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## ECLIPSES IN 1837.

There will be five Eclipses this year-three of the Sun and two of the Moon : only one, that of the Moon, on the 13th October, will be visible in this Province.

1st.-A partial eclipse of the Sun, April 5th, at 2 h .42 m . which, on account of the time it occurs and the Moon's Southern latitude, will be visible only in a small portion of the Southern Ocean.
2d.-A total eclipse of the Moon, April 20, at 4h. mean time, in the evening-visible throughout the Eastern continent; but ending before the Moon rises in this quarter.

8d. - A partial eclipse of the Sun, May 4th, at 2h. 22 m . mean time, in the afternoon. This eclipse, although it takes place when the Sun is above the horizon, will be invisible to us on account of the Moon's Northern latitude. It will visible on the North-west part of this continent.

4th.- A total eclipse of the Moon on Friday, October 13th. Thiq eclipse begins before the Moon rises, but nearly the whole of it will be visible to te, as follows:-

6th.-A partial eclipse of the Sun, October 29th, at 6 h . 50 m . morning. This eclipse takes place while the Sun is above the horizon, but will be invisible to us on account of the Moon's Southern latitude. It will be visible only in the Southern Ocean and in the Southern extrenity of South Amorica.

Cape Sable Seal Jaland Light:-The first Light is approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Senl Island. This Lighs is olevated about 80 feet above high writer mark, and may be seen, in upproacioing the Ioland from any point of the Compass. A very dangerove Rock, under water, but upen which the sen always breake, wall-ed-Dlonde: Rock, lies about 2 miles: 8. S. W. by Compans, from the LightHouser Between this rock end the island, there are come dina-gers-the ground in rocky throughout; and large vamels, tharefore, ought not to attempt passing betweoo them.

Drier Jaland Light:-In ndvancing up the Bay, the next Light Is situated on Brier Island, about half n mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof, with an improved Lubtern and Lamp. Thic Light will therefore be much more beneficial to the trade of the Bay than formerly.

Linagolis Gus Light. -The noxt Light on the ceast of Nova Scotia is placed on the West side of the Gut of A nnapolis-from Brier Islanad North Enistward. The conat is very bold, and not indented; the Light is therofote olitefly intonded as a guide into Annapolis Banin. The Lampii and Lantern' were reinewed in the Spring of 1835, and reflectors furnis.ded, top that this Light is in high order.

Notz.-The above three Lights are each aingle, fised, and show Whitr lights.

Gannet Rock Light. - This Light boars from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 21 miles. It is inteaded 10 warn vessels of their appreach to a very dengerous range of shouls and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Island off Machias, a distance of about 20 miles.

Head Harbour Light. - Next in order nfor passing Grand Manan, is Et: ad Hinbour light. This is placed on the N. E. extremity of Campun Bello, and is 11 guide to ressels entering the main chanivel to Wesi Ielee, Moose Islasid, nnd the inner Bay of Pasamanquoddy; it enmbles vesselo eliso at all cimes to enter. Head Harbour-it is a Gixed wats light.

Point Le Preau Lights.- Opon this projecting Hend Land, wo Lighte have Intely been placed, one abore the other, and diatant 18 feet. Buih lighis enn be seen fromi every point of the Compas, where they may be useful-both are fixed and waitz.

Partridge Island Light.-Thin light, at the entrance of the River and Hartuor of Saint Jolm, having been established upwqrda of forty years, requites no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed whife light.

Beacon Light. - Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar, which extends ahout half a mila S. S. E. of Sand Point, nad which dries at two thirds olbb; stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower uLight is estublished, nlich is eminently useful to the coast tng irndo of Saint Juhny and to all other vessels having pilote on bongd, nin is enables them to enter tho harbour ut all hours of the night. A fixed white light.

Quaco-A revolving white Light is placell on m amall rock off Qunca Hend, showing iwice full nud twice dark in a minute. This Light cau be seco froma any quater where a vessel ean ngipronet.

West Quoddy Light. - This is an American Light, and is placed on the West sida of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubeo and Eateport;-a new light houso has Jately been erectef hore, and tho light much improved.
Two fixed white lights, upon the Muchias Seal Island, were put into operation in 1332-they are elevatod about forty-five feef above Ligh water, nad bent from ench other E.C.S. E. and: W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which they will be immediately dietinguished from oll other Lighis upon the coast, (British or American) - the fullowing are tho bearings from then, yiz.

## Bates of Pilotage,

Established by a Iiaw or Ordinance of the Commbn Council af the Cify of Saint John, passed July, 1895.

Pive Shillings per foot, for bringing any ship or veavel into the Harbour of Saiat Jehn, and mooring her in a nafe place or berth; or aceariug her alongaide of one of the wharves; and five chillioge per feot foritemoving and taking any ship or veveel out of the harbear.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of veswels, under and by virtue of the Quarnatine or Health Laiva of the Province, they shall the entilled to demand and reeeive from the Masters of such vessels; the sum of Tan Shilliuge per day, for every day of auch dotention, in addijion to the allowarice aforesaid.

Consting vegeals, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to onothor, - British or Foreign atenm-bonte, or British vemels drawing updericix feet of water, are not compelled to inke Pilota: when emplayed, they, are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

## MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION.

Population of the World.-A thousand millions have been mentioned, apparently for no other reason than the convenience of a round number. Malte Brun reduces the amount to 650 millions. We think his enumeration for Asia, Africa, and America still rather high, and submit the following estimate as the result of our enquiries :Europe, 185 millions, Asia, with Australia and Polynesia, 270 millions, Africa, 55 millions, and America, 40 mil-lions,-total, 550 millions. Hassel, in 1519, estimated the population of Europe to be 180,702,000; but Balbi, in 1828, raised it to 226,283,000. De Schlieben put it at 188,391,174, of whom $172,432,000$ were Christians, and the armed force of all its countries at 2,500,000. Dr. Malthus stated the population of China, from his authorities, at 330 millions. The Chinese gave this account to Lord Macartney. Malte Brun, in his view of the subject, reduces it to 150 millions. Area of the Globe. -The extent of the four great divisions of the world is as follows, in square English miles, - Europe, with its isles; $3,432,000$; Africa; with Madagascar, 11,420,000; Asia, coritinental, 16,890,000; the isles, including New Holland and Polynesia, 4,200,000; South America, 6;420,000; North America, 8,100,000; the islands, 160,000 ; and Greenland, (supposed) 620,000, total square miles, $51,242,000$. England and Wales contain 57,960 square miles, Scotland 30,500 , and Ireland 30,000 ; in all 115,460 square miles. The United States contain about 2 millions square miles, or nearly one-twon-ty-fifth part of all the land on the globe.

Our Globe contains about 146 millions of square miles. of water, and 50 millions of land. In America, are about 16 millions of square acres of land, in Asia 16, in Africa 11, in Europe 3, in Australia $3 \frac{1}{2}$ millions.

The number of languages spoken upon the globe is about 3000 .

The number of births, by estimation, is, to the numb of inhabitants, as 1 to $29 \frac{1}{2}$, and the number of deaths as 1 to 38.

In Europe the nomber of male children born is to that of females as 21 to 20 , or 26 to 25 . At the age of fifteen years, the number of males and females is nearly equal. Over that age the number of females is greatest.

In a country where there are 10,000 births, the whole population is computed at 295,000 ; children under fifteen years of age, 93,030 ; over fifteen, 202,000; married couples; 23,000 ; widows, 5000 ; widowers, 4000.

It is also computed that nearly a quarter of the children. horn, die the first year, and nearly a third within the two first years.

The number of births upon the earth in a year is about 34 millions ; in a day, 65,000 ; in an hour, 2,703 ; in a minute, 43 .

In a population of one million, 502,000 will live to be $t$ wenty years of age ; 384,000 to forty-five years ; 218,000 to $60 ; 177,000$ to seventy ; 34,000 to eighty ; 2,800 to ninety ; 207 to one hundred; 16 to 105 ; 2 to one hundred and eight; 1 to one hundred and nine ; and none to one hundred and ten years.

The Planets. - It is a universal fact, that while none of the planets are perfect spheres, so none of their orbits are perfect circles. Each planet revolves around the Sun in an ellipse, which is more or less eccentric, having the Sun, not in the centre of the ellipse, but in one of its foci. The eccentricity of an orbit is the distance from the centre to either of the foci, and is equal to half the difference between the two diameters. In every revolution of a planet, therefore, it is once in its aphelion, and once in its perihelion. In the former case, it is as much farther from the Sun than it is in the latter, as the longer diameter of the orbit exceeds the less, which excess is always equal to twice the eccentricity.

The Sun- - The Suu is by fur the largest of the heazenly bodies, whose dimensions we have been able to estimate. Its diameter is something more than 884 thousand miles; and, consequently, it contains a mass of matter equal to fourteen hundred thousand globes of the size of the earth. Of a body, so vast in its dimensions, the human mind, with all its efforts; can form no adequate conception. The whole distance between the Farth and the Moon would not be sufficient to embrace one-third of its diameter. Were the Sun a hollow sphere, with numerous openings to admit the light from above, and were'a sun, moon, planets and stars to be represented on the concave surface, and a globe as large as the eurth to be at the cantre, there woutd be presenit to the view of a spectutor oń the Earth's surface, a univerne a aplendid as that, which now appears to the uninstructed eye- $-a$ universe as large and extonive as the whole crection
seemed to be in the infancy of astronomy. The next thing which fills the mind with wonder, is the distance at which so great a body must bo placed, to occupy, apparently so emall a space in the firmament. The Sun's mean distance from the Earth, is eleven thousand nino hundred and ninety-two times the Earth's diametens or nearly ninety-five millions of miles. We may derive some faint conception of such a distance, by considering that the swiftest steam-boats that ply our waters, at the rate of 200 miles a day, would not traverse it in thirleen hundred years; and, that a cannon-ball, flying night and day, at the rate of 16 mile'a minute, would not reach it in eleven years. [From numerous experiments, made at the Imperial Polytechnic and Military Schools under Bonaparte, the mean velocity of a musket ball is 1600 feet in a second; that of a cannon-ball 1400 feet in a second; Which is about twice the velocity erroneously given in school books.]

The Earth.-The Earth, like all the other planets, moves in its elliptical orbit with a velocity which is varying every instant, being most rapid in its perihelion, (when the Sun, as we say, is in perigee,) and slowest in its aphelion, (when the Sun, as we say, is in apogee.) It is in its perihelion, or Sun in perigee, about the 1st of January, and in its aphelion, or Sun in apogee, about the Ist of July. Thus we are above 3 millions of miles nearer the Sun in mid-winter than in mid-summer. The reason why we have not, as might be expected, the hottest weather when the Earth is nearest the Sun, is, that the Suin, at that time, baving retreated to the southern tropic, (the Earth being in the accending part of her ofbit,) shines so obliquely on our northern hemisphere, that its rays have scarcely half the force of the Summer sun; and continuing but a short time above our horizon; more cold is accumulated by night than is dissipated by day.
The constant variation of the Earth's orbit motion, is occasioned by two forces, one tending to the centre of the Sun, and the other in the direction of a tangent to its orbit, arising from the primitive impulse given at the time when it was launched into space. The former is called ita centripetal, the Jatter, its centrjite al force. farthest from the Sun, his attraction overcomes its valocity, and brings it towards him with so nccelerated a motion, that it at last overcomes the Sun's attraction, and shoots past him: then, gradually agais decreasing in velocity, it arrives at the aphelion where the Sun's attraction again prevails. This is the universal law of planetary motion. However large or small, however near or remote, the planets may be, their motion is always such that imaginary lines joining their centres to the Sun, pass over equal areas in equal times: and this is true not only with respect to the areas described every hour by the same pilanet, but the agreement holds, with rigid exactness, between the areas described in the same time by all the planets and comets, belonging to the solar system.-The furm of the Earih's orbit is such, that its longer axis or dianeter is about the one-sixtieth part longer than its shorter axis or diameter; consequently, the foci of the orbit are above $1 \frac{1}{2}$ million of miles from its centre. [In aphelion, the Earth is distant from the Sun $96,477,230.2$ miles; in perihelion, $93,286,551.4$ miles ; the mean distance being $94,881,890.3$; and the eccentricity of its orbit, 1,595,339.4:-taking the Earth's mean diameter at 7912 miles, and the Sun's horizontal parallax at 8.6".] Now as the Sun remains fixed in the lower focus of the Earth's orbit, it is easy to perceive that a line', passing centrally through the Sun at right angles with the transverse or longer axis of the orbit, will divide it into two unequal segments: precisely thus it is divided by the equinoctial. That portion of the Earth's orbit which lies above the Sun, or north of the equinoctial, contains about $184^{\circ}$; while the portion which lies below the Sun, or south of the equinoctial contains only $176^{\circ}$. This fact shows why the Sun continues about 8 days longer on the north side of the equator in summer than it does on the south side in winter.

Important Discqvery.-The Baltimore Atheneum says that some very remarkable lectures were lately delivered ly Mr. Biot, at the College de France.-He has proved, that, ly polarized rays it is possible to ascertain the chemical action which takes place between bodies held in solution in various liquids; an action which has not yet been discovered by less delicate means. The discovery, it is thought, will lead to the most important resiltes.

Equalizing the Blood- in the Human System. - We see that a patent has beon taken out at Washington for an
apparatus to effect the above important parpose. The limb affected, or the whole body, is to be enclosed in a tube or vessel rendered air tight by India rubber, and the air is to be then extracted by micans of an air pump, so as to take off atmospheric pressure from the part enclosed, and thereby cause an influx of blood. Heat is at the same time to be applied, to propitiate the circulation.

Bleeding to death. - Whore an artery of consilerable size is cut, it is in general neeessary to tie it up, and in most cases if a surgeon be not at hand, the person dies in a short time. The following simple plan for checking the hamorrhage, until surgical assistance can be bad, may prove useful. Pass a strong corrd, string or handkerchief iround a limb, and above the point of injury ; tie it tight, so that it will not slip, and insert a stick of any kind between it and the limb; by twisting the stick around (which is thus formed into a kind of lever) the cord or handkerchief may he made so tense around the limb, as to stop the circulation of the blood, which may be thus retained for several houre, without injury to the individual.

We know disenses of stoppings and suffocations, says Bacon, are the most dangerous in the boly; and it is not muchotherwise in the mind: you may take sarza to open the liver, steel to open the spleen, flower of sulphur for the lungs, casto reum for the brain; but no receipt openeth the heart but a true friend, to whom you may impart griefs, joys, fears, hopes, suspicions, counsels, and whataoever lieth upon the heart to oppress it, in a kind of civil shrift or confessioin. - Whero peace is, there Gad is, or diwells.

Important to Farmers.-Beet Sugar.-As the manufucture of Sugar from Beets, may ere long be undertaken by some of our Agriculturists, the following article from an American paper, may be of interest :-

It appears that a Mr. Lecerf, of Ournaing, in the arrondissement of Valenciounes, has for sometime made sugar of most excellent quality, and that the apartments used as his factory are only two in number, one of which is 17 feet, the other 7 feet square. The machinery in the first apartment, consists of a wooden insp turned by a crank, a hand-press of the sume material, three small iron kettles. containing 25 to 30 gallons each, and three filterers of the same capacity.. cach, and moulds ranged around for the reception of the sugar. The price of the whole apparntus does not exceed \$125. The quantity of sugar mate daily is 110 pounds. It thus appears that every farmer may make his own sugar, but as every furmer may not wish to incur even this expense, it is suggested that compranies be formed in towns and villages who shall purchase the roots from the farmers. Speuking of the nature of the soils most adnpted to the culture of this vegetable, the writer of the article referred to, says that those which are sanily and formell by alluvial deposits are the hest, although n portion of almost every farm might be found sufficienty suitable to justify the cultivation of the root. 'To give ant idea of the profit to be derived from this manufacture, it is estimuted that an acre will produce 1000 bushels of beet- 1600 have been raised on that space-each bushel weighing 60 pounds. Numerous experiments show that the root yields seven per cent of sugar, three per cent of molasses, and twenty-five per cent of cake. The estimates here given of cost are said to be very liberal, probalily double the real amount; but as the expeuse of fuel nised in the evaporation will be the greatest * itom, each farmer can calculate for himself. From the above data, it would certainly seem that there are few crops indeed from which a greater profit can be derived than the beet. The experiment is well worthy of trial, and if successful, must be, in a climate like ours, a source of great wealth.-Baltimore American.

BRIDF HINTSTOR AUTUMN YORE.
Furrow draias shauld be cut by passing the plough throe or four times through the same furrow, and they should be maile through all low parto of the field. They should be
well cleared of loose earth by means of a shovel or hoe, so as to admit the surface water in wet seasons to pass freely off.

Corn should always be cut up, that is cut off near the surface of the ground, und not topped, or cut off above the ears. The former is more expeditious, it saves twice as much fodder, and is attended with a better crop of corn, as it is always diminished considerably by topping. This has been proved by repeated experiments, where the crop, was measured.

Seed corn should always be selected in autumn-talse such for this purpose as have the greatest number of ears to the stalk.

Grain fed to hogs should always, if possible, be first ground to menl.

Considerable advantage is derived from feeding cooked food, (steamed or boiled) to hogs, and it should always be practiced when the number is sufficient to warrant the erection of proper apparatus for it.

Cooked food for fatening cattle is of little advantage, and commonly not worth the trouble.

Advantage is generally derived from nsing mixed food for domestic animals.

Straw may always be of great use to the farmer in many ways, und is well worth preserving. The following method of securing it is given by a correspondent : ' Previous to thresh:ig I go to a hay stack, and twist a quantity of bands from six to ten feet long, which are placed at the barn door, and when the straw is raked to the door, two men take a band and stretch it over the bundle of straw, and then run each a hand under it, and turn it over endwise, when one of them fastens the band, and the other preparjs another band. In this manner, two men will bind as fast as the swiftest machine will thresh, and the straw is stacked as securely as wheat, and in one fourth of the time required when not bound.' 'When wanted, it may be afterwards removed with far less tronble than when stacked without binding.

Strawberries may be transplanted with advantage in the carly part of autumn.

Fruit trees may be removed and transplanted after the first of October. Most farmers who transplis fruit trees suffer a great loss by not doing the work well. The principal care needed is, first, to dig the holes large, say six feet across, and fifteen or eighteen inches deep; secondly, to preserve, carefully, the roots, as entire and uninjured.

as possible, and not to suffer them to become dry out of the ground; and thirdly to fill the hole with finely pulverized, rich earth, (not manure) shaking it in, in small quantities, and packing it closely but gently along the roots, so as to leave them in their natural position in the soil. The whole expenses of this would not be more than half the price of the tree, and in five years it would bo three times the size which it would be if transplanted by the common way of digging small holes, and doing the work hastily and imperfectly.

Deep ploughing prevents injury from drowth, by allowing the roots to strike deeply, while if they only extended on the surface, the plants would perish from a want of moisture.

Deep ploughing prevents drowning of plants, because a heavy rain, by sinking in a deep soil, and diflusing itself through it, does not so much affect it ; while a shallow one would be surcharged and flooded.

But deep ploughing may materially injure land, if a barren subsoil is thrown up and mixed with the more fertile soil at the surface; when therefore a shallow soil is to be deepened, it must be accompanied with a due application of manure.-Gen. Farmer:

Early sort of Corn.- This sort seems to be butlate: ly introduced into New England. "It has very small stalks, but hears sound ears, and gives a good crop. Those who have raised this kind think they can raise as many or more bushels on an acre as of the larger seed." This kind of corn is generally two or three weeks earlier than the common kind: this fact has been ascertained ly experiments, many having raised both kinds in adjoining fields, and on the same kind of soils.

The advantages accruing from this early seed corn are many and well described by a practical farmer, as follows -" The ears sit low on the stalk, grow to a good size, and the grain is heavy. I think it is as valuable for use as any other kind of this grain ; and from the fact that it will bear planting so thick; I believe that I can secure a larger product than from any other that I have ever tried. But the circumstance which gives it its chief excelience, in my estimation, arises from the fact that I can gather my corn in season for the sowing of wheat or rye. In the most unfavorable seasons, wheat or rye may be sown in Soptember, and in very favorable peasons oarly in that month."

At a lale meeting of the London Horticultural Society, Mr. Knight, the President, deseribel the culture of a new variety of potatoo, wherely 1000 bushels (each bushel 60 lbs.) may be obtained as the average produce of an acre. He also stated that he had found a ininute quantity of the flower of sulphur very efficacious in destroying the red spider on peach and nectarine trees, and on inelon vines.

Planting Forest Trees.-The hest time for planting acorns and walnuts, as well as peaches, cherries and other stone fruits, is in the fall of the year, as soon as they are ripe. If they are kept long after becoming thoroughly ripe, they are apt to lose their vegetative principle.

Remedy for Vermin in Sheep. Mr. Coke's recipe for dressing ull his flocks previous to winter, was as follows: two pounds of tobacco, two pounds and a half of soft soap, one pound of white mereury in powder, boil in eight gallons. of water one hour; jart the wool once down each shoulder and the breast, and twice along each side ; into which pour it; this quantity is enough for forty sheep.Young's Annals.

Dairy Secret.-Have ready two pans in boiling water; and on the new milk's coming to the dairy, take the hot pans out of the wator, put the milk in one of them, and cover it with the oiher. 'Ihis will occasion great aug. mentation in the thickuess and quality of the cream.

Remedies against Rats and Mice.-Take a spoonful of flour, mixed with some scrapings of old cheese, and seeds of hemlock, (cicuta,) made as fine as possible. Set it where the mice haunt. If it be set in a bouse, let it not be in the same apartment with any thing whieh is food for man. This mixture, according to Deane's New England Farmer, will destroy all the mice which have access to it; and the same poison will destroy rats.

Hints to House-keepers.-Builing codfish in hard water makes fish firmer. Soap should be cut up in pieces that it may be kept hard. A. little wet whiting will get ink out of boards. A little white wax will clear-atarch nicely. Milk will take ink out of prints.

To boil Peas or Beans.-That dry peas or beans may readily boil soft in hard water, throw a small quantity of sub-carbonate of soda, (common soda of the shopa,) into the vessel in which the dry seeds are put to boil.

Recipe for the Croup.-Sponges or napkins dipped in the hottest water, wrung out, and applied to the throat, are said to be excellent in the croup.

Recipe-Linseed, sugar, liquorice, and lemon juice, added to a little rum, are said to be an excellent recipe for a cough.

Cure for a Burn.--Scrape the inside of a potatoe; mix oil and turpentine so as to make a poulcice of the inixture; apply it to the burn immediately, and it will extract the heat.

China Ware-In Chiaa, it is said that the prepared clay for the manufacture of porcelain ware is buried in deep pits, and left to ripen there for half a century; by which means their porcelain attaius that semi-pelucid and pearly. delicacy which has never been equalled in this country or in England.

Transparent Cement for uniting broken glass.-It is said that Isinglass; boiled in spirits of wine, makes a fino transparent cement, which will unite broken glass, rendering the fracture almost imperceptible and very atrong.

Early Frugality.-In early childhood you lay the foundation of poverty or riches, io the habits you give your children. Teach them to save every thing;-nofor their mon use, for that would make them selfish-but for some use. Teach them to share every thing with their playmates; but never allow them to destroy auy thing. I once visited a family where the most exact economy was observed, yet nothing was mean or uncomfortable. It is the character of true economy to be as consfortable with little as others are with much. In this family, when the father brought a package, the older children would of their own accord put away the paper a. twine neatly, instead of throwing them in the fire, or tearing them to pieces. If the little ones wanted a piese of twine to spin a top, there it was in readiness; and when they threw is upon the floor, the older children had no need to be told to jut if again in ite place.
