B. pa per of 10th inst. we find a strange document being no less than a claim made by the present Earl of Stirling and Dovan, as proprietor and hereditary lieutenant of all Nova Scotia, &c .it amounts even to a claim of Sovereignty over the province of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia. &c.
