A Berlin tradesman, Hans Wilhelm EGGEN @ Peter MILLE-MUELLER is stated to travel frequently to Switzerland and to act as liaison between Himmler and certain German and Swiss agents active in Switzerland. He uses as cover the purchase of wooden barracks for Germany. One of his contacts is Dr. jur. Paul MEYER of Zurich, a former officer of the Swiss Intelligence Service but no details regarding the purpose of their meetings have been obtained. EGGEN was born on 5.6.12. When in Zurich he usually stays at the Hotel Baur au Lac or Hotel Bellerive au Lac. His Berlin address is, Dahlmanstrasse 35,


- 2. A certain Alexander FINSK who emigrated from Vienna to Zurich in 1938, was reported to be a German agent in November 1943 and to be under the surveillance of the Swiss police. FINSK is a stateless subject, who was born at Vienna on 25.5.00.
- J. It is now known that the notorious Dr. Fritz GIBHARDT @ Dr. UNTERBERG was working at the German Consulate in Zurich about June 1940. He was planning to work in Germany as a mechanic. The agent was sent to Iberia and North Africa after being trained in Germany.
- Early in 1945 an agent of the German Intelligence Service, Eduard WARTJEN was staying at the Hotel Baur au Lac, Zurich. He is interested in conomic espionage and is active mainly in Turkey. He is of mixed Danish and American extraction.
- 5. In September 1943 a certain Friedrich ZITTA arrived at the Hotel Schweizerhof, Zurich as the representative in Switzerland of the German railways. His predecessor, Friedrich STRIBEL was arrested for espionage in May 1943. ZITTA's appointment may have been only temporary as his residence card expired in December 1943. The Swiss police were stated to be investigating his activities. He was born in Berlin on 20.1.91.

## GENERAL

1. About December 1945 a certain Armand DURUSSEL, who was born on 29.9.01 left Switzerland on a journey to Iberia. He is an active agent of K.O. Schweiz.

A report dated November 1943 stated that a Republican Fascio had been formed at Geneva. It was under the leadership of Oswald OLIVIA, secretary of the former Fascio. Only 20 members had so far been enrolled.

The most active members were a certain BERUITI and his two sons, BALDACCI and his son and one STELLA, who worked at the Italian Consulate.

After an excellent lunch at which Mrs. Wolf was also present and during which the conversation remained general, the three of us proceeded to Wolf's study. Wolf started the conversation by saying that, as a continuation of an earlier meeting with 493, Eggen had come to try to arrange a meeting between 110 and his superior, Schellenberg. I asked why and he replied that Schellenberg wanted to explore jointly with 110 the possibilities of bringing the war to an early conclusion. He, Eggen, continued that it should still be possible to arrange terms between the Americans, and the British in order to prevent the Communization of Germany. I told him that there would be no point in a meeting between 110 and Schellenberg unless the latter were able to suggest a plan that would fit within the framework of the Yalta conference and the recent speech of the President before the joint session of Congress. He replied that in his opinion the President's speech was only for public consumption and, when I assured him that he was in error, he replied that Germany would then have to fight to the bitter end. A surrender without a guarantee of the immediate establishment of a strong central German government would mean chaos and the Communisation of Germany because Naziism and Communism are closely related and that, with the exception of the upper ten thousand, Germany was ripe for Communism. I told him that continued resistance was hopeless and that resistance could only intensify the chaos his people feared. The continuing destruction of life and the means of production would only work to the ultimate detriment of Germany. To my surprise he agreed with this. However he claims that it would be impossible for anyone to seize power and then surrender Germany unless guarantees were granted by the Allies. I told him I hoped and believed that somewhere in Germany there must be a man strong enough to seize the power and wise enough to see that unconditional surrender was now the best policy for the German people. Eggen said he would report to Schellenberg but that he had very little hope of success. This ended the specific conversation.

## Random notes:

In a more general conversation which both preceded and followed the foregoing, Wolf, who knows Eggen extremely well, told him that The Germans always were too late in making proposals and always failed to understand the point of view of the rest of the world anyhow. This Eggen took in good part.

Eggenmentioned that the recent Russian successes had been greatly aided by small fry members of the Muly 20th group whom the SS had not bothered to arrest. This policy, he said, had been a serious error.

Wolf and Eggen returned by car with me to Zurich and were dropped in a side street. Eggen had an appointment with Masson on Monday afternoon and was then returning to Berlin by car.

I asked both Eggen and Wolf for a drink before lunch on Mondy. At this time I suggested to Eggen that, as part of his duties were maintaining liaison with Jap Intelligence, and that as he had said that he thoroughly despised them, he might at some <u>future</u> date be able to help us in that direction. He didn't answer, but to my surprise, did say that if we wanted anybody or any small thing out of Germany he would arrange it for us.

Eggen stated that the outside duration of the war could not exceed eight months and that the end would probably come much sooner.

Subject of research on atom smashing was casually mentioned and Eggen stated that the Germans were pursuing this subject primarily in order to try to obtain better propulsion powers for airplaines and guns. (I already discussed this with Dr. Chiddick).

## Later conversation with Wolf:

- 1. Wolf states that Eggen has been very useful to the Swiss in having specific people released or exchanged.
- 2. That he has provided excellent information to the Swiss of a political nature.
- 3. That Swiss Intelligence will protect Eggen when Germany collapses.
- 4. That Eggen would most probably arrange for the release of anyone we particularly wanted out.
- 5. That in his opinion Eggen probably would be willing to give us Jap intelligence.
- 6. That Eggen would not turn against Germany unless the use of gas were ordered.
- 7. That Iggen would be back in Switzerland in about ten days or a fortnight.
- 8. That if it was ever wanted by us a direct channel now exists to Himmler.

1. With reference to 110's B-009 of 18 January 1945, you have probably in the meentime received London's XX 5307 of 13 Februzry 1945, which establishes the fact that Hans ECKEN is identical with SS Sturmbannfughrer Hans Wilhelm ECGEN.

2. We agree with 110's conclusion that EGGEN is not the right man for us. We believe, as does 110, that all our efforts should be bent towards finding a very highly-placed German to penetrate their intelligence and Party organization for us. however, we differ somewhat from 493 in the evaluation of Lugan, who seems to us not to be "thoroughly reliable" but rather a very shrewd and intelligent man who is trying to penetrate us and, probably on orders from his superiors, attempting to establish good relations with representatives of the Allies.

- 3. EGGEN made several statements to 493 which quite obviously are not correct and which EGGEN must have known were not true; on page 3 he is quoted as having said that Germany is invulner-able to strategic bombing. The facts belie this statement. The statement that the gasoline crisis in Germany had passed is equally untrue. The fact that his own gas ration had been increased is no criterion whatsoever, since he is performing ( vitally important assignments for the German war effort. On page 5 EGGEN makes the statement that in his belief the war will in so on for enother two or three years and result in no one's winning. Certainly no honest person could in January 1945, with enemy armies in the east and west of Germany, believe that the Germans could hold out for enother two or thee years, at the end
  - 4. 493 may have been misled by EGGEN's statement that HIMMLER "apparently has made the FUEHRER class," since HIMMLER has for many years been "REICHSFUEHRER of the SS."
  - A 5. Paragraph 9 on page 5 is just one more attempt on the part of German emissaries such as EGGEN to try to split the Allies by mointaining that the Russians are already negotiating with Germany "and are not playing fair with us." We believe it most dangerous even to make it appear as though we were willing to believe such statements or perhaps to establish contact with high German officials on the basis thereof.

Para 48. According to SCHELLENEERS, GAKAI was an obviously specially picked intelligence officer working with AOJIMA. He was in contact with ECGEN. The latter worked with SAKAI on an economic basis. As far as SCHELLENEERS remembers, he founded a firm for which the Japanese had to find the money. Apart from the tendency to put thereby his financial position in order (ECGEN had, it seems, lost a great deal of money in Hungary and France), he achieved good relations based on confidence with SAKAI. This man must have had contacts with the Russians or must have known ways to approach them... ECGEN always pretended that the Japanese, therefore mainly SAKAI and KOJIMA, wanted to win over SCHELLENEERS for cooperation with the Russians

- 1. Hans Wilhelm ECCEN is 32 years old, tall with an athletic build. His hair is black, his eyes brown. He has an oval face and is clean shaven. ECCEN's manner is pleasant, his voice soft. Nicknamed FATER, he is the son of a well-to-do Bremen family, who were in the textile industry. At his university ECCEN was a member of a dueling fraternity.
- 2. As a Hastuf in Amt VI, EGGEN is considered a dangerous and intelligent man with unbelievable contacts in the Wehrmacht, the SS, the various police units, and the Nazi Party, albeit he is not known to be a party member. EGGEN was a personal friend of HIMMLER, he worked in an ante-room of SCHELLEN-BENG's Berlin office and shared to HELLENBENG's private living quarters. He was a close friend of Chergruppenfuhrer FOHL, who also lived with SCHELLENBENG, EGGEN is believed to have used several aliases; AGCI, MILLE, AGHLET, and Paul MALLER.
- 3. SCHELLENBERG reports that EGGEN was his principal agent in Switzerland our evidence tends to verify this. EGGEN often came to Switzerland under cover of a delivery agent for wooden barracks. One of his missions under this cover, involved his offering large stocks of industrial machines to Switzerland. These machines could not be taken into the Reduit and were being sold to build Nazi credit abroad. EGGEN is believed to have had a permanent visa for Switzerland.
- A. Subject is known to have been in contact with Col Roser MASSON, chief of the Swiss Intelligence bervice, who is now under investigation by the Swiss; Pauly-Holzach, a Swiss, believed to be a captain in the Swiss Intelligence Service; Dr. Pauly ISTER, whose pen hame is Wolfyschwertenbach, and who is also a Swiss Intelligence officer. Econn is known to have been in contact with Hand Dauffildt, SD chief for Switzerland. #### Lebenslauf of Hans Wilhelm EGGEN

I was born on 5.6.1912 in Wennigsen b/Hannover, the son of Johann Wilhelm EGGEN, a police court judge. My father was a judge by profession. I completed the first six years of school in my parents' home with a private tutor. Later I attended the Leibnizschule in Hanover with a break between Untersecunda-Obersecunda. At that time I intended to specialize in agriculture. At 21 I received my diploma. My father had at that time and until his death on 14 August 1934 financial participation in various undertakings of private industry. Therefore our family had good industrial connections. After the completion of my schooling in the autumn of 1932, I joined Cavalry Regiment 13 in Hannovor as a one-year volunteer. I there received the rank of corporal with the qualification of reserve officer, and thereafter matriculated at the legal school in Tibingen. There I was active in the Bo-russia Corps. Thereafter I alternated my studies between Berlin and Tübingen, and at the beginning of 1937 took my final examinations in Berlin. In the meantime I had again done military service.

after the change of government in 1933 It was necessary for every student enrolled in Garman universities, if he wished to continue his studies, to become a member of the National Socialist Students League It was a family tradition that I, like my father and grandfather, should. be active in the Borussia Corps. The National Socialist Students League required that its members resign from corporations, which were then later completely dissolved. In order to avoid membership in the National Socialist Students Loague, to which we Corps-students were strongly opposed, I decided, in order to be able to pursue my studies at the University, to join as a civilian the "allgemeinen SS" and at the same time, of necessity, the MSDAP. My joining the SS, as well as the NSDAP fat that time one could not foresee the later changed character of the SS) was for me entirely a matter of form. Until the beginning of the war and also until August 1940, because of an office in the Party, I also hold office in the SS. At this time as a Wehrmacht officer, I was still en ordinary SS men without any rank. In August 1940 as an officer of Gavalry Regiment 9, I was assigned to a post on the French border. I was at that time Leutnant and a short time later became an Oberleutnant. At that time because of my knowledge gained from my civilian profession. I was ordered to the Führungshauptamt, department of Foreign- and Currency Control. At the some time I was liaison officer to the Ministry of Commerce. At first I served at the Führungshauptant as a Wehrmacht officer. Because of a general order I was transferred in 1941 to the Waffen SS. From the beginning I used my activity at the Führungshauptent to mitigate, as far as it lay within my power, hardships and injustices. There are sufficient exemples in which I gave proof of my sympathies and that at a time when Germany still played a part in Europe.

I would like at this time to state de Initely that in this war I took no part in any fighting and so employed my activity within the framework of the industrial bureau that there are international proofs of it. Information about my activity can be given by Dr. Westrick, lawyer, who was formerly active in Berlin and a former member of the Board of directors on UNILEVER and Standard Electric. Dr. Westrick is also known to Mr. Dulles. Zürich, 10. September 1945.



## DAUFELDT's Expulsion and Subsequent Events

The situation in Switzerland deteriorated rapidly with the changing war situation. By March 1945 the Swiss authorities had requested the removal of DAUFELDT himself and Amt VI representation within the couuntry itself cassed. There was however a replacement in the person of Graf DOENHOF who was appointed to the Consulate in Zurich. Surprisingly enough, DOENHOF's appointment was possible as a result of the benign cooperation of the Foreign Office, an event which did not however reflect any closer cooperation between Amt VI and the Foreign Office, but which was due to DOENHOF's own close personal friendship with STEENGRACHT of the Foreign Office. DOENHOF had had only a short period of training with VI D before his departure and was the officer responsible for the final mission of the notorious SETH. It hardly be said of course that this unexpected assistance from the Foreign Office was too late to be effective. DOENHOF, who had in any case very little idea of what his functions were to be, was expelled soon after his arrival.

## The Sonderlinien

There remains one aspect of Amt VI work in Switzerland to be dealt with which is of importance, not so much for the results it achieved, but as a reflection of SCHELLENBERG's conduct of Amt VI SCHELLENBERG did not allow himself to be bound by recognised channels, and when the official reporting channels of Amt VI fell short of his standards, SCHELLENBERG established where possible his own sources of information. These contacts have been referred to as his 'Sonderlinien'. Such a link existed in Switzerland in the person of Hastuf EGGEN, and the establishing of the contact was a reflection on the inability of DAUFELDT to produce the desired results. EGGEN travelled frequently to Switzerland inthe course of his busimess and was exploited by SCHELLENBERG to establish contacts within the country; these contacts were on a high level and it was mainly through EGGEN that SCHELLENBERG maintained relations with the Swiss Intelligence The extent to which this contact proved valuable to SCHELLENBERG is still a matter of doubt but the mere contact itself was a considerable achievement. EGGEN was also responsible for arranging SCHELLENBERG's visits to Switzerland.

This method ofpenetrating Switzerland was also adopted by STEIMLE, the Gruppenleiter who attempted to exploit Dr GARDEMANN as a personal agent. GARDEMANN had previously been employed in the German Embassy in Madrid, where he had acted as a personal informer for RIBBENTROP. STEIMLE's effort was however informer for RIBBENTROP. unsuccessful as it was not found possible to persuade the Swiss authorities to allow GARDEMANN to enter the country.

The personal contact arrangement was further in evidence when SONNENHOHL, a professional diplomat who had seen previous service in France, was sent to Switzerland late in 1944. SONNENHOHL was not an Amt VI representative in the true sense of the term, but, through a personal agreement with STEIMIE, provided the latter with excellent political reports on Switzerland. These in any case would have gone to the Foreign Office and were not the product of the Secret Service, but were symptomatic of the strained relations existing between the Foreign Office and Amt VI.



I am informed that the German subject, Hans Wilhelm EGGEN, who entered Italy on 1 October 1945, has been arrested at Ponte Chiasso, and is now detained by the American military authorities in Italy. Althout any reference to the charges that the Allies might bring against him, I should like to state the following:

- 1) In my capacity as Deputy Chief of the General Staff of the Swiss Army, I have dealt with the repatriation of a certain number of Allied subjects. Their liberation took place before the end of the war.
- 2) Hr. EGGEN, whom I have known since 1941, has assisted me in rendering this service to the Allies. He was responsible, for instance, for the liberation of General VANNEMANN, fermer Wilitary Attache at the American Embassy in Berlin, who had been detained by the Germans. General VANNEMANN, who is at present in the United States, told me when he passed through Berne that, if it were mosessary, he would willingly attest to the very great help given him by EGGEN. Moreover, EGGEN was responsible for the liberation of several other Allied subjects. I shall only mention the cases of General GRAUD's family and Major DODGE of the British Army.
- 8) While in Switzerland, EGGEN was arrested a few days before the end of the war by the Swiss authorities, and detained for several months. He was eventually liberated, as nothing could be proved against him.





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to take the topic order to the control of the 46. KOJIMA, so SCHELLENDERG says, recognised very clearly these mistakes in German policy. In the course of many conversations he had with SCHELLENBERG on this subject he declared: The German military authorities regard everything only through their narrow military spectacles. For instance Admiral MEISEL sees only his U-boats and has no other problems. KOJIMA knew very well all the deficiencies of the German leadership. He had no use whatsoever for RIBBENTROP. One day in January or February 1945, KOJIMA, confiding himself to SCHELLENDERG, said: The whole German state machinery, also the military leadership of the Reich, are over-organized; in separate sections everything works very well and in an examplary way. What is lacking, however, is the right combination of the whole. Hitler has concentrated everything on himself. This will not do. He needs a Reich General Staff and a Reich Cabinet. Co-operation with Japan has not been realised either in the political, the military or even the economic field in the manner in which a war like this makes it imperative. RIBBENTROP, KOJIMA said, confuses foreign policy with propaganda. His (KOJIMA's) main object after his an return to Germany had been to bring about a compromised peace between Germany and Russia. Behind him had stood the opinion of the Japanese navy which regarded a block, Germany-Russia-Japan, as a desirable goal.

47. Japan had even been propared to give up parts of Manchukuo and other territories and to bring about a complete change in the policy vis a vis China. KOJIMA said it had taken a long time before he had convinced OSHIMA of the necessity for such lines of thought, as OSHIMA had been a devoted follower of Hitler's ideas. RIBBENTROP and Hitler had shown completely wrong reactions and had transferred the centre of gravity of entirely superficial soundings to Tokio and Ambassador STAHMER who as a result of the questions which he was asked to put officially to the Japanese Foreign Ministry, had given a wrong direction to the whole course of events. KOJIMA said now everything was too late and he regretted sincerely that he had to wait to February 1945 to speak with SCHELLENDERG in this way. He thought that if he had found the line to SCHELLENDERG in 1944 things would have gone better. The same applied also to the intelligence connection between SAKAI and EGGEN.

48. According to SCHELLENDERG, SAKAI was an obviously specially picked intelligence officer working with KOJIMA. He was in contact with EGGEN. The latter worked with SAKAI on an economic basis. As far as SCHELLENVERG remembers he founded a firm for which the Japanese had to find the money. Apart from the tendency to put thereby his financial position in order (EGGEN had, it seems lost a great deal of money in Hungary and France), he achieved good relations based on confidence with SAKAI. This man must have had contacts with the Russians or must have known ways to approach them. It was planned that EGGEN should together with SAKAI, meet a Russian spokesman in Bern at OKAMOTO's house. This meeting did not, however, take place as OKAMOTO fell gravely ill (it was alleged that he had a heart attack). SCHELLENBERG remembers EGGEN telling him that the Russian in question was a professor at one of the Swiss Universities (Zurich?). His name was something like ORLOWSKI(?). EGGEN always pretended that the Japanese, therefore mainly SAKAI and KOJIMA, wanted to win over SCHELLENDERG for co-operation with the Russians. KCJIMA referred to disagreements between the Army and Navy in Japan. The Navy wanted a quick termination of the war in China and a moderate, peaceful and purely Asiatic co-operation with China as well as a close alliance with Russia, which in KOHIMA's view was quite natural because Russia needed in the Pacific a naval power tuned in with Russian policy. KOJIMA firmly believed in his thesis. He was therefore also of the opinion that it was essential that a more intelligent and more flexible Japanese Ambassador should be dispatched to Moscow. He maintained that MATSUOKO was too old for his job. He also said that the Japanese army always wanted to show off and for this reason prolonged the war in China.

49. This difference of views was also perceptible between KOMATSU and KOJIMA. They kept from each other their visits to SCHELLENBERG.

- 182. SCHELLENBERG, though not providing concrete proofs, connects KALTENBRUNNER with the shooting of British officers at Hallo.
- 183. Ludwig NEUBERG, chief of the Spanish desk of Amt VI is described by SCHELLEN-BERG as "an unimportant man".
  - 184. Licut. Colonel FREUND. This officer of Amt VI Z (counter espionage) worked under ROHLEDER and dealt with questions affecting the Balkans. In this subject he was at home and knew all the lines there. SCHELLENEERG says that he chose him for counter-espionage work because he was less obstinate and disputatious than ROHLEDER. He collaborated closely with Dr. SCHMITZ of the Secretariat because SCHMITZ also made use of FREUND for counter-espionage at home. FREUND was a valuable colleague vis a vis Amt IV that is, "against MUELLER". Fro MUELLER nursed the plan to take over the whold of counter-espionage as a domain for the Staatspolizei. Abroad he wanted to hand over the desk to the Police Attaches. In Section VI Z FREUND was still a new-comer. His special successes in former times must have been in the Balkans. SCHELLENBERG did not know much about them. He thinks that FREUND must always have been very efficient because he was recommended by everybody. Other special territories of FREUND were Switzerland, Spain and Portugal. In Switzerland, the solution of the "Agent 509" case was his particular hobby. In Portugal FIGURD maintained close contact with Fritz CRIMER and in Spain with ROHLSCHEIDT. FIGURD that the work many names in Spain, Portugal and Switzerland.   - of. Dr. SCHINDOWSKI originally came from Tilsit. In 1943-4 he was in Amt VI C. was then posted to Amt VI Kult as special assistant to SANDBERGER. One of his actions was to receive and entertain visitors. He was presentable and sufficiently intelligent.
  - 187. Standartonfuehrer TSCHIERSKY. TSCHIERSKY was removed by SCHELLENBERG from Amt VI C because he was too stupid. He joined PRUETZMANN's staff and was always in PRUETZMANN's special train. He must know everything which can be known about the Werewelves and their training.
  - 188. Standartenfuehrer RAPP. RAPP was put in command by SCHELLENBERG of the remnants of Amt VI in North Germany when the offices of the RSHA were divided into Northern and Southern sections. He was SCHELLENBERG's specialist on Polish questions.
  - 189. Obersturmbannfuehrer PAEFICEN. PAEFFCEN was an efficient intelligence officer, but without initiative or independent political judgement. He always required to be given instructions. SCHELLENGERG had confidence in him.
    - 190. Obersturmbannfuehrer BERNHARD. BERNHARD was an altogether negligible figure.
  - 191. Oberstleutnant FOCKE. SCHELLENBERG has no respect for FOCKE, whom he describes as hard working and active but stupid and politically uneducated.
  - 192. Major LOOS of Mil Amt D was given to SKORZENY as NAUMANN's successor by KALTENBRUNNER. LOOS, like KALTENBRUNNER, was native of Linz, and this constituted a bond between them.

[Page 7, paragraphs 6 XXXI: Source's Part in Surrender Negotiations; and 7: Relations with Japanese.] During late 1944 on one os EGGENS'S visits to MAYer's home, he met two US Vice Consuls, Loughborough and Doenisch. During discussion of war situation became clear to EGGEN that Germany's only hope was to sue for peace. On his next visit to SCHELLENBERG in Berlin he reported this and urged SCHEL. to see Himmler. SCHEL. however unwilling since he would have to do so through Kalterbrunner with whom he on bad terms. Kalt. would undoubtedly use occasion to get rid of SCHEL. SCHEL than therefore suggested EGGEN try see Himmler through FHA head XNEIN JUETTNER. was done but EGGEN was unlucky at hqs. and only relayed substance of msg to Himmler's ADC. EGGEN NXXXXX stated in the interrog. report that he had no a connection with the negotiations carried on in Switzerland by WOLFF.

Re relations with the Japanese, in early 44, EGGEN on visit to Berlin on economic matters was introduced to Dir.Gen. SCHAAR of the Reichsbank and Pres. of the Japanese Committee in Germany. SCHAAR mantioned that Jpanese were xxx anxious to negotiate contracts for equipment in Switzerland and asked EGGEN to help. At dinner with Japanese Com he met SAKAI,XKWMI KOJIMA, and others, including OTANI. Japanese

Swiss france and in return **remidixhexef**x Japanese could be of service in starting negotiations with Russians as they still at peace with Soviets. EGGEN stated that he reported this to SCHEL. who was scared of negotiating with Russians for fear that if he were the first to talk openly of it in at the RSHA it would cost him his head. He did ask EGGEN, however, to maintain contact and keep him informed.

Therefore EGGEN continued to meet SCHAAR and SAKAI from time to time. SCHELLENBERG made no move, but when SAKAI in summer 44 asked EGGEN if he would call on General OKAMOTO in XMXXX XMXXXX Zurich, SCHEL. told him to do so and see what he could find out. Therefore EGGEN called on OKAMOTO but found him seriously ill from a paralytic stroke. EGGEN recieved no message from him and did not discover why SAKAI had asked him to call. EGGEN stated in the interrog. report that he was certain that no Russian was mentioned in connection with this affair/and maintained that he did not know that SAKAI was an Intelligence officer.

(b) History and Career

Source is the son of a wealthy Amtsgerichtrat and business man and was born at WENNINGSEN (HANOVER) on 5 Jun 1912. He went to school in HANOVER, aid a year's military service with the Reichswehr, and then went to University in TUEBINGEN (1933/4 and 1935/6) and BERLIN (1934/5) where he studied law. He joined the Nazi Party and at the same time the Allgemeine SS in 1933, claiming that it would otherwise have been impossible to continue his studies and general student activities. In 1936 he went into a textile firm in BERLIN in order to get an insight into business methods and in 1937 did the same with a banking firm in BERLEN, finally taking up the management of his own family business (Warenvertriebs G.m.b.H.) in BERLIN (Tauentzienstr. 12A) in 1938. This firm was an international import and export business dealing in various commodities.

At the outbreak of war Source was called to the colours as a Ltn on the Wehrmacht reserve and was posted to Reiterregiment 9, then stationed on the West German frontier. In Mar 40, because of his experience in the import and export business, he was recalled from the Army and posted to the Auslandsund Devisen Referat (Foreign and Currency Dept) of the SS Fuchrungshauptamt (FHA), shortly afterwards being promoted to Obltn of the Wehrmacht. as the result of a general order covering all Wehrmacht reserve officers working in Sa organisations, Source was transferred from the Wehrmacht to the Waffon SS with rank of Obersturmfuehrer. He was promoted to SS Hauptsturmfuchrer in 43 and to SS Sturmbannfuchrer in 44. He worked with the FHA throughout the war and maintains that his contacts with Intelligence were In the latter stages of the war he was instrumental in purely incidental. securing the release from GERMANY of the GIRAUD family (Mar 45) and the In Apr 45 he helped to prevent the blowing-up American General VANNEMANN. of the frontier bridge at HOECHST and after the German collapse remained in In Jun 45 he was arrested by the Swiss authorities in connection SWITZERLAND. with a charge brought against Oberst Brigadier MASSON, the Head of the Swiss Nothing, however G.S. Intelligence, and subjected to prolonged interrogation. could be proved against him and Source was released in Oct 45. (c) Assessment

Source is the smooth, German business-man type who expresses a distaste for "Nazis" by stressing the "good old German family atmosphere", from which he comes and his preference for the Wehrmacht as opposed to the SS. He appears to have used his connections with the SS chiefly in order to feather his own nest and his many useful contacts in SWITZERLAND to keep on good terms with the Nazi "big shots" without becoming too involved himself. Although he seems to have been fully co-operative it is probable that he has told his story in such a way as to put himself in a more favourable light.

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## 2. WORK FOR FUEHRUNGSHAUPTAMT (FHA) AND CONNECTIONS WITH AMT VI RSHA

From Mar 40 onwards Source was employed by Amt IX (Beschaffungsamt) of the FHA in negotiating purchases of material abroad for the Waffen SS and in this capacity carried out the necessary liaison work between the FHA on the one hand and the Reichswirtschafts Ministerium (RWM), which controlled the allotment of foreign currency for purchases abroad, and the Rohstoffamt which controlled the allotment of raw materials for such purchases on the As the officer chiefly concerned with negotiating foreign currency matters for the FHA, he was also entrusted with arranging for the payment of pensions, etc, to the relatives of Auslandsdeutsche who had been killed on active service and for this purpose also liaised with the Erzeugungsamt. Similarly his work also led to a certain amount of liaison with the Wirtschafts und Verwaltungshauptamt (WVHA) which acquired certain commodities from abroad: his principal contact at the WVHA was 3S Gruppenfuehrer LOERIER. (He never came in contact with the Chief, SS Obergruppenfuchrer POHL.) Finally his work brought him into contact with Amt VI of the RSHA, since all foreign contracts for the Waffen SS required the personal approval of the Amtschef of VI. In this way Source came into personal contact with SS Brigadefuehrer JOST and later with 33 Gruppenfuehrer SCHELLENBERG. Source, as representative of FHA, also got his passport and visas through this channel which was much more expeditious than the usual one through the Foreign Office. maintains that although he met various members of VI/Wi in SCHELLENBERG's waiting room and in the mess he had no official connections with the Referat at all.

#### D. CO TACTS WITH SWISS G.S. INTELLIGENCE

One of Source's carliest business deals in SWITZERLAND was with the Ewiss Tirber Syndicate (Holzsyndikat) for the delivery of wooden huts to GRA TAME. There were considerable difficulties owing to the attitude of the German Industry Commission (DIKO) which had stopped the delivery of certain from parts necessary for the completion of the huts in order to try to enforce certain financial demands that the Swiss did not wish to meet as they considered them in conflict with agreement made with the Allies. The work on the huts was therefore at a standstill when Source came on the scene, but he was able infinally to smooth out the difficulties between the DIKO and the Timber Syndicate and get the contract completed. During these negotiations, which earned him considerable respect from the Swiss, Source made the acquaintance of a certain Dr RITZBURG (nom-de-plume "SCHWERTENBACH") whom he later learned was Hauptmann MAYER of the Swiss General Stoff Intelligence. It was apparently usual for the Swiss I.S. to have a representative present at all important negotiations between Swiss and foreign firms.

After the conclusion of these negotiations MAYER asked Source if he might be willing to render a service to SWITZERLAND and do something to ingrove the relations between the two countries which were not good at that time. Source agreed and was introduced to a "Press representative" who explained that it would help a lot if the German newspaper "IPA" published in SWITZERLAND could be closed down, since it was making violent attacks on the Shiss C-in-C, General GUYSAN. Source, who realised that these attacks were a clumsy attempt to lower the prestige of the Swiss Army among German-speaking Swiss and secure sympathy and possible recruits for the Wehrmacht, agreed to do what he could. He went to see the Chief of the SS Hauptant Chappenfuehrer BERGER and explained that the propaganda being carried out by TIPA" was having precisely the opposite effect of that intended and alienating all Swiss sympathy. BERGER had the paper closed down.

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Source subsequently learned that the "Press representative" was none other than Oberst Brigadier MASSON, the Head of the Swiss General Staff Intelligence. Both he and MAYER became friends of Source as a result of his work in connection with the suppression of "IPA" and Source was subsequently a frequent guest at MAYER's home at SCHLOSS WOLFSBERG.



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When later in 1941 SCHELLERGERG took over Amt VI at the RSHA and Source among others was required to give the new chief an outline of his activities abroad for the PHA, he told SCHELLENBERG of the "IPA" affair and of the resultant good relations with MASSON and MAYER. SCHELLENBERG expressed his approval of this: some months later he began to show great interest in this contact.

#### 4. RELATIONS SCHELLENBERG-MASSON

The relations between SCHELLENBERG and MASSON started about Christmas 1941. GUYS/N (the Swiss C-in-C) had asked MASSON to try and secure the release of a Swiss agent named MOERGELI who was interned in GERMANY, and MASSON knowing that Source had direct access to SCHELLENBERG on account of his work in SWITZERLAND, asked Source to see what he could do. Source put the case to SCHELLENBERG in BERLIN and the agent was shortly afterwards released and returned to SWITZERLAND. The reasons for this action are unknown to Source but he assumes from later happenings that the VI Amtschef wished to set up a personal connection with the Head of the Swiss General Staff Intelligence.

In fact in the spring of 1942 Source was asked to arrange a meeting between the two and it appeared that they had already discussed this, the initiative coming from SCHELDAMERS. With the help of MAYER the meeting was arranged and took place at WALDSHUT on the German-Swiss frontier. Source was not present at the conversations but thinks it likely that the question of SWITZERLAND's attitude in the event of a German attack was the main subject of the talks: he knows that the Swiss were at that time anxious to know why the Germans were holding a number of divisions in the Black Forest and the German General Staff on their side wanted to assess the Swiss determination to resist. This was quite fixed and Source is certain that MASSON-made this clear to SCHELDAMERS. At the same time, from what he knows of MASSON's attitude to neutrality, Source is equally certain that there was no exchange of intelligence on this occasion.

A sequel to this meeting came at the end of 1943 when the Germans were planning to invade SWITZERLAND and take over the railways and the transport system in order to facilitate the movement of troops and supplies to meet the Allied threat on the Italian mainland. At the last meeting in BERLIN before the final decision to do this was taken, SCHELLENBERG had declared that not only would the Swiss resist the invasion with all the means at their disposal, but would also destroy their railways and important tunnels. This declaration and certain cormercial considerations led to the abandonment of the enterprise. Exacdiately afterwards Source was summoned by SCHELLENBERG and instructed to inform MESSON of what had occurred and to arrange another meeting. This was done and MESSON and SCHELLENBERG met for the second time in Nov or Dec 43 at MEER's home at SCHLOSS WOLFSBERG. Source again was not present at the conversations and cannot state with any certainty what was discussed, but thinks as before that any exchange of intelligence extremely unlikely.

In early 44 a stir was caused in GERMANY by the forced landing in SWITZERLIND of a new Mc 110 equipped with all the latest night-fighter devices which the Swiss Bundesrat had refused to return as not in accordance with neutrality. After a conference between representatives of the Luft-waffe, SKORZENY and SCHELIEMBERG, it had been decided to try to solve the problem by friendly approach and Source was entrusted with the task of negotiation. With the help of MASSON he succeeded in arranging for the machine to be destroyed on the DUEBENDORF airfield in exchange for which favour the Swiss asked to be allowed to buy twelve Me 109G. On his return to GERMANY Source was summoned to HIMALER'S HQ to report on the incident: this he did and secured the Reichmuehrer's agreement to the sale of the aircraft. Six of these were delivered shortly afterwards for a price of 3,000,000 Swiss Frs and a further six some time later for a similar sum.

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It was also about this time (May 44) that SCHELLENBERG tried to obtain



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information from MASSON on the Allied plan for the landings on the Continent and in particular when they were due to take place. Source was asked to try and get this information from MASSON and he approached the Swiss I.S. Chief in the matter; MASSON, however, refused to listen or give such a request consideration.

In the closing stages of the war the connections between MASSON and SCHELLENBERG chiefly concerned the release of prominent internees in GERMANY and negotiations for a surrender, in both of which matters Source was the intermediary. In early 45 MASSON was urging the release of the Belgian King, Paul REYNAUD and DE GAULIE's sister: SCHELLENBERG, although sympathetic, was not willing to take responsibility for these actions owing to fear of KALTENBRUNNER. SCHELLENBERG did, however, ranage to secure the release of the GIRAUD family and Source was entrusted with the task of bringing them from FRIEDRICHSROD, and getting them over the frontier. In Apr 45 Source smuggled out the American General V. WEMANN: this had been another request of MASSON's to SCHELLENBERG which the latter had agreed to without consulting KALTENBRUNNER or HIMALER.

The measons for the continued contacts between SCHELLENBERG and MASSON - were, Source thinks, the following:-

- (a) SCHELMENERG, supported by HEYDRICH and later by KALTENBRUNNER and HIMMLER, was anxious to absorb the Abwehr and get rid of CANARIS and by maintaining a connection with the Head of the Swiss General Staff Intelligence had outmanocuvred the Abwehr and had good material to reinforce the argument for its absorption by the RSIM.
- (b) Further, in his plan for outmanoeuvring RIBBENTROP (whom HIGTER wanted to see replaced by a less powerful rival), SCHELTENEERG planned to use the MASSON connection for opening negotiations with the Allies for a compromise peace. Such peace talks had been planned since the time of HEYDRICH and contemplated securing Allied support for a continued struggle against RUSSIA.

MASSON for his part was interested in the connection with SCHELLENBERG as it represented a means of securing advantages for SWITZERLAND not obtainable by other means; he was also interested in getting the Abwehr out of SWITZERLAND (some of its reports on the alleged activities of foreign Intelligence Services had caused the Swiss General Staff considerable annoyance); and finally he was interested in seeing the war brought to an end and thought. SCHELLENBERG sufficiently powerful to be able to effect something in this direction.

SCHELLENBERG was of course always hoping to obtain intelligence of the Allies through MASSON but never met with any success, as MASSON insisted on a strict neutrality.

#### 5. INTERNAL RELATIONS BETWEEN SWISS GENERAL STAFF AND BUNDESRAT

The contact between MASSON and SCHELLENBERG had a certain effect on the relations between the Swiss General Staff, more particularly Gen GUYSAN, and the Bundesrat. These were apparently strained, a state of affairs that dated from the time of the German invasion of FRANCE, since when GUYSAN had kept up close personal contact with certain high-ranking French Generals, laying down in agreement with them certain points with reference to possible developments of German military operations. The Swiss Bundesrat, convinced of a German victory, repreached GUYSAN with not maintaining neutrality and told him that he was a stumbling block to good relations between SWITZERLAND and GEHMANY. The Swiss General Staff on the other hand, which, through MASSON, bore the brunt of combating German espionage activities in SWITZERLAND, was a sharp opponent of the Bundesrat's extreme tolerance to GERMANY, which manifested itself in large credit allotments and agreement to the setting up of Auslandsorgenisationen. Moreover, GUYSAN was very pro-Allied and Swiss officers, with few exceptions, were anti-German.



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In view of the above position therefore the Bundesrat greeted very warmly the opening of personal contact between MASSON and SCHELLENBERG and as a mark of its appreciation voted for the promotion of MASSON from Oberst to Oberst Brigadier but at the same time decided to try and set up its own direct contacts with the RSHI, in the hope that more substantial favours than those secured by MASSON (suppression of "IPA" and information on the possible invasion of SWITZERLAND) might be obtained. Accordingly on the orders of Bundesrat von STEIGER (then Minister of Justice and now Bundespresident), the head of the Swiss Fremdenpolizei, Dr ROTMUND, went to BERLIN in early 43 to set up contact between the Swiss police and the RSHA. SCHELLENBERG, however, saw in this an undermining of and a danger to his own contact with the Swiss General Staff and arranged that although ROTMUND was to be received with the utmost cordiality he was to return to SWITZERLAND with his mission unfulfilled. The Bundesrat made a second attempt in 1943 and sent Kommissaer MAURER of the Bundesanwaltschaft to BIRLIN with similar mission but once again SCHELLENBERG intervened.

The failure of these two missions caused von STEIGER to view the MASSON-SCHELMENBERG connection with a less favourable eye. At the same time the relations between GUYSAN and the Bundesrat became more tense, owing to the increasing hostility shown by the Swiss officer class to the Bundesrat, and the great popularity of GUYSAN both with the Armed Forces and the civilian population, which was in marked contrast to the relationship between the Bundesrat and the population.

Bundesrat KOBELT, made a third attempt to set up its own connections. On the excuse that he might not always be available either through ill-health or for service reasons, MASSON was told to put Polizeioberst MUELLER, who was also 2 i/c to MASSON in the Swiss I.S., in contact with Source. This was done and during the winter of 1943/4 Source met MUELLER several times. The latter was at pains to explain that the contact with MASSON would only be of value to GERMANY and SWITZERLAND as long as general mobilisation obtained in SWITZERLAND and while GUYSAN had full powers, but that when this state of affairs ceased and the Bundesrat re-acquired full powers he (MUELLER) in his peacetime capacity as Polizeioberst would enjoy a greater trust of the Bundesrat than MASSON. In short, contact with MUELLER would be more profitable in the long run for all concerned.

Source did not accept this view of things and the contact did not ripen. MUELLER, seeing that the plan of approaching SCHELLENBERG through Source was not succeeding, attempted to do so through the Swiss Military Attache in DERLIN, Major BURGHART, and put certain information on the Allied forces at his disposal for passing to SCHELLENBERG. Source does not know what this information was exactly, since it was passed over his head but thinks it chiefly concerned Allied 0 of B in ITALY and in FRANCE: on one occasion (only) in about Oct 44 BURGHART gave Source a list with the divisional numbers of about ten British Divisions then in FRANCE for transmission to SCHELLENBERG. The latter accepted all the information offered but nevertheless did not alter his relations with MASSON or make advances to MUELLER.

When the circome of the war became finally obvious and an Allied victory a certainty, the Bundesrat changed its policy and ceased to seek any contacts with CERMANY. In an attempt to show the Allies that any previous contacts had been disapproved of and only tolerated because of force of circumstance, preparations were made to bring a case against MASSON and he was deprived of his rank and forced to retire. Source was arrested shortly before he was due to return to CERMANY and for three months (Jul-Oct 45) continually interrogated in an effort to produce material. These investigations were arranged by von STEICER, KOBELT and MUELLER and it was intended to publish the results in the Swiss Press in order to turn public opinion against Gen GUYSAN and in order to justify a lengthy imprisonment of Source. The enquiry, however, produced no such results and MASSON was reinstated in his rank and position, and Source released. MUELLER on the other hand has now retired.



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## 6. SOURCE'S PART IN SURGENDER NEGOTIATIONS

During the latter part of 1944 during one of his visits to MAYER's home at SCHLOSS WOLFSBURG, Source made the acquaintance of two American Vice-Consuls, Mr LOUGHBOROUGH and Mr DOENISCH, who were also friends of MAYER. Discussion on the war situation with these Americans soon made it clear to Source that GENEMANY's only hope at that stage was to sue for peace. During his next visit to SCHELLENBERG in BERLIN Source reported on these conversations (which had been quite informal and not done on anyone's instructions) and urged SCHELLENBERG to see HIMMLER. SCHELLENBERG, however, was not willing to do this, since he would have to do it through KALTENBRUNNER with whom he was on extremely bad terms and who would undoubtedly use the occasion to get rid of SCHELLENBERG. He therefore suggested that source should try to see HIMMLER through Gruppenfuehrer JUETINER, the Head of the FHA. This was done, but Source arrived at HIMMLER's HQ at an unlucky moment when the Reichsfuehrer was too tired to see him and only succeeded in getting the substance of his message conveyed by HIMLER's ADC. Source had no connection with the negotiations carried on in SWITZERLAND by Obergruppenfuehrer WOLFF.

## 7. RELATIONS WITH JAPANESE

In the early part of 44 during a visit to the Reichswirtschaftsministerium in connection with his foreign currency work, Source was introduced to General-direktor SCHLAR, a Director of the Doutsche Reichsbank and President of the Japanese Committee in GERMANY. SCHLAR mentioned that the Japanese were anxious to regetiate contracts in SWITZERLAND for the purchase of nautical and other equipment and Source was asked to help. In invitation to dinner with the members of the Japanese Committee followed: here Source met Bino SANI, assistent to the Japanese Naval Attache, KOJIMA, and several other appears all of whose names he has forgotten with the exception of a Col OTANI. During conversation the Japanese showed great interest in Source's connections with the RWM and suggested that he might be able to secure Swiss francs for them. In return for this they suggested that they could be of service in starting negotiations with the Russians (the project of a German compromise with RUSSIA was very much in the air at that time) since JAPAN was still at peace with the Soviets.

Source referred these matters to SCHELLENBERG who was scared of the talk of negotiating with the Russians since he knew that if he were the first to talk openly of it at the RSHA it would cost him his head. He nevertheless encouraged Source to maintain the contact (as representative of the FHA) and keep him informed of any developments.

Source therefore continued to meet SCHAAR and SAKAI from time to time. It was clear that the Japanese were convinced that GERMANY had lost the war and were anxious to manoeuvre themselves into as favourable a position as possible with the Russians and secure as many economic advantages as possible from the impending collapse of GERMANY. SCHELLENBERG made no move, but when in the summer of 44 SAKAI asked Source if he would call on General OKAMOTO in ZURICH, SCHELLENBERG told him to do this and see what he could find out. Source duly called on the General but found him seriously ill from a paralytic stroke and came away without receiving any message or discovering for what reason SAKAI had asked him to call. (Source is certain that no Russian was mentioned in connection with this affair and maintains that he did not know that SAKAI was an Intelligence Officer).

## 8. DEFERRE VI/VI



Source was nover employed by this Referat but in the course of his contacts with Amt VI met various members of it. Most of them were former employees in commercial firms who had got into the RSHA in one way or another and hopelessly unequal to the task they were supposed to do. The three successive Referente, Regierungsrat SEBASTIAN, S3 Sturmbannfuehrer ZEIDLER and Professor SCHMIED were of a better class but without experience

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in international commerce and therefore incapable of coping with the problems set them. The Referat totalled at most ten including clerks.

The programme of VI/Wi was to carry out espionage through German business men with connections in foreign countries. Very few could be found who were willing to do this since their business depended on maintaining good connections with foreign countries. Attempts by VI/Wi to bring pressure by interfering in the granting of passports and visas incurred the open hostility of business men and the little that might have been achieved was ruined by these "petty police" methods. The observations made to Source on the Referat by business acquaintances were scathing. SCHELLENBERG told Source that he had never once received any information of the slightest value from VI/Wi. This fact and many others concerning SCHELLENBERG's Dept, Source points out, can be checked by referring to the two secretaries, Frl SCHINKE and Frl ERDMANN.

# 9. HOW THE HOECHST BRIDGE WAS SAVED

In the last weeks of the war Source was at HOECHST on the Germano-Swiss frontier after getting the American Gen VAINMANN into SWITZERLAND. KONSTANZ-BREGENZ-FELDKIRCH, at first declared "open", was suddenly redeclared a battle area by Gauleiter HUFER, who ordered the demolition of all RHINE bridges and frontier bridges between SWITZERLIND and GERMINY. . Source declares that he saw no sense in this order, particularly since it would mean that the living remains of BELSEN camp and large numbers of wounded, which were coming through the area would be cut off from the care of the Swiss Red Cross services. He therefore decided to prevent the blowing up of the bridges, communicated his decision to the Swiss frontier officer, Hpt GOETZ, and asked him for a detachment of Swiss who would work under the direction of a trusted Austrian frontier guard, Inspektor OBERMAYER. Source claims that he kept the local German quards in conversation and allowed a large number of refugees on to the bridge so that the Swass were able to clear the demolition charges without being seen and get back into SWITZERLAND. Source and OBERMAYER followed Just before leaving GERWANY, Source was approached by an escaped British FW Major named DODGE who asked for help. Source took him into The following night OBERMAYER went back in civilian clothes SWITZERLAND. to bring his family to safety, was caught by German guards and shot on the orders of HOFER.

## AMT VI ACTIVITY IN SWITZERLAND

Prisoner states that owing to his function of attending to the economic side of contacts important to the GIS, the following instances of infiltration by Amt VI in business deals with SWITZERLAND came within his aphere.

The firm WARENVERTRIEBS GmbH, BERLIN, an import and export concern dealing in all types of merchandise, was owned and managed by a certain SS Hptstuf EGGEN, who at the same time was a member of the Waffen SS and at the outbreak of war was attached to Amt VI. From time to time EGGEN made purchases for the Waffen SS through the WARENTRIEBS GmbH, and in autumn 1941 he became very friendly with SCHETLENBERG, head of Amt VI, who eventually employed him, not only because of his commercial connections in BERLIN, but also because he had a great number of connections in other countries, including the BALKANS and SWITZERLAND, the latter being of particular interest to Amt VI.

During the winter of 1941-42 EGGEN was requested by the Waffen SS and the Wirtschafts - and Verwaltungshauptamt to buy from SWITZERLAND through his firm hutments to the value of 5-6 million Swiss francs. Payment was to be made in cash, in a scordance with the German-Swiss Trade Agreement; time-limits were fixed for delivery and payment was to follow immediately. As Amt VI was short of funds in SWITZERLAND to enable it to carry out its int tasks, SCHELLENBERG seized upon this transaction as a means of financing his schemes, but as the price of the hutments had been fixed and approved by the Wirtschaftsministerium in BERLIN, it was not possible to increase it and make the difference in price available to Amt VI. To overcome this obstacle, EGGEN proposed to float a company in SWITZERIAND, which would exist in name only, to negotiate the hutment transaction, thus enabling him to add a commission to the price agreed upon, which sum would be placed at SCHELLENBERG's disposal. SCHELLENBERG's plan was to use the money to finance ROTHAUND, the head of the Swiss CO Alien Police, with whom he had connection. SCHELLENBERG readily agreed to EGGEN's proposals and EGGEN proceeded with the scheme; HOLZACH(?), the head of the Wood Syndicate, and Dr MEYER (?), EGGEN's legal adviser, were w included in the new company, but took no active part in it. A noncommittal designation, "Interkommerz" or something similar, was chosen by EGGEN and 60,000 Swiss francs, the commission on the hutment transaction, were ultimately obtained for the "new firm". Prisoner states that the receipt for this money is among the Amt VI Wi documents in BERLIN; it was made out by "Interkommerz", but was NOT signed by ROTHMUND; it may have been signed by MEYER or HOLZACH. Prisoner does NOT know whether ROTHMUND actually received any of this money.

How the 60,000 Swiss francs were transferred to S/ITZERLAND Prisoner does NOT know; if they were transferred through a Bank evidence ought to be found in the "Interkommerz" books; but Prisoner thinks it more likely



that ECGEN took the money to SATTZEPLAND in cash. Who the recipients in SATTZEPLAND were, was obviously a matter which had to be kept secret.

The Swiss firms who arranged the hutment deal and EGGEN's legal adviser received only the usual commercial commission; no special. commission was paid on this transaction, as this would have meant that the prices demanded by the Wood Syndicate would have been higher than those of private firms, in which case the German authorities would not have sanctioned the deal.

Whother the Swiss firms or EGCEN's legal adviser received any money beyond their fixed commissions out of the 60,000 Swiss francs which were at the disposal of "Interkommerz" is a question which Prisoner is unable to answer as it did not interest him; his rôle was to shelve the accusations made against EGGEN of running a foreign exchange swindle in connection with the hutment transaction.

In summer 43 Germany no longer had any foreign currency available in SWITZERLAND, and as the German armament programme depended to some extent upon deliveries of certain tools and machinery from that country, numerous attempts were made to expand the volume of German-Swiss trade by means of "special agreements".

Prisoner became aware of these negotiations at the end of summer 43, and SCHELLENBERG requested him to endeavour to obtain Swiss currency in cash for the benefit of Amt VI from these transactions.

An example of this was the proposal presented to the Swiss Kriegstechnische Abt by the RIM in 1943 to deliver immediately eight Messerschmitts in exchange for cert in tools and machines to the corresponding value. Prisoner therefore visited the head of the RIM, but was told that it was quite impossible to convert goods-clearing into cash-clearing in foreign currency, and any German demands to this effect would jeopardise the conclusion of the agreement. If the Amt, however, could take on the responsibility of declaring that it was absolutely necessary in the interests of the Reich to obtain Swiss currency by making the deal a cash-clearing one, the case would assume a different aspect. Prisoner put this suggestion to the Referent for SWITZEPLAND, AHRENS, we so that he could obtain a decision from a higher authority, but as far as he knows the Amt derived no foreign currency for its int commitments from this transaction; he heard nothing further about the matter except that the agreement was finally concluded by the RIM in its original form.

## 4. Amt VI Employment of Swiss Individuals

SCHELLENBERG was opposed to employing people from Swiss Nazi circles on int work in SWITZERLAND for the following reasons:

- a) Dr ROTHMUND had informed him (see IR 40, para 6) that such persons were to be regarded with caution, from the point of view of knowledge and of character, their main interests being financial, and as SCHELLINBERG was anxious not to harm his good relations with ROTHMUND, he had agreed not to use such people for int work.
- The welfare of Swiss Nazis domiciled in GERMANY was the responsibility of Dr RIEDWEG of the SS-Führungshauptamt, and there had been an agreement between SCHELLENBERG and RIEDWEG that these persons, if suitable for int work, were to be placed at the disposal of Amt VI, on the understanding that they should not be employed actually in SWITZERLAND.

Prisoner believes that this policy was firmly adhered to by the Amt; at least in his own Amt VI Wi he had no connection with any Swiss or other foreigner operating against SWITZERLAND; any such activities were to be attributed to the relative Länderreferate.

One of Prisoner's duties was to obtain positions in German offices and firms for people of no further use to the GIS, and he gives the following account of his knowledge of one Jean CHARLES, a Swiss merchant about 35 years of age.

W. I

CHARLES had left S.ITZERLAND as a consequence of being convicted there because of his political views, and had settled in the MUNICH area. He therefore came under the surveillance of the SS-Führungshauptamt, who brought him to the notice of SCHELLENBERG as he seemed suitable for work with Amt VI, and it was decided to employ him on int work in the SOUTH of FRANCE and MONACO. Gestapo investigations, however, led to his being suspected of Bolshevist tendencies, and as a result of this SCHELLENBERG regarded him as being unreliable and declined to sanction the mission. Prisoner was therefore commissioned to get rid of CHA LES in such a way as to avoid any repercussions on the Amt, and as CHARLES knew very little German, but had some knowledge of banking and spoke fluent French, Prisoner placed him at the disposal of SCHAFER, Reichskommissar for the Bank of France, who subsequently found him a position in the Aerobank in PARIS(spring 44). Prisoner heard later from the Aerobank in BERLIN that instead of being evacuated with the German authorities and business firms on the fall of PARIS, CHARLES had gone to the SOUTH of FRANCE or MONACO, but had not been given any int Prisoner believes that CHARLES' wife returned to SWITZERLAND. commission.

## 5. Financial Arrangements for Amt VI Commitments

To finance int services the RWM placed at the disposal of Amt VI a sum of RM 250,000 monthly (see IR 21, para 6). This amount was then converted by the Reichsbank into Swiss francs, because of the recognised stability of Swiss currency, and made available to Amt VI in that form; it was then reconverted into whatever currency Amt VI required.

The amount was controlled by the Finance Dept of the Amt. The relative Länderreferat had to state the reasons for each demand for currency, which were examined by the Amtschef, who either sanctioned or refused it, and if sanctioned the demand then went to the Finance Dept who paid it direct to the Länderreferat.

Prisoner does NOT know the individual estimates of the Länderreferate, nor does he know how currency was transferred to SWITZERLAND.

After the August 1944 affair, Mr. EGOTH, the personal secretary of Mr. SCHELLENBERG, approached me through Reichbank Director SCHARR and asked me to explore the possibilities of establishing direct confidential contact with the staffs of President ROCSEVELT and Tremier STALIN. He wanted to suggest unofficially an armistice in order to save the German nation the misery of becoming a battle field; this was fast becoming unavoidable. The plan was to arrange the withdrawal of the German army from that front which accepted the idea and the proposal. The whole plan was predicated upon the forecast of an inevitable future clash between the West and the Soviets.

With the approval of Admiral MOJIMA I visited Switzerland in October 1944 and consulted with Dr. HACK, who had an open channel to the American authorities, and I asked him to contact them at once. At the same time I consulted the former German Consul General Geneva (I have forgotten the name; he resigned his post but refused to return to Germany) regarding the possibility of contacting STALIN, but with no results. I asked General OKAMOTO who was then in Zurich and he referred me to Colonel (again I cannot remember the name) in Berlin. At my request he flew to Sweden to consult General ONODERA, with unknown results. In January I visited Dr. HACK and the ex-German Consul General and their reply was that the U.S. officials do not believe in the sincerity of the Nazi officials.

We consulted further over separate peace between U.S. and Japan and planned to send either Rear Admiral KOJAMA or Vice Admiral ABE to regotiate with U.S. officials in Switzerland. Due to Admiral ABE's hesitation, we missed the chance to obtain a visa for Admiral KOJIMA. Thus, the negotiations had to be carried on by an officer of lower rank, Commander FUJIMURA. Consequently, headquarters at first did not take seriously the cables we sent and valuable time was lost. We planned to conduct negotiations also through the Swedish Navy but as a result of my interment, and the loss of my special passport as diplomatic courier, this came to nothing.

Upon my return to Japan I spent two years in Maruizawa. I then started foreign trade with the help of Swedish friends and today operate an import—export business in every country of the world. I do this in the hope of repaying our debt to the next generation and to bring the people of the world, especially the Japanese, closer to each other economically. I call this the alliance of the stomach.

1. Early in 1948 SAKAI Mace prepared a biographical sketch for us but it was so brief, so superficial, we did not care to forward it. Then came the OZAVA case, resulting from an indiscretion by one of his contacts, and we dismissed all further thought of using him. However, we continued to see him; we liked the man.

2. ZJIA-1213 revived our interest in him. We have used him to dig deeper into the activities of rightest groups. ZJI-575 is one of the results. Then ( ) appeared on the scene. Wash #31915 gave us the excuse we needed to request detailed background information from Subject. He offered fewer objections than we had anticipated. The attached statement is his report, corrected and edited in detail only.

3. We fear his statements may be sensulat misleading. The facts are correct; the early, adventured, years are a matter of record. But when he speaks about his work in Carrary, in the Office of the Japanese Maval Attache, we believe he emggeratos the importance of his position. A "Shokutaku" can have many widely different functions. His were muser-J regarding Subman who knew all the ropes and got things done. There is no doubt that he knew many people in Europe and that is did a good job for the Navy. But we are frankly skeptical of his formal hidisons and contacts. Insofar as the "peace feelers" are concerned, we know he is magnifying the 111 role he played. But he was, without question, one of those who ran Navy intelligence operations. This is the first this he has admitted it; we hope to get the details later. He are perticularly interested in the reference to his connections with Malana Formalian Bard of the Reichsicherheitshauptamt. - 4. Subject is of especial interest to us not only for his intelligence potential but on account of his rather unusual personality. He is the only Japanese we know who thinks and note completely like a European. In fact, except in appearance, he is entirely un-Oriental. This gives him an objectivity, a critical approach, that is in many ways unique and which could be invaluable tows. It also gives him a strange sort of sensitivity. He is acutely aware that he is Japanese: his British wife and foreign children, and the race prejudice he encountered in Germany, have made him very race conscious. This accounts for his interest, if not participation, in OKAMOTO Jingo's activities and has made him a Japanese "nationalist" in the unreprehensible sense of the term.
- 5. There is no doubt that he will go back to intelligence. His experience in that field is considerable. Moreover, if he should return to Europe now, he would have an excellent cover position and many old and new contacts. Under the circumstances, our control would be limited, but we have it, we believe, to a great degree in his divided loyalties: in his deep affection for his foreign family and in his pathetic attempts to make over Japan in his own non-Japanese image.

Enclosed are photocopies of Ahren's letter with original attachment (Att. 2), supposed agent report on Bull - Pauls meeting (Att. 7), supposed agent report on Roberts - Bauer meeting (Att. 8) summary presumably prepared by Schellenberg and containing marginal comment believed to be in his handwriting. Also included are following examples of propaganda utilization by Sovs:

- e. Extract from U.S. booklet by Lift and Marzani, Cuba vs. the CIA, 1961, pp. 11-14, marked L & M.
- 2. Marliese SCHIENKE was born in Goeritz on 12 December 1909. She has German citizenship. She has been living in the 14th Bezirk of Vienna since 11 August (or possibly March) 1959, having come here from Berlin. The address is Einwanggasse 27/16, where she is a sub-tenant (Untermieterin) bei Elisabeth KOBES. The telephone number of KOBES is 82 30 283. SCHIENKE frequently travels to Berlin (presumably West Berlin) on behalf of her job with the Austrian department store, firm GERNGROSS, which has apparently become a subsidiary of the German firm HERTIE.
- Jundersigned called on her at 0800 on 1 May. She was very unwilling to get mixed up in anything arising from her past, even though the letter from Dr. SCHMITZ reassured her slightly. She allowed herself to be persuaded, though reluctantly, to discuss the matter with L. Lat his hotel shortly after 0900. (She knows by last TN.) Instead she called and said that upon reconsideration she wanted nothing to do with it. After further expostulation she asked for time to think it over in her office at Gerngross and proposed meeting or calling Bunce ca. 2000 hours on 1 May. She suggested that she might bring to a meeting a male friend who did not know her past, but dropped the idea when it was pointed out that a discussion about SCHELLENBERG and the RSHA would be

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hampered by his presence. She said that she had been approached twice previously, in Vienna, by strangers, and that both times embarrassing newspaper articles had resulted from these interviews. She also said that she would bemuch readier to discuss the subject in Berlin than in Vienna. In view of the undersigned's time schedule, calling for departure from Vienna airport at 0800 2 May, this memorandum has been written before the 2000 phone call or visit. If she still proves adamant, the undersigned will underline the point, made in SCHMITZ' letter, that the inquiry is official and has official German as well as U.S. support. As noted above, she still has German citizenship. If these tactics fail, she will be asked to set a time and place for a Berlin meeting with Dr. SCHMITZ or someone appearing with a letter from him. If she provides, will cable data from Rome.

- 4. Although her whereabouts were determined by the Austrian police, she was told that the information came from the Einwohner-meldeamt. It is suggested that UPHILL be told the same story.
- 5. The following information is outlined for the benefit of UPHILL:
- I under true name, debriefed Dr. SCHUEDDEKOPF in Braunschweig during the morning and early afternoon of 14 April 1962. The Hannover representative of UPHILL, @ BREUER (whose true particulars have been provided to MOG) set up the meeting but was not present except at its close at 1500 hours. SCHUEDDEKOPF identified the handwriting on p. 1, lines 7 and 10, Att. 6, as his own, and believed that he might have written the marginal comment on (He could not guess who might have written the marginal comment on p. 8.) He said that he could not remember any of the attachments, including 2. He theorized that 6, 7, and 8 were passed to him directly by SCHELLENBERG or, more probably, through Dr. PAEFGEN, SCHUEDDEKOPF's superior (in other words, PAEFGEN was then - April 1943 - chief of RSHA Amt VI D). SCHUEDDEKOPF's explanation for his failure to recall the documents was that he had been called into the SD in mid-1942 (having served previously on the eastern front), had had no military rank, had been concerned only with British and not with U.S. affairs, and had had practically no social contact with other SD personnel. Compartmentation was strict in the SD, he said, not only for security reasons but also because of interdepartmental jealousy. He surmised that Dr. PAEFGEN must have told him that BULL was Mr. Dulles and that ROBERTS was Taylor or Tyler. He farther surmised that SCHELLENBERG had buck-slipped Atts 6, 7, and 8 to VI D, that they had to be returned, and that therefore he (SCHUEDDEKOPF) had had the documents copied —hence the "Abschrift" on Atts 6 and 7. When the marginal comment on p. 8 of Att. 6 was again drawn to his attention, he said that Atts 6 and 8 must be copies of what he received from SCHELLENBERG and that only Att. 7 was an attachment made in his own office. SCHUEDDEKOPF recalled that SCHELLENBERG had sometimes complained of SCHUEDDEKPPF's sober or dry literary style and that SCHELLENBERG himself tended to be more literary or flowery. Therefore he (SCHUEDDEKOPF) considered it thoroughly likely that SCHELLENBERG had himself written Atts 6, 7, and 8, see especially 6. He theorized that SCHELLENBERG would have done so in order to persuade HIMMLER

that it would serve the purposes of the Third Reich to maintain and intensify contact with Mr. Dulles. When asked to furnish leads, SCHUEDEEKOPF mentioned Dr. Max PAEFGEN, his former secretary T.H. (whose name he professed to be unable to recall), Heinrich AHRENS, and Hans DAUFELDT.

- b. @ BREUER then drove to Bielefeld, where on the same day, the 14th, a strained session with AHRENS was held. Because @ BREUER did not have an UPHILL accreditation (it had expired and he was waiting for a new one), both AHRENS and wife (who attended the meeting by obvious previous arrangement with her husband) were highly suspicious and resistant. AHRENS claimed that he could not remember VM 144/7957, BULL, PAULS, ALFONSO, ROBERTS, BAUER, or much of anything else. He launched into a bitter explanation of his physical mistreatment by the Dutch after the war. After he had warmed up a little, he said that his signature on Att. 2 was authentic and that he believed that SCHELLENBERG had written Att. 6. He thought the marginal comment on p. 8 was in SCHELLENBERG's handwriting. As leads he suggested Dr. SCHMITZ (could not recall first name), Dr. Eugen STEIMLE (former chief of Amt VI B) and the two secretaries of SCHELLENBERG, whose names he also claimed to have forgotten. AHRENS knows @ BREUER as BREUER and the undersigned as He had previously met @ PETERSEN because of the UJDROWSY case. @ BREUER was present throughout the interview.
- On 24 April 1962 UPHILL brought Dr. STEIMLE from Stuttgart for a meeting in Munich with 🛴 🗕 🙊 PETERSEN was present throughtout the meeting but not at the lunch that followed. Of Att. 2 STEIMLE said that he would have stopped AHRENS! inquiry if he had seen it because VI B had five or six leads # into Dulles and didn't need to have him looked up in Who's Who. STEIMLE felt that the man who would know the most about Att. 2 and VM 144/7957 is Dr. Klaus HUEGL (or HUEGEL), former VI B 3 chief, who wasin Algiers at the time of our talk but who would be finding new living quarters in Stuttgart during the first week of May. As for the penetrations, he said that they were all "special connections" except fnu GROSSMANN, alias LUDWIG, an agent directed by SCHELLENBER STEIMLE said that GROSSMANN was arrested by the Gestapo in mid-1944 as a Soviet spy. @ PETERSEN knows the details. GROSSMANN supported the son or nephew of Dr. Joseph WIRTH with RSHA funds during the war and posed as his private benefactor, thus obtaining WIRTH's gratitude. Asked for further identities of penetrations, STEIMLE listed a fnu FRANK, then of Stuttgart, an industrialist; ITA, who was run out of Vienna, and DAUFELDT. When pressed further, he said that HUEGL would know the details. He too surmised that SCHELLENBERG was the probable author of Att. 6 and possibly of Atts 7 and 8. He did not believe that SCHELLENBERG had prepared these papers, or caused them to be prepared, for passage to the Soviets, but only to HIMMLER. STEIMLE knows C as C
- d. On 25 April I met Dr. Hans SCHMITZ, who had been aide-de-camp to SCHELLENBERG. SCHMITZ was brought by UPHILL from Hannover to Munich for the meeting, which was attended in its entirety by @ PETERSEN. No recapitulation is considered necessary.

SCHMITZ produced leads to Marliese SCHIENKE, former head secretary to SCHELLENBERG; Hans Wilhelm EGGEN, a SCHELLENBERG agent who had direct contact with Mr. Dulles; Crystel ERDMANN, SCHELLENBERG's No. 2 girl; and previously interviewed. He confirmed that Reinhard SPITZI was Amt VI - in fact, that he was a staff member directed by SCHELLENBERG. He felt fairly sure that the marginal noteon p.8, Att. 6, was in SCHELLENBERG's handwriting and that SCHELLENBERG had probably written or dictated Att. 6/

- 6. The meetings with Hans DAUFELDT will be reported separatel So far as is known, UPHILL is not aware that these meetings occurred and should not, of course, be informed. MOG has been given the particulars, including the case of the dead but resurrect brother.
- 7. It is requested that @ PETERSEN follow up on these leads, listed in the order of value:
  - a. Marliese SCHIENKE, if she won't talk to C J (Vien note: Presumably three Schmitz)
    - b. EGGEN, if he will talk to PETERSEN.
    - c. HUEGL.
    - d. PAEFGEN.
    - e. ERDMANN.
    - f. Finally, Max Egon HOHENLOHE, if he come to Bonn.

P.S. On night of 1 May I finally persuaded Frl. SCHIENKE to meet me and read the basic documents. She is sure, or almost sure, that she knows who PAULS is, but she is not willing to tell me because he is still alive. She is willing, however, to send a letter to Dr. SCHMITZ and tell him who PAULS (and BAUER) are, in her opinion, and to let him do as he will with this information. She may want to look at the photocopies again, as could easily be arranged. When she goes to West Berlin, she goes to the home of her mother, and Dr. SCHMITZ knows this address.

She said that she believes that the marginal comment, Att. 6, p. 8, is in SCHELLENBERG's hand. She did not type any of the attachments herself.

- 1. Outlined below is a lead which can be pursued, because the key person (EGGEN) is alive in West Germany and can be debriefed.
- 2. In the final stages of WW II SCHELLENBERG received word that, through the Japanese in Switzerland, he might be able to establish contact with several Soviets who were interested in peace negotiations. The Japanese primarily involved were: SAKAI, KOJIMA, and OKAMOTO. According to OSS records, this situation developed sometime at the end of 1944 (or February 1945). SCHELLENBERG assigned EGGEN to handle this matter.
- 3. In the course of his debriefing SCHELLENBERG stated that EGGEN made arrangements through SAKAI to meet an RIS operative in Switzerland. The meeting was to have taken place at the home of OKAMOTO, but nothing came of it, because OKAMOTO became seriously ill (he apparently had a heart attack). I have looked everywhere but have been unable to find any further information about the meeting. There is no information to show that the meeting between OKAMOTO and the Soviet agent actually took place.
- 4. Concerning the RIS agent, SCHELLENBERG states that his name was ORLOVSKIY (German spelling ORLOWSKI), or a name similar to that one. He supposedly was a professor at one

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of the Swiss universities, possibly Zurich. SCHELLENBERG says that he assigned Lt. Col. (Dr.) STEIMLE and Lt. Col. FREUND to conduct an investigation concerning ORLOVSKIY. Although SCHELLENBERG could not recall whether the contact with the Soviets had been established, he did remember that the investigation showed that there was such a person as ORLOVSKIY. We have done extensive searching on this man, but were unable to find any further information about him. Also, his name has not figured in the Rote Kapelle or Rote Drei information available to us.

- 5. According to another OSS document, ORLOVSKIY had been the chief RIS agent in Switzerland.
- 6. Naoe SAKAI is the subject of J. Lt. Gen. Kiyotomi OKAMOTO was the Japanese Military Attache in Berne at that time. Rear Admiral Hideo KOJIMA was the Japanese Naval Attache probably in Berlin.

## MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Certain Allegations Concerning Heinz FELFE

- 1. On 30 May 1972 I spoke with Hans Wilhelm EGGEN, former SS Major and personal friend of Walter SCHELLENBERG. During World War II EGGEN was assigned to SCHELLENBERG's office and served as his outside trouble shooter, primarily in Switzerland. Since World War II, he has been in private business and at the present time owns an import-export firm in Hannover. He boasts that the business is doing very well and that he is quite wealthy. He lives in an upper middle class apartment building in Hannover, Germany and claims to own a hunting lodge and a very fine yacht.
- 2. My discussion with him was at his home and concerned a topic other than the subject of this memorandum. I asked him about FELFE as an incidental question, when we generally touched on the work of the Swiss desk of the RSHA. In the course of this discussion, as well as during a subsequent talk at his business office on 22 June 1972, I gained the impression that he likes to brag and exaggerate. I am convinced that he will lie without hesitation, if telling a falsehood will serve to enhance his prestige with the listener(s). I doubt, however, that he will resort to lying for treacherous or sinister purposes.

3. In the course of our conversation, EGGEN stated that he had known FELFE casually during the war years. He also said that he DUPLICATE COPY

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AND METHODS INVOLVED

had heard about him in the following context:

- a. It was common knowledge among certain members of the RSHA that FELFE was a heavy pambler. He liked to play cards and was in constant debt because of this weakness. EGGEN believes that it is not at all unlikely that FELFE could have been recruited on this basis. Although EGGEN did not set a specific time frame, the general time period under discussion was ca 1942-1943.
- b. EGGEN recalled that SCHELLENBERG had mentioned FELFE to him during a conversation following the 20 July 1944 attempt to overthrow Hitler. EGGEN said that he and his wife were very friendly with the SCHELLENBERGs, that he had known SCHELLENBERG before the war, that SCHELLENBERG as well as other high RSHA officials had frequently been guests at his hunting lodge, and that during such visits SCHELLENBERG had often told him various things in great confidence. During one such visit, EGGEN claims, SCHELLENBERG mentioned to him that FELFE had been involved on the very fringes of the 20th of July plot. In this connection SCHELLENBERG supposedly stated that FELFE had come to him one day and had asked for advice and assistance because he feared that he might be in trouble, even though his involvement in the plot had been very, very minimal. SCHELLENBERG, however, told FELFE that he cannot help him in this matter, because the Gestapo had exclusive investigational jurisdiction in the entire case and there was nothing that anybody short of Hitler and Himmler could do about it.
- 4. EGGEN's knowledge about these two points is quite general. Although I tried to stimulate his memory in various ways, he seemed to be unable to recall anything else in this respect. I asked him whether he had mentioned this matter to the German services or whether he had ever been asked about it by them or by anyone else.

He replied in the negative. Moreover, he made it quite clear that he was not very impressed by the present-day German services and implied that he would not go out of his way to volunteer information or services to them. He did not seem to be bitter and did not speak about them with acrimony. He simply did not hold much of their capabilities and professionalism. As an example, he mentioned that the BND man who had been sent to him to accredit me was a very inept person. He did not go into detail and explained that he did not want to be instrumental in denying the man his bread and butter.

5. EGGEN also expressed the opinion that Marliese SCHIENKE, who had been SCHELLENBERG's head secretary and is now retired and lives in the Frankfurt area, would probably know more details concerning FELFE. She is, however, extremely reluctant to talk to anyone about the past, as we have found in another case in which we had sought information from her and had contacted her directly. It was in this manner that we were led by her to EGGEN, because she said that she would talk only with his approval or through him. He promised to invite her to his hunting lodge for several days, as he had done on a number of occasions in the past. He claimed that the restful atmosphere there had helped them to relax and had stimulated melancholy discussions about the past. He was confident that in this manner he could induce her to talk about the old days and obtain whatever information she might have about FELFE. He also promised to forward to me any information which she might disclose to him.

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
