These roots we obtain most successfully by frequent transplanting in light, loamy soil; and it is an accomplished fact that trees from the READING NURSERY have much better roots, and are more sure to live, than those received from the average nurseryman. The above facts, together with the experience which our long attention to the Nursery business has given us, is evidence that tree-planters cannot better place their orders than with us, as we shall give all such our careful attention; filling with truly named, vigorous, healthy, well-rooted stock, and packing such in so complete a manner as to prevent any exposure to injury or travelling on their journey to their destination.

WEIR'S CUT-LEAVED SILVER MAPLE.

Acer dasycarpum, var. Weirii laciniatum.— A beautiful form of the Silver Maple, of exceedingly rapid growth, with deeply cut foliage of a light-green upper-surface and silvery under-surface, while the leaf-stalks and smaller twigs are of a deep carmine color. The branches are pendulous, and give a most graceful appearance to the whole. Few trees are of more rapid growth, or so satisfactory in appearance; it ranks among the first in attractive lawn trees, and is easily adapted to small grounds, as it will bear any amount of close pruning.
