GENERAL ORDER BY THE MOST NOBLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA
IN COUNCIL.

FORT WILLIAM, FOREIGN DEPARTMENT,

THE 6TH DECEMBER 1852.

THE Governor General in Council has much satisfaction in publishing, for general information, despatches which have been received from His Excellency Commodore Lambert, and from Major General Godwin, C. B., reporting the capture and occupation of the Town of Pegu, after resistance, and with some loss.

The Governor General in Council desires to express his full approbation of the steadiness and gallantry that have been displayed by all who were engaged upon this service.

His Lordship in Council offers his best thanks to Major General Godwin, C. B., to Brigadier McNeill, in command of the Troops, to Commander Shadwell, R. N., who directed the naval arrangements, to Lieutenant Colonel Tudor, Bengal Fusiliers, to Major Hill, Madras Fusiliers, to Major Shurbrick, 5th Madras N. I., to Captain Mallock, with the guns, and Captain Brown in command of the Rifle Company 5th Madras N. I.

His Lordship in Council desires also to offer his thanks to the Officers of the Staff, to Major Mayhew, Deputy Adjutant General, Major Boulderson, Deputy Judge Advocate General, Captain Hamilton, Assistant Adjutant General, Captain Darroch, Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General, Captain Burne, Military Secretary, Captain Renaud, Brigade Major, Captain Latter, Interpreter with the Force, Captain Chads, A. D. C., and to all the Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, Soldiers, and Sailors who were engaged upon the Expedition.

To HIS EXCELLENCY COMMODORE G. R. LAMBERT,

Commander-in-Chief,

SIR

I have the honor to report, for your Excellency's information, the proceedings of the Expedition to Pegu.

The Troops having embarked at Rangoon on the evening of the 18th instant, on board the H. C. Steamers *Mahanuddy*, *Nerbudda*, *Damooda*, and *Lord William Bentinck*, set forth in the accompanying Memorandum, showing the details of the whole force, dropped down the River below the Hastings' Shoal, and waited for the morning tide.

A convoy of Boats, containing Provisions, Stores, and Camp-followers, escorted by the Gun-boats, under the command of Lieutenant Mason, preceded the Steamers on the afternoon of the 18th.

Weighing at early day-light on the 19th, and taking the whole of the flood-tide with them, the vessels, led by the *Lord William Bentinck*, proceeded up the Pegu River, and arrived in the evening at stations a few miles below Pegu.

The *Lord William Bentinck*, more fortunate than the rest, (Mr. Digney having previously acquired some knowledge of the River on a former occasion,) reached a point two miles below the position it was proposed to take up; the *Damooda*, *Nerbudda*, and *Mahanuddy* remaining for the night at stations lower down the River.

The further advance of the Vessels on the following day was tedious, and a matter of considerable difficulty, owing to the decreasing width and depth of the Channel, and the serpentine bends of the River.

By the evening the *Lord William Bentinck* had pushed on to a position about a quarter of a mile below the S. E. angle of the old ruined City of Pegu; the *Nerbudda* reached a point half a mile further down; the *Damooda* three quarters; and the *Mahanuddy* a mile and three quarters below the *Lord William Bentinck*.

After anchoring, the Major General, accompanied by some Staff Officers and myself, proceeded up the River to reconnoitre, and make arrangements for landing on the following morning.

In the evening, and during the early part of the night, some desultory firing took place from the enemy's River Stockades on the headmost Steamer, which was returned by her and the boats, while Picquets were thrown out from the Steamers on the banks during the night to prevent the accident of a night attack.

The disembarkation of the Troops commenced on the following morning, Sunday, the 21st, at 4 A. M., each Steamer landing her men on the left bank of the River, abreast of her own position, from whence the different columns marched along the bank to the point of concentration abreast of the headmost Steamer, the *Lord William Bentinck*.

At the same time the Artillery, two 24-Pounder Howitzers, (which had been previously transferred from the *Mahanuddy* to the Paddle-box Boats,) were landed by the Seamen under the directions of Commander Lambert.

The ancient City of Pegu is of a quadrangular form; the ruined walls or ramparts are still clearly defined, and are surrounded on all sides by a moat, much choked with mud and rubbish, its sides being about a mile and three quarters in length—the Pagoda, which forms the key of the position, lying in the N. E. division of the space, enclosed by the ruined ramparts.

The Enemy, whose numbers are stated to have amounted to between three and four thousand, were strongly posted at the S. E. angle of the walls, and also along the river front of their position, which was strongly stockaded. The Enemy made no opposition to our landing, owing to our movements being concealed by the fog which prevailed in the early morning.

The concentration of the Troops and the arrangements for the advance, were completed by about 6-30 A. M.; at 7 the advance commenced, the columns moving along the outer edge of the Southern moat towards the Eastward, so as to turn the flank of the Enemy's position, their progress being necessarily extremely slow, on account of the difficult nature of the ground, which was covered with high grass and jungle, and over which there was no regular road.

The Enemy immediately commenced a sharp fire, which soon caused some casualties, and as the Troops advanced along the edge of the moat, they moved along the ramparts parallel to them, and maintained a constant fire. At about 9-15 the European Troops who were in advance reached a point opposite to a broken opening in the rampart, where the moat seemed passable, and after a short halt to refresh the men, and form them under cover of a wood, they advanced at 9-45 A. M. in column of attack, charged gallantly across the moat, entered the line of the Enemy's defence, and drove the Burmese before them,—the Enemy retreating towards the Pagoda.

I had remained a little behind to assist the advance of the Artillery, about which the General had been anxious, and on my arrival at 10 A. M. had the satisfaction of seeing our Troops in possession of the Enemy's ramparts.

After refreshing the men, the Troops advanced, at 10-45 A. M., to the left along the bund, towards the line of the river defences, for the purpose of dispersing the Enemy in that quarter; but on perceiving them in full retreat towards the Pagoda, owing to the efficient fire of shell and canister, which from the commencement of the affair had been kept up on them by the *Lord William Bentinck* and the Gun Boats, the General countermarched the Troops to the right again; and returned to our original position.

At 12 o'clock the columns again advanced by the direct road leading towards the Pagoda without meeting any opposition, and on arriving near it, at 0-45 P. M. the columns were formed for the assault. On approaching it we perceived some Burmese stealthily watching our movements; our men advanced with a rush, the enemy fired a volley and fled, we entered the Pagoda, and Pegu was ours.

It could scarcely be expected that this service could be performed without some loss; and I regret to say, that the Military force had six men killed and thirty-one wounded, including, among the latter, three Officers; most providentially some of the Seamen in the Boats, or on board the *Lord William Bentinck*, (which vessel alone was near enough to take part in the attack,) were either killed or wounded, although continually exposed to a warm fire.

It is with much gratification that I have to report to Your Excellency, the zeal, energy and good conduct of the Officers and Seamen attached to the Expedition.

To Commander Rowley Lambert, of H. M. S. *Fox*, praise is due for the able manner in which the Guns were promptly landed by the Seamen under his directions, and subsequently for the efficient manner in which he directed the fire from the Gun Boats, on the enemy's position, by which they were ultimately dislodged.

Messrs. Digney, Porter, Berwick and Simson, respectively Commanding the Honorable Company's Steamers, deserve great credit for the perseverance and energy they displayed in pushing their Vessels up the River, under circumstances of most difficult navigation, as well as for their general assistance.

Lieutenants Mason and Glover, and Mr. Pocock, Mate, and the subordinate Officers in charge of Boats, acquitted themselves to my entire satisfaction.

The services of Mr. J. F. Johnson, Assistant Surgeon of H. M. S. *Sphinx*, were extremely valuable in attending on the wounded, many of whom were sent on board the *Lord William Bentinck* at the commencement of the affair.

Commander Beauchamp Seymour, R. N., accompanied the Expedition as a volunteer, and was present with the Major General Commanding throughout the operations of the day.

Reporting further Proceedings and Return of Expedition from Pegu.

H. M. S. *SPHINX*, Rangoon. 24th November. 1852.

FROM COMMANDER CHARLES D. A. SHADWELL,

TO HIS EXCELLENCY COMMODORE LAMBERT,

In continuation of my letter No. 7, relative to the Expedition to Pegu, I have the honor to inform Your Excellency that, in accordance with the wishes of the Major General Commanding the Forces, the Troops whom it was proposed should return to Rangoon, were embarked on board the

Hon'ble Company's Steamers *Mahanuddy*, *Damooda* and *Lord William Bontinck*, on the evening of the 22nd. The two latter Vessels left for Rangoon on the morning of the 23rd, and General Godwin and Staff, having embarked on board the *Mahanuddy* during the afternoon, that Vessel proceeded and returned to Rangoon at noon this day.

A Garrison of 430 men remains at Pegu, 230 Europeans and 200 Sepoys.

The Major General at first wished the *Nerbudda* to remain at Pegu for a few days, but having subsequently changed his mind, I ordered that Vessel to return also, and desired one of the *Sphinx's* Paddle-box Boats to remain until further orders.

Mr. Bamadistan, in charge of the Yawl of H. M. S. *Winchester*, arrived at Pegu, with a Convoy of provision boats from Rangoon, on the morning of the 23rd, I have instructed that Officer to return to Rangoon with the empty boats as soon as they have been cleared.

Sir,

I have the honor to state, for the information of the Governor General in Council, that Pegu was captured yesterday.

In June last, I was induced, by strong representations from various sources, to send a small force to drive out some Burmese from Pegu. We had had some friendly intercourse with the inhabitants of that place, who declared to me that if they were put again in possession of their town, they would be able to hold it. There was an armed party of Taliens at the time from the villages around who promised their support.

The Burmese were driven out and the people recovered possession of their Town, but, as I feared, they did not hold it a week.

At this time it would have been inconvenient in many ways to have stationed a force there at the commencement of the monsoon.

Since that time I have had various reports of the enemy being in great force at Pegu, and that they had thrown up strong defences on the River, and from it to the Pagoda, within the site of the old City—they became troublesome also to several villages between this and Rangoon.

As the Army will shortly be at Prome with a garrison only at Rangoon, it became imperative to take possession of and garrison Pegu.

I had determined upon this for some time, and the three small river Steamers with the *Mahanuddy*, having returned from Prome on the 16th of November, I arranged with Commodore Lambert, that the troops should embark on Thursday evening, the 18th, when 300 men of the 1st Bengal Fusiliers, under Lieutenant Colonel Tudor; 300 of the 1st Madras Fusiliers, under Major Hill; 400 men of the 5th Madras N. I., under Major Shabrisk; 70 Sappers with two 24-Pounder Howitzers and 32 Artillery men, embarked by 7 o'clock P. M.

This force I placed under the command of Brigadier McNeill of the Madras Army.

I also embarked with my own Staff in the *Mahanuddy*, for the purpose of accompanying the Expedition.

Commander Shadwell, of the Royal Navy, had charge of the Flotilla.

This town is situated about 60 miles from Rangoon, on a fine creek, called the Pegu River, which runs into the Rangoon River, just below the town of Rangoon.

We started on Friday morning, the 19th, at day-break, and in consequence of the shallow water were obliged to anchor about two miles below Pegu at sunset, on the evening of the 20th.

The troops commenced disembarking at 4 A. M. the next morning, and were all assembled on shore by $\frac{1}{2}$ past 6 o'clock, and when I joined the force at this hour, I found it buried in high grass jungle and the whole country enveloped in a thick fog.

I was in some degree aware of the position of the Enemy, from a plan I had had in my possession for some time, furnished by Captain Latter, he having accompanied the former expedition in June, but not the particulars of it, until I saw it on the ground. The site of the old City, wherein the Enemy was posted, is formed by a square, surrounded by a high bund, each side of which is presumed to be about two miles in length, the West side facing the river, and the square is surrounded by a wet moat, between 70 and 80 paces wide.

From the South-west angle there is a causeway over the moat, close to and parallel with the river. This causeway the Enemy had made exceedingly strong by traverses, and breaking it down at various intervals to prevent our advance. On the whole of the South face of the bund, fronting our position, they had bodies of troops stationed, extending for about a mile and a quarter.

As the causeway on the right of their position was so narrow that only a file of men could advance along it against their numerous musquetry and local impediments, I abandoned all idea of attacking them there. It was therefore determined to force our way along the moat, and to turn the left of their position, on the South face of the square.

Captain Latter, my Interpreter, who was with me, had with him a Burmese, who promised to find us a causeway leading into the bund close to the left of their position. We commenced our advance, the Bengal Fusiliers leading, covered by the Rifle Company of the 5th Madras Native Infantry, and followed by the Madras Fusiliers and 5th Native Infantry, in file, and for two hours was this force struggling through the almost impenetrable grass and jungle along the outer edge of the moat, and exposed to a very warm fire from the enemy.

We at last reached a part of the moat which admitted of a passage for the troops and marked by the extreme left of the Enemy's position, and where they had a strong post and two guns.

I here directed Colonel Tudor to form a storming party of 150 of his own men and 100 of the Madras Fusiliers, which the Lieutenant Colonel led. At the signal given they crossed the moat through mud and water, and most gallantly stormed the Enemy's post. We were now masters of their position.

Our own guns were actively employed under Captain Mallock at the spot from which we first commenced our move, and after some time they were brought up, over almost impassable ground, nearly to the spot where we effected our entrance into the Enemy's position, and they were protected by the Grenadiers of the 5th Madras Native Infantry under Captain Wyndham.

After resting the troops for some time, and collecting the wounded men, we again advanced by an excellent path in the direction of the large Pagoda. We suffered no molestation from the Enemy, but on approaching the Pagoda, I formed a party for its attack, under Major Hill, of the Madras Fusiliers, consisting of 100 of his own Regiment, with a similar number of the Bengal Fusiliers. They advanced up to the steps of the Pagoda, and on ascending received a fire of musquetry, which they soon silenced, and took possession of the place at about one o'clock P. M.

The fatigues of the day were now over, and I am certain that while they lasted no soldiers ever met with more arduous ones, nor ever met the obstacles of such an advance with more cheerful and steady perseverance than did this little band of brave and determined men.

The Enemy by the least computation could not number less than 5,000 men, evidently headed by people of consideration, by the numerous mounted people as well as elephants, which were seen retiring by the road to Sitang.

Our loss is not nearly what I apprehended in the morning it might have been, and considering the difficulties of the ground and exposure to the Enemy, I congratulate myself that it is so small.

I have now to ask the Governor General in Council's consideration of the services performed on this expedition by the Officers and men engaged.

To Brigadier McNeill, who formed up the force in the morning as it disembarked, and whose indefatigable exertions during the day brought on an exhaustion which occasioned me much distress to witness and which deprived me of his valuable assistance for a short time.

To Lieutenant Colonel Tudor, of the Bengal Fusiliers, who led the storming party and carried the Enemy's position.

To Major Hill, of the Madras Fusiliers, who led the party which carried the Pagoda.

To Major Shubrick, of the 5th Madras Native Infantry, whose position in the *Bentinck*, which was considerably in advance of the rest of the Flotilla, called forth his greatest vigilance to protect his people from the Enemy, who were around him, as also for his exertions during the day.

To Captain Mallock, for his exertions with the Guns.

To Captain Brown, who commanded the Rifle Company of the 5th Madras Native Infantry, who covered our advance, and whose conduct I witnessed with much pleasure during the day.

I feel most particularly indebted to the attention and devotion paid to the sick and wounded by the Medical Officers who accompanied the force.

The Brigadier has brought to my notice Captain Renaud, his Brigade Major, whose services he highly appreciates.

To Captain Latter, whose distinguished gallantry on this as on all occasions has been conspicuous, as also his local information and active assistance, I beg to call your Lordship's particular attention.

To Commander Shadwell, who had charge of the naval part of this Expedition, I am deeply indebted for the most unremitting exertions by night and day, and for the disembarkation of the Troops, which was conducted as quietly as expeditiously. Neither the Steamers nor the boats could get up to the Enemy's defences, owing to the shallowness of the River.

Captain Shadwell personally accompanied me throughout the day.

Will your Lordship permit me to introduce to your notice Commander Beauchamp Seymour, of the Royal Navy, who is here on a visit to many friends, who accompanied me during the day, and whose conduct was conspicuous on every occasion.

To Major Mayhew, Deputy Adjutant General; Major Boulderson, Deputy Judge Advocate General; Captain Hamilton, Deputy Assistant Adjutant General; Captain Darroch, Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General; Captain Burne, Military Secretary, and Captain Chads, Aid-de-Camp; the General and my personal staff, whose duties were most arduous, being carried on on foot, and whose exertions to keep up the communication with the force in this broken ground were incessant, I beg to call your Lordship's attention.

I leave a garrison of 400 men, 200 of the Madras Fusiliers and 200 of the 5th Madras Native Infantry with two 24-Pounder Howitzers and a detail of Artillery with 40 Sappers, which the upper terrace of the Pagoda will hold most commodiously, including the Magazine and stores. This party will be under the command of Major Hill, of the Madras Fusiliers, a most excellent officer.

Lieutenant Campbell, of the Bengal Engineers, will see to its necessary defences.

Eight guns were taken and it is supposed that more will be found.

I purpose leaving this for Rangoon to-morrow morning.

The 29th November, 1852.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time, on the 29th November 1852:

ACT No. — OF 1852.

An Act to extend the jurisdiction of Magistrates, under the 53rd George 3rd, Cap. 155, Sec. 105, in cases of assaults, forcible entries, and other injuries accompanied with force, not being felonies.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 53rd year of the reign of King George the 3rd, it was enacted amongst other things that it should be lawful for any Native of India resident in the East Indies or parts therein mentioned, and out of the Towns of Calcutta, Madras and Bombay, in case of any assault, forcible entry, or other injury accompanied with force, not being felony, alleged to have been done against his person or property by a British subject, to complain of such assault, forcible entry, or other injury accompanied with force, not being felony, to the Magistrate of the zillah, or district where the alleged offender should be resident, or in which such offence should have been committed, and that such Magistrate should have the power and authority therein mentioned: and whereas Natives of India, resident in the East Indies, upon complaints preferred by them under the aforesaid provisions of the said Act, may be prevented from obtaining redress under the same by reason of their inability to prove the place of their birth: and whereas it is expedient to extend the aforesaid provisions of the said Act as amended by Act IV. 1843, to cases of assaults, forcible entries, and other injuries accompanied with force, not being felonies, committed in any part of the territories under

the Government of the East India Company, not being within the said Towns of Calcutta or Madras, or the town or Island of Bombay, or the settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, against the person or property of any Native of Asia, or of any other person whatever, whether a Native of India or not: It is enacted as follows:

I. The provisions of the said Act of the 53rd George 3rd and Act IV. 1843, so far as the same extend to the case of assaults, forcible entries, or other injuries accompanied with force, not being felonies, against the person or property of any Native of India, are hereby extended to the case of any assault, forcible entry, or other injury accompanied with force, not being felony, which may at any time hereafter be committed in any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, not being within the said towns of Calcutta or Madras, the said town or Island of Bombay, or the said settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, by any British subject or other person, against the person or property of any person whatever.

II. The powers in such case given to the Magistrate of the zillah or district, are hereby extended to any Joint Magistrate or other person lawfully exercising the powers of a Magistrate, in the case of any such offence as aforesaid, which may hereafter be committed within the district over which his authority extends.

Ordered that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 1st day of March next.

Translation of Proclamation regarding Suttee issued to the Hakims of Pergunnahs in the Marwar territory.

In compliance with the desire of the Hon'ble East India Company, it is ordered that Suttee shall be forbidden. In case any one wishes to be a Suttee, the Jageerdars, Boomeeahs, Rajpoots and Ryots, all must be responsible for their own houses, that neither Suttee nor Sumaud takes place. Should a Suttee occur, a fine will be levied on Jageerdars 200 Rupees on their Rekh (per 1,000,) and from Ryots according to their property. A Perwannah to this effect is to be prepared for each village. It is the order of the Maha Raja.

SIR,

I have the honor to report, for your Excellency's information, the proceedings of the Expedition to Pegu.

The Troops having embarked at Rangoon on the evening of the 18th instant, on board the H. C. Steamers *Mahanuddy*, *Nerbudda*, *Damooda* and *Lord William Bentinck*, as set forth in the accompanying Memorandum, showing the details of the whole force, dropped down the River below the Hastings' Shoal, and waited for the morning tide.

A convoy of Boats, containing Provisions, Stores, and Camp-followers, escorted by the Gun-boats, under the command of Lieutenant Mason, preceded the Steamers on the afternoon of the 18th.

Weighing at early day-light on the 19th, and taking the whole of the flood-tide with them, the vessels, led by the *Lord William Bentinck*, proceeded up the Pegu River, and arrived in the evening at stations a few miles below Pegu.

The *Lord William Bentinck*, more fortunate than the rest, (Mr. Digney having previously acquired some knowledge of the River on a former occasion,) reached a point two miles below the position it was proposed to take up; the *Damooda*, *Nerbudda*, and *Mahanuddy* remaining for the night at stations lower down the River.

The further advance of the Vessels on the following day was tedious, and a matter of considerable difficulty, owing to the decreasing width and depth of the Channel, and the serpentine bends of the River.

By the evening the *Lord William Bentinck* had pushed on to a position about a quarter of a mile below the S. E. angle of the old ruined City of Pegu; the *Nerbudda* reached a point half a mile further down; the *Damooda* three quarters; and the *Mahanuddy* a mile and three quarters below the *Lord William Bentinck*.

After anchoring, the Major General, accompanied by some Staff Officers and myself, proceeded up the River to reconnoitre, and make arrangements for landing on the following morning.

In the evening, and during the early part of the night, some desultory firing took place from the enemy's River Stockades on the headmost Steamer, which was returned by her and the boats, while Picquets were thrown out from the Steamers on the banks during the night to prevent the accident of a night attack.

The disembarkation of the Troops commenced on the following morning, Sunday, the 21st, at 4 A. M., each Steamer landing her men on the left bank of the River, abreast of her own position, from whence the different columns marched along the bank to the point of concentration abreast of the headmost Steamer, the *Lord William Bentinck*.

At the same time the Artillery, two 24-Pounder Howitzers, (which had been previously transferred from the *Mahanuddy* to the Paddle-box Boats,) were landed by the Seamen under the directions of Commander Lambert.

The ancient City of Pegu is of a quadrangular form; the ruined walls or ramparts are still clearly defined, and are surrounded on all sides by a moat, much choked with mud and rubbish, its sides being about a mile and three quarters in length,—the Pagoda, which forms the key of the position, lying in the N. E. division of the space, enclosed by the ruined ramparts.

The Enemy, whose numbers are stated to have amounted to between three and four thousand, were strongly posted at the S. E. angle of the walls, and also along the river front of their position, which was strongly stockaded. The Enemy made no opposition to our landing, owing to our movements being concealed by the fog which prevailed in the early morning.

The concentration of the Troops and the arrangements for the advance, were completed by about 6-30 A. M.; at 7 the advance commenced, the columns moving along the outer edge of the Southern moat towards the Eastward, so as to turn the flank of the Enemy's position, their progress being necessarily extremely slow, on account of the difficult nature of the ground, which was covered with high grass and jungle, and over which there was no regular road.

The Enemy immediately commenced a sharp fire, which soon caused some casualties, and as the Troops advanced along the edge of the moat, they moved along the ramparts parallel to them, and maintained a constant fire. At about 9-15 the European Troops who were in advance reached a point opposite to a broken opening in the rampart, where the moat seemed passable, and after a short halt to refresh the men, and form them under cover of a wood, they advanced at 9-45 A. M. in column of attack, charged gallantly across the moat, entered the line of the Enemy's defence, and drove the Burmese before them,—the Enemy retreating towards the Pagoda.

I had remained a little behind to assist the advance of the Artillery, about which the General had been anxious, and on my arrival at 10 A. M. had the satisfaction of seeing our Troops in possession of the Enemy's ramparts.

After refreshing the men, the Troops advanced, at 10-45 A. M., to the left along the bund, towards the line of the river defences, for the purpose of dispersing the Enemy in that quarter; but on perceiving them in full retreat towards the Pagoda, owing to the efficient fire of shell and canister, which from the commencement of the affair had been kept up on them by the *Lord William Bentinck* and the Gun Boats, the General countermarched the Troops to the right again; and returned to our original position.

At 12 o'clock the columns again advanced by the direct road leading towards the Pagoda without meeting any opposition, and on arriving near it, at 0-45 P. M. the columns were formed for the assault. On approaching it we perceived some Burmese stealthily watching our movements; our men advanced with a rush, the enemy fired a volley and fled, we entered the Pagoda, and Pegu was ours.

It could scarcely be expected that this service could be performed without some loss; and I regret to say, that the Military force had six men killed and thirty-one wounded, including, among the latter, three Officers; most providentially none of the Seamen in the Boats, or on board the *Lord William Bentinck*, (which vessel alone was near enough to take part in the attack,) were either killed or wounded, although continually exposed to a warm fire.

It is with much gratification that I have to report to Your Excellency, the zeal, energy and good conduct of the Officers and Seamen attached to the Expedition.

To Commander Rowley Lambert, of H. M. S. *Fox*, praise is due for the able manner in which the Guns were promptly landed by the Seamen under his directions, and subsequently for the efficient manner in which he directed the fire from the Gun Boats, on the enemy's position, by which they were ultimately dislodged.

Messrs. Digney, Porter, Berwick and Simson, respectively Commanding the Honorable Company's Steamers, deserve great credit for the perseverance and energy they displayed in pushing their Vessels up the River, under circumstances of most difficult navigation, as well as for their general assistance.

Lieutenants Mason and Glover, and Mr. Pocock, Mate, and the subordinate Officers in charge of Boats, acquitted themselves to my entire satisfaction.

The services of Mr. J. F. Johnson, Assistant Surgeon of H. M. S. *Sphinx*, were extremely valuable in attending on the wounded, many of whom were sent on board the *Lord William Bentinck* at the commencement of the affair.

Commander Beauchamp Seymour, R. N., accompanied the Expedition as a volunteer, and was present with the Major General Commanding throughout the operations of the day.

Reporting further Proceedings and Return of Expedition from Pegu.

FROM COMMANDER CHARLES D. A. SHADWELL,

TO HIS EXCELLENCY COMMODORE LAMBERT,

SIR,

In continuation of my letter No. 7, relative to the Expedition to Pegu, I have the honor to inform Your Excellency that, in accordance with the wishes of the Major General Commanding the Forces, the Troops whom it was proposed should return to Rangoon, were embarked on board the

Hon'ble Company's Steamers *Mahanuddy*, *Damooda* and *Lord William Bontinck*, on the evening of the 22nd. The two latter Vessels left for Rangoon on the morning of the 26rd, and General Godwin and Staff, having embarked on board the *Mahanuddy* during the afternoon, that Vessel proceeded and returned to Rangoon at noon this day.

A Garrison of 430 men remains at Pegu, 230 Europeans and 200 Sepoys.

The Major General at first wished the *Nerbudda* to remain at Pegu for a few days, but having subsequently changed his mind, I ordered that Vessel to return also, and desired one of the *Sphinx's* Paddle-box Boats to remain until further orders.

Mr. Bamadistan, in charge of the Yawl of H. M. S. *Winchester*, arrived at Pegu, with a Convoy of provision boats from Rangoon, on the morning of the 23rd. I have instructed that Officer to return to Rangoon with the empty boats as soon as they have been cleared.

SIR,

I have the honor to state, for the information of the Governor General in Council, that Pegu was captured yesterday.

In June last, I was induced, by strong representations from various sources, to send a small force to drive out some Burmese from Pegu. We had had some friendly intercourse with the inhabitants of that place, who declared to me that if they were put again in possession of their town, they would be able to hold it. There was an armed party of Taluans at the time from the villages around who promised their support.

The Burmese were driven out and the people recovered possession of their Town, but, as I feared, they did not hold it a week.

At this time it would have been inconvenient in many ways to have stationed a force there at the commencement of the monsoon.

Since that time I have had various reports of the Enemy being in great force at Pegu, and that they had thrown up strong defences on the River, and from it to the Pagoda, within the site of the old City—they became troublesome also to several villages between this and Rangoon.

As the Army will shortly be at Prome with a garrison only at Rangoon, it became imperative to take possession of and garrison Pegu.

I had determined upon this for some time, and the three small river Steamers with the *Mahanuddy*, having returned from Prome on the 16th of November, I arranged with Commodore Lambert, that the troops should embark on Thursday evening, the 18th, when 300 men of the 1st Bengal Fusiliers, under Lieutenant Colonel Tudor; 300 of the 1st Madras Fusiliers, under Major Hill; 400 men of the 5th Madras N. I., under Major Shubrick; 70 Sappers with two 24-Pounder Howitzers and 32 Artillery men, embarked by 7 o'Clock P. M.

This force I placed under the command of Brigadier McNeill of the Madras Army.

I also embarked with my own Staff in the *Mahanuddy*, for the purpose of accompanying the Expedition.

Commander Shadwell, of the Royal Navy, had charge of the Flotilla.

This town is situated about 60 miles from Rangoon, on a fine creek, called the Pegu River, which runs into the Rangoon River, just below the town of Rangoon.

We started on Friday morning, the 19th, at day-break, and in consequence of the shallow water were obliged to anchor about two miles below Pegu at sunset, on the evening of the 20th.

The troops commenced disembarking at 4 A. M. the next morning, and were all assembled on shore by $\frac{1}{2}$ past 6 o'Clock, and when I joined the force at this hour, I found it buried in high grass jungle and the whole country enveloped in a thick fog.

I was in some degree aware of the position of the Enemy, from a plan I had had in my possession for some time, furnished by Captain Latter, he having accompanied the former expedition in June, but not the particulars of it, until I saw it on the ground. The site of the old City, wherein the Enemy was posted, is formed by a square, surrounded by a high bund, each side of which is presumed to be about two miles in length, the West side facing the river, and the square is surrounded by a wet moat, between 70 and 80 paces wide.

From the South-west angle there is a causeway over the moat, close to, and parallel with the river. This causeway the Enemy had made exceedingly strong by traverses, and breaking it down at various intervals to prevent our advance. On the whole of the South face of the bund, fronting our position, they had bodies of troops stationed, extending for about a mile and a quarter.

As the causeway on the right of their position was so narrow that only a file of men could advance along it against their numerous musquetry and local impediments, I abandoned all idea of attacking them there. It was therefore determined to force our way along the moat, and to turn the left of their position, on the South face of the square.

Captain Latter, my Interpreter, who was with me, had with him a Burmese, who promised to find us a causeway leading into the bund close to the left of their position. We commenced our advance, the Bengal Fusiliers leading, covered by the Rifle Company of the 5th Madras Native Infantry, and followed by the Madras Fusiliers and 5th Native Infantry, in file and for two hours was this force struggling through the almost impenetrable grass and jungle along the outer edge of the moat, and exposed to a very warm fire from the enemy.

We at last reached a part of the moat which admitted of a passage for the troops and marked by the extreme left of the Enemy's position, and where they had a strong post and two guns.

I here directed Colonel Tudor to form a storming party of 150 of his own men and 100 of the Madras Fusiliers, which the Lieutenant Colonel led. At the signal given they crossed the moat through mud and water, and most gallantly stormed the Enemy's post. We were now masters of their position.

Our own guns were actively employed under Captain Mallock at the spot from which we first commenced our move, and after some time they were brought up, over almost impassable ground, nearly to the spot where we effected our entrance into the Enemy's position, and they were protected by the Grenadiers of the 5th Madras Native Infantry under Captain Wyndham.

After resting the troops for some time, and collecting the wounded men, we again advanced by an excellent path in the direction of the large Pagoda. We suffered no molestation from the Enemy, but on approaching the Pagoda, I formed a party for its attack, under Major Hill, of the Madras Fusiliers, consisting of 100 of his own Regiment, with a similar number of the Bengal Fusiliers. They advanced up to the steps of the Pagoda, and on ascending received a fire of musquetry, which they soon silenced, and took possession of the place at about one o'clock P. M.

The fatigues of the day were now over, and I am certain that while they lasted no soldiers ever met with more arduous ones, nor ever met the obstacles of such an advance with more cheerful and steady perseverance than did this little band of brave and determined men.

The Enemy by the least computation could not number less than 5,000 men, evidently headed by people of consideration, by the numerous mounted people as well as elephants, which were seen retiring by the road to Sitang.

Our loss is not nearly what I apprehended in the morning it might have been, and considering the difficulties of the ground and exposure to the Enemy, I congratulate myself that it is so small.

I have now to ask the Governor General in Council's consideration of the services performed on this expedition by the Officers and men engaged.

To Brigadier McNeill, who formed up the force in the morning as it disembarked, and whose indefatigable exertions during the day brought on an exhaustion which occasioned me much distress to witness and which deprived me of his valuable assistance for a short time.

To Lieutenant Colonel Tudor, of the Bengal Fusiliers, who led the storming party and carried the Enemy's position.

To Major Hill, of the Madras Fusiliers, who led the party which carried the Pagoda.

To Major Shubrick, of the 5th Madras Native Infantry, whose position in the *Butinck*, which was considerably in advance of the rest of the Flotilla, called forth his greatest vigilance to protect his people from the Enemy, who were around him, as also for his exertions during the day.

To Captain Mallock, for his exertions with the Guns.

To Captain Brown, who commanded the Rifle Company of the 5th Madras Native Infantry, who covered our advance, and whose conduct I witnessed with much pleasure during the day.

I feel most particularly indebted to the attention and devotion paid to the sick and wounded by the Medical Officers who accompanied the force.

The Brigadier has brought to my notice Captain Renaud, his Brigade Major, whose services he highly appreciates.

To Captain Latter, whose distinguished gallantry on this as on all occasions has been conspicuous, as also his local information and active assistance, I beg to call your Lordship's particular attention.

To Commander Shadwell, who had charge of the naval part of this Expedition. I am deeply indebted for the most unremitting exertions by night and day, and for the disembarkation of the Troops, which was conducted as quietly as expeditiously. Neither the Steamers nor the boats could get up to the Enemy's defences, owing to the shallowness of the River.

Captain Shadwell personally accompanied me throughout the day.

Will your Lordship permit me to introduce to your notice Commander Beauchamp Seymour, of the Royal Navy, who is here on a visit to many friends, who accompanied me during the day, and whose conduct was conspicuous on every occasion.

To Major Mayhew, Deputy Adjutant General; Major Boulderson, Deputy Judge Advocate General; Captain Hamilton, Deputy Assistant Adjutant General; Captain Darroch, Deputy Assistant Quarter Master General; Captain Burne, Military Secretary, and Captain Chads, Aid-de-Camp; the General and my personal staff, whose duties were most arduous, being carried on on foot, and whose exertions to keep up the communication with the force in this broken ground were incessant, I beg to call your Lordship's attention.

I leave a garrison of 400 men, 200 of the Madras Fusiliers and 200 of the 5th Madras Native Infantry with two 24-Pounder Howitzers and a detail of Artillery with 40 Sappers, which the upper terrace of the Pagoda will hold most commodiously, including the Magazine and stores. This party will be under the command of Major Hill, of the Madras Fusiliers, a most excellent officer.

Lieutenant Campbell, of the Bengal Engineers, will see to its necessary defences.

Eight guns were taken and it is supposed that more will be found.

I purpose leaving this for Rangoon to-morrow morning.

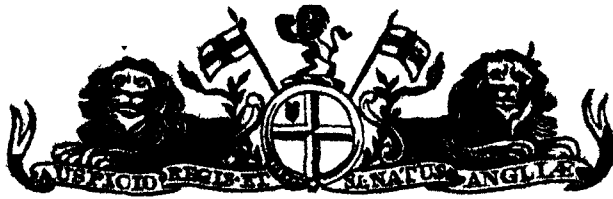

SIR,

I have the honor to acquaint you that having had under review the duties and responsibilities of Regimental Pay Masters and the security furnished by them to the Crown, as prescribed in the War Office Explanatory Directions, I deem it right to call your attention to the established principle that the Pay Master, in the proper line of his duty as such, is not more liable than any other Regimental Officer to take any charge or management of any Funds which are purely regimental, and placed by regulation wholly under the control and responsibility of the Commanding Officer, and consequently that the Pay Master's security to the Crown cannot be made available to meet any deficiency occurring in any such Fund when entrusted to his care.

Such being the case, I further consider it right to urge on your attention, as an indispensable rule, that whenever the Pay Master does take charge of any such funds, or of any monies whatever other than those which, in his capacity as Pay Master, he is bound to administer, his accounts of such funds or monies must be kept perfectly distinct and separate from the accounts of money which passes into his hands as a public accountant, and that he must not be suffered to mingle in the same accounts any entries of private or purely regimental transactions with the entries of his receipts and expenditure for the public.

In stating to you this rule, I have to request that you will take care that it shall be invariably followed in the Regiment under your command.

NOTIFICATION.—By Section IX., Act XVII. of 1835 of the Government of India, it was enacted that thenceforward no Gold Coin should be a legal tender of payment in any of the Territories of the East India Company, and accordingly Gold ceased from the date of the passing of the Act to be a legal tender of payment in the Company's Territories in India.

But by a Proclamation issued on the 13th January 1841, Officers in charge of Public Treasuries were authorized freely to receive Gold Coins struck in conformity with the Provisions of the same Act XVII. of 1835, at the rates indicated by the denomination of the pieces, until they should have passed certain limits of lightness set forth in a table published with the Proclamation, or until further orders, and Gold Coins have been thus received in liquidation of public demands up to the present date.

Notice is now given, that so much of the Proclamation of the 13th January 1841, as authorized the receipt of Gold Coins into the public Treasuries of Government, will be withdrawn and cancelled from the 1st January 1853, and that on and after that date, no Gold Coin will be received on account of payments due, or in any way to be made to the Government in any Public Treasury within the Territories of the East India Company.

Gold will continue as heretofore to be received into any of the Mints within the Territories of the East India Company for coinage, under the Act and Rules at present in force for the coinage of Gold, but Mint Certificates for Gold Coins

will be discharged in Gold only, and no such Certificate for Gold will be accepted in any Public Treasury in liquidation of public demands, or on account of any payment to the Government whatever.

Bird Islands.—The Bird Islands, situated in the Eastern extremity of Algoa Bay, lie off Woody Cape, which is, as its name imports, covered with wood, except a small patch of sand at its summit, and is the only sea-board land that is so, which gives it, in contrast with that for miles on either side, a dark appearance; the land on its West side, from near St. Croix up, rises into small numerous sandy hillocks, quite bare of vegetation, and that to the Eastward up to Padrone Point is similarly bare.

Woody Cape.—Is high, rugged, and not prominent, scarcely determinable as a cape, except when very near it; not so Padrone Point, which runs out into a low point of sand, forming a determinable cape, without vegetation, from which breakers run out some distance, and the water breaks still further out at times, owing to the meeting of currents there, and after strong winds.

Anchorage off, and Dangers near, Bird Islands.—The innermost danger from these Islands is fully five miles from Woody Cape, and they afford tolerable shelter behind them in winds from W. to S.S.E. in 13 fathoms, and rather better than half a mile from the Northernmost breakers; closer would afford more shelter, but the ground is foul. They are very low and proportionally dangerous, and though the main-land will generally be seen, before them, and the distance from them may be estimated by it, yet this is not entirely to be relied on; so, in shaping a course to go outside of them, allowance should be made for the fact that the eddy, or return current, sets in towards them, and then to the Eastward.

Doddington.—The Doddington and Western Reef should be considered as part of the Bird Island Reef, and no vessel should go between them; the water does not always break on them, but in bad weather the

breakers extend the whole way from them to the Islands; the Doddington lies about 11 miles from Woody Cape. In clear weather the rugged topped mountain and the Cockscomb may be seen from these Islands, or rather from abreast of them for the latter would be shut in when on them; but in passing outside the Doddington, it should be kept open to the West of the rugged-topped mountain, bearing about N. W., and the ship should steer N. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. Having passed the Doddington, the high land at the back of Port Elizabeth will soon appear right-a-head.

Erroneous Statements.—There are many statements current about breakers being seen from time to time in different parts of Algon Bay; but I believe others than those laid down in the Chart, now transmitted, not to have any existence, and that that which has been mistaken for such has been the effect of mirage."

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 22nd December 1852.

ACT No. — OF 1852.

An Act for the apprehension of Persons for offences committed out of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, and for delivering them up to Justice, and to provide for the execution of warrants in places out of the jurisdiction of the authorities issuing them.

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the apprehension and delivery up to justice for offences committed in any part of the dominions of Her Majesty, or for heinous offences committed in the territories of any Foreign Prince or State, of persons who may take refuge in any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, and to enable the Government of any Presidency or place within such last mentioned territories to carry out treaties entered into by or on behalf of Her Majesty, or the East India Company with any Foreign Prince or State; It is enacted as follows:—

I. If requisition be made by the person or persons for the time being, administering the executive Government of any part of the dominions of Her Majesty, to the Government of any part of the British territories in India to deliver up to justice any person accused of having committed any offence in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, subject to the Government making the requisition, against the laws thereof, and who shall be, or shall be supposed to be, in any part of the British territories in India, subject to the Government to which the requisition shall be made, or if a similar requisition be made by any Foreign Prince or State, or any Minister or Officer thereof in respect of a person accused of having committed a heinous offence in any part of the territories of such Foreign Prince or State, it shall be lawful for the Government to which the requisition shall be made to issue an order in writing for the apprehension of the person accused.

II. The order shall be signed by one of the Secretaries to the Government, it shall be directed to all Magistrates and Justices of the Peace

of the Presidency or place under the control of such Government, it shall signify that the requisition has been made, shall state the nature of the offence charged, the name or other designation, if the name be not known, of the person accused, and any other description of him that may be thought necessary, and it shall require the Magistrates and Justices to whom it shall be directed to aid in the apprehension of the person accused, and to proceed in pursuance of this Act.

III. Upon the production of the order to any such Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, and also upon the production of a warrant issued by an Officer having competent authority in that behalf in the territories in which the offence shall be alleged to have been committed, for the arrest of the person accused for the same offence, and upon proof that such warrant or document would in such last mentioned territories, justify the arrest or holding to bail of the person accused for the offence charged, such Magistrate or Justice of the Peace shall examine into the truth of the charge, and for that purpose shall have the same powers as if the offence had been committed within his jurisdiction.

IV. If the evidence adduced shall in the judgment of the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace be sufficient to justify the apprehension of the person accused for the offence, the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace shall issue his warrant for the apprehension of such person. The warrant shall be issued in the same manner as a warrant for an offence cognizable by the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace issuing it, and shall contain a memorandum, stating the place in which the offence shall be charged to have been committed, and that the warrant is issued under this Act, and if issued in pursuance of an order of Government, shall also state the fact and specify the Government. The memorandum may be to the following effect:

This warrant is issued under Act No. _____ of _____, for the within mentioned crime of _____ alleged to have been committed at _____ in _____ and is issued by order of the Government of _____

V. The warrant of any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction in any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company for the arrest of any person

charged with having committed any offence whatever, may be executed within the jurisdiction of any other Magistrate or Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction in any other part of the said territories, whether in the same Presidency or not, upon having a written authority under the hand and seal of the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, within whose jurisdiction it may be executed, previously indorsed thereon, and which indorsement may be to the following effect:

To the Nazir [or other Officer as the case may be] of the zillah of

“This warrant may be executed in the zillah or district of _____” [describing the zillah or district of the indorsing Magistrate or Justice of the Peace] by any of the Officers to whom the same is directed or by _____ [describing by his name of Office the Officer, to whom a similar warrant, issued by the indorsing Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, would be directed.]

VI. The Magistrate indorsing a warrant issued under the hand or official seal of any such other Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, shall not be liable to any action or other proceeding in consequence of any illegality in the issuing of the warrant; but any Magistrate illegally or improperly issuing the same, shall be liable for an arrest in pursuance of the indorsement in the same manner and to the same extent only as if the warrant had been executed within his own jurisdiction.

VII. Upon the apprehension of the supposed offender, if the offence be alleged to have been committed in any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, he shall be carried before the Magistrate within whose jurisdiction the offence shall be alleged to have been committed, and shall be by him dealt with according to law, unless by the warrant the Officer be authorized to take bail or security, and such bail or security be given for the appearance of the person accused before the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace of the zillah or district in which the offence shall be alleged to have been committed. If the offence be charged to have been committed in any place not within the territories under the Government of the East India Company, the person arrested shall be forthwith carried before a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, of the zillah or district in which he may be arrested. The Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, before whom the supposed offender shall be carried in pursuance of the last mentioned directions, may proceed in the same manner as in cases in which he has power to commit for trial, or to hold to bail for an offence committed within his own jurisdiction. If the evidence adduced shall be sufficient in his judgment to warrant a committal, he shall commit the accused to some place of confinement within his zillah or district, which in the judgment of the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, shall be fit for receiving the prisoner, or if there be no fit place, to the gaol of the Presidency, there to remain until he shall be delivered up pursuant to the requisition, or shall be discharged by orders of Government. If no sufficient evidence be adduced to warrant either the committal or the holding to bail of the prisoner, he shall be discharged.

VIII. If the offence charged shall be one committed out of the British territories in India which, if committed within the jurisdiction of the Magistrate, would be bailable, the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace may discharge the prisoner

upon his giving the necessary bail. The recognizance or bail-bond in such case shall be for the appearance of the accused before the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace on a certain day to be named therein, allowing reasonable time for receiving the orders of Government, and on such subsequent days as the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace shall from time to time appoint.

IX. If any person shall in pursuance of this Act be carried before a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace other than the one who may have issued the warrant, or a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace of the same zillah or district, the depositions and documents upon which the warrant shall have been issued, or copies thereof, to be certified under the hand and seal of the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace of the zillah or district in which the warrant was issued, shall be sent to the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace before whom such person shall be carried; and if the warrant shall be issued under an order of Government, and executed in a different Presidency or place to that under the Government issuing the order, notice of the arrest shall be forthwith communicated to such Government, who shall forward the requisition, and any documents upon which they may have acted in making the order to the Government to which the place where the arrest may be made shall be subject.

X. If the accused shall be proved to have been convicted and sentenced for the offence by a Court of competent jurisdiction in the territories in which the same may be alleged to have been committed, and to have escaped before the execution of such sentence, the Magistrate, upon proof of such conviction and sentence, and of a warrant or authority issued in such territories for the commitment or apprehension of the person accused in pursuance of the conviction and sentence, and upon proof that such conviction, sentence and warrant or authority would justify the apprehension of such person in the territories last aforesaid, may issue a warrant for his apprehension, and he may be arrested and committed in manner aforesaid without further proof, unless the person accused shall prove that such conviction or sentence was improperly obtained, or that the same has been reversed or annulled.

XI. If it shall appear to the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, before whom any prisoner shall be carried under this Act for an offence alleged to have been committed in any territories not under the Government of the East India Company, that particular circumstances exist which render it advisable that the case should be investigated by the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace of a zillah or district nearer to such territories, he shall forthwith report the case and the particular circumstances to the Government, who shall either order such Magistrate or Justice of the Peace to proceed with the case himself, or to send the case to be investigated by the Magistrate or Justice of the Peace of any other district to be named. In the latter case the prisoner shall be sent, or if the offence be bailable shall give bail to appear before such last mentioned Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, who shall have power to deal with the case as if he had issued the warrant under which the prisoner shall be arrested, and all the depositions and documents shall be forwarded to such Magistrate or Justice of the Peace. The order of Government shall be a sufficient justification for all persons acting in pursuance thereof.

XII. The Government making the order for apprehension for an offence alleged to have been committed in the territories of a Foreign Prince or State, may, if they think fit, direct that copies of the depositions, and of any exhibits upon which the original warrant or document was issued, certified under the hand of the Officer issuing such warrant, and to be proved by the person producing the same to be true copies, may be received in evidence of the criminality of the person accused. Under an order for the arrest of any person for an offence alleged to have been committed in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, copies of such documents and exhibits, certified as aforesaid, may be admitted as evidence in manner aforesaid without an order of Government and without further proof.

XIII. The Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, after committing the accused or holding him to bail as aforesaid, for any offence committed out of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, shall forthwith report the result of his proceedings to the Government to which he is subordinate, together with any remarks which he may deem necessary or proper to make upon the whole case. He shall also forward with such report a copy of all depositions which shall be taken or used before him, and of all documents referred to by such depositions, or used before him.

XIV. Upon receipt of the report, and after examining the case, the Government may, by order in writing to be signed by the Secretary to the Government, order the accused either to be discharged or to be held to bail to appear in such Court or place and at such time or times as the Government may think fit, or to be delivered up to the person authorized by the Government or Officer making the requisition, to receive and take charge of him, and the name of such person shall be specified in the order of Government. In cases falling within Act I. 1849, the Government may order the person accused to be tried under that Act.

XV. If ordered to be delivered up, the person to whom the accused may be ordered to be delivered shall not have the custody or charge of him so long as he shall remain in any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, but the accused shall be conveyed in custody through such last mentioned territories towards the territories in which the offence shall be alleged to have been committed, in the same manner as a prisoner sent from the station of one district to that of another, and as soon as he shall have been conveyed to the frontiers of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, he shall be delivered over to the person in that behalf appointed by the order of Government. If such person shall not attend to receive the prisoner, the latter shall be discharged out of custody.

XVI. Any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, acting under the provisions of this Act, shall issue all necessary warrants, orders and directions for carrying the same, and also any order made under it by the Government, into effect under his signature and seal, or seal of office, if he shall have a seal of office, and all Magistrates and Officers acting in pursuance of this Act, shall have and exercise the same powers as if the offence charged had been committed within the zillah or district subject to their jurisdiction, and in cases where the accused may have been held to bail,

the Magistrate may order the bail-bond to be renewed in such form as may be necessary to carry any order of Government into effect, and if such bail-bond shall not be renewed accordingly, may commit him to prison for such period as may be necessary to carry such order into effect.

XVII. In case any person arrested under this Act, shall escape out of any custody, he may be re-taken in any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, in the same manner as if he had escaped from custody under process for an offence committed in that part of such last mentioned territories.

XVIII. The Government may, if they think fit, previously to making an order under this Act, require some person to be named as the prosecutor of the accused, and to give security that such person, if delivered up, shall be brought to trial with as little delay as possible, and if acquitted upon such trial, shall, if he require it, be provided with the means of returning to the place where he was apprehended, or as near thereto as he may desire free of expense, and in a manner suitable to his station of life.

XIX. If a warrant shall have been issued in any part of Her Majesty's dominions for the arrest of any person for an offence alleged to have been committed therein, or for the arrest of any person for any offence whatever of which he may have been convicted in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, by a Court of competent jurisdiction, any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace within the territories under the Government of the East India Company, may, upon the production of such warrant or document and proof of the signature of the Officer signing it, and of his authority to issue the same, proceed to cause the person accused to be apprehended and committed, or held to bail, in manner aforesaid, as the case may require, without an order of Government, but if the offence shall be alleged to have been committed in any place not within the British territories in India, the person accused shall not be delivered over as aforesaid without such order.

XX. In cases also of necessity in which the immediate apprehension of any person accused of having committed a heinous offence as defined in Section XXII. in any of the territories mentioned in Section I. of this Act, may be necessary for the ends of justice, the person accused may be apprehended in the same manner as if the offence had been committed in the place where the person accused may be found, and after his apprehension may be committed or held to bail in manner aforesaid, as the case may require, without an order of Government, but he shall not be delivered up without such order.

XXI. If any person imprisoned under this Act shall not either be conveyed out of the Presidency or place in which he shall have been arrested, or be discharged or brought to trial within two calendar months after his committal over and above the time required to convey him from the place to which he was committed for confinement by the readiest way to the place where the offence shall be alleged to have been committed, it shall be lawful for the principal court of original jurisdiction in criminal cases in the district in which he shall be imprisoned, upon application by or on behalf of the prisoner, and upon proof that notice of the intention to make the application has been given to the Government, having authority in the place where the prisoner shall be detained, or to

the Secretary of such Government, to order the person so committed to be discharged out of custody, either upon giving such bail as the Court may order, or without bail, unless sufficient cause shall be shown to such Court why such discharge ought not to be ordered.

XXII. The offences intended by the words "heinous offence" in this Act, are treason, murder, attempting to murder, rape or other great personal violence, maiming, dacoity, thuggee, robbery, burglary, breaking and entering a dwelling-house, and stealing therein, arson, setting fire to a village, house, or town, forgery or uttering forged documents, counterfeiting current coin, knowingly uttering base coin, perjury, subornation of perjury, embezzlement, whether by public officers or other persons.

XXIII. The said words "heinous offence" shall also be deemed to include cattle stealing and any offence, for which by any treaty in force between Her Majesty or the East India Company, and any foreign Prince or State, Her Majesty or the East India Company, shall, at the time of making any requisition as aforesaid, be bound to deliver up offenders to the foreign Prince or State making the same, and any other offence which in the judgment of the Government to whom the requisition shall be made, shall be of an aggravated nature, or for which the person accused cannot be punished within the territories under the Government of the East India Company.

XXIV. If by any such treaty, Her Majesty or the East India Company shall be bound to deliver up to any foreign Prince or State, any person liable to be proceeded against by the laws of such foreign Prince or State, in any case not expressly provided for by this Act, or in any manner other than that provided by this Act, it shall be lawful for the Government of any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, in which such person may be found, upon requisition made by or on the part of such foreign Prince or State, to adopt such proceedings for carrying such treaty into effect, and for the surrender of such person, and for making any preliminary inquiry into the charge contained in the requisition, as they may think fit, and any order of the Government in writing under the hand of one of the Secretaries of such Government, shall be a sufficient authority and justification for all acts to be done in execution thereof.

XXV. Sections V., VI. and VII., Regulation XI. 1827, of the Bombay Code, are repealed.

XXVI. The words "the Government," as used in this Act, means the Governor or Governor in Council, or other person or persons administering the executive Government. The words "British territories in India" shall include any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company. The word "Magistrate," as used in this Act, is intended to include a Joint Magistrate, or any person lawfully exercising the powers of a Magistrate. Words in the singular number, are intended to include the plural, and words in the masculine gender to include the feminine.

GENTLEMEN,—I have great pleasure in forwarding copy of a letter from the Brigadier General Commanding this Division to Army Head Quarters, which will, I am sure, interest the Board. It reports the landing from the "Duke of Argyle," of the first batch of Recruits which have made the passage direct from London to Kurrachee. The majority are intended for the Punjaub.

2. The vessel made the passage in 100 days, without difficulty or disaster of any kind. Munora Point was the first land she sighted after leaving the Channel, and the Captain is stated to have been surprised at the ease with which he accomplished a voyage which had been spoken of as beset with all sorts of hazards, known and unknown. The vessel came inside the Harbour at high water on the 19th, which, as she is 800 tons register, old measurement, and drew 16 feet 9 inches, as she crossed the bar on the day preceding the lowest neap tides, is satisfactory evidence that, even in its present state, the port is not closed to vessels of considerable burden.

MEMORANDUM.—The Ship "Duke of Argyle," of 800 tons burden, left England with troops in the month of July last. She was bound direct for Kurrachee. The passage was made in 100 days. The Ship anchored in the Harbour on the 18th October, on the afternoon of which the troops were landed on the Bunder in good health and condition.

This being the first voyage of a vessel of this character direct to the port from the mother country, it may not be out of place to mention the Captain's opinion regarding the Harbour of Kurrachee, and the facility with which it is made, points which are not perhaps so generally known as they should be. His report is annexed, and from it I take the liberty of making a summary.

The land about Cape Mouze being high, it is easily made and readily distinguished. The Light House at the entrance of the Harbour is situated on a high bluff point. The light is visible at 20 miles in clear weather.

On the bar there is 21 feet water in the springs, within, it deepens to 7 fathoms. The Harbour is perfectly safe, being land-locked with water quite smooth. Its capacity is equal to the accommodation of at least twenty ships of 800 tons.

To the above I might add, that any number of coasting craft might at the same time find safe anchorage.

With such an example before us of the facility of direct communication with England, and the saving of time, of money, and of life, in adopting it in preference to the routes *vid* Calcutta or Bombay, for the transport of troops and stores to the Punjaub and North-West Provinces, I think it my duty as a public servant to bring the fact to prominent notice.

MEMORANDUM.—A ship, after having arrived in Lat. 20 N. and Long. 63 or 64 East, should steer a direct course for Cape Mouze, which is easily distinguished by the island of Culney, distant from Cape Mouze about three miles; it is of a cone-like shape and bluish color. Cape Mouze is high land, being a continuation of the range of Hills to the Northward of Kurrachee, and terminates in a low point. The land from Cape Mouze to Kurrachee, distant 15 miles

East, has a rugged, burnt, sandy appearance. There is a high bluff point at the entrance of the Harbour, called Munora, on which the Light House is placed, showing a bright light visible about 20 miles in clear weather, to the left of which are several white tents and bungalows, the outer anchorage is due South of the Light House distant 3 miles, in 7 fathoms water. To the Eastward of the Light House about 2½ miles are three large, and four small islands, which at a distance very much resemble coasting vessels under sail. The entrance over the bar being between these islands and the Light House.

On the bar there is at high water springs 21 feet, when across there are 7 fathoms. I consider the harbour perfectly safe, being land-locked, and the water quite smooth in any weather and would contain at least 20 ships of 800 tons or upwards. I consider the port is easily made. I make the Light House in Lat. 24° 48' N. Long 67° 24' 45" East, Var. 2 Westerly.

THE Most Noble the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that the following Proclamation, whereby the Province of Pegu has been declared to be a portion of the British Territories in the East, shall be published for general information.

His Lordship in Council directs that in honor of this event, a Royal Salute shall be fired at every principal Station of the Army in the several Presidencies of India.

PROCLAMATION.

THE COURT OF AVA having refused to make amends for the injuries and insults which British subjects had suffered at the hands of its servants, the Governor General of India in Council resolved to exact reparation by force of arms.

The Forts and Cities upon the Coast were forthwith attacked and captured; the Burman forces have been dispersed wherever they have been met; and the Province of PEGU is now in the occupation of British Troops.

The just and moderate demands of the Government of India have been rejected by the King; the ample opportunity that has been afforded him for repairing the injury that was done, has been disregarded; and the timely submission which alone could have been effectual to prevent the dismemberment of his Kingdom, is still withheld.

Wherefore, in compensation for the past, and for better security in the future, the Governor General in Council has resolved, and hereby Proclaims, that the Province of PEGU is now, and shall be henceforth, a portion of the British Territories in the East.

Such Burman Troops as may still remain within the Province shall be driven out; Civil Government shall immediately be established; and Officers shall be appointed to administer the affairs of the several Districts.

The Governor General in Council hereby calls on the Inhabitants of PEGU to submit themselves to the authority, and to confide securely in the protection of the British Government; whose power they have seen to be irresistible, and whose rule is marked by justice and beneficence.

The Governor General in Council, having exacted the reparation he deems sufficient, desires no further conquest in Burmah, and is willing to consent that hostilities should cease.

But if the King of Ava shall fail to renew his former relations of friendship with the British Government; and if he shall recklessly seek to dispute its quiet possession of the Province it has now declared to be its own; the Governor General in Council will again put forth the power he holds, and will visit with full retribution aggressions which, if they be persisted in, must of necessity lead to the total subversion of the Burman State, and to the ruin and exile of the King and his race.
