Submitted in accordance with AF LTR No. 200-5, dated 20 April 1952, Sub: Unidentified Flying Objects Reporting.

At approximately 1010E hrs, 15 July 1952, an Unidentified Flying Object was observed visually from surface position 26° - 42' N; 80° - 03' W., near West Palm Beach, Florida, traveling on a N.W. to S.E. course at an undetermined altitude and speed.

Time of observation: Approximately 1-1/2 minutes.

Weather at time of sighting: 2500 feet, scattered cloud cover, 25,000' overcast, visibility 15 miles. Surface wind ESE 15 MPH, altimeter 30.06 in Hg. breaks in the overcast.

The aircraft mentioned in statements of witnesses was an SA-16, piloted by two U.S. Air Force officers of the 12th Air Rescue Squadron stationed at FDIA. They stated they were flying at 5000' altitude at approximately 1010E 15 July 1952, in a southerly direction, airspeed 160 knots, and continued to hold their heading and altitude until they approached the east side of the field between West Palm Beach and the field, where they made a slow right turn. They saw no object or anything unusual. It is 2-3/4 miles by map measure from point of observation to east edge of E-W runway at Palm Beach International Airport.

Attached report includes written statements of the four observers, and the evaluation of reliability of the witnesses by the Interviewing Officer of the 1707th AB Wing, MATS, at FDIA.

As close as I can calculate it was about 10:10 P. M., EST, when I saw this object, 2 days ago, the 15th. At the time I first sighted it, I was alone. I was standing at the water fountain and I started over to the side of the building and I was attracted by the ordinary noise of a plane. I stopped just a minute. It was a military plane of some sort, flying out about 3000 to 4000 ft. It was an amphibian (later identified as SA-16). Then I proceeded to walk south along the property and I was attracted by this object which appeared to be above and to the rear of the SA-16. What distance exactly, I don't know. It appeared to be roundish at that time; when I first sighted it it seemed to be more or less ball shaped. Then I stopped [REDACTED] struck. I saw that it was moving and as I concentrated on it, I continued to walk slowly looking at it. I don't know whether it tilted or what, but it changed its shape into a disk. It seemed to be either attracted by or descending upon the airplane. When I first saw it, it didn't seem to give an impression of great speed but I could tell it was moving and when it approached the airplane it appeared to speed up considerably. The object approached from the N. W. on a S. E. course, altitude unknown. As the object approached the airplane and hovered over it, it appeared to be more distinct. I don't know whether this was because of speed or whether it was getting closer to me. I believe the plane was 3000 or 4000 ft. in the southerly direction and it maintained the direction throughout the whole series of events. At this time I was looking in a westerly direction when the plane and the saucer were closest to each other. The object appeared to be approximately the same size of the aircraft at this time or possibly a bit smaller. However, I was unable to estimate its distance from the aircraft and so cannot give you an accurate estimate of its size due to its unknown relationship to the aircraft. As it approached the airplane it appeared to be more of a discus shape and flatten out. Its leading edge was somewhat rounded, pointed but not sharp. It slowed up over the aircraft and hovered above for a few seconds. As it hovered over the aircraft it appeared that the trailing edge was lower than the leading edge. It hovered over the aircraft for a few seconds, maintaining the same speed of the aircraft. I am unable to estimate the length of time over the aircraft. It seemed to rush over the aircraft and waivered a little bit as though it were just above stalling speed of the aircraft. At that time it was in observation of the other observers. It stayed over the aircraft for a few seconds and then appeared to tilt its leading edge upward and move off to the south, maintaining a straight course until out of sight in that position. As it gained speed it seemed that

what would be its right side was up, left side down, and maintained that relative position until it moved out of sight. As it moved it appeared to still be moving or in a tail low position. As it left the airplane its speed increased terrifically. The SA-16 airplane over which the object hovered was approximately 1/2 mile linear distance from me and about 5000 ft. in altitude. As I first saw it, it appeared to be greyish. As it hovered over the airplane, the color seemed to be yellow-orange but I was unable to determine its exact color.

I was back there working on the car and brother yelled and said, "Look up there in the sky". He had been watching it for a little while—I don't know how long. I saw a plane circling over directly above—I would say a good bit above. I saw a greyish, more or less elliptical thing, not perfectly round. I could tell it was going out of sight. I saw no trails of any kind. I watched it about 20 or 30 seconds, that is just an estimate. It was over the airplane, almost directly over it. It seemed a good distance from the airplane. I didn't see it over the airplane—I just saw it as it was going in a straight line. [REDACTED] called my attention to it. Then he called the boy over and we both stood there and watched it go out of sight and that was the end of it. I can't go into much more detail. I have good vision—I saw it. It was an object as far as I was concerned. The sky was clear. Further in a distance it was a little hazy and above that it disappeared. That is about all I saw.

I was standing under the grease rack at the service station working on my Uncle's car. My Father yelled "Come out here quick". I saw this object. It looked like a discus. It was going pretty fast and when it got up behind the airplane and a little bit above it, it slowed down to the same speed. Then it just went south and disappeared behind the clouds. It didn't leave any kind of a trail. It was going a lot faster than the airplane. As it started to pass the aircraft its right side appeared to tilt upwards a little bit and its trailing edge remained in a slightly downward position and it went out of sight in that position. When I first saw it, it was approximately due west of where I was standing. It maintained a straight path to the south until it got completely out of sight. The color of this object appeared to be a silver-white, similar to the color of stainless steel but didn't shine. I was unable to estimate its altitude or speed at any time.

I was sitting inside the garage reading the paper when someone called and told me to come out right away and I came on out. They were pointing to this airplane and I noticed a yellowish-white object on top of the airplane. I just noticed it about a second or two and the object took off above the clouds. It was on not quite a 45 degree angle when it took off. It was a roundish discus. It didn't go up, it didn't go down—it just headed straight into the clouds. I could not determine the speed but it was going faster than the airplane. From a distance I should say it wasn't too far above the airplane. I would estimate that it was 500 to 1000 ft.

1. Unidentified flying object reported by Lt. J. K. Talmage and Lt. D.B. Hobart, flying on local mission, heading 160 degrees at 20,000 feet.

3. Weather: Clear, wind (surface) calm, 20,000 feet 40 kncts at 360 degrees.
4. Visibility: Unlimited by atmospheric conditions.

8. Description of object: The object might have been silver. There was a red light on the left, and a green light on the right. Object seemed to be rolling in a clockwise direction.

10. General description of events surrounding sighting: While Lts. Talmage and Hobart were on mission heading at 160 degrees at 20,000 feet, Lt. Hobart got a momentary glimpse of red and green lights moving clockwise flying into his aircraft. Lt. Hobart was flying about 1500 yards behind Lt. Talmage and about 500 feet below him. It appeared as though the object, between the two aircraft, was going to hit Lt. Hobart, and Hobart made a sharp left turn, told Talmage to look for the object. Talmage saw it begin to climb slowly. Lt. Hobart is now sure the object was another aircraft.

Object observed through living room window in a Southwest direction. Object was about 30 degrees from a point directly overhead in the sky.</p> <p>3. Description of object: Round, about the size of a pencil eraser held at arms length, with the appearance of a round "Goodyear Blimp". It was alternately red and blue, or a bluish-green, fading from one color to another as if controlled by a rheostat. Flashes seemed to come out of the object shaped like a keyhole. The whole object moved in the sky from 10-15 degrees in the two hours of observation. It had a motion described by Mr. [REDACTED] (an Engineer) as "the bottom half of a sine wave".</p> <p>4. There was no apparent wind on the surface; no movement of trees leaves.</p> <p>5. Weather at time of observation: Clear, 15 mile visibility. Wind: North at 5 kncts from surface to 20,000 feet, where wind was West at 25 kncts.</p> <p>6. Apparent direction of object's motion: Southwest.</p> <p>7. At times, the object would move in back of trees. There were no clouds. There were no vapor trails or exhaust visible, although a "jet-like" flame, alternately Red and (blue)Green was seen.</p> <p>8. Estimated speed of object: very slow. At time, almost motionless.</p>






