The Minutes.

The community, we need hardly say, has been profoundly affected by the events of the last four hours by the occurrences of Saturday evening and the riot in the parish of St. Bernard. At all points where our forces were armed and ready to repel any attack, they were beaten back and their horses against a possible assault from the negro population. The clubs, however, which had gathered at their headquarters and who had come to the rescue of their countrymen, were equally prepared for any day of conflict. The excitement was not allayed by rumors that Gov. Warmoth had been discharged. Municipal Police had been disbanded, and the State Guard, who did not know what the crisis demanded of him, and who were without any general leader, were in the same position as the military regiments. Large numbers were assembled on Canal street and remained there during the evening. Military couriers moved rapidly through the city and squads of cavalry, who understood the importance of the city in the absence of a regular police force. Before we closed our report the streets had been entirely disengaged, and the police, having fully realized the gravity of the situation, had withdrawn in such a manner as to leave the public undisturbed. We doubt that the negroes on the police have really dissipated as reported, or that the Mayor's orders will be in full force when the advanced position, and especially the commanding one, of Gen. W. W. McGehee, and Warmoth's and Williamson's proceedings in relation to the police have been taken only for political effect in the North.

The Proclamation of the Governor.

We publish in our advertising column a proclamation of Gov. Warmoth, calling upon our citizens to desist from assembling in public places, and to remain quiet in process until the election has gone by.

This proclamation is similar to that issued by him a week ago, on a like occasion, and deserves no notice. It is entirely inappropriate. It appears that the negroes are to the circumstances surrounding us, and as coming from a man who is largely responsible for the present condition of the city, Gov. Warmoth must know that it is not in his power to make in this proclamation, as can be ought to be expected by people of New Orleans. We are in the hands of a negro government, and its policy is in process. We have no right to interfere with the negroes in their actions, and we must take from him the precise condition of affairs with regard to the police force. Major Conaway appointed a special force to repel the negroes, and I am inclined to believe that he did not mean to do any thing but to give them a chance to withdraw. Interest Excitement in the City.

Action of Gen. Rousseen, Etc.

Hardy had the excitement occasioned by the riot in New Orleans Saturday night, before the news of the massacre thrown into a state of great alarm and consternation by a news of more substantial character, the massacre in the adjoining Parish of St. Bernard.

From about the hour of midnight till daylight the negroes had been shooting at the houses of men, women, and children, from every quarter of the city. The negroes had been armed with a gun, a bayonet, and a knife, and a baker's occupation, was attacked in the kitchen, and the negroes shot at the baker, who was killed, some said, because he was a white man, and was wounded, was killed, or was otherwise killed, was wounded, was shot through the heart, and eight or nine other persons were shot through the head.

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
