Brooking, of New Westminster, who served with the first Canadian contingent in South Africa, returned home last night and received a deservedly hearty welcome. Private Brooking's parents reside, at Winnipeg, and being unexpected his appearance at the paternal residence en route was a loyf al surprise to his relatives. Inferviewed at the Peniric Otty, Pre-Brooking said that he was in all the fighting participated in by the first con-tingent up to the battle of Paardoberg, where he was wounded.
