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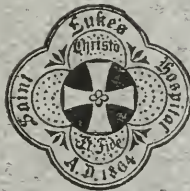

Forty-Second Annual Report of the Trustees of St. Luke's Hospital.

Fiscal Year ending September 30, 1905.

The Hospital has enjoyed another year of usefulness and prosperity. The pressure on the capacity for caring for patients has been continuous, even during the summer months. The report herewith presented furnishes to our patrons and friends another argument, if one is needed, for money to increase the facilities for receiving and treating all who need our services—those who can pay and those who can not pay.

Our finances are steadily improving. Though we have done more work, more days for more patients, we have kept scrupulously within our income, with a small balance on the safe side of the account. This carries out our purpose to apply to the relief of the needy all the money properly available, and to pause at the point which affects the credit, the efficiency or the permanency of the institution. This is our record for more than five years, attended by an increase of more than sixty per cent. in the number of patients treated. Now we are limited in growth by the plain fact that we are operating the full facilities entrusted to us by the generosity of donors in the past to the fullest possibilities.

We are told by those who are competent to say, that the reputation of the Hospital stands higher than ever before in the esteem of the medical profession.

Under these circumstances we appeal for money to build additional wards.

We acknowledge gratefully the faithful work of the Woman's Board, and their liberal expenditures in refitting the Accident Ward, and other work, fully referred to in the Superintendent's Report.

We acknowledge thankfully the additions to the Endowment Fund made by the will of Mrs. Lambert Tree—\$3,000;

By the endowment of the Ginevra Fuller Room, made by William A. Fuller, Esq.—\$10,000;

By the endowment of a room in memory of Homer Earl Sargent and Rebecca Eddy Sargent, by their sons, Homer E. Sargent, Jr., John R. W. Sargent, William P. Sargent and Captain Fred. H. Sargent—\$10,000.

We wish to thank the Superintendent, and those responsible to him, for efficient services rendered through the entire year.

...Private Rooms...

The private rooms of the Hospital are maintained for the benefit of those who desire superior accommodations and are able to pay the Hospital charges in full.

The reputable and otherwise acceptable physicians of the city are invited to treat their patients in the private rooms. They will have at their disposal all the facilities of the institution.

RATES :

Rooms (2 and 3 beds), \$12 to \$14 each bed per week. Single rooms \$16 and upward per week. Special Nurse, undergraduate, \$15 per week. Special Nurse, graduate, \$25 per week.

Rates are the same whether the patient be a child or an adult.

The rates named include room, board, ordinary medicines and dressings, the services of the nurse of the ward, and of the House Staff. All fractions of a day will be charged for as a day.

An extra charge will be made for examinations made in the Pathological Laboratory, for the use of the operating room, for the services of special nurses when they are required, either by order of the Attending Physician or Surgeon, or to meet the demands of the patient, and for all extraordinary articles of diet, wines, medicines, apparatus, dressings, etc.

Friends of patients will be accommodated with room and board (the regular bill of fare only) when conditions will permit. The rate for any room will be the same as though occupied by a patient.

Personal clothing will not be furnished patients, nor will patients' clothing be laundered.

The Hospital will not be responsible for money or valuables unless they are deposited in the office for safe keeping.

Visitors will be admitted between the hours of 10 a. m. and 9 p. m., unless their presence is deemed prejudicial to the welfare of the patient.

Complaints should be made directly to the Superintendent.

All bills are payable strictly in advance.

...Open Wards...

The maximum rate is \$8 per week. In cases where the circumstances warrant it a reduction is made, and a certain proportion are admitted free.

AS TO FEES :

Pay patients should make their own arrangements as to fees with the members of the Medical Board by whom they are treated.

"No member of the Attending Staff will make any charge for professional services for attendance upon any patient who does not pay in full the Hospital charge for board, room and nursing; where the patient is nominated by the endower of a bed or room, but is nevertheless able to pay for the services of the physician or surgeon in charge, physicians' or surgeons' fees may be charged, if in the discretion of the Hospital authorities it is thought just and proper.

"The services of the Attending Staff are gratuitous to all patients who, in the judgment of the Hospital authorities, are unable to pay for the same.

"No officer, interne, nurse or servant is allowed to receive any fee or gift from a patient without the formal permission of the Board of Trustees."

Superintendent's Report.

To the Board of Trustees :

GENTLEMEN:—I beg to submit the following report of the work of the Hospital during the past year:

The financial outcome of the year, as shown by the auditors' report is very satisfactory, in that we have cared for all the applicants for free treatment who were proper cases under our rules, save when the wards were absolutely filled and still have a small balance on the right side. The real estate of the Hospital except vacant property, is well rented and is making fair returns. The rapidly changing business conditions on Michigan avenue, in this neighborhood, promise increased returns in the near future.

During the year we have treated, exclusive of the Dispensary, 3,290 patients, an increase of seven and eight-tenths per cent. over last year. The number of patient days is 54,503; three and eight-tenths per cent. more than in any previous year. That the increase in this item is small is due to the fact that we have approached so closely to the maximum possible with our present facilities that no considerable future growth may be expected with our present plant.

The cost of each patient per day has risen to \$1.77 or one-tenth of a cent more than last year. The cost of food stuffs per day for each person has increased two and two-tenth cents. That the total cost per day has not risen in the same proportion is due to economies in other directions. The average time for each patient in the Hospital has decreased one day.

During the busy part of the year we have encountered the old trouble of a lack of sufficient private room accommodations and it has become necessary to turn away a considerable number of applicants for such accommodations. We expect in the near future to meet this demand in a very limited degree by converting the floor now occupied by the Interns Staff into three private rooms, which will be provided with private bath rooms and some other conveniences not afforded by the other rooms. Contributions to the fund for this work were made by trustees only.

We have to thank the Woman's Board and the Emergency Committee of that board for several improvements, of which the more important are: The refitting and furnishing of the Accident Ward, the lavatory of the Florence Ward and the pantry of Ward 5W. The Accident Ward now has a tile floor and side walls, with marble trim about the doors and windows, new plumbing and a complete equipment of furniture. It is admirably adapted to its purpose. The lavatory of the Florence Ward has tile floors, marble wainscoting and partitions and new plumbing of the most modern type. It will serve as a model for future improvements of this character. The pantry of Ward 5W has new plumbing and new furniture throughout.

The Woman's Board has also furnished the funds for the maintenance of a kindergarten school in the Florence Ward. While the conditions in a general hospital, restricted to acute cases, are not ideal, this school, which was instituted last winter, has proved to be a distinct success. None of the patients are allowed to attend when it interferes in any degree with their treatment, but all of the older ones are anxious to participate and the class usually numbers from one-third to one-half the patients in the ward.

The work of the Library Committee also deserves mention. The Library for the nurses, which is composed largely of reference works, is assuming respectable dimensions and the books selected are of the best.

In the report of the Directress of the Training School, which I incorporate in this report, will be found the details of the year's work in the Training School.

I desire to call the special attention of all interested in the Hospital to the complete analysis of the finances and accounts of the institution as presented in the reports of the auditors. It is a matter of pride with the management that they are able to lay before you a comprehensive and thoroughly trustworthy statement of the affairs of the institution.

I desire also to express our appreciation of the generosity of Messrs. Jones, Caesar, Dickinson Wilmot & Co. in the matter of this examination.

Dispensary.

This department is conducted for the benefit of those who are able to come and go and are unable to pay for adequate private treatment. The service is free except that those who can do so are expected to pay a nominal sum for the medicine which they carry away with them. When circumstances permit, patients whose condition requires indoor treatment, are admitted to the wards of the Hospital.

Free patients who require attention after their discharge from the wards, are referred to the Dispensary.

The Dispensary is open for the treatment of patients every day between one and two p. m., except on Sundays and Holidays.

The health of the pupils since last report has been and is excellent, and that in the face of an unusually continuous busy year, that extended through the summer months, the vacation season of physicians and surgeons, when a partial cessation of heavy work is expected. This satisfactory state of their health may in a measure be attributed to a tent having been placed at their disposal on the roof of the Training School, where fresh air could be obtained with little exertion. The increased work of the Hospital has necessitated increasing the number of the pupils to sixty, which overcrowded the dormitory accommodations of the Home. This has been met by using one of the Saranac Flats for the probationers' bed rooms, under the supervision of one of the assistants. Another feature in the line of increased work is the creating of the position of third as-

sistant, whose duties are with the second assistant in the operating rooms, where a senior nurse on a six months term is also in attendance, as well as the usual pupils in training. This additional assistant, with the adjunct of the six months term nurse, has added markedly to the smooth running of the Hospital nursing, as conflicting operations can now be cared for without calling in the aid of the Assistant Directress as hitherto, and who to do so had temporarily to leave the ward superintendency. The pupils have had the regular courses of classes and lectures, on practical work, Materia Medica, Practice of Medicine, Anatomy, etc. They have shown gratifying interest and advancement in their studies. The course in Dietetics was given by Miss Horton of the School of Domestic Science. Dr. Dagg the attending Pathologist gave the intermediate class a bacteriological course, and Dr. Lewis gave, to two special classes of twelve nurses each, courses treating on practical urinalysis. Mrs. Osbaldeston taught the senior class Massage to advantage. The Senior Nurses this year have had, by invitation, the pleasure of attending the Alumnae lectures at the regular monthly meeting held in the Training School, and in joining in the social gathering afterward.

It is pleasing to note how loyal our graduates are to their Alma Mater, as is evinced by the good attendance at our Thursday evening "at homes." Miss Critchell, owing to the impairment of her health, resigned the night superintendency, after holding the position two and one-half years, the vacancy being filled by Miss McKnight. She in time applied for, and was accepted as third assistant when that position was created. The night superintendency is now held by Miss Dean. The work of the Library Committee is entitled to special recognition. They have provided for the nurses an excellent reference library, reno-

vated the room and made it one of the brightest spots in the Training School. As in the past the Medical Board Dispensary staff and outside physicians have not only aided the nurses in the wards, but have been most generous with their valuable time in giving courses of lectures, and to Dr. Cheney is due express notice and thanks for his close and prompt attention to the ailments of the nurses. Before closing my report I would like to take this opportunity to express my thanks for the consideration shown by the Hospital Management in permitting of my absence for three and one-half months to enable me to recuperate, when my health temporarily gave way during the past summer.

GENTLEMEN : During the year past my work as Chaplain of the Hospital has been prosecuted with the usual satisfactory results.

In all my efforts to cheer and comfort the sick and the afflicted within our walls I have felt that I had the hearty sympathy of the attending physicians, internes and nurses. To this, in a large measure, may be attributed the happy results. The experience of each succeeding year leads me to place a higher estimate upon the Chaplain's work, especially if it can be followed up by the clergy of the Church after the patients are discharged. Reports of the after fruits of my labors which have come to me are most encouraging.

I have held services in the Chapel daily and in the open wards as opportunity offered, visiting throughout the Hospital and administering Holy Communion to sick when it was desired. Most happy have I been in the realization that the Chaplain's ministrations were apparently highly appreciated by the patients.

I have administered the Sacrament of Baptism to two adults and seven infants. One adult has been presented to the Bishop for Confirmation. I have also officiated at two marriages and seven burials.

As in years past I am under great obligations to the Union League Club, the Chicago Club and many individual friends of the Hospital for contributions of reading matter, to be distributed among the patients. The library has been enlarged by the addition of many books contributed. Good books are always in demand.

Report of the President.

It has been the aim of the Woman's Board to carry on the work heretofore undertaken, and its efforts have been uniformly successful.

The Committees of the Board are the Linen, the Emergency, the Delicacies, the Entertainment, the Kindergarten and the Visiting Committees and the Committees on the Margaret Carter, the Stranger's, the St. Elizabeth's, the St. Helen's and Frances Beds.

The Committee on Children's Offerings has been changed to the Kindergarten Committee, its object now being the maintenance of a kindergarten for the children in the Florence Ward. The salary of the teacher and the cost of supplies amount to \$170 per annum. Many of the children coming into the Hospital are so utterly ignorant, that the benefits of the school are great, particularly where the children remain for any length of time.

The Furnishing Committee is now known as the Emergency Committee and devotes its efforts to making improvements in the hospital buildings and in the furnishings and equipment.

... RULES ...

AS TO ROOMS, BEDS AND ENDOWMENTS,

**SUBJECT TO THE RULES GOVERNING THE
ADMISSION OF PATIENTS TO THE HOSPITAL**

1. A donation of \$10,000 endows a private room in perpetuity, and the endower shall have the privilege of naming the room.
2. A donation of \$5,000 endows a bed in an open ward in perpetuity.
3. A donation of \$300 supports a bed in an open ward for one year.
4. A donation of \$3,000 endows a bed in an open ward during the life-time of the donor.
5. Any room not endowed may be granted by the Trustees to the endower of a bed during his life-time, and he may, during that period, enjoy all the privileges accruing in perpetuity from the endowment of the room, in addition to the perpetual privileges accruing from the endowment of a bed. An additional endowment of \$5,000, at any time, shall endow said room in perpetuity.
6. Any room, not endowed and not granted as provided in Section 4, may be granted by the Trustees, to the supporter of a bed, and he may, during the year in which he supports the bed, enjoy the privileges accruing in perpetuity from the endowment of a room, subject to termination at the close of any year.
7. No ward, or other division of the Hospital, shall be named without action of the Trustees.

Note.—The endowment of a bed entitles the endower to nominate one patient at a time to an open ward bed free of charge at any time when there is such a bed vacant, and, if all the beds are filled, to the preference over other applicants when a bed becomes vacant.

If an endower desires any service from the Hospital in excess of that furnished the open wards, a bill will be rendered at current rates, and the current ward charge, which is at present \$8.00 per week, will be credited to the endower on the bill.

The endower of a bed in perpetuity has the right to name a successor, which right to name a successor shall belong to each successor. If an endower or his successor fails to name a successor it will be deemed to lodge the right in the Trustees of the Hospital, who will thereafter exercise the right of nomination to the endowed bed.
