

GEOGRAPHY.

THE Publisher of the Atlas of Modern Geography has at length the satisfaction of having completed the design which he announced to the public on finishing the former work: viz. of forming a correspondent Atlas of Maps, illustrative of Ancient Geography. In doing this, he has not been sparing either of expence or labour, and he flatters himself that it will be found to be executed in such a manner as to obtain the same flattering marks of approbation as those with which the modern Atlas has been honoured by a generous and indulgent public.

The Maps in this work are arranged under different heads, for the sake of a more easy and speedy reference.

The first series under the title of *Geographia Sacra*, consists of a complete set of Maps peculiarly adapted to elucidate the events of Sacred History, recorded in the Old and New Testaments, and which point out the situations of almost every place mentioned in the Sacred Volumes: to which are added, a series of Chrono-Genealogical Charts, on a new construction, wherein the genealogical descent, and order of time, are correctly adhered to, in exhibiting the families of the Patriarchs, Kings, Prophets, Apostles, &c. by whom the countries delineated in the Maps were at first peopled, or afterwards governed, or who bore a principal part in those memorable transactions for which they have been so much celebrated; particularly here will be found, clearly exhibited, the Genealogy of our Saviour, traced downward from Adam, both in the paternal and maternal lines, as recorded by the Evangelists Matthew and Luke.

The second series, entitled *Geographia Ecclesiastica*, consists of three Maps, which are designed to assist the student in Ecclesiastical History; one, shewing the extent of the jurisdiction of the Eastern, or Greek Church; another, that of the Latin, or Western Church, with their respective Patriarchates, Exarchates, Primacies, &c.; and the third, which is adapted to English Church History, exhibits the Provinces, Dioceses, and Archdeaconries, including all the changes of Sees which have taken place since the Church of England was first established by St. Augustine: to which is added a Table of all the Dioceses, with their Incumbents, forming a complete list of English Bishops, down to the close of the last century, by which may be clearly seen, at any given time, who were the then Bishops, which were their Sees, and what the extent of their jurisdiction.

The third series, entitled *Geographia Antiqua*, consists of Maps adapted to elucidate the accounts and descriptions which are met with in the Classic Authors.

And the fourth series, under the head of *Geographia Historica*, is calculated for the illustration of the histories of some particular events of that period, which could not be so well distinguished on general Maps, as well as to accompany the histories of subsequent events down to what are usually denominated the middle ages.

In an undertaking so extensive, it can scarcely be expected but that some errors or deficiencies will be observed by a discerning eye; but as the Publisher has taken considerable pains to avoid them, so he will be thankful to be informed of any that may be discovered, in order to rectify them; but in the meantime he indulges an encouraging hope and expectation, that they will, on examination, be found to be a pleasing and useful addition to the library of the Divine, the Scholar, and the private Gentleman.

N. B. As some gentlemen may wish to have modern Maps of the different countries bound up with the ancient ones, for the purpose of more readily examining the changes which have been produced in their limits and divisions by the events of revolving ages, the Publisher takes the liberty of informing them that any of the Maps in the Atlas of Modern Geography may be had separately; and being of the same size exactly, and printed on the same paper with this work, may be inserted without any hazard of destroying that uniformity of appearance which in a work of this kind is so highly desirable.—Subjoined is a list of the Maps contained in the Modern Atlas.









*GENEALOGICAL CHART of the FOURTH AGE OF THE WORLD
