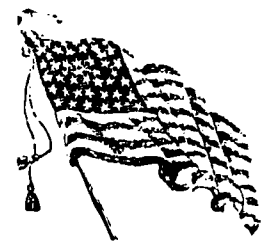

BIG CROWD AT THIRD FLOWER SHOW

Rose Exhibit Especially Fine

Everybody in Narberth who knew the difference between a daisy and a peony went to the Third Annual Flower Show last Saturday in the Y. M. C. A. building. Folks began dropping in a few minutes after two o'clock in the afternoon and continued coming until half past ten in the evening. At one time during the evening the show room was so crowded that people had to wait on the stairway and down in the lobby until those who were ahead of them had had their look and were ready to leave.

So in view of the foregoing facts it is entirely unnecessary to say that the show was a success.

Roses Especially Fine

The display of roses was generally conceded to be finer than in either the 1916 or 1915 shows. And this is all the more remarkable when we recall the weather of the last two or three weeks. The blooms exhibited by Mr. F. D. Walker carried off a number of prizes and won universal praise. Mr. J. F. Donnelly's roses, especially his foxglove, also won general commendation.

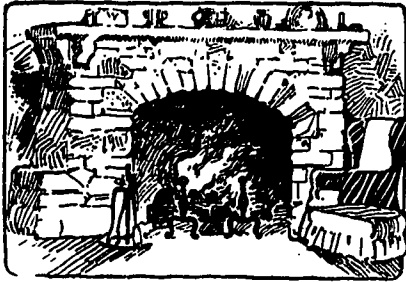
And this is the hospital to which many of the American wounded boys will be taken. Is it worth helping? Come and "do your bit."

VACANT LOTS AS "DUMPS"

An anonymous communication has been received by the Narberth Civic Association, calling attention to the fact that the vacant lot at the corner of Chestnut and Essex avenues is used as a dumping ground for rubbish of all kinds, and that often fires are started and left to burn alone, endangering residences in the vicinity. Even people living a square away are said to offend in this manner.

Our Town does not often pay attention to anonymous communications. It is no crime to call attention to the practice of making an eyesore of a public lot in the center of the town, and starting fires that endanger property. It would have been more effective if the writer had signed the communication, or joined the Civic Association and reported the matter personally.

However, if this condition exists, it should be remedied by the residents in that neighborhood. Complaints should be registered with the Board of Health and Fire Company, who are fully competent to suppress nuisances and menaces of this kind.

NARBERTH HAS GARDEN

Postmaster Edward S. Haws is to be congratulated on the interest demonstrated by his fellow townspeople in the planting and cultivation of the big garden he has been enabled to provide for their food conservation efforts.

The garden consists of five fertile acres of land owned by Miss Sarah Stotesbury, of Chaney, Pa., who, at the solicitation of Postmaster Haws, has donated the use of the land free. Mr. Haws had the garden plowed, put in order for immediate planting and divided into twenty-two plots and these plots have been rented to those who till them at what such preparation cost. As the ground was fully ready for the seed it proved an incentive to those who did not have time to put it in order, consequently every plot is

planted and there were not enough to meet the demand.

Mr. Haws is proud of his enterprise and the promising big crops of vegetables and is sure that each renter of a plot will make good so as to get his same plot again next year, providing the land is still unoccupied.

MISS TAFT BRYN MAWR DEAN

Daughter of Former President Unanimously Chosen by Board of Directors of College

Directors of Bryn Mawr College have unanimously chosen Miss Helen Herron Taft, only daughter of former President Taft, as dean of the institution.

Miss Taft is a graduate of Bryn Mawr, and during her undergraduate days created a worthy record as a student. In 1908 she won the first matriculation scholarship for Pennsylvania and the Southern States. After two years of study she returned to Washington to assist her mother in her social duties at the White House.

In 1913 Miss Taft returned to Bryn Mawr, and in 1915 took her degree specializing in history, economics and politics. Despite the fact that her college course had been interrupted by the three years in Washington, she was above merit in all grades.

Since her graduation Miss Taft has been studying in the graduate department of Yale, completing all the formal work for the degree of doctor of philosophy.

Miss Taft succeeds Miss Marion Reilly, of Philadelphia, who was dean for eight years, and has been elected a member of the board of directors. During the present year the office has been held by Eunice Schenck, associate professor of the French department, who will return to teaching.
