Special dispatches from Ottawa indicate that the Dominion government has given official notice of the disallowance of two more of the acts upon the statute books of this province.

The two latest acts to be disallowed were both passed in the term of the Turner government, and they are: (1) An Act relating to the employment of Chinese and Japanese persons on works carried on under franchises granted by private acts; (2) An Act to amend the Transvaal Incorporation Act.

In case of any act passed during the present session or hereafter passed, giving authority or conferring to any person or body corporate the right of erecting a bridge, making a railway, tramway, turnpike road, telegraph or telephone line, the construction or improvement of a harbor, canal, lock, dam, slide, or other like work, the right of carrying any trade, business, occupation or calling, or of mining, or of conducting any business, or of carrying on any other business, shall be employed in connection with it in relation to any of the works, rights, trade, business, occupation or property given, granted, confirmed, authorized or affected by the act.
