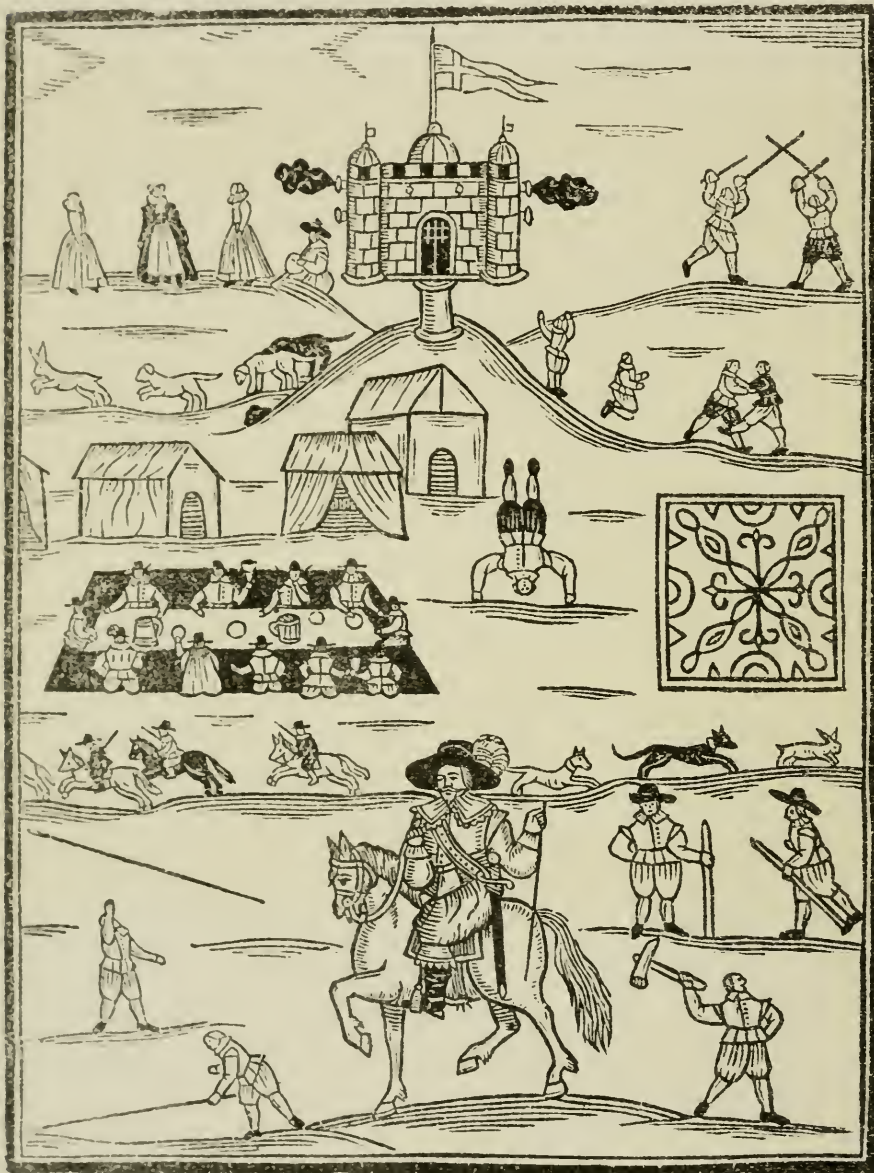

PREFACE

THE precise form which a County Bibliography should take—both as regards its contents and arrangement—is a matter on which there is room for much diversity of opinion. A glance at the Bibliographies compiled for the Counties of Cornwall, Devon, Dorset, Kent, and Norfolk will show how differently such a work may be treated. In order that the scheme which we have adopted may be readily appreciated, we will state briefly what have been the reasons which have guided us in the selection, treatment, and arrangement of the works noticed in these volumes.

Whether these reasons are held to be sufficient or insufficient will depend largely on what is considered to be the main purpose, which a local bibliography is intended to serve. Such a work will generally be consulted by two classes of readers, viz., Students of Local History, and Collectors of Topographical Books; and it is therefore their requirements which should receive most consideration at the hands of the bibliographer. Unfortunately, however, these requirements are by no means identical, and it often happens that the wants of the one class must be subordinated to the wants of the other.

Our primary aim has been to provide the student of Gloucestershire and Bristol history with a ready means of ascertaining all that has been written about these localities, and of knowing whether a particular book is likely to be of service to him before he has examined it.

To this rule we have made occasional exceptions. For example, we have included a very few works—such as Barksdale's *Nympha Libethris or the Cotswold Muse*—the contents of which have no local reference, but the prominence of some local name on the title seemed to demand admittance into a collection of Gloucestershire books.

It was our original intention to include biographies of all who had some title to be considered Gloucestershire men; but we have been compelled with reluctance to abandon it in order that our work might not exceed its present dimensions. The history of a county is so interwoven with the history of its inhabitants that what relates to the one must almost of necessity relate to the other. We have copied the titles of more than 2000 works relating to the lives of inhabitants of Gloucestershire or Bristol. These, together with many original biographical notes, may perhaps be issued at some future day, either as a supplemental volume to this Manual, or as an independent work.

Where there is an obvious and marked connection between works of a biographical character and a particular locality we have noticed them under the head of that locality. For example *An English Country Squire as sketched at Hardwicke Court* will be found under "Hardwicke"; pedigrees of families, described as of a particular place, we have placed under that place; and literature relating to the Berkeley Law Suits is noticed under "Berkeley."

II. Treatment. The titles of all books and tracts relating exclusively to the County, which would be likely to be included in a collection of topographical books, have been given *in extenso*, and we have endeavoured to copy them with minute accuracy, even to the reproduction of errors in spelling and punctuation. Quotations on the title, except when very short, have however been omitted, and their omission indicated thus, "[Quot.]" In the titles of such works the only other abbreviations employed are "Pr." for Printed, and "Pub." for Published.

In the case of works noticed only on account of their contents (*e.g.*, Acts of Parliament, Orders of the County Council, etc.) and of works containing references to the County, the titles have been sometimes abbreviated. These abbreviations have been indicated thus . . .

The size of every work noticed has been usually given approximately, as fol., 4to., 8vo., 12mo.; but we have sometimes discriminated between the varieties (*e.g.*, royal, demy, post, etc.) which these terms include. The domicile of the copy of each important or rare work examined has been indicated.

The number of printed pages of every paged book noticed has been given, and the number of leaves of unpagged books. In the case of standard or important works the type in which they are printed has been stated, and the signatures have been given as well as the number of pages. In such cases the preliminary matter has been generally described. In the case of some pamphlets the only description given, besides the size, is the number of pages, *e.g.* "Pp. 16." When this is so, it may be inferred that the title is included in the pagination. Lists of plates have only been given where no list is found in the work described, except in the case of two or three of our leading county histories.

On works that would be prized by a collector we have aimed at making our notes descriptive. In other cases they will be found to be rather explanatory. We have occasionally given our opinion of the character or value of a work noticed, but generally criticism has been avoided. Whenever the connection of a work with the locality under which it is classed is not evident from the title, an explanatory note has been added. The authorship of anonymous works, when ascertainable, has been stated. We have very rarely been satisfied with information at second hand. Indeed almost every book noticed has been examined by both of us, and the notes made by the one have been checked by the other. In

the very few cases where an unseen work has been noticed, it is so stated in our notes, and the source from which the title has been obtained is almost always given.

III. Arrangement. This may be either alphabetical under authors' names (as in the *Bibliotheca Cornubiensis*, and *Bibliotheca Staffordiensis*) or local (as in the *Bibliotheca Dorsetiensis*, and *Bibliotheca Cantiana*). We venture to think that for almost every reason the latter arrangement is preferable. Those who consult county bibliographies do not generally want to know what has been written by a particular person, but what has been written about a particular place. For this reason our primary classification of works noticed has been under the headings of the localities to which such works refer. We shall however give an index of authors at the end of Vol. iii.

The main headings of our work are :

- I. Works relating to the County generally.
- II. Works relating to the Forest of Dean.
- III. Works relating to the City of Gloucester.
- IV. Works relating to particular Towns and Parishes.
- V. Works relating to the City of Bristol.

When works relating to any particular locality are very numerous (as is the case with those referring to the County generally, Gloucester, Bristol, and to some of the larger towns) they have been subdivided; but subdivisions have only been resorted to when a particular branch of literature would overshadow the rest. For example, among works under the "County Generally," those relating to "County Administration" have been allotted a class to themselves. Similarly, "Guides" have been separated from other literature relating to Cheltenham; and "Acts of Parliament" and "Periodicals," will often be found under sub-headings.

In Class I. it has been thought best to separate works relating exclusively to the County from those which only contain references to it.

Dated works in each sub-division have been arranged chronologically. We have preferred this to an alphabetical arrangement, which is practically useless until the reader has mastered the system on which it is based. A chronological arrangement has also the advantage of serving to some extent the purpose of an annual register, as it constitutes a record of all events, which gave rise to any literature, in the order of their occurrence.

Undated works have been arranged alphabetically at the end of dated works. Here, and in all sub-divisions where an alphabetical system has been found necessary, the works have been arranged in accordance with the first word, not an article, of their titles. Works of which an approximate date has been ascertained, but which have no date on the title, have been placed among the dated works with a cross-reference under undated works. In such cases the date prefixed to them in the chronological arrangement is enclosed in a bracket.

Periodicals relating to a particular locality, when sufficiently numerous, have been arranged alphabetically, either in a single class or under sub-headings. Periodicals relating to Parishes will generally be found among the dated works under the year when they first appeared. The Periodicals relating to County Administration have also always been placed under the date of the first of the series. This was done in order to keep all works relating to County Administration together, and because the date of the first number of each series was known. An alphabetical list of County Administration Periodicals has however been added.

It only remains for us to express our gratitude to the many friends and acquaintances who have aided us in our labours. Our special thanks are due to Mr Phelps, of Chestal, to Mr Fox, of Yate House, and to Mr Braikenridge, of Bath, for having allowed us to spend many hours in examining the contents of their splendid libraries. All of the illustrations

in the first volume of the L.P. Edition of our Manual have, with the kind permission of Mr Phelps, been taken from works in the Chestal library. Our notice of Bristol tracts would have been far less complete, were it not for the help which we received from the late Rev. B. H. Blacker. Mr H. W. Bruton, Mr C. T. Davis, and Mr E. C. Sewell have repeatedly given us much valuable information, and made many useful suggestions. Some of the discontinued Gloucester Newspapers would have escaped our notice but for information supplied by Mr H. Y. J. Taylor. Mr Bellows has most kindly revised our statements as to the type in which important works are printed. Permission granted to us by Mr C. H. Dancey, Mr Clement Moore and Mr W. N. Skillicorne to inspect their collections of local books has been of great service to us; and we have received much kind assistance from others, whose names, though too numerous to mention, are gratefully remembered. We have had occasion to consult large numbers of books in the British Museum and Bodleian Libraries, and we desire to express our gratitude to the officials of both Institutions for their unfailing courtesy and attention.

We do not claim that these volumes form an exhaustive catalogue of Gloucestershire and Bristol Literature. Bibliographers know well how idle such a claim would be. We can however assure our subscribers that we have spared neither time nor trouble in making our work as complete as it lay in our power to do.

PART I. — GENERAL LITERATURE, EXCLUSIVELY RELATING TO THE COUNTY

1609. A Sermon Vpon the xii. xiiij. and xiiij. Verses of the xiiij. Chapter of Ezechiel. Wherein are chiefly shewed both the originall & accidentall causes of euerie dearth and famine, and especially of this dearth in England now 1608 and 1609. With the effects and Fruits of the same, as also the helpes & remedies therof, if they may be speedily and effectually practised. Preached at Strowd in the Countie of Gloucester and published for the good of the church Melitant. Whereunto is added a like Meditation of the same Author, vpon the 26. verse of the 11 Chapter of Salomons Prouerbs, which may be called the Poore mans Plea. By William Woodwall, Minister and Preacher of the word. 1609. London. Printed by E. A. for Ed. White, & are to be solde at his shop neere the little North doore of S. Paules Church at the Signe of the Gunne. 1609. sm. 4to. F.A.H.

Title, one leaf; To the Christian Reader, 2 leaves, A2—A3; Sermon, pp. 1-44, [A4]—G; "A prouerbe pronounced to all the cruell, couetous, and hard hearted Corne-maisters, Cloath-maisters, and al other olde Pinching penny-fathers at this day amongst vs . . ." pp. 45-49, G2-[G4]; A Meditation vpon [Prov. xi, 26]. . . which may fitly be called The poore-mans Plea, pp. 51-63, H—K; To the indifferent Reader, 2 leaves, K2—[K3].

It is stated in the address "To the indifferent Reader" that "the Transportation of Corne, and all other victualls (fruite only except) from the Townes of Bewdley, Tewxburie, and the Citties of Worcester and Gloucester, vnto Bristowe, &c." had been prohibited, to effect which the Justices of the Peace for Gloucestershire had been commanded "to appoint certaine honest and substantiall men to be searchers of all such boates or vessels as should passe on the riuer Seauerne, fro any of the foresaid places to another place, by which good means, it hath pleased God somewhat to mittigate the dayly encreasing price of corn & graine amongst vs."

The following is a M.S. note in the copy collated, in the handwriting of the

late Rev. B. H. Blacker. "Subsidy Roll, 27 Oct. 1605. 'Stroud Will'mus Woodhull, curatus Stipend. vjs. viij.' This sum was the second payment of fourth subsidy granted 4 Eliz. and due 26 Mar. fr. W. Woodhull, but he refused to pay."

There is a running title "Gloucesters Myte" at the head of each page. It appears from the dedication that Thomas Rogers was a resident at Tewkesbury.

Title, one leaf; "To my worthy Friend Mr Robert Dover," signed Mat; Walbancke, one leaf, A2; Thirty-four poems, 33 leaves, unpagcd, signed B—K; Woodcut, frontispiece. Lowndes' collation viz. "pp. 72 A—K2 with a frontispiece" is inaccurate and was probably taken from the reprint. The signatures are at first irregular. Leaving the frontispiece out of account, the book comprises pp. 70. The title (pp. 1-2) is, as usual, unsigned. Page 3 is signed A2 and page 5, B. After this the signatures proceed systematically in fours, the first 3 out of every 4 being signed and the 4th being always blank. Thus, pp. 5-70 are signed B, B2, B3 [B4], . . . I, 12, 13 [14], K.

The Poems end on K verso. Thirty-two out of the thirty-four are by the Authors whose names appear on the title. The one stated to be by "R.N." is said in a M.S. note on the title of the Grenville copy in the British Museum to be by R. Newburgh. These thirty-three poems are eulogies on Robert Dover and his Olympic Games. The thirty-fourth (of which no mention is made on the title) is by Robert Dover himself, and is entitled, "A congratulatory Poem to My Poeticall and Learned Friends, Compilers of this Book." It is inserted between the verses by R.N. and those by Thos. Heywood, and is the last poem but one in the original edition.

The Frontispiece is a quaint woodcut intended to represent various scenes at the Games, e.g., coursing, single sticks, wrestling, dancing, feasting, etc., with an equestrian portrait of Robert Dover at the foot. It is minutely described by Anthony Wood under his notice of Clement Barksdale in

Copies of this work with the original frontispiece are excessively rare. Only one has (to the Authors' knowledge) been in the market during the last 10 years, and only six such copies have come under their notice. Of these, two are in the British Museum, two are in Mr Phelps' library at Chestal, one is in the possession of Lord Moreton, and one of Mr F. A. Hyett. The finest copy known is one of the Chestal copies, which measures $7\frac{1}{16} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ inches. The two copies in the British Museum came respectively from the Grenville and the Banks libraries. The former was a presentation copy to Sr. Thomas Trevor, and has in it Dover's autograph. It is rather badly cut, and measures only $6\frac{1}{8}$ and $4\frac{3}{8}$ inches. The Banks copy measures $6\frac{3}{8} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ inches.

Mr Grosart in the introduction to his Reprint (p. xix.) says that he knew of only three perfect copies besides his own; two of these were probably the British Museum copies.

Of original editions wanting the wood cut frontispiece we have seen five. Two of these are at Chestal, one is in the Library of the Gloucester Literary and Scientific Association, one is in the Bodleian, and one is in the possession of Mr F. A. Hyett.

There seem to have been at least two, if there were not more, issues of this edition, as many variations in spelling have been found in the copies examined. One of the Chestal copies wanting the frontispiece has several peculiarities, and on a leaf after the last poem is the following imprint—"Imprimatur Robert Field. August 29, 1679." This copy has, however, several blank leaves bound up with it, and it is not quite certain that the imprint belongs to it.

Perfect copies have fetched the following prices:—Saunders (1818) £13 2s 6d; Bindley (1818) £12 12s, [See Davis's *Second Journey round the Library of a Bibliomaniac*]; £7 7s, [See Introduction to Vyvyan's Reprint]; and it was priced in one of Thorpe's catalogues (1824) at £8 8s. The last copy in the market was sold for £5 5s, a sum probably much below its value.

The games in celebration of which these poems were written were instituted by Robert Dover and were held on a hill still called Dover's hill, situate in the parish of Weston-sub-edge, and about a mile from Chipping Campden. The date of their establishment is not known, but it was probably at the very beginning of the seventeenth century. From this time, except during the Commonwealth, they appear to have been held annually till 1851, when the inclosure of the common on which they were held necessitated their discontinuance. For some years prior to this they had deteriorated in character and were a source of much disorder to the neighbourhood.

Robert Dover was born circa 1575 and died 1641.

This edition is so similar to the original edition that it has often been mistaken for it. It is of much the same size, and is printed on the same kind of paper and in the same type. The greater number of pages of both editions are almost identical in appearance. The title, with the exception of the transposition of the word "of" from the end of the 3rd to the beginning of the 4th line is a facsimile of the original. There are however some marked and important differences. After the ending of Matt. Walbanke's letter on A2 verso there is in the original only the catchword "TO." But in the reprint between the letter and the catchword the following words occur: "Dr Dover thought it his Duty to perpetuate the Memory of that Good Man his Grandfather." These words probably mean that the work was reprinted by Dr Dover to perpetuate his grandfather's memory, and from them the date of the reprint can be fixed within certain limits. Robert Dover had a grandson John, who was styled Dr Dover, and who was born in 1644 and died in 1725. It is not likely that Dr Dover would have interested himself in literary matters till of age. Hence his reprint must have appeared between 1665 and 1725, and it is probable that its appearance was nearer to the latter than the former year. There is yet another still more important difference. There is an anonymous poem added after that by Thomas Heywood (the last poem in the original), entitled "In celebration of the yearly Preserver of the Games at Cotswald." This poem ends on K2 recto. It is by "Will Davenant," and is to be found at p. 236 of the 1673 edition of his works. This poem is not mentioned on the title. The frontispiece, as has been stated, is a copperplate copy of the wood cut. No one acquainted with the various processes of engraving could mistake the one for the other, but it may be as well to note the following differences between them. In the original, the shading of the tent entrances is given by a few thick horizontal lines, and in the copy by several fine perpendicular lines. The first of the three horses on which men are seen galloping is white and the second is black in the original, while in the copy the first is black and the second white. The hound nearest to the hare under the scroll is black with a white collar in the original, and white with a black collar in the copy. The conventional scroll on the right is formed by one thick line in the original and by two fine lines in the copy. There are also some other minor differences.

This copperplate frontispiece was very accurately copied by Caulfield in his "Portraits and Memoirs of Remarkable Characters," 1794. Sometimes this plate with the foot-lettering ("Pubd. by Caulfield and Herbert 1794") cut off, is mounted and inserted in copies of the Annalia Dubrensis which want a frontispiece. In such cases, it is difficult to distinguish it from the original copperplate, and the following variations are therefore given.

The original plate is $6 \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ inches, and the Caulfield copy is $5\frac{3}{8} \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ inches, measured from the outside of the marginal lines. The head-lettering, "Cotswold Games" is in larger and heavier type in the original than in the copy, the former being $\frac{1}{4}$ and the latter $\frac{1}{8}$ inch in depth. The three men riding on the left centre all carry whips or sticks in their hands in the original, while the first only has one in the Caulfield plate.

There are here and there some trifling differences, e.g. in spelling or punctuation, between the text of the original and that of Dr Dover's reprint.

Most of the copies of the reprint examined are larger than any of the original, but as all of the latter extant have been cut by the binders, it may be that they were originally of the same size. One of the Bodleian copies measures $7\frac{3}{4} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ inches, and one in Thirlestaine House, Cheltenham, $7\frac{3}{4} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ inches. Mr H. W. Bruton's and Mr F. A. Hyett's copies each measure $7\frac{3}{4} \times 6\frac{1}{2}$ inches. Lowndes gives the prices of the reprint as £2 10s, £2 11s, and £3 13s 6d.

Three copies have been sold at auctions in London between 1887 and 1893 at prices ranging from £1 9s to £3, and a few copies have during the past 10 years been priced in booksellers' catalogues at about the latter sum. One, an unusually fine one, bound by Roger Payne with M.S. additions, sold for £5 5s.

There is much interesting information in the preface to this edition, but Dr Grosart is mistaken in stating that the Reprint appeared in 1794. This error was probably caused by the date 1794 on the Caulfield copy of the frontispiece.

In this letter the High Sheriff and two Justices were commanded to levy contributions in aid of the royalist cause, and make a return of those who were well affected and of those who were ill affected towards the King. They were further directed to require the Trained Bands to send their arms to Cirencester "within tenne daies after the date of this letter" and all traffic with the City of Gloucester was prohibited. It was ordered that the letter be read in all Churches and Chapels in the County.

The only place in the neighbourhood with a name at all similar is Badgeworth. Possibly, however, it was Padsworth in Berkshire; or perhaps the tract, like many others, is fictitious.

take subscriptions of money, plate, horse or arms, and to sequestrate "malignants, delinquents and papists' estates." The second ordinance was dated Oct. 2, 1644, and the third March 13, 164 $\frac{1}{2}$. The fourth ordinance, dated Mar. 15, 164 $\frac{1}{2}$, ordered that the "third part of the profit that shall arise out of the customes payable on currans" should be paid to Nathaniell Stephens, Thomas Hodges and Thomas Pury for the use of the Gloucester Garrison.

The only connection which this book has with Gloucestershire is its title. It consists of a number of very short poems and epigrams, for the literary merit of which not much can be said. Pts. I. & II. comprise 50 numbered pieces each, while Pt. III. comprises 34 and Pt. IV., 58. A list of these is given in Sir Egerton Brydges' *Censura Literaria*, vol. vi., pp. 17-29 by "T.P." [T. Park] where the book is fully described. It is there stated that the printer "F. A." was Francis Ash of Worcester, to whom some of Barksdale's verses are addressed. Ash was also a noted binder. According to Anthony Wood, *Nympha Libethris* has sometimes been mistaken for *Amalia Dubrensis*. It is a rare book. A copy sold in 1818 for £15 15s., and another in 1892 for £8 10s.

Clement Barksdale, the Author of this work, was born at Winchcomb in 1609. He was chaplain to the Chandos family at Sudeley during the first years of the Civil War. About 1650 he opened a private school at Hawling, and it was here that he wrote the *Nympha Libethris*. After the Restoration he held the livings of Naunton and of Stow-on-the-Wold. He was the author of "The Disputation at Winchcombe" and of many other theological and of some biographical works. He died in January, 1687. There is a brass tablet to his memory in Naunton Church.

And therefore we resolve, according to our bounden

duty, to joyn with the Lord Mayor and Common-councill of the City of London, and all other Counties in England in pursuance thereof. And we doe not doubt but all true-hearted Englishmen who love their own Liberties, and are not willing to be made Slaves, or to enslave their Brethren will joyn with us herein. s. sh. fol. *B.M.*

The plate of "Wotton, the Seat of Tho. Horton Esq." is almost invariably misplaced, the binder having apparently supposed that it was the seat of Tho. Horton at Combe End, Elkstone, referred to on page 428, and placed it after that page.

The work was possibly in type during Atkyns' life time, but it did not appear until the year after his death. Gough says it "was very expensive to the undertaker, who printed it in a pompous manner." It was published at £5 5s., but its value soon rose, owing to the destruction of the greater part of the impression by a fire which occurred at Bowyer's printing office in Whitefriars, on Jan. 29, 1712-13, and "some of the copies which were rescued from the flames still retain the indelible marks" [*Upcott's English Topography*, vol. i., p. 246.] When Rudder issued his proposals to print a history of the County, a copy of Atkyns was worth £21.

There were two issues of the first edition, which may be distinguished by the vignette on the title page. The one usually met with consists of a figure of Mercury on a scroll between two birds. In the other, which is of very rare occurrence, two flying cupids are the prominent features.

Notwithstanding more than one attempt to displace it, this work still maintains preeminence among the histories of our county. The transcripts of the grants and charters were collected by Dr Richard Parsons, Chancellor of the diocese of Gloucester, who contemplated publishing a history of the county in two volumes, one to be entitled "Memoirs of the antient abbey and present cathedral of Gloucester," and the other "A parochial visitation of the diocese;" but ill health prevented the accomplishment of his design. [*Gough's British Topography*, vol. i., p. 372]. This is alluded to by Sir Robert in the opening paragraph of his preface, but there is no acknowledgment of assistance from Dr Parsons. "It were to be wished that more authorities had been given" [*Id.* vol. i., p. 372].

Browne Willis complains [*Leland's Collectanea*, vol. vi., p. 206] that the accounts of some Gloucestershire Abbeys with which he had supplied Atkyns had not been correctly printed by him, and desires that such accounts in his *View of the Mitred Abbeys* are to be looked upon as more correct than those in Atkyns' work.

The account of each parish usually comprises the following information:— (1) Its situation with distances from adjacent towns (not always accurate). (2) The devolution of the Manor, preceded in some cases by extracts from Domesday Book. This portion of the work is the most complete, and must be considered its principal feature. (3) A short description of the Church, with a history of its endowments. Lists of former patrons and incumbents are sometimes given. Mention is made of the more important monuments and inscriptions in the church, but the latter are not given *in extenso*. (4) The amount of First Fruits, Tenths Synodals, etc. (5) The number of Houses, of Inhabitants and of Freeholders. (6) The yearly Births and Burials. (7) Amount of Tax paid To the Royal Aid in 1692 and of Land Tax and Poll Tax in 1694. Besides the above, the physical peculiarities of the parish are sometimes mentioned as well as the more important events which have occurred in it. Extracts from Camden's *Britannia* are not infrequent.

The views of the seats are copper plate engravings, drawn and etched by Johannes Kip in his earliest manner. They will be appreciated more by the antiquary than the artist, as they are in a style (much in vogue during the early part of the last century), in which the draughtsman endeavoured to make his work at once a landscape and a plan. But they are historically of interest and of value, as since their execution many of the houses which they portray have been much altered, and some have been demolished. Few will now agree with Gough in censuring Sir Robert for having adorned his work with too many "views and prospects," as it is probable that the number and character of the engravings has done quite as much as the nature of the letter-press, to enhance its value and reputation.

It has been questioned whether these plates were specially executed for Atkyns' History, or whether they had not been previously etched by Kip for his own works. From their re-appearance subsequently to 1713² it has been argued that they were not on Bowyer's premises when the fire occurred there in that year, and that they were not there because they were Kip's property. It is certainly noticeable that the portrait of Sir Robert Atkyns—which was not engraved by Kip—did not appear in the second edition of his History. This has always been attributed to the loss of the plate from which it was engraved, in the fire. A more conclusive reason, however, for thinking that the plates in question were not Atkyns' property is to be found in the fact that all of the 64 views of Seats etc., as well as the 8 leaves of Coats of Arms, appeared in the several editions of Kip's *Britannia Illustrata*, or as it is sometimes entitled, *Nouveau Théâtre de la Grande Bretagne*, which appeared before 1740. This accounts for the worn condition of the plates when they re-appeared in the second edition of Atkyns in 1768. It is stated in the *Dictionary of National Biography*, vol. xxxi., p. 194, that the first edition of vol. ii. of *Britannia Illustrata* (which contained 62 out of the 64 Atkyns plates) appeared in 1703. If this is so, the plates referred to must have been published 3 years before they appeared in Atkyns' History. No copy of vol. ii. bearing an earlier date than 1716 has been seen, but there is a copy of vol. iii. dated 1712 in the Bodleian. Whether the plates in question appeared first in the *Britannia*, or in the *Ancient and Present State of Glostershire*, it seems probable that they were drawn and engraved by Kip at Atkyns' request, and that he agreed to supply Atkyns with a certain number of impressions, retaining the right to use them for his own works whenever he thought fit. But for some arrangement of this sort, it would have been hardly likely that out of the 102 views in one volume of Kip's work, 62 should have been views of seats in Gloucestershire. That Kip did not wish to call attention to the undue preponderance of one county in a work professing to be national, is evident from his list of plates, where the county in which each seat is situated is stated, except in the case of those in Gloucestershire.

The two Atkyns plates not comprised in vol. ii. of the *Britannia* were those of "Badminton" and "Gloster Cathedral," the former of which appeared in vol. iii., and the latter in vol. iv. of the 1724 edition [called the *Nouveau Théâtre*], but it is not mentioned in the contents. There are 3 views of Badminton in some editions of vol. i. of the *Britannia* and 4 in others,

numbered respectively 9-11 and 9-12. No. 9 is almost identical with the view of Badminton in Atkyns, but it is from a different plate.

There is a rare print of Hempsted Court, etched by Kip from a drawing by Robins, which is said by the Rev. S. Lysons to have been executed for Atkyns' History, but it was not included in that work, nor was it published in *Britannia Illustrata*.

The views from Atkyns are often to be met with separate from the work, but rarely in complete sets. All of the plates were, it is said, sold to a brazier in Cambridge as old copper, and destroyed [*Lowndes*, vol. iii., p. 1075]. The finest copy of this work which has come under our notice is the property of H. W. Bruton, Esq., of Bewick House, Gloucester. It measures 16 × 10½ inches.

Sir Robert Atkyns was born in 1647. He was the only son of Sir Robert Atkyns, Chief Baron of the Exchequer, and sometime speaker of the House of Lords. He was descended from David Atkyns, a Chepstow merchant, who died in 1552, and who before his death removed to Tuffley. Here he and his descendants resided until the purchase of Sapperton Manor by Chief Baron Atkyns. The family was remarkable for the number of eminent lawyers which it had produced. Sir Robert's father (the Chief Baron) wrote, that "He himself and his three immediate ancestors, having been of the profession for near two hundred years, and in judicial places; and (thro' the blessing of Almighty God) have prospered by it." Sir Robert was knighted by Charles II. on his visit to Bristol in 1663. He was M.P. for Cirencester, 1680-1 and for the County of Gloucester, 1681-5. He died at his house in Westminster in 1711, one year before the publication of his History of Gloucestershire. Hence the insertion in that work of the Epitaph on his monument. He was buried in Sapperton Church.

This edition, like the first is printed in double columns, but it is in pica, solid. The Author's Portrait is wanting, and there is a different vignette on the title. "The West Prospect of Gloster" inscribed in the first edition to "Sr John Powell Judge of the Queen's Bench" is in this edition inscribed "To the Mayor and Aldermen," but is otherwise unaltered. The inscription had been altered as early as 1724 when the plate was used for Kip's *Nouveau Théâtre*. The lettering on the map of the County is in a different type to that on the map in the first edition. The plate of "Broadwell the seat of Danvers Hodges Esq" is either a new plate or it was re-touched for this edition. The lettering at the top of it is different, and the signature is not in the same position. It is also blacker and somewhat bolder in style. It appeared in the same state as in the first edition, but much worn, in vol. ii. of Kip's *Britannia Illustrata*, 1716. Gough says that two plates which had been lost were supplied by the editor. If so, these may have been "The West Prospect of Gloster" and "Broadwell." They both bear Kip's signature, but they must have been copied from his plates by another hand, as Kip died in 1722. It is probable, however, that both had been prepared for one of the later editions of the *Britannia Illustrata*. With these exceptions the plates are the same as in the first edition, a list of which has been given.

This edition was edited by William Herbert, the editor of Ames' *Typographical Antiquities*, but it does not display his usual industry. He merely reprinted the work, and though he corrected some clerical errors, he did not take the trouble to rectify those indicated by the Author in the Advertisement to the first edition, or to put the parish of Sevenhampton in its proper place. Probably it was hurried through the press, in order to forestall Rudder's History of Gloucestershire, the prospectus of which had appeared in 1767. By a curious coincidence, many copies of this edition were also destroyed by fire.

Some large paper copies were printed on superior paper. The largest which has come under our notice is in the possession of Mr. C. H. Dancey, of 6 Midland Rd., Gloucester, and measures 18 x 11½ inches. In these, possibly through more careful printing, the worn condition of the plates is not so obvious as in the small paper copies.

It was published at 2 guineas. This low figure was probably fixed on by the editor to undersell Rudder, whose New History of Gloucestershire had been advertised at £2 10s.

The plate of New Mills is often wrongly placed, facing p. 425, on which there is a mention of a place called New Mills, near Dursley, "where Mr John Purnell has a beautiful house." Lowndes and Upcott have fallen into this error. New Mills, the subject of this plate, which was in Rudder's time the seat of Mr Thomas Baylis, is situate in the Slad Valley, near Stroud, and is mentioned on p. 714. It is engraved in Fisher's Notes & Recollections of Stroud, p. 216. At the foot of the Bibury plate there is the following notice: "Barrington Park, Sandiwell Park, Berkeley Castle, Highnam Court, New Mills, Rendcomb Park and This Print price 17s. 6d. the Set, or 3s. each Singly. Printed for and sold by T. Bonnor, No 36 Maiden Lane, Covent Garden, London, and to be had at Mr Fleys, College Green, Gloucester." And there is a notice to the same effect on the Highnam plate.

According to Upcott, pp. 617 & 618 are wrongly numbered 619 & 620, but though we have examined many copies, we have never seen one in which either of these errors occurs.

In some copies after the leaf paged 345, 346 is another leaf paged [345], [346]. In these copies the 4 pages numbered 345—[346] are on a new sheet which was supplied by Rudder to his subscribers in March, 1782 with a direction that it was to be substituted for the half-sheet, paged 345, 346 which was to be cancelled. The cancelled leaf contains a description of Roman remains at Cirencester, which is considerably amplified in the new sheet. Hence the letter-press on pp. 345, 346 in copies in which the pagination is consecutive, differs from that in the leaf bearing those numbers in copies in which the extra leaf [345] [346] is found. The explanation of the issue of the additional pages is given on page [346].

There was a later issue of the work which may be known by a Postscript to the Preface, [pp. xi.-xii.], dated April 3, 1783. In this issue the new sheet 345—[346] is always found. The Postscript was written in answer to an adverse criticism in which Rudder's history had been unfavourably compared with that of Sir Robert Atkyns. The critic, whom Rudder describes as "a reverend gentleman," was very possibly Foshroke. Rudder, in the Postscript, gives a long list of errors which occur in Atkyns, and adds that more might be pointed out.

The scope of Rudder's History is sufficiently indicated by the title and collation. It is, as its author admits in the preface, to some extent founded on that of Sir Robert Atkyns. The descent of the manors is generally copied from Atkyns, often without any alteration in language. Rudder, however, claims that he has "avoided Sir Robert's errors and supplied his defects."

His work differs from that of Atkyns in the following particulars: He omits lists of incumbents, but he adds lists of benefactions, and the monumental inscriptions which he notices are generally given verbatim. His description of each parish is fuller, and his distances of villages from adjacent towns are more accurate. To the taxes for the years 1682-4 and the births and deaths in each parish, as given by Atkyns, he adds the land tax for 1770 and the births and deaths for the ten years ending 1779.

It is on the whole more complete and more accurate than Sir Robert Atkyns' great work, and as it brings the history of the county down to a later date, it will probably be found the more useful work of the two by the student. It lacks however the interest which Kip's quaint views give to the "Ancient and Present State of Gloucestershire."

Horace Walpole, in a letter to the Rev. W. Cole, written in Dec., 1779, says: "Have you seen Rudder's new 'History of Gloucestershire?' His additions to Sir Robert Atkyns make it the most sensible history of a county that we have had yet; for his description of the site, soil, products and prospects of each parish are extremely good and picturesque; and he treats fanciful prejudices, and Saxon etymologies when unfounded, and traditions, with due contempt."—*Walpole's Letters*, 1891, vol. vii., p. 298.

The production of the work occupied its author much longer than he anticipated. In a letter to a newspaper, unsigned, but dated from Lincoln's Inn, Dec. 16, 1776, several of the Subscribers to "A New History of the County of Gloucester" call on the Author to explain why his Work, which he engaged to perform more than 10 years ago, has not appeared. Rudder in his reply, dated Dec. 23, 1776, which apparently appeared in the St. James's Chronicle, informs his Subscribers that the non-appearance of his history "is solely to be attributed to the Publication of a literal Copy of Sir Robert Atkyns' Book some time after subscriptions for the New History were received. That copy was advertised at Two guineas. Till then, perhaps, the excessive price of the old Edition had operated in favour of the proposed New History." He adds that his work will certainly be published "some time next summer." Rudder's proposals to print were issued in Feb., 1767. Possibly it was their appearance which caused Herbert to reprint Atkyns' History; and his hurry to publish it, before the appearance of the New History, may account for the imperfect manner in which his work was done.

The tallest copy of the work seen measures $17\frac{1}{2} \times 10\frac{1}{2}$ inches. Its usual size is about $16\frac{3}{4} \times 10\frac{1}{2}$. It was published at £2 10.

Mr Niblett's copy was sold in 1884 for £7 10s. At recent London book auctions the prices of presumably perfect copies have ranged from £4 2s. 6d. to £10 10s. An extra illustrated copy, bound in 2 vols., fetched £16 in 1889. Copies with the Postscript to the Preface commanded a higher price than those without it.

This title never formed part of any completed work. It appeared with the first number of a Series of Etchings by Samuel Lysons, F.R.S., the publication of which extended over 12 years, and it was superseded by a new title on the completion of the work, which was finally presented to the public in 1803 as "A Collection of Gloucestershire Antiquities." *q.v.*

As far as is known no copy of the complete series of etchings in their original wrappers is extant, hence no collation of the work as a serial is possible; but some account of its progress between 1791 and 1795 can be given, and the growth of the "Antiquities" out of the "Etchings" can be partially traced. With each of the first eleven parts one leaf of descriptive letter-press was issued, by means of which the contents of each part may be inferred. In the following list the dates in brackets are the dates of publication. The date assigned for the appearance of each part is approximate, and has been gathered partly from the dates on the plates which it contains, and partly from notices and advertisements in the Gentleman's Magazine.

The Etchings, of which this Work is intended to be composed, were begun by the Editor for his Amusement, and as a Relaxation from the pursuit of a laborious Profession: Finding that they increased considerably under his Hands, and that he could make them with great Facility, a Desire of adding somewhat to the Topography of his native County has induced him to offer them to the Public in the present Form. A second part will be published on the 1st of August, and if the number of Copies sold should be sufficient to defray the Expenses of the Undertaking, he proposes to continue the Publication every three months, till it becomes sufficient to form a Volume, which, he flatters himself, will be thought no unacceptable Appendix to the Histories of Gloucestershire already published, and the Collections now publishing from the Papers of the late Garter King-at-Arms.* Herein he hopes to be able to comprise every remarkable Building or Piece of Antiquity within that County of which no Engraving, or only an imperfect one, has been hitherto published. With regard to the Designs he has only to say, that he has endeavoured to render them as accurate as possible; and has in no instance ventured to sacrifice *Truth to Effect*, his intention having been to give faithful Portraits of the Objects he wished to represent, and not *picturesque* views, unless he found them such. It should be remembered that the Plates are not the works of an Artist by Profession, and therefore not to be examined with too critical an eye.

As there are many curious Remains of Antiquity in the City of Bristol, hitherto wholly unpublished, and others which have been very inaccurately engraved, he proposes to insert Views of them in the present Collection; for though that City constitutes a County of itself, and has therefore never been treated of in the Histories of Gloucestershire, yet the greater part of it being commonly considered as lying within that County, he has thought it sufficiently connected with his Plan to make a part of it.

* * The second number will contain, amongst other Views, those of Elkstone Church, the Inside of the Chancel, and the Doorway of that Church, Cirencester Cross, and Arlingham Church."

The Vignette of Gloucester from Robinswood Hill formed part of the title, and the other plates, numbered in this announcement [2 to 7], bore respectively the numbers I.-VI.

Parts I. and II. were noticed in the Gentleman's Magazine for August, 1791, at pp. 743, 4 where the Reviewer says "The Editor of this elegant work (we

know not why) withholds his name at present from the public; but we understand it to be the production of Samuel Lysons, Esq., F.S.A." And Part VII. was mentioned at p. 82 of the September number of that Magazine for 1793.

Part XII., which probably appeared in July, 1794, was accompanied by the following advertisement:—

"The Editor of this Work proposes to complete it in twenty-one numbers, the Thirteenth and Fourteenth of which will be published in the course of a few months: and he hopes that the remainder will be published before the end of the year 1796.

Several of the Plates already published will be etched afresh, and given in the remaining Numbers, the intended effect not having been produced in them. One of these, plate XXI., is included in the present number.

The short Descriptions intended to accompany the Plates will be given all together at the end of the Work, it having been frequently found inconvenient to adapt them to each separate Number."

The succeeding parts do not seem to have been advertised. This, together with the discontinuance of the letter-press, has made it impossible to ascertain either their number or composition, or the dates of their appearance. Their publication, however, lasted 7 years longer than their author anticipated. This no doubt arose from his increased dissatisfaction with his earlier work, which led to the cancellation of many more plates than he contemplated in 1794. Of the 64 plates which had then been issued, only 11 were ultimately deemed worthy of a place in the *Antiquities*. These were—

Three plates published after 1794, viz., Nos. LXVI., LXVIII., and LXXIV., were also subsequently cancelled. The total number of etchings published by Mr Lysons between 1791 and 1803 was 166, of which 56 were cancelled and 110 were included in the *Antiquities*.

If all of the matter deleted during the production of the *Antiquities* were collected in one volume, its collation would be as follows:—Title to Part I., one leaf; Inscription to the Right Honourable Henry, Earl Bathurst, one leaf; Descriptive letter-press to plates I.-LXIV., 11 leaves; Plates numbered I.-VII., IX.-XLIII., XLV.-LI, LIV., LVI.-LVIII., LXVI., LXVIII. and LXXIV.

The work sometimes advertised or catalogued as "*Lysons's Etchings*" usually comprises some of the cancelled matter, together with some of the plates or letter-press of the *Antiquities*. These volumes differ widely as to their contents, and care should be taken before purchasing one, to see that it comprises most of the cancelled plates. Many of these latter, as well as plates from the *Antiquities*, are often to be met with singly. Some of the substituted plates may be distinguished from those which they replaced by an asterisk appended to their number. But a more complete index to the identification of a cancelled plate is to be found in the position of its number, as all of the plates first issued (I.-LXIV.) had the number placed immediately over the plate at the right hand corner, while all of the plates issued subsequently were numbered over the centre of the plate. As has been said, the last 6, and 5 earlier ones, of these 64 plates were retained in the *Antiquities*. Therefore every plate bearing a number between 1 and 58 at the top right

hand corner, except Nos. 8, 44, 52, 53 & 55, is a cancelled plate. But besides these there are 3 cancelled plates, viz., 66, 68 & 74, which are numbered in the centre. The plate substituted for No. 68 has an asterisk added to its number. The other two can only be known from the new plates by their subjects.

In order that the cancelled plates may be readily distinguished from those which were substituted for them, a list of both series has been given, side by side, in the collation of "A Collection of Gloucestershire Antiquities," 1803. *q.v.*

The Monumental Inscriptions and the Historical Notes are printed partly in long primer and partly in pica type. The former are in columns.

The following errors in pagination occur:—The numbers 286, 287 are repeated on pages which should be numbered 288, 289. Hence vol. i. contains pp. 634. Pages 550, 551, 552, 565 and 566 are numbered respectively 350, 351, 352, 365 and 366.

The leaf paged 375-6 is sometimes found in duplicate, as the leaf first issued bearing those numbers was directed to be cancelled, and a new one was substituted for it. At the head of page 375 of both issues is a view of the South Porch of Cleeve Church. The cancelled plate was drawn by S. Lysons and engraved by T. Bonnor. In it a man holding two keys in his right hand is seen disappearing into the church, and bright rays of light, apparently from a lantern in his left hand, are seen behind his head. The substituted plate bears the inscription "S. Lysons fecit. Aquâ forti 1720," and is in Lysons's early manner, resembling in style many of the plates issued in his "Etchings," and afterwards cancelled. There is no figure in this plate. The letterpress on the two leaves is slightly different. Unless the figure and arrangement of light were considered inartistic, it is not clear why the former plate was directed to be cancelled, as it was engraved by Bonnor, and is more in character with the other plates in the work than the new one.

All of the plates by Bonnor and Ravenhill are fine line engravings. They are at the same time faithful copies and pleasing pictures, though the beauty of some of them is sometimes slightly marred by ill drawn figures in the foreground.

Bound copies of vols. i. & ii. are usually about 16½ × 10¼ inches in size. They were probably printed on demy fol. paper.

Mr. Niblett's copy, together with parts 1-8 of the Continuations, realized £26 in 1884. A copy [vol. i. complete and vol. ii. ending at Marshfield] was sold at Messrs Solheby's in 1888 for £6 12s. 6d.

This work, though of great archaeological value, does not fulfil the promise of its title. The historical notices of most of the parishes are meagre, and the genealogical portion was reserved for a separate volume which was never published. It consists therefore principally of monumental inscriptions, which are printed in long and short lines, as if they were verbatim transcripts; but these inscriptions were not always copied by Bigland's own hand, and the persons employed by him sometimes abbreviated them. It should be remembered that Bigland's aim was to supplement and not to supplant the works of Atkyns and of Rudder. In the course of making his collections, which extended over a period of 30 years, he at one time contemplated bringing out a revised and enlarged edition of Atkyns' Ancient and Present State of Gloucestershire, but the appearance of Herbert's edition of that work and of Rudder's New History of Gloucestershire obliged him to abandon this intention. He then determined to print his collections "as an Appendix to former Publications of the History of this County."

Almost all of the information contained in the two volumes under notice was collected by Mr. Ralph Bigland, and he also wrote the preface, and prepared the earlier portions of the work for press, but no part of it was printed in his lifetime. He died in 1784, and his son Richard with the assistance of the Rev. James Dallaway continued the work, and they brought the obituary notices down to the date of publication of the first part.

Vol. i. was issued in 22 parts. No complete series in original wrappers has been examined, but parts 6, 7, 8, 12, 13 and 15 of vol. i. and part 2 of vol. ii. have been seen in this state. Part 1, comprising Abbenhall—Alderton, appeared in 1786 [*Gent. Mag.*, vol. lvi., p. 1062], with a title page of that date. Part 5, the contents of which are not stated, but which included Berkeley, was noticed in the same Magazine in 1788 [vol. lviii., p. 344] where the Reviewer says "We are glad that this splendid work meets with the encouragement which it so well deserves." The contents of the other parts seen were as follows: Part 6, Beverstone—Bisley; Part 7, Bitton—Bourton-on-the-Water; Part 8, Boxwell—Bulley; Part 12, Cirencester—Cleeve; Part 13, Clifford Chambers—Coln St Dennis; and Part 15, Daglingworth—Deerhurst. Hence part 14 must have comprised Coln Roger's—Cromhall. Part 20, comprising Fairford—Frampton Cotterel was out by April 1791 [*Gent. Mag.*, vol. lxi., p. 345]; Part 7 comprised Lechlade, Leckhampton, The Leigh, Lemington, and Lydney [*Gent. Mag.*, June 1793]; and Part 9 (the last part issued by Mr. Richard Bigland) comprised Moreton Henmarsh, Moreton Valence, Naunton and Newent, [*Gent. Mag.*, Feb. 1795]. Further progress of the work was arrested by Mr. Richard Bigland's death and it was not re-commenced for many years. Hence the 21st part must have comprised Frampton-upon-Severn—Guiting Temple. The 22nd part comprised the Title-page to vol. i., the Quotation from Warton, the 3 plates of Arms, the Indices, Directions for placing the plates, and the substituted leaf with the view of the S. Porch of Bishops' Cleeve Church. This part was probably supplied to subscribers gratuitously. The other 21 parts were issued at 3s. each.

Part 1. of vol. ii. must have comprised Hampnett—Harescombe, as part ii. contained Haresfield—Hatherop.

The title page of this volume may have been issued with its first part, as it is dated 1791, the year in which that part probably appeared.

Certain errors in the work are pointed out in a letter signed "D.H." in the *Gentleman's Magazine* [vol. lxi., pp. 725-7]; and from a letter signed "Glevensis" in the same Magazine [vol. lxiii., p. 687] it would appear that the work had been elsewhere unfavourably reviewed.

The unpublished MSS., consisting almost exclusively of Monumental Notes, passed into the hands of Messrs. Nichols of Parliament St., Westminster. An attempt was made by them to continue, by subscription, the publication

of the work, under the editorship of the Rev. T. D. Fosbrooke, but without success. Bigland's notes on the City of Gloucester were, however, published in a condensed form by Fosbrooke in his "Original History of the City of Gloucester," 1819, and most of the illustrations in that work are from plates which had been engraved for Bigland's History.

Messrs Nichols' attempt to obtain subscriptions for the continuation of Bigland's work seems to have been made about 1802-4, for on the wrapper of the Supplement to the *Gent. Mag.* for 1802 appeared the following advertisement "Biglands' Collections for Gloucestershire. Vol. I complete. Price Three Guineas in Boards. Or any single Number of Vol. II at 2s. 6d. each Number. This Work will be continued with all Convenient Speed, and due Notice given of the Mode in which the Remainder is intended to be published"

This advertisement was repeated in the same magazine in 1803 and 1804, but in November of the latter year the price of parts of vol. ii. was advanced to their original cost of 3s. each.

Nichols sold the Bigland MSS. to Sir Thomas Phillipps, who in or about the year 1833 caused to be privately printed at the Middle-hill press some 50 copies of the collections relating to 18 parishes from Newington Bagpath to Pauntley.

This part consisted of 32 leaves, folio, pagged 253-316, and it was issued in boards without any title, lettering on cover, or list of parishes. The first leaf is signed Ttt. No other signatures occur. The catch word at the end of p. 316 is "CLXXXVIII Pebworth." The parishes it comprised, the number prefixed and the pages allotted to each parish are as follows:

This part was printed on poor paper, and copies of it are usually badly foxed. It was reprinted in 1886.

After this issue Sir Thomas Phillipps discontinued the work for a long period. He resumed it in 1870, when he commenced what has been called the second issue of the Bigland Continuations. Of this issue only two parts were printed at his death, which occurred in Feb., 1872. In these parts Bigland's historical notes were largely augmented by the labours of Sir Thomas and several of his friends.

Only a few copies of pts. 1 & 2 were printed. Pt. 2 ended with the parish of Rendcomb. By his will Sir Thomas entreated Mr. S. H. Gael, one of his executors, to continue the superintendence of the printing of the remaining parishes. Mr. Gael undertook the task, and in 1873 he issued a pamphlet, giving an account of the progress of the work up to that date, and inviting

subscriptions for its continuance. It is from this pamphlet that much of the above information has been obtained. Seven additional parts of the second issue were printed between 1873 and 1889, under the superintendence of Mr. Gael, and after his death in 1887 under that of Mr. T. Fitz-Roy Fenwick, to whom the whole of Sir Thomas Phillipps' valuable library had been bequeathed. Part 9 ended with the parish of Yate, and one more part which has not yet [1894] appeared, will conclude the work.

The following is a summary of the contents, dates of appearance *etc.* of the several parts of the three issues of the Continuations. A full collation of the Second and Third Issues is given later.

Pts 1 & 2 of the second issue appeared in plain wrappers without any lettering; and pts 3-9 in brown paper wrappers, and a list of the parishes comprised in each part printed on white paper was pasted on its wrapper. These lists on pts. 4-9 were headed "Bigland's Gloucestershire." They are correct except that on pt. 6, from which Tidenham was omitted, and that on pt. 8, from which Whittington was omitted.

The whole of pt. 1, a portion of pt. 2 and a few pages in the middle of pt. 3 were paged, but pts. 4-9 were unpagged.

The Parishes from the first in vol. i. (I. Abbenhall) to the last in the first issue of the Continuations (CLXXXVIII. Pauntley) were all consecutively and correctly numbered in Roman numerals only; but in the second issue they are numbered in both Roman and Arabic numerals, and the errors in numeration are frequent and remarkable. Numbers are omitted and repeated, first in one series and then in the other, and the two numbers prefixed to a parish rarely correspond. It is impossible to trace any system or method in either series. In the earlier parts of this issue errors of other kinds abound. Indeed the combined carelessness of Editor and Printer has made some of these parts curiosities in literature.

Errata in the Additions to Sevenhampton on inserted slip before Quedgeley. There are woodcuts of Sevenhampton and Whittington Churches (the former repeated) and of Brasses in both Churches with the letter-press, and detached woodcuts of Willersey Church (full page) and Coscombe House, 1818, and of Campden House, the Seat of Sir Baptist Hicke temp. Chas. I. These plates are rough, cheap productions, quite unworthy of a book which contains the fine work of Bonnor and Ravenhill.

The sheet containing the parishes of Quedgeley and Queinton was superseded by a new sheet, supplied subsequently with Pt. 2. The catch word at the foot of p. 2 of the sheet first issued is "Queinton"; that on the same page of the new sheet, "CCVII, or 210.—Queinton." The half-page relating to Snowhill was also superseded by a new leaf supplied with Pt. 4.

This part contained the same woodcuts as appeared in Pt. 1. (1870).

Mr. Fenwick's reprints are a great improvement on the originals both as regards the quality of the paper on which they are printed, and freedom from typographical errors.

The Continuations contained no illustrations, except the woodcuts in Pt. 1, but 73 plates had been engraved before the death of Mr. Richard Bigland for illustrating the portion of his work which he did not live to complete. A few proofs of these were struck off on folio paper, and distributed with impressions of the plates which appeared in vols. i. & ii. Volumes containing the whole series of published and unpublished plates are occasionally to be met with, but they are very rare, and fetch from 6 to 10 guineas. In two of the copies which have been seen, there is one engraving on each page, but in most copies the smaller engravings are printed two on a page.

Twenty-nine of these plates were afterwards employed by Fosbrooke to illustrate his "Original History of the City of Gloucester," 1819, but he added the lettering to some, and altered it on others.

What became of the original copper plates is not known. Nichols, in whose possession they must have been in 1819 when he allowed Fosbrooke the use of them, did not hand them over to Sir T. Phillipps with the unpublished MSS. The last evidence of their existence is the appearance of the Berkeley Castle plate, as frontispiece to Fosbrooke's Berkeley Manuscripts, published in 1821.

The following is a list of the unpublished plates, which are merely numbered for reference. The numbers in brackets after plates 1-29 are the pages where they will respectively be found in the folio edition of Fosbrooke's History. Pl. 30 must have been intended for vol. ii. of Bigland's History, but was never used.

Pl. 31 is a view of "Our Lady's Well" taken from the opposite side to that in the plate in Bigland, vol. ii. p. 65.

Two other views which appeared in Fosbrooke's History of Gloucester are sometimes bound up with the above plates, viz. :—

Rawl direxit," but the dates of these show that they could not have been prepared for Bigland's History. The latter will be found in a different state in *Bonnor's Itinerary*, p. 30, where it is stated to have been dr. and eng. by T. Bonnor and pub. Dec. 1st, 1806.

Some monuments in Tewkesbury Abbey, engraved by S. Wale in 1745, are also generally found with the above plates.

The plates of the churches, are with a few exceptions, of much the same size, the engraved portions of them measuring from 6¼ to 6¾ inches in length and from 4¼ to 4¾ inches in depth.

Some of the plates used in the early part of the work have been met with in two states. Mr. H. W. Bruton has in his possession some of these which differ from the published plates in the following particulars.

All of the above plates were etched by Samuel Lysons. Plate CX. is sometimes placed as the Frontispiece. In a few copies (among others in that from the Banks Library in the British Museum) a fine mezzo-tint engraving by S. W. Reynolds of a portrait of Lysons by Sir Thomas Laurence has been added as Frontispiece. This portrait is more often found in large paper copies of the 1804 edition, and it has been suggested that it was added by the author to presentation copies [*Gloucestershire Notes & Queries*, vol. iii., p. 558].

The cancelled plates vary considerably in style and in excellence. Some closely resemble sepia drawings [e.g. pls. 34, 35 & 46]; others are little more than outlines, so faint that they might be taken for pencil sketches [e.g. pls. 24, 23 & 41]; while others are darkly shaded in bold thick lines, like chalk drawings [e.g. pls. 26, 29 & 49] and the chiaro-oscuro of one [pl. 54] recalls some of the works of Piranesi.

The plates in the Antiquities on the other hand, are more uniform in style, more highly finished, and of more equal merit. In these Lysons's manner somewhat approximates that of Bonnor, whom he seems to have imitated, but he never approaches Bonnor in delicacy of execution, though he always exceeds him in boldness. From an architectural point of view these plates are perhaps more valuable, but many of them have less character than the plates which they superseded. Why Lysons cancelled plate 14, [Cirencester Church], it is difficult to say, as it is artistically one of his finest productions. This work was issued at £6 6s., but it has not maintained its price. This may arise from the fact that copies are rarely to be met with that are not badly foxed. The following prices have been realized at public sales in London:—£2 10s. (1886); £1 8s., £2 9s., and £2 15s. (1887); £1 16s. and £1 9s. (1892). The late Mr Niblett's copy, which was bound up with all of the cancelled plates, sold, in 1884, for £10 10s.



1-5 were issued separately. Pt. 6 comprised Nos. 6, 7, 8 and 9; Pts. 7 and 8 comprised Nos. 10, 11, 12 and 13; and Nos. 14 and 15 were issued separately as pts. 9 and 10 respectively. The title on the wrapper of Part I. was as follows: "Number I. The History of Gloucestershire. By Walter Honeywood Yate, Esq. of Bromsberrow-Place, Member of the Royal Institution, &c. and Thomas Dudley Fosbrooke, F.S.A. Purchasers of this Number must be considered as Subscribers to the Whole Work—Vide Proposals. Printed at the Herald Office, Gloucester." In a slip inserted in this number it is stated that "Mr. Yate (who is of a friendly and affectionate temper) does me the honour, from pure disinterested motives, of undertaking the biographical department, some particulars of which will, it is hoped, consist of matter which has not been edited. He will also contribute such incidental and genealogical matter as he may be able by private and other sources to procure." As Mr Yate's name disappears from the title of the completed work, and no mention is made of him in the preface, it may be inferred that his share in it was not large. The Work is however dedicated to him "as a testimony of his friendship and services." On a slip inserted in Number 9 it is stated that in order to terminate the work in 6 numbers more, the type in long parishes has been abbreviated and 3 sheets added. Mr Fosbrooke in this note complains bitterly that he has been denied access to the Rolls Chapel except on payment of fees, so high as to be prohibitive, and he attributes any imperfections in his work to such refusal. In an Advertisement it was stated that the Appendix would comprise 6 numbers; and a note on a slip, dated Aug. 11, 1809, commences "Mr Fosbrooke having concluded the last number of his Appendix cannot dismiss this Work" *etc.* None the less it is believed that the whole appendix issued comprised only one part, consisting of 32 pages and a reprint of the list of Subscribers which accompanied Number 15 of the Work, as "The End" is printed after the letterpress on p. 32. The following note appeared on a slip inserted in Number 15 (the 10th and last supplied to the Subscribers):

"Mr Fosbrooke, having concluded the last Number of his Appendix, cannot dismiss this Work without making due acknowledgements to the Subscribers. He did, however, entertain a hope, that from having compiled a work *de novo*, in the most difficult walk of literature, and encountered the slander incident to such publications, that he should have obtained a permanent recompense, which he had endeavoured to *deserve*. He is sorry, however, to state, that whatever obligations he may feel to particular Gentlemen of the first respectability and station, upon his proposal of an application to the Chancellor, for a Living, he has not yet obtained the adequate support. He therefore respectfully requests that such Gentlemen as may be disposed to encourage such a proposal, will honour Mr. F. with their permission to use their names, for forwarding to the proper sources. Horsley, July 11, 1809.  In the last Suppl. of the Monthly Magazine is a Review, in which the merits of the work are exhibited."

Some L. P. copies were issued. The 3 copies sold at the Niblett sale, realized respectively £6 15s., £5 5s., and £4 12s. Between 1887 and 1833 copies have been sold at public auctions at prices ranging between £1 13s. and £6 6s. L. P. copies, especially if they have the Appendix and deleted plates, are seldom to be had for less than 5 guineas.

The author of this history was born in 1770 and died in 1842. He was curate of Horsley, Gloucestershire, from 1792—1810. He then went to Walford, Herefordshire, of which he was Curate until 1830, and Vicar from 1830 till his death. He was also author of the History of the City of Gloucester, 1819, 4to and fol.; Abstracts of Smyth's Lives of the Berkeleys, 1821, 4to; A Picturesque Account of Cheltenham, 1826, 8vo; and other topographical and archaeological works. He was an antiquary of some eminence. Between 1807 and 1819 he changed the spelling of his name from Fosbrooke to Fosbroke. Besides the works on which his name appears, he is said to have been the Author of "Poetical Essays by a Young Gentleman of the University. Oxford: 1786," 8vo, pp. 44, and also of a Periodical, now very rare, entitled "The Cosmopolitan. A Miscellany. By Gentlemen of the University of Oxford. London." Four numbers of the latter appeared on April 15 and 30, and May 15 and 30, 1788 respectively, which were sold at 3d. each, and comprised together 78 pages. Probably no more were issued.

Twenty of these Sketches were published separately, price 1d. (double-numbers 2d.), under the title "Gloucestershire Tracts"; and were issued quarterly. The first appeared Jan. 1861 and the last Oct. 1865. A Second Edition with 11 new sketches, (including Lucius, Whittington, Dowry, Sarton, Gregory, Drewett, Keble, and Richard of Cirencester) was begun in 1866 and finished in 1867. These were then reprinted and published under the title "Good and Great Men of Gloucestershire." The price to Subscribers was 5s. plain or 5s. 6d. gilt and to Non Subscribers 7s. or 7s. 6d. Only 600 copies were printed and these were all sold before the end of the year. To meet a further demand a few complete sets of the 31 Gloucestershire Tracts (separately paged) were bound in cloth with the following title:

This Act recites that grievous complaints have been made from the counties of Hereford, Gloucester, and Shropshire, and from the counties of Somerset, Chester, and Bristol, of the oppressions and extortions made on them by Welshmen.

John Corbet [b. 1620, d. 1680] was the son of a Shoemaker of Gloucester where he was born and educated. He took orders and became Incumbent of St Mary de Crypt Church. He was chaplain to Colonel Massey during the siege of Gloucester. He took part in a disputation with Robert Bacon

in Gloucester Cathedral on the subject of "Close Antinomianism" while the City was surrounded by the enemy. After the Restoration he was ejected for nonconformity. He died in 1680, and his funeral sermon was preached by his intimate friend, Richard Baxter. This sermon "With his True Memoir and Exemplary Character" [pp. 36] was printed in 1682, and reprinted in Baxter's *Practical Works* 1707, vol. iv., pp. 911-920, and 1880, vol. xviii., pp. 161-192.

He was the author of a curious little tract entitled "Self Employment in Secret" published one year after his death. This was reprinted, with a memoir of Corbet by G. W. Counsell, in 1833, 1835 and n.d. Biographical Notices will also be found in Baxter's *Biographical Collections*, 1st. ed., 1766, vol. i., pp. 150-170; and 2nd ed. (called Christian Biography), 1768, vol. i., pp. 150-170; *Good & Great Men of Gloucestershire*, pp. 145-156; and *Dict. Nat. Biog.*, vol. xii., pp. 201-2, where a list of Corbet's works will be found. It is said that he assisted in the compilation of Rushworth's *Historical Collections*.

This description was printed in the form of a pamphlet to accompany the Ten Views which were supplied in a case measuring $8 \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ in. The plates which are all dated May 13, 1796, are beautiful line engravings executed with much delicacy. They are of different sizes, varying from 6×4 in. to 3×2 in., and in this edition were printed on loose sheets of paper also of different sizes. On the case containing the views there was the following advertisement.

"Copper Plate Perspective Itinerary, By T. Bonnor, Engraver. Price Five Shillings, to be Continued Quarterly; Each Number to consist of Ten Perspective Views of Castles, Abbeys, Cathedrals, Palaces, Mansions, Ruins &c. . . No. I., which is published, Contains Ten Views, the principal Beauties of Gloucester Cathedral, its Ground Plan, Measurements, History, Description of present State, History of the College School, &c.

No. II. will Contain Ten Views of Goodrich Castle . . .

No. III. will contain Ten Views of the Vicinity of Cheltenham . . .

London. Published as the Act directs May 13th 1796 . . .”

Inside the case was a fuller prospectus of the work, on a small single sheet, headed “Address.”

The Second Number, which comprised eleven views of Goodrich Castle, was published in 1798, price 7s. 6d. In this number the plates were all printed on paper of the same size (8 in. × 5½ in.) loosely stitched together and placed inside a paper wrapper containing descriptive letter-press (pp. 37) and list of Subscribers, (pp. 39-46).

After the appearance of No. II. an Appendix to No. I. was issued, price 2s. 6d., which consisted of a folding plate (measuring about 10 in. × 7 in.) and was headed Pl. XI. and Pl. XII. It comprised seven views of the exterior of Gloucester Cathedral, viz:—(1) The Pinacles and Embattlements, (2) The Builder's Bracket, (3) The S.W. Extremity, (4) The S. Porch, (5) The flying Buttresses, (6) King Osrick, and (7) Bearings from Glouc: Coll: Tower.

According to an advertisement on the wrapper of No. II. this Appendix also comprised some pages of descriptive letter-press, but no copy of the first edition of the Appendix with any letter-press has been seen. A single sheet containing an announcement that H.M. Queen Charlotte had become a Subscriber to the Perspective Itinerary has been seen. It is dated Sept. 23, 1799, and was probably issued with the Appendix.

After the publication of the Appendix Bonnor seems to have discontinued the work for some years, and when he resumed it he changed the plan which he had originally announced.

He abandoned his intention of issuing No. III., which was to have comprised views of Cheltenham and its vicinity, and he re-issued Nos. I. & II. with this Appendix, in book form, as four numbers, price 5s. each. In these all of the plates were printed on the same sized paper. His revised plan was announced on the wrappers of Nos. III. & IV. of the re-issue, where it was stated that Nos. V. & VI. (price 7s. 6d. each) would contain engravings of the Remains of Antiquity in the City of Gloucester, and Nos. VII. & VIII. Views of Frogmore. None of these numbers ever appeared.



At this time it was 22 in. \times $15\frac{1}{2}$ in. in size. Soon afterwards (c. 1820), it was published on a Friday evening (See Roberts' *New Guide to the City of Gloucester*, p. 97). Roberts was printing it in 1816, and probably continued to do so until its discontinuance in 1827, when it was superseded by the Gloucester Mercury.

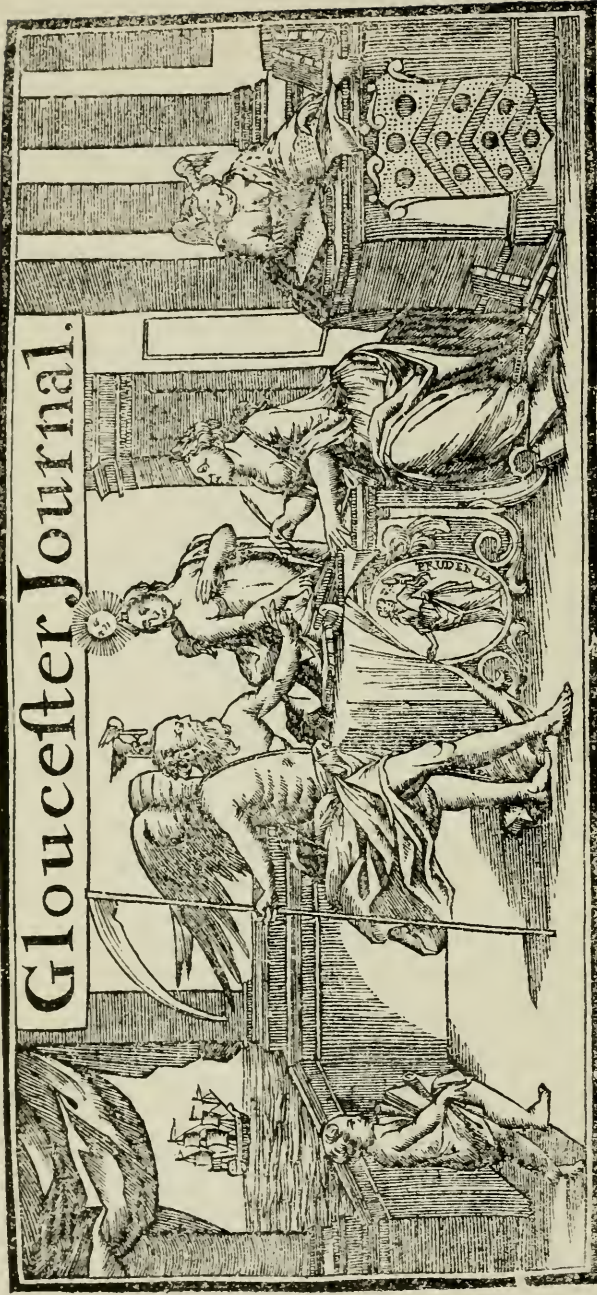

Mayer, and John Clarke (author of *The Architectural History of Gloucester*), and printed by Henry Smart. Price 1½d. No copy has been seen. It is said to have been a Conservative paper.

With the exception of the Cirencester Post, and some of the Bristol Papers, this is the oldest Gloucestershire Newspaper, and it is one of the oldest Provincial Newspapers in existence. Its appearance was announced in the following advertisement:—

" March 10, 172½.

At the Printing-Office, Against the Swan-Inn in Gloucester, Will be shortly published, Weekly, a News Paper intitled, The Gloucester Journal, which will contain not only the most authentic Foreign and Domestic News but also the Price of Corn, Goods, &c. at Bear Key in London, and all other Trading Cities and Market Towns 50 Miles round. The Paper will be suitable to all Degrees and Capacities, and will be collected with all the care that Money or Industry is capable of procuring. N.B. At the aforesaid Printing-Office, any Shop-keepers or others may have all Sorts of Bills and Advertisements Printed after the best Fashion; as also their Signs or any other Ornaments very curiously Ingraved on Wood, at reasonable Rates."

The first number appeared on April 9, 1722, and was headed as follows:—Number 1. Gloucester Journal. With the most material Foreign Advices, And the largest Account of Home News. Monday April 9." It was "Printed by R. Raikes and W. Licey, over-against the Swan-Inn; Where Advertisements are taken in; as also by the men that carry the News."

At the head, after the word "Journal" was a very quaint allegorical woodcut * which was used for the first 104 numbers, to March 30, 1724. On April 6, 1724 a new one (the S. W. Prospect of Gloucester) *, was substituted for it. This was used till No. 160 (April 24, 1725) after which it was discontinued, and the paper merely headed "Gloucester Journal." On Aug. 10, 1742 the letters of the Heading were enlarged and otherwise altered, and so continued till April 8, 1760. On April 15, 1760 (No. 1977) the heading "Gloucester Journal" was placed between a female figure [? Britannia] and the Arms of the City of Gloucester. In 1811 the Figure was discontinued, and the City Arms placed in the centre; and on Oct. 4, 1845 the City Arms were placed between two lions as supporters. The first number measured 12¾ × 7¾ inches. Its price was not stated. It was enlarged on Aug. 10, 1742 to 16 × 10½ inches. In 1764 it had been further increased in size to 18 × 11 inches, and on Jan. 2, 1792, it was again increased to about 20 × 14 inches. On April 22, 1793 its price was 4d., and the price was stated for the first time. Subsequent changes in size and price took place on the following dates; Price raised to 6d. July 10, 1797. Size, 20 × 14 inches, Jan. 5, 1801. Price raised to 6½d. June 12, 1809. Size 22 × 16 inches, Jan. 3, 1814. Price raised to 7d., Sept. 4, 1815. Size 22 × 16 inches, Jan. 6, 1827; 22¼ × 16 inches, Jan. 1, 1831; 23¼ × 16½, Jan. 3, 1835, and 25½ × 19¼ April 11, 1835. On Sept. 17, 1836, the price reduced to 5d. Size, 27¼ × 21¼ inches, Oct. 4, 1845; 28¼ × 22 inches, Jan. 2, 1847; and 27¼ × 21½ inches Jan. 4, 1851. On June 30, 1855 price reduced to 5d. stamped and 4d. unstamped, and on Oct. 5, 1861

to 4d. stamped and 3d. unstamped. On Oct. 26, 1861, the paper measured 24 × 13 inches. On Jan. 4, 1873, its size was increased to 25 × 21 inches, and on Jan. 3, 1885, its price was reduced to 1½d., at which figure it still stands.

The Advertisement of March 10, 172½ and early numbers of this paper are in the possession of Mr Phelps, of Chestal.

This Journal was established by Robert Raikes the elder, and he edited it from 1722 to his death in 1757. His son Robert succeeded him as Editor and Proprietor, and so continued until he sold it 1802 to David Walker, of the Hereford Journal. During the period that it was in the possession of the Raikes family it was printed at their house in Southgate St., which had previously been the residence of Judge Powell, and is now a Grocer's Shop, in the occupation of Messrs Sterry and Morris.

In September, 1802, David Walker removed the printing offices to the premises in Westgate St., in which the paper was until recently printed. It continued in the possession of the Walker family for two generations, being printed successively by D. Walker alone till April, 1816, by D. Walker and Sons from 1816 to 1831, by Alexander and David Mowbray Walker from 1831 to 1833, and by David Mowbray Walker from 1833 to 1871. On the death of Mr D. M. Walker it passed into the hands of Mr Thomas Henry Chance, who was sole proprietor and editor till 1881, when he took into partnership Mr Samuel Bland. The paper is now (1893) owned by Mr T. H. Chance, Mr S. Bland and Mr Harry Godwin Chance (Mr T. H. Chance's son) who was taken into partnership in 1891.

It was originally a Whig paper, and is now the leading organ of the Radical party in the county.

THE GLOUCESTER MERCURY.

No copy of this paper has been seen. It was established by Mr Blewitt, and published by Charles Hough, of College Court, c. 1827. It was discontinued in 1829, when Mr Blewitt, the proprietor, established the Monmouthshire Merlin. This "Mercury" was a Tory paper, and some of its articles are said to have possessed much literary merit.

It was advertised in the "New Guide to the City of Gloucester" (published by J. E. Lea, c. 1823), p. 97.

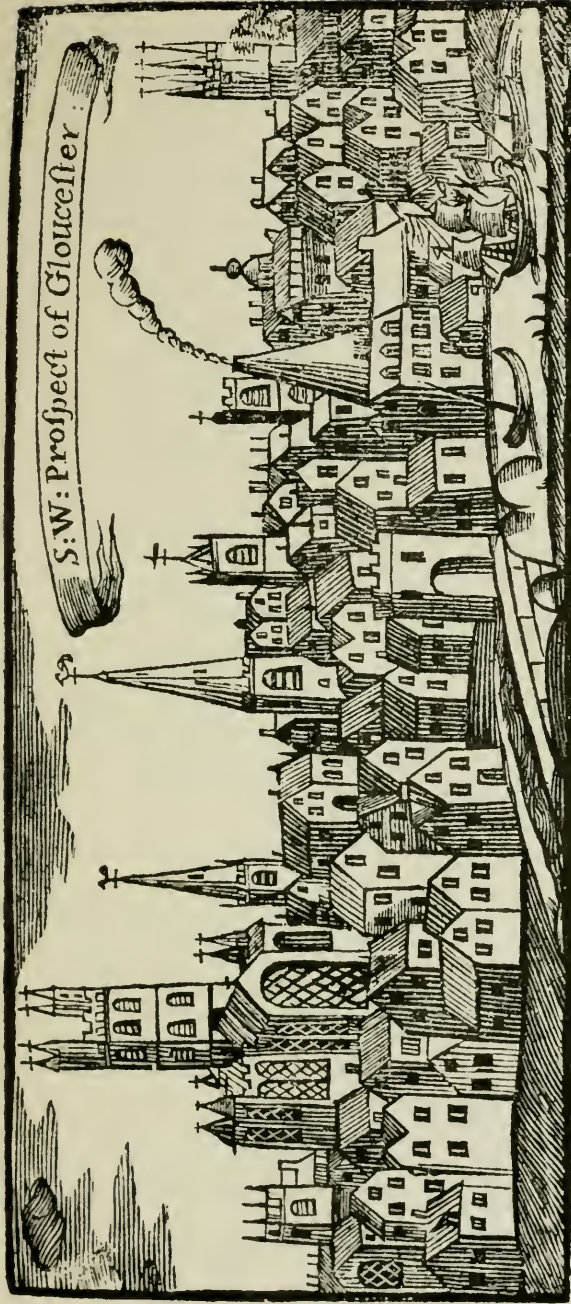

The additional water works authorised were to be in the parishes of Oxenhall and Newent. The 14 parishes and 4 hamlets which were comprised within the City, were by this Act constituted, for civil purposes, the parish of Gloucester. The County Lunatic Asylum was however contingently exempted from the operation of the Act.

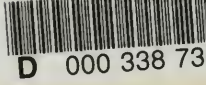
