Portuguese Steamship Mossamedes Found Abandoned and Aground at Cape Frio, Southwest Africa; No CHIP AGRICULTURE Trace Yet of Passengers and Crew; No Landing Places Nearby.

London, April 26.—A Reuter dispatch from Cape Town says the Portuguese mail steamship Mossamedes, which grounded several days ago at Cape Frio, Southwest Africa, has been found abandoned, with no sign of the 237 passengers she carried. Thus far, the dispatch adds, no boats have been picked up and there is the fact that no indication of the passengers and crew. Owing to the fact that there are no landing places in the neighborhood of Cape Frio and that a heavy sea is running to day, grave anxiety is felt for the safety of the boats. The Mossamedes' passengers included twenty-nine women and twenty-five children, two of them being British and the rest Portuguese

**Communications Along West** River Interrupted

Hongkong, April 26. - Retreating Kwangsi forces have turned on their constitutionalist pursuers, and the latter, supporting Sun Yat Sen, have suffered their first defeat in the new civil war raging in South China, ac-cording to advices received here to-

day.

The disorganized Kwangsi army, falling back up the North River, was reinforced by troops sent from Shiukwan, headquarters of General Sum Hung Ying, one of the leaders of the coalition opposing Sun Yat Sen. The constitutionalist advance was checked and fighting is in progress above Sun Kwai.

Montreal, April 26.—The striking miners at the Thetford Asbestos Mines have raided all the hardware stores in the district and supplied themselves with arms and have seized quantities of dynamite, with which they threaten to blow up public buildings and the company's property, it was stated this morning by W. G. Ross, president of the Asbestos Corporation of Canada. In view of the serious outlook the company has applied to Premier Taschereau, as Attorney-General of Quebec, to take the necessary steps to give adequate protection to the company's property as well—as the public property and lives of individuals in the Thetford Mines district.

The ejectment of forty special constables from the offices of the Asbestos Corporation by a mob of 1,500 miners late last night and the second forced departure from the town of Lieut-Colonel Macnut, general manager of the corporation, are the outstanding developments of the tumiltuous situation here. The constables, who had been sent from Montreal following the first ejectment of Colonel Macnut from the town, were forced to capitulate to the first mob and leave for Sherbrooke after they had been attacked with stones and a fire hose and had fired blank cartridge over the heads of the insurgent miners.

# **COLORFUL SCENES IN LONDON TO-DAY WHEN DUKE OF YORK WED**

King and Queen, Prince of Wales, Leading Figures In Britain and Personages of Other Lands In Abbey During Ceremony To-day; Throngs In Streets Gave Duke and Duchess an Ovation.

London, April 26.-Prince Albert, Duke of York, was united in marriage with Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon in Westminster Abbey at noon to-day with a pomp and panoply reminiscent of the spacious days of the Mid-Victorian Era and amid the tumultuous demonstrations of the vast throngs that had gathered under threatening skies to witness the wedding pageant.

As the cortege entered the abbey a slight drizzle of rain fell, but soon afterward the sun broke through the clouds and as the royal pair made their exit they were greeted with brilliant sun-shine, recalling the old saying: "Happy is the bride the sun shines on.

It was the second time in a little more than a year that the British King and Queen gave one of their children in wedlock to a person outside the realm of royalty. While the marriage of

Seattle Interests Purchase Big Stretch Around Horne Lake

Vancouver, April 26.—One of the largest timber sales that the Canadian Pacific Railway has made in several months on Vancouver Island, has just heen completed. A group of Seattle lumbermen came into possession of 12,000 acres of timber land at Horne Lake. There are more than 200,000,000 feet of standing timber on the property, some of it of the very finest kind, in patches rivalling the well-known timber at Cameron Lake. The purchasers are acquiring other limits and it has not been decided whether to put up a mill on the

The purchasers are acquiring other limits and it has not been decided whether to put up a mill on the Island or to haul the logs to Seattle. It is likely that the latter course would be adopted.

Tide water on the cast side of the Island can be reached by a spur line about ten miles in length or the company may decided to connect with the E. & N. and ship logs over the railway down the coast to a favorable point for dumping into the water.

Horne Lake is about ten miles morth of Cameron Lake, and the Alberni branch of the Esquimait & Nanaimo Railway. Installation of a short railway spur would make it possible to ship logs from Horne Lake on the E. & N., and then to boom them at a convenient point for towing to Seattle.

Purchase of the Horne Lake timber is only one of many developments in the Island's lumber industry this year. The present boom in the lumber industry has led lumber interests to seek to exploit new stretches of timber, yet untouched by the logger's saw.




