# PREFACE

NEARLY sixty years have passed since the late Mr. H. E. Chetwynd-Stapylton published the first instalment of his well-known Eton School Lists which covered, when completed, the period from 1791 to 1892. Though the number of books dealing with Eton which have been produced in the intervening years has not been small, no attempt has been made to issue an earlier biographical register of Etonians. Nor need this fact call for any great surprise. Mr. Stapylton had taken the date 1791 as his starting-point for the very sound reason that this was the first year in which it had occurred to anyone at Eton-and we owe the idea to William Hexter, the ingenious writing-master of the day-to put into print the School-list which was annually compiled at Election time. By a curious coincidence, too, the earliest entrance-books known in Mr. Stapylton's time to exist were those of Dr. Heath, who became headmaster at the end of that same year. Thus, in the absence of printed school lists and entrance-books, the task of editing a register was none too easy.

Yet an earlier register was certainly to be desired, if Eton were not to fall behind other schools in this respect. Before, however, such a work could be undertaken, it was necessary to see if sufficient foundations existed upon which to build it. From direct sources in print little help could be gained. It is true that, with the usual enterprise of an Eton bookseller, Joseph Pote had compiled and published his *Registrum Regale* in 1774, of which a later edition, edited by his grandson, Edward Pote Williams, appeared in 1847; it is true too that Thomas Harwood had published his Alumni Etonenses in 1797,<sup>1</sup> yet notwithstanding the comprehensive title of that work, like the Registrum Regale it included only the biographies of such scholars as had proceeded from Eton to King's College, Cambridge. To a very slight extent these books had been supplemented by Creasy's Biographies of Eminent Etonians (1850), Jesse's Memoirs of Celebrated Etonians (1875), and Mr. A. C. Benson's Fasti Etonenses (1899). The valuable biographical notices contained in Mr. Lionel Cust's Eton College Portraits (1912) were not yet in existence when the editing of the present Register was begun.

More assistance was, however, to be derived from manuscript sources. In the first place there existed in duplicate, in the possession of the Provosts of Eton College, and King's College, Cambridge, respectively, a MS. register of Admissions to the foundation at Eton dating from 1661. In addition to the christian names of the scholars, this volume gave the date of their baptism and the parish in which it took place. Secondly, there had survived a considerable number of MS. school-lists, some in the possession of Eton College, and others in the hands of various private owners. Of these Mr. Stapylton, after taking copies of all those to which he could gain access, had finally bequeathed his collection of transcripts to the Library at Eton College. As a rule these lists contained nothing but the bare surnames of boys.

A preliminary step before compiling any register was to complete as far as possible the collection of MS. school-lists before 1791. Several years passed in a search for such lists—a search which, if tedious in the main, had its occasional moments of compensation, when, for instance, it was possible to claim for Eton a list of 1706 lying in the British Museum and long attributed to Westminster School. The result of my search for these lists was published in 1907. I had been able

to bring together a complete series of annual lists, with the exception of one year, from 1753 to 1790, and a fair number of earlier lists, which were, however, by no means for consecutive years. It was, therefore, not very difficult to decide that any contemplated register should embrace the years from 1753 to 1790, for which period it would include practically all who had been at the school, except some few boys who had stayed for only a half or two; whereas had I attempted to take it further back the register must have been far less complete.

With the period of the register thus fixed, my next step was to arrange in alphabetical order all the names contained in the lists, adding the years during which they appeared therein. This task, which was carried out for me by Mr. Murison, the Corrector of the Eton College Press, was laborious, but on the whole easy, owing to the fact that boys usually retained the same relative positions in the school; yet it had its occasional difficulties when boys changed their names while at school, or after being oppidans became collegers, or when there were many boys of the same name. For instance, it has proved an almost impossible task to disentangle the various boys of the name of Smith, though I have had better fortune with the owners of the names of Brown and Jones.

Accordingly, I found myself confronted with some three thousand surnames, which all needed to be identified before it was possible to give any notes on the subsequent careers of their possessors. For, out of the three thousand, only the names of boys with titles and of the collegers offered any obvious means of identification.

Fortunately certain discoveries had been made, since my work began, which tended to make this part of the task less difficult than at one time seemed likely. In the first place, while looking through the shelves of the College Library I had come across—possibly discovered, for no one seemed aware of its existence a parchment-covered volume containing, with other information, a list of names which proved to be those of the boys admitted by Dr. Barnard, headmaster, between the years 1754 and 1765. In addition to the surname, Dr. Barnard gave, as a rule, the christian name, the date of entry, the name of the dame, and the amount of the entrance fee. This discovery made the task of identifying some 1100 boys much easier than had previously seemed probable. Still the ease was only comparative, and varied largely with the name. For instance, while it might be fairly easy to identify Thomas Watkinson Payler, it was obviously far more difficult to be certain about a boynamed John Jones or William Smith. Unfortunately, too, even headmasters sometimes nod, and Dr. Barnard not only at times entered the christian name wrongly, but now and then forgot to enter any christian name at all, and it is an annoying fact that he was particularly careless in the case of the family of Smith, for out of twelve Smiths, in five cases he gave no christian name.

Unluckily the discovery of Dr. Barnard's entrancebook was not followed up by that of the entrancebooks of his two successors, Dr. Foster and Dr. Davies. That they must have existed one can hardly doubt, but they may have been regarded as the headmaster's private property, and for that reason never have been placed among the archives of the College.<sup>1</sup>

Another discovery, not quite so important as the first, has now to be recorded. In addition to the MS. Register of Admissions to College, already mentioned, a collection of rolls of paper was brought to my notice by the present Bursar, which proved to be the certificates of baptism deposited by each successful candidate for election to a scholarship at Eton College with the object of proving that he was of statutory age. These certificates, which were copies from the parish registers, contained in nearly every case, in addition to the facts given in the MS. Register of Scholars, the name

(and often the status) of the father and sometimes even the maiden name of the mother.

To identify the remainder of the boys who had not been admitted under Barnard, or been upon the foundation, or possessed a title, it was necessary to search in more indirect quarters. One very valuable source of information lay in the Registers of Admissions at several of the colleges at Cambridge, where it has been the custom to record the schools from which the undergraduates came. These registers had been published in the case of Gonville and Caius College and of St. John's College (down to 1767) before I began my work, while those for Christ's College, Peterhouse, and Trinity College have appeared in more recent years. Moreover, in every case except the last, full biographies of the names recorded have been compiled wherever possible. By this means, as I most gratefully acknowledge, I have been provided in many cases with a short cut to all I wanted, and for selfish if for no other reasons I can only regret that the largest and richest foundation of all has hitherto taken the least trouble in following up the careers of its *alumni*.

With regard to the other Cambridge colleges, by the kindness of the various authorities I have been able to search the registers at Sidney Sussex College, which also gives the schools of its undergraduates, and of Emmanuel College, Clare College, and Trinity Hall, which record them for short periods, while the late Master of Magdalene College, Dr. S. A. Donaldson, sent me a list of the Etonians from his register.

Yet another college, or rather university, which records under the admission of its members the schools at which they were educated, is Trinity College, Dublin, and through the kindness of Mr. T. U. Sadleir I have been furnished with a list of such Etonians as are to be found in its register.

Unfortunately no similar custom prevailed at Oxford, and there is thus far less certainty in identifying Etonians who proceeded to that university.

Further means of identification are to be found by searching through the columns of the *Dictionary* of

National Biography for instances where the subject is said to have been educated at Eton; and through the Eton Parish Register for boys who died while at the school, and were buried there. Again, considerable help has been afforded by notes appended to the names on some of the old school-lists. Thus the list, printed in the Gentleman's Magazine of January 1832, for the year 1781, though attributed to 1779-80, contains some very valuable notes. Many notes, too, are to be found in the MS. collection of lists for 1762 to 1769, belonging to Mr. G. E. Lloyd-Baker, as well as a few in the Roll for 1769 belonging to Sir William Portal, and in that for 1765 belonging to the late Mr. V. F. Tufnell. Nor must Stapylton's Eton School Lists be forgotten in the cases of boys who overlap into his period.

Another source deserving mention is the lists of Stewards of the Eton Anniversary, a function which flourished from 1787 onwards. The initials prefixed to the names as advertised in the public press of the day often assist in identifying their owners. Then, again, a fair sprinkling of Etonians is to be discovered in such works as Nichols' Literary Anecdotes of the Eighteenth Century, and in his Illustrations of the Literary History; in Angelo's Reminiscences, and his Pic-nic (the preface of which provides us with the interesting identification of Repkombe); in the 'Eton Characters' to be found in the World newspaper for 1787; and in the rambling preface to G. M. Berkeley's Poems. In addition there are the chance references to Etonians to be found in countless Memoirs, and the details supplied by the living in regard to ancestors who were at Eton. No source of information is to be despised. A name cut in the Upper School or even on the block, or written on the fly-leaf of an old school-book, if the initials of the christian names and a date are added, may often establish the identity of what otherwise would be nothing but a surname. Again, a bequest in the will of John Ranby, a wellknown surgeon, to his grandson, a boy at Eton, gives

us the christian name of the boy Waring. Unfortunately all clues are not of equal value, and I have not been able to identify either Power or Llewellyn on the strength of notes saying that the former was 'an Irish gentleman,' and that the latter 'died in Wales of a damp bed.'

Thus, in one way or another, it has been found possible to identify a very large proportion of the names, and had I stopped with the identification my task would have been accomplished much more quickly. But the standard for school and college registers is constantly rising, and it seemed desirable that an Eton Register should be at least as complete as that of any other school. Accordingly I have done my best to record the careers of all Etonians within the period, though naturally in many instances I have failed to find any particulars. For the purpose I have made great use of such books as Burke's Peerage, Burke's Landed Gentry, the Admissions to the various Inns of Court, the Army Lists, and that invaluable treasurehouse of biography, the Gentleman's Magazine. Nor has any book been more helpful than that stupendous achievement, Foster's Alumni Oxonienses. Great is my regret that the promised volumes of Alumni Cantahrigienses were not available for my purpose. To many it will perhaps seem that I have wasted my time by giving details easily accessible in various publications. But others, I hope, will excuse me for trying to make the register as complete in itself as possible.

In the absence of any certainty, I have often indulged in conjecture. According to the laws of chance, a proportion of these guesses must be wrong, and I can only claim by way of excuse that, first, I have in nearly all cases had some reason for the conjecture perhaps for instance the boy's father had been at Eton or his son came to Eton, or the date of matriculation or admission at the University coincides with that of his leaving Eton, or he was a subscriber to *Musae Etonenses*—and, secondly, that such conjectures are almost always marked by a 'perhaps' or a 'probably.' I cannot pretend that I have observed any particular proportion in the length of the biographies. I have not, for instance, attempted full accounts in the case of men so famous as the Duke of Wellington or Charles James Fox. Undistinguished men have often been given longer notices than their merits deserved. Indeed the length of the notice has often depended more on the amount of information discoverable than upon anything else.

A word or two may perhaps be said as to the arrangement according to which the names appear.

In editing school-lists there are three possible plans : (I) to keep to the form of the school-list; (2) to keep the names in the order in which they appear in the entrance-books; (3) to arrange the names in alphabetical order. The first plan is perhaps the natural one to adopt where a single list is being annotated, or where lists are few and far between. It was adopted by Dr. Butler in his edition of the early Harrow lists, and also by Mr. Chetwynd-Stapylton in his Eton College Lists, and by the Old Etonian Association in the registers for which that body has been responsible. But except for the fact that it is a convenient arrangement for enabling one to see what has happened to boys in one's own remove, it is an unsatisfactory plan, entailing much repetition of names, much waste of space, many cross references, an ugly appearance, and a very complete index. There would have been no point in following such a plan in the present register.

The second plan was also out of the question, owing to the absence of entrance-books for two-thirds of the period.

There remained therefore the alphabetical plan, which has at least one advantage, namely that it renders any full index of names unnecessary.

A difficulty, however, arises with regard to boys who afterwards changed their names. For those who did so while at school, cross references are provided, and in the case of those who changed them subsequently, I have done my best to get over the difficulty by giving supplementary indexes. With reference to the former class it is something of a triumph, though largely a matter of luck, to have discovered that the Aldworth of 1759–1762 is the same as the Neville of 1763–1767; that the Osborne of 1753–54 becomes the Ranby of 1756 to 1760; that the Pittman of 1779–80 is identical with the Coppin of 1781; and the Jefferson of 1782–84 with the Sergison of 1785.

Unfortunately no book of this sort can possibly claim to be complete, and I am well aware that there are few persons into whose hands these pages may fall who will not be able either to supplement or to correct the information herein contained. Indeed, a further and more prolonged search in the columns of the *Gentleman's Magazine*, in the Army Lists, or among the Wills at Somerset House would without doubt have elicited additional details, and it is only by pleading that I have already spent a considerable amount of time over the work, and by taking refuge in that comfortable, if cowardly, French proverb that *le mieux est l'ennemi du bien*, that I venture to commend this book with all its faults of commission and omission to the indulgence of my fellow Etonians.

There remains the pleasant task of attempting to acknowledge my numerous debts. To begin with, I must thank Mr. Wasey Sterry for unselfishly placing at my disposal such biographical notes as he had collected in the course of his Eton researches, as well as for urging me to undertake this register. In addition to all the use that I have made of the Complete Peerage and the Complete Baronetage of G.E.C., I am deeply indebted to the Hon. Vicary Gibbs, who is now re-editing the Peerage, for looking through my proofs and saving me from many a blunder; for such errors as have subsequently crept in, he is in no way responsible. Without the continuous and unstinted assistance of Mr. V. L. Oliver my notes on the many boys of West Indian connexion would have been sadly deficient. Similarly my friend the late Colonel W. Gordon McCabe, the president, and Mr. W. G. Stanard, the secretary of the Virginia Historical Society, have helped me in every possible way with regard to the biographies of the American boys who, coming 'home 'for their education, chose Eton as their school. I have been fortunate, too, in being able to draw on the unrivalled stores of the Rev. A. B. Beaven's knowledge for such Etonians as sat in Parliament or held any office of State. Mr. R. F. Scott, the Master of St. John's College, Cambridge, has furnished me with almost everything I could want relating to Etonians at his College, while Mr. T. U. Sadleir has supplied me with notes about those at Trinity College, Dublin, and Mr. F. L. Clarke with details about Etonians who proceeded to King's College, Cambridge.

I am grateful to the Provost and Fellows at Eton for granting me at all times access to the information contained in the shelves of the College Library; also to the Bursar for bringing to my attention the baptismal certificates of the Collegers. Further, my thanks are due to the authorities at the several colleges at Cambridge who have allowed me to search their registers of admission; to Dr. J. Venn and Mr. J. A. Venn for help in the case of various Etonians afterwards at Cambridge University; to the Dean of St. George's Chapel, Windsor, to the Rector of Clewer, and to the Vicars of Eton and St. Mary's, Slough, for permission to search their registers; to Mr. G. E. Lloyd-Baker for the use of the notes in the early MS. school-lists in his possession; to Mr. A. E. Hamilton, of Messrs. Spottiswoode, Ballantyne & Co., Ltd., for his careful reading of the proofs for press; and to Miss A. Brandstaetter for much clerical and personal assistance.

To the many other correspondents who have helped in individual cases, I wish to place my thanks on record.

THE period covered by the register is full of interest. It is hardly too much to say that, with the exception of the close of the sixteenth century, for which we possess Malim's invaluable Consuetudinarium, it is not till the second half of the eighteenth century that we are at all familiar with life as it was lived by the Eton boy. For the seventeenth century we possess little information beyond the meagre curriculum of Dr. Mountague, and the few references in the Boyle and the Barrett correspondence. Again, the records for the first half of the eighteenth century are scanty in the extreme, and scarce exceed the rumours of a serious rebellion under Dr. George. Horace Walpole, who might have told us so much, contributes but little to our enlightenment. Even the two letters recently brought to light, written while he was a boy at Eton, contain little else than proofs of the affection which Walpole bore to his mother.1 But in the epoch with which we are dealing the case is very different, and thanks to the careful and laborious account of Eton discipline given by Thomas James, thanks to the more racy hints contained in the Nugae Etonenses, and to the lengthy characters of Etonians in the World newspaper, as well as to such Reminiscences as Henry Angelo's, and to numerous letters still extant, it is not difficult to realise the kind of life lived by the Etonian of that day. Indeed, the Eton which emerges in 1790, with its year divided by three regular periods of holidays, with its complicated time-table constantly upset by the arrival of a Saint's day, with its system of dames' houses already beginning to be encroached upon by the assistant masters, is not so very unlike what the oldest Etonians of to-day can still remember.

Again, the period is notable for the new position which Eton assumed among public schools. In 1753, so far as size went, Eton was running a neck and neck race with her ancient rival, Westminster. The inspiring personality of Dr. Barnard brought

her numbers up from about 300 to over 500, and though they fell as low as 250 in 1775, when they were once more inferior to those of Westminster and almost surpassed by those of Harrow, yet under the careful rule of Dr. Davies they soon forged ahead, and at the end of the century were superior to those of any other school.

Indeed, the year 1765 may be taken as the high-water mark of the century. With 522 boys Eton was relatively far larger than she is to-day, that is to say if we take into account the population of the British Isles then and now. It is true that her scholars on the foundation were still limited by the ancient statutes to boys born in England, Wales, or the Channel Isles-that is to say to the English possessions of her founder-but no such limitation existed in the case of oppidans. Thus, while the difficulties and the expense of travelling limited most schools to the boys living in their immediate neighbourhood, Eton, owing to the wealth of her clientele, had a large connexion among the leading families of Scotland and Ireland. Moreover, she attracted a considerable number from the West Indies and a sprinkling from the American colonies. The presence of boys from America is particularly interesting; but it must be remembered that, at the beginning of the period at any rate, the leading families of America still looked on England as their 'home.' We shall see that most of the Americans who came to Eton belonged to the southern colonies, that is to Maryland, Virginia, and South Carolina. The reason for this is partly that it was to the southern colonies that many of the younger branches of the aristocracy had emigrated, and partly because the gentlemen of Virginia, and South Carolina in particular, were able more easily than their northern countrymen to realise money through the sale of their crops of tobacco, rice, and indigo. Further, the American colonies were practically devoid of public schools. The colleges of Harvard and Yale, then almost as much schools as universities, were too far distant from the southern colonies, while the College of William and Mary in Virginia lay. under the suspicion of improving neither the morals nor the learning of its students. Thus the easiest method for the southern gentry was to ship their sons off to England in the same vessel that carried a cargo of tobacco, and leave them there until they had finished their course at a school and a university, and perhaps rounded it off by a call to the English Bar.

A study of the names to be found in the register will show what a cosmopolitan state English society had reached. In

addition to the native English, Welsh, Scottish, and Irish, we find French names represented by the Huguenot families of Amyand, Bosanquet, Garnier, Garrick, Giraud, Luard, and Portal, to mention but a few; German names by Brinckman, Schutz, Pollnitz, Blomberg, and Wagner; Dutch by Keppel, Vansittart, Vandeput, Vanneck, Dedel, and Coussmaker; Italian by Angelo and Dominiceti; Swedish by Lindegren; Spanish by Casamajor; and Swiss by De Salis and Noverre. Of the boys from America we find Virginia represented by such well-known families as Burwell, Fitzhugh, Grymes, Lee, Randolph, Wormeley, Spotswood, etc.; South Carolina by Huger, Lynch, and Trapier; Maryland by Dulany and Tilgh-The West Indian names are almost too numerous to man. mention, but prominent among them are those of Byam, Duer, Gunthorpe, Husbands, Redwood, Storer, Verchild, and Whitehorne.

Viewed from another aspect the society at Eton was decidedly more democratic than it is to-day. Whilst, on the one hand, Eton was never so full of representatives of the leading families as it was under the *régime* of Dr. Barnard, on the other hand it was still the practice for Eton and Windsor tradesmen to send their boys to the famous school which lay at their doors. Moreover, the advantages of the foundation attracted boys of humble origin from the outside world. Thus tradesmen of the following description are to be found sending their sons to Eton: printer, hosier, vintner, ballet-master, coal merchant, shipwright, mercer, bricklayer, draper, packer, poulterer, cook, baker, druggist, tea-man, etc.

It remains to enumerate a few of the walks of life in which Etonians distinguished themselves. The Army is represented by Wellington, Cornwallis, Hutchinson, and Simcoe; the Navy by Duckworth, Williams, and Ogle; the Church by Sumner, Beresford, Moss, and Simeon; politics by Fox, Canning, Grey, Melbourne, and Windham; scholarship by Porson and Wellesley; literature by Hallam and Frere; poetry by Hayley; painting by Beaumont; music by Bates; science by Bankes; medicine by Pepys; the stage by Fennell and Young; and fashion by Brummell and Hanger.

In reading the various biographies one may almost say that there were few events in the history of those times in which Etonians had not a hand. Thus, to take but a few instances, Lynch became one of the signers of the American Declaration of Independence; Grieve was notorious for having been the friend of Marat and the persecutor of Madame du Barry; whilst

Fanshawe became governor of Kieff and died a Russian senator. Others, again, met with misfortune, deserved or undeserved: Lord George Gordon died in gaol, Palmer was transported to Botany Bay, and Fitzgerald was executed. But no career appears to have surpassed in variety that of Combe, the author of *Dr. Syntax*, who is said to have been in turn 'a common soldier, a waiter at Swansea, a teacher of elocution, a cook at Douai College, and a private in the French army.'

There is little that need be said with regard to the three provosts who held sway during this period. Neither Stephen Sleech, 1746-65, nor William Hayward Roberts, 1781-91, was a man of any particular brilliance, while Edward Barnard, 1765-81, seems to have used the position as a place of rest after his strenuous years as headmaster.

Nor is there much more to be recorded of the Fellows, of whom nearly all had moved entirely in the narrow worlds of Eton and King's College. The election, indeed, of Thomas Barnard, who belonged neither to Eton nor to King's, and who had spent some years of his life in the Barbados, was almost an outrage, and must be imputed to the influence exercised by his brother who was at that time Provost. Similarly the election of William Roberts, son of another Provost, to so comfortable a sinecure, at the age of twenty-five, although of Eton and King's, comes as something of a shock, especially when we find that in order to qualify he had to procure his M.A. degree from Lambeth.

Of the three headmasters—for Sumner's rule was practically finished when our period opens—who were responsible for the teaching and discipline of the school, Barnard was by far the most notable. His outstanding merit, helped perhaps by the fact that he had been private tutor to the sons of so important a person as Lord Townshend, caused him to be appointed headmaster, although he was neither a King's man nor an assistant. His success is proved by the fact that the numbers of the school nearly doubled during the eleven years of his rule, and that he maintained order over his turbulent kingdom without the occurrence of a single riot or rebellion so far as we know. To govern five hundred boys with the absurdly small staff at his command, and before the days of organised games, must have been a severe test, but Barnard emerged with a reputation which was denied to his successors Foster and Davies. It is said that Barnard urged that Foster should be appointed as his successor, and if this be true, it is hardly a proof of the former's good judgment. For, admirable scholar as he was, Foster seems to have lacked the prestige and authority necessary to success. It is true that his apologists have suggested that he was unlucky, in that the storms which had been silently gathering under Barnard burst as soon as the latter had resigned. But judging merely by results Foster must be written down a failure. In just over seven years the numbers had dropped to less than half what they were under Barnard, and there had been the serious rebellion of 1768, when so many boys had marched off to Maidenhead. Nor was the reign of Davies uniformly happy. There were grave disorders in 1783, when it was thought that the headmaster would be compelled to resign, but he weathered the storm, and on his election to the provostship at the end of 1791 was able to hand over the school to his successor with the numbers brought up to 400.

The assistants were uniformly confined to King's men. Their number, which was eight in the earlier part of the century, but which had declined to six by 1745, rose with the numbers in the school, being increased to eight in 1754, and to the high-water mark of ten in 1760. The number fell to seven in 1773, but rose to eight again in 1788. The occasion in 1783, on which, in the language of to-day, they 'downed' gowns and went 'on strike,' only returning to duty because of a rebellion by the boys, is described by Sir H. C. Maxwell Lyte.<sup>1</sup>

#### TUTORS

In the period covered by the Register it seems to have been the general rule for every boy to have a tutor.<sup>1</sup> The ordinary boy had for tutor one of the assistant masters, while some of

the richer boys had private tutors, whom they either brought with them, or found already living at Eton. Boys with private tutors did not usually have an ordinary tutor as well, but the two Latouche brothers were an exception to this rule, having Baker as private tutor in addition to Goodall as ordinary tutor. There are few opportunities of discovering the tutors of boys at Eton in the eighteenth century, apart from the list of Eton College in 1788.<sup>1</sup> There is also a MS. list of 1780, giving boys down to end of remove with their tutors, in the MS. collection of school-lists in the College Library.

#### PRIVATE TUTORS

Four lists of these are in existence, viz. :

(1) For 1763-66, given in Frankland's version of Nugae Etonenses.<sup>2</sup>

(2) For 1781, printed in the Gentleman's Magazine for Jan. 1832.

(3) For 1787, printed in the World newspaper 29 Sep. 1787.<sup>3</sup>

(4) For 1788, in an MS. school-list.<sup>4</sup>

In a few other cases we happen to know who the private tutor was, *e.g.* that Philip Francis was tutor to C. J. Fox, and Bower to Lord Glasgow.

Besides the private tutors who actually came to Eton with their pupils, it seems to have been the practice for some tutors to set up at Eton and to make a profession of taking pupils. Thus in the list of private tutors given in *Nugae Etonenses*, we find Rice tutoring both Dutton and Hanger, and Macleod tutoring White, Carnegie, etc.

William Cole, who was an assistant from about 1778 to 1779, then resigned and became a private tutor. On the other hand, Edward Barnard went straight from the position of private tutor to that of headmaster without ever having been an assistant at all.

#### DAY-BOARDERS

In addition to the oppidans boarding at dames, there were a considerable number of day-boarders from Eton and Windsor who presumably lived at home, although usually possessing a

dame at whose house they had their meals and spent the time during which they were not in school or playing games.

Such boys belonged to two very different classes : one composed of the sons of rich parents, perhaps with some official position at Windsor, e.g. Brudenell and the Tickells; or of the sons of wealthy people living in the neighbourhood, e.g. the Chesshyres and the Holders; or of the sons of parents who had come to Eton or Windsor for the express purpose of educating their sons, e.g. Lowry and Gervais, both from Ireland.<sup>1</sup>

The second class were those who were the sons of local tradesmen, e.g. Chartres, Delavaux, Doble, Foster, Goldwin, Such boys frequently got into College very young, and etc. succeeded by seniority to King's College, Cambridge, at the expense of cleverer boys who got on to the foundation at a more mature age. This is one reason why in old days King's College produced comparatively few men of real distinction. In later times this class of boys became colloquially known as Eton or Windsor ' birds.' 2

#### FEES

Dr. Barnard in his entrance-book is usually careful to give the amount of the entrance-fee. The usual fee was  $f_{2-2s}$ . but the sons of wealthy parents often gave three, four, five, and up to ten guineas. On the other hand, poorer boys often gave one guinea or nothing. All the entrance-fees went to the headmaster. The amount of the fee is sometimes a help towards identifying the boy, especially when it was a large one.

#### DAMES

In the period covered by this Register, with but few exceptions, such Eton boys as were oppidans boarded at dames' houses. This had been the custom from very early times, for even in 1479 we find William Paston mentioning his 'hostess.' Indeed, there were probably 'dames' long before there were assistant masters. In the latter part of the eighteenth century. however, the practice of assistants taking boarders was gradually creeping in. Probably these were taken at first as private pupils, and at a much higher fee than boys were in the habit of paying to their dames. Evidence of this is to be found in the

account-book of William Hayward Roberts who, while he was assistant, from 1759 to 1771, had always some half-dozen boarders living with him and paying about £100 per annum, at a time when the usual charge of a dame was but £25.<sup>1</sup> Besides the oppidans, every colleger had a dame allotted to him, who tended him when he was sick, and at whose house he could find temporary refuge from the noise of Long Chamber.

For the period under review we can construct a fairly complete list of the dames—or dominies as they were called when they were of the male sex. In the first place Dr. Barnard in entering the boy's name nearly always added his dame. Next after Barnard's day we find lists of dames given in *Nugae Etonenses*, c. 1763-67; others can be gleaned from an extant day-book (c. 1771-74) of Thomas Pote, the Eton bookseller, for he entered the dame of each boy who made a purchase at his shop; there is yet another list of dames given in the *World* newspaper of 29 Sep. 1787; and, finally, there is a MS. school-list giving most of the boys at Eton in 1788 with their dames and tutors.<sup>2</sup>

The following is a list of the dames between 1753 and 1790, many of whom, although spinsters, were styled 'Mrs.':

- ARDEN, Miss, c. 1758–72. The house (part of Baldwin's Shore) was kept by two or three sisters, the daughters of George Arden of Ombersley, co. Worcester. One sister married Robert Carey Sumner, headmaster of Harrow.
- BAGWELL, Miss, c. 1754-69. Several sisters of this name lived at Gulliver's.

BARNARDISTON, Mrs., c. 1751-58. She lived at Baldwin's Shore.

- BLAND, Mrs., c. 1739-58. Perhaps Susanna Bland, a niece of Provost Bland; she married William Kimber, a doctor, of Windsor. As a dame she probably lived at Weston's.
- BROOKLAND, Miss, 1783-87. She was Elizabeth, daughter of William Brookland, an attorney at Windsor. She was niece of Miss Tyrrell (q.v.); b. 1745, buried at Windsor 3 Dec. 1787. She lived in the house next to the Corner House.
- DAVIES, Mrs., c. 1763-96. Margaret, sister of Jonathan Davies, headmaster of Eton 1773-91; she lived at Evans'; she was buried at Eton 10 Nov. 1796.
- DUCKWORTH, Mrs., c. 1758; remained for a very short time. She may have been the wife of the Rev. Henry Duckworth, a minor canon of Windsor.

- ELLY, Mrs., c. 1756-74. Elizabeth Elly was the widow of Mr. John Elly, 'haberdasher of hats,' and was buried at Eton 23 June 1774. She occupied a house on the site of the New Schools.
- EVANS, Mr., c. 1747-66. Evan Evans, dominie and writingmaster; buried at Windsor 21 Dec. 1777.
- GRAHAM, Miss, c. 1756-67. Mary and Frances were the daughters of Dr. Andrew Graham, private tutor at Eton, by Jane, daughter of Jane Elliot, a boarding dame. Their brother George was an assistant at Eton. They lived in the northern half of the Corner House.
- GREGORY, Mrs., c. 1750-85. Prince Gregory, one of the clerks of St. George's Chapel, Windsor, who was perhaps a son of Richard Gregory, the Eton College cook, married Mary Barnard, of Windsor. Mrs. Gregory and her daughter Lucy between them kept this house, the mother dying at the end of 1770. They lived in the southern half of the Corner House.
- HANNINGTON, Mrs., c. 1771-95. She was presumably the widow of J. Hannington, a sugar-baker from Barbados, and probably came to Eton to be near her son who was at Eton 1770-77. She died 27 Dec. 1807 at Hanwell, Middlesex, in her 88th year. She lived in the northern half of the Corner House.
- HARDING, Mr., c. 1756–1805. Brian Harding, who was probably a relation of Timothy Harding, college cook (d. 1698), held this house and was succeeded by Elizabeth Harding. Brian Harding was a draper and maltster. He lived at Baldwin's End.
- HARRINGTON, Miss, c. 1787-93. Sarah Harrington, perhaps a connexion of Mr. Harrington who was a private tutor at Eton, c. 1765. She died in 1811, leaving her money to her niece Sarah Roberts, of Windsor.
- HARRIS, Mrs., c. 1758-1792. Mrs. Harris was widow of George Harris, who was elected a Fellow of Eton in 1731. She died at Eton 25 Aug. 1783 and was succeeded by her daughter Catherine. They lived at Weston's.
- HEATH, Miss, c. 1790. The Misses Heath were probably sisters of Dr. Heath the headmaster. They probably lived in a house on the site of the New Schools.
- HIRD, Mrs., c. 1744–93. Mary Hird, probably née Huggins, succeeded her sister Mrs. Hopkins as dame. She died 19 Mar. 1785 and was succeeded by a Mr. Hird. They lived at Baldwin's Bec.

- HUGHES, Mrs., c. 1788. Perhaps Elizabeth Hughes, who died in 1790.
- HUNTER, Mrs., c. 1788–1804.
- JOHNSON, Mrs., c. 1754-57.
- KEY, Mrs., c. 1752-71. This was probably Martha, daughter of Jane Wogan, boarding-dame. She married the Rev. Thomas Milward Key, minor canon of Windsor and vicar of Upton, who died in 1760. She had a son at Eton 1760-72, and she died 17 Feb. 1805, being buried at Langley. She lived at Godolphin's.
- Long, Mr., c. 1752-63. Henry Long, boarding-master, was buried at Eton 24 Sep. 1759; his wife or daughter may have then kept the house.
- MANBY, Mrs., c. 1771–1800. Possibly Judith, wife of Edward Manby, of Amersham, surgeon. According to Henry Angelo she had been a Miss Harding. She lived at Baldwin's Shore.
- MILWARD, Mrs., c. 1758–1771. She had a very fashionable boarding-house.
- NAYLOR, Miss. (1) c. 1763-71, Mary Naylor. (2) c. 1775-94, Rachel, daughter of the Rev. Farmer Naylor, by Mary, daughter of Mr. Hanson, registrar of Eton College; she succeeded her sister Mrs. Mary Young, at the Manor House. She was buried at Eton 7 April 1797.
- NEWMAN, Mr., c. 1756-74. Mr. George Newman, boardingmaster, was buried at Eton 14 Dec. 1774.

NEWTON, Mrs., c. 1751-82; lived at Gulliver's after about 1770.

Pote, Mr., the Eton bookseller; he took boarders occasionally.

- PRIOR, Mrs., c. 1737-71. Several members in turn of this family, which was descended from Edmund Prior, the college porter, kept a boarding-house. The Rev. John Prior, assistant 1760-89, was of this family. His two daughters married Dr. Goodall, headmaster, and Thomas Thackeray, respectively. The Priors owned the house at the southeast corner of Keate's Lane.
- ROBERTS, Miss, c. 1772. Probably some relation of W. H. Roberts, provost.
- SPEED, Mrs. She was buried at Eton 19 Nov. 1755; she was perhaps a daughter of Mr. Will Speed buried at Eton 3 Sep. 1709.

- STURGES, Mrs., c. 1760-72. She was probably a relation of Thomas Sturges, Fellow of Eton, who died in 1751. She lived in part of Savile House.
- THACKERAY, Mrs., c. 1771–1809. She was Ann, daughter of John Woodward, the Eton College butler, and widow of Thomas Thackeray, headmaster of Harrow. On her husband's death she returned to her early home at Eton and kept a fashionable boarding-house. See Lady Ritchie's *Miss Angel*, chap. xxiv. The family lived in the house in Keate's Lane next to Prior's.
- TYRRELL, Miss, c. 1751-83. She was sister of William Tyrrell, clerk of the peace for the county of Berks. She was succeeded by her niece Miss Brookland (q.v.). They lived at the house next to the Corner House.

WEDGBOROUGH, Mrs., c. 1751-63. She lived at Evans's.

- YONGE, Mrs., c. 1751-1791. Mrs. Frances Yonge, who was probably a sister of Dr. Cooke, headmaster and fellow, held the house till her death in April 1779. She was succeeded by her two daughters Catherine and Frances, who died in 1804 and 1782 respectively. They lived at Jordley's.
- Young, Mrs. etc., c. 1728-75. Mrs. Mary Young was the daughter of the Rev. Farmer Naylor, by Mary, daughter of Mr. Hanson, the Eton registrar. She married on 18 May 1725 Bartholomew Young, an assistant at Eton, who died in 1732. Of her two children Edward Young, assistant at Eton 1753-63, married in 1760 Alicia Cooper, the natural daughter of Henry (Fox) 1st Lord Holland, through whose influence he became successively Bishop of Dromore and Bishop of Ferns; her daughter Catherine married the Rev. Septimius Plumptre, vicar of Mansfield. Mrs. Young lived at the Manor House, Eton, and was the best-known dame of the eighteenth century.

#### ETON CHRONOLOGY, 1753-1791

- 1753. The wall of the Long Walk coped with stone.
- 1754, May. Edward Barnard, a private tutor, becomes headmaster.
- 1755. The summer holidays changed from Whitsuntide to the month of August.
- 1756, July. Robert Allgood drowned near Sixth Form Bench.

- 1757, 26 Nov. Christopher Bateman, an Eton boy, dies owing to the alleged neglect of the Eton apothecary.
- 1758. In the school-list taken at Election, the fifth, fourth, and third forms are each headed by a duke.
- 1759. The date of 'Montem' changed from the first Tuesday after 23 Jan. to the Tuesday of Whitsun week. The attic storey in the Fellows' buildings begun.
- 1761, 10 June. The numbers of the school reach 500.
- 1762, 25 Sep. George III pays his first state visit to Eton.
- 1763, Sep. William Whitaker Kent dies of scarlet fever, by which the boys get a week's holiday.
- 1765. The great clock moved from the north side of the Chapel and placed in Lupton's Tower.

Dec. John Foster becomes headmaster.

1766. Great battle between Eton boys and the butchers of Windsor as a result of which William Windham is taken away from the school.

A new Eton parish church built.

1767. Three medals presented by Sir John (? Sir David) Dalrymple for the best exercises produced by the sixth, fifth, and fourth forms.

George Hayter, the 3rd boy in the school, expelled for insolence to Dr. Foster.

- 1768, July. The King of Denmark attends Election.
  - 2 Nov. Trouble over the rights of præpostors. March of the Eton boys to Maidenhead.
- 1769, May. The Lord Chancellor (Lord Camden, an old Etonian) presented, on his visit to Eton, with a Latin poem by the captain of the school.
- 1771. Benjamin Heath, an Eton assistant, appointed headmaster of Harrow School.

Lord Wellesley migrates from Harrow to Eton.

- 1773, July. Jonathan Davies becomes headmaster.
- 1774. The prime minister (Lord North, an old Etonian) attends speeches on Election Monday.
- 1775. Rule made that 'Montem' should be celebrated only once in three years.
- 1776, 13 Dec. Day of fasting ordered in connexion with the British reverses in America; a deep impression is made thereby on the mind of Charles Simeon, then a boy at Eton.
- 1778. The King and Queen attend speeches at Election. Thomas James, an Etonian, appointed headmaster of Rugby School.

### INTRODUCTION

- 1781, 3 Dec. Dr. Barnard dies. 12 Dec. William Hayward Roberts appointed provost.
- 1783, Nov. The assistants resign; riot of boys; the assistants return to duty; eighty boys flogged; all boys go home at the beginning of December.
- 1786. The Microcosm, the first school journal at Eton, begun.
- 1787, 19 May. The Eton anniversary dinner inaugurated. Nov. Epidemic of fever breaks out, and boys are all sent home.
- 1788. 'Bacchus' exercises, previously shown up on Shrove Tuesday, abolished.
- 1790. Annual dinner of Essex Etonians started.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTES

The basis upon which the register has been compiled is my volume of *Eton College Lists*, 1678–1790. The names therein found have been placed in alphabetical order, after being supplemented by forty-two additional names. The majority of these extra names are to be found in Barnard's MS. Entrancebook, but do not appear in the *Eton College Lists*, owing to the fact that their owners stayed for such a short time, viz. Aston, Austin, Barnett, Basil (2), Burke, Cleobury, Denton, Evors, Fenton (W. S. M.), Grieves, Hare (Charles), Hayley (John), Herbert (R. C.), Irvine, Martin (William), Prescot (Charles), Randolph (2), Rolling, Skip, Solby, Tilghman, Wilson (D.), and Worrall.

Certain other names have been recovered from the collection of MS. School-lists 1775–1799 in the College Library, viz. Le Hunt, Poellnitz, Popleton, and Spry.

In addition a few names have been inserted on the authority of the *Dictionary of National Biography*, viz. Fitzgerald (G. R.), Hamilton (Archibald), Smith (William Cusac), Steevens, and Towry.

Two names, viz. Wade and Masters, are inserted on the strength of a very circumstantial paragraph appearing in the *London Chronicle* for 7 December 1784.

Again the burials in the *Eton Parish Register* provide us with one extra name, viz. Griffith (Christopher).

The Register of Admissions at Trinity College, Cambridge, supplies us with one, viz. Anstey (Christopher), and that at Trinity College, Dublin, with another, viz. Barry.

The baptismal certificates of successful candidates for Eton College provide us with two, viz. Atkins (Samuel) and Maule xxxiii (George), for owing to the prevailing custom by which candidates for College nearly always entered the school as oppidans, it seems probable that these two boys should be included in the register.

Finally, one boy, Bramston, is included on the strength of a statement in *Alumni Felstedienses* (1903), p. 16.

Unfortunately owing to the fact that we possess as a rule only one School-list for each year, and not one for each schooltime, it is impossible to pretend that the Register records every boy who was at Eton between 1753 and 1790 (apart from the fact that no list has survived for the year 1755), but it is reasonable to suppose that the omissions are not very numerous.

After the names come the dates between which the boys appear in the School-lists. As a rule it is only for the period 1754-65, covered by Dr. Barnard's Entrance-book, that we know the actual dates when boys were admitted. Consequently most of the dates can only be taken as approximately correct. Frequently the boy must have come to the school in the autumn half, and therefore—as lists were usually compiled at Election times—was there the year before that actually given; and often a boy will have left in the spring, and therefore have stayed into the year following that actually set down. It is only occasionally that there is sufficient proof to warrant making the dates more precise.

After the dates there sometimes follows ma., mi., or min., as given in the School-lists, but it is not possible to rely too closely on such evidence as might hereby be expected. Often the compiler of the MS. list forgot to insert such distinguishing marks, nor does it seem quite certain that when he did remember to add them they always denoted brothers.

Next come, when they are known, within brackets the name of the dame and tutor, with this exception however, that when the admission of the boy occurs in Barnard's Entrance-book, the dame's name follows the date of admission as in his book, and is followed in turn by the amount of the fee, when it is recorded.

A few remarks may be apposite with regard to the age at which boys entered and left the school. As might have been expected, there was a wide divergency. We find, for instance, boys coming to the school at the tender age of four, especially those boys whose parents resided at Eton, *e.g.* Thomas Dampier, whose father was Lower Master, and Edward Cooke. On the other hand some boys arrived as old as fifteen or sixteen.

The age of leaving was not so very different from that of xxxiv

the present day. If a few precocious boys entered the University at fourteen, fifteen, or sixteen, e.g. two of the Strettells and Charles James Fox, the majority waited till they were eighteen or nineteen. Collegers especially, who were not superannuated till nineteen, were in the habit of staying on as late as possible, in the hope of succeeding to a vacancy at King's.

It is true Canning in a letter<sup>1</sup> states that oppidans only remained till the age of seventeen, but this cannot be said to have been universally or even generally true.

It will be seen that it was easily possible for a boy, especially a Colleger, to stay at the school for twelve years; indeed we find instances in the cases of Henry and Thomas Dampier. The claim, however, by Dr. Edward Scott,<sup>2</sup> that his grandfather John Scott went to Eton at the age of five and remained till he was twenty-one, is not borne out by the facts contained in this register.

With regard to scholars elected to King's, it should be mentioned that the date of their admission to King's College is given, and not that of their election, which was often a year earlier.

It will be noted that boys were frequently admitted to the University some time before they left Eton, and also that matriculation was often long delayed at Cambridge.

Another fact worth pointing out is that boys standing for College were nearly always already in the school as oppidans.<sup>3</sup> There are several cases, also, of boys apparently resigning their scholarships and remaining on as oppidans, e.g. Duke (J.), Filewood, Jesse, Leycester (R.), Morgan (T.), Plumptre (C.), and Wickes.

It seems unnecessary to set out at length any list of the authorities consulted, as they are given at the end of each biography; and it is believed that such contractions as have been used will be readily understood. But a word of explanation may be advisable as to a few.






