LOS FELIZ ESTATE IS SUBDIVIDED

Well Known Light Estate Is Sold After Years of Inactivity

HEIRS TO BENEFIT


Sold Under Court Order, Property Cut Into Lots Now on Market

Residents on Laurel and Los Feliz road are gratified to have the property known as the Light estate, consisting of about three acres, between the two streets and just west of Brand boulevard, being subdivided and sold to persons who will improve it.

For years it has lain vacant because the inheritance which came to Mrs. Rosetta Light was entailed to her children with the proviso that it could not be distributed to them during their lifetime Under a court order and through the agency of Arthur Campbell, it was sold about a month ago to a Mr. Whitaker who is now reselling it in lots through Mr. Campbell. The proceeds will be held in trust under the provisions of the will. As it is desirably situated between Brand and San Fernando, a part of the Los Feliz boulevard and as there are no restrictions relative to apartment houses or bungalow courts, it is going fast, having been divided into seventeen lots ranging in price from \$2,000 to \$3,500

Mr. Campbell reports that William McMillan has purchased Lot 9, which faces Laurel and will improve it with, a bungalow court. Lots 10 and 11 have been bought by George F. Schmall on specula-Angelo Camillo has bought Lot 8 on Los Feliz road and will improve it. Lot 5, also on Los Feliz, has been purchased by J. Banker who will probably build upon it a duplex house. Chas. W. Ulrich has bought Lots 6 and on Los Feliz for investement. Lots 17 and 18 have been taken by a Mr. Gray, a builder, who will improve them with dwellings. Property in that part of the city



If you have never gone out Broadway past the new high school site and at the point where



You never before had realized that such a view, embracing ocean and mountains and valleys, was to be had anywhere in Glendale, did you?







No temporary structures of any kind will be permitted on the tract.

To further popularize both tracts, J. Harvey Mc-Carthy will revert to an old custom, now almost forgotten, of presenting a solid silver mug to the mother of the first baby born in a new house either in Eagle Glen Heights or Rolland Square.

All of which proves the enterprise of J. Harvey McC. and his faith in the future of Glendale.
