WAR MEETING OF THE COLORED CITIZENS OF NEW BEDFORD.

A PRIZE IN New Bedford, Mass., sent us for publication in THE STANDARD the following report of the proceedings of a meeting lately held in that city. The report is by Mr. Mercer. Our friend says: "I desire to let the people know that the cause of Liberty, Justice, Fraternity and Equality are here regarded as the natural rights of man. No member of Congress takes higher views than Mr. Eliot; and as the names of each one of our strong men appear before the public, the sentiment becomes strengthened; or rather these sentiments will gradually become crystallized into principle." We take pleasure in complying with our correspondent's request.

There was a very large and enthusiastic meeting of colored citizens in City Hall, New Bedford, on Tuesday evening, 10th inst., which was called to order by Rev. J. Mason, and organized by the choice of five Agents and two Secretaries.

On taking the platform Mr. Brown, in a very few remarks, stated the object of the meeting, and the need of immediate and decided action, which he introduced Rev. M. G. Jones to the audience.

Mr. G. Jones said that it was true that heretofore the colored man had been denied the privilege of fighting although since the firing of the first gun at Sumter hundreds had been anxious to do so. Now the opportunity was offered them, he believed, to receive a national recognition, to stand forward and make the whole world hear, and raise themselves to eminence. He implored them not to be backward. He said he would go, and if he could not attend the Chapeau he would go as a private. He considered his duty. We have been praying for this, which shall liberate our brethren, and if you will only respond to the call they will be wide open and the oppressed will go free. We have the right sort of leaders—men who do not know the word retreat—and we shall meet with a glorious result. It is a glorious time, and a glorious cause, and we shall stand firm to the last, moving from pure motives, and waiting for bounty, but trusting in God, who will put all things right. They went forth under the most unfavorable circumstances, for they all knew that the result if taken prisoners, would be as that of the Civil War, and that they would be taken prisoner, and would be held fighting. They were going with the determination never to retreat, but to fight until their valor was exterminated.
