## WORLD'S CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES—1910.

Four games out of five, is the record that Connie Mack's Athletics put up against the much-talked-of machine of Frank Chance's Chicago Cubs, in the 1910 World's Championship Series, which opened at Philadelphia on October 17 th, and closed at Chicago on October 23rd.

The defeat of the Chicagoans cannot be attributed to "baseball luck," even though they were not quite as fortunate as the Mackmen, but the outcome of the series was directly resultant from the clean, sharp fielding, the hard and timely hitting, and the general "inside" baseball ability of the Philadelphians. The seasoned Cubs were able to wrest only one game from the younger and far less experienced Athletics. The Athletics showed themselves to be the better batsmen, displayed better fielding judgment, manifested that they had a better pitching staff, and proved that the "young blood" can do a lot, when it comes to winning a World's Championship.

The series was an undoubted financial success, but did not reach the high mark set the year before. The National Conmission displayed its generosity, in ruling, that should a Sunday game be necessary, and the receipts exceed those of the fourth game, that the Sunday receipts should be registered for the fourth game, the last in which the players were to share in the profits. This offer was the source of much jubilation to the players, as the Sunday receipts far exceeded those of any of the other games.

The attendance fell way below the 1909 series, and at no time were the attendance or receipt records in danger of being broken.

## F.1LL MEETINGS. <br> AMERICAN LEAGUE.

The fact that Ban Johnson knows his business, was demonstrated prior to the annual meeting, which was held at New York on December 15, 1910. Before the meetir $\delta$, President-Secretary-Treasurer Johnson predicted that there would be little business transacted, and when the meeting was over, sure enough, the sporting writers were still looking for "live" Baseball "dope."

The principal topic of interest was the decaration of Robert Lee Hedges, of St. Louis, that he was through wita Baseball, owing to his physician's advice that he needed a rest. Piesident Johnson, Charles Comiskey and Frank Farrell of New York were appointed a committee to interview Hedges. He explained the situation to them, and they agreed to his views. After some dickering the matter was almost arranged, when the syndicate, who were to purchase the franch:se, failed to live up to their agreement, and once again the St. Louis patrons will be greeted by the genial smile of Robert Lee. The latter incident did not take place until long after the meeting, however.

The matter of schedule was then taken up, and it was decided to continue the 154 game policy, starting April 12th, and finishing on Octobr 6th, in order that the League Champions might have time for a "tuning-up" series, similar to that participated in by the Athletics last season.

After these matters had been satisfactorily adjusted the meeting quietly adjourned. The spirit of good fellowship might have been inducted into the magnates, at the dinner which was tendered to the National and American League representatives and the newspaper writers on the evening before the meeting, by Frank Farrell, owner of the New York American Club.

## NATIONAL LEAGUE.

The members of the National League met in New York on December 13, 1910, for a quiet and peaceable meeting. Thomas J. Lynch was reelected President of the League for a one year term.

John T. Brush of New York was unable to attend the meeting, as he was in Texas, owing to ill health. The magnates sent him a cheery letter, and his interests were handled by John Whalen and W. A. Gray.

The schedule matter was up for discussion, and the final decision was for a 154 game schedule, beginning April 12th, and ending October 12th. The arrangement of the schedule was turned over to a committee, comprising President Lynch, John A. Heydler, and Barney Dreyfuss.

It was recommended at the meeting that the umpires be obliged to undergo an examination by an oculist at the beginning of each season. There was much comment made on the umpire question, and the work of President Lynch was highly endorsed by all the members. Mr. Lynch was empowered to secure the most competent men available for the indicator work, and his first appointment was that of Finneran, formerly of the Eastern League staff.

Several cases came before the Board of Directors, prominent among which were those of Ferguson, Boston; Maddox, Pittsburg; and Camnitz, Pittsburg. The cases of Ferguson and Maddox were acted upon favorably toward the players, and action on Camnitz case was deferred until the Spring Meeting.

The financial report showed that all clubs were in good condition, as a general thing. Some were said to be exceedingly prosperous, and all did better than cover expenses.

After formally awarding the championship to Chicago, the meeting adjourned.

## NATIONAL ASSOCIATION.

On November 14th, the National Board of Arbitration held a lengthy meeting at Chicago to clear up matters for the meeting of the National Association, which was scheduled for the following day. The reclassification of some of the leagues was the most important subject for consideration, but after the matter had been looked over carefully, it was decided that steps for the reduction of the class of any league would hurt the game, and all those leagues in doubt were cheered by the news that they would retain their former rating.
W. H. Lucas, the "father" of the Northwestern League was granted territorial rights for a new Union League in Utah, Montana and Idaho.

Several minor claims by and against players were settled, and all was ready for the Association meeting, which opened November 15 th.

Secretary Farrell had an extensive report ready, the chief points of which follow:

The Association comprises fifty Leagues embracing 336 cities in the United States and Canada.

Ten thousand one hundred and forty-five contracts were put through the office, as well as 2,155 releases, 850 suspensions and 262 reinstatements.

The National League contributed $\$ 46,700$ for players, and the American League $\$ 37,800$. These amounts, together with the $\$ 58,700$ from the National Association made a total of $\$ 143,200$.
M. H. Sexton and John H. Farrell were re-elected president and secretary, respectively. San Antonio, Texas, was decided upon as the headquarters for the next meeting.

On November 16th, the principal business of the meeting was the matter of constitutional amendments. The following were the recommendations: "Money going through the secretary's hands to the credit of defaulting, players, clubs or leagues, can be seized by him to satisfy the defaults." "Contract jumpers can be reinstated under certain conditions."

The period at which protection must be secured and from which all obligations must date, was changed from October 15 th to September 1 st.

## SPRING MEETINGS.

## AMERICAN LEAGUE.

On February 14th, the representatives of the American League Clubs met at the Congress Hotel, Chicago, for the annual spring meeting. The clubs were represented as follows: New. York, President Farrell, Manager Chase, and Scout Irwin; Priladelphia, President Shibe, Manager Mack, and Secretary Hough. Washington, President Noyes, and Manager McAleer; St. Lotis, P-esident Hedges, and Manager Wallace; Detroit, President Navin; C!'=veland, President Somers, and Vice President Barnard; Chicago, Eresident Comiskey.

The first important piece of business transacted was the adoption of the schedule drawn "ip by President-Secretary-Treasurer B. B. Johnson, and after this had been done in rapid fire order, the regular routine business of the meeting was carried on.

A noteworthy feature of the meeting was the fact that there was not a single trade made, although negotiations were started for several exchanges.

Some more talk of the St. Louis club's proposed sale was in evidence, when Jack Gleason of San Francisco attempted to make a deal with President Hedges for the purchase of the franchise. Mr. Hedges, however, declared that the franchise was not for sale, despite all the rumors that had been circulated.

At the close of the meeting the club owners and officers were the guests of President Shibe, and Manager Mack of the Athletics, at a banquet which was given in celebration of the Athletics' victory over Chicago in the World's Series.

## NATIONAL LEAGUE.

The Board of Directors of the Nat:onal League met at the Hotel Breslin, New York, on February 14th, to pass on several cases which were pending from the fall meeting in December. The most important of these cases was that of Howard Camnitz, of the Pittsburg club, who claimed $\$ 1,200$ due from a 1910 contract. After both sides of the question had been considered, it was decided that the claim of the player was unjust and that the club should be released from any obligations to him.

The disposition of this case left the way clear for the regular meeting of the League. Every club, except St. Louis, was represented, and Garry Hermann 'had Stanley Robison's proxy. The umpire question was taken into consideration, and President Lynch advised the magnates as to his desires relative to appointing, and releasing umpires. His opinion of the matter was favorably taken, and his appointments were confirmed. The following men are on the staff for 1911: Hank O’Day, W. J. Klem, J. E. Johnstone, Charles Rigler, William Brennan, M. W. Eason, William Finneran, and Jack Doyle, the latter men being the new appointees. Bob Emslie was appointed a substitute indicator man.

Section 8 of the League Rules was changed to read as follows: "When the President has awarded a player under the provisions of this section, the club to which the player is awarded cannot remove its claim."

Section 9, which was also changed, has the following wording: "The penalty of any violation of the waiver rule is to be fixed by the Board of Directors, but in no case is the penalty to be more than \$250.00."

The Rules Committee made recommendations that several of the rules be revised, especially those referring to an unfairly delivered ball, and the balk rule.

After Horace Fogel had obtained permission for the Phillies to change the style of their home uniform, the meeting adjourned till Wednesday, when the magnates re-convened, and formally adopted the playing schedule for 1911.

The important topic of the Official Ball was then taken into consideration. Several firms were in the market with all kinds of liberal offers for the adoption of their products, but after considerable discussion, the League decided to continue with the same ball as in past years.

## Official Playing Rules Professional Baseball Clubs

As adopted at the meeting of the Joint Playing Rules Committee of the
National League and the American League, held at National League Headquarters, New York City, March 2, 1904. Amended February 14, 1906; February 25, 1907; February 27, 1908; February 17, 1909, and January 24, 1910.

These Rules have also been adopted by The National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues.

## The Ball Ground.

RULE 1. The ball ground must be enclosed. To obviate the necessity for ground rules, the shortest distance from a fence or stand on fair territory to the home base should be 235 feet and from wome base to the grand stand 90 feet.

## To Lay Off the Field.

RULE 2. To lay off the lines defining the location of the several bases, the catcher's and the pitcher's position and to establish the boundaries required in playing the game of baseball, proceed as fol-

## Diamond or Infield.

From a point A, within the grounds, project a straight line out into the field, and at a point, B, 154 feet from point A, lay off lines B C and $B$ at right angles to the line $A \quad B$; then, with $B$ as a center and 63.63945 feet as a radius, describe arcs cutting the lines $B A$ at $F$ and $B C$ at $G, B D$ at $H$ and $B E$ at I. Draw lines $F G, G E, E H$, and $H F$, which said lines shall be the containing lines of the Diamond or Infield.

## The Catcher's Lines.

RULE 3. With $F$ as a center and 10 feet radius, describe an arc cutting line $F A$ at $L$, and draw lines $L, M$ and $L, O$ at right angles to F A, and continue same out from FA not less than 10 feet.

## The Foul Lines.

RULE 4. From the intersecting point, $F$, continue the straight lines $F G$ and $F H$ until they intersect the lines $L, M$ and $L, O$, and then from the points $G$ and $H$ in the opposite direction until they reach the boundary lines of the ground, and said lines shall be clearly visible from any part of the diamond, and no wood or other hard substance shall be used in the construction of said lines.

## The Players' Lines.

RULE 5. With $F$ as a center and 50 feet radius, describe arcs cutting lines $F O$ and $F M$ at $P$ and $Q$, then with $F$ as center again and 75 feet radius, describe arcs cutting $F G$ and $F H$ at $R$ and $S$; then, from the points $P, Q, R$ and $S$ draw lines at right angles to the lines $F O, F M, F G$ and $F H$, and continue the same until they intersect at the points $T$ and W'.

## The Coachers' Lines.

RULE 6. With $R$ and $S$ as centers and 15 feet radius, describe arcs cutting the lines $R \mathrm{~W}$ and $\mathrm{S} T$ at X and Y and from the points X and

Y draw lines parallel with the lines $F H$ and $F G$ and continue same out to the boundary lines of the ground.

## The Three-Foot Line.

RULE 7. With $F$ as a center and 45 feet radius, describe an arc cutting the line F G at 1, and from 1 to the distance of three feet draw a line at right angles to $F G$, and marked point 2 ; then from point 2 draw a line parallel with the line $F G$ to a point three feet beyond the point $G$, marked 3 ; then from the point 3 draw a line at right angles to line 2, 3, back to and intersecting with $F G$, and from thence back along the line $G F$ to point 1.

## The Batsman's Lines.

RULE 8. On either side of the line A F B describe two parallelograms six feet long and four feet wide (marked 8 and 9), their longest side being parallel with the line A F B, their distance apart being six inches, added to each end of the length of the diagonal of the square within the angle $F$, and the center of their len.ith being on said diagonal.

## The Pitcher's Plate.

RULE 9. Section 1. With point $F$ as center and 60.5 feet as radius, describe an arc cutting the line $F B$ at line 4 , and draw a line 5, 6 , passing through point 4 and extending 12 inches on either side of line F B; then with line 5,6 , as a side, describe a parallelogram 24 inches by 6 inches, in which shall be located the pitcher's plate.

Section 2. The pitcher's plate shall not be more than 15 inches higher than the base lines or the home plate, which shall be level wish the surface of the field, and the slope from the pitcher's plate to every base line and the home plate shall be gradual.

## The Bases.

RULE 10. Section 1. Within the angle $F$, describe a five-s.ded figure, two of the sides of which shall coincide with the lines F G and F H to the extent of 12 inches each, thence parallel with the line $F$ B $81-2$ inches to the points X and Y , a straight line between which, 17 inches, will form the front of the home base or plate.

Section 2. Within the angles at G, I and H describe squares, whose sides are 15 inches in lengti, two of such sides of which squares shall lie along the lines $F$ G and GI, G I and I H, I H and H F, which squares shall be the location of the first, second and third bases respectively.

RULE 11. The Home Base at $F$ and the Pitcher's Plate at 4 must each be of whitened rubber, and so fixed in the ground as to be even with its surface.

RULE 12. The First Base, at G, the Second Base at E, and the Third Base at H must each be a white canvas bag filled with soft material and securely fastened in place at the points specified in Rule 10.

RULE 13. The lines described in Rules $3,4,5,6,7$, and 8 must be marked with lime, chalk or other white material, easily dist:nguish. able from the ground or grass.

## The Ball.

RULE 14. Section 1. The ball must weigh not less than five nor more than five and one-quarter ounces avoirdupois, and measure not less than nine nor more than nine and one-quarter inches in circumference. The Reach American League Ball, or the Spalding National League Ball must be used in all games played under these rules.

Section 2. Two regulation balls of the make adopted by the league of which the contesting clubs are members, shall be delivered by the home club to the umpire at or before the hour for the commencement of a championship game. If the ball placed in play be batted or thrown out of the grounds or into one of the stands for spectators, or in the judgment of the umpire becomes unfit for play from any cause, the umpire shall at once deliver the alternate ball to the pitcher and another legal ball shall be suplied to him so that he shall at all times have in his control one or more alternate balls. Provided, however, that all balls, batted or thrown out of the ground or into a stand shall, when returned to the field, be given into the custody of the umpire immed:ately, and become alternate balls and so long as he has in his possession two or more alternate balls he shall not call for a new ball to replace one that has gone out of play. The alternate balls shall become the ball in play in the order in which they were delivered to the umpire.

Section 3. Immediately upon the delivery to him of the alternate ball by the umpire, the pitcher shall take his position and on the call of "Play" by the umpire, it shall become the ball in play. Provided, however, that play shall not be resumed with the alternate ball, when a fair batted ball or a ball thrown by a fielder, goes out of the ground, or into a stand for spectators, until the base runners have completed the circuit of the bases unless compelled to stop in compliance with a ground rule.

## Discolored or Damaged Balls.

Section 4. In the event of a ball being intentionally discolored by rubbing it with the soil or otherwise by any player, or otherwise damaged by any player, the umpire shall forthwith demand the return of that ball and substitute for it another legal ball, as hereinbefore described, and impose a fine of $\$ 5.00$ on the offending player.

## Home Club to Provide Balls.

Section 5. In every game the balls played with shall be furnished by the home club, and the last in play shall become the property of the winning club. Each ball shall be enclosed in a paper box, which must be sealed with the seal of the President of the League and bear his certificate that he has examined, measured and weighed the ball contained therein and that it is of the required standard in all respects. The seal shall not be broken by the umpire except in the presence of the captains of the contesting teams after "Play" has been called.

## Reserve Balls on Field.

Section 6. The home club shall have at least a dozen regulation balls on the field during each championship game, ready for use on the call of the umpire.

## The Bat.

RULE 15. The bat must be round, not over two and three-fourths inches in diameter at the thickest part, nor more than 42 inches in length and entirely of hardwood, except that for a distance of 18 inches from the end, twine may be wound around or a granulated substance applied to the handle.

## Number of Players in a Game.

RULE 16. The players of each club, actively engaged in a game at one time, shall be nine in number, one of whom shall act as captain; and in no case shall more or less than nine men be allowed to play on a side in a game.

## Positions of the Players.

RULE 17. The players of the team not at bat may be stationed at any points of the field, on fair ground, their captain may elect, regardless of their respective positions, except that the pitcher, while in the act of delivering the ball to the bat, must take his position as defined in Rules 9 and 30 ; and the catcher must be within the lines of his position as defined in Rule 3 and within 10 feet of home base whenever the pitcher delivers the ball to the bat.

## Must Not Mingle With Spectators.

RULE 18. Players in uniform shall not be permitted to occupy seats in the stands, or to mingle with the spectators.

## Uniforms of Players.

RULE 19. Every club shall adopt two un:forms for its players, one to be worn in games at home, and the other in games abroad, and the suits of each of the uniforms of a team shall conform in color and style. No player who shall attach anything to the sole or heel of his shoe other than the ordinary base ball shoe plate, or who shall appear in a uniform not conforming to the suits of the other members of his team, shall be permitted to take part in a game.

## Size and Weight of Gloves.

RULE 20. The catcher or first baseman may wear a glove or mitt of any size, shape or weight. Every other player is restricted to the use of a glove or mitt weighing not over 10 ounces and measuring not over 14 inches around the palm.

## Players' Benches.

RULE 21. Section 1. Players' benches must be furnished by the home club and placed upon a portion of the ground not less than twenty-five (25) feet outside of the players' lines. One such bench shall be for the exclusive use of the visiting team and the other for the exclusive use of the home team. Each bench must be covered with a roof and closed at the back and each end; a space, however, not more than six (6) inches wide may be left under the roof for ventilation. All players and substitutes of the side at bat must te seated on their team's bench except the batsman, base-runners, and such as are legally assigned to coach base-runners. Under no circumstances shall the umpire permit any person except the players and substitutes in uniform and the manager of the team entitled to its exclusive use to be seated on the bench.

## Penalty for Violation.

Section 2. Whenever the umpire observes a violation of the preceding section, he shall immediately order such player or players as have disregarded it to be seated. If the order be not obeyed within one minute the offending player or players shall be fined $\$ 5.00$ each by the umpire. If the order be not then obeyed within one minute, the offending player or players shall be debarred from further participation in the game, and shall be obliged to forthwith leave the playing field.

## A Regulation Game.

RULE 22. Every championship game must be commenced not later than two hours before sunset and shall continue until each team has had nine innings, provided, however, that the game shall terminate:

Section 1. If the side first at bat scores less runs in nine innings than the other side has scored in eight innings.

Section 2. If the side last at bat in the ninth inning scores the winning run before the third man is out.

Section 3. If the game be called by the umpire on account of darkness, rain, fire, panic, or for other cause which puts patrons or players in peril.

## Extra-Inning Games.

RULE 23. If the score be a tie at the end of nine (9) innings for each team, play shall be continued until one side has scored more runs than the other in an equal number of innings, provided, that if the side last at bat score the winning run before the third man is out in any inning after the ninth, the game shall terminate.

## Drawn Games.

RULE 24. A drawn game shall be declared by the umpire if the score is equal on the last even inning played when he terminates play in accordance with Rule 22, Section 3, after five or more equal innings have been played by each team. But if the side that went second to bat is at the bat when the game is terminated, and has scored the same number of runs as the other side, the umpire shall declare the game drawn without regard to the score of the last equal inning.

RULE 25. If the umpire calls a game in accordance with Rule 22, Section 3, at any time after five innings have been completed, the score shall be that of the last equal innings played, except that if the side second at the bat shall have scored in an unequal number of innings, or before the completion of the unfinished inning, at least one run more than the side first at bat, the score of the game shall be the total number of runs each team has made.

## Forfeited Games.

RULE 26. A forfeited game shall be declared by the umpire in favor of the club not in fault, in the following cases:

Section 1. If the team of a club fail to appear upon the field, or being upon the field, refuse to begin a game for which it is scheduled or assigned, within five minutes after the umpire has called "Play" at the hour for the beginning of the game, unless such delay in appearing or in commencing the game be unavoidable.

Section 2. If, after the game has begun, one side refuse to continue to play, unless the game has been suspended or terminated by the umpire.

Section 3. If, after play has been suspended by the umpire one side fails to resume playing in one minute after the umpire has called "Play."

Section 4. If a team employ tactics palpably designed to delay the game.

Section 5. If, after warning by the umpire, any one of the rules of the game be wilfully and persistently violated.

Section 6. If the order for the removal of a player, as authorized by Rules 21,58 and 64 , be not obeyed within one minute.

Section 7. If, because of the removal of players from the game by the umpire, or for any cause, there be less than nine players on either team.

Section 8. If, after the game has been suspended on account of rain, the orders of the umpire be not complied with as required by Rule 29.

Section 9. If, when two games are scheduled to be played in one afternoon, the second game be not commenced within ten minutes of the time of the completion of the first game. The umpire of the first game shall be the timekeeper.

Section 10. In case the umpire declare the game forfeited, he shall transmit a written report thereof to the president of the League w.thin
twenty-four hours thereafter. However, a failure on the part of the umpire to so notify the president shall not affect the validity of his award of the game by forfeiture.

## No Game.

RULE 27. "No game" sliall be declared by the umpire if he terminates play in accordance with Rule 22, Section 3, before five innings are completed by each team. Prov.ded, however, that if the club second at bat shall have made more runs at the end of its fourth inning than the club first at bat has made in five completed innings of a game so terminated, the umpire shall award the game to the club having made the greater number of runs, and it shall count as a legal game in the championship record.

## Substitutes.

RULE 28. Section 1. Fach side shall be required to have present on the field during a championship game a sufficient number of substitute players in uniform, conforming to the suits worn by their team-mates, to carry out the provisions of this code which require that not less than nine players shall occupy the field in any inning of the game.

Section 2. Any such substitute may at any stage of the game take the place of a player whose name is in his team's batting order, but the player whom he succeeds shall not thereafter participate in that game.

Section 3. A base-runner shall not have another player whose name appears in the batting order of his leam run for him except by the consent of the captain of the other team.

Section 4. Whenever one player is substituted for anotiner, whether as batsman, base-runner or fielder, the captain of the side riaking the change must immediately notify the umpire, who in turn must announce the same to the spectators. A fine of $\$ 5.00$ shall be assessed by the umpire against the captain for each violation of this rule, and the President of the League shall impose a similar fine against the umpire, who, after having been notified of a change, fails to make proper announcement. Play shall be suspended while announcement is being made, and the player substituted shall become actively engaged in the zame immediately upon his captain's notice of the change to the umpire.

## Choice of Innings-Fitness of Field for Play.

RULE 29. The choice of innings shall be given to the captain of the home club, who shall be the sole judge of the fitness of the ground for beginning a game after a rain, but, after play has been called by the umpire, he alone shall be the judge as to the fitness of the ground for resuming play after the game has been suspended on account of rain, and when time is so called the ground-keeper and sufficient assistants shall be under the control of the umpire for the purpose of putting the ground in proper shape for play, under penalty of forfeiture of the game by the home team.

## THE PITCHING RULES. <br> Delivery of the Ball to the Bat.

RULE 30. Preliminary to pitching, the pitcher shall take his position, facing the batsman with both feet squarely on the ground and in front of the pitcher's plate; and in the act of delivering the ball to the bat he must keep one foot in contact with the pitcher's plate defined in Rule 9. He shall not raise either foot until in the act of delivering the ball to the bat, nor make more than one step in such delivery.

## A Fairly Delivered Ball.

RULE 31. A fairly delivered ball is a ball pitched or thrown to the bat by the pitcher while standing in his position and facing the batsman that passes over any portion of the home base, before touching the ground, not lower than the batsman's knees, nor higher than his shoulder. For every such fairly delivered ball the umpire shall call one strike.

## An Unfairly Delivered Ball.

RULE 32. An unfairly delivered ball is a ball delivered to the bat by the pitcher while standing in his position and facing the batsman that does not pass over any portion of the home base, between the batsman's shoulder and knees, or that touches the ground before passing home base, unless struck at by the batsman, or with the bases unoccupied, any ball delivered by the pitcher while either foot is not in contact with the pitcher's plate. For every unfairly delivered ball the umpire shall call one ball.

RULE 33. Section 1. If, after the batsman be standing in his proper position ready to strike at a pitched ball, the ball be thrown by the pitcher to any player other than the catcher when in the catcher's lines and within ten feet of the home base (except in an attempt to retire a base-runner), each ball so thrown shall be called a ball.

Section 2. The umpire shall call a ball on the pitcher each time he delays a game by failing to deliver the ball to the batsman for a longer period than twenty seconds, excepting that at the commencement of each inning, or when a pitcher relieves another, that pitcher may occupy one minute in delivering not to exceed five balls to the catcher or an infielder during which time play shall be suspended.

Section 3. In event of the pitcher being taken from his posit:on by either manager or captain, the player substituted for him shall continue to pitch until the batsman then at bat has either been put out or has reached first base.

## Balking.

## A balk shall be:

RULE 34. Section 1. Any motion made by the pitcher while in position to deliver the ball to the bat without delivering it, or to throw to first base when occupied by a base-runner without completing the throw.

Section 2. Throwing the ball by the pitcher to any base to catch the base-runner without stepping directly toward such base in the act of making such throw.

Section 3. Any delivery of the ball to the bat by the pitcher while either foot is back of the pitcher's plate.

Section 4. Any delivery of the ball to the bat by the pitcher while he is not facing the batsman.

Section 5. Any motion in delivering the ball to the bat by the pitcher while not in the position defined by Rule 30.

Section 6. Holding of the ball by the pitcher so long as, in the opinion of the umpire, to unnecessarily delay the game.

Section 7. Making any motion to pitch while standing in his position without having the ball in his possession.

Section 8. Making any motion of the arm, shoulder, hip or body the pitcher habitually makes in his method of delivery, without immed:ately delivering the ball to the bat.

Section 9. Delivery of the ball to the bat when the catcher is standing outside the lines of the catcher's position as defined in Rule 3.

If the pitcher shall fail to comply with the requirements of any section of this rule, the umpire shall call a " balk."

RULE 35. A dead ball is a ball delivered to the bat by the pitcher, not struck at by the batsman, that touches any part of the batsman's person or clothing while he is standing in his position.

## Ball Not in Play.

RULE 36. In case of an illegally batted ball, a balk, foul hit ball not legally caught, dead ball, interference with the fielder or batsman, or a fair hit ball striking a base-runner or umpire before touching a fielder, the ball shall not be considered in play until it be held by the pitcher standing in his position, and the umpire shall have called "Play."

## Block Balls.

RULE 37. Section 1. A block is a batted or thrown ball that is touched, stopped or handled by a person not engaged in the game.

Section 2. Whenever a block occurs the umpire shall declare it, and base-runners may run the bases without liability to be put out until the ball has been returned to and held by the pitcher in his position.

Section 3. If the persor not engaged in the game should retain possession of a blocked ball, or throw or kick it beyond the reach of the fielders, the umpire shall call "Time" and require each base-runner to stop at the base last touched by him until the ball be returned to the pitcher in his position and the umpire shall have called "Play."

## THE BATSMAN'S RULES.

## The Batsman's Position.

RULE 38. Each player of the side at bat shall become the batsman and must take his position within the batsman's lines (as defined in Rule 8), in the order that his name appears in his team's batting list

## The Order of Batting.

RULE 39. Section 1. The batting order of each team must be on the score card, and must be delivered before the game by its captain to the umpire, at the home plate, who shall submit it to the inspection of the captain of the other side. The batting order delivered to the umpire must be followed throughout the game unless a player be substituted for another, in which case the substitute must take the place in the batting order of the retired player.

Section 2. When the umpire announces the pitcher prior to commencement of game, the player announced must pitch until the first batsman has either been put out or has reached first base.

RULE 40. After the first inning, the first striker in each inning shall be the batsman whose name follows that of the last man, who completed his "time at bat" in the preceding inning.

## Players Belong on Bench.

RULE 41. When a side goes to the bat its players must immediately seat themselves on the bench assigned to them as defined in Rule 21 , and remain there until their side is put out, except when called to the bat or to act as coachers or substitute base-runners.

## Reserve for Umpire, Catcher and Batsman.

RULE 42. No player of the side " at bat," except the batsman, shall occupy any portion of the space within the catcher's lines as defined in Rule 3. The triangular space back of the home base is reserved for the exclusive use of the umpire, catcher and batsman, and
the umpire must prohibit any player of the side "at bat" from crossing the same at any time while the ball is in the hands of the pitcher or catcher, or passing between them while standing in their positions.

## Fielder Has Right of Way.

RULE 43. The players of the side at bat must speedily abandon their bench and hasten to another part o the field when by remaining upon or near it they or any of them would interfere with a fielder in an attempt to catch or handle a thrown or batted ball.

## A Fair Hit.

RULE 44. A fair hit is a legally batted ball that settles on fair ground between home and first base or between home and third base or that is on fair ground when bounding to the outfield past first or third base or that first falls on fair territory beyond first or third base or that, while on or over fair ground, touches the person of the umpire or player.

## A Foul Hit.

RULE 45. A foul hit is a legally batted ball that settles on foul territory between home and first base or home and third base, or that bounds past first or third base on foul territory or that falls on foul territory beyond first or third base, or, while on or over foul ground, touches the person of the umpire or a player.

## A Foul Tip.

RULE 46. A foul tip is a ball batted by the batsman while standing within the lines of his position, that goes sharp and direct from the bat to the catcher's hands and is legally caught.

## A Bunt Hit.

RULE 47. A bunt hit is a legally batted ball, not swung at, but met with the bat and tapped slowly within the infield by the batsman. If the attempt to bunt result in a foul not legally eaught, a strike shall be called by the umpire.

## Balls Batted Outside the Ground.

RULE 48. Section 1. When a batted ball passes outside the ground or into a stand the umpire shall decide it fair or foul according to where it disappears from the umpire's view.

Section 2. A fair batted ball that goes over the fence or into a stand shall entitle the batsman to a home run, unless it should pass out of the ground or into a stand at a less distance than two hundred and thirty-five (235) feet from the home base, in which case the batsman shall be entitled to two bases only. The point at which a fence or stand is less than 235 feet from the home base shall be plainly indicated by a white or black sign or mark for the umpire's guidance.

## Strikes.

RULE 49. A strike is:
Section 1. A pitched ball struck at by the batsman without its touching the bat; or,

Section 2. A fair ball legally delivered by the pitcher at which the batsman does not strike.

Section 3. A foul hit ball not caught on the fly, unless the batsman has two strikes.

Section 4. An attempt to bunt which results in a foul not legally canght.

Section 5. A pitched ball, at which the batsman strikes but misses and which touches any part of his person.

Section 6. A foul tip, held by the catcher while standing within the lines of his position.

## An Illegally Batted Ball.

RULE 50. An illegally batted ball is a ball batted by the batsman when either or both of his $f \in e t$ are upon the ground outside the lines of the batsman's position.

## When Batsman is Out.

## The batsman is out:

RULE 51. Section 1. If he fail to take his position at the bat in the order in which his name appears on the batting list unless the error be discovered and the proper batsman replace him before he become a base-runner, in which case, the balls and strikes called must be counted in the time "at bat" of the proper batsman. But only the pioper batsman shall be declared out, and no runs shall be scored or bases run because of any act of the improper batsman. Provided, this rule shall not be enforced unless the out be declared before the ball be delivered to the succeeding batsman. Should the batsman declared out under this section be the third man out and his side be thereby put out, the proper batsman in the next inning shall be the player who would have come to bat had the players been put out by ordinary play in the preceding inning.

Section 2. If he fail to take his position within one minute after the umpire has called for the batsman.

Section 3. If he make a foul hit other than a foul tip, as defined in Rule 46, and the ball be momentarily held by a fielder before touching the ground; provided it be not caught in a fielder's cap, protector, pocket or other part of his uniform, or strike some object other than a fielder before being caught.

Section 4. If he bat the ball illegally as defined in Rule 50.
Section 5. If he attempt to hinder the catcher from fielding or throwing the ball by stepping outside the lines of the batsman's position, or in any way obstructing or interfering with that player.

Section 6. If, while first base be occup:ed by a base-runner, the third strike be called on him by the umpire, unless two men are already out.

Section 7. If, while attempting a third strike, the ball touch any part of the batsman's person, in which case base-runners occupying bases shall not advance as prescribed in Rule 55, Section 5.

Section 8. If, before two hands are out, while first and second or first, second and th:rd bases are occupied, he hit a fly ball, other than a line drive, that can be handled by an infielder. In such case the umpire shall, as soon as the ball be hit, declare it an infield or outfield hit.

Section 9. If the third strike be called in accordance with Sections 4 or 5 of Rule 49.

Section 10. If he steps from one batsman's box to the other while the pitcher is in his position ready to pitch.

## BASE RUNNING RULES

RULE 52. The base runner must touch each base in legal order, viz: First, second, third and home bases; and when obliged to return while the ball is in play, must retouch the base or bases in reverse order. He can only require the right to a base by touching it, before having been put out, and shall then be entitled to hold such base until he has legally touched the next base in order, or has been legally forced to vacate it for a succeeding base-runner. However, no base-runner shall score a run to count in the game ahead of the base-runner pre-
ceding him in the batting order, if there be such preceding baserunner who has not been put out in that inning.

## When the Batsman Becomes a Base-runner.

RULE 53. The batsman becomes a base-runner:
Section 1. Instantly after he makes a fair hit.
Section 2. Instantly after "Four Balls" have been called by the ump.re.

Section 3. Instantly after "Three Strikes" have been declared by the umpire.

Section 4. If, without making any attempt to strike at the ball, his person or clothing be hit by a pitched ball unless, in the opinion of the umpire, he plainly makes no effort to get out of the way of the pitched tall.

Section 5. If the catcher interfere w:th him in or prevent him from striking at a pitched ball.

Section 6. If a fair hit ball strike the person or clothing of the umpire or a base-runner on fair ground.

## Entitled to Bases.

RULE 54. The base-runner shall be entitled, without liability to be put out, to advance a base in the following cases:

Section 1 . If,, while the batsman, he becomes a base-runner by reason of "Four" Balls or for being hit by a pitched ball, or for being interfered with by the catcher in striking at a pitched ball, or if a fair hit ball strike the person or clothing of the umpire or a base-runner on fair ground.

Section 2. If the umpire awards to a succeeding batsman a base on four balls, or for being hit by a pitched ball, or being interfered with by the catcher in striking at a pitched ball and the base-runner be thereby forced to vacate the base held by him.

Section 3. If the umpire call a "Balk."
Section 4. If a ball delivered by the pitcher pass the catcher and touch any fence or building within ninety (90) feet of the home bast.

Section 5. If he be prevented from making a base by the obstruction of a fielder, unless the latter have the ball in his hand ready to touch the base-runner.

Section 6. If the fielder stop or catch a batted ball with his cap, glove or any part of his uniform, while detached from its proper place on his person, the runner or runners shall be entitled to three bases.

Section 7. If a thrown or pitched ball strike the person or clothing of an umpire on foul ground the ball shall be considered in play and the base-runner or runners shall be entitled to all the bases they can make.

## Returning to Bases.

RULE 55. The base-runner shall return to his base without liability to be put out:

Section 1. If the umpire declares any foul not legally caught.
Section 2. If the umpire declares an illegally batted ball.
Section 3. If the umpire declares a dead ball, unless it be also the fourth unfair ball, and he be thereby forced to take the next base, as provided in Rule 54, Section 2.

Section 4. If the person or clothing of the umpire interfere with the catcher in an attempt to throw or the umpire be struck by a ball thrown by the catcher or other fielder to intercept a base-runner.

Section 5. If a pitched ball at which the batsman strikes but misses, touch any part of the batsman's person.

Section 6. In any and all of these cases the base-runner is not required to touch the intervening bases in returning to the base he is legally entitled to.

Section 7. If the umpire be struck by a fair-hit ball before touching a fielder; in which case no base shall be run unless necessitated by the batsman becoming a base-runner, and no run shall be scored unless all the bases are occupied.

Section 8. If the umpire declares the batsman or another baserunner out for interference.

## When Base-Runners are Out.

The base-runner is out:
RULE 56. Section 1. If, after three strikes have been declared against him while the batsman, the third strike ball be not legally caught and he plainly attempts to hinder the catcher from fielding the ball.

Section 2. If, having made a fair hit while batsman, such fair hit ball be momentarily held by a fielder before touching the ground or any object other than a fielder; provided it be not caught in a fielder's hat, cap, protector, pocket, or any other part of his uniform.

Section 3. If, when the umpire has declared "Three Strikes" on him while the batsman, the third strike ball be momentarily held by a fielder before touching the ground. Provided it be not caught in a fielder's cap, protector, pocket or other part of his uniform, or touch some object other than a fielder before being caught.

Section 4. If, after three strikes or a fair hit, he be touched with the ball in the hand of a fielder before he shall have touched first base.

Section 5. If, after three strikes or a fair hit, the ball be securely held by a fielder while touching first base with any part of his person before such base-runner touch first base.

Section 6. If, in running the last half of the distance from home base to first base, while the ball is being fielded to first base, he run outside the three feet lines, as defined in Rule 7, unless he do so to avoid a fielder attempting to field a batted ball.

Section 7. If, in running from first base to second base from second to third base, or from third to home base, he run more than three feet from a direct line between a base and the next one in regular or reverse order to avoid being touched by a ball in the hands of a fielder. But in case a fielder be occupying a base-runner's proper path in attempting to field a batted ball, then the base-runner shall run out of direct line to the next base and behind said fielder and shall not be declared out for so doing.

Section 8. If he fail to avoid a fielder attempting to field a batted ball, in the manner described in Sections 6 and 7 of this rule, or in any way obstruct a fielder in attempting to field a batted ball, or intentionally interfere with a thrown ball. Provided, that if two or more fielders attempt to field a batted ball, and the base-runner come in contact with one or more of them, the umpire shall determine which fielder is entitled to the benefit of this rule, and shall not decide the base-runner out for coming in contact with a fielder other than the one the umpire determines to be entitled to field such batted ball.

Section 9. If at any time while the ball is in play, he be touched by the ball in the hands of a fielder, unless some part of his person be touching the base he is entitled to occupy. Provided, however, that the ball be held by the fielder after touching him, unless the baserunner deliberately knock it out of his hand.

Siection 10. If, when a fair or foul hit ball (other than a foul tip as defined in Rule 46) be legally caught by a fielder, such ball be legally held by a fielder on the base occupied by the base-runner when such ball was batted, or the base-runner be touched with the ball in the hands of a fielder, before he retouch such base after such fair or foul hit ball was so caught; provided, that the base-runner shall not be out in such case, if, after the ball was legally caught as above, it be delivered to the bat by the pitcher before the fielder hold it on said
base, or touch the base-runner out with it; but if the base-runner, in attempting to reach a base, detach it from its fastening before being touched or forced out, he shall be declared safe.

Section 11. If, when the batsman becomes a base-runner, the first base, or the first and second bases, or the first, second and third bases be occupied, any base-runner so occupying a base shall cease to be entitled to hold it, and may be put out at the next base in the same manner as in running to first base, or by being touched with the ball in the hands of a fielder at any time before any base-runner following him in the batting order be put out, unless the umpire should decide the hit of the batsman to be an infield fly.

Section 12. If a fair hit ball strike him before touching a fielder, and, in such case, no base shall be run unless necessitated by the batsman becoming a base-runner, but no run shall be scored or any other Lase-runner put out until the umpire puts the ball back into play.

Section 13. If, when advancing bases, or forced to return to a base, while the ball is in play, he fail to touch the intervening base or bases, ii any, in the regular or reverse order, as the case may be, he may be put out by the ball being held by a fielder on any base he failed to touch, or by deing touched by the ball in the hands of a fielder in the same manner as in running to first base; provided, that the base-runner shall not be out in such case if the ball be delivered to the bat by the pitcher before the fielder hold it on said base or touch the base-runner with i ..

Section 14. If, when the umpire call "Play," after the suspension ot a game, he fail to return to and touch the base he occupied when "I Ime" was called before touching the next base; provided, the baserunner shall not be out, in such case, if the ball be delivered to the bat by the pitcher, before the fielder hold it on said base or touch the base-runner with it.

Section 15. If, with one or no one out and a base-runner on third base, the batsman interferes with a play being made at home plate.

Section 16. If he pass a preceding base-runner before such runner has been legally put out he shall be declared out immediately.

## Overrunning First Base.

Section 17. The base-runner in running to first base may overrun said base after touching it in passing without incurring liability to be out for being off said base, provided he return at once and retouch the base, after which he may be put out as at any other base. If, after overrunning first base, he attempt to run to second base, before returning to first base, he shall forfeit such exemption from liability to be put out.

Section 18. If, while third base is occupied, the coacher stationed near that base shall run in the direction of home base on or near the base line while a fielder is making or trying to make a play on a batted ball not caught on the fly, or on a thrown ball, and thereby draws a throw to home base, the base-runner entitled to third base shall be declared out by the umpire for the coacher's interference with and prevention of the legitimate play.

Section 19. If one or more members of the team at bat stand or collect at or around a base for which a base-runner is trying, thereby confusing the fielding side and adding to the difficulty of making such play, the base-runner shall be declared out for the interference of his team-mate or team-mates.

## When Umpire Shall Declare an Out.

RULE 57. The umpire shall declare the batsman or base-runner out, without waiting for an appeal for such decision, in all cases where such player be put out in accordance with any of these rules, except Sections 13 and 17 of Rule 56.

## COACHING RULES.

RULE 58. The coacher shall be restricted to coaching the baserunner only, and shall not address anyone except the base-runner and then only in words of assistance and direction in running bases. He shall not, by words or signs, incite or try to incite the spectators to demonstrations, and shall not use language which will in any manner refer to or reflect upon a player of the opposite club, the umpire or the spectators. Not more than two coachers, who must be players in the uniform of the team at bat, shall be allowed to occupy the space between the players' and the coacher's lines, one near first and the other near third base, to coach base-runners. If there be more than the legal number of coachers or this rule be violated in any respect the umpire must order the illegal coacher or coachers to the bench, and if his order be not obeyed within one minute, the umpire shall assess a fine of $\$ 5.00$ against each offending player, and upon a repetition of the offense, the offending player or players shall be debarred from further participation in the game, and shall leave the playing field forthwith.

## The Scoring of Runs.

RULE 59. One run shall be scored every time a base-runner, after having legally touched the first three bases, shall legally touch the home base before three men are put out; provided, however, that if he reach home on or during a play in which the third man be forced out or be put out before reaching first base, a run shall not count. A force-out can be made only when a base-runner legally loses the right to the base he occupies by reason of the batsman becoming a baserunner and he is thereby obliged to advance.

## UMPIRE AND HIS DUTIES.

## Power to Enforce Decisions.

RULE 60. The umpires are the representatives of the League and as such are authorized and required to enforce each section of this code. They shall have the power to order a player, captain or manager to do or omit to do any act which in their judgment is necessary to give force and effect to one or all of these rules, and to inflict penalties for violations of the rules as hereinafter prescribed. In order to define their respective duties, the umpire judging strikes and balls shall be designated as the umpire-in-chief: the umpire judging base decisions, as the field umpire.

## The Umpire-in-chief.

RULE 61. There shall be no appeal from any decision of the umpire on the ground that he was not correct in his conclusion as to whether a batted ball was fair or foul, a base-runner safe or out, a pitched ball, a strike or a ball, or on any other play involving accuracy of judgment and no decision rendered by him shall be reversed except that he be convinced that it be in violation of one of these rules. The captain shall alone have the right to protest against a decision and seek its reversal on a claim that it is in conflict with a section of these rules.

Section 1. The Umpire-in-chief shall take his position in back of the catcher; he shall have full charge of, and be responsible for the proper conduct of the game. With exception of the base decisions to be made by the field umpire, the Umpire-in-chief shall render all decisions that ordinarily would devolve upon a single umpire, and which are prescribed for "The Umpire" in these playing rules.

Section 2. He shall call and count as a ball any unfair ball delivered by the pitcher to the batsman. He shall also call and count as a
strike any fairly delivered ball which passes over any portion of the home base, and within the batsman's legal range as defined in Rule 31, whether struck at or not by the batsman; or a foul tip which is caught by the catcher standing within the lines of his position, within ten feet of the home base; or which, after being struck at and not hit, strikes the person of the batsman; or when the ball be bunted foul by the batsman; or any foul hit ball not caught on the fly unless the batsman has two strikes, provided, however, that a pitched ball shall not be called or counted a "ball" or "strike" by the umpire until it has passed home plate.

Section 3. He shall render base decisions in the following instances: (1) If the ball is hit fair, with a runner on first, he must go to third base to take a possible decision; (2) with more than one base occupied, he shall decide whether or not a runner on third leaves that base before a fly ball is caught; (3) in case of a runner being caught between third and home, when more than one base is occupied, he shall make the decision on the runner nearest the home plate.

Section 4. The Umpire-in-chief alone shall have authority to declare a game forfeited.
RULE 62. Section 1. The Field Umpire shall take such positions on the field of play as in his judgment are best suited for the rendering of base decisions. He shall render all decisions at first base and second base, and all decisions at third base except those to be made by the Umpire-in-chief in accordance with Rule 61, Section 3.

Section 2. He shall aid the Umpire-in-chief in every manner in enforcing the rules of the game and, with the exception of declaring a forfeiture, shall have equal authority with the Umpire-in-chief in fining or removing from the game players who violate these rules.

## No Appeal from Decisions Based on Umpire's Judgment.

RULE 63. There shall be no appeal from any decision of either umpire on the ground that he was not correct in his conclusion as to whether a batted ball was fair or foul, a base-runner safe or out, a pitched ball a strike or a ball, or on any other play involving accuracy of judgment, and no decision rendered by him shall be reversed, except that he be convinced that it is in violation of one of these rules. The captain shall alone have the right to protest against a decision and seek its reversal on a claim that it is in conflict with a section of these rules. In case the captain does seek a reversal of a decision based solely on a point of rules, the umpire making the decision shall, if he is in doubt, ask his associate for information before acting upon the captain's appcal. Under no circumstances shall either umpire criticise or interfere with a decision unless asked to do so by his associate.

## Duties of Single Umpire.

RULE 64. If but one umpire be assigned, his duties and jurisdiction shall extend to all points, and he shall be permitted to take his stand in any part of the field that in his opinion will best enable him to discharge his duties.

## Must Not Question Decisions.

RULE 65. Under no circumstances shall a captain or player dispute the accuracy of the umpire's judgment and decision on a play.

## Clubs Cannot Change Umpires.

RULE 66. The umpire cannot be changed during a championship game by the consent of the contesting clubs unless the official in charge of the field be incapacitated from service by injury or illness.

## Penalties for Violation of Rules.

RULE 67. In all cases of violation of these rules, by either player or manager, the penalty shall be prompt removal of the offender from the game and grounds, followed by a period of such suspension from actual service in the club as the President of the League may fix. In the event of removal of player or manager by either umpire, he shall go direct to the club house and remain there during progress of the game, or leave the grounds; and a failure to do so will warrant a forfeiture of the game by the Umpire-in-chief.

Section 2. The Umpire shaii assess a fine of $\$ 5.00$ against each offending player in the following cases: (1) If the player intentionally discolor or damage the ball; (2) if the player fail to be seated on his bench within one minute after ordered to do so by the umpire; (3) if the player violate the coaching rules and refuse to be seated on his bench within one minute after ordered to do so by the umpire; (4) if the captain fail to notify him when one player is substituted for another.

Section 3. In cases where substitute players show their disapproval of decisions by yelling from the bench, the umpire shall firsi give warning. If the yelling continues he shall fine each offender $\$ 10.00$, and if the disturbance is still persisted in he shall clear the bench of all substitute players; the captain of the team, however, to have the privilege of sending to the club house for such substitutes as are actually needed to replace players in the game.

## Umpire to Report Violations of the Rules.

RULE 68. The umpire shall, within twelve hours after fining or removing a player from the game, forward to the President a report of the penalty inflicted and the cause therefor.

RULE 69. Immediately upon being informed by the umpire that a fine has been imposed upon any manager, captain or player, the President shall notify the person so fined and also the club of which he is a member; and, in the event of the failure of the person so fined to pay to the Secretary of the League the amount of said fine within five days after notice, he shall be debarred from participating in any championship game or from sitting on a player's bench during the progress of a championship game until such fine be paid.

RULE 70. When the offense of the player debarred from the game be of a flagrant nature, such as the use of obscene language or an assault upon a player or umpire, the umpire shall within four hours thereafter forward to the President of the League full particulars.

## Warning to Captains.

RULE 71. The umpire shall notify both captains before the game, and in the presence of each other, that all the playing rules will be strictly and impartially enforced, and warn them that failure on their part to co-operate in such enforcement will result in offenders being fined, and, if necessary to preserve discipline, debarred from the game.

## On Ground Rules.

RULE 72. Section 1. Before the commencement of a game the umpire shall see that the rules governing all the materials of the garie are strictly observed.

Section 2. In case of spectators overflowing on the playing field, the home captain shall make special ground rules to cover balls batted or thrown into the crowd, provided such rules be acceptable to the captain of the visiting club. If the latter object, then the umpire shall have full authority to make and enforce such special rules, and he shall announce the scope of same to the spectators.

Section 3. In all cases where there are no spectators on the playing
field, and where a thrown ball goes into a stand of spectators, or over or through any fence surrounding the playing field or into the players' bench (whether the ball rebounds into the field or not), the runner or runners shall be entitled to two bases. The umpire in awarding such bases shall be governed by the position of the runner or runners at the time the throw is made.

Section 4. The umpire shall also ascertain from the home captain whether any other special ground rules are necessary, and if there be he shall advise the opposing captain of their scope and see that each is duly enforced, provided they do not conflict with any of these rules and are acceptable to the captain of the visiting team.

## Official Announcements.

RULE 73. The umpire shall call "Play" at the hour appointed for the beginning of a game, announce "Time" at its legal interruption and declare "Game" at its legal termination. Prior to the commencement of the game he shall announce the batteries, and during the progress of the game shall announce each change of players. In case of an overflow crowd, he shall announce the special ground rules agreed upon, and he shall also make announcement of any agreement entered into by the two captains to stop play at a specified hour.

## Suspension of Play.

RULE 74. The umpire shall suspend play for the following causes:

1. If the rain fall so heavily as in the judgment of the umpire to prevent continuing the game, in which case he shall note the time of suspension, and should rain fall continuously for thirty minutes thereafter he shall terminate the game.
2. In case of an accident which incapacitates him or a player from service in the field, or in order to remove from the grounds any player or spectator who has violated the rules or in case of fire, panic or other extraordinary circumstances.
3. In suspending play from, any legal cause the umpire shall call "Time", when he calls "Time," play should be suspended until he calls "Play" again, and during the interim no player shall be put out, base be run or run be scored. "Time" shall not be called by the umpire until the ball he held by the pitcher while standing in his position.

## Field Rules.

RULE 75. No person shall be allowed upon any part of the field during the progress of a game except the players in uniform, the manager of each side, the umpire and such officers of the law as may be present in uniform and such watchmen of the home club as may be necessary to preserve peace.

RULE 76. No manager, captain or player shall address the spectators during the game except in reply to a request for information about the progress or state of the game, or to give the name of a player.

RULE 77. Every club shall furnish sufficient police force to preserve order upon its own grounds, and in the event of a crowd entering the field during the progress of a game, and interfering with the play in any manner, the visiting club may refuse to play until the field be cleared. If the field be not cleared within fifteen minutes thereafter, the visiting club may claim and shall be entitled to the game by a score of nine runs to none (no matter what number of innings has been played).

## General Definitions.

RULE 78. "Play" is the order of the umpire to begin the game or to resume it after its suspension.

RIJLE 79. "Time" is the order of the umpire to suspend play. Such suspension must not extend beyond the day.

RULE 80. "Game" is the announcement of the umpire that the game is terminated.

RULE 81. "An inning" is the term at bat of the nine players representing a club in a game and is completed when three of such players have been legally put out.

RULE 82. "A Time at Bat" is the term at bat of a batsman. It begins when he takes his position, and continues until he is put out or becomes a base-runner. But a time at bat shall not be charged against a batsman who is awarded first base by the umpire for being hit by a pitched ball, or on called balls, or when he makes a sacrifice hit, or for interference by the catcher.

RULE 83. "Legal" or "Legally" signifies as required by these rules.

## The Scoring Rules.

RULE 84. To promote uniformity in scoring championship games the following instructions are given and suggestions and definitions made for the guidance of scorers, and they are required to make all scores in accordance therewith.

RULE 85. Section 1. The first item in the tabulated score, after the player's name and position, shall be the number of times he has been at bat during the game, but the exceptions made in Rule 82 must not be included.

Section 2. In the second column shall be set down the runs, if any, made by each player.

Section 3. In the third column shall be placed the first base hits, if any, made by each player.

## The Scoring of Base Hits.

Section 4. A base hit shall be scored in the following cases:
When the ball from the bat strikes the ground on or within the foul lines and out of the reach of the fielders.

When a fair ani ball is partially or wholly stopped by a fielder in motion, but such player cannot recover himself in time to field the ball to first before the striker reaches that base or to force out another base-runner.

When the ball be hit with such force to an infielder or pitcher that he cannot handle it in time to put out the batsman or force out a baserunner. In a case of doubt over this class of hits, a base hit should be scored and the fielder exempted from the charge of an error.

When the ball is hit so slowly toward a fielder that he cannot handle it in time to put out the batsman or force out a base-runner.

In cases where a base-runner is retired by being hit by a batted ball, unless batted by himself, the batsman should be credited with a base hit.

When a batted ball hits the person or clothing of the umpire, as defined in Rule 53, Section 6.

In no case shall a base-hit be scored when a base-runner is forced out by the play.

Section 5. Sacrifice hits shall be placed in the summary.
A sacrifice shall be credited to the batsman who, when no one is out or when one man is out advances a runner a base by a bunt hit, which results in the batsman being put out before reaching first or would so result if it were handled without an error.

A sacrifice hit shall also be credited to a batsman, who, when no one is out, or when but one man is out, hits a fly ball that is caught, but results in a run being scored, or would, in the judgment of the scorer so result if caught.

## Fielding Records.

Section 6. The number of opponents, if any, put out 1 each player shall be set down in the fourth column. Where the batsman is given out by the umpire for a foul strike, or fails to bat in proper order, or is declared out on third bunt strike, the put-out shall be scored to the catcher. In cases of a base-runner being declared "out" for interference, running out of line, or on an infield fly, the "out" should be credited to the player who would have made the play but for the action of the base-runner or the announcement of the umpires.

Section 7. The number of times, if any, each player assists in putting out an opponent shall be set down in the fifth column. An assist should be given to each player "who handles the ball in aiding in a run out or any other play of the kind, except the one who completes it.

An assist should be given to a player who makes a play in time to put a runner out, even if the player who could complete the play fail, through no fault of the assisting player.

And generally an assist should be given to each player who handles or assists in any manner in handling the ball from the time it leaves the bat until it reaches the player who makes the put-out, or in case of a thrown ball, to each player who throws or handles it cleanly and in such a way that a put-out results, or would result if no error were made by a team-mate.

Assists should be credited to every player who handles the ball in the play which results in a base-runner being called "out" for interference or for running out of line.

A double play shall mean any two continuous put-outs that take place between the time the ball leaves the pitcher's hands until it is returned to him again standing in the pitcher's box.

## Errors.

Section 8. An error shall be given in the sixth column for each misplay which prolongs the time at bat of the batsman or allows a base-runner to make one or more bases when perfect play would have insured his being put out. But a base on balls, a base awarded to a batsman by being struck by a pitched ball, a balk, a passed ball or wild pitch, shall not be included in the sixth column.

An error shall not be charged against the catcher for a wild throw in an attempt to prevent a stolen base, unless the base-runner advance an extra base because of the error.

An error shall not be scored against the catcher or an infielder who attempts to complete a double play, unless the throw be so wild that an additional base be gained.

In case a base-runner advance a base through the failure of a baseman to stop or try to stop a ball accurately thrown to his base, the latter shall be charged with an error and not the player who made such throw, provided there was occasion for it. If such throw be made to second base, the scorer shall determine whether the second baseman or shortstop shall be charged with an error.

In the event of a fielder dropping a fly but recovering the ball in time to force a batter at another base, he shall be exempted from an error, the play being scored as a "force-out."

## Stolen Bases.

Section 9. A stolen base shall be credited to the base-runner whenever he advances a base una:ded by a base-hit, a put-out, a fielding or a battery error, subject to the following exceptions:

In event of a double or triple steal being attempted where either runner is thrown out, the other or others shall not be credited with a stolen base.

In event of a base-runner being touched out after sliding over a
base, he shall not be regarded as having stolen the base in question.
In event of a base-runner making his start to steal a base prior to a battery error, he shall be credited with a stolen base.

In event of a palpable muff of a ball thrown by the catcher, when the base-runner is clearly blocked, the infielder making the muff shall be charged with an error and the base-runner shall not be credited with a stolen base.

## Definition of Wild Pitch and Passed Ball.

Section 10. A wild pitch is a legally delivered ball, so high, low or wide of the plate that the catcher cannot or does not stop and control it with ordinary effort, and as a result the batsman, who becomes a base-runner on such pitched ball, reaches first base or a base-runner advances.

A passed ball is a legally delivered ball that the catcher should hold or control with ordinary effort, but his failure to do so enables the batsman; who becomes a base-runner on such pitched ball, to reach first base or a base-runner to advance.

## The Summary.

RULE 86. The summary slall contain:
Section 1. The score made in each inning of the game and the total runs of each side in the game.

Section 2. The number of stolen bases, if. any, made by each player.
Section 3. The number of sacrifice hits, if any, made by each player.
Section 4. The number of sacrifice flies, if any, made by each player.

Section 5. The number of two-base hits, if any, made by each piayer.

Section 6. The number of three-base hits, if any, made by each player.

Section 7. The number of home runs, if any, made by each player.
Section 8. The number of double and triple plays, if any, made by each club and the players participating in same.

Section 9. The number of innings each pitcher pitched in.
Section 10. The number ? base hits, if any, made off each p.tcher and the number legal at bat scored against each pitcher.

Section 11. The number of times, if any, the pitcher strikes out the opposing batsmen.

Section 12. The number of times, if any, the pitcher gives bases on balls.

Section 13. The number of wild pitches, if any, charged against the pitcher.

Section 14. The number of times, if any, the pitcher hits a batsman with a pitched ball, the name or names of the batsman or batsmen so hit to be given.

Section 15. The number of passed balls by each catcher.
Section 16. The time of the game.
Section 17. The name of the umpire or umpires.

## 1910 Fielding Treats.

Below may be found a list of the triple plays made in the Major Leagues during the 1910 playing season.

April 23-New York vs. Brooklyn, at New York. Wheat and Burch on bases. Hummel grounded to Bridwell, who threw to Doyle, torcing Wheat. Doyle threw to first, retiring Hummel. Burch over-ran first base, and was run down, Merkle to Devlin to Meyers.

April 28-Boston vs. Brooklyn, at Boston. Boston made a batting rally in the seventh and succeeded in getting two men on base. A sharp hit to right field started the triple play machine, made up of Burch, Daubert, McElveen, Bergen and Smith, which put an end to the Doves' hopes.

May 4 -Detroit vs. Chicago, at Chicago. Cole on first base, Dougherty on second. Purtell lined to Simmons (first base), who tagged first, retiring Cole, and then threw to Delehanty, catching Dougherty off second.

June 18-Detroit vs. Boston, at Boston. Stahl on first, Gardner on second. Lewis drove what seemed a safe fly, but Ty Cobb managed to get it and threw to Delehanty, who tagged the base, putting Gardner out, and then tagged Stahl, coming in to the base.

July 20-New York vs. Cincinnati, at Cincinnati. Doyle on third, Becker on second. Murray lined to Downey, who stepped on third, retiring Murray and Doyle, and threw to Eagan, retiring Becker.

July 30 -Chicago vs. St. Louis, at St. Louis, National League. Men on first and second. Line drive to Hauser, who touched second and threw to first.

August 27-New York vs. Chicago, at Chicago, National League. Men on first and second. Batter lined to pitcher, who tipped ball with his glove. Evers caught the ball, retired the man running from first to second, and was obliged to toss to Zimmerman for the third out.

September 2-Cincinnati vs. Pittsburg, at Pittsburg. Flynn on second, Wilson on first. Gibson flied to Hoblitzel, who threw to Egan at first, retiring Wilson. Egan threw to McMillan at second, who put Flynn out.

September 18 -Boston vs. Chicago, at Chicago, American League. Lewis on first, Stahl on second. Purtell lined to Parent, who threw to second, retiring Stahl. Zeider shot the ball to Gandil, at first, retiring Lewis.

October 2-Chicago vs. Cincinnati, at Cincinnati. Men on first and third. A long fly to Sheckard was fielded home in time to get the man from third, and Kling whipped the ball to Archer at first, retiring the third man, and completing the last of the numerous triple plays of the season.

## UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO BASEBALL TEAM

Early in September, 1910, thirteen students of the University of Chicago left on what eventually proved to be the longest trip a college athletic team ever undertook. About 19,000 miles were covered, mostly by water, in a period of almost four months.

As the guests of Waseda University of Tokyo, Japan, the Chicago team carried on an international baseball series with two of the leading educational institutions in the "Land of the Rising Sun"; namely, Waseda and Keio Universities of Tokyo.

Early in October, the series began. Students and townspeople alike turned out ten thousand strong to welcome the Americans and throughout the whole series the fans proved to be ardent admirers of our National game. Every play on either side was appreciated, and through the true sportsmanship of the officials, the games were beyond criticism.

The first game was played October 4th. Chicago got the jump on their rivals and by heavy hitting were returned the victors over the Waseda University team, by the score of 9-2.

On October 6th, Keio University, proud of their record of the previous fall over Wisconsin, looked to their laurels. The play was keen and even. Chicago scored three runs in the first inning and Keio, working hard, scored one in the ninth. That tells the tale.

On October 8th the Waseda team was met in the second game. Chicago played a perfect defensive game and won by a $5-0$ score.

The next day Keio was encountered, in what proved to be a battle royal. In a pitcher's duel, Chicago won out in the tenth inning. The final score was 2-1, thus giving the Chicago men the second and deciding game of the Ke.o series. Never before in Japan had such a spirited athletic engagement taken place.

Next Waseda was met in the third and deciding game of that series. Chicago's hitting completely put them to rout, the final count being 15-4.

Bewildered with these victories, the Japanese fans were anxiously awa:ting the downfall of the Maroons. Their hopes were almost realized when, with Chicago two runs ahead in the eighth, their champions evened up the score. But in the tenth, three doubles and a base on balls showed Chicago 5 and Keio 2.

To commemorate their victories, the Maroons received two handsome bronze statues, representing the native ball player at bat and pitching.

Following these "series, the Maroons, journeyed into Western Japan as guests of the "Mainichi Shimbun," and again Waseda University was routed in three games; 8-4, 20-0, 12-2.

Bidding farewell to Japan the collegians visited China, stopping at Shanghai and Hongkong, and arriving in the Philippine Islands in the middle of November.

As guests of the American citizens and people of Manila a very enjoyable week was spent, and the leading teams of the Philippine Islands were encountered. The first game, on November 12th, was played in a drizzling rain. Chicago lost to the Marines (champions of the City League) ; score $4-0$. Chicago got revenge in the second game, defeating the Marines $4-1$. The third game of the Manila series was played with the All-Star Filipino team, composed of natives. Chicago's defensive game and timely hitting brought them a $5-0$ victory. The final Manila game, against the Fort McKinley Army team resulted in a 3-0 victory for Chicago.

Late in December the American athletes completed their Oriental tour, full of pride over their ten straight victories in Japan, three out of four in Manila, and three out of five en route to Seattle. In ail Chicago won sixteen and lost three, an enviable record for any University team.

## HIT THE "BULL"

At the close of the 1909 season, when the records and results of the year's work were carefully looked over, there were, of course, many surprises, both to the players and to the fans. Some of these surprises occurred in the averages, and some in the league standings, but by far the greatest wonderment was caused by the story of the "BULL" DURHAM cut-out signs, some fifty of which were through the '09 campaign.

Blackwell's Durham Tobacco Company, the owners of the signs, placed the following liberal offer on each Bull. Every player who hits the Bull with a fairly batted ball during a regular scheduled league game, is presented with a check for FIFTY DOLLARS. And added to this, each home run made on the grounds where the Bull is located, entitles the heavy hitters to a carton containing 72 five-cent packages of "BULL" DURHAM Smoking Tobacco. These offers keep the fans in a state of wild excitement during the playing season, and of course the players are always "on edge," in order to secure any of the prizes.

When the results of the 1909 season were compiled and given out, it was found that 14 men had been successful in hitting the signs, making a total of $\$ 700.00$ which they received as the result of their work. There had been 487 home runs made in the parks, and as the result of these hits there was the enormous amount of 2,435 pounds of "BULL" DURHAM Tobacco given away.

As the interest in the National Game was then waning in some parts of the country, the Tobacco Company decided that in order to stimulate the interest, it would be necessary to increase the herd of Bulls, and the first game of the 1910 season saw the number of Bulls increased to almost 150. The same liberal offer was attached to each one of these Bulls, and when the results were looked over there was a grand total of 85 hits registered against the unsuspecting animals, and over 2,000 home runs were made in the parks where the Bulls were located. This made the cash prizes amount to $\$ 4,250.00$, and the free Tobacco for home runs reached the total of over 10,000 pounds.

The 1910 "Bull" season was opened officially by Jake Daubert of Brooklyn, who hit the Philadelphia sign on April 15th, and from then until October 23rd, when Walter Carlisle of Vernon closed the season with a drive at the Ios Angeles Bull, there were on an average a little better than three hits made per week.

Harry Armbruster, of the Syracuse Club, performed the unique feat of hitting the sign three times, May 28, June 13 and July 1, and all of his drives were scored against the Syracuse Bull. The only other man who succeeded in repeating was Russell Bailey of the Eau Claire Club, who hit the Superior Bull on Aug. 27, and registered a hit against the Eau Claire sign on Sept. 4.
