> An application was read from Mrs Anna Woodrow, requesting that the board refund a portion of the fee paid for motor bus license No. 442, issued February 10 last, on account of the signer having ceased to operate said motor bus. On motion of Trustee Grist, it was ordered that a refund in the sum of \$5.00 be made to Mrs. Woodrow, by unanimous vote.

An application was read from Mr. C. A. Gorton for permit to operate motor bus over a route between Littlelands, La Crescenta, La Canada and Montrose to Glendale. The application being approved by the city manager, was on motion of Trustee Grist granted, provided that a satisfactory bond be furnished.

An application was read from Geo. Peters, Jr., for permit to erect a supply station at the Northwest corner of Colorado street and Central avenue and install gasoline tank and pump. On motion of Trustee Muhleman, the application was referred to the city attorney and city manager to make a report.

The city manager reported that the Pacific Electric railway company has begun work on the crossings at Brand boulevard and First street and Doran street

He reported in regard to the sanitary conditions in Verdugo canyon, that there are nineteen families in that vicinity and sixteen of these have satisfactory cesspools; he described the conditions in reference to the remainder. He reported that he had seen the new owners of Verdugo Park who had informed him that they do not care to have those grounds used for picnic purposes at present. He suggested the framing of an ordinance specifying details as to construction and care of cesspolls in the canyon.

He reported further in regard to the protection work in Verdugo wash, that Messrs. Ross and Thom have expressed themselves as ready to go ahead with this work if carried out in accordance with their views and to pay one-third of the cost of the same, provided that the total cost does not exceed two thousand dollars. Trustee Woo'lberry supplemented this report by stating that Messrs. Ross and Thom had agreed to give the city an easement of twenty or twenty-five feet in the bed of the wash for work extending from the packing house up to the big sycamore tree in the canyon; they being opposed to having any of their land taken for the purpose of protection work outside of the present bed of the stream.
