SEASONABLE NOTES

The open weather during February in most of the Southern States has caused a very heavy demand for all seeds for spring planting. The seeding of grains and clovers has been heavier than for a number of years and prices, especially on Red and Sapling Clover, have taken quite an advance, with indications that supplies of native grown Red Clover will be exhausted before many days. With this scarcity of Red Clover and the highly prevailing prices, we are recommending the use of **Alfalfa, Sweet Clover and Alsike Clover** as most desirable substitutes, all of which are reasonable in price.

In this edition we are listing a good many varieties of the most desirable types of Seed Corn and Cotton, giving a short description and their adaptability to sections where they will give the best results. Good seed stocks of both of these items are in short supply, and we certainly advise early purchases. Be sure that both the cotton and corn you plant this year is of strong germination. The early frost last year damaged a large portion of the crops, making the seed unfit for planting purposes.

VIRGINIA 2nd CROP SEED POTATOES

Judging by the increased demand for Second Crop Potatoes, we feel sure that they are giving as good or better results than we have claimed. We have received a good many letters about the wonderful yielding qualities of these potatoes in comparison with Maine grown seed, and have no hesitancy in recommending them highly for your planting this spring.

Our seed stock was grown in the very best potato districts of Virginia from certified Maine grown seed. They are smaller in size than Maine potatoes, cut to better advantage and more economical for planting. Second crop Potatoes are acclimated to our Southern growing conditions, being a sure cropper, and will produce large yields of good uniform potatoes. We can supply both the **Red Bliss** and **Irish Cobbler** varieties.

Yielded 200 Bushels Per Acre Without Spraying.

The **Certified Maine Grown Irish Cobbler Potatoes** secured from you last spring produced a very fine crop, very smooth potatoes. On account of the crop being further advanced when late rains came the yield was not quite as good as from the **Virginia Grown Second Crop Cobblers**. The **Virginia Grown Second Crop Cobblers** produced at the rate of 200 bushels to the acre without spraying. The tubers were large, many quite large, smooth and were easily sold on a glutted market.—J. C. BEAVERS, Guilford County, N. C., December 3, 1924.

JAPAN CLOVER OR LESPEDEZA

The Alfalfa of the South

A vigorous growing Clover, especially adapted to the Southern States, and has been used quite extensively in some of the Northern States on land where other Clovers will not catch. Lespedeza is successful on a wide range of soils; ranks high with other Clovers as a soil improver, and produces hay equal in feeding value to Alfalfa.

The best summer pastures in the South are those which consist of Lespedeza in combination with Bermuda Grass or Carpet Grass, with the further addition of White Clover. Stocks of Carpet Grass this year, however, are exhausted and no more seed is available.

For a hay crop seeded alone, sow 25 pounds per acre. For pasturage, 15 pounds Japan Clover, 5 pounds Bermuda Grass and 2 pounds White Clover per acre.

WHITE SWEET CLOVER

White Sweet Clover has some marked advantages over ordinary pastures. It can be pastured earlier in the spring; will support more animals per acre; not affected so severely by drought, and is of higher feeding value. Besides Sweet Clover is an excellent soil improver and a surer crop than either Red Clover or Alfalfa. When you consider the high prices of other leguminous Clovers, as well as Cow Peas and Soja Beans, White Sweet Clover should be used very largely this year, as it compares favorably with these crops as a soil builder. Give Sweet Clover a trial this year for either a pasture or hay crop, as we feel sure you will be well pleased with this legume. Sow at the rate of 15 to 20 pounds per acre and inoculate the seed.

We wish to call your particular attention to these Mixtures, which are especially prepared from years of actual study for various soil conditions. These Mixtures have given wonderful results wherever used, and their use are the surest method of obtaining a permanent pasturage or hay crop. They contain from ten to fifteen different grasses and clovers of the highest quality, and will furnish a better balanced feed much preferred by the leading cattle raisers.

Select Your Seed Corn Carefully With Reference to Soil and Situation

The Varieties Offered Below Are True to Type and Germination 90-100%

The foremost thought in the mind of practically every farmer in the East at the present time is, "What variety of seed corn am I going to plant this year?" This is all the more important because approximately 75 per cent. of all corns raised in the East this year are of poor or worthless germination, and if planted would tend to materially destroy the planter's chance of raising a satisfactory crop of corn this year. Seed corns naturally will be very scarce, and with the present heavy demand, advise early purchases while the best stocks are available.

We were fortunate in having some contracts for seed corn delivered to us from favored spots which are of excellent quality. There has been some slight change in the varieties available since our Catalog was issued, and we herewith present a list of varieties that we can recommend with confidence as being true to type and of strong germination.

White Varieties

WOOD'S PEDIGREE BOONE COUNTY. The best existing type of Boone County Corn, raised from certified seed.

UTILITY BOONE COUNTY. The standard type of Boone County, raised by a good grower from good seed, not certified. Boone County type corn is highly recommended for central and northern Virginia, the Piedmont sections and higher altitudes of the Central and Northern States.

PEDIGREE CASEY'S PURE BRED. Raised from certified seed. Casey's Pure Bred Corn is a slightly flintier corn than the Boone County, but a similar type, and we recommend it for the same territories.

WOODBURN WHITE DENT is specially recommended for low grounds along rivers and streams, and has proven its superiority over all other varieties in the James River Valley. A heavy yielder, and has given wonderful results on good upland soils. A fine general purpose corn.

IMPROVED SOUTH RN SNOWFLAKE, as its name implies, is a soft, flaky, white grain corn, recommended as an early field variety for roasting ears.

BIGG'S SEVEN EAR. A flinty prolific corn, producing three to five ears to the stalk. Universally popular wherever grown in Virginia and the South, and in competitive field tests has proven that it is one of the largest yielders of all white corns.

WOOD'S IMPROVED WHITE DENT. A corn of vigorous growth. A large single ear variety. Known for generations through Virginia and the South. Admirably suited to Delaware, eastern Maryland or Coastal regions.

PAYMASTER. The best of the red cob varieties. Large deep grained, two eared type corn. Best suited for the Piedmont sections of Virginia and the Carolinas. One of the surest croppers.

HICKORY KING. A variety suited for practically any section of the East. It is known as a **POOR MAN'S CORN**, from the fact that it seems to suit thinner soils better than other varieties.

MOSBY'S PROLIFIC. A valuable variety for southern Virginia and the Carolinas. Reasonably flinty. Fairly weevil proof. Two ears or more to the stalk. Good sized ears and a good yielding variety. A valuable milling corn, and one of the best prolific varieties.

CUMBERLAND CORN. A valuable new deep grained corn of the old gourd seed variety. Produces a big ear, and is one of the best milling corns in existence. This corn made 20 bushels per acre more than several other varieties planted on the same farm. A fine corn well adapted to the higher altitudes.

COCKE'S PROLIFIC. A hard, flinty variety, producing three to four ears to the stalk; a heavy growth of fodder, and is valuable on river bottom lands. **Cocke's Prolific** makes a very tall growth and large stalk, making it a wonderful ensilage corn.

WOOD'S DIXIE. A valuable new variety, offered by us this year for the first time, which is destined to become a favorite in the South. Two to three ears to the stalk. **Wood's Dixie Corn** is the result of careful breeding, and is well adapted to Virginia and the Carolinas.

Yellow Varieties

REID'S YELLOW DENT. An early variety admirably suited to all of the higher altitudes. **Reid's Yellow Dent** is one of the most widely grown yellow corns in the Northern States.

IMPROVED GOLDEN DENT. The standard yellow variety. Known wherever yellow corns are grown. This variety is used very largely in the far Southern States for early feed and roasting ears.

EARLY YELLOW DENT. Suitable only where the grower wants an early, quick maturing corn.

GOLDEN SUMMIT. A broad grain variety somewhat similar in appearance to Golden Dent, but better suited to planting in the higher altitudes. For these sections, where a yellow corn is desired, you will make no mistake in planting **Golden Summit Corn**. A much flintier corn than Reid's Yellow Dent, and believe will eventually take its place in popularity before many years. (See opposite page for prices.)

Cotton Seed

Good Cotton Seed of strong germination is scarce this year, and the failure of some of our crops compels us to change somewhat from our Catalog issued the first of the year.

The germination tests of most of the Virginia seed we have tested up to the present time show it to be absolutely unsuited for planting purposes, and a great deal of seed from the Carolinas also show unsatisfactory germination. The seed we offer are all carefully tested and proved to be of good germinable quality. The varieties we are offering are well adapted for planting in Virginia and the Southern States.

KING 29. The seed we are offering of this variety was raised by a very careful grower in Caswell County, N. C. The product seed were secured direct from the Statesville Branch Experimental Station in the spring of 1924. Every precaution was taken to keep this seed pure in growing, and special ginning arrangements were made with the growers to clean out the gin thoroughly before ginning this seed. It would be difficult to furnish a better or purer strain of the **King 29 Cotton** than we are offering.

IMPROVED EARLY KING. This seed was raised by a careful farmer in Halifax County, N. C., which is in the northern part of the State, having been carefully bred by this farmer during the last three or four years, and ginned over his own private gin. **Early King** is one of the earliest types of cotton, and farmers desiring an early variety should use this cotton, as we believe it is as pure **King Cotton** as can be obtained.

CLEVELAND BIG BOLL. This is recognized as the standard big boll type of cotton for the northern cotton growing section of the Belt. This variety is so well-known that it is not necessary to give an extended description. Our seed was raised by

a careful grower, ginned in a private gin, and is seed that can be recommended as being as pure and unmixed as it is possible to obtain. This seed is well suited to southern Virginia and the Carolinas.

LIGHTNING EXPRESS. This cotton was originated by Coker, of South Carolina, and our grower of this seed in Gloucester County, Va., obtained pedigree seed from the originator. The grower of this seed planted it about May 10th and commenced to pick about September 20th. From one acre he gathered as much as 2,000 pounds seed cotton, and from this he obtained 615 pounds of lint. This is a long staple variety, 1 1/4 to 1 3/16 inch staple. It is probably the earliest variety of the long staple cotton, and is suitable for sandy lands of eastern and southern Virginia, as well as for North and South Carolina.
