Paris, May 30 .- At to-day's sitting of the The Russian Proposals Regarding Ar-bitration-Will Not Be Compulsory. The Hague, May 30.—The text of the Russian proposals regarding arbitration was published in the Vaderland to-day. Part one deals with the desirability of seeking a solution of international dis-putes by mediation of friendly powers,

putes by mediation of friendly powers, and sets forth that such good offices, whether sought or proffered, shall bear strictly the character of friendly counsel, and in no way of compulsory force.

Part two deals with international arbitration, which it declares "the most efficacious and equitable means of settling questions regarding the international application of treaties."

After setting forth that each state remains the sole judge of what cases are so to be submitted to arbitration, it is suggested that a large number of cases such as questions of pecuniary damage and disagreements in the application of treaties or conventions affecting commercial, postal, navigation, currency, san-

and disagreements in the application of treaties or conventions affecting commercial, postal, navigation, currency, sanitary or copyright matters and the like, not affecting vital interests, are those in which arbitration should be obligatory. The closing clause provides as follows: "With a view of facilitating recourse to arbitration the signatory powers agree to formulate a common arrangement for the employment of international arbitration and for fundamental principles to be observed in drawing up rules of procedure to be followed pending inquiry into the dispute and the pronouncement of the arbitrators' decision. The application of these principles and procedure may be modified in virtue of special arrangements between the states which may have recourse to arbitration."

Part four deals with an international commission of inquiry. It provides as follows: "In cases of divergence causing international litigation on local circumstances which cannot be settled by ordinary diplomatic means, but do not involve honor or vital interests, the governments interested agree to institute an international commission of inquiry.

entiments interested agree to institute an international commission of inquiry to investigate impartially all questions of facts. Each government interested shall appoint two members of the commission. Those four shall choose a fifth, who shall be president of the commission, if the votes are divided as to this an appeal shall be made to another government or to a third party to appoint a president. After the investigation the commission shall submit a report, signed by all the members, to the governments interested. The report shall in no wise have the churacter of an arbitration judgment, but shall leave the conflicting parties in full liberty either to conclude a friendly agreement on the basis of said report or to have recourse to arbitration, by concluding an agreement ad hoc, or else by resorting to active measures allowable in the mutual relations between nations."

The Russian proposals are followed by a code of arbitration indicating procedure on these lines: The states interested, that have accepted arbitration shall sign a special act of compromise, clearly setting forth the questions to be arbitrated, and the full facts connected therewith. 

A Metal Bridge, a Park, a Cycling Track and a Music Hall on the Flats.

Company Ask for a Fifty Years Lease and Exemption From Taxes.

Protest From Mr. Sorby --Will the Two Schemes Conflict?

The details of the proposal which Mr. Henry Croft makes to the city, looking to the reclamation of the James Bay flats and the construction of a bridge across that bay in return for a lease, were disclosed at an informal meeting of the council this morning.

Another feature which would be added would be swimming baths, which had often been attempted in Victoria, but without success. Accidents occurred every year which would not happen were facilities provided for teaching boys to swim.



RESTRICTED KISSING IN FLORIDA.
