The Everbearing Strawberry is a big success. Plants set out in the spring will produce a good crop of berries the same season they are planted. The next June they will yield a big crop and then bear abundantly all summer and fall, up until the ground freezes. We set out our first Progressive plants eight years ago and that season sold berries to more than pay for the plants four times, and had plenty of berries for home use. Our berries have sold for 50c a quart wholesale on the St. Joseph market for three seasons. Plants guaranteed to be genuine everbearers. Many firms are short on their supply of everbearing strawberry plants and are asking about double our price. Our Frost-Proof Cabbage Plants

Will Mature Heads Two to Three Weeks Earlier Than Your Home Grown Plants and Double Your Profits---Why?

There are a number of islands along the Sea Coast of South Carolina, where the soil and climatic conditions are just suited for growing tough, hardy Cabbage plants during the Winter and early Spring. The plants make a slow but steady growth, until at eight to ten weeks of age they are very tough and hardy, the buds are purple and the outer leaves are redish brown. When in this condition they can be shipped to territory farther north and be planted in the open ground a month to six weeks sooner than home-grown hot bed or cold frame plants. These Frost-Proof Cabbage plants will stand a temperature of 20 degrees above zero without injury. The land freezing, or the plants being covered with ice, sleet or snow after they are planted will not injure them, providing temperature does not go below 20 degrees above zero.

The top of the plant does not grow until your regular Spring weather opens up, but the roots grow from the time they are planted, and just as soon as spring weather starts, the established root growth assimilates the fertilizer in the soil, the plants grow very fast, maturing headed cabbage two to three weeks sooner than you can mature them from hot bed or cold frame plants. You know what the difference in profit will be if your crop is matured and marketed before the general crop from home grown plants is matured. To get the advantage of these Frost Proof Cabbage Plants they must be planted a month or six weeks earlier than you would plant home grown plants. We fill orders from December 1 to May 25. The plants when received will be somewhat wilted and have a hard stunted appearance, which will be disappointing to persons who have never used these plants before. Regardless of appearances, they will produce the crop results.

Send your order two or three weeks before you expect to set the plants and you will get them on time.

There is no finer garden flower, and the finest specimens are shown if the spike is cut when the first bud opens and allowed to develop in the house; every bud on the stalk will open and the richest colorings result. Bulbs should be planted at intervals from the middle of April till the first of July for a succession of flowers. Plant the bulbs 3 inches apart and rows about 12 to 18 inches. CULTURE---First you should select good rich ground, although most any kind of soil will grow good berries, and ground that has grown garden truck, corn or potatoes is preferred. Prepare the ground same as for a crop of potatoes. We use an ordinary garden line and make a "V" shaped hole with a common garden spade. Set the plants so that the crown of plants will be just even with the top of the ground. Perfect flowering varieties may be set alone. If you set an imperfect flowering kind, at least every third row should be planted to a perfect variety. Plants should be cultivated about every week and after each rain, to keep a crust from forming. Cultivate only deep enough to kill the weeds, one-half inch around plants and three inches in the middles is about right. A one-horse garden cultivator is the best tool for cultivating. Hoe around plants when necessary and keep all blossoms pinched off the first season. In the fall, when the ground freezes, cover with straw, leaves, etc. Cultivate Everbearing plants as above; only pick blossoms off until July 1.

IMPORTANT---If, for some reason, you are not ready to set plants early in season, it is a good plan to have the plants shipped early, and then on arrival of plants, open the bundles and line out carefully until ready to set out. Plants treated in this manner will be much in advance of plants dug and shipped late in the season.
