SUBJECT: Tokyo-To Child Welfare Center


1. On 18 April the public welfare adviser (supervisor) conferred with the following officials at the Tokyo child welfare center: Mr. Marui, chief of the center; Mr. Ihara, chief of the consultation division; Mr. Yeguchi, chief of the protection division; and Miss Kinjo, staff member of the foster home division.

2. For the past two months the Children's Section of the Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau has been carrying out a locally established policy in relation to the placement of Japanese children of mixed blood in homes of Occupation personnel. The policy (referred to in Annex B-2 for March 1951) has proven to be of limited value in handling such cases. It is now believed that the policy is too limited and in a sense is discriminatory in that it does not cover all cases involving the same kind of Eurasian children. The policy is applicable only to those children who are under the custody of the Child Welfare Center. Tokyo-To Children's Section and Child Welfare Center officials pointed out that comparatively few of the Eurasian children are under the custody of Tokyo-To. The bulk of them, the exact number is not known, are in private welfare institutions as a result of private arrangements made by known and unknown persons who may or may not hold parental right over the child. In most instances the private person or persons making such placements seem to disappear, and in those few cases where institutional officials attempt to locate responsible persons, such efforts prove to be futile. Instances of this kind usually occur because the institution has not made a proper or adequate investigation at the time the child is accepted for care. Fictitious names and erroneous addresses account for the inability of institutional officials to contact or even locate those persons who made the original arrangements with the institution. The institution is then placed in a difficult position and may choose one of two courses of action: it may report the case to the public welfare officials and request that the public agency assume financial responsibility for the child; or the institution may decide to keep the child and assume financial as well as custodial responsibility. In case the latter action is taken, as it is in many but an unknown number of cases, the public welfare officials are completely unaware of such cases and exercise no control, responsibility or authority over the child. Naturally the policy developed by the Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau cannot apply to such children. The institution is then in a position to handle the case in whatever manner it may decide upon. It is pointed out that the handling

and placement of children differs between institutions. The Christian child welfare institutions have different standards and employ different methods in determining the advisability of placement. In summary it is known that there are actually three different procedures and methods applied to the placement of the Eurasian children with Occupation personnel: those of the Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau; those of the Christian private welfare institutions; and those of the non-Christian private welfare institutions. If the future welfare as well as the present welfare of these children is a matter of concern, then it is essential that the numerous problems concerning placements on a temporary basis and placements for possible adoption be considered as they apply to these children as a group. It is recognized that the enforcement of certain minimum standards in all child welfare institutions is the responsibility of the prefectural welfare officials. It is also recognized that these standards are mostly related to institutional physical factors and not to institutional policies and procedures. It is believed that the public welfare officials have the implied responsibility or the authority to examine policies and procedures employed by any institution which is placing children in the homes of Occupation personnel. The Tokyo-To welfare officials are not concerning themselves with the problems of the children living in institutions but not under custody of the child welfare officials. The officials say that it is their practice to advise the institution on matters concerning the Eurasian children when they are requested to do so by the institution. So far there have been no requests. The Tokyo-To child welfare officials recognize the negative aspects of the system of the utilization of different standards by different types of institutions, and it is believed that they recognize the need for uniformity of standards, policies and procedures that should be established and enforced by the public welfare officials. The CA welfare officer concluded that the To officials do not know the extent or the size of the problem in relation to the number of children involved. It was suggested that, as an initial move, the Children's Section make plans to conduct a survey for the purpose of determining the number of Eurasian children who have lived in or are now living in child welfare institutions (public or private) in Tokyo-To. After the scope of the problem is determined, it is believed that the To welfare officials will be in a better position to plan at their level and to request assistance from the Ministry level in the form of instructions and legislation concerning the problems referred to above.

MEMORANDUM FOR: Chief of Public Welfare Section

SUBJECT: Review of the Kojimachi Child Welfare Center, Tokyo-To,
on December 21, 1950.

1. The undersigned Welfare Adviser, accompanied by Interpreters Miss Nakayama and Mr. Mori, conferred with the following child welfare officials: Mr. Eto, Chief of the Kojimachi child welfare center and his staff, also Mr. Tachibana, of the Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau Children's Section.

2. This center is independent of the Central Child Welfare Center, and is under the direct supervision of the Child Welfare Section of Tokyo-To, however cases for placement in Foster Homes are referred to the Central center, also frequent conferences are held between the Central Center and this center. In reference to monthly statistical reports, this center submits statistics to the Central center and also to the Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau.

3. At the present time there is a total staff of eight, assigned to the Kojimachi center. Assignments are as follows:

- 1 Chief who is in charge of general administration and supervision of the staff.
- 1 part-time official who is assigned to this center, but who also works in other centers, whose main responsibility is to give psychological tests.
- 1 General Affairs head, who is responsible for accounting matters, personnel, also interviews children coming to the center.
- 1 Assistant Secretary, who is responsible for investigation and guidance of the children who are under 14 years of age and have committed minor crimes. He is also responsible for the center's monthly reports.
- 1 Assistant Secretary, who is responsible for filing, documents and protection expenses, also refers any children who are in need of medical care or examinations to the Health Center. He also is responsible for obtaining food ration certificates,

fire and theft prevention and office equipment.

2 Registered Nurses, who are in charge of the children's health, and observe the children's behaviour, who are temporarily protected in the center.

1 Cook and janitress.

4. The hours of the center are as follows: Office hours from 8:30 to 5:30 on week days, however the center is actually open 24 hours per day daily to receive children. The nurses are always on duty, and there is also one male night clerk. The capacity of the center for temporary shelter is 35. At the present time there are 3 girls (ages 3, 10 and 12) and 3 boys (ages 8, 13 and 15). Of the six inmates, to the center's knowledge they are all orphans. Two of the present inmates, were referred to the Center by Tokyo-To Children's Section. The children had asked for protection. Three were referred by the police, (2 were vagrants and one was an abandoned child). One child was referred to a ward office by the police as the child was a vagrant, and in turn the ward office referred the child to the center. The usual length of stay of the children temporarily protected is from one month to a month and a half. The shortest length of stay was one day. Of the present children staying in the center, the majority have been there 15 days, one was admitted one day ago.

5. Welfare Adviser questioned the Chief as to whether any decision had been reached on any of the children now staying in the center. The Chief stated that a decision had been made on two of the children. One is to be sent to an uncle in another prefecture and one is to be placed in a child welfare institution.

6. There are 5 Child Welfare Officials operating in the area of jurisdiction of this center, which includes Chiyoda, Minato, and Shibuya wards. The total population in these wards is 500,000. The foregoing officials are under the direct supervision of the Children's Section of the Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau. Welfare Adviser asked the Chief as to the relation of the Child Welfare Officials with the Center. The Chief stated that the Center receives referrals of children for investigation and decision from the officials, and they also cooperate with the Officials upon request on investigations. The Child Welfare Officials maintain their offices in branch ward offices, Ku offices and one official is assigned to the center. In reference to the relationship of the Center with the case workers in the ward offices, the Chief stated they have no direct contact. If the Center wishes any investigation or information on a case referred to the center, such information is secured through the Child Welfare Officials who contact the case workers in the ward offices.


a. Of the total number of new cases handled in November (130), decision and disposition on all the cases were made by 1 December 1950, as follows:

4	placed in an infant home
33	placed in an institution for neglected and abused children.
1	placed in a reformatory
1	placed in an institution for feeble minded.
16	were given advise and guidance only.
9	referred to the ward office.
66	were given temporary shelter (returned to their homes, also this number includes renaways from the center).

8. Welfare Adviser questioned the officials whether they had any private interviewing room. The Chief stated that they did; however, it was noted during Welfare Adviser's conference that people were being interviewed in the office, which does not lend itself to any privacy.

9. A tour of the center facilities were made, and considering that the building itself is the lower floor of a bombed-out building, the rooms were in fair condition, and were neat and quite clean. However, one very bad factor was noted, and that was the lack of heat. The six children presently protected there were huddled around one "hibachi", which was the only heat in a large concrete-walled room and the air was very cold. It was suggested that efforts be made through Tokyo-To to secure additional heating facilities.

SUBJECT : Administrative Review (Child Welfare) of Tokyo-To
Central Child Welfare Center (continued from 13 Sept)

1. On 29 September 1950 the undersigned met with the following Japanese officials at the Tokyo Central Child Welfare Consultation Center: Mr. Sekine, chief of Protection Section of the Children's Section of the Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau; Dr. Hara, chief of the Guidance & Consultation Division of the Child Welfare Center; Mr. Yaguchi, chief of the Protection Division, Child Welfare Center; and Mr. Shida, chief of General Affairs Division, Child Welfare Center.

2. Purposes of this meeting were previously stated in paragraph 2 of the memo dated 15 September 1950, subject, same as above.

3. Closer examination of intake procedures at the Central Child Welfare Center indicated that the procedures are more consolidated than they appeared to be on 14 September. At that time, it was stated that the Protection Division and the Guidance & Consultation Division operated distinctly different intake practices. Such is not true. Inquiries this date revealed that reception function is centralized, even though persons coming to the Center are not originally interviewed by a specifically designated person. In actual practice, Mr. Suzuki who is classified as a clerical worker in the Consultation & Guidance Division, interviews all persons and/or cases referred to the Center. At times other duties prevent his seeing those persons coming into the Center for service. In those instances, some other individual from either the Protection Division or the Guidance & Consultation Division will take the information secured at the intake. The intake interview is not a complete one. It consists of securing the name of the child concerned, birth date, address, and name and occupation of parents or responsible relatives. It also contains a statement as to source of referral, a very general statement as to the nature of the problem and the remarks of the receptionist. Following the intake interview, the case is then ready for the consultation interview. All children and/or cases coming into the Center are processed through consultation interview. The consultation interview consists of the following:

- a. Personal history of the child.
- b. Physical examination.
- c. Mental examination.
- d. Character evaluation.
- e. Evaluation of vocational aptitudes.

f. Observation of the child, either in the temporary shelter of the Center by Center employees, or in the child's own home by a child welfare official to whom the case might be assigned.

Children brought to the Child Welfare Center by the police are sometimes handcuffed. The Center officials do not permit these children who are usually accompanied by policemen to be placed in the same room with children whose parents have brought the child to the Center. It is felt that if the children brought in by police are seen by other children in the reception office, that a bad impression will be created. After the consultation interview, all children are usually given the same treatment and go through the same processing within the Center.

4. A study was made to determine procedures and methods utilized in the disposition of cases. After the consultation interview and the mental and physical testing have been completed and all outside information has been secured, a conference is held with the following persons attending:

- a. the child welfare official concerned with the case.
- b. The Center official who conducted the consultation interview.
- c. The chief of the Child Welfare Center.
- d. The chief of the Consultation & Guidance Division.
- e. The chief of the Protection Division.

In some instances when a child has been under observation of a nursery teacher in the temporary shelter, the teacher may attend the conference. At this conference decisions are reached as to what recommendations will be made as to the disposition of the child. Following is a list of the resources available to the Center that may be utilized in handling the individual case:

- a. Hospital for medical treatment.
- b. Feeble-minded institution.
- c. Reformatory.
- d. Institution for physically weak children.
- e. Home for care of infants under the age of 2.
- f. Home for dependent, neglected and abused children.
- g. Foster home care.
- h. Referral to the child's own home under the supervision of the child welfare official.

At the present time the Child Welfare Center may refer children to any one of 93 different institutions in the Tokyo area. At the present time population in these 93 institutions is 5,970. The Center officials said that all institutions are filled to capacity and that most of them are overcrowded. They admitted that in many instances, the recommendations of the Center as to the kind of treatment and care the individual child should have, are not taken into consideration in referring the child to the institution. The reason for this is that institutions are overcrowded and that, for example, children who, according to findings of the Center, should be placed in a reformatory are sent to homes for dependent and neglected children because the reformatories are overcrowded. They also stated that children who should be sent to feeble-minded institutions are being put into homes for dependent, neglected and abused children because of the lack of facilities to care for feeble-minded children. The Center officials also stated that they recognized that all of the work done by the Center in testing, giving examinations and making plans is wasted and lost because of conditions in the institutions.

5. Since this problem is recognized and understood by the Center officials, a discussion was developed around possible solutions to the overcrowding in institutions. The Center officials do not have any responsibility for, or control over, child welfare institutions. It is their opinion that many institutions, primarily the private ones, are holding children in institutions who could be released to their own parents. The CA welfare officer asked if there is any evidence concerning the latter statement. The chief of the Protection Division of the Child Welfare Section of the To said that a recent survey revealed that of the 5,970 children in institutions, 1,190 had parents and that more than 1/3 of the 1,190 cases could be returned to their own homes. However, children are being held in institutions because the manager of the institution refuses to release the child. Those children who should be returned to their own homes are those who have made excellent adjustments in the institution and whose rehabilitation has been completed. In actuality, the institution has carried out the recommendations of the Center and the child is no longer benefitting from institutional care. Institutional managers would like to keep these children because they do not cause any trouble, these children are good examples of what institutional care can do, and as long as the child remains in the institution, public funds are received by the institution for the care of the child. CA welfare officer questioned the authority and the right of the institutional manager to hold a child that, according to the opinions of the inspecting authority, should be returned to his own home. The chief of the Protection Division of the Tokyo-To Children's Section stated that article 28 of the Child Welfare Law is so interpreted that the manager of an institution may determine when the child is to be released.

6. The relationship between the child welfare official and the Child Welfare Center was studied. In considering this relationship, the place of the wards in Tokyo-To was brought into the discussion. CA welfare officer directed the following question to the chief of the Protection Division of the Tokyo-To Welfare Section: What is the relationship

between the various child welfare centers and the wards? The answer was - None. CA welfare officer then considered the method of assigning child welfare officials to various areas within Tokyo with particular attention given to that area covered by the Central Child Welfare Center. The Central Center covers the following wards: Toshima, Nerima, Itabashi and Setagaya. There are 7 child welfare officials responsible for the 4 above-mentioned wards. These officials actually have desks located in the various ward offices. If these 7 child welfare officials have their desks in ward offices, it does not seem possible that there would not be some relationship between child welfare officials and various wards in which they operate. The Center officials insisted that even though the child welfare officials are physically located within the wards, ward chief does not have any jurisdiction or control over the child welfare official. It was learned that the chief of a ward may request child welfare official to carry out one of the responsibilities of the Child Welfare Law (article 24) that have been delegated to the ward from the To. This particular responsibility involves making of investigations to determine eligibility of children for admission to day nurseries. If the ward chief has the authority to ask the child welfare official to make the necessary investigation, then it would seem that he would also have the authority to ask for reports and information concerning the investigations made by the child welfare officials.

7. The relationship between the Child Welfare Center and the child welfare official is not a well-defined one. The child welfare officials may come to the Child Welfare Center to discuss problems with the Center staff. The Child Welfare Center also refers cases to the various child welfare officials. There are no provisions for regular conferences or meetings.

SUBJECT : Administrative Review (Child Welfare) of Tokyo-To
Central Child Welfare Center

1. On 13 September 1950 the following named persons from Civil Affairs Section participated in the review: Mr. Borish, Civil Affairs Section Public Welfare Officer, GHQ, SCAP, and Mr. Stemple, Public Welfare Adviser, Kanto Civil Affairs Region. Japanese welfare officials participating were Messrs. Shimaoka, chief of Children's Section, Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau; Sekine, chief of the Protection Section of the Children's Section of the Welfare Bureau; Kudo, staff member of Protection Section of the Children's Section; Marui, chief of the Child Welfare Center; Shida, chief of the General Affairs Division of the Child Welfare Center; Dr. Ihara, chief of the Guidance & Consultation Division of the Child Welfare Center; and Mr. Yaguchi, chief of Protection Division of the Child Welfare Center.

2. Purpose of conference was to review the administrative structure of the child welfare center, taking into consideration its relationship to the Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau, and to examine procedures in relation to intake and treatment of children coming to the center.

3. The attached chart shows the administrative structure of the Tokyo-To Child Welfare Center. It will be noted that the Central Child Welfare Center is not the only operation coming under the administration of the Protection Division of the Child Welfare Section of the Tokyo-To Welfare Bureau. Other responsibilities are:

- a. Child welfare institutions.
- b. Eight other separate and distinct child welfare centers located in different areas within the To.

The Child Welfare Institutions Section under the Protection Division has administrative and supervisory responsibilities for the following types of child welfare institutions:

- a. Homes for dependent, neglected and abused children.
- b. Institutions for training and education of juveniles.
- c. Homes and institutions for the feeble-minded children.
- d. Institutions for the deaf and mute.

There are three other kinds of child welfare institutions which, although classified as child welfare institutions, are under the supervision and management of the To Health Bureau. These types are:

- a. Homes for infants under the age of 2.
- b. Homes for weak children.
- c. Homes for physically handicapped children.

It was made clear that these latter three institutions are not responsibility of the To Welfare Department, even though children may be referred to institutions of this kind from child welfare centers. The second function under the Protection Division of the Child Welfare Section is the administration and operation of the Central Child Welfare Center and the 8 other separate centers previously referred to. The 8 separate child welfare centers are not under the administration, supervision, control, or guidance of the Central Child Welfare Center and are not to be considered as branches of the central center. The Protection Division handles central center, as well as the other 8 centers, individually.

4. Particular attention was devoted to a consideration of measures and methods of control and supervision exercised by the Protection Division over the central center and the 8 separate centers. It was learned that within the Protection Division is a sub-section which is the responsibility of one man who gives what little supervision is provided. An examination of the duties and responsibilities of this man revealed that supervision and control over the centers is non-existent. When discussing functions, the person theoretically responsible for supervision listed the following:

- a. Collection of funds from parents of children in the child welfare centers.
- b. Foster parents' applications and the handling of relationships between child welfare officials and child welfare boards.
- c. Contacts with the metropolitan police in regard to care of juvenile vagrants apprehended by police.
- d. Review and examination of requests from child welfare centers in relation to expenses and building repairs.
- e. The receiving of statistical reports from the various centers.

It was interesting to note that in describing duties and responsibilities, the person responsible did not mention the term "supervision" in any of his discourse. It was agreed between officials

attending that supervision as such from the Protection Division to the various child welfare centers does not exist.

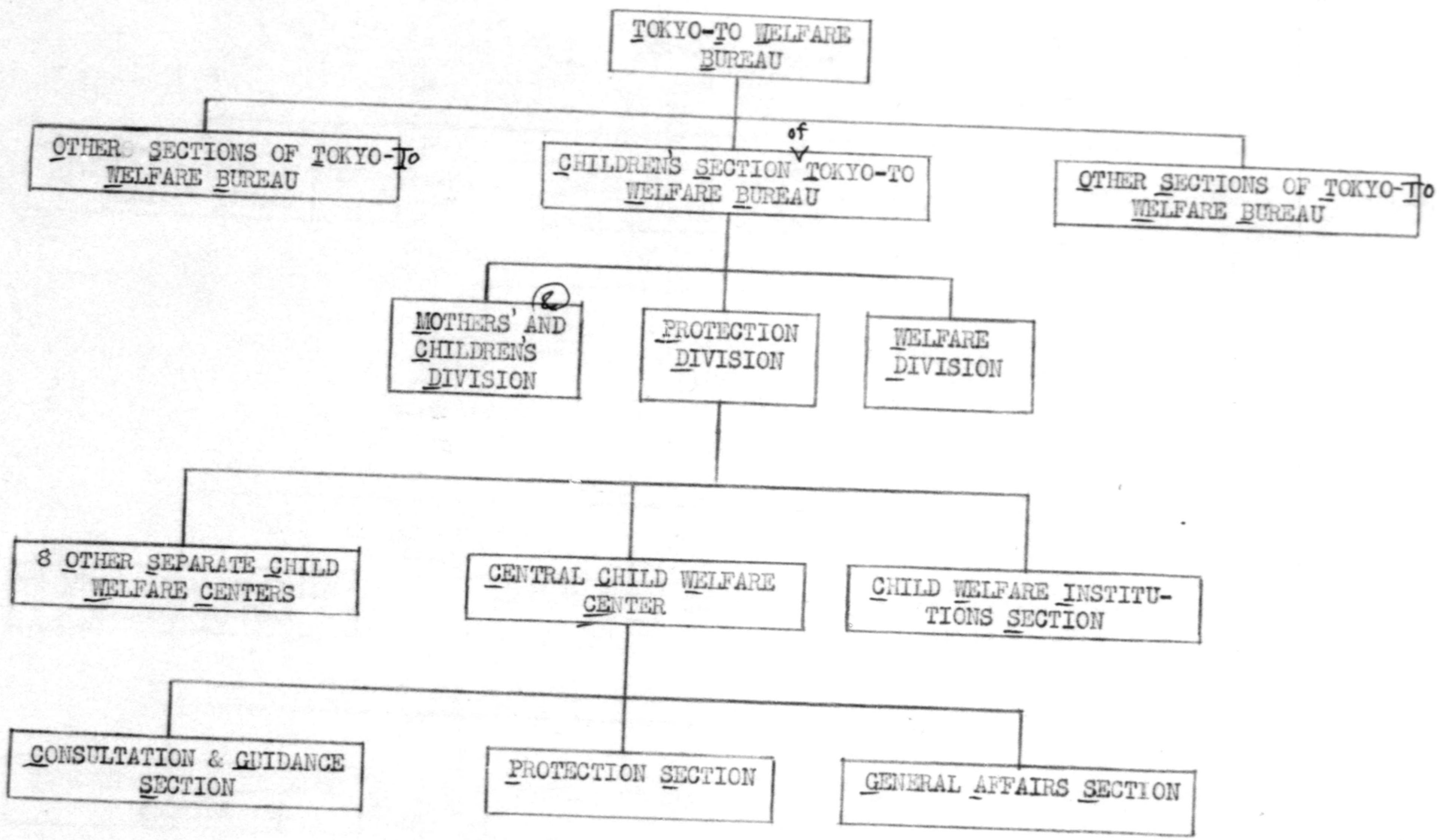
5. In the Central Child Welfare Center, the chiefs of the three sections of the center are responsible for supervision and control of their staff members. An analysis, or evaluation, of the kind of supervision being given will be made at a later date, at which time personnel in staffing will be considered.

6. As previously mentioned, the center is broken down into three sections - Guidance & Consultation, Protection, and General Affairs. In determining functions within the sections, it was learned that Guidance & Consultation Section handles primarily those cases which may be classified as involving "good problem children." The Protection Section handles the "bad problem children." This group consists of vagrants and children referred or brought to the center by the police from the family courts. There is a definite distinction in the kind of treatment given to these children who are classified as "good" and "bad." The danger in this system is that a diagnosis or a label is placed on each child the moment he arrives at the center. Various processes for individual children vary in the Guidance and Protection Sections. These two sections operate in separate buildings. It was determined that the bulk of the children who come into the Protection Section are placed in one type or another child welfare institution, while those admitted to the Guidance Section are usually returned to their own homes and responsible relatives. The only connection between the Protection Section and the Guidance Section is in relation to the mental and psychologic examinations and testing. Since the psychiatrist conducts these tests and is the chief of the Guidance Section, those children referred to the Protection Section are sent to the Guidance Section for the tests. Each of these sections operates a separate intake or reception function. There is no central intake.

7. It was decided that this review would be continued at a later date, at which time the functions of the various staff members in the center would be studied. Attention would also be given to the processing of children out of the center. The relationship between the center and outside facilities utilized by the center in providing aftercare would also be closely examined.

2. Conference with Mr. Shimada, Chief-Child Welfare Section, Mr. Sekine, Chief-Protection Division, Child Welfare Section and Mr. Ogino, Chief-Welfare Division, Child Welfare Section.

3. A review of the present child welfare program was made functions of the Child Welfare Section and attached administrative chart was prepared. In Tokyo, there are approximately 2,000,000 children under 18 years of age. The 1949-50 budget for the Child Welfare Section amounted to a total of 402,798,415 yen. The primary budget for the 1950-51 fiscal year is 402,032,799 yen and will probably ultimately amount to double these amount. Approximately 14,653 children are receiving direct assistance through the Child Welfare Section. As in other prefectures, it is felt that too much emphasis is being placed on the establishment of institutions and community organizations rather than the usually accepted basic elements of a public child welfare program. However, all activities appear to be carried on in accordance with Laws and Directives.

4. The Child Welfare Deliberative Council met eleven times last year for the purpose of discussing juvenile problems, considering foster care applications and childrens "cultural" material. The meetings are held on irregular dates. A new council is to be organized in Tokyo-to based on Cabinet Directive - Soshin #201 (Ministers Deliberative Council), dated 21 September 1949, Subject: "Counter Plans for Youths and Juveniles" and further described in Ji Hatsu #791-2- same date. The Council is to have 57 members, selected from among public and private officials concerned with child welfare. Four members of the Child Welfare Deliberative Council are to be members. Meetings are to be held monthly for the Standing Committee and bi-monthly general meetings on unspecified dates. The duties are not yet specifically stipulated, but it is said that the Council will act more or less on a "free basis" and "sponsor public programs with various wards and cities".

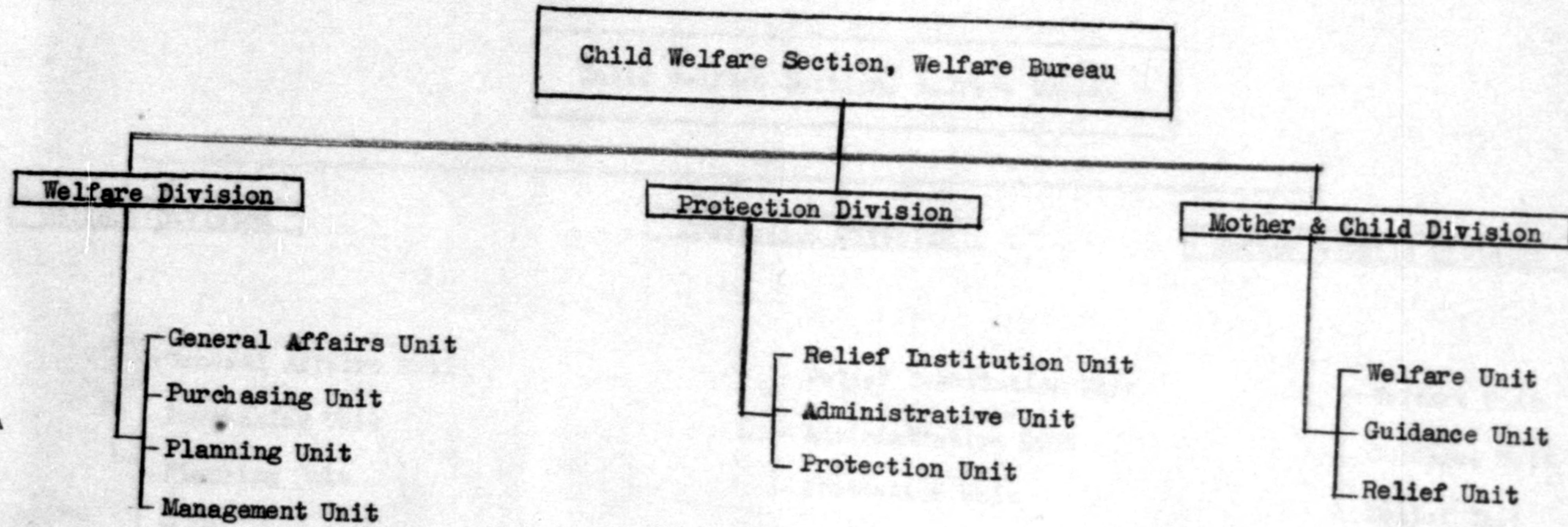
