## PREFACE

HE writing of Baptist history depends on an acquaintance with the sources. 1738 Thomas Crosby made the first attempt, he used the collections of his brother-in-law, Benjamin Stinton; and was subsequently aided by volunteer contributions. But the task of exploring archives was too difficult before the days of cheap travel and the penny post; even to learn the contents of libraries was hard before the compilation of catalogues. What, however, Joseph Smith has done for the Friends, Henry Martyn Dexter for the Congregationalists, Cox for those interested in the Sabbath, is clearly overdue for the Baptists. present volume tries for the first time to register everything relevant to Baptist history, whether pro or con, until the political severance of England and America. It will be followed by another dealing with Baptist life in Britain until 1837.

Attention has been paid to the manuscript sources. Here the most important are the archives of the Baptist churches, and an attempt has been made to ascertain the earliest dates when any records begin. Most churches have willingly responded to requests for information, but a few of the oldest, which in the gradual separation that marked the period about 1844 aligned themselves with the Strict and Particular Baptists, feel a conscientious objection to impart information to those not of their own faith and order. In 1838 such records as included registers of births, marriages and deaths or funerals were gathered to Somerset House; and the registration of these has been comparatively easy. Some of the most important documents, both in public custody and in denominational, have been studied; but to describe the contents is the work of the historian, not the bibliographer. The documents of denominational Societies are similarly registered by the earliest date, and not in detail.

The early manuscript documents of Associations are of two kinds. The annual letters are usually monotonous jeremiads, echoing the letters from the churches that religion is declining; the specimens which have been collected or seen at ancient churches decided the editor not to catalogue them, as they

add little or nothing to history. The minutes of the annual meetings were often entered in the church-book where the messengers met; but "breviates" of the minutes were occasionally copied and taken away by the messengers. Minute-books for an association came into vogue during the eighteenth century, and often began with a retrospective collection of breviates. Since information from anti-Baptist sources is equally relevant, though not always equally trustworthy, manuscripts of this description have been sought. The great mine of wealth is the Public Record Office, and with the aid of the calendars it has been possible to examine and register a mass of material from the Stuart period; this is indeed being transcribed for publication. The collections at Oxford, Cambridge, the Museum, Lambeth, have also repaid an examination of their catalogues, by a few gleanings; many of these have been perused.

For printed books, the Baptist libraries have been visited. Bristol has a collection begun by Andrew Gifford in the middle of the eighteenth century, Rawdon another founded by John Sutcliff a generation later, Midland a third peculiarly rich in General Baptist books; the Baptist Missionary Society has the next oldest, valuable in home affairs as well as foreign; the Baptist Union began early last century; Manchester has done well within only half a century. Yet the books of the earliest generation are not represented well in all these put together, and it is due to the antiquarian tastes of Joseph Angus that this fault has been remedied at Regent's Park. In two directions this quest has been baulked. It has proved impossible to examine the splendid collection at Hamilton, New York, or even the more accessible library at Providence, Rhode Island; and only an ancient catalogue of the latter has been analyzed. Further, the editor has been so emphatically assured by Welshmen that no Englishman is competent to deal with the literature of the Cymry, vi. Preface

that he has reluctantly desisted from systematic attempts. He is therefore the more grateful to the English societies, which have given ready access, have answered many enquiries, and have provided willing transcribers.

The second group of libraries visited comprises those gathered under the auspices of other denominations. Three are of special importance; the Friends' Reference Library begun in 1673 at Devonshire House; the collection founded by Dr. Williams in 1716, now in Gordon Square; and the books of the Congregational Union, gathered from 1833, to be seen at the Memorial Hall, Farringdon Street. Other three are at Sion College, now on the Embankment; at Lambeth, specially rich in eighteenth-century pamphlets; and a few at York in the Chapter Library.

A third group is due to the public spirit of towns. London has the Guildhall, Liverpool its City Library; Manchester is peculiarly rich, in its ancient Chetham Hospital, its civic Free Library, and the magnificent works gathered to the memory of John Rylands.

Two societies, the Antiquaries and the British and Foreign Bible Society, have published catalogues which have been of assistance. A choice collection by Principal Gould, head of the Baptist Union Publication Department, is extremely relevant to the present purpose. At Haigh Hall, near Wigan, is the Bibliotheca Lindesiana, rich in ephemeral literature such as broadsides and proclamations, and by no means lacking in more general volumes.

The three universities of Oxford, Cambridge, and Dublin, have been invaluable; the last has been used only by the medium of its catalogue, but repeated visits have been paid to the English collections. They are naturally much stronger on the anti-Baptist side than on the Baptist.

Above all, the national treasure at the British Museum has been the mainstay of the whole work; and it is a pleasure to recall that one of the first trustees was John Ward, a Baptist professor, the first sub-librarian was Andrew Gifford, pastor of Eagle Street Baptist church. The catalogue has been consulted almost weekly, and the library itself almost monthly. On its shelves are many Baptist books not known elsewhere, and under its dome stand all the books of reference so indispensable to the bibliographer.

Of such books, Allibone, Watt, Halkett, and

many others have been used at the Harris Free Library, Preston, whose officers have granted special facilities for this work, and whose resources seem far in excess of most provincial towns. Two modern publications have been at the compiler's elbow; Arber's reprint of the Term Catalogues, the Museum catalogue of the Thomason Collection—so good in many ways that its abbreviation of titles and its occasional mistakes as to dates are disappointing.

To select from this mass of information what was germane to Baptist life, the histories by Crosby, Taylor, Ivimey, Murch, Wilson, Benedict, gave the earliest clues; it would be impossible to mention all the books whence hints have been taken. serials of Rippon, the General Baptist Repository, the Baptist Magazine, and others, have been scrutinized. Three trans-Atlantic workers deserve special mention. A very little help afforded at the outset to Louise Fargo Brown, has been repaid with rich interest by the appearance of her work on Baptists and Fifth-Monarchy Men in the Commonwealth times, with abundant references. Some information given to the late Willard Ezra MacIntyre, of New Brunswick, aided in his "Baptist Authors," from three numbers of which a little return information has been gathered, and acknowledged at each point. The pages of Charles Evans' massive American Bibliography have been used down to 1776, with acknowledgment where anything fresh was learned. Anything gathered from other living writers is specially noted; but not everything which may have been due to Dexter, Joseph Smith and Robert Cox.

It is to be regretted that the publication of Dr. MacIntyre's great work has been checked by his death. When he announced about 1911 that he was ready to issue the results of twenty years' study, the Baptist Union decided to delay, or even cancel, the production of this bibliography. But the Canadian work was postponed again and again, and when an instalment did appear in 1914, it was at once apparent that there was room for both. Dr. Mac-Intyre's manual deals with Baptist Authors and their work, 1500-1914; this deals with the materials for Baptist history till 1837. Common ground is only covered at present by Baptist authors A-C till 1776. Of these, sixty-one are catalogued by each compiler. The present volume adds twenty-four, with eight men of affairs who figured in literature, and three who ceased to be Baptist. Even for the sixty-one, many more works are enumerated here than in

Canada, including some published west of the Atlantic. Moreover anonymous tracts, and anti-Baptist productions, both manuscript and printed, will be found registered here.

Notes are appended to the entries of important books, and occasionally separate notes are interpolated at critical junctures. Brief biographical memoranda are given in many headlines and in the index to authors. These have been largely drawn from the catalogues of the University library at Cambridge and of the Museum, or from the Dictionary of National Biography; but rectifications have been introduced from the appendixes to Dr. W. A. Shaw's History of the English Church, 1640-1660, and from Prof. Lyon Turner's Original Records of 1665, 1669, 1672. And for Baptists, whether authors or men of action, the summaries are usually based on sources.

Of the information registered in manuscript, which will be available for students at the Baptist Church House, some has been omitted from the printed page. The name of the publisher is rarely given, unless he were himself a Baptist; but quite possibly more were Baptist than the compiler knows. The size is only mentioned when it is known not to be the standard—quarto in the Stuart period, octavo since. The place of publication is only mentioned when it is known not to be London; but it must not be assumed without verification that London was the place when none is mentioned.

Certain devices of typography have been invented to aid the student. The name of the author is put in capitals, with an occasional word or two as to his rank, office, locality. The name of every Baptist is put in clarendon type, capitals if he be the author, lower case if he be referred to in the title of the book. The name of every place relevant to Baptist life is put in small capitals, whether it be the residence of the author, the place of a debate, the town of publication, &c. The name of a Baptist society, such as an Association, College, Mission, is put in full roman capitals. The title of a manuscript is in italic.

The books are registered chronologically. Very seldom has it been possible to determine the period of the year when a book was issued, and except where the notes of Thomason, the advertisements of the Term Catalogues, and the dates of manuscripts permit, the arrangement within any year is arbitrary.

Old Style dates are converted into New Style. For purposes of reference each book is numbered, and as fresh discoveries are always to be expected, a notation was desirable to permit the ready insertion of such. Therefore a hint has been taken from the system used for street-numbering in America; every book belonging to the year 1679 bears as its last three figures 679, and prefixed to these is a number determined by the order adopted here, with such a result as 14-679. Thus the date is an inherent part of the reference number; yet this rarely exceeds five figures. Later editions are summarised in a note, and in special cases are registered afresh at the appropriate year.

Another feature is the notation for the libraries. Dexter led the way in saying where a book might actually be seen, but it seemed possible to improve his reference marks, and needless to add the shelf marks, especially as these are liable to change. The system here is that each library is denoted by a single letter, as shown overleaf.

Four indexes form an important part of the work. One is to about 400 anonymous pamphlets. A second combines references to authors, even when hidden behind pseudonyms or initials, and to societies, as explained in a note at its head. It guides to more than a thousand Baptists who figured in print within 170 years, and to hundreds of men who intersected the Baptist plane. A third shows how various districts were affected. The fourth deals with certain institutions, principles and doctrines. In using these indexes, the addenda on pages 203-207, 239, must be recollected.

Hitherto the chief works on Baptist History in England have been concerned with minor bodiesthe old General Baptists, the New Connexion, the Seventh-day Baptists, the Johnsonians-decidedly leaving a wrong impression on the outside world, and obscuring the fact that as early as 1660 the Calvinistic or Particular Baptists were the most important group. The smaller bodies have done well for their literature, but only the Seventh-day Baptists have published a formal bibliography, in the Historical Papers, Plainfield, New Jersey, 1910. This has been freely used, with the rectifications constantly necessary. But the following pages will show that the main current is distinct from the billabongs hitherto explored, and will render possible the production of a history in perspective.

Eighteen Baptists voted, and though they spoke for themselves, not their cherches, yet the churches did follow on their lines, thus: Subscribers, one General Baptist, seven Particular; Non-subscribers, two General, one Seventh-day, four Earticular. Several Baptist churches were without postors at the time, and were not represented.

This however swelled to two, both issued in 1740. The volumes are artless in their arrangement, as is natural from the process of growth. Nor had Crosby any critical faculty, or conception of history as distinct from annals. His opinions long tainted the writings of Baptists, so that it is much to be lamented that his materials were not used by Gifford or Ward. Yet it is not to be forgotten that while Sewel had written a history of the Friends, there was no history of the a history of the Friends, there was no history of the Independents or of the Presbyterians; Crosby had a sense of a denomination. Indeed he was so strongly possessed of Stinton's views that he even neglected the distinction between the General Baptists of 1611 and the Particular Baptists of 1638. In this he was too sanguine, for not till 1891 did the great mass of these two bodies draw together; in history they had long remained apart, and Crosby obscured the difference. The value of his work was in its citation of originals, and now that these have been identified, and that abundant other con-temporary materials are known, his work has lost all authority.



\*\* The Western Association had continued yearly meetings since 1690, when indeed they had been designed for Baptists all over the country. The revival now proceeding under Whitefield and Wesley affected the Particular Baptists in directly this year, in three ways; the enhanced importance of these Association meetings, evinced by the resort to print; the gathering of books; and the foundation of an Education Society. The Western Association being the first to print minutes of its meetings, set fashions which were followed in curious detail by other associations, as they revived or reconstructed, or formed for the first time. It is hard to say what is the title of the leaflet, and many expert cataloguers have not known what to do with these ephemeral productions, for there is nothing to show that they are connected with similar issues for other years; at the British Museum they are often catalogued under the name of the town where they met. There is another peculiarity about these documents, which is highly misleading; they were signed by the moderator or chairman of the meeting, and not by the author of the letter. The custom was for accounts of the churches to be given orally or by letter, then for some one to withdraw and draft a letter in response to all the accounts, which letter was read adopted or amended, and signed by the moderator on behalf of all the members present; copies had been taken home or sent by post. Now that the letter was printed, with the minutes

of the meeting, the old usage was retained, with the effect that a reader might naturally think the moderator was the author—which was rarely the case. All such documents therefore are here entered under the name of the author, with the title given if there is one, and with an entry in this form [Circular letter of the WESTERN Association from Bratton, J. Stennett, moderator]. This year the Midland Association met at Birmingham, the Northern at Great Broughton.

Stennett and Gifford were Westerners in London, where they were in contact with Ward. The British Museum was just being founded, with Ward as a trustee, and Gifford as assistant librarian. The latter acquired a good library which is now housed at Bristol Baptist College; from this time onwards that library may be consulted with advantage.

#### II. Baptists and their opponents, Baptist Societies, Pseudonyms, and Initials.

Books reprinted in the same age are marked \*. Books published anonymously but here assigned to authors are marked []. Books not by the Baptist named, but referring to him are marked (). References to Pedobaptists are not indexed, nor the names of mere informers about Baptists, whose letters are preserved in the Public Record Office.

At the head of the entries relating to a prominent Baptist, an attempt is made to summarise his Information of this kind is seldom available in a convenient or accurate form, unless the man figures in the Dictionary of National Biography: even Catheart's Baptist Encyclopædia deals rather with recent Americans than with early authors.

On the other hand, information as to a Pedobaptist relates to his standing at the time he is concerned here, and ignores honours he may have won consequently or subsequently. It is not correct to say that Smyth and Robinson were addressed by "bishop" Hall; their opponent was a man junior to them, who had not yet lived down having his Satires burnt by order of the archbishop for their licentiousness; he did not attain a bishopric for nineteen years. John Shute Barrington did not become an Irish viscount till after 1719, when he was the political head of the Dissenting Interest, the capacity in which he figures here.




