Due to the continued fine weather we have received considerable cotton this week past, but sales have been confined principally to "strays" ranging at 10 1/4 a 10 1/2 and 10 8/9 cts.

The Upland Cotton Crop.—It is now very apparent that the crop of Upland of the present season will fall considerably short of that of last year, notwithstanding the very favorable prospects.

The quantity of cotton received in this place will not exceed 40,000 bales, and estimated by many at 32,000 bales instead of 70,000.
