Mr. Fredric Harrison recently unveiled two medallion portraits in bronze, in memory of Charles Lamb and John Keats respectively, at the Passmore Edwards Public Library, Edmonton.

The last two years of Lamb's life were spent at Bay's Cottage, in Edmonton. Tae "gentle Elia" lies buried in All Saints' churchyard. Two or three doors from the house in Church street, in which Lamb lived is that in which the poet Keats resided for some considerable time.

The decision of the silver-lead mine owners of the Slocan with respect to the eight-hour law is announced in the following circular just issued. They will bring it into effect from the first of June and pay \$3 for the eight-hour day, instead of \$3.50 for ven hours as formerly.

Owing to the action of the British Columbia legislature in enforcing the eight-hour law in the Slocan, the silver-lead mine owners of the district consider that they owe it to their employees, who are affected by the change rendered necessary by the operation of the act, to place their intentions with regard to it on record. on record. In the first place, the mine owners of this district were not consulted in any way as to this radical change in the mining law, and on being informed of the passage of the act, made every effort in their power to have the law held in abeyance until it could be carefully considered by those interested.


