SIR,—I have the honour to submit to you herewith the Public Accounts for the year ended the 30th June, 1900.

The receipts on account of Consolidated Fund for the year amounted to \$51,029,994.02, and the expenditure for the same period to \$42,975,279.51. The surplus of receipts over expenditure was therefore \$8,054,714.51.

The sum of \$1,547,623.74 was paid in connection with the South Africa Contingents.

At the close of the fiscal year the balance at this credit of the depositors in the Post Office and Government Savings Banks amounted to \$53,149,722.40 an increase of \$2,908,006.95 over the balance held on June 30, 1899; part of this increase, \$1,501,992.09, represents interest added to the various accounts, and the remainder, \$1,406,014.86, the excess of receipts over withdrawals.

Dominion notes to the amount of \$26,094,923.52 were outstanding on the 30th June, 1900, as against \$24,236,466.52 on the 30th June of the previous year, or an increase of \$1,858,457.

There has been a continued expansion in the circulation of notes of the denomination of one and two dollars. The demand for this class of currency makes itself felt especially during the months of September and October on account of the activity caused by the movement of the harvest. On the 31st October last the issue of one and two dollar notes exceeded the ten million dollar mark for the first time. The following statement shows the progressive increase since 1893 :—

It may be of interest to refer, in this connection, to the increase in the circulation of the notes of the chartered banks, although the subject is one that does not relate directly to the accounts herewith submitted. The business conditions that demanded a largely increased issue of Dominion notes of the smaller denominations influenced in the same way the issues of the chartered banks. On October 31, 1899, the banks according to their returns had notes in circulation amounting to \$49,588,236, and at the corresponding date of this year \$53,198,777, or an increase of \$3,610,541. In the five years from October 31, 1895, there has been an increase of over 53 per cent in the volume of the circulation of the notes of the chartered banks.

Investments on account of the Sinking Funds of the various Loans were made during the year to the amount of \$2,465,639.84, making the total amount held on this account on June 30, \$45,824,282.37.

The net debt of the Dominion at the close of the fiscal year was \$265,493,806.89, or a decrease of \$779,639.71 from the previous year, the details of which are as follows :

The average rate of interest paid on the gross debt for the year was \$3.09 as compared with \$3.14 for the year previous, and the net rate of interest paid fell from \$2.68 to \$2.60

Satisfactory progress has been made towards the final adjustment of the outstanding accounts between the Dominion and the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec. The account of the Province of Ontario down to 1892 has been settled with the exception of one item, that relating to the claims arising out of Treaty Number Three. The account of the Province of Quebec to the same date is rapidly approaching settlement.

The only matter of primary importance that stands in the way of the final disposal of the accounts is that referred to arising out of Treaty Number Three, and it is hoped that steps will be taken to have it submitted to the arbitrators at an early day.

The awards made during the last two years are submitted herewith.

On page *xviii* will be found the table of the aggregate receipts and expenditures under all heads from Confederation to June 30 last. At that date the excess of the expenditures over the receipts was \$189,765,165.52.

The tone of the money market in Great Britain has been firmer of late than it was at the close of 1899. The prices of securities of the very highest class such as consols, owing to special causes, have not recovered to any extent the severe decline experienced in the previous year. Corporation stocks remain dull and quotations fail to show any recovery from the falling away of 1898 and 1899. In fact the market quotations for securities of the gilt-edged class generally have ruled weak. Notwithstanding these features of the market the prices of Canadian issues have been uniformly and distinctly firm. The knowledge that the market for them would be broadened by

their inclusion in the list of funds in which trustee investments could be made has no doubt tended to maintain their price. The *Economist* of November 24 last quotes Canadian  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cents at 105, 3 per cents at 101 and  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cents at 92.

The table respecting the number of officers subject to the Superannuation Acts and Retirement Act, carried down to June 30, 1899, will be found appended. The number subject to the old Superannuation in 1892 was 4,236 and in 1899 it fell to 2,984, showing a decided decrease in this contingent liability devolving on the Treasury on this account.

SESSIONAL PAPER No. 2

*To all to whom these Presents shall come :*

The Honourable John Alexander Boyd, of the city of Toronto, and the province of Ontario, Chancellor of the said province ; the Honourable Sir Louis Napoleon Casault, of the city of Quebec, in the province of Quebec, Chief Justice of the Superior Court of the said province of Quebec, and the Honourable George Wheelock Burbidge, of the city of Ottawa, in the said province of Ontario, Judge of the Exchequer Court of Canada, SEND GREETING :

Whereas it was in and by the Act of the Parliament of Canada, 54-55 Victoria, chapter 6, and in and by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, 54 Victoria, chapter 2, and in and by an Act of the Legislature of Quebec, 54 Victoria, chapter 4, among other things, provided that for the final and conclusive determination of certain questions and accounts which had arisen or which might arise in the settlement of accounts between the Dominion of Canada and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, both jointly and severally, and between the two provinces, concerning which no agreement had theretofore been arrived at, the Governor General in Council might unite with the Governments of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec in the appointment of three arbitrators, being judges, to whom should be referred such questions as the Governor General and Lieutenant Governors of the said provinces should agree to submit.

And whereas we, the undersigned, John Alexander Boyd, Louis Napoleon Casault, and George Wheelock Burbidge have been duly appointed under the said Acts, and have taken upon ourselves the burdens thereof.

And whereas it was provided in and by the said Acts such arbitrators, or any two of them should have power to make one or more awards, and to do so from time to time.

And whereas a certain question respecting the division of the income of the Common School Fund between the provinces of Ontario and Quebec : namely, whether the award of September 3, 1870, in so far as it directs a division of the income of the Common School Fund between the provinces of Ontario and Quebec is good or not, has been submitted to us the said arbitrators, and we have heard the parties and what has been alleged on the part of each.

Now, therefore we the said arbitrators exercising our authority to make a separate award at this time respecting the said matter, and proceeding upon our view of a disputed question of law, do answer the said question in the affirmative, and do award, order and adjudge in and upon the premises, that the income of the Common School Fund be divided between the said provinces of Ontario and Quebec in the manner and proportions determined and provided for in the said award of September 3, 1870.

Sir Louis Napoleon Casault dissents from this answer and award.

In witness whereof we, the said John Alexander Boyd, Louis Napoleon Casault and George Wheelock Burbidge have hereunto set our hands and seals this twenty-second day of March A. D., 1899.

*To all to whom these Presents shall come :*

The Honourable Sir John Alexander Boyd, of the city of Toronto, in the province of Ontario, Chancellor of the said province ; the Honourable Sir Louis Napoleon Casault, of the city of Quebec, in the province of Quebec, Chief Justice of the Superior Court of the said province of Quebec ; and the Honourable George Wheelock Burbidge, of the city of Ottawa, in the said province of Ontario, Judge of the Exchequer Court of Canada, SEND GREETING :

Whereas it was in and by the Act of the Parliament of Canada, 54-55 Victoria, chapter 6, and in and by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, 54 Victoria, chapter 2, and in and by an Act of the Legislature of Quebec, 54 Victoria, chapter 4, among other things, provided that for the final and conclusive determination of certain questions and accounts which had arisen, or which might arise, in the settlement of accounts between the Dominion of Canada and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, both jointly and severally, and between the two provinces, concerning which no agreement had theretofore been arrived at, the Governor General in Council might unite with the Governments of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec in the appointment of three arbitrators, being judges, to whom should be referred such questions as the Governor General and Lieutenant-Governors of the provinces should agree to submit.

And whereas, we, the undersigned, John Alexander Boyd, Louis Napoleon Casault, and George Wheelock Burbidge, have been duly appointed under the said Acts, and have taken upon ourselves the burdens thereof.

And whereas it was provided in and by said Act that such arbitrators, or any two of them, should have power to make one or more awards and to do so from time to time.

And whereas by an agreement made on April 10, 1893, on behalf of the government of Canada of the first part, the government of Ontario of the second part, and the government of Quebec of the third part, it was, among other things, agreed by and between the said several governments, parties thereto, that the following questions, among others, mentioned in the order of the Governor General in Council of the twelfth day of December, eighteen hundred and ninety, be, and they were thereby referred to the said arbitrators for their determination and award, in accordance with the said statutes, namely :

'The ascertainment and determination of the amount of the principal of the Common School Fund, the rate of interest which should be allowed on such fund, and the method of computing such interest.

'In the ascertainment of the amount of the principal of the said Common School Fund, the arbitrators are to take into consideration, not only the sum now held by the government of the Dominion of Canada, but also the amount for which Ontario is liable, and also the value of the school lands which have not yet been sold.'

And whereas certain questions respecting the common school fund were submitted to us the said arbitrators, and among others, a claim made on behalf of the province of Quebec that the province of Ontario is liable to the Common School Fund for the following amounts :—

1. Moneys collected by Ontario which they have omitted to credit to the Common School Fund in their accounts as rendered . . . . .	\$ 9,468.59
2. Deductions made by Ontario on balances due in capital and interest on sales of land prior to June 30, 1867 . . . . .	260,445.19
3. Deductions on balances due in principal and interest on sales made subsequent to July 1, 1867 . . . . .	2,975.99
4. Balances due in principal and interest on lots sold prior to June 30, 1867, patents having been issued by the Ontario government to the occupants of lots without payment of any money . . . . .	7,270.62
5. Amounts due in principal and interest on sales made prior to June 30, 1867, but subsequently cancelled and re-sold by Ontario at reduced rates . . . . .	20,662.58

And whereas dealing with that claim, among others, and exercising our authority to make an award in respect thereof, we did, among other things (Sir John Alexander Boyd dissenting from so much of the award as made the province of Ontario liable for any sums of money remitted to or not collected from the purchaser of any common school lands and for interest on any sums so remitted or not collected) award and adjudge in and upon the premises as follows, that is to say :—

That in computing the amount of principal money of the Common School Fund for which the province of Ontario is liable, the following sums shall be deemed to be and shall be treated in all respects as moneys received by the province from or on account of the common school lands set apart in aid of the common schools of the late province of Canada, that is to say :—

‘(a.) Any sum of money due for principal or interest from any purchaser of said common school lands, remitted by the province of Ontario to the purchaser, unless it be shown by the province that such remission was made in a fair and prudent administration of the common school lands and fund ; and

‘(b.) Any sum of money due for principal or interest from any purchaser of said common school lands, at the time when letters patent for such lands were issued to him by the province of Ontario, and not collected by the province, unless it be shown by the province that there was good cause for not collecting the same.

‘That where in a fair and prudent administration of the common school lands any sale of such lands has been cancelled by the province of Ontario, and the same resold at a price less than that first obtained, the province shall not be liable for the loss resulting therefrom.’

And whereas it is claimed on behalf of the province of Ontario that the Common School Fund should be debited and province of Ontario credited with certain refunds of moneys collected, or received on deposit, on account of certain common school lands and credited to the said fund, amounting in all to the sum of \$11,558.24 ;

And whereas the parties have proceeded further with the said claims made by the provinces of Quebec and Ontario, and have filed statements showing the particulars thereof, and have submitted evidence in respect thereto, and in respect of the value of the school lands which had not at the date of the said Agreement of Submission been sold ;

And whereas we have heard the parties and considered the evidence ;

Now therefore, we, the said Louis Napoleon Casault, and George Wheelock Burdige, two of the said Arbitrators, exercising the authority given to make an award at this time, and deciding, not according to strict rules of law, but upon equitable principles (the said John Alexander Boyd dissenting as hereinafter mentioned) do award, order and adjudge in the premises as follows, that is to say :—

1. That subject to any revision and correction of the amount of the item in each case (which shall be ascertained by accountants to be appointed by the Arbitrators, in case the parties themselves do not otherwise agree) that may appear necessary and proper in the further taking of the accounts, that the province of Ontario shall be debited with the sum of \$9,468.59, hereinbefore mentioned for moneys collected on account of the Common School Lands and not credited to the Common School Fund in the accounts as rendered. This amount being the difference in sums omitted to be credited to that fund, and sums wrongly credited thereto, the several items as they appear in the statement prepared by Mr. Hyde and laid before us are (subject to such revision and correction) allowed as claimed by Quebec.

2. That subject to such revision and correction as aforesaid the province of Ontario shall be debited and the Common School Fund credited with the several items and amounts shown in the said statement prepared by Mr. Hyde, that go to make up the amount of \$260,445.19 hereinbefore mentioned, and for which the province of Quebec claims that the province of Ontario is liable, with the exception of an item of \$359.31 which appears at page 54 of the said statement in connection with sale numbered 9762.

3. That subject to such revision and correction as aforesaid the province of Ontario shall be debited and the Common School Fund credited with the several items and amounts shown in the said statement prepared by Mr. Hyde that go to make up the

sum of \$2,975.99 hereinbefore mentioned, and for which the province of Quebec claims that the province of Ontario is liable.

4. That subject to such revision and correction as aforesaid the province of Ontario shall be debited and the Common School Fund credited with the several items and amounts shown in the said statement prepared by Mr. Hyde that go to make up the sum of \$7,270.62 hereinbefore mentioned, and for which the province of Quebec claims that the province of Ontario is liable.

5. In respect to the amount of \$20,662.58 hereinbefore mentioned, and for which the province of Quebec claims that the province of Ontario is liable in respect of the cancellations of certain sales of land and the re-sale thereof at reduced rates, that the province of Ontario, subject to such revision and correction as aforesaid, be debited and the Common School Fund credited with the following items and amounts:—

7. That the said several sums, items and amounts to be so debited to the province of Ontario and credited to the Common School Fund are subject, notwithstanding anything herein contained, to the deductions for management, and for the Upper Canada Improvement Fund mentioned in our award of the sixth day of February, 1896, whenever the same fall within the rules therein in that behalf laid down.

8. Sir John Alexander Boyd dissents from paragraphs two, three, four and five of this award on the ground that the liability of Ontario to account for school moneys is to be measured by the terms of the award of 1870. The ninth paragraph of that award created and constituting the sole basis of such liability is confined in express terms to moneys received from the sale of lands. It appears not competent for the present Board to extend that obligation by the addition of words importing that Ontario is liable also for moneys which might have been received. Nor does it appear competent to extend that obligation obliquely by the application of 'equitable principles,' for these principles are not to be employed to add to the language, or to alter the meaning of the award of 1870, which has been declared by the Supreme Court of Canada to be in this regard final and conclusive.

*To all to whom these presents shall come* :—The Honourable Sir John Alexander Boyd, of the city of Toronto, in the province of Ontario, Chancellor of the said province; the Honourable Sir Louis Napoleon Casault, of the city of Quebec, in the province of Quebec, Chief Justice of the Superior Court of the said province of Quebec; and the Honourable George Wheelock Burbidge, of the city of Ottawa, in the said province of Ontario, Judge of the Exchequer Court of Canada, SEND GREETING :

Whereas it was in and by the Act of the Parliament of Canada, 54-55 Victoria, Chapter 6, and in and by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, 54 Victoria, Chapter 2, and in and by an Act of the Legislature of Quebec, 54 Victoria, Chapter 4, among other things, provided that for the final and conclusive determination of certain questions and accounts which had arisen, or which might arise, in the settlement of accounts between the Dominion of Canada and the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, both jointly and severally, and between the two provinces, concerning which no agreement had theretofore been arrived at, the Governor General in Council might unite with the governments of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec in the appointment of three Arbitrators, being Judges, to whom should be referred such questions as the Governor General and Lieutenant Governors of the provinces should agree to submit;

And whereas we, the undersigned, John Alexander Boyd, Louis Napoleon Casault, and George Wheelock Burbidge, have been duly appointed under the said Acts, and have taken upon ourselves the burdens thereof;

And whereas it was provided in and by the said Acts that such Arbitrators, or any two of them, should have power to make one or more awards and to do so from time to time;

And whereas by an agreement made on the tenth of April, 1893, on behalf of the government of Canada of the first part, the government of Ontario of the second part, and the government of Quebec of the third part, it was, among other things, agreed by and between the said several governments, parties thereto, that the following questions, among others, mentioned in the order of the Governor General in Council of the twelfth day of December, eighteen hundred and ninety, be, and they were thereby referred to the said Arbitrators for their determination and award, in accordance with the said statutes, namely :—

The claims made by the Dominion government on behalf of Indians and payments made by the government to Indians;

And whereas amongst other claims submitted to the said Arbitrators were those of the Dominion on behalf of the Ojibeway Indians of Lakes Huron and Superior against the provinces of Ontario and Quebec as representing the late province of Canada for the payment under the Robinson Treaties of the 7th and 9th days of September, 1850, of certain arrears of increased annuities, and for moneys paid by the Dominion government to these Indians from the year 1874 in respect of such increased annuities;

And whereas we, having heard the parties and what was alleged by them respectively, and exercising our power from time to time to make one or more awards, did make certain awards in the premises;

And whereas the said parties giving effect to such awards by mutual agreement and arrangement have in effect, as will appear by reference to the orders or minutes of Council, of which copies, verified by the signatures of the undersigned, are hereto attached, consented and agreed as follows, that is to say:—

1. With respect to the Lake Superior Treaty that there be entered and charged in the province of Canada account against the said province as represented by the provinces of Ontario and Quebec the sum of \$17,232.00, of which amount the sum of \$3,068.00 is to be entered and charged therein of the date of December 31, 1874, and the balance or sum of \$14,164.00, of the date of December 31, 1892.

2. With respect to the Lake Huron Treaty that there be entered and charged in the province of Canada account against the said province as represented by the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec the sum of \$95,768.00, which said sum is to be entered and charged in the said account of the dates and in the manner following, that is to say:—

EXTRACT from a Report of the Committee of the Honourable the Privy Council, approved by His Excellency on December 8, 1899.

On a report dated December 4, 1899, from the Minister of Finance, submitting that by the first agreement of submission, dated April 10, 1893, in the arbitration between the Dominion of Canada, the province of Canada, the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, respecting the settlement of the disputed accounts of the Dominion and the said provinces, 'the claims made by the Dominion government on behalf of Indians and payments made by the government to Indians' were to form part of the reference.

That amongst other claims submitted to the arbitrators were those of the Dominion on behalf of the Ojibeway Indians of lakes Huron and Superior against the provinces of Ontario and Quebec as representing the late province of Canada for the payment, under the Robinson Treaties of September 7 and 9, 1850, of certain arrears of increased annuities, and for moneys paid by the Dominion government to these Indians from the year 1874 in respect of the said increased annuities.

That under the said Treaties the said Indians ceded certain lands to the government of the province of Canada in consideration of a cash payment, and the further payment of fixed annuities of \$2,000 per annum in respect of the Superior Indians, and \$2,400 per annum in respect of the Huron Indians, which sums were to be increased under certain circumstances and conditions set out in the Treaties, to an amount not to exceed \$4 for each Indian.

That at confederation, in the settlement of the debts and liabilities of the province of Canada under the British North America Act, the amount of the said fixed annuities, namely, \$4,400, was capitalized at the sum of \$88,000, which sum was charged in the province of Canada account and formed part of the debt of the said province of Canada; and the interest on the said sum of \$88,000 has been sufficient in the hands of the Dominion to liquidate and pay to the Indians the amount of the fixed annuities, which fixed annuities have always been paid and no question has arisen in this arbitration as to the said fixed annuities.

That in the year 1874 the Indians represented to the Dominion that the lands ceded were producing sufficient revenue to justify the payment of the increased annuities up to the amount of \$4 per Indian, and thereafter the Dominion has paid to each of the said Indians the sum of \$4.

That by the said first agreement of submission, all the accounts referred to were to be brought down and extended to December 31, 1892, inclusive.

That in the proceedings before the arbitrators upon the claims under the said Treaties, as the Minister is advised, such steps have been taken that the arbitrators are now in a position to make their awards as to the amount to be paid to the Dominion government by the government of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, as representing the province of Canada, for arrears of increased annuities prior to 1874, and for payments made by the Dominion to the Indians in respect of such increased annuities from the year 1874 up to and inclusive of the year 1892, the amount to be charged to the province of Canada account arising upon the Superior Treaty, being the sum of \$17,232, and the amount under the Huron Treaty the sum of \$95,768, which would close the account under these Treaties in respect of the said increased annuities up to December 31, 1892, the said sums to be charged at the dates and in the manner hereinafter specified.

That since December 31, 1892, the Dominion government has continued to pay the Indians under the said Treaties the said increased annuities, and the Indians will be entitled in future to receive and be paid such increased annuities; and suggestions have been made by the several governments interested that instead of the governments of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, as representing the late province of Canada, paying to the Dominion an annual sum to satisfy the said increased annuities, it would be well that the said Governments of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec should be relieved from the payment of an annual sum to the Dominion to satisfy in the future after December 31, 1892, the increased annuities payable to the Indians under the terms of the said Treaties, and that in order to carry these suggestions out an annual sum should be capitalized sufficient to satisfy the amounts payable by the provinces of Ontario and Quebec in respect of the said increased annuities; and the capitalized sum charged to the province of Canada account.

That negotiations to that end have taken place between the said governments, and the sum of \$8,200 has been agreed upon as representing the amount which the provinces of Ontario and Quebec would be required to pay to the Dominion annually towards the payment of the said increased annuities, which sum capitalized at the rate of 4 per cent, as agreed upon, would produce the sum of \$205,000.

The Minister with the view of carrying into effect the agreement which has been reached between the several governments interested therein, recommends as follows:—

1. That the above mentioned amounts of \$17,232 and \$95,768 be charged to the late province of Canada account as of the dates hereafter named, as follows:

2. That the said capitalized sum of \$205,000 above mentioned be charged to the said province of Canada account as of December 31, 1892, and be taken to extinguish for ever thereafter the annual charge of \$8,200 for and in respect of the annual claims of the Dominion on behalf of the said Indians for increased annuities under the said treaties, and that the provinces of Ontario and Quebec as representing the late province of Canada, be from and after December 31, 1892, relieved from all liability and further payment in respect of the said increased annuities which may be payable under the said Huron and Superior Treaties.

3. That the amount of the balance of the said account of the province of Canada on the said December 31, 1892, including the above sums, be, on the last mentioned day, apportioned, divided and transferred to the separate accounts of Ontario and Quebec, on the basis of the apportionment established by the award of September 3, 1870.

4. That certified copies of this Order in Council be transmitted to the Lieutenant Governors of Ontario and Quebec for approval and confirmation by their respective governments.

No. 220.—Concerning certain claims submitted to the Arbitrators appointed by the Legislatures of Canada, Ontario and Quebec.

The Honourable the Treasurer of the province, in a report dated the fourth of May instant (1900), sets forth : that among the claims submitted to the Arbitrators appointed by Acts of the Legislatures of Canada, Ontario and Quebec, for the final and conclusive determination of certain questions and accounts between the Dominion of Canada and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec and between the two provinces, were those of the Dominion on behalf of the Ojibeway Indians of Lakes Huron and Superior against the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, as representing the late Province of Canada, for the payments under the Robinson Treaties of 1850 of certain increased annuities under the conditions set forth in the said Treaties.

That by virtue of awards of the said Arbitrators and judgments of the Supreme Court of Canada and of the Lords of the Privy Council, the said provinces of Ontario and Quebec have been held jointly liable for such increased annuities ; and whereas an agreement has been made between the governments of the Dominion of Canada and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, as representing the late province of Canada, for the settlement of the amount payable in the past for these increased annuities, and also for the amount of the capitalization thereof, for the future the Honourable the Treasurer recommends that the terms of the order of His Excellency the Governor General of Canada in Council, dated the 8th December, 1899, embodying the terms of this agreement, be approved and confirmed, viz. :—

1. That the amounts of \$17,232 and \$95,768 be charged to the late Province of Canada account as of the dates hereinafter named, as follows :—

That the amount of the balance of the said account of the province of Canada on the said 31st December, 1892, including the above sums, be, on the last mentioned day, apportioned, divided and transferred to the separate accounts of Ontario and Quebec, on the basis of the apportionment established by the award of September 3, 1870.

The Honourable Sir John Alexander Boyd, of the city of Toronto, in the province of Ontario, Chancellor of the said province; the Honourable Sir Louis Napoleon Casault, of the city of Quebec, in the province of Quebec, Chief Justice of the Superior Court of the said province of Quebec; and the Honourable George Wheelock Burbidge, of the city of Ottawa, in the said province of Ontario, Judge of the Exchequer Court of Canada,—SEND GREETING.

Whereas it was in and by the Act of the Parliament of Canada, 54-55 Victoria, chapter 6, and in and by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, 54 Victoria,

chapter 2, and in and by an Act of the Legislature of Quebec, 54 Victoria, chapter 4, among other things, provided that for the final and conclusive determination of certain questions and accounts which had arisen, or which might arise, in the settlement of accounts between the Dominion of Canada and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, both jointly and severally, and between the two provinces, concerning which no agreement had theretofore been arrived at, the Governor General in Council might unite with the governments of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec in the appointment of three arbitrators, being judges, to whom should be referred such questions as the Governor General and Lieutenant Governors of the provinces should agree to submit ;

And whereas we, the undersigned, John Alexander Boyd, Louis Napoleon Casault and George Wheelock Burbidge have been duly appointed under the said Acts, and have taken upon ourselves the burdens thereof ;

And whereas it was provided in and by the said Acts that such arbitrators, or any two of them, should have power to make one or more awards and to do so from time to time ;

And whereas by an agreement made on April 10, 1893, on behalf of the government of Canada of the first part, the government of Ontario of the second part, and the government of Quebec of the third part, it was, among other things, in substance agreed by and between the said several governments, parties thereto, that the following questions, among others, mentioned in the order of the Governor General in Council of December 12, 1890, be, and they were thereby referred to the said arbitrators for their determination and award, in accordance with the said statutes, namely :—

All matters of account between the Dominion and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec jointly, and that such accounts should be brought down and extended to December 31, 1892, inclusive ;

And whereas certain matters of account between the Dominion of Canada and the said provinces conjointly as representing the late province of Canada have been laid before us, and we have heard the parties and what was alleged by them and have made certain awards respecting the same ;

And whereas a statement of account, known as the province of Canada account, a copy of which, verified by the signatures of the undersigned, is hereto attached, has been prepared and laid before us, in which, among other things, effect is given to the said awards ;

And whereas by the said statement of account it appears that in respect of the matters therein dealt with the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, as representing the late province of Canada, were, on December 31, 1892, indebted to the Dominion of Canada in the sum of Two hundred and twelve thousand nine hundred and four dollars and four cents (\$212,904.04) ;

And whereas by certain orders or minutes of Council, copies of which are attached to an award bearing even date herewith made by us in the matter of the Lakes Huron and Superior, or Robinson Treaties, the said parties have, among other things, agreed that the balance of the province of Canada account on the said December 31, 1892, should be apportioned, divided and transferred to the separate accounts of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec on the basis of the apportionment established by the award of September 3, 1870 ;

And whereas it appears that in accordance with such basis of apportionment the sum of one hundred and twelve thousand three hundred and fifty dollars and fifty-three cents (\$112,350.53) should, as of December 31, 1892, be charged against the province of Ontario in the province of Ontario account, and that the sum of one hundred thousand five hundred and fifty-three dollars and fifty-one cents (\$100,553.51) should, as of December 31, 1892, be charged against the province of Quebec in the province of Quebec account ;

And whereas it is admitted on behalf of the Dominion of Canada, of the province of Ontario, and of the province of Quebec, that said statement of account and apportionment is true and correct, and it is desirable and expedient that we should by our award give effect thereto ;

Now therefore know ye that we, the said John Alexander Boyd, Louis Napoleon Casault, and George Wheelock Burbidge do award, order and adjudge in the premises as follows, that is to say :—

That on December 31, 1892, the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, as representing the late province of Canada, were conjointly indebted to the Dominion of Canada in the sum of two hundred and twelve thousand nine hundred and four dollars and four cents (\$212,904.04) as per the annexed statement of account and that of this amount the sum of one hundred and twelve thousand three hundred and fifty dollars and fifty-three cents (\$112,350.53) is chargeable to the province of Ontario, and is to be entered and charged as of that date against the said province in the province of Ontario account, and the sum of one hundred thousand five hundred and fifty three dollars and fifty-one cents (\$100,553.51) is chargeable to the province of Quebec, and is to be entered and charged as of that date against the said province in the province of Quebec account.

This award is made without prejudice to any claim that the Dominion of Canada may at any time have against the provinces of Ontario and Quebec conjointly in respect of any debt or liability of the late province of Canada not dealt with in the said statement of account for which subsequent to the said thirty-first day of December, 1892, the Dominion may be found to be liable.

## SESSIONAL PAPER No. 2

*To all to whom these Presents shall come :*

The Honourable Sir John Alexander Boyd, of the city of Toronto, in the province of Ontario, Chancellor of the said province; the Honourable Sir Louis Napoleon Casault, of the city of Quebec, in the province of Quebec, Chief Justice of the Superior Court of the said province of Quebec; and the Honourable George Wheelock Burbidge, of the city of Ottawa, in the said province of Ontario, Judge of the Exchequer Court of Canada, SEND GREETING.

Whereas it was in and by the Act of the Parliament of Canada, 54-55 Victoria, chapter 6, and in and by an act of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, 54 Victoria, chapter 2, and in and by an Act of the Legislature of Quebec, 54 Victoria, chapter 4, among other thing, provided that for the final and conclusive determination of certain questions and accounts which had arisen, or which might arise, in the settlement of accounts between the Dominion of Canada and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, both jointly and severally, and between the two provinces, concerning which no agreement had theretofore been arrived at, the Governor General in Council might unite with the governments of the provinces of Ontario and Quebec in the appointment of three arbitrators, being judges, to whom should be referred such questions as the Governor General and the Lieutenant-Governors of the provinces should agree to submit.

And whereas we, the undersigned, John Alexander Boyd, Louis Napoleon Casault, and George Wheelock Burbidge, have been duly appointed under the said Acts, and have taken upon ourselves the burdens thereof.

And whereas it was provided in and by the said Acts that such arbitrators, or any two of them, should have power to make one or more awards, and to do so from time to time.

And whereas by an agreement made on April 10, 1893, on behalf of the government of Canada of the first part, the government of Ontario of the second part, and the government of Quebec of the third part, it was among other things, in substance agreed by and between the said several governments, parties thereto, that the following questions, among others mentioned in the order of the Governor General in Council of December 12, 1890, be, and they were thereby referred to the said arbitrators for their determination and award in accordance with the said statutes, namely:—

All matters of account between the Dominion of Canada and the province of Ontario, and that such accounts should be brought down and extended to December 31, 1892, inclusive.

And whereas certain matters of account between the Dominion of Canada and the province of Ontario have been laid before us, and we have heard the parties and what was alleged by them, and have made certain awards respecting the same.

And whereas a statement of account, known as the province of Ontario account, a copy of which, verified by the signatures of the undersigned, is hereto attached, has been prepared and laid before us, wherein among other things, effect has been given to the said awards.

And whereas by the said statement of account it appears that in respect of the matters therein dealt with the province of Ontario, on December 31, 1892, was indebted to the Dominion of Canada in the sum of one million eight hundred and fifteen thousand eight hundred and forty eight dollars and fifty nine cents (\$1,815,848.59).

And whereas it is admitted on behalf of the Dominion of Canada and of the province of Ontario that the said statement is true and correct.

Now therefore, we, the said John Alexander Boyd, Louis Napoleon Casault and George Wheelock Burbidge, do award, order and adjudge in the premises that on December 31, 1892, the province of Ontario was indebted to the Dominion of Canada in the sum of one million eight hundred and fifteen thousand eight hundred and forty eight dollars and fifty nine cents (\$1,815,848.59) as per the annexed statement of account.

Provided, however, that as the said agreement of submission requires the arbitrators to bring down and extend all accounts between the parties to the said December 31, 1892, and certain matters respecting the Common School Fund and the North-west Angle Treaty, No. 3, have not been finally concluded and determined, and as the principal or capital of certain funds held by the Dominion for the province has not been entered in the said statement to the credit of the province, this award is and shall be taken to be made with respect only to the matters dealt with in the said statement and without prejudice to our authority in the final statement of the account as of the date mentioned and in our award therein to add to or take from the said amount by reason of anything not concluded by the said statement of account hereto attached and this our award in respect thereof.
