THEIR SECOND NATURE

## AL DAVIES TO HEAD SEATTLE BOXING BILL

Along With Earl Baird Will Supply Feature Bout at S. A. C. Smoker

Seattle, Nov. 15.—Some of the best amateur boxers in the Pacific Northwest are booked to tangle at the big opening fall smoker of the Seattle Athletic Club next Friday night. The card announced by Pat Scott, boxing instructor of the S.A.C., contains more real talent than has been brought together at one time in an amateur show here for a long time.

Topper of the card is Al Davies, champion of British Columbia, in the 125-pound class, and Earl Baird, 125-pound Pacific coast champion, of the S.A.C. When these boys tangle there should be some classy boxing, as they are undoubtedly the best at their weight in the West, and each has been training hard for the bout.

In the semi-final, Ralph Underwood, 115-pound far western champion, of the Midtown Athletic Club of Portland, will oppose Bob Harper, 108-pound far western champion, of the S.A.C. Harper will be giving away several pounds in weight, but he is confident that he will administer a severe lacing to the Rose City visitor despite his handicap.

Tom Loutitt, of the Multnomah A.C., will tackle Bill Pierce of the S.A.C., in the 115-pound division. Elmer Quinn, Chet McIntyre's pride, is scheduled to hook up with Lonnie McIntosh, the clever S.A.C. lightweight, Frank Pauley, 115 pounds, is another one of Chet's boys who will be on the programme. He will meet an opponent as yet unselected, but who will be the best man at the weight that Scott can obtain.

There will be two other boxing bouts on the card besides two wrestling matches between S.A.C. and Multnomah A.C. members.

Frank Patrick Signs Terminal Star and Acquires Services of Montreal Man

Confirming reports of the past few days that negotiations for the acquisition of Dr. Gordon Roberts, former star of the Wanderers of Montreal, and announcing the receipt of the signed contract of Lloyd Cook, the first Vancouver player to affix his signature to a 1916-17 contract, Frank Patrick, manager of the Millionaires, left Vancouver for Spokane bubbling over with enthusiasm over the outlook for the coming season. He has gone over to the Inland Empire to discuss plans with Brother Lester and incidentally to give the new Spokane plant the once over. A couple of deals may be consummated while he is in the city of baseball champions, but he declined to discuss pending trades. President Patrick has announced November 29 as the date on which the first practice will be held.

## WELSH AND KILBANE TO MEET AT TOLEDO

Lightweight Title Will Be at Stake in 15-Round Battle for \$10,000 Purse

Toledo, Ohio, Nov. 15.—Freddie Welsh, lightweight boxer, has agreed to meet Johnny Kilbane, champion featherweight, in a 15-round bout for \$10,000 in this city.

Officials of the Toledo Athletic Association have received word from Harry Pollok, Welsh's manager, agreeing to meet Kilbane if Welsh is permitted to weigh 135 pounds at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of the bout. The official immediately called Jimmy Dunn, Kilbane's manager, on the telephone, and he tentatively agreed to this proposal.

It is planned to hold the bout in the Terminal Auditorium about the middle of December. Seating arrangements for 15,000 spectators can easily be arranged.

The city officials say they will push the contracts to completion this week if possible.

## SOCCER MEN FORM SENIOR DIVISION

Six-Team League Will Open Its Schedule With Game Next Saturday

Victoria's soccer men have got together at last, with the result that a six-team senior league has been formed with the Wests, Navy, Garrison, Bantams, Yukon contingent and the V. I. A. A. as members. The V. I. A. A. will play out its schedule in the intermediate division, and will have no senior fixtures until the completion of the matches in the former division. The organization of the new division was effected at a meeting of the Victoria and District Football Association last night when a large number of soccer enthusiasts were present. The teams will get down to business immediately, and the first game will be played between the Wests and Bantams at Beacon Hill next Saturday afternoon with P. C. Payne officiating. On the following Wednesday the Navy and Garrison will meet on the Canteen grounds. The drawing up of the schedule will be completed at next Wednesday's meeting. It was suggested at the meeting that the Red Cross should be invited to take up a collection at the senior games in aid of the fund.

## COAST AMATEURS MAY PLAY FOR ALLEN CUP

Plans Being Laid for Series to Decide Who Will Travel East

If the present plans of the Northwest amateur hockey enthusiasts do not go amiss, an amateur team will go East for the Allan Cup when the winter of the series to be played in Seattle between the amateur champions of each of the four towns—Spokane, Seattle, Portland and Vancouver—will travel to Winnipeg next spring after the trophy that is emblematic of the amateur hockey championship of the world.

Plans are now under foot to stage a big amateur hockey carnival in Seattle about March 1, when the winners of the amateur series in Vancouver and the winners of the amateur series in each of the other towns in the P.C.H.A. circuit will gather for a play-off. The leagues which may compete are the Vancouver City Amateur Hockey Association, the Spokane Amateur Hockey Association, the Seattle Amateur Hockey Association, the Portland Amateur Hockey Association, Seattle, Portland and Vancouver are in favor of having a play-off for the Coast amateur hockey title, although the newly formed Spokane organization has not yet been heard from.

Savage will have to find berth on his club for Loughlin, Marples and Irvin, the Winnipeg amateurs, there is a strong possibility of the deal for Johnson going through.

Right now Savage, the Portland boss, is better off for hockey players than any other manager in the league. Besides Johnson he has Harris, Murray, Dunderdale, Harbour, Ukisla, Marples, Loughlin, Irvin and Tobin. Harbour and Ukisla were substitutes on last season's squad.

President Patrick is in Spokane this week discussing plans with Brother Lester. The latter is lining up his talent for the coming campaign, and as he has always had a contender, there is every reason to believe that Spokane will start the season with a formidable appetite. Pete Muldoon is gathering his players under his wing, and as he will have the majority of last season's men available he is not worrying.

## EASTERN LADIES TO PLAY HOCKEY AGAIN

Montreal, Nov. 15.—The Maisonneuve Ladies' Hockey Club are making great arrangements for the coming winter, and are already arranging games in Ottawa and Toronto and New York. The Maisonneuve ladies have been asked to go into an Inter-City league, consisting of two teams from Ottawa, two from Cornwall and two from Montreal, and the organizers of the Inter-City league are making arrangements for a six-club body. Manager Thompson, of the Maisonneuve ladies, however, does not think that it is a good proposition, and does not think that it would pay. He thinks the only safe way is to play home and home games like last year.

## DETROIT TEAM HAS LARGE NEW ARENA

Will Have Spacious Ice Surface; Many Players in Line for Coming Season

Detroit, Nov. 15.—Detroit's hockey team will have splendid new quarters this season in a spacious, modern rink, and the patrons of the winter sport will be privileged to see hockey contests without having to go to an out-of-the-way part of the city to satisfy their cravings for the sport.

The new rink will have a hockey space of 200 feet in length and 90 feet wide and has a seating capacity of about 2,500 for the games.

Detroit has many players from which to draw on for his septet this season and another big year is expected. In addition to Captain Johnson, Black, Hammelef, Shaw, Jack Skelly, Kennedy and Reid, there are many players from across the border who now are residing here who no doubt will come out for the team. Among the newcomers might be mentioned Elmer Irving, who has played hockey in Cleveland for several seasons.

With conditions much improved for the proper care of the puck chasers this year, an even better team should be turned out than the fine aggregation Detroit boasted last season.

## FULTON LOOKS LIKE LOGICAL CONTENDER

Rochester Giant Has Shown Great Improvement During the Past Year

New York, Nov. 15.—Fred Fulton, the "Rochester Giant," intends to prove to a doubting world before many months have passed that he would be against Jess Willard or any other heavyweight. Although Fulton has been held cheaply in some quarters because of his lack of real experience, the attenuated heavyweight has shown such great improvement since he last appeared in this city that many critics, especially those in the Middle West, now rate him as being one of the most promising contenders for the heavyweight title.

With arrangements under way for a bout between Fulton and Frank Moran at St. Paul, speculation is rife among ring fans as to what chance Fulton would stand with the Pittsburgh man. The impression is general that Fulton would more than hold his own, for he has a destroying left hand punch, against which Moran would find it difficult to set up a defence. Fulton, furthermore, has improved vastly in ring generalship, has taken on weight, and has been thoroughly "seasoned."

## MORE BRITISH STARS KILLED IN ACTION

Every Branch of Sport Represented Among Names in Latest Casualty Lists

London, Nov. 15.—As the result of sniping and night raids by bombing parties on the western front, the names of several well known athletes are added to the already long list of British sportsmen who have been killed and wounded in action.

A. E. Sutherland, killed, was one of the best known Scottish athletes. He was runner up to W. R. Sutherland, the Scottish athlete and rugby international, in the 1911-12 Scottish border 100 yards championship. He occupied a like position in the 320 yards championship in the latter year when he was only overtaken at the post, and in 1913 he was chosen as Edinburgh University's second string in the 220 yards for the Scottish Inter-university sports.

A well known cricketer has also made the supreme sacrifice in E. B. Myers, of the Surrey Country Club. C. T. Cobbold, the famous Cambridge oarsman, killed in action, rowed in the Catus College boat in the Thames cup at Henley in 1913 in the memorable dead heat against Marlow. Catus were just beaten in the row-off half an hour later. A. C. Clark, dead of wounds, made his name famous in athletic circles in and around Bristol and was also a member of the Bristol Rugby Club. Lieut.-Col. H. S. Poynts, the well known Somerset County cricketer, has been badly wounded.

Capt. A. R. Gibb, killed, is the twelfth international athlete of Scotland, who has died in the war. He was a noted cross country runner and taking to the track he won the four miles championship of Scotland and the four miles race against Ireland in 1906. Two famous English soccer players have also fallen, P. McGuire, the brilliant Manchester City fullback, and J. M. Foster, of the Sunderland club. James Ferguson, the Scottish League footballer of the Third Lanark Club, and a splendid sportsman, has also laid down his life.

## CHANCE PASSES UP BIG LEAGUE BERTHS


"Peerless Leader" Refuses Attractive Offer From Owners of Cubs and Pirates

Having won the Pacific Coast league championship with his Los Angeles team, Frank LeRoy Chance has declined offers from two National League clubs, it is said, for the reason that he prefers to remain in California. Chance has just signed a new contract to handle the Angels and will receive a large salary, together with a percentage of the profits. It is common gossip that he could have managed the Cubs or Pirates next year. In fact baseball sharpshooters say that Owner Weeghman of the Cubs offered to pay Chance \$20,000 a year if he would return to Chicago, while Barney Dreyfuss was prepared to sign the peerless leader for a similar amount if he would agree to succeed Jimmy Callahan. But Chance made such a big success on the coast this year that he concluded to remain at the head of the Los Angeles club, at least for another season.

Chance would have restored the National League's popularity in Chicago if he had accepted the Weeghman proposition. Chicago baseball fans have not forgotten the way he won championships with the Cubs when they were controlled by Charles Webb Murphy. Weeghman and his friends figured on the engagement of Chance some time ago, and when he refused their terms they were greatly disappointed. But Chance, it is understood, after first regarding the Chicago offer with some favor, decided to turn it down because he believed that he would not be permitted to run the team with absolute authority. He had heard stories of interference with Tinker and he did not care to experience similar treatment. Furthermore, Chance is one of Tinker's closest friends, and he did not feel like standing in the way of the latter's possible re-engagement.

Chance also was opposed to forcing Callahan out of a job, it is said, and as soon as he heard from Dreyfuss he wired a refusal of the Pirate's figures. VANCOUVER HONORS CAPT. BELL-IRVING

Address Presented to Airman Who Won D. S. O. and Military Cross

Vancouver, Nov. 15.—Due honor to one of the most gallant of Canada's war heroes and homage to a native son of Vancouver, who alone of the hundreds of thousands of Canadians enlisted in the only one to win both the coveted D. S. O. and the Military Cross, was paid yesterday when Captain Malcolm Bell-Irving, a flight commander of the Royal Flying Corps, who has just returned from England on leave of absence to recuperate from wounds sustained in thrilling aerial duels, was presented with an illuminated address by Mayor Malcolm McBeath on behalf of the citizens of Vancouver.

POLES SOON WILL ENJOY AUTONOMY

Russia Reiterates Promise; Proclamation of Austro-Germans of No Effect

Petrograd, Nov. 15.—Russia's intention to create a Poland which shall embrace all Polish territory and to maintain it on a basis of autonomy under Russian sovereignty remains unaltered, says an official announcement issued to-day denouncing the Austro-German proclamation of an independent Polish state as an effort to swell the ranks of the Teutonic armies. The statement reads: "The German and Austro-Hungarian governments, taking advantage of the temporary occupation by their armies of a portion of Russian territory, have proclaimed the separation of Polish districts from the Russian empire and their constitution as an independent state. The object of our enemies evidently is to obtain an addition to their armies. The imperial government regards this action on the part of Germany and Austria-Hungary as a fresh gross infringement by our enemies of the fundamental principles of international law which prohibit the population of a military-occupied territory being forced to raise armies against its own country."

Honolulu, Nov. 15.—A regular Honolulu-Japan commercial service was inaugurated to-day by the wireless telegraph company here with messages sent by President Wilson and other prominent men from Bolinas Ridge, near here, via Honolulu, to the Emperor of Japan and other dignitaries in that country.

A WOMAN GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

Toronto, Nov. 15.—Mrs. Mary Davies, of Kilmount, Ont., who was tried at Lindsay on a charge of murdering Fred Spenceley, was found guilty of manslaughter at midnight last night.

THANKSGIVING DAY IN U. S.

Washington, Nov. 15.—The usual Thanksgiving Day proclamation will be issued from the White House within the next few days.

Teachers for Alberta

Teachers with requisite qualifications are still in strong demand for Alberta schools. British Columbia trained teachers submitting Academic, First or Second-Class certificates receive regular standing, while those submitting Third-Class certificates who have taken both preliminary and advanced training receive Third-Class standing for two years. Prevailing salaries in rural districts vary from \$700 to \$800 per year. The Department is prepared to assist teachers in securing positions, especially in rural schools.

A WARNING REGARDING U-BOATS IN ATLANTIC

Providence, R. I., Nov. 15.—The Merchants' & Miners' steamship Howard reported on arrival here to-day that when off Block Island before daylight she had been warned against German submarines by a British cruiser describing herself as "A.B.M.C." It was reported at first that a submarine had been discovered waiting off the coast of Southern New England, but when the Howard docked an inspection of the wireless she had received showed it to be a general warning addressed to all shipping against German undersea vessels, which it was said might be met "anywhere in the Atlantic ocean."

NOT AN OFFICIAL PROTEST TO BERLIN

Lansing Explains Instructions Sent to Charge About Deportations of Belgians

Washington, Nov. 15.—Announcement last night of the state department's action in instructing American Charge Grew, at Berlin, to communicate with the German foreign office on the subject of the deportation of Belgians to do forced labor in Germany, brought out a flood of inquiries to-day for details and explanation of the department's action.

AMERICANS INVESTIGATE FRAUDS IN ELECTIONS

Washington, Nov. 15.—Investigation of election frauds was discussed briefly to-day at a conference between President Wilson and Attorney General Gregory. Mr. Gregory declared that his investigation will be separate from the one proposed by the senatorial committee.

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SWEDISH, BRITISH, DANISH SHIPS SUNK

London, Nov. 15.—The sinking of the Swedish steamship Astrid, formerly the pleasure steamer Saga, by a German submarine is reported in a Reuter dispatch from Stockholm. The Astrid was on her way from Stockholm to Raumo, Finland. Her crew was saved. Lloyds' Shipping Agency reports the sinking of the Danish steamship Ragnar, of 2,123 tons gross, and the British steamship Polpend.

BULGARIANS WERE DISPERSED BY BRITISH

London, Nov. 15.—Reporting military operations in Greek Macedonia, a British official statement issued to-day, says: "Dolran front—An enemy concentration at Krastali (3 1/2 miles southwest of Dolran) was shelled heavily and dispersed yesterday."

TRIAL AT BRANDON

Brandon, Nov. 15.—A true bill was returned to-day against W. A. Rosebrough, charged with attempting to murder his wife by shooting. The trial commenced this afternoon.

NEW YORK CENTRAL ATTACKS 8-HOUR LAW

New York, Nov. 15.—The New York Central railroad to-day filed suit in the federal district court to test the constitutionality of the Adamson eight-hour law. The suit is directed against the three federal district attorneys of New York state and the chairman of each of the four brotherhoods in the state. The road's principle is, according to Albert H. Harris, general counsel, that the Adamson law "is in no sense a regulation of commerce, but a temporary and arbitrary increase in wages for the brotherhood men."

TRIAL OF GRAVES IN AMERICAN CAPITAL

Washington, Nov. 15.—The preliminary hearing of Karl Armgard Graves, self-styled international spy, charging with attempting to extort \$3,000 from Countess von Bernstorff, wife of the German ambassador here, was postponed to-day until Dec. 6 at the request of the United States attorney's office. When Graves, with his lawyers, appeared before U. S. Commissioner Taylor, the prosecution announced that the testimony of Prince Hatzfeldt, counsellor of the German embassy, with whom Graves dealt, was essential. The prince, however, may not appear without permission of his government. It may be two weeks before permission is received.

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
