GREECE.

The most recent accounts from Greece are dated Jan. 9th. they were brought by the frigate *Didon*, arrived at Toulon from Patras, she has on board 495 men of the 29th regiment.

The Gazette of France sees in the King's discourse, a signal given for a revolution. The session of 1829 has commenced says that paper, the revolution will go on.

The Danube has been passed at all points. The Pasha of Widden marches on the principalities with 30,000 men, and it is expected that the Grand Duke Constantine will not arrive in time to prevent the invasion, the Russian army will be obliged to repass the Pruth.

The Philadelphia (Jackson) Mercury says: "One fourth of our own party is more profligate than even that of the Coalition. The President Jackson will have to go a great deal more against his pretended friends than his avowed enemies. If he should fall into the shares of the profligate of his own party, he and the country are lost."

LITTLE ROCK, (Ariz.) Jan. 27. *Mex. Indian Murders.*—The following is an extract of a letter to the Editor, from a respectable citizen of Miller county, dated 16th instant:—"With deep concern, I have to inform you of more Indian hostilities. A Mr. Whitesides has just returned from a trip to the Comanche country. His company, four in number, were all killed! Mr. Joel Dyer, of Hempstead county, was among the number! The Indians commenced trading with them in a seeming friendly manner, but soon commenced the work of massacre. Mr. Whitesides made his escape, by leaping down a high bluff, and concealing himself in a thicket until night, when he returned and saw the bodies of his murdered companions. He picked up a few scraps of meat, (having no gun,) on which he subsisted sparingly ten days, after which he was five days without any provisions before he reached one settlement."

EDINBURGH, Dec. 3.—Late on Monday night a gentleman, who resides in a town a good way up the Fort, chanced to be coming to town from Leith. Though walking at a pretty smart pace, he was overtaken by three ladies, who feigned a fondness for his company and protection. The gentleman not only walked slower for their accomodation, but politely permitted two of them to lean on his arms. On reaching the head of Elm row, they left him rather abruptly, and shortly after they were gone, the gentleman, to his great mortification, discovered that his fair friends had robbed him of his pocket-book, which contained 300l.

Longevity.—There are now living in perfect health, in a small village adjoining the east side of Yoxford, Suffolk, 12 men with their wives, combined years, since marriage, make 529; and what is remarkably singular is that the combined ages of the men are exactly equal the combined ages of the women, viz; 846 years. One of the women has never yet slept from her own bed since her marriage, a period of upward of 41 years.—*Cambridge Chronicle.*

Despatch.—The number of letters received yesterday at the New-York Post Office by the principal arrivals was as follows: Florida, from Liverpool 2590; Pacific, do 2100; Corinthian, London, 600; Sully, Havre, 1360; Desdemona, 46; Mary & Harriet, 73; Massachusetts, 140; Packages of Newspapers, &c. 500 in all 7,309.—All these letters and packages were received, counted, assorted, marked, placed in the proper boxes, and mostly delivered and postage taken between 3 o'clock and half past 7.—[N. We learn, by the schr. Martha, that Gen. Vivian, the Netherlands ambassador to Guatemala, and suite, who accompanied Gen. Harrison to Corracon from which place his Netherland Majesty's ship of war Pallas conveyed him to Omoa, arrived, all well, at Guilar which is within five days journey of the capital. Gen. V.'s reception by both the contending parties was friendly, and much was anticipated favorable from his embassy. The San Salvadoreans were besieging the city of Guatemala, and had possession of Guilar and Ysabel.—N. Y. Amer.

North American Squadron.—We quote the following note as a matter of news, (for so far as relates to the americans there is not a word of truth in it) but to show the manner in which our infant Navy is regarded abroad. It is from an Ancono date, of Dec. 30.

It is said a North American Squadron will appear in the Archipelago next spring; a circumstance which gives rise to all sorts of reasonings and political conjectures. The English who trade in the Levant, and especially those who are ready to freight vessels, are alarmed at these reports. It would not be at all improbable that the Porte should concede great commercial advantages to the United States of North America, that they might assist it in their contest with the Greeks. These Englishmen, who are so much interested in the preservation of the most perfect harmony between their nation and the Turks, long for the return of the Pasha potentaries to Constantinople. The French have philanthropic views, and cannot persuade themselves that the most powerful free State in the New-World can consent to assist, with naval force, in the oppression of a Christian nation even though that State should derive the greatest advantage from it. It seems very certain that the North Americans are seeking greatly to extend their commerce in the Archipelago, and that with this view they are negotiating with the Porte, without interfering in any manner with the affairs of Greece; but it is not to be supposed that the policy of the United States of North America thinks of countering the projects of the three principal maritime Powers of Europe. Notwithstanding the declaration of the blockade of the Dardanelles, numerous cargoes of articles not contraband continue to be sent from all the ports of Italy for Constantinople.

We understand the Volante brought 6000 muskets and 200 rifles, with the necessary camp equipage, complete, and a quantity of small arms, ammunition, &c. for the service of the militia of this province, which are lodged in the Government stores.

How to avoid Bankruptcy.—The legislature of Massachusetts, having refused for several years past to assess tax for the support of government, and finding large arrears accumulating against the treasury, have at length hit upon a plan of helping themselves out of the difficulty, by providing for the taxation of Presidents, Professors, Tutors, Librarians; and students, of all their Colleges, Theological & Medical Institutions,—ministers of the Gospel, Proceptors of Academies and Latin Grammar School-Masters. Also sheep and the machinery of cotton, woollen and linen manufactures.—This law is, in a sense, *ex-post-facto*, because, when pay-day comes, (and it will come at last,) the Ministers, Presidents, Professors, Students, &c. will have to bear their proportion in the payment of arrears, including the three or four years already past.—Otherwise, we do not complain of the law, except on account of its sudden operation; for if the people choose to take money from their salary-men, in order to pay it back again there is no great harm in it. In a few years the salaries will be produced according to the change of circumstances.
