2. 1. Attached is report of Mr. Joseph K. Kelsey, visiting expert consultant on petroleum refineries, who completed tour of duty with ESS (Feb-Aug 1950). Mr. Kelsey's mission was to advise SCAP on oil refinery operations in Japan. Problems existing at time of activation of the petroleum refineries included rehabilitation of existing equipment, procurement and installation of additional machinery and material, institution of an allocation system for crude oil, and the training and instruction of personnel in the methods and techniques of refinery production and effective management. One of the ultimate objectives was to minimize the import requirements for petroleum products, saving foreign exchange dollars for the Japanese economy.

2. Mr. Kelsey's visit can be considered successful, since scheduled current production of the Pacific refineries (using import crude) when added to the production of refineries working on indigenous crude, will meet the minimum requirements of the Japanese economy with the exception of fuel oil. Fuel oil can be imported more economically than it can be produced through refining crude. Relative to all oil products, steps are under way to meet projected requirements through the revision of price structures and installation of advanced processes. Lube oil which was formerly in short supply is still being budgeted for as an import item. However, CARICAFunds will not be used if anticipated production schedules are met. Judicious allocation and price control exercised through the Japanese Government under the guidance of SCAP will influence production in those channels most beneficial to the Japanese economy.

3. In summary, Mr. Kelsey specifically recommended:

a. Substitution of contact filtration for contact re-run plants; and installation of more equipment to recover crystalline wax and petrolatums-- this is being accomplished by ESS. Two plants are being converted, completion date 31 Dec 50. Expected to influence other refineries in same direction due to lower cost of production.

b. Development and initiation of personnel training program at refineries -- ESS has been encouraging such programs and will continue. Foreign oil companies are also filling this gap by offering technical help to Japanese producers.

c. Recruitment of another expert consultant on oil refineries -- this program appears well advanced. Believe decision relative necessity of additional expert at this time should be determination of ESS.

4. Some advantages would immediately accrue from enforcing the transfer of refinery equipment from arsenals (reparations items), namely an early increase in lubricating oil production beyond just the minimum requirements. However, the Japanese Government has resisted this action and failed to make application necessary to effect transfer of arsenal facilities. It is understood now that two transfers are in the making, although based upon past experience, full effectuation of this program is doubtful without written directive. Since present conditions make the wisdom of such a move politically questionable, subject information is furnished for such action as may be determined desirable.

5. In view of the notable progress achieved in the advancement of the petroleum refinery program as contained in the report, no specific recommendations are made by G-1. The above comments are submitted as an information digest of the inclosed report.

His visit was successful since he was able to help considerably in rehabilitation of refineries and in the improvement of management, administration, refinery methods and techniques to the point, that total production (includes refining of indigenous and imported crude) will meet minimum requirements of Jap economy, except for fuel

oil. Fuel oil however can be imported more cheaply than it can be produced here. One major policy question still exists: the extent to which SCAP desires to press the Jap Govt to apply for transfer of refinery equip at the arsenals (reparations items) to refinery plants. They have resisted this move and only recently requested two such transfers. Effectuation of this transfer program would allow for inc in lube oil production with beneficial effect on economy, since only very minimum requirements are presently being met. Inst C/N outlines above facts and points out that since question re transfer of arsenal equip is probably a touchy political one, info is submitted for such action as may be determined desirable. Also that since overall report of Kelsey shows decided improvement in refinery production no specific recommendations are made by G-1, info being furnished as digest of Kelsey's report.

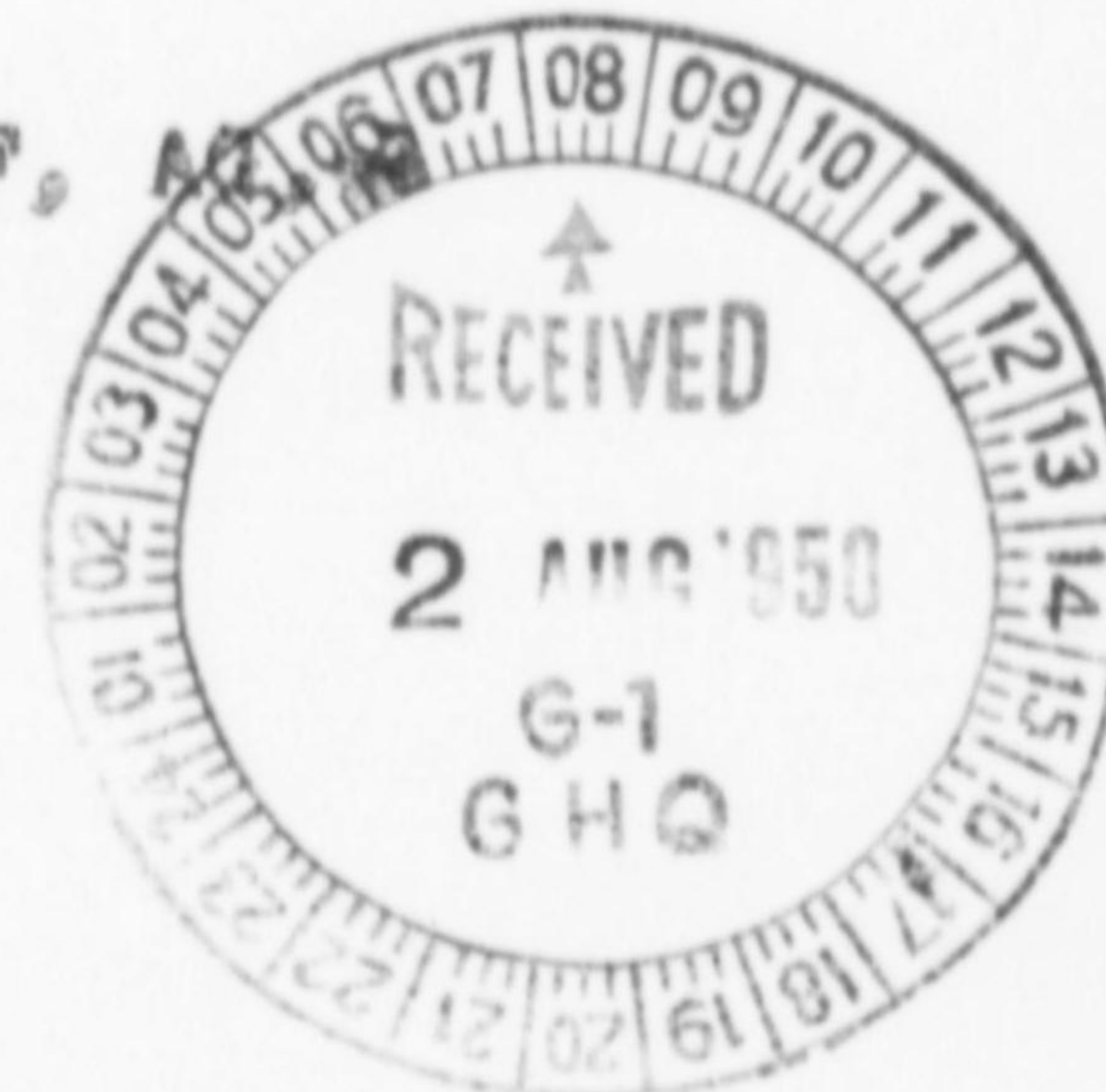

1. Under GARIOA Project 412, it is understood that funds will be allocated for the fiscal year 1951 for the employment of visiting experts for Japan and that the funds allocated for this purpose are to be retained and administered in Washington.

2. It is requested visiting experts be recruited in the fields listed in inclosures 1 and 2. Security and loyalty assurances should be undertaken before the individuals leave the Zone of Interior.

3. In addition to the requirements of Economic and Scientific and Natural Resources Sections, Public Health and Welfare Section desires that a formal invitation be extended to the American Dental Association to send a five person mission to Japan for a period of thirty days during the latter part of 1950 or early part of 1951, as time may be agreeable to the Association. The purpose of the mission is to render assistance in revision of curriculum content in dental education; foster democratic professional society reorganization; advise regarding dental practice; indoctrinate in the use of modern dental material and techniques; and advise regarding public education in oral hygiene and preventive dentistry. The costs of this mission are estimated at approximately \$10,000, as follows: Commercial air transportation (San Francisco to Tokyo and return) \$6090.00; \$10.00 per diem for five persons for thirty days; land travel in the Zone of Interior and per diem enroute, \$2,000. 1. In the light of the very limited appropriations available in support of the Visiting Expert Program only the highest priority projects have been recommended consistent with the assigned mission of ESS.

2. It is deemed highly inadvisable to interrupt continuing activities of the headquarters pursuant to outstanding responsibilities on the assumption that the recent developments in Korea have altered the basic objectives of the Occupation. Nothing could be more disruptive to the accomplishments of the last five years than to determine that projects recently approved as being desirable and consistent with our responsibility have suddenly become superfluous. While all activities connected with the Korean War will, of course, be accorded top priority, this certainly should not mean the precipitous abandonment of other activities which have formed the basis of the Occupation effort in the economic and scientific sphere to this date. Specifically, no recent development has altered the importance attached to the Economic Recovery Program and its related activities. No policy statement from SCAP or the responsible U. S. agencies in Washington warrants abandonment or reduced emphasis on the Economic Recovery Program. It is believed to be incorrect to consider the effort to support the U. S. military activities in Korea and the Economic Recovery Program in Japan as competing alternatives. Actually there is in fact no such opposition of objectives and every effort will be directed to accomplishing the maximum implementation of both.

In connection with Project 12-PS, the following is submitted. It is imperative that a qualified individual such as Dr. Detrick of the Bureau of the Census be available in sufficient time to aid in the development of tabulation techniques of the Japanese census October 1950. Procedures must be developed prior to this date to assure a successful tabulation as the Japanese Government is in urgent need of such assistance. While Dr. Leonard's assignment here can be postponed some three months along with the other personnel of the proposed statistical mission, it is important that Dr. Detrick be available in August of this year.

5. Every effort has been exercised to postpone projects for such period in fiscal year 1951 as the nature of the work makes possible. It is recognized that developments in the next six or nine months may warrant changes in the schedule indicated above. It is deemed imperative, however, that the projects proposed not be terminated as such but merely be postponed to a later period within the fiscal year and that the appropriation request for the Visiting Expert Program be submitted as prepared.

SUBJECT: FY 1951 Visiting Expert Program

1. Requests for visiting experts for FY 1951 as submitted by NRS, ESS and PHW are attached as Tabs A, B and C respectively. The CIE expert program was approved by the Chief of Staff on 23 April 1950, and a special American Medical Educators mission for PHW was previously approved.

2. A resume of the programs requested by the sections and the estimated commitments to date follows:

3. The committed figures outlined above include holdovers from the FY 1950 program and those experts for whom the DA is presently recruiting.

4. A review of the projects for which visiting experts have been requested reveals that none of them are vitally essential. In most cases, the SCAP sections concerned still have specialists on their permanent staffs who can adequately supervise the programs for which experts are requested and a critical screening of the requests would undoubtedly result in the deletion of several of the projects outlined.

5. The SCAP surveys recently performed by the G-1 survey team for the Committee on Missions and Functions of SCAP sections have not resulted in any firm manning levels to date. Some of the projects requested are at variance with the recommendations of the survey team regarding functions to be retained by the sections concerned. For this reason, it is difficult to make recommendations relating to specific experts requested. For example, NRS requests a Mining Industry Consultant and the survey reports recommend the transfer of mining responsibility to ESS. Industry Division of ESS has indicated that, should this responsibility be transferred to them, they would not require the services of a visiting expert as long as their present technical staff is available.

6. In view of the emergency situation and the changing priorities of missions and functions in all areas, plus the consideration presented in the comprehensive surveys made to date, it is considered more feasible and economical to withhold blanket approval of the visiting expert program. Individual requests can be considered on the basis of current factors.

1. In keeping with the public health and welfare reforms instituted during the period of the Occupation, there have been brought to Japan representatives of the American Medical Association, the American Pharmaceutical Association and a Social Security Mission. It is now desired to bring to this country a group of recognized specialists in the field of dentistry, selected by the American Dental Association, in order that the group advise and make recommendations relating to dental practice.

2. Such a mission has been requested by the Japan Dental Association, which presented a document under date of 16 March 1950, expressing the decision of the society arrived at in general session (Tab B).

3. PH&W, believing an American dental mission to Japan will render as distinct a service in improving dental practice as did the American Medical Association Mission, the American Pharmaceutical Association Mission and the Social Security Mission in those respective fields, entered into informal correspondence with the President of the American Dental Association (Dr. Philip E. Adams) inquiring as to the receptability of the A.D.A. in organizing a dental mission for Japan (Tab C).

4. Reply was received from Dr. Adams expressing a favorable reaction to the proposal and stating the matter would formally be presented to the society (Tab D).

5. Under date of 10 June 1950, the Board of Directors of the A.D.A. in ad interim session, accepted the proposal and nominated five leading dentists, including the President and the Secretary of the Association, to come to Japan if an invitation is extended, in late 1950 or early 1951 (Tab E).

6. To date, certain progress has been made in improving dentistry in this country but this improvement has lagged behind that made in medicine. A group of American dentists could greatly enhance progress were it to be brought to Japan for the specific purpose of rendering advice on that part of the reformed dental educational program which is concerned with the material incorporated into dental school curriculum and to present to the dental association, the views of the A.D.A. on dental practice, as well as to make known the many new materials used in reconstructive dentistry in the U.S., and to stress oral hygiene and preventive dentistry. Dental practice in Japan is years behind that of the United States and other modern countries and the poor dental health of the people constitutes a public health problem. It is in the U.S. that dentistry has been developed to its highest degree and dental health

recognized as a field of medicine to be incorporated into public health programs.

7. The Japan Dental Association, which was in 1948 reorganized into a body with a constitution patterned after that of the A.D.A., needs indoctrination by its counterpart in the United States as to the proper activities to engage the attention of a professional society. It needs as well, indoctrination in the principles of professional ethics, uncomprehended in Japan, which if understood and accepted by the Japanese will result in instilling a sense of social responsibility. It is believed that the elevation of dental standards will be hastened by the stimulus given through personal contact with highly qualified individuals representing the American dental society, the organization from which the Japanese association has drawn its new precepts.

8. The estimated expense of bringing a 5-person mission to Japan for a period of 30 days, covering cost of air transportation to and from Japan and a moderate per diem, will not exceed \$10,000. (Itemized in Tab F)

9. Contingent upon approval of a dental mission for Japan, the American Dental Association will furnish this headquarters with the qualifications of the individuals proposed by that body for concurrence or recommended changes by PH&W and for necessary clearance.

10. Recommend that the necessary funds be made available through appropriate GARIOA funds, covering the cost of commercial air travel and moderate per diem allowance while enroute and while in Japan.

11. Recommend this group be given VIP status with billeting at the ? Imperial Hotel.

12. Recommend approval of the attached radio requesting the American Dental Association to send a mission of five leading American dentists to Japan (Tab A).

Dear Dr. Adams:

Early in the Occupation I became impressed by the low standard of dentistry in Japan. During the past four years, I have been able to make certain progress in raising the standard. Dental colleges were inspected and second rate schools closed, so that today all dental education is received in university level colleges. The Japan Dental Association, formerly concerned with the sale and distribution of dental materials and precious metals, was reorganized into a democratic organization with a new constitution patterned considerably after that of the American Dental Association. Certain progress has, therefore, been made but dentistry still lags behind the progress made in medicine. It had been my hope that by this time, the dental profession by absorbing American professional ethical standards and improving techniques, would be recognized as a profession occupying a place equal to that of the profession of medicine. Such, however, has not been the case and I am faced with the problem now of taking further steps to reach this objective. I have not by directive or authoritative instruction attempted to change dental practice, but by the slower process of indoctrination and precept have endeavored to establish American concepts. If the present circumstance which prompts this letter can be considered as an index of partial success, we may be reaching our goal, for I have recently received from the Japan Dental Association a request to bring an American dental mission to Japan.

I have long wished to bring such a mission to this country but have hesitated until such time as the Japan dental profession itself would realize that such a mission was desirable. The request now having been received is most gratifying. I am inclosing a copy for your perusal.

Were a group of leading American dentists to come to Japan to render advice in matters of dental education, particularly the content of dental curriculum, to present the American views on dental

service in relation to social insurance and to elucidate on the subject of oral hygiene and preventive dentistry and the more recent advances in the use of dental materials and dental techniques, it would be of inestimable value to the dental profession of this country and a distinct public service.

I, therefore, approach you with the question as to whether or not the American Dental Association would be interested in organizing such a mission.

In the latter part of 1948, the American Medical Association, upon the invitation of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, sent a similar mission to Japan consisting of Dr. R. L. Sensenich, President of the Association, Dr. Elmer L. Henderson, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Dr. Ernest E. Irons, President-Elect, Dr. John H. Fitzgibbon, member of the Board of Trustees, and Dr. Edward J. McCormick, member of the Board of Trustees. The group in part remained in Japan for about 30 days and rendered an outstanding service. During the summer of 1949, at the invitation of SCAP, the American Pharmaceutical Association sent a mission to Japan, which also rendered a distinct service. If the American Dental Association is in the position to organize a similar mission, it will accomplish, I am sure, the same satisfactory result.

I cannot at this time extend a formal invitation. However, I am writing to get your reaction to the proposal, were the Supreme Commander to extend an invitation. If the Association is favorably disposed, it would be desirable to receive the mission either in October or November during the period dental schools are in session.

I hope that you find it possible to give this subject your prompt attention for it will be necessary to enter into long series of arrangements, leading to the entry into Japan of the selected individuals, providing transportation, expenses etc., as well as the itinerary for the group while in this country.

You may be sure that any assistance given by the American Dental Association will be gratefully received.

Whether, as I would infer from your letter, the composition of the mission should be: a well informed representative in the field of dental education; one familiar with the development of dental health programs; one capable of presenting information on oral hygiene and preventive measures; and one who by training would be competent to present recent advances in dental materials and techniques. Other pertinent data that you feel would be helpful would be appreciated.

If the answers to the above questions could be supplied, it would be possible to do some preliminary planning relative to the personnel of such a mission. All such planning would be made contingent upon the extension at a latter time of a formal invitation.

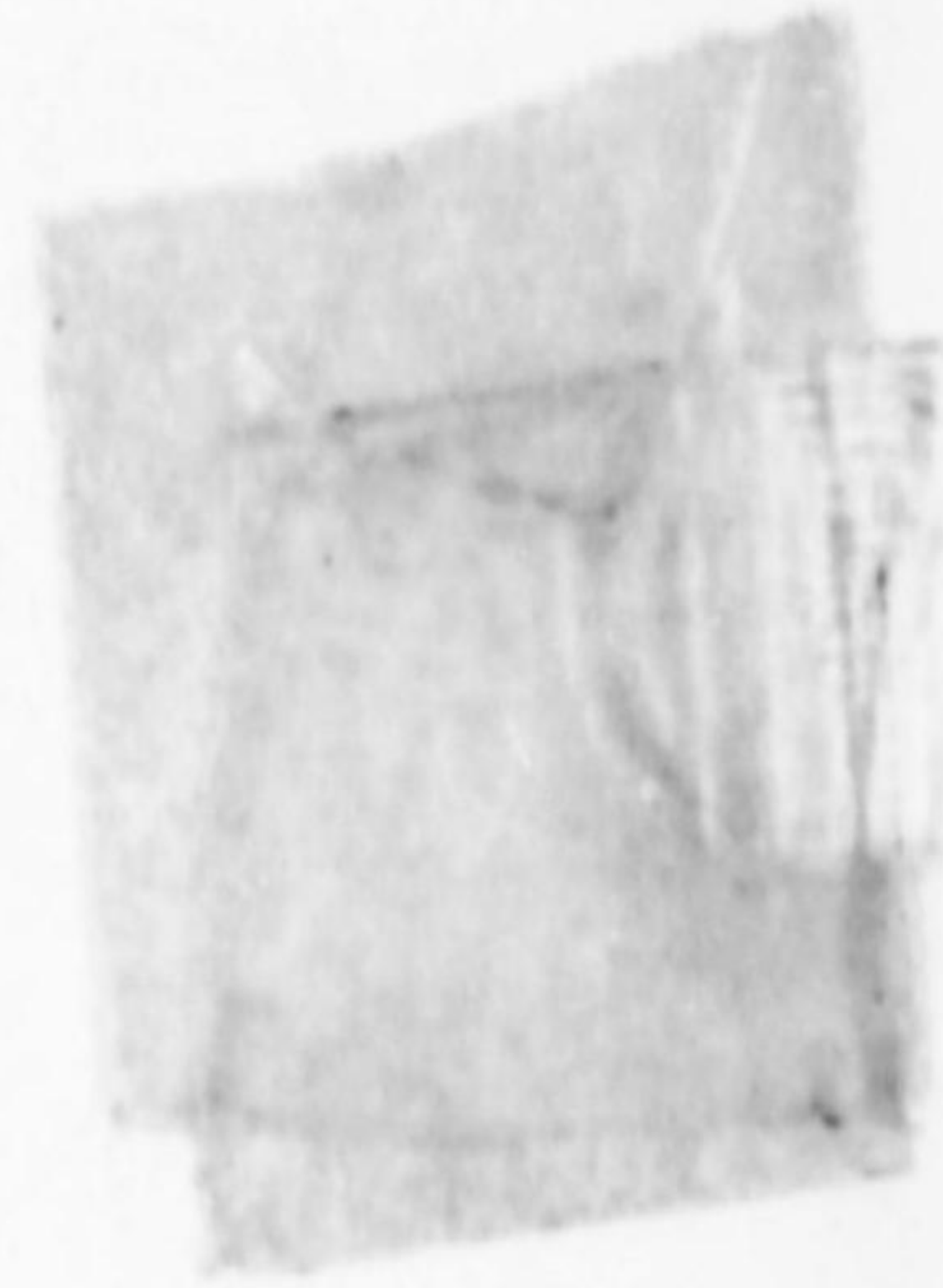

SUBJECT: Visiting Expert Program, FY 1951

1. Chief of Section called chiefs of all divisions together at 1500 hours, 18 Jul 50, to discuss the visiting expert program for FY 1951. He stated that Brig Gen G. V. Keyser, ODCS/SCAP, wished Col Schenck to discuss with him in about two days the visiting expert program as submitted by NR. Gen Keyser stated further that the number of visiting experts proposed by NR exceeded those requested by any other section. Col Schenck informed the division chiefs that the proposed visiting expert program should be reviewed for the purpose of justifying each project solely on the basis of its importance to the economic rehabilitation program. As a result of the review, which should take into consideration the proposed changes in the Section manning level, the Chief of Section desired that certain projects be recommended for cancellation and the rest arranged in absolute order of priority. If it is determined that there will not be sufficient money for all the proposed projects the projects at the end of the list may be cancelled in reverse order.

2. At 1545 hours, 18 Jul 50, Mr Hardesty held a conference with chiefs of technical divisions and Maj T. M. White, NR/Ad, at which time the following rearrangement of priorities was agreed upon by the division chiefs:

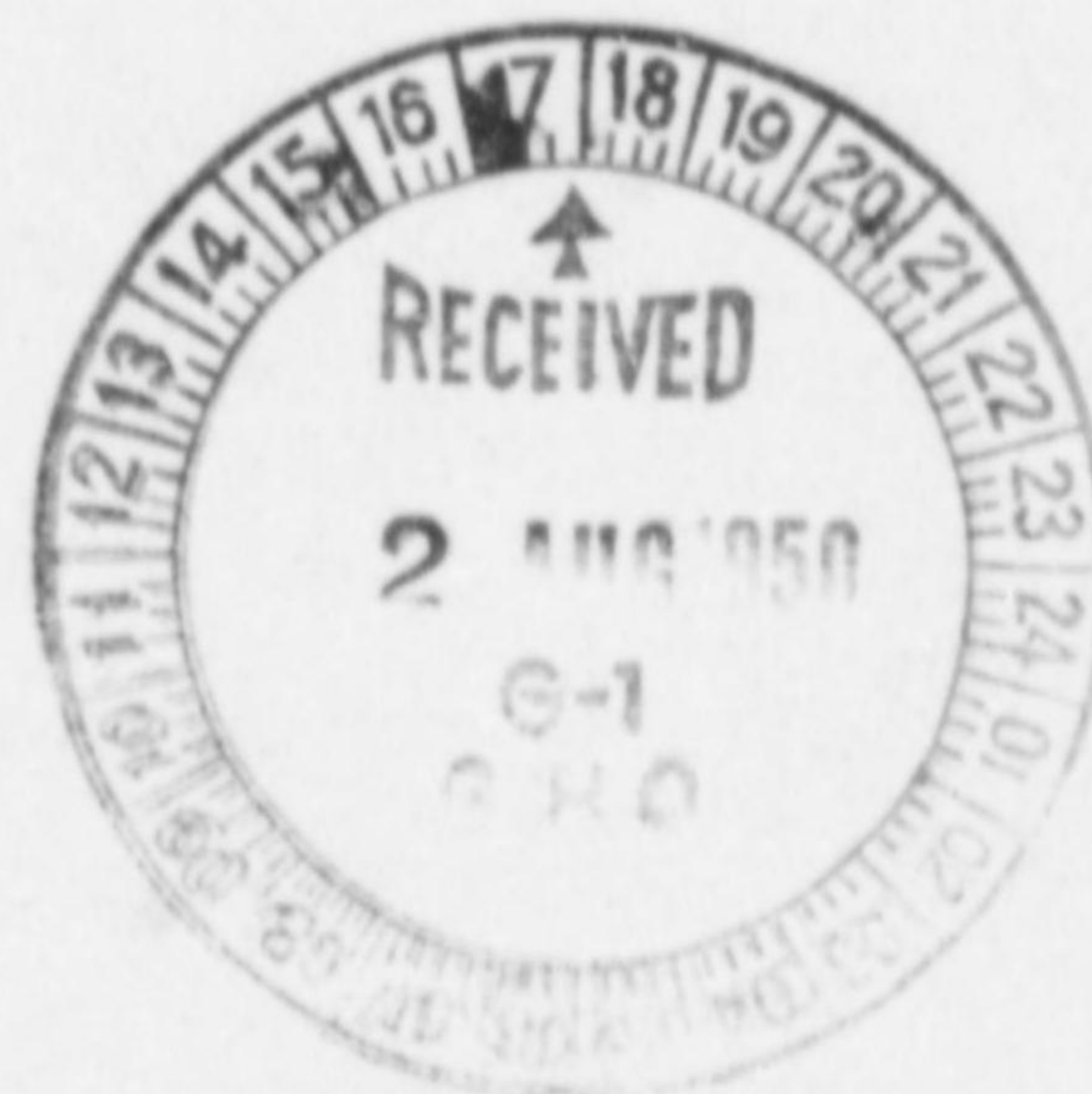

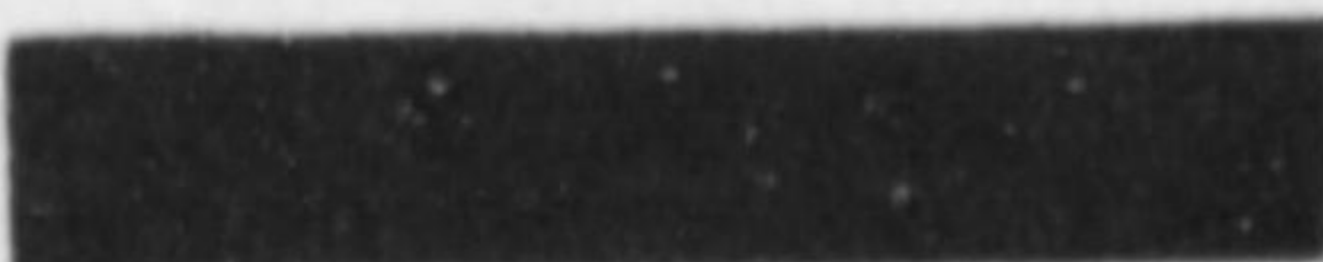

1. Inclosed is report of ESS visiting expert, Dr. J. Richard Huber. Dr. Huber's primary mission was to assist in the evaluation of the National Income Estimate of Japan. He also participated in the analysis of International Payments of Japan and in the investigation of the amount of debt of the Japanese Government.

2. Dr. Huber's evaluation of the national income estimate, as prepared by ESS, is that it is at least ¥500 billion too low. Review of Dr. Huber's report indicates that he is conservative in his approach, which would tend to indicate that the under-estimation is probably far in excess of this figure. Since a proper estimate of gross national income product is basic to every economic program such as tax planning, investment policies, debt retirement, credit control, etc., this is an area of deficiency which should have received serious attention and greater manpower effort than has been accorded.

3. Statistical methods and procedures of the ESB have apparently been directed with a view towards achieving special purposes said to be prompted by a desire to favor certain income groups for tax purposes. For example, proprietor's income has been substantially underestimated; and corporate profits, representing the most serious underestimation in any section of the economy - ¥ 200 billion. Due to the lack of reliability of this data, it has been necessary for the "using" divisions of ESS and visiting advisors such as Dr. Shoup and Mr. Dodge to adjust by "guesstimates" their use of national income figures in order to compensate for the inaccuracy of the ESB statistical product.

4. ESS (Mr. Morrow, Chief Programs and Statistics Division) advises that the reason for failure to obtain a quality statistical product in terms of national income has been the non-availability of competent personnel. While it is true that qualified men in this field are scarce, the essentiality of

the data is such that the most vigorous efforts would have been justified to secure reliable statistics in the effectuation of SCAP's missions and functions dependent upon this data.

5. It has been indicated that Mr. Crowder (former visiting expert in this field), Dr. Rice, Bureau of Standards and Statistics, and one other consultant are expected in April 1951 to give their attention to national income estimate statistics. It is believed that the best answer to the problem earlier in the occupation would have been in the recruitment of a permanent staff rather than by the intermittent use of experts who could do little more than appraise and evaluate, with no real opportunity to effectuate necessary reforms leading to more reliable results. However, at this time, it is questionable whether any more can or should be done than is contemplated. The development of sound methods in this field is a long term proposition, i.e., in the U. S. Dept of Commerce, National Income Estimate Unit, after 15 years operation, they are just beginning to produce what can be considered a fully satisfactory product due to the inherent complexity of the problem.

6. Since refinement of statistics in this field would be long range in character, the recruitment of a staff at this time would not be warranted. It would appear, however, that if with the termination of the occupation, there continues to be a vested U. S. financial stake in Japan, proper controls would require at least one competent individual to render advice and guidance to the supervisory agency remaining.

7. It is therefore recommended that ESS undertake the assignment of a top qualified individual from within their organization, if available, or by direct recruitment within present manning level. The concentrated and undivided attention of at least one employee in this area appears desirable. It is considered especially significant at this time in view of the policy planning being done by Dr. Shoup and Mr. Dodge, and that which may be expected at the peace table where reliable analyses in all economic areas will be invaluable in assuring proper protection of U. S. and UN interests.

1. Mr George W. Trayer, Visiting Expert Consultant, Natural Resources Section, has investigated forest and forest products research organizations and their programs. The significance of this assignment is that Mr Trayer, a committee chairman of the Munitions Board, Department of Defense, is concerned with the world shortage of wood products of strategic value and how best to increase production of vital materials without undue deterioration of national economies. In this respect, Japan with one-tenth the forest area of the United States has more than one-half the population, and its economy is basically dependent upon an adequate supply of wood products. Mr Trayer is scheduled to leave Tokyo on or about the night of 29 July after spending 94 days in Japan. Inclosure one is a biographical sketch and inclosure two is a copy of his report.

2. Mr Trayer concludes that in the interests of economy of operation and increased effectiveness, forest research regions in Japan should be reduced in number and all forest products research immediately centralized at one laboratory or institute. To effect this will require the transfer of wood utilization research from other ministries to such a central institution. Further, it is essential that the Occupation technical guidance program be intensified.

3. Mr Trayer's investigations reveal that too much time is devoted to fundamental research and insufficient attention is given to applying research findings to practical problems. He feels that while the Japanese technicians are good, they are incapable of supplying the required guidance necessary to reduce waste and inefficiency and to improve production. This assumes a knowledge of modern techniques and an ability to apply them, which the Japanese technicians do not possess.

4. There is a great need for immediate action on the establishment of a forest products institute because of the part it can play in strengthening Japan's economy, in raising the value of exportable wood products, and in increasing the production and utility of forest products during any possible national emergency without undue drain on the limited forest reserve. For these reasons, NR believes that the Deputy Chief of Staff, SCAP, would be interested in the opportunity to discuss the full implications of the required forest research program with Mr Trayer.

MEMORANDUM TO: General Beiderlinden

SUBJECT : Report of Visiting Expert on Forest Research

1. NR transmits the attached report to DC/S through G-1 with recommendation that DC/S interview the visiting expert before his departure 29 July after 94 days in Japan.

2. The visiting expert states his own mission:

"To advise SCAP and the Japanese Government on the development of an effective organization and program for research in Forestry and particularly on the centralization of forest utilization research at a forest production laboratory."

a. Briefly, the expert is a proponent of complete centralization even going so far as to suggest that creosoting activities of the Ministry of Transportation and the Ministry of Telecommunications on rails and telephone poles be taken from them. He appears at variance with Dr. Scarr's basic concepts that NR and their experts have no interest once the tree is cut and it gets into the hands of the mill men or other utilization channels. The expert wants to start a five year program with double budget, centralization, protection of the researcher from administrative forays of the government, so that the researchers actually have a say not only in the pathology, growth, and harvesting of trees, but right down ~~in~~ to the utilization of trees. For instance his program would place, in the forest research organization he recommends, the authority to decide that Japan should add value to its wood exports by sending out flooring rather than lumber, plywood not veneer logs, and rayon instead of wood pulp.

b. MOM/L detects the old "reaching" for work by one of the SCAP sections far beyond the requirements of its mission. The desirability of the recommendations of the visiting expert, doubtless good but the necessity is not proven.

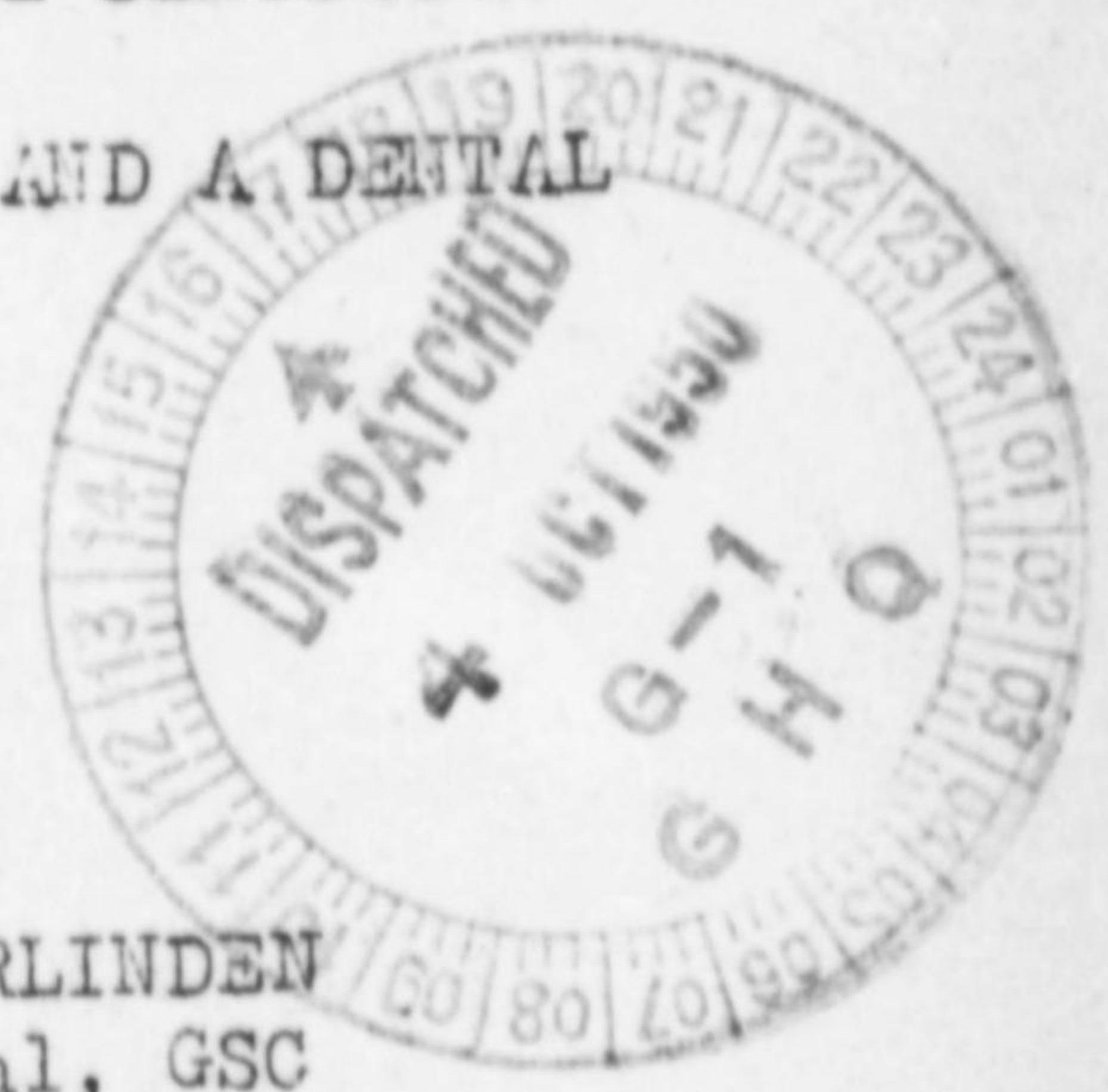

MEMORANDUM FOR: Chief of Staff

SUBJECT: FY 1951 Visiting Expert Program

1. Requests for visiting experts for FY 1951 as submitted by NRS, ESS and PHW are attached as Tabs A, B and C respectively. The CIE expert program was approved by the Chief of Staff on 23 April 1950, and a special American Medical Educators mission for PHW was previously approved.

2. A resume of the programs requested by the sections and the estimated commitments to date follows:

3. The committed figures outlined above include holdovers from the FY 1950 program and those experts for whom the DA is presently recruiting.

4. A review of the projects for which visiting experts have been requested reveals that none of them are vitally essential. In most cases, the SCAP sections concerned still have specialists on their permanent staffs who can adequately supervise the programs for which experts are requested and a critical screening of the requests would undoubtedly result in the deletion of several of the projects outlined.

5. The SCAP surveys recently performed by the G-1 survey team for the Committee on Missions and Functions of SCAP sections have not resulted in any firm manning levels to date. Some of the projects requested are at variance with the recommendations of the survey team regarding functions to be retained by the sections concerned. For this reason, it is difficult to make recommendations relating to specific experts requested. For example, NRS requests a Mining Industry Consultant and the survey reports recommend the transfer of mining responsibility to ESS. Industry Division of ESS has indicated that, should this responsibility be transferred to them, they would not require the services of a visiting expert as long as their present technical staff is available.

6. In view of the emergency situation and the changing priorities of missions and functions in all areas, plus the consideration presented in the comprehensive surveys made to date, it is considered more feasible and economical to withhold blanket approval of the visiting expert program. Individual requests can be considered on the basis of current factors.

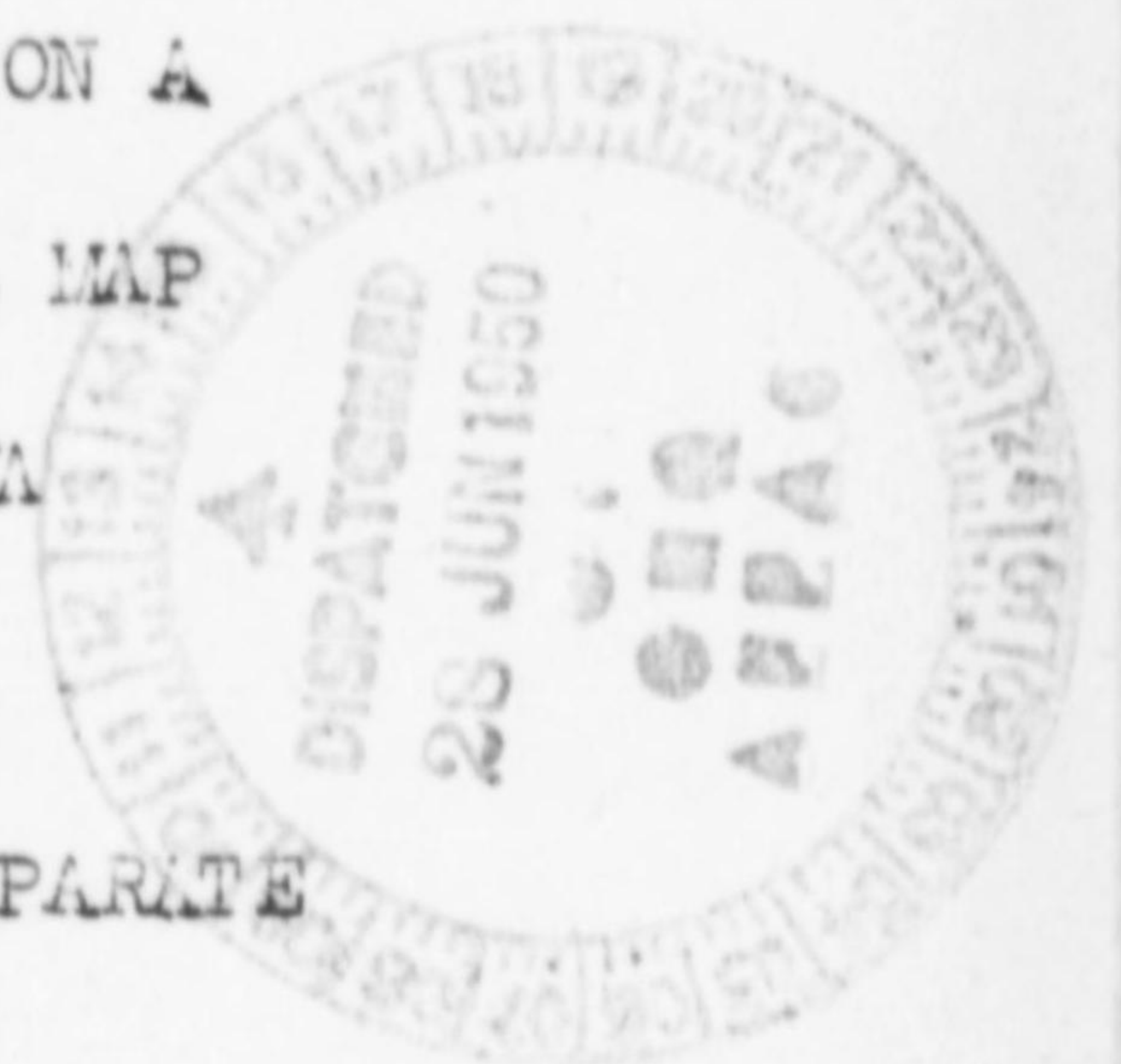

1. a. Tab A is a proposal by the Chief, ESS, to recruit a Customs-Tariff mission for Japan. This matter was discussed by Mr. Moss, ESS/IR, during his recent visit to Washington.

b. Tab B is a DA proposal that two experts who accompanied the Dodge Mission return to Japan with Dr. Shoup's group. This proposal is suggested by Mr. Dodge and has the concurrence of Dr. Shoup.

c. G-1 concurs in both proposals, and has prepared a proposed message to DA, Tab C, to effectuate approval thereof. Tab C is a combination of Tab A and a concurrence with Tab B proposal.

3. Since only CIE has submitted a firm program for FY 1951, the commitments for ESS and NRS represent either holdovers from the FY 1950 program, or individual actions such as the attached. G-1 has requested firm programs from ESS and NRS, but such have not yet been received. It is apparent that the \$250,000 budgeted for visiting experts, FY 1951, will be inadequate to support the firm programs of CIE, NRS, ESS and a minor requirement from PHW.

a. DA budgeted for 2,018 DAC spaces for GARICA 412 (Japan), at \$11,008,000 (including the \$250,000 for visiting experts). Present approved FY 1951 manning levels total 1,615 man years, at estimated cost of \$9,037,000 (including \$250,000 for visiting experts). The difference of \$2,000,000, which represents savings from original budget estimate, should be adequate to provide for necessary increases in the visiting expert program, as well as absorb any reasonable reduction which may be imposed by Congress or Bureau of the Budget.

b. Upon receipt from NRS and ESS (within the next few days) of a firm FY 1951 Visiting Expert Program, G-1 will submit revised recommendation for

Consider that services of qualified customs and tariff experts would be extremely useful here to assist the headquarters in necessary SCAP review of present status of Japanese customs procedures and tariff policies. Consideration of specific customs tariff schedules not contemplated since belief here such rates should be decision of Japanese Government.

Mr. Harold Moss, recently in Washington on TDY, discussed composition of such group informally with representatives of U. S. Treasury, State, and the Tariff Commission. 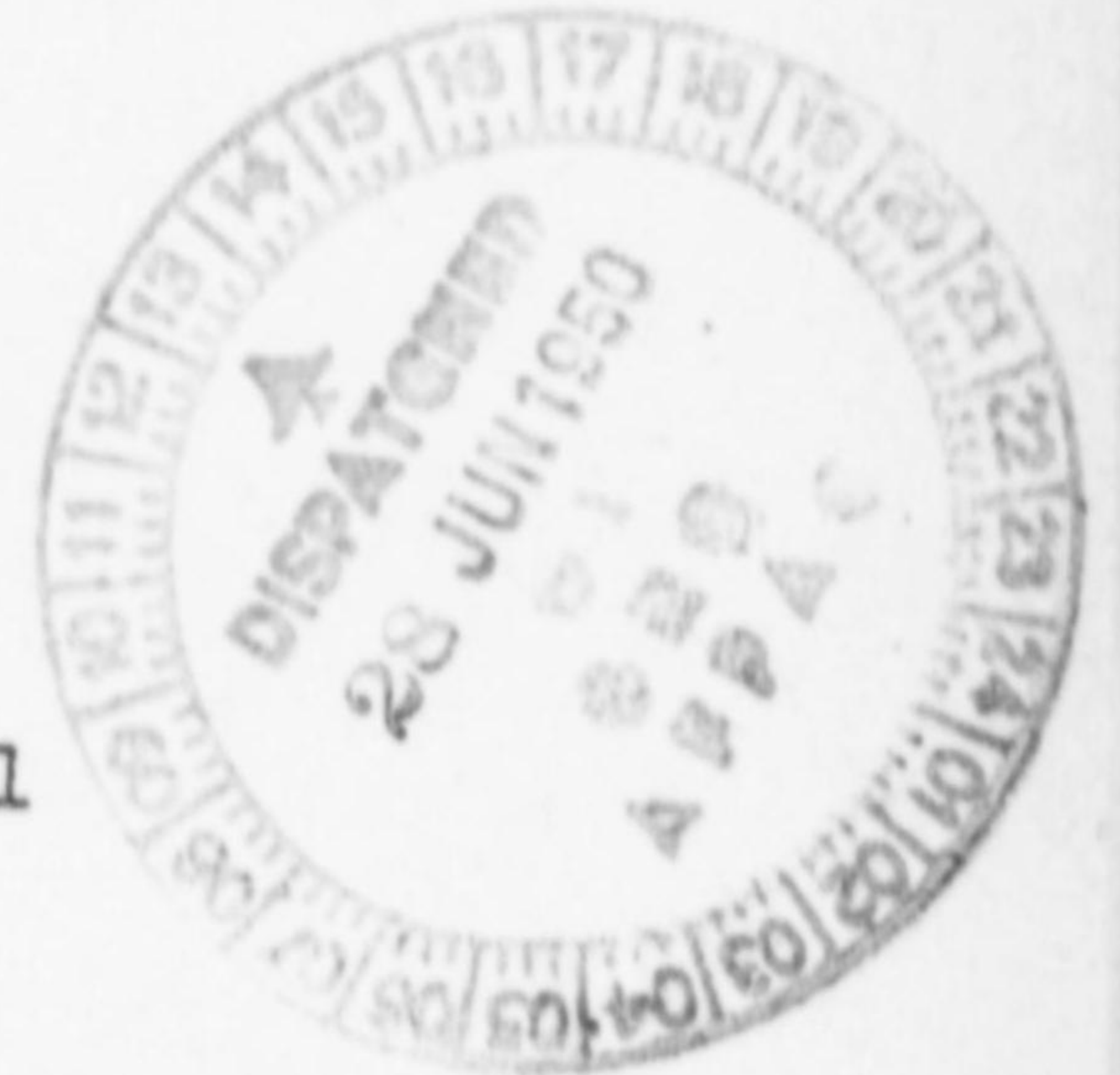
