

SUBJECT: Recommendation for Award of Medal of Freedom

TO: Commander-in-Chief, Far East Command, APO 500

1. Under provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, Yay Panlillo, Philippine National, is recommended for the Award of Medal of Freedom with Silver Palm for meritorious service during the period of April, 1942 to July, 1945.

2. Yay Panlillo was employed by C-2 of Headquarters, Philippine Department prior to hostilities. Early in 1942 she organized the Intelligence Unit of the Markings Guerrillas, a group which became very prominent in 1943. She functioned as its Chief of Staff. This Group, largely through her untiring and intelligent efforts, was instrumental in organizing an informant net which secured vital intelligence for General Headquarters including Japanese troop dispositions, air installations, and location of supply dumps. Throughout three (3) years of Japanese occupation, Yay Panlillo, under the most adverse conditions, resisted the Japanese in every way possible and continued securing and forwarding to General Headquarters intelligence which was of great assistance in the campaigns for the liberation of the Philippines. Through her positive and untiring efforts and the resultant knowledge gained, many American lives were saved.

3. a. Yay Panlillo was working as a C-2 Agent from 1941 to 1945 with no authorized rank from the United States Government.

b. No other individuals have been or are being recommended for participation in the same acts.

4. This recommendation is not supported by any official record due to the manner in which duty was performed. However, extracts of General Headquarters records (on Guerrilla radio traffic) are appended.

5. I have personal knowledge of the service for which the award is recommended.

6. A recommended citation is attached.

7. The individual recommended has not been awarded previously a decoration for the services rendered.

8. During the period covered, I was aware of the Guerrilla activities of Yay Panlillo.

1. Under the provisions of Section I, War Department Circular No. 281, dated 18 September 1946, it is recommended that the Army Commendation Ribbon be awarded to Major Howard Fletcher, Junior, O292949, Cavalry, for outstanding performance of duty in connection with Civil Censorship operations in this theater from 16 October 1945 to 19 October 1946.

2. Major (then Captain) Fletcher served as Liaison Officer at Civil Censorship District II, Osaka, Japan from 16 October 1945 until 18 April 1946. In October 1945, during the early stages of the Occupation of Japan, Major (then Captain) Fletcher was faced with the problem of establishing liaison between Headquarters, I Corps, Headquarters, 25th Division and the Civil Censorship Officer, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. This officer, on his own initiative, organized and planned measures that were responsible for making the Osaka station a most outstanding operating unit. He devoted untiring effort in establishing procedures for securing services and supplies required to effect censorship civilian communications as required in the areas controlled by Commanding General, Sixth Army.

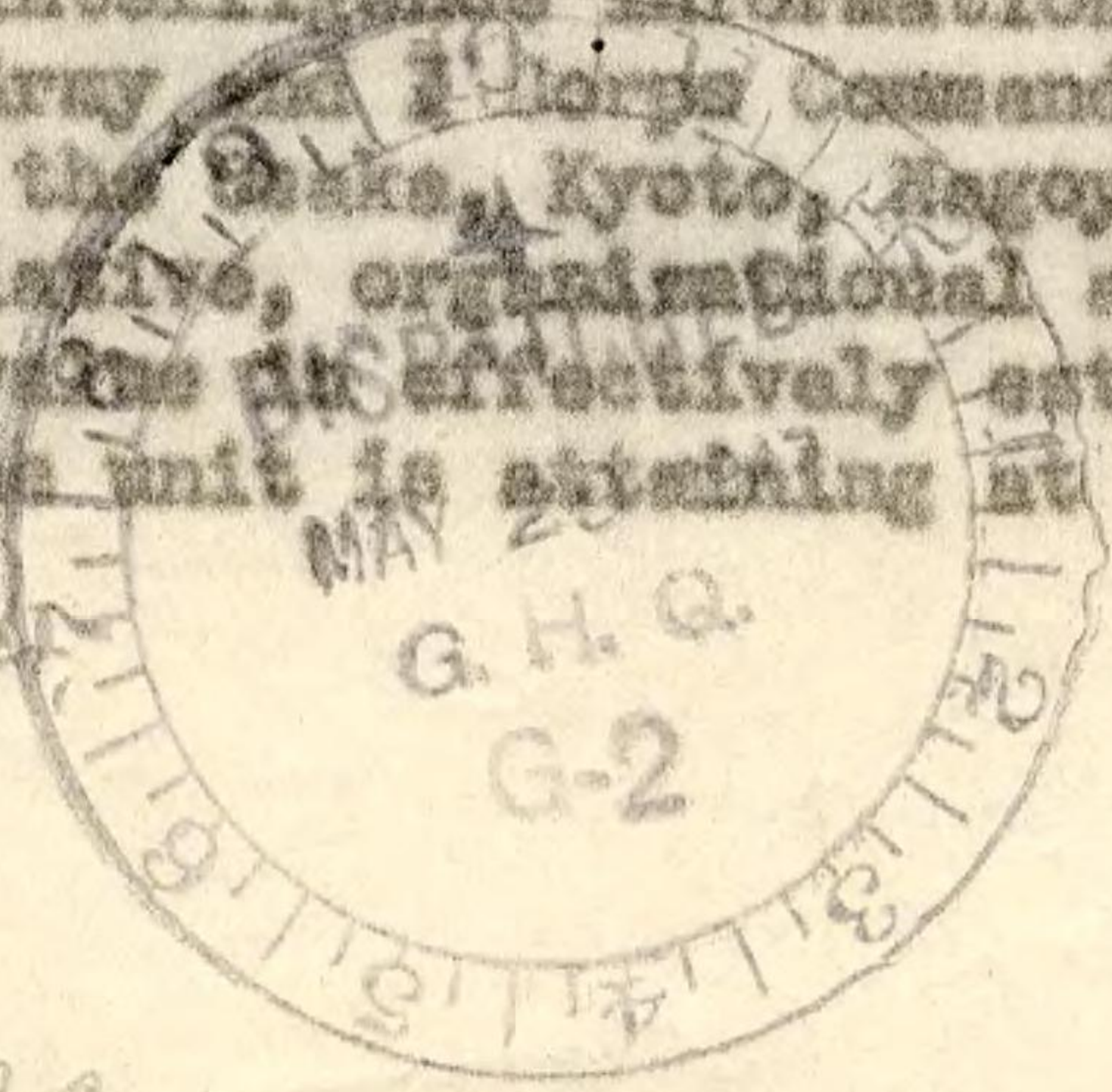
3. This officer proved capable of extending his abilities far beyond the ordinary requirements of his position. The Commanding Officer of the District and this officer alone shared the responsibilities of keeping the office open from 0800 until 2300 daily, together with being actually on duty 24 hours every day on call whenever required. Major (then Captain) Fletcher established the ground work for the policy and procedure of disseminating intelligence information gathered from censorship channels to the Sixth Army and I Corps Commands and to Military Government and CIC units in the Osaka, Kyoto, Nagoya and Shikoku areas. This officer displayed initiative, organizational ability and foresight that proved of inestimable value in effectively establishing groundwork for the excellent results the unit is attaining at this time.

On 18 April 1946, Major Fletcher was ordered to report to Tokyo to assume the position of Liaison Officer at Headquarters, Civil Censorship Detachment, Tokyo, in which responsibility he was required to contact various elements of other headquarters and representatives of various Staff Sections within General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and United States Army Forces, Pacific (now Far East Command). This officer worked untiringly in furnishing various Staff Sections, other Commands and the Military Government and other Units with advance information concerning the economic and political situation in Japan and Korea with the result that such agencies were better capable of discharging their duties in connection with the Occupation. Letters are of record in this headquarters indicating the value of the information furnished User Agencies, all of which Major Fletcher organized to a large degree.

5. This officer also represented Civil Censorship Detachment on various occasions to present intricate problems to the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2 or Deputy Chief, Civil Intelligence Section, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, and United States Army Forces, Pacific (now Far East Command). Possessed with his professional military education, and background, as well as his seasoned experience in Government investigative work, Major Fletcher was capable of exerting the keen qualities required by an officer in this position and he exerted himself far beyond the normal requirements of his position. Through his initiative and foresight, the mission of Military and Civil Intelligence was greatly enhanced and his outstanding performance of duty has contributed notably to the Occupation of Japan and the Liberation of Korea.

6. The entire service of Major Fletcher has been honorable during the period for which the award is recommended.

7. The basis for this recommendation has not been used for any previous award and will not be used for any future recommendation.

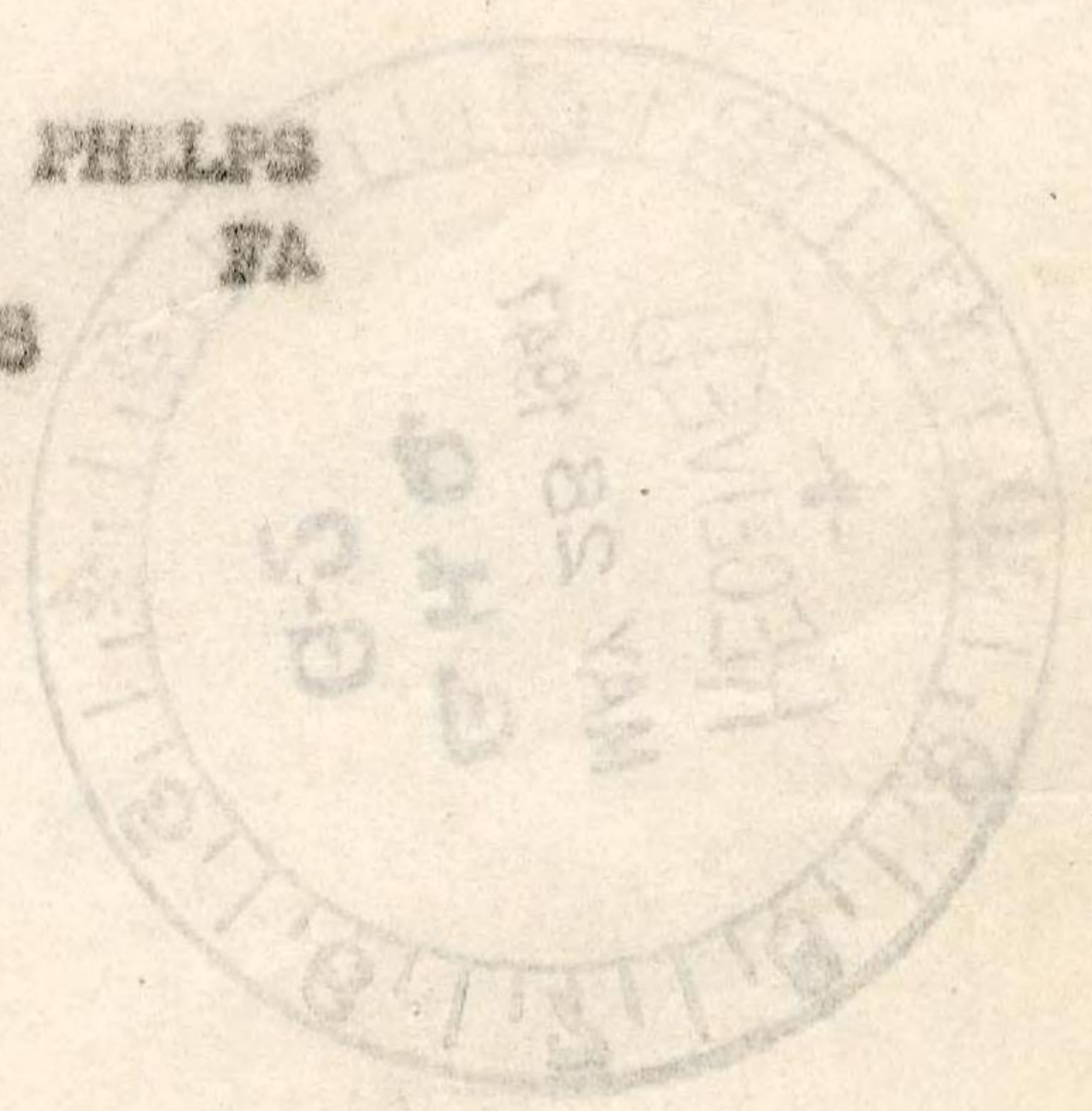

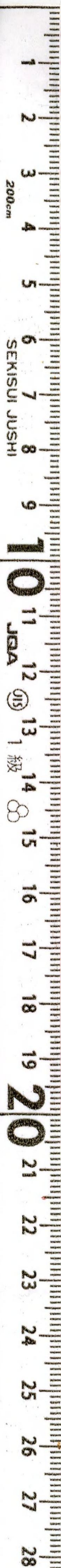

Information in Detail

1. Presumed place of origin of fire:

The Freight Department of the Osaka Branch of the Kawanishi Warehousing Company, 7 1-chome, Minami-kaigan-dori, Minato-ku, Osaka.

2. Warehouse destroyed:

The classes and quantities of the "arms" were not given by the Army at the time of entry.

5. Cause of fire: Uncertain, the investigation of the police station concerned having proved fruitless.

6. General description of fire-fighting: The fire-fighting force was composed of two pump-automobiles attended to by 87 fire-extinguishers in the Government service. The force was co-operated by five pump-boats in harbour and five hand-drawn gasoline pumps of the vigilance corps. There were also one pump-automobile and one hand-drawn gasoline pump sent out by the Army for assistance. The pump force represented about one-tenth of the pumps operated in ordinary times by the Government fire service in

Osaka. The spreading of flames was completely checked one and a half hours after the start of the fire. This time has been stated above as that of fire extinction. The final complete extinction of fire was effected on Aug. 9, at 9 a.m. All the pumps at work were withdrawn from the scene of fire between the hours of 10 and 11 a.m. the same day.

The weather of the day of the fire was fine, westerly wind (one meter in speed), with temperature of 26 deg. and humidity of 87 %.

7. Prisoners of War: Fire-fighting operations on the scene were entirely under the direction of the chief of the Port Fire Station, and no prisoners of war were employed in the work. Clearing of the fire debris is outside the jurisdiction of the station, and record is lacking concerning the matter. The fire officials did not observe or heard of any employment of war prisoners made in the fighting of the fire. The Osaka Harbour Police had nothing to do with war prisoners, as they are outside its jurisdiction. No member of the Police heard of war prisoners being used in the clearing of the fire-devastated area.

8. The war prisoners camp is about 300 meters distant from the scene of the fire, the location being 4-chome, Shijo-dori, Minato-ku, Osaka.

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, First Lieutenant James W. Burt, O-1320425, Infantry, Army of the United States, is recommended for the award of the Soldier's Medal for heroism at Tokyo, Japan, on 3 January 1947.

2. On the morning of 3 January 1947, at about 1105 hours, a Japanese national, Fumio Matsumoto, employed as a vehicle washer at the 441st Counter Intelligence Corps Detachment motor pool, was driving a $\frac{1}{2}$ ton 4 x 4 winterized vehicle onto the wash rack within the motor pool. The motor pool is adjacent to the inner moat of the Tokyo Palace grounds, and the wash rack is so located within the motor pool that it is about 2 feet from the moat. As Fumio Matsumoto drove the vehicle onto the wash rack, his foot slipped from the brake, thereby accelerating the vehicle forward, crashing off the wash rack toward the moat. The vehicle crashed through the 12 foot picket fence which is between the moat and the motor pool and fell into the moat. The vehicle landed upside down, pinning Matsumoto within the jeep, which was completely submerged in approximately 6 feet of water. First Lieutenant James W. Burt, Motor Officer of the 441st Counter Intelligence Corps Detachment, was at the scene and witnessed this mishap. Realizing the situation, Lieutenant Burt, without regard for his own personal safety, immediately plunged into the chilled waters of the moat and swam toward the vehicle. After several attempts he was able to extricate Matsumoto unassisted after opening the doors of the vehicle. Lieutenant Burt then brought the injured man to safety. Matsumoto suffered minor cuts, shock and immersion. Lieutenant Burt suffered from exposure; further, he endangered himself to possible infection due to the contaminated condition of the waters of the moat. Lieutenant Burt, as a result of his prompt action, coolness, and courage in the face of great danger undoubtedly saved the injured man from additional injury and possible death. This act of bravery, which saved a Japanese national from certain drowning, reflects great credit on Lieutenant Burt as well as the armed forces of the United States.

AFFIDAVIT

On 3 January 1947, Matsumoto, Fumio, while driving a jeep onto the vehicle wash stand, crashed through the wall separating the moat from the motor pool and fell into the moat. The jeep overturned and he was pinned underneath. Lieutenant James Burt jumped in and dragged Matsumoto from under the jeep. I, MIZUI, Tanotsu, was on the wash stand working while this event was taking place.

Roberts, 37751882, Army of the United States, for outstanding performance of duty in connection with Civil Censorship operations in this theater from September 1945, to 30 July 1946.

2. As Assistant Chief of Special Activities Division, Sergeant Roberts, organized the duties of his subordinates and directed them with such ability that he was in a large measure responsible for the intercepts of a formidable number of concealed messages, and by his zeal and enthusiasm helped set the extremely high standards of efficiency encountered in this section. Directly in charge of ten (10) Foreign Nationals, he took full responsible authority of training the examiners in the analysis of concealed messages, procuring and mixing of chemicals from formulae issued by Headquarters, Special Activities Division, the special handling of communications and the development of minor secret inks. Sergeant Roberts volunteered and undertook on his own initiative the construction of an ultra-violet lamp which was critically needed. This work was done on his own time and through his untiring efforts was ready for use several weeks before one could have been obtained through supply channels. He devoted long hours of study in his free time to Japanese in order to gain a more complete and first hand grasp of concealed message analysis. Directly due to this extra curricular study, he was able to study and provide the station with invaluable crypt-analysis work on codes and ciphers. 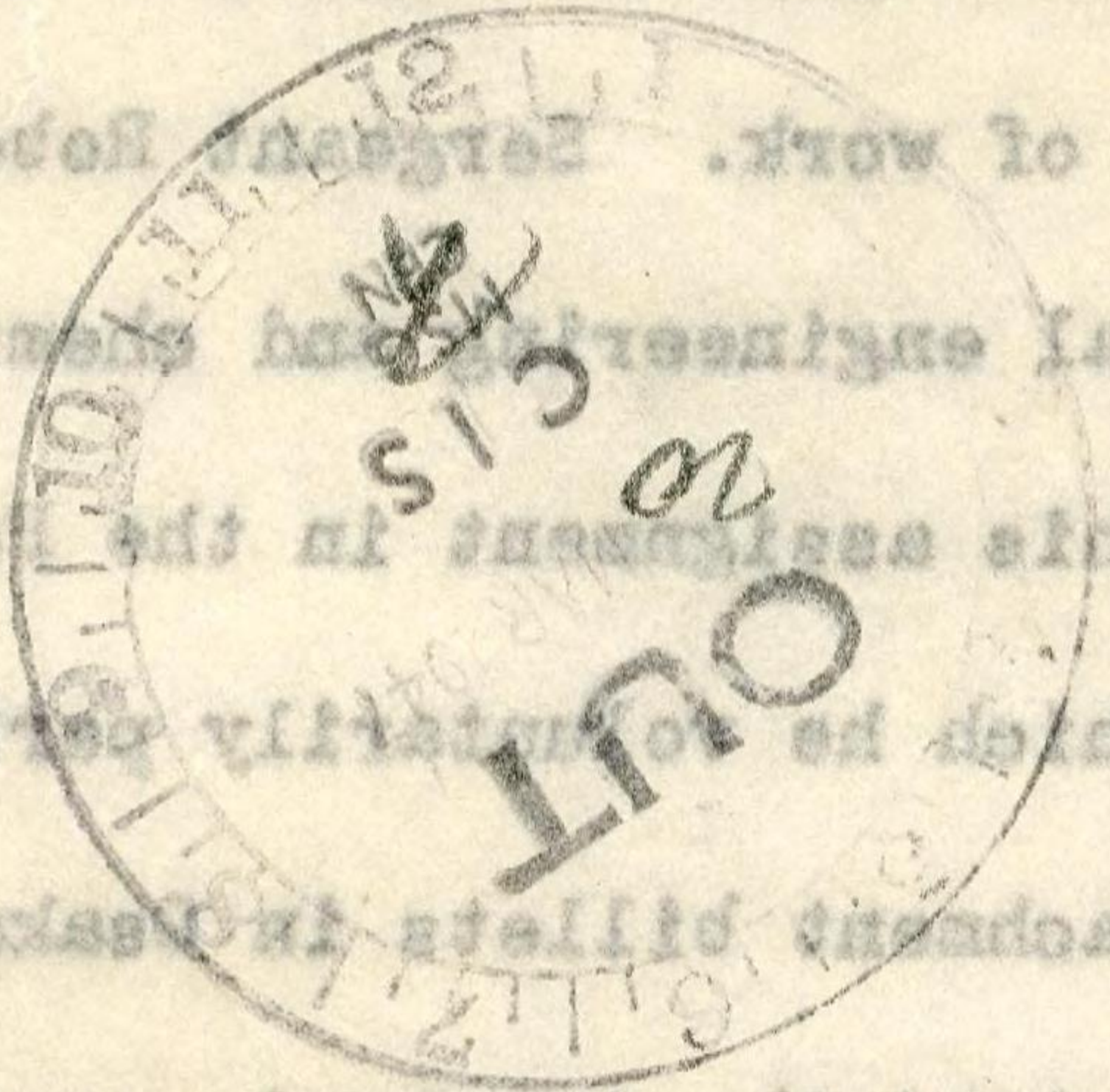

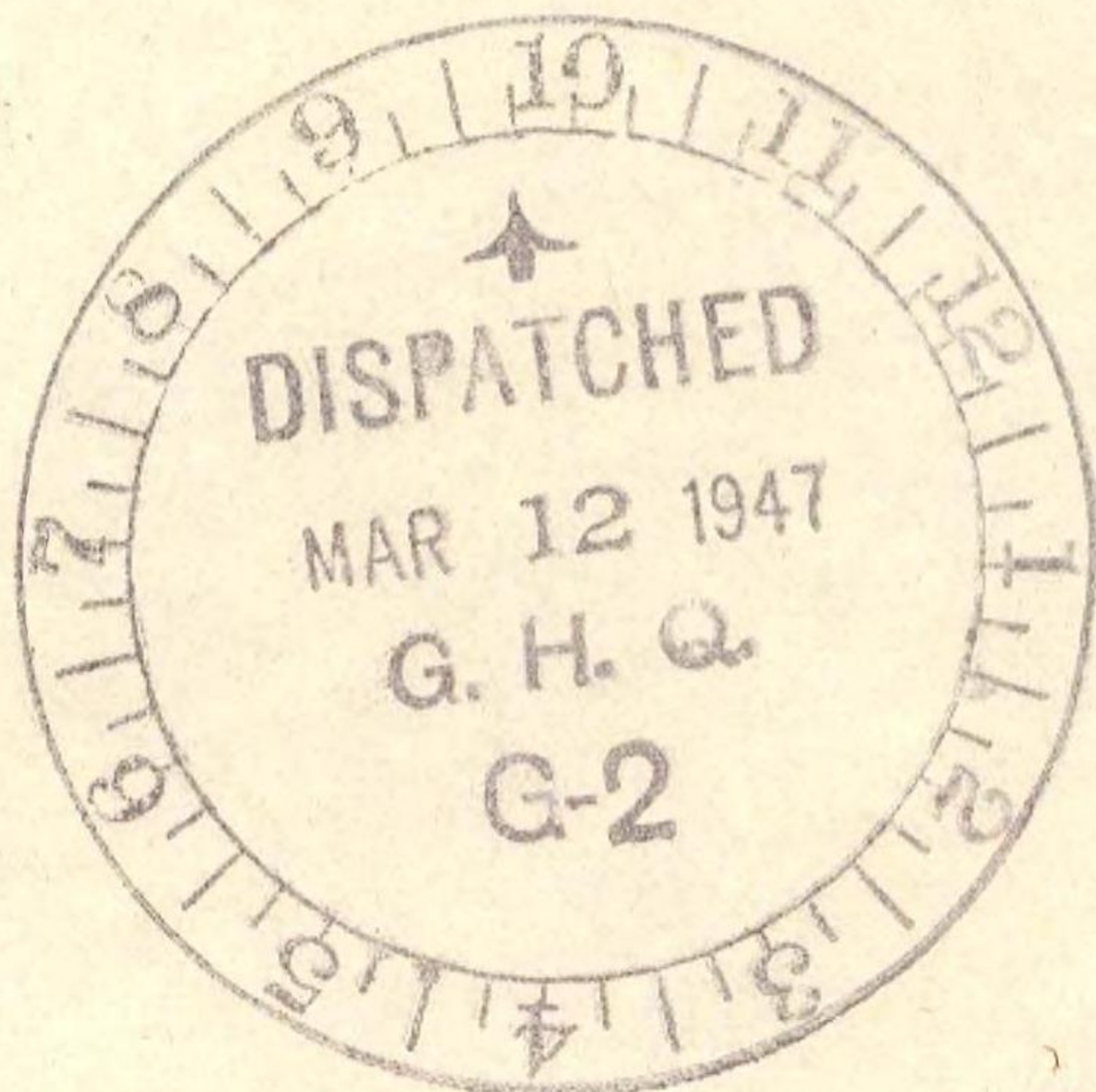

1. Under the provisions of AR 600-45, as amended, First Lieutenant James W. Burt, O-1320425, Infantry, Army of the United States, is recommended for the award of the Soldier's Medal for heroism at Tokyo, Japan, on 3 January 1947.

2. On the morning of 3 January 1947, at about 1105 hours, a Japanese national, Fumio Matsumoto, employed as a vehicle washer at the 441st Counter Intelligence Corps Detachment motor pool, was driving a $\frac{1}{2}$ ton 4 x 4 winterized vehicle onto the wash rack within the motor pool. The motor pool is adjacent to the inner moat of the Tokyo Palace grounds, and the wash rack is so located within the motor pool that it is about 2 feet from the moat. As Fumio Matsumoto drove the vehicle onto the wash rack, his foot slipped from the brake, thereby accelerating the vehicle forward, crashing off the wash rack toward the moat. The vehicle crashed through the 12 foot picket fence which is between the moat and the motor pool and fell into the moat. The vehicle landed upside down, pinning Matsumoto within the jeep, which was completely submerged in approximately 6 feet of water. First Lieutenant James W. Burt, Motor Officer of the 441st Counter Intelligence Corps Detachment, was at the scene and witnessed this mishap. Realizing the situation, Lieutenant Burt, without regard for his own personal safety, immediately plunged into the chilled waters of the moat and swam toward the vehicle. After several attempts he was able to extricate Matsumoto unassisted after opening the doors of the vehicle. Lieutenant Burt then brought the injured man to safety. Matsumoto suffered minor cuts, shock and immersion. Lieutenant Burt suffered from exposure; further, he endangered himself to possible infection due to the contaminated condition of the waters of the moat. Lieutenant Burt, as a result of his prompt action, coolness, and courage in the face of great danger undoubtedly saved the injured man from additional injury and possible death. This act of bravery, which saved a Japanese national from certain drowning, reflects great credit on Lieutenant Burt as well as the armed forces of the United States.

AFFIDAVIT

On 3 January 1947, Matsumoto, Fumio, while driving a jeep onto the vehicle wash stand, crashed through the wall separating the moat from the motor pool and fell into the moat. The jeep overturned and he was pinned underneath. Lieutenant James Burt jumped in and dragged Matsumoto from under the jeep. I, MIZUI, Tamotsu, was on the wash stand working while this event was taking place.

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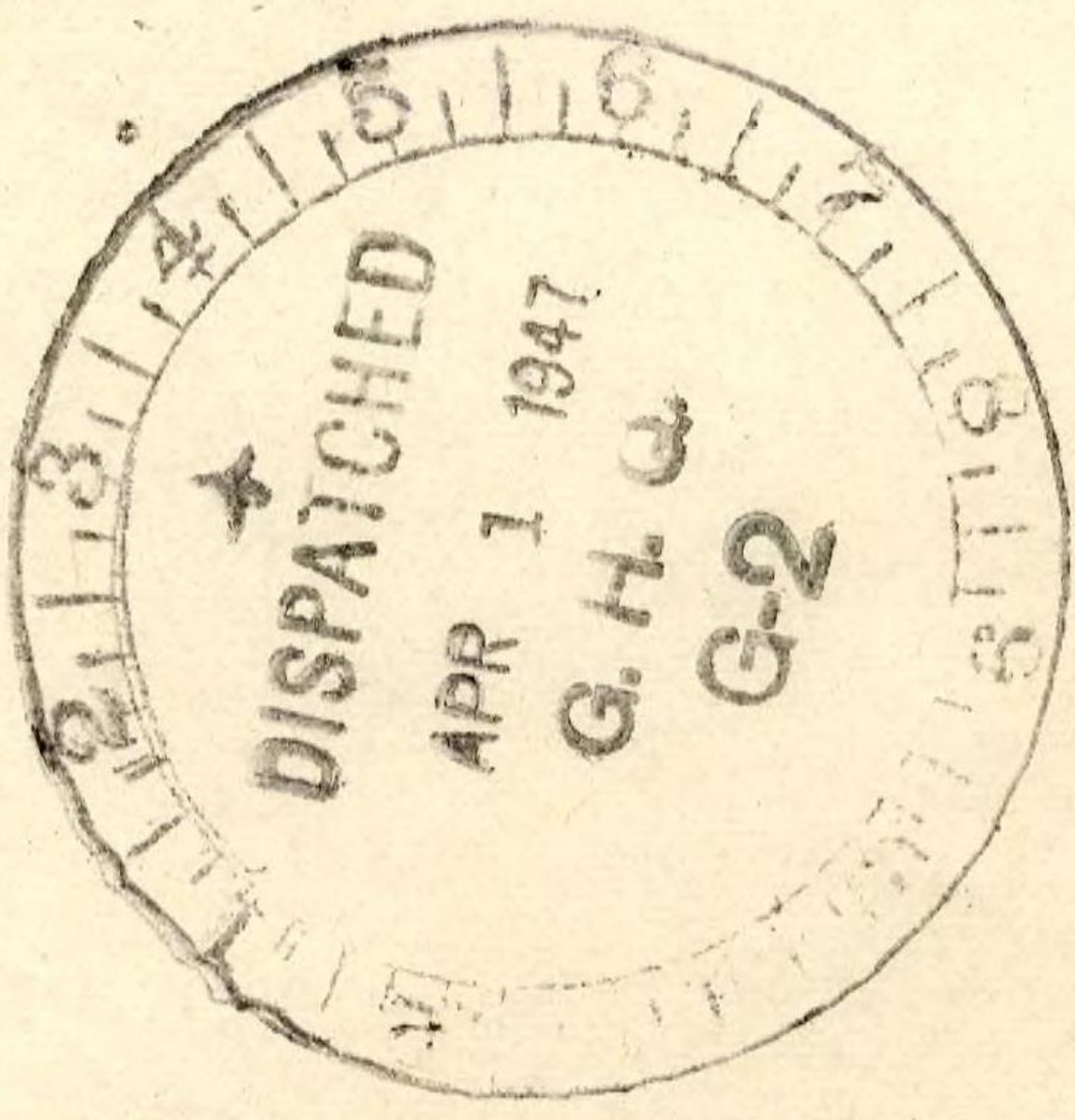

1. Under the provisions of AFPAC Regulation 10-50, dated 25 September 1945, as amended, it is recommended that the Bronze Star Medal be awarded Captain Marjorie S. Sturges, L-203864; Women's Army Corps, Army of the United States, for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the Southwest Pacific Area and subsequently in the Pacific Theater from 14 December 1944, until 2 March 1946.

2. Captain Sturges arrived in the Southwest Pacific Theater on 10 May 1944, at Sydney, Australia, and was assigned to Civil Censorship Detachment, Headquarters, United States Army Forces in the Far East, at Port Moresby, New Guinea, on 14 December 1944. Captain Sturges was ordered to join the advance elements of Headquarters United States Army Forces, in the Far East, at Tacloban, Leyte. Reporting for duty at Tacloban on 25 December 1944, she was assigned as Assistant Chief, Information and Records Section, Civil Censorship Detachment. Although faced with constant hazards from enemy aerial attacks and difficult tropical combat conditions, this officer established a Master Watch List, an implement of high intelligence value in the occupation of a liberated or an enemy controlled country, and made valuable contributions to the intelligence mission in the liberation of the Philippine Islands. When it became necessary to move the material of the Information and Records Division to Manila, Captain Sturges organized and planned the movement, arriving in Manila, on 7 March 1945. Upon receipt of the National Watch List material from the United States on 5 June 1945, this officer was assigned as Chief, Watch List Section in addition to her other duties, and organized and established the National Watch List with the Philippine Watch List on a working basis. Captain Sturges displayed extensive initiative and worked in untiring manner toward the establishment of intelligence plans that were being promulgated for the occupation of Japan and the liberation of Korea. Being one of the few officers experienced with theater policy in Civil Censorship based upon her long duty commencing in New Guinea, this officer proved of invaluable assistance in solving intelligence problems and contributed to the success of future plans. Captain Sturges arrived

In New Guinea, Leyte, and Manila, Phillipine Island, and finally in Japan, through adverse tropical conditions and period of actual combat and bombardment by the enemy, this officer displayed courage, initiative, organizational ability, and devotion to duty in distinguishing herself by meritorious service in connection with Military Operations against the enemy, and in addition, made notable contributions to the success of the occupation of Japan.

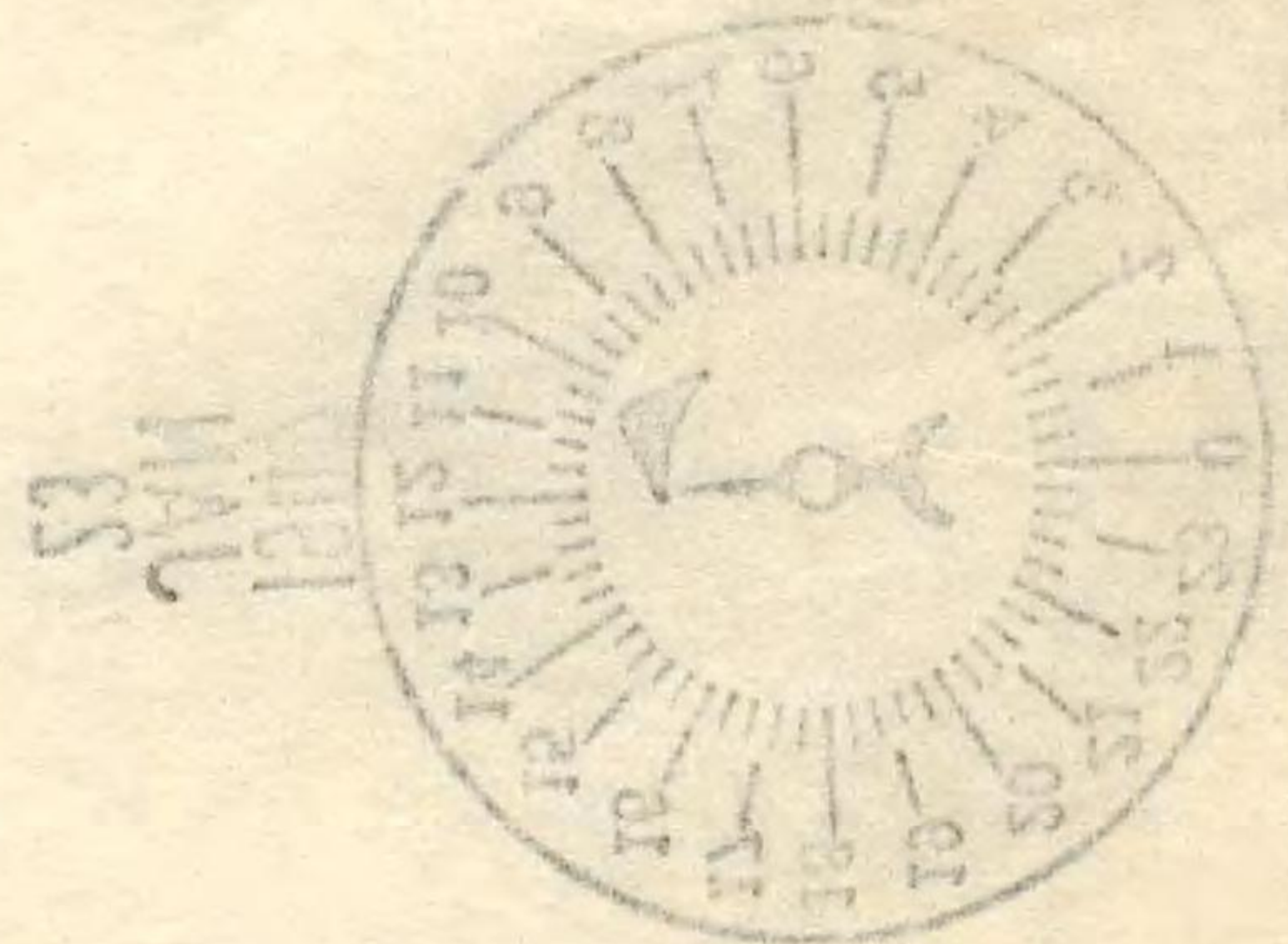

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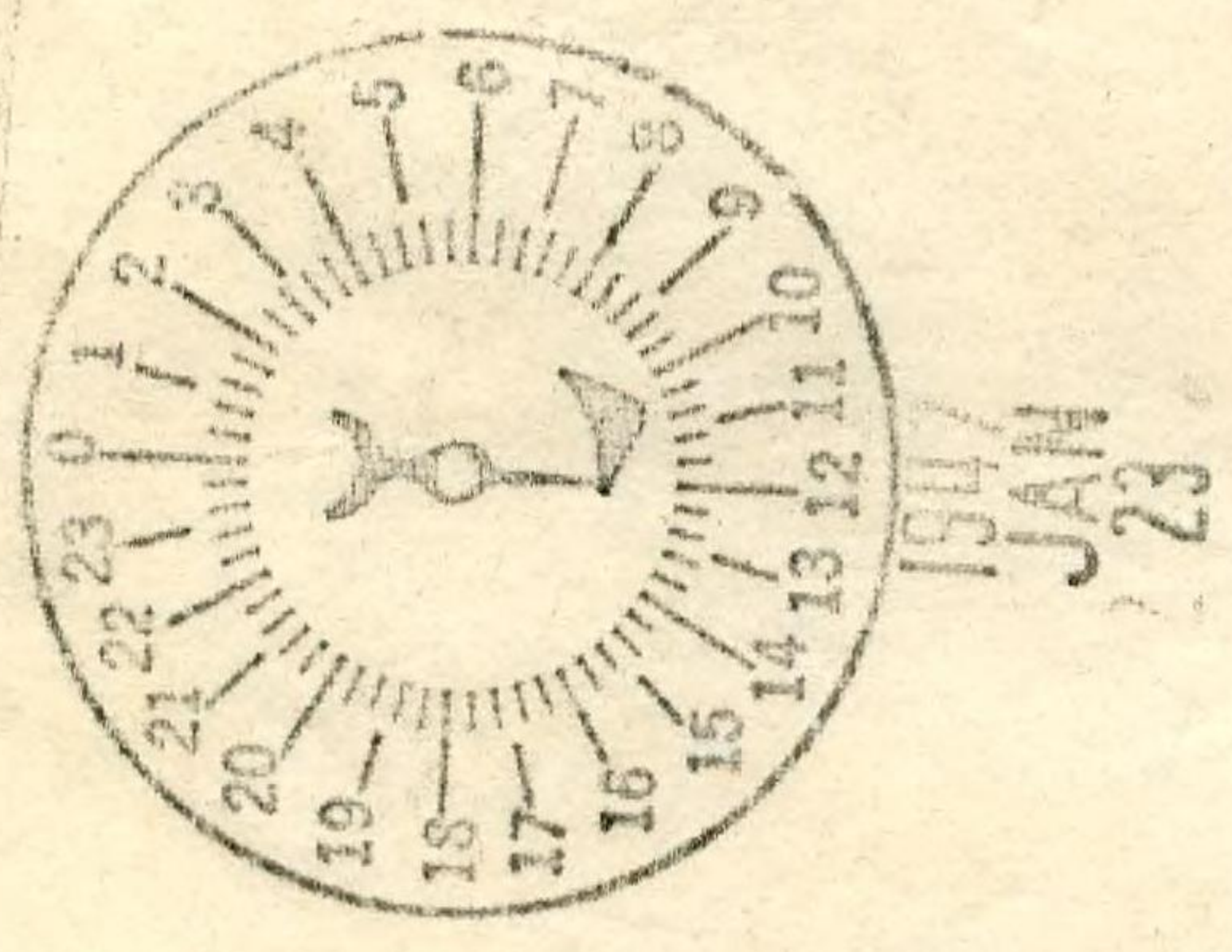

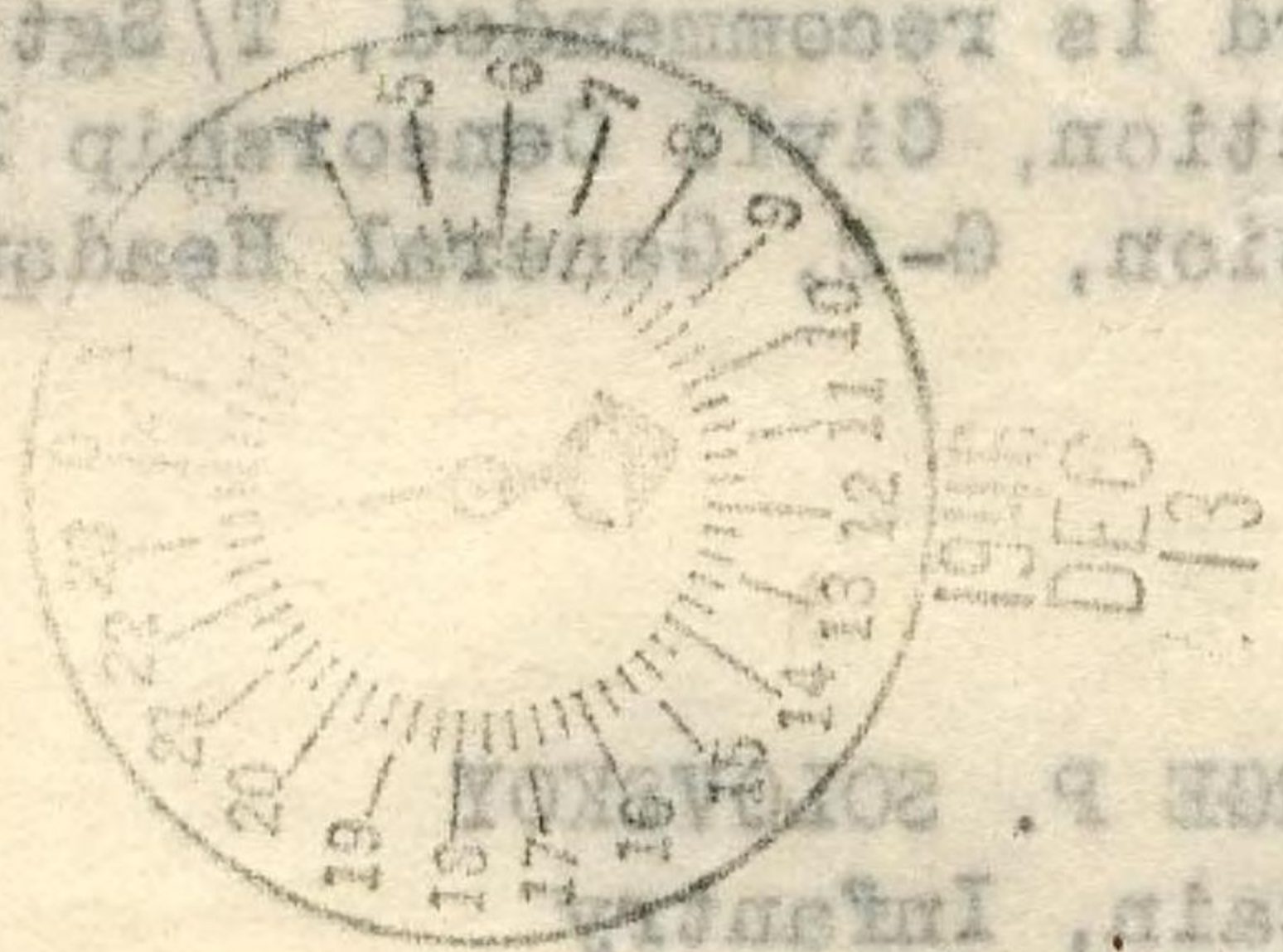
