

Types in Peaches. [CONTINUED.]

CHINESE TYPE-HONEY STRAIN.

This strain is quite distinct from the Chinese Cling strain. It blooms earlier and succeeds best further Southward. Its Northern limit for the best results is about latitude 30 to 31 degrees, and its Southern limit about 28 to 29 degrees. The varieties belonging to this strain, in the order of ripening, are Early China, Honey (the parent of this strain), Japan Blood, Early Cream, Pallas, Climax, Imperial, Chinese Blood, Florida Gem, and Townsend.

The size of the fruit is small; the characteristic form is oval, compressed, with deep suture on one side extending more than half way around, and terminating in a sharp, peculiar recurved point; color white or cream colored, almost covered with bright crimsom; blossoms large; flavor sweet and lacking in character.

The extreme earliness of some of the varieties make them profitable for market. The color of the bark and leaves of the trees in the growing season in the nursery, has a whitish green tinge.

CHINESE TYPE-PEEN TO STRAIN.

The Peen To or Flat Peach is the parent of this strain. The peculiar flat shape of this peach is probably a deviation from the normal type, as its seedlings show a disposition to return to the usual form. This strain is valuable because of its adaptability to the extreme South, where the varieties of the other types and strains will not succeed. It thrives side by side with the lemon, and is almost tropical and evergreen, as it retains its foliage in the far South until new leaves appear. It blooms so early that it does not fruit well much North of the lemon belt, though some of its Florida seedlings succeed in Northern Florida.

The varieties of this strain, in the order of ripening, are: Peen To, Florida's Own, Waldo, Yum Yum, Laura, Maggie, Queen of the South, Barr's Early, June Beauty, Barr's Late, Red Ceylon, Angel.

The size of the fruit is small, shape flat or round to roundish oblong; color white or cream colored, with blushed cheek. Flavor sweet to mild sub-acid, some varieties bitterish; blossoms large. Color of bark and leaves in the nursery similar to the Honey strain, but the leaves are smaller and greener and hang later on the trees. W. F. H.

The meeting was well attended by officers and exhibitors connected with horticultural work at the Exposition and much interest manifested. Mr. Geo. W. Campbell was elected temporary chairman and Mr. L. H. Bailey secretary. The permanent organization was effected by the election of the following officers: President, P. J. Berckmans, Augusta' Ga.; Vice-President, Henri L. de Vilmorin, Paris, France; Secretary and Treasurer, George Nicholson, England. The membership fee is \$2.00, and all those interested may become members by handing or sending this fee to Chief Samuels, World's Fair.

The Abundance Plum.

The Abundance plum (August 4) at the Rural Grounds is a sight to behold. The branches are wreaths of fruit, and they, as well as the tree itself, are held up by props and ropes. Some of the plums are beginning to color; all are of good size, and, though the old marks of the curculio sting are engraved upon most of them, no injury seems as yet to have resulted. For 20 years, off and on, the R. N.-Y. has tried so-called curculio-proof plums. We have never used insecticides or jarred the trees to destroy them, and we have NEVER before had a crop of plums. Plums are not raised in the vicinity simply because the people are not willing to put themselves to the trouble of jarring the trees, and they know from experience that they cannot raise plums without do-ing so. Now here we have the Abundance loaded down with beautiful fruit, while not a precaution has been taken to destroy the curculio. Blessed be the Abund-ance! It is well named.—Rural New Yorker.

Walter Savage Lander truly said: "Old trees in their living state are the only things that money cannot command. Rivers leave their beds, run into cities and traverse mountains for it; obelisks and arches, palaces and temples, amphitheatres and pyramids rise up like exhalations at its bidding; even the free spirit of man, the only thing great on earth, crouches and cowers in its presence. 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

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Terms and Conditions Governing Quotations in the Price List of the Huntsville Wholesale Nurseries.

RATES.—As we send this list to the trade only, we make the difference in prices between the 10, 100 and 1000 rates very slight—simply sufficient, as a rule, to cover the difference in the expense of handling in the smaller numbers. We uni-formly tie in bunches of 10, when consistent with the order, and we suggest to our customers to make their orders for varieties in multiples of 10 as far as practicable. Orders for 50 and not over 300 trees, if for not less than 10 of a variety, will be charged at the rate per hundred. Orders requiring 300 trees or more, and not less than 10 of a variety, will be filled at the lowest quoted prices. Orders for less than 10 trees of one variety, will be charged at the rate per ten. Spason.—Our packing and shipping season

SEASON .- Our packing and shipping season

begins by the 20th of September, and continues until about the first of March. We have great advantages to offer here in early shipments for the North in Spring. We do not accept orders for trees we do not grow, as we never buy trees to sell again. You can de-pend upon us for fresh dug trees. Each order is taken up separately, and not until it is wanted for shipment.

SHIPPING DIRECTIONS .- We respectfully beg Shipping Directions.—We respectfully beg our patrons to furnish us with explicit direc-tions as to shipping, and the mode of conveyance by which they desire trees forwarded. When no particular directions are given, we forward according to the best of our judgment. But in no case do we assume any responsibility as to safe aclivery and condition of Trees and Plants of the proper shipment by us after a proper shipment by us.

after a proper shipment by us. **RELEASE.**—When prepayment of freight is not required, we will kelease and Guarantee, and take forward. r's receipt and mail to consignee. It is left to the option of the shipper of trees over some railroads, whether he will release them or not under the clause "Value loss than \$5.00 per 100 lbs." If released under this clause, the freight is less on roads governed by this classification, and we will assume it to be proper to make this release, without reference to the value of the trees, unless instructed to the con-trary. This clause does not apply upon roads under some of the district classifications, and because of this confusion we will not be held responsible for any oversight to release, unless instructed by our customers. PACKAGES.—The cost of package must be added to the prices quoted in this list, as follows: Boxes 30 inches square, from 7½ to 9 feet long, as the trees may require, each \$2.50; boxes 24 inches, \$2.00; boxes 15 inches, \$1.50; bales from 25c. to 75c. each.

PACKING.-Goods will be packed in moss, and especial care taken to insure their arrival in the best condition.

ASSORTMENTS .- We do not require customer to take an assortment they do not wish, but will sell one variety alone if desired. If any substi-tution can be allowed, either in grade or variety, it should be so stated when making the order. As a rule we do not substitute without permission.

CAUTION.—We accept all orders upon the con-dition that they shall be void, should any injury befall the trees from frost, hail, storm, fire, or other causes over which we have no control.



ACCEPTANCE.—Notice should be sent us by tel-egraph, at our expense, if there is any cause of complaint, or should the trees be refused, stating egraph, at our expense, it there is any cause of complaint, or should the trees be refused, stating reasons. Claims for deduction, from whatever cause, will receive consideration only when made promptly upon the receipt of the trees. If trees show any signs of shrivelling upon arrival, they can usually be restored by being thoroughly watered and buried entirely under the ground for two or three days. Should there be any frost in the trees upon arrival, they should not be removed from the box until the frost is all out. The box should be placed in the cellar or pro-tected in some other way. The presence of frost in the boxes is not to be considered an evidence of bad condition, as we pack to is allowed to come out in the natural way. Goods will be considered accepted if removed from the boxes in which they are packed, with-out notice of complaint to us, and without our orders for their disposition.



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
