## OLD PARTIES FUSE TO BEAT SOCIALISTS

Republicans Ratify Agreement with Tammany in 12th, 13th, 14th, and 20th Districts.

## TO DEFEAT MEYER LONDON

8ullivan and La Guardia to be Returned-Brooklyn Organizations Designate Candidates.

Fusion between Democrats and Republicans, directed against Socialist candidates for Congress in four districts where the Socialists have shown strength in other years, became effective through acure of the Executive Committee of the Republican County Committee yesterday. The Tammany Executive Committee took the initiative in the matter some days ago.

The four districts involved are the welfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, and Twelfth, Twentieth. The principal object is the defeat of Meyer London, Socialist, in the Twelfth, and Morris Hillquit in the Twentieth. In the Twelfth and Thirteenth the Republicans have voted to indorse the Democratic candidates. the Fourteenth and Twentieth the Democrats will inderse the Republican candidates. In each instance the candidates will run in the primaries of both parties. It is not likely that fusion will extend to other districts.

The line of action was first suggested by the National Security League. President Wilson in letters and public utterances has given impetus to Democratic action in compliance with the suggestion, while Elihu Root in speeches has urged the wisdom of this plan on Republican audiences in the interest of 100 per cent.
