Abraham Dupont, a planter of Matanzas, East Florida, recommends to the agriculturists in the cotton growing States, the cultivation of a species of coffee known in this country as Florida coffee. He says, that it will be a stapl of i nunense value to them—one which will realise more than any other even -if not more than one half the price of West In its coffice be obtained for it. It grows wild according to his account on the banks of the Mississippi around our city, where it is collected by the old inhabitants and used as cuffee. Having made use of it himself for three months in his family, he prenounces it superior to the green Cuba coffie. He describes it as an annual plant, to be cultivated in the same manner as cotton, leaving the plants at a greater distance rich land. It will grow on the poorest land. Two pounds of seeds will plant an acre of land; one acre will produce from fifteen hundred to two thousand pounds of coffee; it blooms from early in July until late in October, ripens from early in August until front, or early in November, the seeds are about the size of a grain of wheat, of an olive color, each post containing from forty to sixty grains of coffee; the pode must be collected as fast as they ripen, when threshed, which is performed with a common stick from the woods in a close room with a tight floor, and after it is winnamed it is then fit for use; neither horses, cattle or hogs will eat of the plant; it is not disturbed by caterpillars or any insects, it returns more foliage to the land than any highland cultivation; it is also a great acquisition to the rearing of bees, as pure honey rises on the stem of each stalk of the leaves, which is sought after by the bees and ante.
