1965-66 WORLD COFFEE CROP

#### ESTIMATE UP SLIGHTLY

The Foreign Agricultural Service's third estimate (December) of the 1965-66 world coffee crop put total production at 78.2 million bags 1/, and exportable production 2/, at 63.4 million bags. This is up slightly from the September estimate and close to the record crop of 1959-60 which totaled 78.9 million bags. It is considerably larger than 1964-65 production of 51.7 million bags total and 37.1 million exportable.

## Production

North America: Total North American coffee production is estimated at 11.4 million bags, with exportable production at 8.5 million. This is up only slightly from the September estimate, but considerably above the 10.4 and 7.5 million bags, respectively, produced in 1964-65.

The estimate for the 1965-66 Costa Rican crop has again been revised upward as that country continues to show recovery from the natural disasters of 1964-65. In fact, the volcanic ash accumulation in the soil during that period, plus the pruning effect which the ash had when it fell, might actually have helped the trees in the long run. Reports out of Cuba indicate a scarcity of coffee in that country; this country has not had any production available for export in recent years. Production in El Salvador is expected to be up about 5 percent in 1965-66 as a result of the "up" year in the coffee cycle. However, this "cycle" is tending to become less and less important in El Salvador, and in some other countries, as the result of improving cultural practices.

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Weather conditions have been good in Honduras and production there appears to be up in 1965-66. A combination of good weather, a favorable year in its coffee cycle, and better cultural practices have led to predictions of a record crop in Mexico. Production in Trinidad and Tobago is down and is now expected to be less than in 1964-65.

South America: Total 1965-66 production in South America is expected to reach 44.7 million bags, more than double the 1964-65 figure of 20.7 million, while an exportable production of 35.4 million bags is more than triple the 1964-65 total of 11.6 million.

The basic reason for the jump to an almost record level in 1965-66 after the low of 1964-65 was largely the recovery of the production in Brazil. Production in that country in 1965-66 is now estimated at 34.0 million bags and there are some estimates that go even higher. Exportable production for the same year will be about 26.8 million bags. During the previous year, only 10.0 million bags were produced, 3.0 million of which were considered exportable (total production minus domestic consumption). The 1965-66 crop in Colombia is still estimated at 8.0 million bags, with exportable production at 6.8 million. The 1964-65 estimate has been lowered slightly to 8.0 bags, of which 6.9 million is exportable.

The 1965-66 crop in Ecuador is expected at least to equal that of 1964-65, which in itself was larger than predicted earlier. The Peruvian crop remains near previous estimates, but the estimate is down slightly in 1965-66 in Venezuela. Also, domestic consumption in the latter country appears to be increasing faster than previously estimated.

Africa: Total coffee production in Africa in 1965-66 is now estimated at 17.9 million bags, compared with 16.2 million in 1964-65. Exportable production is about 17.1 million bags, compared with 15.4 million a year earlier.

The principal increase in Africa came in the Ivory Coast, where the crop is estimated to be up more than a million bags over 1964-65. Sizable increases are also estimated in the Congo (Leopoldville), which is trying to recover from the political disorders which affected the 1964-65 crop, and in Uganda. In Angola, Africa's second-largest producer, the total output is estimated to be down slightly from 1964-65. Production continues to increase in most other African countries.

Asia and Oceania: Total production in Asia and Oceania is estimated to be down slightly in 1965-66 to a level of 4.3 million bags, of which 2.4 million is exportable. The respective figures for 1964-65 were 4.4 million bags total, and 2.5 million exportable.

Production in India is now expected to be down slightly from 1964-65, although exportable production will probably be up. This may be attributed to the fact that India's Coffee Board controls the amount of coffee released for domestic consumption.

#### World Trade and Developments

World imports dropped considerably during the 1964-65 (October-September) coffee marketing year. As prices firmed and held in 1965, importing countries drew heavily on the stocks that had been built up during 1964. As a result, stock levels in importing countries dropped. As the large 1965-66 crop started to come in, however, stocks started to build again; but these new increases are taking place primarily in producing countries because the International Coffee Agreement limits the amount of coffee going into world trade. Brazil, which was able to move some of its stocks in 1964-65 following the small crop that year, will probably add eight or more million bags to its stockpile in 1965-66.

Green coffee prices reached their 1965 low in May, 1965. The International Coffee Agreement's new "indicator price" mechanism went into effect at that point, however, and this was followed by a firming of prices that held throughout the rest of the year. The New York spot price of African Robustas (Ambriz AA's) rose from a low monthly average of less than 23 cents per pound in May, 1965, to more than 36 cents in December -- a rise of more than 55 percent. The overall green coffee level rose only about 10 percent during the same period.

Imports of green coffee into the United States from October 1, 1964, through September 30, 1965, totaled 20,179,063 bags, valued at \$1,039,931,784. This compared with 23,274,179 bags, valued at \$1,126,714,504 during the same period in 1963-64. There was thus a drop of 13 percent in the quantity of green coffee imported, while the drop in value was only 8 percent.

According to the U. S. Department of Commerce, total inventories of green coffee in the United States on September 30, 1965, were 2,654,000 bags, or down about 35 percent from a year earlier. Coffee roastings were also down and, at 21,515,000 bags, were 6 percent below the October, 1963 - September, 1964 level. Included in these totals are roastings for soluble coffee of 3,596,000 bags (green weight) in 1964-65, compared with 3,932,000 bags a year earlier.

The International Coffee Council met in London in December and discussed the problems which still plague the International Coffee Agreement. The principal action taken at the meeting was to grant export waivers to the 22 members which were seeking revision of their basic quotas. This was a temporary solution to the problem of basic quotas, production goals, etc., which will be major items on the agenda of the next ICC meeting, probably taking place in mid-1966.
