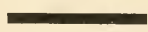

EARLY SETTLEMENT.

The town of Hillsborough is situated in the north-western corner of Hillsborough county, to which the town has the distinction of giving its name. The original grant to Col. Hill was for a section "about six miles square;" the appearance of the town on the map, however, is more like a diamond with a northwest acute angle forced into the town of Washington, in Sullivan County. Hillsborough is bounded on the north by Washington and Bradford, on the east by Henniker, on the south by Deering and Antrim, and on the west by Windsor and Washington. The town is in latitude $43^{\circ} 5'$ north, and longitude $5^{\circ} 5'$ east. The surface of the town is greatly diversified by hills and valleys; the soil is strong and generally productive, but it is complained of for its rocks which render it generally hard to cultivate.

The first settlement made in Hillsborough, in 1741, was one hundred and eighteen years after the first made in the colony, in Dover, under the lead of Gorges and Mason. The proprietors of this company sent out two small colonies,

under the charter granted by James 1st of England. Their charter, embracing New Hampshire, included the territory lying between the sea and the St. Lawrence, and the rivers Kennebec and Merrimack. Massachusetts colony set up a claim to New Hampshire, in part, to all north of the Merrimack, and for many years the colonies were united under one government. A final separation was effected in 1741, the same year the first settlement was begun in Hillsborough. Previous to this year the place was the unrestricted and favorite resort of the Indians, probably the Pennicook tribe which is thought to have roamed the entire valley of the Contoocook. Numerous implements of their manufacture have been unearthed in the town; and it appears that where the village of Hillsborough Bridge is now located was to them a common resort.

The township of Hillsborough, then called "Number 7" in the line of towns from the Merrimack to the Connecticut River, was granted by Massachusetts, Jan. 16, 1735-'6. The same territory was later—Jan. 26, 1748-'9—granted by the Masonian Proprietors to John Hill and others, and was permanently settled under the latter grant.

The principal men among the first group of settlers were Samuel Gibson, James Lyon, Robert McClure, and James McColley. Each of these men erected his log cabin in the hitherto unbroken wilderness, and began the preparation of the soil for their first crop of grain and Indian corn. They soon began the construction of a meeting house, presumably of hewn logs, for there was no saw mill nearer than New Boston. This meeting house was furnished with glass windows

and a bell, which seem to have been the only luxuries indulged in by these hardy, but devoted pioneers.

James McColley, of Scotch-Irish descent erected his log cabin within the limits of the present Bridge Village, and within this rude structure was born, Jan. 18, 1742, the first child born of white parents within the limits of Hillsborough. This child was John McColley, who afterward won distinction as a soldier in the French and Indian war, and later in the American Revolution. A daughter (Elizabeth) was born to Samuel Gibson, who had located on the farm now occupied by Harry Burbank, on the road from the Bridge to the Center, May 19, 1742. Twenty-five years later, these two were married in Litchfield, received a present of a farm from Colonel Hill, the proprietor, and removed to Hillsborough, where they made their home.

In the same year that McColley came, (1741), and perhaps at the same time, came Francis Graham—a name afterwards changed to Grimes as the name Graham itself has been changed from the old Scotch Graeme—Francis Graham was the grandfather of John Grimes, the grandfather of the present Colonel James F. Grimes. It is believed the third white child born in this town was Ann Graham, born in 1743.

A few others may have also located here during the first settlement, from 1741 to 1746, but the company was very small and the narrow clearings they made in the noble forest were scarcely noticeable on the hillsides.

But soon a new alarm was rung within their hearing. At first the Indians had been found generally friendly, but in 1744 news came that war had been declared between France

and Great Britain. The result in America was "the Cape Breton War," which waged with great severity. The Indians were enlisted on the side of the French and became a constant terror to the scattering settlements. An attack was made on the settlement of Hopkinton, where eight pioneers were taken prisoners. Indians were seen lurking near the falls at the sight of the Bridge village in this town, and the few settlers decided it was time to leave. The entire settlement was then abandoned, and no permanent settlement was made until after the close of the French and Indian War of 1754 to 1763.

The Indians were slow to learn peace, but in 1763 peace became established and Colonel Hill made preparations for the re-settlement of number 7. He employed Daniel Campbell, of Amherst, to run out anew the lines of the town, and divide it into 100-acre lots. Soon settlers who had come prepared to stay began to pour in. The following is the list of those who were known to be there in 1767. One family came in 1762, before the war closed. The rest came, a few at a time, and were these, viz.: John McColley, Capt. Samuel Bradford, Lieut. Samuel Bradford, Jonathan Durant, Jonathan Easty, Timothy Wilkins, John Gibson, Samuel Gibson, Wm. Williams, Benj. Lovejoy, Wm. Pope, Jonathan Sargent, Moses Steel, Isaac Baldwin, Wm. Taggart and Isaac Andrews. Of these, it will be remembered, John McColley was the first child born in town. The two Gibsons were brothers of Mrs. McColley. The first settlers who left during the Cape Breton War never returned here to reside.

These settlements were made at the Center, at the Bridge and near the meeting house which had been located between these two places. All danger from the hostile savages was not past, but all able bodied men belonged to the organized militia and leaned upon their own powers and strength for the protection and safety of their homes. These gradually increased in numbers, while the earlier cabins were replaced by large and stately mansions, many of which have withstood the varied seasons of a hundred years. Suitable monuments are they to the hardihood and vigor, and the strength of character of the men who fearlessly faced the dangers of pioneer life, that they might make for themselves suitable homes, and leave to their posterity a valuable heritage.

INCORPORATION OF HILLSBOROUGH.

The town of Hillsborough was incorporated under a charter bearing date of Nov. 14, 1772. This charter, issued in the name of His Majesty, King George III, was obtained through the agency of Isaac Andrews, Esq. By this charter all the white pine trees were reserved for supplying masts for the King's navy. This township, whose original bounds have remained unchanged, was originally known as "Num-

ber 7", and was intended to be six miles square. It is stated that Col. Hill paid a liberal sum to Governor Wentworth for signing his name to the charter, and it is for this man the town received its name.

The First Town Meeting—The first town meeting was held on Bible Hill, at Capt. Bradfords tavern, on Nov. 24, 1772. The following entry is copied from the re-written record of this pioneer political gathering:

MILITARY MATTERS

The second settlement of Hillsborough had scarcely got under way when the great American Revolution broke out, but this town was ready for the struggle for independence. The news of the battles of Concord and Lexington, and the call "to arms" were quickly and effectively responded to by the citizens of Hillsborough. The following is a list of

Capt. Baldwin was the first to enlist from the town, and the first to die—killed while fighting at Bunker Hill at the head of his men. He was a veteran of the French and Indian War, having fought under Stark. Lieut. Ammi Andrews served through the whole war, and shared in Arnold's expedition against Quebec in 1775. For a sketch of Benjamin Pierce's record see personal sketch in another chapter.

WAR OF 1812.

Hillsborough has had representatives in every considerable war in the history of the United States, and has furnished not only men but leaders. The McNeils—four generations of military men—have won honor to the town. John McNeil was in the Louisburg expedition of 1744-45, and in

the Cape Breton War. His son Daniel was accidentally drowned in the Contoocook at Hillsborough Bridge. His grandson, John, was a captain in the Revolutionary War. This man's two sons, Solomon and John, both became generals. John received many promotions during the War of 1812 for valor. He married a daughter of Gov. Pierce, sister of the ex-president. Of this marriage were a son and daughter. The son, John W. S. McNeil was a lieutenant in the regular army, having been educated at West Point. He fell while leading an attack against the Indians in Florida, Sept. 10, 1837, at the age of twenty-seven. George Dascomb and Daniel Templeton were also engaged in this war. The following is a list of veterans of the War of 1812 who lie buried in the cemeteries in town:

Hillsborough was ably represented in the Mexican War by her honorable son, Franklin Pierce, who enlisted as a private but soon rose to the rank of a brigadier-general. Here he established his brilliant military record, to which every citizen of Hillsborough points with pride.

WAR OF THE REBELLION.

Hillsborough furnished her full quota of soldiers in the Civil War. James F. Grimes received a captain's commis-

sion at the beginning of the war, and opened a recruiting office at the Bridge village. Many enlistments were secured, the young men of this and surrounding towns responded nobly to the call to defend their country's integrity. At least forty-five of the noble men thus engaged either fell on the battlefield or died from wounds received in action. 195 men were furnished by the town, many of whom were led by James F. Grimes, who by meritorious conduct rose to the rank of colonel.

In the spring of 1877 great pains were taken to find the graves of all deceased soldiers who had been buried in cemeteries in use by the town, one of which was just over the line into Deering. Following is a list of the Civil War soldiers' graves then located. These with the veterans of other wars were decorated with flags and wreaths of flowers, which custom has continued through the succeeding years. Gradually the list of departed heroes is increased, while the ranks of the G. A. R. are thinned by the unceasing ravages of time. Let us of the present generation not forget the debt of gratitude we owe these men who so nobly fought for the Union of our country and the liberty of an enslaved race.

To the glowing military record made by the representatives of this town in the several wars in which our state and nation have been engaged has lately been added the brilliant achievement of W. Scott West, a young Hillsborough man, who enlisted in the regular U. S. naval service, May 11, 1897. Here he remained two and one-half years, and was one of the crew from the Battleship "Marblehead" to cut the cables at Cienfuegos, Cuba, during the Spanish-American War. For this deed of valor, which was performed just one year from the enlistment of Mr. West in the Navy, he received a medal, given by vote of the U. S. Congress, "for heroism and gallantry when under fire." He was also engaged at Guantanamo and at Manzanillo, and before the close of the war received a second medal for deeds of valor.

GRAND ARMY POST.

The G. A. R. Post of this town was organized Oct. 5, 1876, under the name of "Reynolds Post, No. 25." There were twelve charter members. On June 12, 1878, the name was changed to "Pierce Post, No. 25," in honor of Gov. Pierce. The name was again changed, Aug. 24, 1881, to "Senator Grimes Post," in honor of Senator Grimes, of Iowa, who was a native of this town. The names of 112 different veterans have stood on the muster rolls of this organization but the present number is only 25, many of the others having gone to their reward.

A Woman's Relief Corps was organized Oct. 5, 1894, under the name of "Senator Grimes Relief Corps, No. 80." Its membership at the present time numbers about 70. There is also a Camp of Sons of Veterans.

INDUSTRIES OF HILLSBOROUGH

Previous to 1860 the chief occupation of the citizens of Hillsborough was the cultivation of their farms, or the manufacture of lumber. The farms in this section were found very productive, but hard to work; however, when properly cultivated, the crops of hay, grain and corn, which were reaped from her fertile acres showed that Hillsborough could produce as good yield to the acre as the Central West, but could not successfully compete since the rocky soil would not generally admit of the use of machinery.

These earliest farms were chosen on the hills, or hill-sides which offered particular advantages to the first comers. Gradually these farms have become deserted or converted into pasture lands for the large herds of the valley farms of a later period. Much attention has been given to dairying, the product being either home-made butter, or the milk sold to creameries, one of which was at one time located in this town, but at the present time much milk is shipped to Boston.

Many saw-mills have been operated on the streams wher-

ever sufficient water power could be obtained. These converted the extensive forests of hard wood and evergreens into the lumber necessary for the construction of the many roomy farmhouses, or later contributed to build up the Bridge village. Much has also been shipped to other markets. The old water-wheel mill has now been supplanted by the portable mill, many of which are now in operation in this town. Although a commendable business enterprise, it is a lamentable fact, that these machines are desolating the beautiful wooded hills which add such beauty to the broken landscape.

THE CONTOOCOOK MILLS

Half a century ago the old cotton-factory of the Marcys had passed into other hands, and about that time John B. Smith bought and took possession and set up the business of hosiery-knitting. The old saw mill standing near the south end of the bridge, which had sawn boards, lumber and had turned out shoe-pegs by the cart-load passed into his (Smith's) hands, and was transformed into a large and convenient factory. For a time Geo. D. Reaseler run the south mill—the old cotton-factory—and J. B. Smith the newly modeled one near the bridge. At length the north factory came into his hands, and for several years he operated both mills to the best advantage and amassed a fortune. The Contoocook Mills Company was formed by Mr. Smith and others under which name the business has since been carried on. The mills have been completely renovated and greatly enlarged since 1885. Twelve sets of machinery are now

operated for the manufacturing of undewear, 20,000 doz. pieces being an average annual product together with 180,000 doz. half-hose. Employment is given to 225 hands, who are regularly paid \$10,000 per month in wages. This sum is circulated generally throughout local business houses and and plays a most important part in supporting local business enterprise. J. B. Smith is president of the company, G. E. Gould, treasurer, and C. A. Jones superintendent of the mills.

HILLSBOROUGH WOOLEN MILL (THE NEW MILL)

The project of "the new mill," so-called, was started by local business men, who bought shares and erected the building, or began its erection, but the amount received did not complete it. Bonds were then issued and more money raised on these. The mill was then completed, but remained unoccupied for some time. It was erected for no especial business, but to sell or rent to some manufacturer who should add a live industry to the village. At length "the new mill" was sold and put to use. This was about 1877. New life seemed to possess the place at once, many new-comers sought homes here and new streets were laid out upon which houses were erected. Prices of land advanced, and business of all kinds improved. Rufus F. Frost & Co. opened the mill under the name of the Hillsborough Woolen Mills.

These mills are situated on an excellent water power, which is not fully utilized. Ex-Gov. John B. Smith, is a large owner, and has been one of the principal promoters of the interests of this important industry for a long period of years.

CHURCH AFFAIRS.

FIRST PARISH AND CONGREGATIONAL SOCIETY.

The first matter attended to by the early settlers in 1741 was the construction of their rude houses, the very next, the meeting house, and soon after, a parsonage. All these were erected of logs, probably hewn by hand, for it is thought the first settlers did not construct a saw-mill. The meeting house was erected on the site of H. Clark's buildings about half-way between the bridge and center village. The house was wantonly burned.

After the resettlement for twelve years public worship was held in warm weather in groves or in barns, in the coldest weather in private dwellings. Colonel Hill, the sole proprietor, gave the town ten acres of land now occupied at the Center by the church and cemetery and village common. Other lots were reserved for the first settled minister. In the autumn of 1772, Mr. Jonathan Barnes was called to settle as pastor, and was accordingly ordained and installed in November, that year, the services taking place on Bible Hill.

Bible Hill is a well known locality in town and is said to have been thus named because the only Bibles in town were owned there by Deacons Isaac Andrews and Joseph Symonds. This locality early bid fair to be the leading place in town, outranking the Bridge even, for on it was built the first tavern in town, built in 1766; the first town-meeting was held there in 1772; the first ordination the same year; and there lived

the first captain and the first lieutenant of the earliest military company formed in town, 1779.

The second meeting house was built by the town, as had been the first which had been burned. At the end of thirteen years this house was found too small to accommodate the increased congregation. It was then removed several rods and converted into a school-house. A new and larger building was then erected on the old site. This was a large two story structure with porches on three sides.

The church society had been organized Oct. 12, 1769, which doubtless was the first religious organization in town. Rev. Mr. Barnes remained pastor for thirty-one years resigning Oct. 19, 1803, having become incapacitated by a stroke of lightning. He lived but two years after. He was the father of ten children and was survived by his widow thirty-three years. Today his descendants are among the esteemed citizens of Hillsborough. Other pastors and preachers followed until 1821 when Rev. John Lawton was installed, remaining about thirteen years, during which time a wide spread revival passed over the state, greatly strengthening the church of which we write. Rev. Seth Farnsworth was the next pastor, being installed Nov. 23, 1836. On the same day the church just erected at the Bridge was dedicated, and the pastor became a resident of that village, but filled both pulpits, the old and the new. He inspired the people with love and confidence but after only four months was removed by death.

Rev. Samuel G. Tenney was the next pastor. In the spring of 1839 the Hillsborough Bridge Congregational

Church was formally organized and Mr. Tenney was retained at the Bridge. He was succeeded by Rev. Jacob Cummings whose services covered the period from 1843 to 1857; Rev. Harry Brickett, 1857-1865; Rev. Stephen Morrill, came in 1865. During his ministry the church was removed from its location in the field to its present location on Main Street. Succeeding pastors here have been Revs. Henry B. Underwood, John Bragdon, Rev. Harry Brickett, a second time, (to the historical sketch of Hillsborough written by Rev. Mr. Brickett we are indebted for much of the early history contained in this account.) A. J. Quick, Rodney J. Mooney, D. W. Goodale, F. W. Burrows, and Charles L. Storrs Jr. Rev. Mr. Storrs came in 1901, remaining until August 1904.

The church was without a settled pastor, until Rev. Christopher R. Hamlin was recently settled.

Two excellent memorial windows were put in the church recently, one by F. B. Dutton in memory of the Dutton family, the other by Henry Dutton in memory of the Hatch family. The present membership of this society is about 100 resident, and 40 non-resident members.

We will now go back to the original church at Hillsborough Center which we left destitute of a pastor in 1839. The following year Rev. Geo. W. Adams was installed pastor of the society, remaining until 1844. Following him were several pastors who remained a longer or shorter period, and with varying success, up to 1859. For a period of two years following this date methodist preachers were employed, and a revival enjoyed under Rev. Mr. Hatfield. This ultimately resulted in the building of the Methodist Chapel. Some

bitter feeling was manifested, but under Rev. John Adams, who took charge of the Congregational Society Jan. 1, 1861, remaining until his death May 18, 1879, the church again became well established. Succeeding Rev. Mr. Adams, licentiates from Theological Seminaries, or the pastors of the Bridge Church, filled the pulpit for several years. Rev. R. J. Mooney was settled as pastor in 1884, remaining until 1887, when he was succeeded by Rev. Paul E Bourne. He was in turn succeeded, in 1894 by Rev. Samuel Eaton. The present pastor, Rev. Wm. France, followed Rev. Mr. Eaton in 1898.

The third meeting house erected was burned June 19, 1892, and the present edifice erected during the fall and spring succeeding. It was dedicated Aug. 15, 1893. Ten years later \$300 was laid out in repairs and improvements on the church. The parsonage was repaired in 1898, costing \$200. The noble record of this pioneer religious institution in Hillsborough is one to do credit to the devoted men and women who aided in laying its foundations, and to the long list of its faithful adherents who have formed its pillars throughout the succeeding generations.

BAPTIST CHURCH AND SOCIETY.

A Baptist society was formed in town very early in the century, and a meeting-house, located between the Upper and Lower Villages, was erected in May, 1813. The first society was composed of sixteen members. Many different pastors were here employed for a long period of years but no services have been sustained for a long time, and the old landmark is now falling in decay. In 1837 an Independent

Baptist Church was organized, and Rev. John Atwood, who came to the church the same year, become pastor of the Independents.

METHODISM—HILLSBOROUGH BRIDGE.

The doctrines of Methodism were first preached at the Bridge by Daniel Lee and Eleazer Jordan, and the first permanent organization of the church was effected about 1837. Between 1837 and 1839 the church edifice was built on the corner of what are now known as School and Pleasant streets, Lewis Howard being pastor. The building committee was composed of Thomas Howlett, Levi Goodell and Jas. Currier. The members at this time were Levi Goodell and wife, Oliver Colby and wife, Martha Graves, Adelaïne and Mary Craine, Barow Howe, Mrs. Albert Richardson, Abigail Keyes, Mrs. Gilbert, and two Wilder girls. In 1861 the church was removed to its present site on the village square, Daniel Wyman and J. H. T. Newell acting as committee. Later, in 1890, the edifice was extensively remodeled, Joseph Manuel being pastor.

The church has enjoyed marked periods of growth under Moses Chase, VanBurschoten, J. A. Bowler, J. Manuel, and T. E. Cramer.

The membership now numbers 136. There is no incumbrance of debt, and the church is generally prosperous, with a bright future before it.

HILLSBOROUGH CENTER M. E. CHURCH.

This church was organized by William F. Hatfield, and

the present building erected in 1861. Previously students from Concord Biblical Institute had held Sunday services regularly, and from this work there resulted scores of conversions. In recent years the church has suffered losses from deaths and removals until now the membership is only 24. Among the pastors who served this church were Amos Kidder and J. A. Bowler. Among the first members were Benjamin H. Gay, Ann B. Gay, William E. Gay, Mary J. Gay, E. J. Dunbar, Mrs. A. Dunbar, Mary A. Danforth, Mr. and Mrs. Levi Emery, James Jones, Sarah Kimball, Alden Newman, Nancy Newman, Nicholas Robbins, Lydia C. Robbins, Mr. and Mrs. Jonathan Ray, Albert and Alfred Shedd, Lewis Vickery, and John Cram.

CATHOLIC CHURCH.

The Catholics in Hillsborough for many years were attended by the pastors of neighboring parishes who visited the town as one of their missions. Rev. Edmund E. Buckle, now of Nashua, celebrated the first mass said in town in Patrick Sullivan's house in 1881. For a time he came from Peterboro on a week day about once in every three months, holding service in Odd Fellows' Hall. Rev. P. L. McEvoy and Rev. E. J. Furlong of East Jaffrey said mass once a month. Oct. 7, 1892, Rev. David W. Fitzgerald was appointed the first resident pastor. Under his administration St. Mary's Church and parochal residence were built and St. Patrick's Church in Bennington. In Hillsborough there are about forty Catholic families and a Catholic population of 250. Bennington, Antrim, Greenfield, Hancock, Henniker and

Francestown are attended from Hillsborough, the entire Catholic population being 190 families, about 1,000 people. The present pastor is Rev. Joseph Corcoran.

EDUCATIONAL ITEMS

Hillsborough, from the commencement of its permanent settlement, has paid commendable attention to the education of its children. The early schools were widely scattered, but were largely attended. Some schools then contained sixty pupils, where now there are less than one-fourth that number. Gradually the Bridge district has increased, while the rural districts have diminished, or have become absorbed in more prosperous adjoining districts.

The rural schools of today, although not attended by a large number of pupils, are doing excellent work, and offer good advantages for laying the foundation for an advanced education in the village high school and our numerous colleges. It need not be said that anyone, determined to obtain an education, need remain ignorant, so long as that one possesses health and brains.

HILLSBOROUGH, OR VALLEY, ACADEMY, AND HILLSBOROUGH HIGH SCHOOL

About the year 1820, there was a wide-spread fever, both in New Hampshire and Vermont, for establishing incorpor-

ated academies, with or without invested funds. Hillsborough Academy was incorporated by act of the Legislature, in 1821. The first teacher was Dr. Simeon Ingersol Bard, of Francestown, who had received his diploma from Dartmouth the same year. He was young, even boyish in appearance and of small stature, but strong in mental ability and scholarship, which gave a high tone to the new institution. He was followed by Rev. Wm. Clark, D. D., of Amherst, and a classmate of Dr. Bard. Rev. Samuel W. Clark succeeded his brother, in 1823, remaining one year. The next principal was Rev. Jonah Peabody, following whom, in turn, were Robert and Solomon H. Reed, brothers, both of Dartmouth; Benj. F. Wallace, Esq., another teacher of note; Rev. Ephraim Taylor; Albert Baker, Esq., and F. B. Mussey.

The academy was at first located in a brick building at the Lower village. Having at length done its work there, it reappeared at Hillsborough Centre, under the instruction of Rev. Elihu Thayer Rowe, Dartmouth, 1840. He was a practical and thorough teacher, but died in 1867. Others swayed with credit the educational sceptre on the hill, and the academy did good work there for many years. In 1864, taking the name of Valley Academy, it reappeared at Hillsborough Bridge as a private school, under the auspices of Rev. Harry Brickett, assisted by his wife. There were then about 120 students.

In 1876, Valley Academy reopened with a fall and spring term, the winter and summer terms being in the same building, under the same teachers, and known as the Union School. Rev. Harry L. Brickett, son of the former principal, and a

graduate of Oberlin College, 1875, was then principal, assisted by Miss Ellen J. Brickett, a graduate of the same college. They taught four terms a year from 1876 to 1879, with the best of success. In the fall of 1879, Dr. Frank P. Newman became principal with Miss Mary E. Whittemore assistant. In 1880, Mr. B. F. Hurd, of Bates College, came here as principal and remained three years, when he was succeeded by Geo. A. Dickey.

VILLAGE SCHOOL DISTRICT

An elegant new school building, with four departments, was erected soon after Mr. Dickey came to the school. This building was constructed by the village precinct and accommodates all grades of the special district. Succeeding Mr. Dickey as principal of the high school, was Dana G. Marble. Mr. Marble died during the school year, and his term was finished by Harry Lovering. W. S. Scruton was the next principal, then Elbridge Copp, who remained seven years; Prof. Pringle, Chas. Tracy, and the present incumbent, Rufus D. Barton. Mr. Tracy was a superior instructor and did excellent work in the school. Mr. Barton came here from Windsor, Vt., in the fall of 1900, and has proven a faithful and efficient teacher. The assistants during the present school year are Misses Helen G. Gilman and May L. Harlow. Miss McFadden is principal of the grammar school. A corps of nine teachers are employed in the village schools. These several grades are attended by nearly 300 pupils, a few of whom are tuition students from the town district.

In 1890, three new rooms were added to the village

school building at a cost of \$5,000. The schools of Hillsborough Bridge have had the attention and care of many of the most able men of the village. Dr. M. H. Felt served on the board for 21 years, 18 of which he was chairman, and to the work which he performed, and to that performed by other men and women who have so ably served on the board of education, is due much of the success attained by the local schools.

PROFESSIONAL MEN

LAWYERS.

Hillsborough has been from the first the home of distinguished lawyers. Among the first practitioners was David Starrett, a native of Francestown, a graduate of Dartmouth in 1798, and a law student of Hon. Samuel Bell of Francestown. He opened an office in Hillsborough in 1802, remaining ten years, at the end of which time he mysteriously disappeared and was never since heard from.

John Burnham succeeded him in 1812. He was a Dartmouth graduate, and had studied in both Mr. Bell's and Mr. Starrett's office.

David Steele, born at Peterborough, Sept. 30, 1787, graduated at Williams College, in 1810, and opened an

office at Hillsborough, at the Bridge Village, in 1813. He was a useful man, both in society and in the church.

John McFarland opened an office at the Upper Village in 1815, but died four years later.

Timothy Darling, Harvard 1822, opened an office in Hillsborough in 1826, remaining just one year.

Hon. Franklin Pierce opened an office at the Lower Village in 1827 (see personal sketch).

Albert Baker, a very popular lawyer, graduated at Dartmouth in 1834 after which he read law with Hon. Franklin Pierce, and opened an office at Hillsborough in 1837.

Other eminent practitioners who have located in this town have been Samuel H. Ayer, who was sometimes pitted against Hon. Franklin Pierce at the bar. George Barstow, a native of Haverhill, a man of good mind and scholarship, who succeeded rather as a man of letters than as a lawyer. Francis B. Peabody, who remained but a short time. Francis N. Blood, a Hillsborough boy, had an office at the Lower Village. He was a good lawyer and an upright and honorable man.

Hon. James F. Briggs, of English parentage, an ex-member of Congress, practiced at the Bridge for several years, until his removal to Manchester. Chas. A. Harnden succeeded Esq. Blood.

Brooks K. Webber succeeded Esq. Briggs and was a popular and successful practitioner here for many years. A B. Spaulding, of Lyndeborough, began to practice here the latter part of 1876, remaining but two years. Willis G.

Buxton studied law with Brooks K. Webber and in the Boston Law School.

Samuel W. Holman, now a judge of the police court, has been in practice here for a long period of years, he studied law with Hon. Mason Tappan, of Bradford, Attorney-General of New Hampshire.

Col. Frank H. and Kirk D. Pierce, brothers, located at the Lower Village. The former received a United States appointment and left the town. Kirk D. has become one of the leading advocates of the state, and remains a valued citizen of Hillsborough. J. Millard Newman, son of James Newman, removed to Chicago. Wm. M. Holman, a Boston University graduate, opened an office at the Bridge Village in August, 1900, and J. M. Barton opened an office about one year ago.

PHYSICIANS.

The number of men who have commenced the practice of medicine in this town may almost be called legion. Previous to 1840 there were eleven, as follows: William Little, Joseph Monroe, Benj. Stearns, Joshua Crain, Luther Smith, Reuben Hatch, Mason Hatch, Thomas Preston, Simeon Ingersol Bard, Nahum P. Foster, and Abraham H. Robinson. Many of these deserve special mention for their ability and skill in their profession, but our limited space forbids.

In 1841 Abel C. Burnham opened his office at the Center but soon removed to the Bridge, where he practiced for nearly half a century with unswerving success.

Dr. John Goodell succeeded Dr. Hatch in 1859, since

which time he has been a constant and successful practitioner. Dr. J. Q. A. French came soon after Dr. Goodell, and settled at the Upper Village where he has since remained, receiving a large circle of patronage. Dr. Israel P. Chase, homeopathic, practiced in town thirty years or more. He once published and edited *The Hillsborough Messenger* very successfully.

Dr. Marcellus H. Felt came about 1876, since which time he has been one of the leading physicians. Dr. W. W. Griffiths came about ten years ago, died in 1904. Dr. W. P. Grimes, a native of Hillsborough, is a successful practitioner. Dr. B. D. Peaslee is an eye specialist and practitioner. Dr. W. H. Abbott came here from Bradford about one year ago.

DENTAL SURGERY.

Hillsborough has been distinguished for practitioners in the art of dental surgery. Drs. S. Ball, Frank P. Carey, and Dr. Whittle, were all successful practitioners in this line. Dr. Frank P. Newman and Dr. S. O. Bowers have each been in practice for many years. Dr. Elgin M. Bowers, son of S. O. Bowers, is now practicing in his father's office.

THE PIERCE FAMILY

The name of *Benjamin Pierce*, an honored Governor of New Hampshire of the olden time is familiar to all readers of history. He was born in Chelmsford, Mass., Dec 25, 1757. His father (Benjamin) died when this son was but six years old. Benjamin Jr., was brought up by his uncle, Robert Pierce, of Chelmsford, to work on a farm, and when the news of the battle of Lexington came he left the field where he was plowing, took his uncle's gun and started for the scene. His military record is one to do credit to any man. At the close of the war he had received a lieutenant's commission. He removed to Hillsborough, after the return of peace in the thirtieth year of his age. He was soon appointed brigadier-major by the Governor. In 1789, he was chosen to represent Hillsborough and Henniker in the Legislature, and served in that capacity for thirteen years successively. In 1803, General Pierce was chosen one of the Governor's Council, continuing in that capacity for five years. He filled other high public offices, and in 1827 was elected Governor of the State, and was re-elected two years later. He remained in public service until his death, April 1, 1839, at the age of eighty-one years, during fifty-five years of which he had been constantly employed in some public office. This tribute we find paid to his memory: "He was patriotic, brave, noble-minded and charitable; a benefactor to his country and a blessing to his State and society."

Such, in brief, was the life of the father of Hon. Franklin

Pierce. The Governor was twice married, the first time in 1787, his wife living but a little over a year, and gave birth to Elizabeth A., who married General John McNeil, the hero of Lunday's Lane. He next married Anna, daughter of Benjamin Kenrick, of Amherst, in 1789. They lived in married life fifty-one years. She was the mother of eight children, among whom were Nancy, the wife of Gen. Solomon McNeil; Hon. Franklin Pierce, and Harry Dearborn Pierce, the father of Col. Franklin H. and Kirk D.

Franklin Pierce was born at Hillsborough, N. H., Nov. 23, 1804. His early youth exhibited great mental promise and he attended the schools of Hancock, Frankestown and Exeter, and in 1820, entered Bowdoin College. Here he graduated four years later in the famous class of 1824.

He spent the three following years in the study of law at North Hampton, Mass., and at Amherst. In 1827, he was admitted to the bar and opened his office in his native town, where his success was seemingly phenomenal, but largely because his application was equal to his ability. He espoused the cause of Democracy with great zeal. He was chosen to represent Hillsborough in the Legislature for five years, the last two of which (1832 and 1833) he was Speaker of the House. During his second year as Speaker, being then in his twenty-ninth year, he was elected to represent his native district in the U. S. Congress, and in 1837, he was chosen U. S. Senator. He resigned in 1842 and came home to Concord and resumed his profession as a lawyer. He declined several high offices, including the nomination for Governor, and a seat in President Polk's Cabinet. His rapid rise in the legal

profession and in politics was due, not to any underhand action, but by a firm adherence to political principles, eloquence in debate, capacity for public business, uniform courtesy, and an exhibition of frankness and manliness of character.

When the Mexican War broke out in 1847, Mr. Pierce was among the first to enlist as a private soldier, but was soon commissioned brigadier-general. He led his gallant forces at Contreras, Cherubusco, Molino, and Chapultepec, sharing with them the honors of victory. He was received with great honors upon his return to New Hampshire, being presented with a splendid sword by the State Legislature. After his return he resumed the practice of law. In 1852, the N. H. State Democratic Convention recommended him as a candidate for the presidency, but he declined to allow his name to be used in that relation. However, the National Democratic Convention, which met in Baltimore in June, 1852, after forty-nine ballots, gave him the nomination by a vote of two hundred and eighty-two against eleven.

His name aroused great enthusiasm and he was elected over General Scott, the whig candidate, receiving 254 electoral votes, against 42 for Scott.

President Pierce was inaugurated at Washington, March 4, 1853, in the forty-ninth year of his age. Concerning his administration we will not speak here.

On retiring from the Presidency, he visited Europe, being everywhere received with marked attention and respect. President Pierce died childless. His wife was Mary A. Appleton, who gave him two sons, Benjamin and Frank, the lat-

ter died when but a child, and Benjamin was killed in a railroad accident near Andover, Mass., soon after his father's election as president. Mrs. Pierce died in 1863, and President Pierce passed away Oct. 9, 1869. The family lie buried in Concord.

Mr. Kirk D. Pierce's home is located at Hillsborough Lower Village and is famous for its paintings, books and bric-a-brac that have descended to him through a long line of distinguished ancestry, as well as for the hospitable and courteous treatment, which all his guests receive.

Mr. Pierce has maintained the reputation of his family in the legal line, having been intrusted with several very important cases, which he has handled successfully. He has the reputation of being a very eloquent speaker.

HILLSBOROUGH BRIDGE VILLAGE FIRE PRECINCT.

Hillsborough Bridge Village Fire Precinct was established June 26, 1886, for the purpose of installing and maintaining an efficient fire department, and other village improvements. The first meeting was presided over by M. H. Felt, and F. E. Merrill was chosen clerk which office he has continued to hold. Three fire wards, now termed "commissioners," were chosen as follows: Edwin B. Morse, R.

Childs, and L. W. Gallond. The present board of commissioners consists of Hiram J. Page, A. J. Van Dommele and James Sullivan (deceased). Wm. O. Story is treasurer.

The excellent system of water works was installed by Goodhue & Bernie, of Springfield, Mass.; and was purchased by the precinct Jan. 1, 1897, and a board of water commissioners instituted by special act of legislature, Feb. 23, 1897. The report of Feb. 15, 1904, shows there were then 40 hydrants in the village, and 351 service connections. Commissioners are elected to serve five years each, one being elected each year. The present board consists of W. O. Story, (term expires 1909), I. H. Baker, (1908), J. B. Smith (1907), Geo. E. Wyman (1906), and Chas. A. Jones (1905); J. B. Smith, Chairman; W. O. Story, Supt. Water is brought from Loon Pond, situated at the center of the town, to a reservoir located on Bible Hill for reducing the pressure which is now 80 pounds, producing a power sufficient to furnish protection to the highest buildings in the village district.

HILLSBOROUGH ELECTRIC LIGHT & POWER CO.

Hillsborough Electric Light & Power Co. was incorporated during the year 1894, and started operations December 1. of that year, Lights were put in at the Bridge village, and at Henniker at this time but the line was not extended

to the lower village until two or three years later. The power-house is situated on the Contoocook river about midway between the Bridge and Henniker village, just over the line into Henniker and is under the care of H. J. Smith, Elec. Eng. The power at the falls here is sufficient to produce much more power than is now being used for lighting purposes. This plant is the property of a private company, among the principal stockholders of which, at the time of organization, were Col. James F. Grimes, Henry Emerson, Dr. John Goodell, D. H. Goodell, W. D. Forsaith, Harvey Jones, J. S. Butler, H. C. Colby, and G. W. Lincoln. The officers of the company at the present time are Dr. W. P. Grimes, Pres. and Treas.; Dr. John Goodell, Vice Pres.; and W. D. Forsaith, Clerk,

THE FULLER PUBLIC LIBRARY.

Mark Fuller, at his death, left in his will the sum of \$2,000 for the use of a free library in Hillsborough, on condition that enough of the interest be used to keep in repair the family burial lot in the cemetery between the Lower and the Upper villages. The board of trustees was to consist of the board of selectmen, *ex-officio*, together with two other members. Organization was soon after made, a number of books purchased, and a library room fitted up. Willis G. Buxton was appointed librarian. Mrs. Fuller, at her death, made a substantial addition to the amount left by her hus-

band, but so far no liberal minded man or woman has presented the town with a suitable library building. The library is located in Butler's Block, on School Street. There are in the library at the present time about 4500 volumes, comprising a very good assortment of fiction, and some good works of reference. Mrs. Herman G. Brown is librarian.

PATRONS OF HUSBANDRY.

Valley Grange, Number, 63, was organized at Hillsborough Bridge, June 26, 1875 with 25 charter members. Edgar Hazen was chosen the first master, serving three years, or until 1878, when he was succeeded by J. Q. A. French for two years. Succeeding masters have been: Jesse T. Bailey, 1880-81; Isaac Smith, 1882-83; Mark M. Hadley, 1884-88; Fred W. Flint, 1889-90; John Goodell, 1891-92; Osman B. Huntley, 1893-94; Leonard F. Martin, 1895; Laura E. Huntley, 1896; M. M. Hadley, 1897; Geo. W. Merrill, 1898; Fred A. McClintock, 1899-1902; Alton C. Colby, 1903; and Alma C. Wellman, 1904-05. The present membership of this grange is 139. The list of officers chosen for the present year consists of: Alma C. Wellman, Master; Almira C. Watson, Overseer; Fred A. McClintock, Lecturer; Jessie A. McClintock, Secretary; L. F. Martin, Treasurer; and minor officers.—Account furnished by the Secretary.

Hillsborough Grange, Number 274, located at the Upper Village, was organized with sixteen members in March, 1899. Stillman McClintock, Mark M. Hadley, Warren S. Huntley, and Martin Whitney have served as masters; Mr. Whitney being the present incumbent. The other leading officers for 1905 are: Warren Huntley, Overseer; James Temple, Lecturer; Miss Jennie E. Vickery, Secretary; and Arthur Whitney, Treasurer. The society now numbers thirty-nine, and is steadily increasing in numbers and prosperity.

It should be borne in mind that this plan does not include the names of all former residents of this town, as the names of the non-residents appear only when one or both of the parents are still living in the town. After the name of each non-resident will be found the present address, when such address has been given to us. Non-residents are indicated by the (*).

When a daughter in a family has married, her name taken in marriage appears after her given name in parenthesis, the name preceded by a small m, thus: (m).

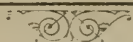

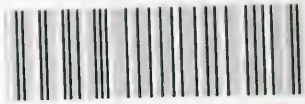
