# "It Pulled Them Through"

We don't know how many good folks from both farm and town have said to us in recent weeks, "My garden has pulled me through when there was little or no money in hand or in sight to buy food at the store." This world-wide depression, which has brought so much trouble to all of us, is teaching us some badly needed lessons. Not the least of these lessons is how small the store bill looks and is when there is a good, well planted, well tended garden to draw from.

There were more gardens made this last spring than for many years. Where they were good gardens, planted with good seed of good varieties, they were really "life-savers" for thousands of fami-lies. Many made the mistake of planting doubtful seed to save a few cents in seed cost. They lost dollars in food supply for every nickel saved in seed cost. Even the best of seeds are now far lower in price than a year or two ago. It is not money saving to buy and plant seed about which you are doubtful.

Not one person in ten, either in town or on farm, makes as good or as large a fall garden as they ought to make or as they need. We have real respect for the turnip salad and collard patch. Fine as far as they go but they don't go far either in quantity or variety. What about beets, cabbage, carrots, kale, lettuce, mustard and ten-dergreen, onions, radish, spinach, rape and the bulb-making tur-nips? All good, all well liked, all resist considerable cold and live through ordinary winters and will carry you well into spring if you will only plant enough of them in August, September, October and even in November and December in the lower South.

Thousands of our good friends and customers have started on the

up-grade; are started on the road to better conditions; are getting a strangle hold on "old man depression." The start was made with a good sized home garden last spring, a garden that was kept ten-ded and replanted just as faithfully as the tending of the best "brag" patch of cotton or corn on the place.

Their tables have been full of vegetables every day. The families have been well fed and there has been a show of health in father's and mother's and the children's faces that has never been there before vegetables became so large a part in the family food supply. There is an abundance of cans and jars of vegetables on closet shelves for next winter and early spring use. The store bill, the drug and medicine bill, the doctor's bill have all been well shot. to pieces.

We firmly and honestly believe that better times are ahead of us. Improvement will necessarily be slow if it is to be sound and permanent. It is not only a time to play safe, but it is to be sound and per-manent. It is not only a time to play safe, but it is time to "buck up," to have hope and courage and go the limit in home production of home food and feed needs. That means first, the good sized home garden kept going as near as possible the year round. That means cows, hogs, chickens and other poultry and home-grown feed to carry them. All these things insure the full breakfast, dinner and supper table as well as chickens, eggs, butter and some veg-

etables to sell in town for as much or more than the store bill. Start right with a good fall garden. Start making a living out of garden and farm and you will soon be making good money from your farm.

S. postage stamps in good condition (one-cent and two-cent stamps preferred) the same as cash, but we would ask those remitting stamps to wrap them in oiled paper, if possible, to prevent their sticking together or to the order.

**C.O.D.Notice** Absolutely no plants or other perishable goods will be sent C. O. D. We advise against C. O. D. orders because of delays and high collection charges which are unsatisfactory to the customer and expensive to us if uncalled for and returned at our expense. We accept C. O. D. orders for seeds in exceptional cases when 25% of the order amount is paid in advance. This deposit is meant to cover collection and return charges in case the order is not called for and paid for by the customer.

### **How to Figure Postage**





# GARDEN PEA

Many of our customers don't plant Garden Peas because they don't bear long enough. Plant seed deeper and work soil up around stalks, and Peas will stay in bearing twice as long. You should plant more Peas. Plantings especially during late summer, growing into cooler weather, should keep these Peas bearing much longer than from spring plantings. Peas do best with cool weather for maturlty.

**Culture** For fall planting in the Central South, sow early in tra early sorts, such as John L., throughout September to mature before frost. In Florida and along the Gulf Coast, sow during any of the fall months. October and November being preferable. Sow in drills, covering seed 2 to 3 inches deep, according to soil. To avoid the necessity of staking or brushing, plant the peas in double rows 6 to 8 inches apart, and when the vines get large enough run them together. Most varieties of the earlies and second earlies are of suf-ficient stiff growth to support each other in this manner. Plant 2 pounds of peas to 100 feet of row. 56 pounds of wrinkled or 60 pounds of smooth peas make a bushel.

**HYACINTH BULBS** 

**Culture** Hyacinths do best in a rich, light loam but do well in any good soil. For bedding and other outdoor planting, set bedding bulbs 6 to 8 inches apart each way and 10 inches apart for the selected exhibition varieties. Cover each bulb

Inches apart for the selected exhibition varieties. Cover each bulb about one and a half times its own depth. For pot culture with the exhibition varieties the most beautiful spikes are made with only one bulb to each 5-inch pot or three or four in a larger pan. It is essential for blooming indoors that the growth be started in the dark. A frequent mistake is made by bring-ing the bulbs into the light too soon, resulting in a failure to bloom or weak spikes.

Potted bulbs may be entrenched or heeled in the garden and cov-Potted bulbs may be entrenched or heeled in the garden and cov-ered with six inches of ashes or gravel for moisture and to prevent frost damage. A bed of ashes should be beneath the pots too, to keep out worms. They may also be kept dark and well watered in a cold-frame or cool cellar. Keep them dark for 12 weeks and then keep in low temperature (about 50 degrees) for 2 weeks until top growth is well developed. Then you may force them as rapidly as you want. You will have strong, compact spikes by keeping close to the glass or window and giving plenty of air. This extra care is worth while.
