On Friday, May 13, 1949, at 3:30 p.m. an "I Am An American Day" program will be held in the Jefferson Memorial Auditorium in honor of all Washington and Beltsville USDA Employees who have entered the ranks of full citizenship during the past year either through attainment of their majority or through naturalization. Special invitations will be issued to these honored guests and seats will be reserved for them until 3:15 p.m. There will be approximately 400 unreserved seats available for interested employees not receiving special invitations.

Judge Carl B. Hyatt, Director, Attorney-General Citizenship Program, will be the principal speaker at the program. Secretary Charles F. Brannan will preside. Other features of interest will be selections by the United States Navy Band, and a twenty-minute movie.
