## TROPHIES FOR BEST KEPT YARDS ARE READY

On Exhibition at Howard's and Fiedler's, and Will be Surrendered When Called For

The trophies are now ready to be delivered and winners will only need to bring this copy of Our Town to Messrs. Fiedler or Howard, show the custodians the record of winning, and claim the trophy with name inscribed. As all of the winners are pretty well known this arrangement no doubt will be satisfactory.

The trophies are awarded to the best kept and most attractive premises as seen from the street; 50 points allowed for neatness and 50 points for artistic effect.

The "Grand Prize" is to be won three times before becoming the property of the winner; competition for this trophy is open to yards of any size frontage. Won in 1916 by Mr. Albert Golze.

The winner of the "Grand Prize" is not entitled to the first prize trophy in his class, this going to the second in line in that class. In 1916 this honor was awarded to Mrs. A. C. Shand, in Class C.

First prize trophy, Class A—Yards with a frontage of 20 feet to 60 feet awarded to Mrs. Robert Snyder, 313 Woodside avenue.

First prize trophy, Class B—Yards with a frontage of 20 feet to 60 feet awarded to Mrs. Edwin P. Dold, 4 Chestnut avenue.

First prize trophy, Class C—Yards with a frontage of 100 feet or more awarded to Mrs. A. C. Shand, Douglass Gardens, Narberth and Price avenues.

## SUNDAY NIGHT AT THE BIG TABERNACLE

Few, if any, of those who had the privilege of attending the Sunday night service in the big wooden tabernacle on Narberth avenue, will soon forget it. From the time that the ushers gathered, with bowed heads for their usual prayer, preceding the meeting, the very atmosphere of the place seemed different from that of any previous night. The chorus choir, about seventy-five in number, made up for the most part of the young folks of our town, gave us some very enjoyable music, under the leadership of Professor Arnold, followed by two solos, one by Mrs. Colesworthy and the other by Miss Helen Wilson. Mr. Addison Raws, of Kiswick, N. J., with his cornet, augmented the usual orchestra, and in addition to a solo, accompanied Professor Arnold as he sang the thrilling, soul-gripping words of George Matheson's hymn, "Oh Love That Will Not Let Me Go." Madame Barakat, a Syrian woman with a wonderful message, made the opening prayer, and also gave a brief talk before the sermon by Dr. Deffer. When the latter announced as his text, "Choose ye this day whom ye will serve," a silence which could be felt settled over one of the largest crowds ever gathered together in Narberth. Eagerly they drank in the words, and as their deep significance, their personal and direct appeal was enlarged upon by the preacher, here and there in the audience a face that had worn a slightly cynical or a slightly bored expression lost that look for one of grave, alert attention. At the close of the sermon it seemed to many in that great room that the very Spirit of God was tenderly brooding over all, silently appealing with the "still, small voice" to the hearts of many.

When, after the closing prayer, in a sane, clean, forceful way an invitation was given to those who desired to publicly confess Christ, to come forward, one after the other, boys and girls, young men and women, and those of maturer years pressed forward until the first four benches were filled by the fifty-eight persons who had responded.

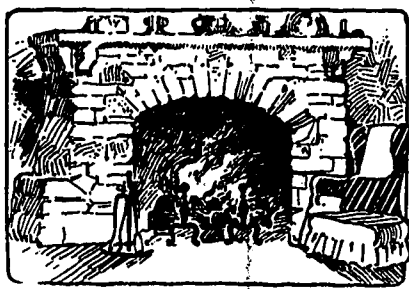

## ANNUAL CONVENTION OF SUFFRAGETTS

The annual convention of the Montgomery County Committee of the Woman's Suffrage Party of Pennsylvania will be held Wednesday, February 14, in the Evangelical Church, Swede and Marshall streets, Norristown. The morning session, from 10 to 12 o'clock, will be devoted to business and the election of officers for the ensuing year. Mrs. Katherine Houghton Hepburn, head of the Vice Commission at Hartford, Conn., will be the speaker at the afternoon session from 2 to 4 o'clock.

Mrs. Hepburn is a graduate of Bryn Mawr College and holds the titles of B. A. and M. A. of that institution. She has traveled extensively, both in this country and abroad, and during her stay in Germany while her husband, Dr. Hepburn, was studying surgery, she devoted her time to the study and investigation of social conditions. Her close observations of the German method of Government regulation of prostitution resulted in her conviction that for the good of the race the woman's point of view must become a power in the government. Upon Mrs. Hepburn's return to the United States, she and her sister, Mrs. Hooker, who is president of the Maryland Woman's Suffrage League, started the movement against the Page law in New York City, a law which many believed to be the entering wedge for the official regulation of social vice in that city. The decision that this law was unconstitutional, a decision gained through the efforts of two women lawyers, is, in Mrs. Hepburn's opinion, the strongest practical justification for women adopting the law as a profession. Since making her home in Hartford, she has led the work against the white slave traffic and succeeded in accomplishing a change of Hartford's policy of tolerating commercialized vice. She has been president of the Connecticut Woman's Suffrage Association since 1913, and that organization under her leadership has developed from one of the smaller State associations into one of the most vigorous associations in the country. Mrs. Hepburn has four children. She says that in Hartford it is the suffragists and not the antis who have the big families.

## WHY NOT IN NARBERTH?

The following article recently appeared in the Conshohocken Record:

"Conshohocking enforces its ordinance against the indiscriminate distribution of circulars and other advertising matter. Many outsiders have long known that advertising matter cannot be thrown into yards and on steps of houses finally to find their way into the highways. There are some persons who do not know of the law and that it is rigidly enforced. Wednesday, a Manayunk business house sent a man here and he distributed many advertising circulars and in a manner that was objectionable. He was promptly stopped and taken before the Burgess. Conshohocken has no complaint of the streets being cluttered with waste paper because the law is enforced."

## CUB KNOWETH THE HEART OF A FOND PARENT

### Understands Human Nature and the Ways of Youth

To the Editor of "Our Town:"

Perhaps you think that the Y. M. C. A. secretary has a cinch. I thought so once, but not now. You, fond parent, see your boy but for a comparatively short period each day. The school has him for a big part of the day, but the Y. M. C. A. is his real headquarters—his office so to speak. He may not be at his office all his spare time, but I have come to the conclusion that when you are looking for your boy you usually depend on the Y. M. C. A. to find him for you. When he is at school or at home, he knows that he is expected to behave and he is generally fair to middlin' at that, but in his leisure time he feels that he is at liberty to give full vent to the animal spirits that have been suppressed for over half a day and seems to think that the Y. M. C. A. is the place in which to let himself out. As compared with the young man at the Y. M. C. A. who has been designated by fathers and mothers to look after the kid during his play time—his wild time—parents and school teachers have a picnic. To handle that bunch of youngsters so that they keep within reasonable limits without spoiling their enjoyment, and at the same time winning their respect, is no sinecure. You'd need training in diplomacy and patience to tackle the job. Mr. Secretary is father, mother and big brother all rolled into one.

However, that is only one part of his job. The others are too numerous to mention here, but I will give you one that is typical. I happened to sit at the secretary's desk the other day for an hour, and during that time about a dozen 'phone calls came from mothers asking for their boys. In each case Mr. Schaeffer had to search the building for the boy wanted. In some cases boy was located, but in other cases he was not. In the latter event, mother invariably left instructions something like this:

"Tell Aloysius to stop in the butcher shop on the way home and buy a pound of cat meat, and at Davis' for 5c worth of gum drops, and by all means hurry home before dark, etc., etc."

And still some people wonder what a Y. M. C. A. secretary does to entitle him to a salary.

Ma and Pa, that fellow is your first assistant and do not forget it—and don't disremember the Y. M. C. A.
