Freparat o s for Advance on the Chinese Capital Being Hurried Forward

London, Aug. 1.-The allies now cor front a new difficult and dangerous problem. Without doubt the ministers at Pekin are held by the Chinese as hostages, and the outcome of the advance on Pekin, which in all probability has begun, will be awaited with anxiety. To-day's dispatches, shows that the allies, notably the Japanese, have been

To-day's dispatches shows that the allies, notably the Japanese, have been pushing their preparations with feverish haste, organizing a transport service of pack animals, carts, trains and junks. It is reported from Beelin that Lieut. Gen, von Lessel, commanding the German forces in China, whom the Emperor William has just promoted to the rank of general commanding an army corps, has been selected as commander-in-chief of the allied forces.

The Chinese are strongly entrenched at Wang Tsun, from which position, however, it is believed they can be ejected without great difficulty. The danger is that, if defeated there, the Chinese will retire on Pekin and put the remainder of the Europeans to death. It is also possible that the advance of the allies will be the signal for the Chinese anthorities to compel all foreigners to quit the capital, in which event they will become the prey of the Boxers.

The feeling of the newspapers here is that nothing whatever should now delay the advances and no negotiations of any kind should be countenanced until the allied troops reach Pekin and assure themselves regarding the fate of the foreigners.

London, Aug 1. Important additional confirmation of the safety of the legations was received in London last evening by Duncan Campbell, representative in Europe of the Chinese customs service, from the commissioner of customs at Chee, Foo. in the shape of a Pekindisparch not dated, but believed to have disparent flot dated, but believed to have been written on July 21st, to the follow-ing effect: "Staff and family still safe," signed by both Sir Robt. Hart, inspector-general of customs, and Mr. Robt. Bre-don, deputy inspector-general. This has seen confirmed by the commissioners of customs in Shanghai, who telegraphed ast evening: "Authentic, inspector-gen-ral. Safe twenty-second."

Earl Li's Negotiations.

London, Aug. 1.—It is reported from an unofficial but usually reliable source that the Chinese minister at St. Peters-burg wired to Li Hung Chang intimating burg wired to Li Hung Chang intimating the possibility of obtaining favorable terms of settlement from Russia if China would adopt a conciliatory attitude and compel a cessation of the attacks on the legation. Thereupon, according to this latormation, Li Hung Chang memorialized the throne, representing that he was ill and unable to come to Pekin, but urking every endeavor be made to send the ministers to Tien Tsin and to ensure the safety of the foreigners and mission-arics.

We are Always at Our Post.

By the beginning of next year the Nile dam will be so far on its way towards completion that its engineers will be able to speak confidently of the date of the laying of the coping stone. The Nile dam is really not one dam, but two. The apper dam is at Assouan; where the first cataract, with its score of islands, first breaks the smooth eurrent of the Nile; and is the great work, both from an economic and engineering point of view. When it is finished nature's surface on the Egyptian frontier will be so far rearranged that the river above the dam will be turned into a pond of a hundred and forty miles long, crossing the Tropic of Cancer and extending southward nearly to Korosko. In the heart of the African desert will be created a lake having from two to three times the superficial area of the Lake of Geneva; and the whole mass of this impounded water—it may interest arithmeticians to know that it will amount in certain seasons of the year to two hundred and fifty billion gallons—will be controlled with scientific precision and turned into distant channels at will. Subsidiary to the great Assouan dam, a smaller one, not unlike the harrage above Cairo, is being made at Assouan. The function of this smaller daw will be to give a sufficient head to the river to force the water into the system of irrigation canals that vein hundreds of thousands of acres between Assouan and Cairo. At is, the upper and bigger works at Assouan which appeal most to the imagination. FAMOUS FASTS.

A man has recently completed a thirty five days

A man has recently completed a thirty-five days' fast simply for the sake of his health. He sought neither gain nor not retry, and during the continuance of his absention-from food quietly attended to his business.

Dr. Tanner was the pioneer of professional fasters. He began his remarkable fast on July 28th, 1880, at the Clarendon Hall, New York. He abstained until August 7th, having reduced his weight to 8st, 9lb., and broke his fast on 2 peach and a glass of milk.

The feat above-mentioned was outdone by Succi, who at the Royal Auguarium, fasted for 45 days. He subsequently repeated the feat at Nester and Bials' music hall in New York. At the end of the fast a large audience assembled to see him each his first meal.

Although in his enfeebled state it must have been the most exquisite torture, he made efforts to get through a quantity of food and so give the public a show for their money.

Subsequently, Succi was challenged by a Frenchman called Jacques, an old solier, to show his endurance by fasting against him. According to Jacques' was to take the gate money. The challenge was curiously bombastic. "I, child of France," wrote Jacques, "defy the blatant Italian. Accept my challenge and starve with me, or be known for evera as a braggart salling under false colors." But a still more wonderful feat of abstinence, was performed by a French murderer named Granie, who though to starve himself to deeth and thus escape the guillotine. For 63 days he went without food in spite of the efforts of the warders, who cooked dishes of delicious food and placed them smoking in his cell. Such was the will of the man, however, that he shut, his cyc, chenched his feeth, and with an effort conquered his craving. An attempt 1, feet him by force was abandoned owing to his violence. At the end of 63 days he died. He had only taken a few plates.
