#### NOTE

Section 119 of The Loan and Trust Corporations Act (R.S.O. 1927, Chapter 223) provides as follows:—

119.—(1) No corporation shall, under the penalty of becoming disentitled to registry or of having its registry suspended or cancelled, make, print, publish, circulate, authorize, or be a party or privy to the making, printing, publishing, or circulating of any statement or representation that its solvency or financial standing is vouched for by the Registrar or that the publication of its statement in his report is a warranty or representation of the solvency of the corporation, or of the truth or accuracy of such statement in any particular.



# DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE

To the Honourable Arthur W. Roebuck, K.C., M.P.P.,

Minister in Charge of the Department of Insurance.

Sir:-

I have the honour to submit herewith, as required by The Loan and Trust Corporations Act, the Thirty-ninth Annual Report of the Registrar of Loan Corporations. It shows the particulars of the business of each registered loan corporation, loaning land corporation, and trust company doing business in Ontario during 1935, as ascertained from its annual and other returns and from the inspection and enquiries made by the Chief Inspector and his staff. Detailed statements of the individual corporations are grouped herein in accordance with these three classifications recognized by the Act and are further arranged in alphabetical order. In addition, statistical tables, tabulated summaries and comparative statements are included as shown in the Table of Contents.

The annual returns of the corporations covering their 1935 business were filed with the Department at the end of February, 1936. Upon filing, each return was carefully checked and a preliminary Abstract of this Report showing assets, liabilities, revenue accounts, profit and loss accounts and mortgage summaries was prepared and issued under date of April 30th, 1936. The remaining months of the year were required to complete the annual inspection of the corporations, more particularly described later in this Report, and to determine exactly what changes and what miscellaneous notes, if any, should be made in the individual statements of the corporations as a result of such inspections. The publication of the Report at an earlier date is not feasible without a substantially augmented inspection staff.

Discrepancies may be observed between the figures shown in the statistical tables, etc., included on pages 250 to 293 and the figures shown in the statements of the individual corporations on pages 3 to 246. The latter figures include the changes

the Registrar deems necessary to be made upon a review of the Inspector's inspection reports — changes which have not been carried, by reason of the time and expense involved, into the former figures which are reprinted without change as they appeared in the preliminary Abstract of this Report published last April.

I have the following registry changes to report:

The Eastern Trust Company. The Eastern Trust Company, with Head Office in the City of Halifax in the province of Nova Scotia, was granted initial registry by certificate dated 1st November, 1936, to transact the business of a Trust Company in the province of Ontario.

The Industrial Mortgage and Trust Company — The Crown Savings and Loan Company. An agreement between these companies dated December 24th, 1935, ratified by shareholders of both companies on the 21st February, 1936, whereby the Assets and Liabilities of the loan corporation were taken over and assumed by the trust company as of December 31st, 1935, was approved by an Order-in-Council dated the 22nd April, 1936.

Niagara Falls Building, Savings and Loan Association—Reincorporation as a loan corporation from that of a Building Society was effected by a special Act of the legislature of the province of Ontario, being 1 Edward VIII, 1936, Chap. 77 which Act, having been approved and ratified by the shareholders present at a special general meeting called for such purpose on May 9th, 1936, became effective on July 1st, 1936, in accordance with the terms of the said Act.

# REVIEW OF 1935 BUSINESS

#### Introduction:

The Statistical Tables included herein have been used for comparative purposes in preparing the following review of 1935 operations.

# Loan Corporations:

Total assets of loan corporations amount to \$213,400,000. They show a decrease during the year 1935 of \$6,400,000 as compared with a decrease of \$3,000,000 in 1934 and \$5,400,000 in 1933. Assets of loan corporations have decreased steadily from a high of \$239,900,000 at December 31st, 1931. The current decrease is reflected in the debenture liability which has been reduced by the approximate amount of \$6,000,000. The inability of companies to renew debentures maturing in 1935 or sell new debentures can be attributed in part to the reduction in the rate of interest such companies were willing to pay. During the year 1935, one loan corporation relinquished its borrowing powers and redeemed approximately \$850,000 of its debentures.

Total debentures outstanding amount to \$107,700,000 of which \$80,607,000 is payable in Canada and \$27,093,000 elsewhere. As noted above, they show a decrease of approximately \$6,000,000. Trust deposits amounting to \$32,200,000 show an increase of \$800,000 over the year 1934.

During the year 1935 there was no change in the number of loan corporations registered and operating in the Province of Ontario as compared with the previous year.

# Trust Companies:

Total assets of trust companies (exclusive of those held for estates, trusts and agencies) resumed the downward trend which has been in evidence since 1930, the year 1934 excepted. In 1935, the decline amounted to \$2,400,000.00. Total assets held for company funds amounting to \$55,200,000 showed a decrease of \$600,000 or 1.08%, while total guaranteed fund assets amounting to \$130,700,000 decreased \$1,800,000 or 1.37%.

Company fund assets have declined steadily since 1930, the rate of decrease being considerably moderated in the last two years. The corresponding decline in the total of companies' reserve funds, contingency reserves, and profit and loss balances supplies an explanation. Obviously, asset values declined to such an extent as to require write-offs and the setting-up of individual investment reserves thereby absorbing all normal increase in surplus and reducing reserve funds, contingent reserves and profit and loss balances. The year 1935 was the exception, the decrease in assets in that year being offset by a reduction in paid-in capital stock.

Unlike company fund assets which declined steadily in the past five years, guaranteed fund assets after a drop from 147½ millions in 1930 to 129½ millions in 1932 have tended to increase gradually reaching a figure of 132½ millions in 1934 only to drop back to \$130,700,000 in 1935. This decrease in assets is a direct result of the companies' inability or unwillingness to maintain guaranteed investment certificates at their former level. The popularity of such investments has declined with the declining rate which companies were willing or able to pay on such funds. Quite the opposite is true of deposits. In this field, with the companies paying a higher rate of interest than the current bank rate, deposits have shown a steady increase from 35½ millions in 1930 to 47 millions in 1935, the latter figure being an increase of 2 millions over that of 1934. Conversely, guaranteed investment receipts declined 4 millions to \$83,200,000.

# Estates, Trusts and Agencies:

As in previous years, total assets under administration in this section have continued their upward trend, having increased \$48,000,000 in 1935 to a total of \$2,243,000,000. During the past fifteen years, assets in this section have risen from \$634,355,000 to \$2,243,000,000, or a total increase of approximately \$1,600,000,000 in that time.

# Mortgage Loans:

Mortgages held by loan corporations in Ontario and elsewhere amount to \$154,-450,000 while those held by trust companies amount to \$84,300,000. Interest due and unpaid on such mortgages amounts to \$6,900,000 and \$6,100,000, respectively. These figures for loan corporations represent a drop of \$4,450,000 in principal and an increase of \$358,000 in interest due and unpaid. Trust companies' holdings show a decrease in principal of \$420,000 in company funds and \$824,000 in guaranteed funds, and an

increase in interest due and unpaid of \$217,300 in company funds and \$633,500 in guaranteed funds.

The popularity of mortgages as an investment for loan and trust company funds has declined in recent years. This is directly due to the abnormal economic conditions prevailing, moratorium legislation, high taxes, and uncertain real estate values. All these factors have combined to create a general feeling of uncertainty in respect of mortgages and have hampered the carrying out of contracts between mortgagors and mortgages. In preference to mortgages, therefore, funds for investment have been diverted to other channels representing investment of a more liquid character. The latter class of investment has enabled the companies to meet demands for liquidation of debentures and guaranteed investment receipts and have ample funds available for any increase in withdrawals from savings accounts.

Under normal circumstances, repayments of principal, operating to reduce the total mortgage investments, are more than offset by new loans and renewals. Under the present conditions, accumulation of charges such as taxes, insurance, etc., paid by companies in protection of their investments together with the small number of new loans made, are more than offset by voluntary writing down of book values and transfers of foreclosed properties to real estate, and result in a net decrease in the mortgage assets of companies as a whole.

As stated above, the steady decrease in mortgage investments of loan and trust corporations continued during 1935. The decrease is equally noticeable in both Eastern and Western Canada, although as noted before, the curtailment of loans on real estate did not occur in Eastern Canada until 1932, while in Western Canada, the downward trend commenced as early as 1930. However, when economic conditions did begin to influence the Eastern mortgage situation, the effect was more rapid and severe than was experienced by Western loans earlier in the period of stress. During the past two years (1934 and 1935) the downward trend in Eastern Canada and the downward trend in Western Canada appear to be on a more comparable basis. Mortgages of loan and trust corporations secured by properties located in Eastern Canada decreased from \$160,300,000 to \$156,500,000, or a drop of 2.4%. Similarly, mortgages secured by properties located in Western Canada decreased by 2.6%, falling from \$84,400,000 to \$82,200,000. It is to be noted that these decreases are reflected in the increase in the amount of real estate held for sale by loan and trust corporations.

The accumulation of arrears of interest is a reliable indication of the condition of mortgages generally. Interest due and unpaid on Eastern loans increased \$109,000 or 3.6% to stand at the total of \$3,140,000. This latter figure represents 2% of the total principal of Eastern loans outstanding. Interest due and unpaid on Western loans increased from \$8,823,000 as at the end of 1934 to \$9,919,000 as at the end of 1935, or an increase of 12.4%. Such interest represents 12% of the total principal outstanding in respect of Western loans.

The following figures have been compiled by the Department from answers to questionnaires sent out in January of 1934, 1935 and 1936, to all loan and trust cor-

porations and life insurance companies transacting business in the province. The information was confined to experience on Ontario mortgages only. The figures show the amount of principal and interest, respectively, falling due in the calendar years 1933, 1934 and 1935, and the contrasting amounts which were actually paid in cash thereon during the same years.

These Ontario figures indicate in a general way the extreme difficulty mortgage lending institutions have experienced during the past few years. When it is realized that the above experience is probably much better than in most other provinces, particularly in the Western sections of Canada, the decline in mortgage investments is readily understandable.

# Office Premises:

Total investment in permanent housings for the operation of loan and trust corporations amounts to \$13,019,000 which shows a decline of \$265,000 due to customary write-downs in respect of depreciation.

# Real Estate Held for Sale:

Real estate holdings of loan corporations amounting to \$8,550,000 increased by \$1,850,000 in 1935, while trust companies' holdings amounting to \$7,150,000 showed an increase of \$450,000, making a total increase of \$2,300,000 in respect of both loan and trust corporations. This increase is \$200,000 greater than that reported for 1934. Excepting loaning land corporations, real estate is not permitted as a direct investment of loan corporations or trust companies and the amounts held under that heading largely represent foreclosed properties and sale agreements, including accumulated charges and interest. Companies have endeavoured to avoid foreclosure proceedings wherever possible and it is apparent that properties have been taken over only after interest has fallen greatly in arrears and other methods of maintaining the investment have failed. Loan corporations' (including loaning land corporations) holdings now represent 4.01 per cent. of total assets as against 3.06 per cent. a year ago, while trust companies' holdings represent 12.96 per cent. of total company fund assets compared with 12.02 per cent. at the end of 1934.

# Collateral Loans:

The total amount of collateral loans of lending institutions is extremely sensitive to current business conditions, increasing rapidly during the upswing of the business cycle and dropping precipitately during the early years of depression. Such collateral loans held by loan and trust corporations reached a peak of \$47,700,000 in 1928, but declined rapidly subsequent to that time, reaching a low point of \$22,300,000 in 1933. In 1934 a slight upswing was noticeable, loans as at December 31st amounting to \$23,-683,000. At the end of 1935, however, the total had again dropped to \$22,880,000. The latter figure is made up of loan corporations—\$429,000; company funds of trust companies—\$4,917,000; and guaranteed funds of trust companies—\$17,534,000. The net decrease from 1934 represents a decrease in guaranteed fund loans of trust companies of \$2,300,000 less an increase in loans of company funds of trust companies of \$1,500,000. Collateral loans of loan corporations remained stationary. Reference to the statistical tables in this Report show that the Montreal Trust Company and the Royal Trust Company carry substantially more than 75 per cent. of all collateral loans reported to the Department. Therefore, the fluctuation in the aggregate amount of collateral loans as reported from year to year has been chiefly affected by the increases and decreases reported by these companies.

# Bonds and Debentures:

Trustee securities, that is, issues of Canadian governments and municipalities, including school districts and rural telephone companies, held by loan corporations moved down \$2,200,000 from \$19,900,000 to \$17,700,000 and those of trust companies \$2,100,000 from \$35,300,000 to \$33,200,000. The decrease in these holdings is attributable to realization for purposes of meeting maturing debentures and guaranteed investment certificates, a large percentage of which were not renewed during the year. Liquidation of such securities has to some extent adversely affected the liquidity position of companies as indicated by the percentage of trustee securities to total deposits. During the past year, such percentage has declined from 71.99 to 67.15 per cent. Similarly, the percentage of total trustee investments to total guaranteed funds dropped from 80.24 per cent. to 79.78 per cent.

"Other Bonds" held by loan corporations decreased \$135,000 from \$3,660,000 to \$3,525,000. Such securities held in company funds of trust companies also show a slight decrease of \$50,000 from \$6,310,000 to \$6,260,000 but holdings of guaranteed

funds of trust companies increased \$1,200,000 to \$4,000,000. In all probability, the decline in mortgage investments with consequent shrinkage in earnings, has encouraged companies to invest in securities which, although of a less favourable type, have a rate of interest more comparable to that earned on mortgages.

# Stocks:

Stocks held by loan corporations amount to \$10,118,000, a negligible decrease of \$24,000 from 1934. Those held by trust companies in company funds dropped \$50,000 to \$4,150,000. Similar holdings in guaranteed funds of trust companies increased \$500,000 from \$2,100,000 in 1934 to \$2,600,000 in 1935.

# Cash:

Cash of loan corporations on hand and on deposit shows a decrease of \$985,000 to \$6,450,000. Company funds cash of trust companies decreased \$68,500 to \$1,353,000 and guaranteed funds cash increased \$407,000 to \$8,154,000. The net decrease of all companies reflects the substantial liquidation of debentures and guaranteed investment certificates during the year.

#### Other Assets:

All other assets of loan corporations amount to \$1,042,000, a decrease of \$70,000 from 1934. Company funds of trust companies show a decrease of \$465,000 to \$3,981,000. Conversely, such assets held in guaranteed funds of trust companies increased from \$940,000 to \$1,000,000.

# Earnings:

Net profits of loan corporations, excluding transfers to and from investment reserves, amounted to \$3,100,000 as compared to \$3,700,000 and \$3,800,000 in 1934 and 1933, respectively. In direct contrast to this steady decline in loan corporations' earnings, those of trust companies (also exclusive of transfers to and from investment reserves) have shown definite increases in recent years. In 1933, net profits of trust companies amounted to \$2,100,000, in 1934, \$2,440,000, and in 1935, \$2,550,000. From an examination of the detailed figures, it is evident that management fees in respect of estates, trusts and agencies have gone a long way in maintaining the earnings of trust companies generally.

The net amount transferred to investment reserves (amount transferred to investment reserves less the amount transferred from such reserves, eliminated from the above figures for purposes of comparison of net profits) totalled \$2,063,000 for the year 1935. Of this amount, \$1,441,000 was in respect of loan corporations and \$622,000 in respect of trust companies. This is a decrease of approximately \$3,075,000 from that set up in 1934, loan corporations setting up \$2,493,000 less and trust companies \$582,000 less. The policy of providing for decreases in asset values by setting up investment reserves was commenced early in the period of depression and has continued throughout.

Moved by the necessity of providing additional investment reserves against decreases in the value of assets, a majority of companies have transferred large sums from their contingency reserves and reserve funds. For this purpose, reserve funds of loan corporations were reduced from \$19,800,000 to \$19,200,000 during 1935 although trust companies reserve and contingency funds increased by \$435,000 to the total of \$15,700,000. As at December 31, 1935, reserve funds and contingency reserves of loan corporations amounted to 56 per cent. of the paid in capital of such corpora-

tions. Similarly, such reserves of trust companies amounted to 62 per cent. of paid in capital.

# Dividends:

In 1935 loan corporations declared dividends amounting to \$2,473,000 and trust companies in the amount of \$1,638,000, representing 4.43 per cent. and 3.85 per cent. of the shareholders' equity in loan corporations and trust companies respectively. The amounts and percentages are similar to those reported in 1934. For purposes of comparison, it will be noted that loan corporation earnings, exclusive of transfers to and from investment reserves, represented 5.58 per cent. of the shareholders' equity as compared to 6.53 per cent. in the previous year. Trust company earnings on the same basis represented 6 per cent. of the shareholders' equity as compared to 5.64 per cent. the previous year.

# Liquid Position:

It will be of particular interest to note the steady improvement in the liquid position of those loan and trust corporations accepting deposits. Such companies are required by statute to report quarterly the amount of deposits held by them and a summary of liquid securities on hand and available for immediate use in satisfying any demands for withdrawal. A ratio of 40% of liquid securities and cash to deposits was considered sufficient a few years ago. Following the financial crises in 1930, demands for repayment of deposits increased materially, with the result that the liquid securities on hand and available were encroached upon and in a few cases the percentage materially reduced. The experience of many of the companies, however, illustrated the need for the maintenance of substantial liquidity at all times, and I feel that the companies are to be commended upon the substantial improvement they have made in recent years. It is evident, however, that a liquidity of 50 to 60 per cent. should be maintained in future. The average percentage of liquid security to deposits held by all companies for the past three years is as follows:

On December 31st, 1935, there were only four companies with a liquidity percentage below 50%, and one of these showed  $49\frac{3}{4}\%$ . The others were approximately 35%, and showed marked improvement over the ratios reported in earlier years. I hope to be able to report next year that all such companies without exception have attained a liquidity percentage of 50% or more.

#### CONSTATING INSTRUMENTS

This corporation was incorporated under Special Act of the Dominion of Canada, 62-63 Victoria (1899), c. 101, under the name of "The Canada Permanent and Western Canada Mortgage Corporation," for the purpose of acquiring the assets and business of the Canada Permanent Loan and Savings Company, the Western Canada Loan and Savings Company, the Freehold Loan and Savings Company, and The London and Ontario Investment Company, Limited, which several purchases were confirmed by Special Act of Ontario, 63 Victoria. 1900. c. 129. The name

was changed to the "Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation" by 3 Edward VII (1903), c. 94 (D), which Act also amended its lending powers. By 3-4 George V (1913), c. 86 (D), further amendments were made to the Incorporating Act.

Of the constituent companies, the Canada Permanent Loan and Savings Company was incorporated by declaration filed under The Building Societies Act (Cons. Stat. U.C., c. 53) in 1855, under the name of the Canada Permanent Building and Savings Society, which name was changed to the Canada Permanent Loan and Savings Company by 37 Victoria (Ontario), 1874, c. 100.

The Western Canada Loan and Savings Company was also incorporated by declaration filed under The Building Societies Act in 1863, under the name of the Western Canada Permanent Building and Savings Society, and its name was changed to the Western Canada Loan and Savings Company by 37 Victoria (Ontario), 1874, c. 79.

The Freehold Loan and Savings Company was also incorporated by declaration filed under The Building Societies Act in 1859 under the name of The Freehold Permanent Building and Savings Society; the name being changed to The Freehold Loan and Savings Company by 36 Victoria (Ontario), (1873), c. 104.

The London and Ontario Investment Company was incorporated by the Act of Ontario 39 Victoria, 1876, c. 62.

In 1918 the corporation purchased the assets and business of The Oxford Permanent Loan and Savings Society, which purchase was ratified by Order-in-Council of Ontario, dated July 31st, 1918, pursuant to The Loan and Trust Corporations Act.

In 1921, the corporation also purchased the assets and business of The London and Canadian Loan and Agency Company, Limited, which purchase was ratified by Order-in-Council of Ontario, dated September 23rd, 1921, pursuant to The Loan and Trust Corporations Act.

In 1927, the corporation purchased the assets and business of The Royal Loan and Savings Company, which purchase was ratified by Order-in-Council of Ontario, dated March 4th, 1927, pursuant to The Loan and Trust Corporations Act.

In 1927 the corporation purchased the assets and business of The British Columbia Permanent Loan Company, Vancouver, B.C.

In 1927 the corporation also purchased the assets and business of The Canada Landed and National Investment Company, Limited, which purchase was ratified by Order-in-Council of Ontario, dated December 30th, 1927, pursuant to The Loan and Trust Corporations Act.

1884—Letters Patent (under the Ontario Government Joint Stock Companies' Letters Patent Act) incorporating The Central Canada Loan and Savings Company of Ontario, with a capital of \$2,000.000, in 20,000 shares of \$100 each, dated 7th March, 1884.

1890—Act (of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario), 53 Vic., c. 129; declares capital to be \$5,000,000, in 50,000 shares of \$100 each; confirms the purchase of the assets of the Peterborough Real Estate Investment Company, Limited; authorizes the issue of debenture stock; authorizes agencies in the United Kingdom; defines the limit of borrowing powers.

Amendments to charter, 9 Edward VII, chap. 114, 7th May, 1909; 5th George V, chap. 125, 5th March, 1915; 7th George V, chap. 102, 22nd December, 1916; 9th George V, chap. 125, 4th March, 1919.

Authorized by special Act of the Legislature of Ontario, 10-11 Geo. V, chap. 156, 4th June, 1920, to transact business therein as specified in Section 5 of the said Act, which enacts as follows:

"(5) The company shall be limited in respect of all business relating to property and

1899—62-63 Victoria, Chapter 111, Canada—An Act changing the name of The General Trust Corporation of Canada to The Canada Trust Company and authorizing certain investments of funds other than trust funds, and authorizing an increase of capital subject to certain limitations.

1922—12-13 Geo. V, Chapter 67, Canada—An Act increasing the Company's board of directors from 9 to 21 and authorizing the Company to receive money on deposit.

1930—January 21st—An Order of the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontario in Council assenting to an agreement for the purchase by The Canada Trust Company of The Consolidated Trusts Corporation.

The powers of the Company are defined by sections of the incorporating Act, which powers are (Section 4) to be deemed subject to the laws of the Province.

#### CONSTATING INSTRUMENTS

The Title and Trust Company was incorporated in 1905 by Special Act of the Parliament of Canada, 4-5 Edward VII, chap. 162 (Royal Assent, July 20th, 1905). By Section 19 of this Act the Company was required to make an initial deposit with the Receiver-General of Canada to carry on the business of Title Insurance, the said deposit to be increased to \$75,000.00 within two years from the date of the issue of such license, and to be further increased as the Treasury

Board may from time to time require.
In 1907, by Special Act of the Province of Ontario, 7 Edward VII, chap. 118, the Company was, upon the conditions therein specified, made admissible to registry under The Loan Cor-

porations Act, and initial registry was granted on the 30th August, 1907.

April 18th, 1914—Amendment to charter changing name to Chartered Trust and Executor Company.

May 16th, 1919—Absorbed Guardian Trust Company.

Incorporated on the 17th September, 1896, by Letters Patent of Ontario, issued under The Ontario Joint Stock Companies' Letters Patent Act, R.S.O. 1887, Chap. 157. See also The Loan and Trust Corporations Act, R.S.O. 1927, Chap. 223.

February 18th, 1929—Order-in-Council confirming By-law No. 14 of the Corporation to increase the capital stock from \$500,000.00 to \$1,000,000.00.

August 21st, 1929—Order-in-Council confirming By-law No. 18 of the Corporation to increase the capital stock from \$1,000,000.00 to \$5,000,000.00.

On the 10th day of September, 1929, His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor approved by Order-in-Council the removal of the Head Office of The London and Western Trusts Company, Limited, from the City of London to the City of Toronto.

June 28th, 1932—Order-in-Council assenting to the conversion of partly-paid shares into fully paid shares equivalent to the amount paid in on account of subscriptions not including premiums.

By an agreement, dated the 15th day of October, 1929, The London and Western Trusts Company, Limited, of London, Ontario, purchased the assets and liabilities, business, rights, property and goodwill, etc., of The Standard Trusts Company with Head Office in Toronto, Ontario. The agreement was ratified and confirmed by the shareholders of both companies and was subsequently approved by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. The transfer became effective on the 18th day of December, 1929. The Standard Trusts Company had, by authority of By-law No. 35, moved its Head Office from Winnipeg to Toronto, and was granted registry in Ontario under date of October 26th, 1929.

Pursuant to Sections 45 or 18a (3) of the Loan and Trusts Corporations Act.

Sec. 45. Every loan company receiving deposits shall make a sworn return to the Registrar quarterly on the 15th days of January, April, July and October in each year, drawn in accordance with the form prescribed from time to time by the Registrar, showing the amount of such deposits and showing the amount of cash on hand and on deposit and the amount of debentures, bonds, stock or other securities of or guaranteed by the Dominion of Canada, and of or guaranteed by any province of Canada less any incumbrances thereon and the amount of bonds, debentures and other securities of any municipal corporation in Ontario or of any city in Canada, less any incumbrances thereon and the bonds or debentures issued by any incorporated company in respect of which bonds or debentures annual or semi-annual subsidy payments sufficient to pay both principal and interest thereof are, by virtue of any general Act of the Dominion of Canada, payable by the Government of the Dominion of Canada to a trust company as trustee for the holders of such bonds or debentures, and the principal amount of any moneys payable to the company on demand the payment of which is secured by the mortgage or pledge of any of the securities hereinbefore in this section mentioned as the said amounts stood at the end of the last preceding month, and stating that the same were at the date mentioned in such return on hand and available for depositors.

Sec. 18a.—(3) Every trust company receiving deposits in the manner authorized by subsection 3 of section 18 shall make a sworn return to the Registrar quarterly on the 15th days of January, April, July and October in each year, drawn in accordance with the form prescribed from time to time by the Registrar, showing the amount of such deposits and showing the amount of cash on hand and on deposit, and the amount of debentures, bonds, stock or other securities of or guaranteed by the Dominion of Canada, and of or guaranteed by any province of Canada, less any incumbrances thereon, and the amount of bonds, debentures and other securities of any municipal corporation in Ontario or of any city in Canada, less any incumbrances thereon, and the bonds or debentures issued by any incorporated company in respect of which bonds or debentures annual or semi-annual subsidy payments sufficient to pay both principal and interest thereof are, by virtue of any general Act of the Dominion of Canada, payable by the Government of the Dominion of Canada to a trust company as trustee for the holders of such bonds or debentures, and the principal amount of moneys payable to the company on demand, the payment of which is secured by the mortgage or pledge of any of the securities hereinbefore in this subsection mentioned, as the said amounts stood at the end of the last preceding month, and including in such statement all such cash and securities and loans as defined in this subsection, whether owned by the company or held by it as guaranteed investments under the provision of subsection 2 of section 17, or subsection 4 of section 18, and stating that the same were at the date mentioned in such return on hand and available for depositors.



### REPORT

OF THE

I have the honour to transmit to you the accompanying reports of the branches of this Department for the five months' period. November 1st, 1934, to March 31st, 1935.

### ARCHITECT'S BRANCH

An important change affecting the Departments of Health and Public Works was made as at the beginning of this period, when the structural maintenance and repair work of the Ontario Hospitals was transferred from the Department of Health, Hospitals' Branch, to this Department. The necessary staff transfers were also made.

The work of the branch for the period is summarized, as follows:

Capital Construction:

Brockville, Ontario Hospital, completion of new power house; also remodelling of cottages D. E. and F.

Burwash, Industrial Farm, extension work.

Hamilton, Ontario Hospital, remodelling of East House; also protection of basement construction.

Kingston, Ontario Hospital. remodelling of Beechgreve.

London, Ontario Hospital, completion and protection of basement storey.

Mimico, Ontario Hospital, completion and protection of basement storey of the extension to Nurses' Residence; also remodelling of cottages A and B.

Orillia, Ontario Hospital, interior work.

Penetanguishene. Ontario Hospital. interior work.

Woodstock, Ontario Hospital, completion and protection of basement storey of the new nurses' residence.

In every case this work was originated and under construction by the late Government at the time of dissolution and the properties and works were completed as above.

Sir:

I have the honour to report on the work done by the Architect's Branch of the Department of Public Works, Ontario, during the fiscal year November 1st, 1934, to March 31st, 1935.

Government House.—Minor repairs have been made as required. The work of installing a concrete coal chute, referred to in the previous report, has been completed.

Parliament Buildings.—The buildings, including Parliament Buildings, East Block, Nos. 11. 15 and 39 Queen's Park Crescent, Highways and Provincial Police garages and 454 University Avenue have been kept in repair.

In the Parliament Buildings, the room off the east gallery of the Legislative Chamber, formerly the Sergeant-at-Arms' office, has been added to the Press accommodation and a spiral metal stair has been installed joining this room with the old Press room below. The Speaker's office has been redecorated and a new glass screen partition has been erected across the Government lobby at the Speaker's entrance to the Legislative Chambers.

Alterations have been made to enlarge the Government Opposition room. This room has been entirely redecorated by painting the walls and ceilings, cleaning off and restoring the oak panelling and trim, refinishing and waxing it. New electric fixtures were installed and the room was suitably furnished.

Sections of the wood floors in hallways and treads of wood stairs have been sanded off and refinished and several offices throughout have been painted.

The upholstery in the Legislative Chamber has been thoroughly overhauled and put in good repair.

In the East Block new glass screen partitions have been erected to provide a number of small private offices in the Department of Welfare. Changes of a minor nature in door opening have been made, cupboards, shelvings, rails and gates to public space in offices have been installed. A new electric furnace has been supplied and installed in the assay furnace laboratory of the Department of Mines and a ventilating hood to carry off lead fumes from cable testing laboratory of the same department has been put in. Watchman's clock stations have been overhauled and repaired. Extensions have been made in the buzzer systems throughout various departments. Painting has been done in the Department of Welfare and the Department of Health offices. The heating plant and elevators have been kept in repair and a new heater tank has been installed, replacing the old to supply hot water at the east wing of the Parliament Buildings. The buildings have been kept thoroughly cleaned and all painted plaster, woodwork and marble work throughout washed down and kept polished under the supervision of the housekeeper.

The houses Nos. 1, 2, 5 and 9 Queen's Park Crescent have been sold by tender, taken down to bottom of foundations and the sites have been cleared of all building material.

No. 11 Queen's Park Crescent has been connected up with the central heating system, partially remodelled, altered and redecorated throughout to accommodate the laboratory and offices of the Medico-Legal Expert of the Criminal Investigation Branch of the Department of the Attorney General; the experimental laboratory of the radio section of the Department of Forestry and the fire pump testing laboratory of the same department, these offices being previously housed at No. 5 Queen's Park

Crescent. The sign painter's workshop and the printing and stationery branches of the Department of Highways were moved from the East Block to the first floor of No. 11 Queen's Park Crescent and the offices of the Soldiers' Aid Commission were moved from 621 Jarvis Street to this building. The offices of the Crippled Children's Society, formerly in No. 5 Queen's Park Crescent, were granted space in No. 15 Queen's Park Crescent.

The property at 621 Jarvis Street vacated by the Soldiers' Aid Commission has been sold to the Red Cross of Canada.

"Bon Air," Kingston Road, vacated by the Soldiers' Aid Commission has been leased to the Scarboro Division of the Army and Navy Veterans in Canada.

The Ontario Government Exhibition Building. Canadian National Exhibition, has been inspected to determine the nature and extent of repairs which the City of Toronto authorities should be called on to do. Repairs have been carried out, as requested, on roofs, concrete floors and on the stonework.

Osgoode Hall.—The building has been kept in repair, some painting has been done and sections of the roofs and gutters have been renewed and repaired.

### EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS

At the Normal School, Toronto, repairs to roofs and plumbing have been made and some painting has been done.

At the Normal School, Ottawa, repairs to roofs and roof parapet copings have been made.

At the Normal School, London, new blackboards have been supplied and installed and repairs have been made to plumbing.

At all other Normal Schools only minor repairs have been made.

At the English-French Training School, Embrun, a new hot water storage tank has been supplied and installed.

At the Ontario School for the Deaf. Belleville, repairs have been made by raising and recovering a flat section of the main roof.

At the Ontario School for the Blind, Brantford, gutters and down pipes on the two dormitory buildings have been renewed and repairs made to roofs. Changes and repairs have been made to the principal's house and new sink and laundry trays have been installed. The house has been redecorated and some new furniture, floor coverings and curtains added.

### AGRICULTURAL BUILDINGS:

At the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, a contract was awarded to the Galt Roofing Company for repairs to the slate roof of the Massey Library and the renewing of the galvanized gutters and flashings in copper. A contract was awarded to Messrs. Frank and Schuett of Guelph to repair the flat roofs over the Dining Hall and the Bacteriological Building.

At the Horticultural Experimental Station, Vinelands, repairs were done, as required and some decorating also.

At the Agricultural School. Kemptville, new locks for the Students' Residence were supplied and put on, and additional fire hose racks supplied and installed.

### DISTRICT BUILDINGS:

Throughout the districts, the necessary repairs have been made to Court Houses, Registry Offices, Land Titles Offices, Jails and Lock-ups.

### ONTARIO HOSPITALS

The work of alterations, additions and repairs to hospital buildings was transferred on the first of November to the Department of Public Works and the architectural staff, formerly in charge of these buildings under the Department of Health, was also transferred to this department at that date.

A complete survey of all the institutions has been begun to ascertain the extent and nature of repairs necessary to be undertaken in the future to maintain the buildings for the safety, convenience and comfort of the patients.

Ontario Hospital. Brockville.—The new power house, described in the previous report, has been practically completed and will be turned over for operation by the hospital engineering staff on, or about, the 31st of May.

The remodelling of cottages D, E and F, of which the corridors and staircases and exits have been fireproofed. has been completed. The work has been carried out by day labour under the supervision of the mechanical staff of the hospital.

New outside fire escape stairs from the rear of these cottages, for which a contract has been let to the Runnymede Iron and Steel Company, have yet to be installed.

Ontario Hospital. Hamilton.—The work of remodelling the East House has been completed. This building has been modernized with new plumbing and heating, fireproof floors, stairs and exits. Specifications have been made and tenders will be called for kitchen equipment. The work of painting has been carried out by contract awarded to J. F. Buchanan of Dundas. The work of remodelling was carried out by day labour under the supervision of the mechanical staff of the hospital.

Alterations to provide improved lavatory accommodation for out-patients at the Hickory Farm have been completed.

The contract awarded for the completion and protection of the basement storey of the nurses' new residence has been completed.

Ontario Hospital, Kingston.—The work of remodelling and fireproofing Beechgrove has been practically completed with the exception of the operating theatre and mortuary wing, the work on which it was decided to leave in abevance. The work of remodelling was carried out by day labour under a clerk of works. Changes have been made to the electric wiring to conform with the Ontario Hydro rules. The work of the changes to the heating in the main building has been left in abeyance.

At the Mowat Wing a new penthouse over the electric dumb-waiter, recently installed, has been built under contract.

Ontario Hospital. London.—A contract was awarded to the McEachern Construction Company of London to complete the basement storev of the new building for patients and to protect and keep heated as a further protection during the winter months. The work has been completed.

Ontario Hospital. Mimico.—A contract was awarded to the Frid Construction Company of Hamilton to complete the basement storey of the extension to the nurses' residence. Heat was provided during the winter by extending the heating mains, the work being done by the hospital engineering staff and the contract completed.

The work of remodelling cottages A and B has been completed. This work was carried out by day labour under the direction of a clerk of works, except the terrazzo work on floors, which was done by the Italian Mosiac and Tile Company under contract. New equipment for dining room service has been installed. The buildings are now fully occupied. New electric transformers have been installed to take care of the increased load, due to the extensions and recent additional buildings at this institution. Renewals and changes to steam and water mains have been carried on.

Ontario Hospital, Orillia.—The work of plastering and tiling of the walls of the two new fireproof exit stairways at the rear of the Main Building has been completed by day labour and the ceiling of the laundry ironing room has been strapped and plastered to overcome the condensation.

Ontario Hospital, Toronto.—The work of repairing the central dome in copper has been done.

Ontario Hospital, Woodstock.—A contract has been awarded to James Vance of Woodstock to complete the basement storey of the new nurses' residence and to protect the foundations against frost action. The work has been completed.

Ontario Hospital, Penetanguishene.—The work of plastering, terrazzo work, supplying and installing fireproof doors and screens at the new exit stair from the amusement hall has been completed. The work of installing a new switchboard for telephone service has been completed.

At the request of the Department of health, the following private hospital buildings have been inspected and reported on:

Byron Sanatorium, Lordon. St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph. Wood Sanatorium, Hemilton. Chatham General Hospital, Chatham.

### REFORMATORIES

Industrial Farm, Burwash.—The steel cell fronts and grille gates manufactured by the Ontario Reformatory of Guelph have been installed complete in the new cell block. The new custodial building is now practically completed, except for the

equipment, the necessary changes having been made to adapt the building to provide central dining rooms for inmates and staff, with fully equipped kitchen. Drawings and specifications have been prepared and tenders called for kitchen equipment.

Plans have been prepared to erect a temporary power house using the two boilers taken from the Veterinary College, Guelph. This power house, in addition to heating the buildings, supplies the steam for cooking and hot water for bathing of inmates.

The work of the new drainage scheme has been delayed by stress of weather and will be resumed when weather conditions permit and frost is out of the ground.

The recently bored well has been abandoned because of the infiltration of fine sand, which has repeatedly choked and finally destroyed the pump. Consideration has been given to the Wanapitei River supply and surveys have been made.

The electric pole line from the hydro plant at McVittie to camp No. 2 has been reported on by the engineers of the Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission and a contract has been awarded to the Commission to step up the voltage from 2200 volts to 6400-8000 volts and to rebuild the line where necessary in crossing the swamp and to supply and install all the necessary new transformers. The rough work is to be done by inmate labour.

Industrial Farm, Fort William.—The work on the extension of the sewage plant and the pumping station has been delayed through stress of weather.

### WELFARE BUILDINGS

Boys' Training School, Bowmanville.—Sketch plans have been prepared for a hospital building at the Boys' Training School at Bowmanville and sketches have also been made for the extension of the workshops and of gymnasium building. Surveys have been made and plans prepared for a sports field, the work on which will be undertaken by the boys at a future date.

Victoria Industrial School, Mimico.—This institution, as already reported, was taken over on the first of November by the Department of Welfare from the trustees of the Victoria Industrial School. The care of the buildings was placed under the Department of Public Works on December 1st, 1934.

The work of boarding up the door and window openings of the buildings has been done. Water has been turned off all buildings and the systems drained and all electric power disconnected, as far as practicable. All outside fire escapes, plumbing and electric fixtures and other articles of value have been stored in one of the buildings. Watchman's services have been retained. Remodelling and repairs have been begun on the Beverly Jones Cottage to accommodate the staff of the Unemployment Relief Department, Lake Shore Area. All farm produce has been taken from the loft over the stable to the Government Clay Plant adjoining.

### **GENERALLY**

Inspections have been made to boiler plants in government buildings throughout the province and these have been kept in repair, where necessary.

I have the honor to report on the work of the Engineers' Branch of the Department of Public Works for the five months' period of November 1st, 1934, to March 31st, 1935.

The work during this period consisted mainly of the completion of work started during 1934 and reported in the 1934 report.

The most important work carried out during this period was the rebuilding of the lock gates and general repairs to the locks and docks at Port Carling. The old gates had become so badly decayed that they were sagging and dragging on the bottom, so that it was very difficult to open them at times. The gates were rebuilt in timber so that they are now good for many years. The little lock was also repaired and it is now in good condition.

The swing bridge, stationary bridge, shelter house, lockmaster's office and tool house were painted so that the appearance of the whole works has been greatly improved.

Repairs to locks, dams and bridges were continued throughout this period.

### MUNICIPAL BRIDGES

### NIPISSING

Dupre's Creek bridge, Widdifield, Graham Creek bridge, Chisholm,

These two bridges were completed and were reported in 1934 report.

### PARRY SOUND

Beatty Creek bridge, Nipissing twp.—This was an old timber trestle 125 feet long and 16 ft. above water level. The bridge had become unsafe for traffic and had to be repaired. A 60 ft. steel span which had been taken from an abandoned road was used at this site. New timber piles were driven to support it and the balance of the bridge was renewed in timber and it is now in good condition and safe for traffic.

Eagle Lake bridge, Machar twp.—This old bridge consisted of two timber spans about 32 ft. long each. Both spans were not required to take the flow of water, so one span was filled with rock and a steel span 32 ft. long was put on the other opening. Concrete abutments resting on rock filled timber cribs support the steel beams. The floor is of concrete and roadway is 18 ft. wide. The approaches were widened and a cable guard railing provided for both bridge and approaches.

North Creek bridge, Spence twp.—This is a timber bridge with 20 ft. span resting on timber cribs.

### Muskoka

Acton Island bridge.—Work was continued throughout the winter on this bridge and it is now completed and ready for traffic.

### HALIBURTON

Work was continued on Guilford bridge, Maple Lake bridge and Union Creek bridge and they are now all completed and open to traffic.

Hawk River bridge, Stanhope twp.—This is a timber bridge consisting of two spans of 16 ft. each and resting on rock filled timber piers. A timber guard railing was provided and the approaches well graded.

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# REPORT OF THE DEPUTY MINISTER OF LABOUR

To The Honourable David A. Croll,

Minister of Public Welfare, Municipal Affairs and Labour.

SIR:

I have the honour to submit to you the following Report of the Department of Labour of the Province of Ontario, including the Report of the Minimum Wage Board, for the fiscal period, November 1, 1934, to March 31, 1935.

#### EMPLOYMENT CONDITIONS IN THE PROVINCE

The general improvement in employment conditions in Ontario which was recorded in the last Annual Report of the Department of Labour continued during the fivementh period. The index number of employment for the five months was 101.4 as compared with 93.8 for the corresponding period of the previous year, or an advance of 7.6 points. The index numbers are reported monthly by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and are based on the average for the calendar year 1926 as 100.

The records indicated an improvement as compared with the same months of last year in all of the thirteen divisions of industry, with the exception of the communications group, in which the index number was a fraction of a point lower. Moreover, in all groups, except communications, transportation and construction, each month showed an advance over the same month of the previous year. The greatest gains were reported for mining, logging, iron and steel and in construction.

Further evidence of improvement in employment conditions was shown in the percentage of unemployment reported among trade union members, which was 18.5 as compared with 22.7 for the same period last year, or a decline of 4.2 points.

Increased activity was indicated in the building trades. The value of building permits issued in Ontario for the five months amounted to \$8,114,483 as compared with \$3,324,072 for the corresponding period of the previous year.

#### INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES

During the five-month period there were 15 industrial disputes reported in Ontario, in which 4,574 employees were involved, with a time-loss of 24,483 working days. In the case of two of these disputes settlement was brought about through the mediation of a representative of this Department, as follows:—the dispute of the dress and shirt factory workers in Toronto was reported terminated in favour of the workers and the dispute of the leather jacket workers in Hamilton resulted in compromise. In the case of the dispute among furniture factory workers in Chesley, the municipal authorities consulted with officials of the Department of Labour with a view to securing settlement, which, however, was not effected until after the close of the five-month period.

#### LEGISLATION

The Industrial Standards Act was passed at the 1935 session of the Legislature of Ontario. This Act is designed to promote the establishment of standard wages and hours of labour by agreements between employers and employees in any industry and in any zone or zones of the Province. If, in the opinion of the Minister of Labour, an agreement has been arrived at by a proper and sufficient representation of employees and employers, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may declare such agreement binding for a period of not more than one year on all persons engaged or employed in the industry in the zone or zones to which it applies. The Act and schedules of wages and hours of labour are to be enforced by the Minimum Wage Board and penalties are provided for violations. Joint boards may be set up by the parties in any industry to hear complaints and to assist in enforcing the terms of the schedules.

#### GENERAL

It is with regret that we have to report two deaths in the Department of Labour during the five-month period. Mr. D. W. Markham, who had served as a member of the Minimum Wage Board for four months, was killed in a train wreck on Christmas night, 1934. Even in his short term of service he had become a valuable member of the Board, which sustained a great loss in his sudden death. On January 28, 1935, Mr. Patterson Farmer was appointed to succeed Mr. Markham.

Mr. Hugh Stevenson, a factory inspector for more than fifteen years, died on January 26, 1935, after a three-month period of ill health. Mr. Stevenson always gave faithful and loyal service to the Department and he has been greatly missed both among his co-workers in the Factory Inspection Branch and in the industrial plants coming under his supervision.

Mr. Louis Fine was appointed on November 22, 1934, to the staff of the Main Office of the Department. Mr. Fine assisted in the preliminary work in connection with the drafting of the Industrial Standards Act and, on the passing of this piece of legislation, Mr. Fine became Industrial Standards Officer.

A brief account of the activities of the various Branches of the Department of Labour and of the Minimum Wage Board during the five-month period from November 1, 1934, to March 31, 1935, is given in the following pages of this Report. The heads of these Branches have co-operated closely in order to ensure the effective administration of the several Acts coming under the jurisdiction of the Department. Their continued loyal services and the assistance rendered by their staffs are greatly appreciated.

# Ontario Government Offices of the Employment Service of Canada

GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT—H. C. HUDSON

During the five-month period from November 1, 1934, to March 31, 1935, three changes were made in Employment Office premises and one temporary office was opened. On November 1, 1934, the Men's Employment Office of Toronto moved to the new premises at 70 Lombard Street. A month later the Women's Employment Office moved to quarters in the same building with entrance on Richmond Street. This building was constructed exclusively for employment office purposes and provides adequate and up-to-date accommodation for the work being carried on there. The London Office moved to new quarters at 180 King Street and it is anticipated that the change will be advantageous from the point of view of employers and workers using this office. A temporary office of the Employment Service was established at Kaladar on November 1, 1934, to handle the placement of men on Northern Development highway projects in that area. The office remained open for a period of two months.

The series of Employment Service broadcasts over Radio Station CRCT, which commenced in October, 1934, continued until the end of the five-month period and met with unqualified approval on the part of both employers and workers, many of whom wrote from distant points to commend this form of publicity. Jobs in approximately sixty occupations were put on the air and replies were received from qualified applicants who otherwise would not have known of the vacancies.

During the month of February the Employment Offices in Southern Ontario were asked to co-operate with the Social Research Council of McGill University in compiling specific information regarding agricultural conditions in this Province. The information supplied in detail by the Superintendents was appreciated by the Research Council and used by that organization in preparing a study of conditions affecting this industry throughout the whole Dominion.

An interested group of teachers, personnel managers and others met in Toronto in January and formed the Ontario Vocational Guidance Association for the purpose of providing a means of interchange of information regarding the important subject of vocational guidance. Superintendents of the Employment Service were given the opportunity of joining the new organization, and the response indicated their interest in the problem of helping young people choose their life work.

In accordance with an understanding reached in March, 1935, the Agricultural Representatives of the Province and the Employment Office Superintendents were linked more closely in a farm placement scheme with the object of improving the service to farm employers during the spring and summer months. This plan was worked out in detail with the Director of the Agricultural Representatives, Mr. R. S. Duncan, and promises to result in an increase in the number of farm placements.

During the five months from November 1, 1934, to March 31, 1935, there were 115,677 applications for employment received at all Ontario Offices of the Employment

Service. Employers, including municipal, provincial and federal government departments, called for 59,856 men and women; 56,919 placements were made, of which 35,777 were of a casual nature and 21,142 were regular placements in employment of a more permanent nature. A complaint was received that the proprietor of a Finnish rooming house was operating an employment office and was charging fees for securing jobs for his patrons. While no direct violation of the Act was found upon investigation, the operator was warned against the charging of fees in connection with any job-finding agency.

# Factory Inspection Branch

ACTING CHIEF INSPECTOR—Jos. R. PRAIN

The five-month period under review was an extremely busy time for the inspectorate of the Factory Inspection Branch. The volume of inspection was well maintained and our inspectors rendered greater assistance than formerly in the enforcement of the Minimum Wage Act. Complaints were less numerous and it would seem that public interest, which was so apparent in 1934, waned with the dropping of press publicity at the close of the public enquiry of the Royal Commission.

In December, 1934, invitations were forwarded to foundrymen throughout the Province to attend a meeting at the Parliament Buildings, which was arranged jointly by the Department of Health and the Department of Labour. The meeting was convened on December 28 under the chairmanship of Dr. J. G. Cunningham, Director of the Industrial Hygiene Branch of the Department of Health, and was well attended by representative foundrymen from all parts of Ontario. The discussions centred on the prevalence of silicosis among workers in various dusty processes in foundries and interesting and instructive lectures were given by Dr. Cunningham and members of his staff. It was shown that approximately 25 per cent, of the moulders examined by the Industrial Hygiene Branch, with an average exposure of 28 years, were suffering from silicosis; 35 per cent. of the grinders; 40 per cent. of the sandblasters and approximately 15 per cent, of various other groups. All these men had many years of service and none were cases which had developed within the year, but rather had accumulated over a lengthy period. They indicated very clearly, however, the prevalence of this dread disease among foundry workers and the processes where the hazard is greatest. The conference proved of great assistance to our inspectors and we feel we are receiving a greater degree of co-operation from the foundry owners and management than at any time in the past. Too much importance cannot be attached to this class of industrial disease and our inspectors are urged to accept no half measures where this insidious hazard is known to be present. We desire to express our deep appreciation to Dr. Cunningham and to his staff for their invaluable assistance in investigations and in laboratory analyses of samples obtained by our inspectors where chemical processes are used and hazardous ingredients suspected.

During the five-month period 80 plans representing a total value of approximately \$1,812,000 were approved by the Branch under section 14 of the Factory, Shop and Office Building Act. The great majority of these plans were for additions and alterations to existing plants, no plans being received during the period for new industries of even moderate size, with the exception of a pottery plant at Toronto. This total value, as well as the number of plans, indicated a slight increase as compared with similar figures for the corresponding months of the previous year.

We regret to have to report the death of one of our inspectors, Mr. Hugh Stevenson, who passed away in January, 1935, after having served the Branch faithfully and well for over fifteen years.

The following statistical information is taken from our records and is of interest in depicting graphically the scope of the work of the Branch:

# Boiler Inspection Branch

ACTING CHIEF INSPECTOR—E. T. URQUHART

Inspectors—W. H. Barrett, J. N. Briggs, N. S. Smith, J. Stevenson

Increases in all phases of the work of the Boiler Inspection Branch continued during the five-month period from November 1, 1934, to March 31, 1935, and conditions indicated a busy year for all boiler manufacturers of the Province. There is a growing demand for greater steam pressures and it is expected that at least two boilers will be constructed shortly which will operate at pressures of approximately 800 pounds per square inch.

Unfortunately two pressure vessels exploded, in each case resulting in the death of one person. On January 31 an investigation was made of a sulphuric acid tank which was reported to have been purchased as a storage tank, and therefore an inspection was not required. When this tank was installed, it was connected with an air line carrying 60 pounds pressure, there being a stop valve in the air line and another stop valve in the discharge line to an open top tank. Due to an overflow of the sulphuric acid in the open top tank the stop valve in the discharge line was closed by the operator, but he neglected to stop the air compressor, allowing the pressure in the acid tank to increase until the tank filled. The operator standing nearby was badly burned by the sulphuric acid and died a few days later.

On January 22 a steam jacketed glycerine tank failed. This vessel was installed second hand about January, 1930, and it was not reported to this Branch of the Department so an inspection could be made of same, as required, before being placed into service. Previous to the accident some one unknown to the owners had made a bye-pass pipe connection to a 150 pound steam line. The tank was not suitably constructed to withstand this pressure and the inner shell fractured, precipitating boiling glycerine on to one of the employees who was standing directly under the tank. The burns received caused his death a few days later.

The above vessels were not inspected by our officials.

# Apprenticeship Board

CHIEF INSPECTOR—A. W. CRAWFORD

There were no important developments under the Apprenticeship Act during the five-month period from November 1, 1934, to March 31, 1935. The attached statistical tables, which correspond with those submitted with previous reports for the full fiscal year, show the changes which have taken place in the number of apprentices enrolled throughout the Province. The number of active contracts, representing apprentices in the nine designated trades, decreased from 343 on November 1, 1934, to 319 on March 31, 1935. Despite this decrease it is interesting to note that during the five-month period 11 new contracts were registered, whereas, only 15 were registered during the whole of the preceding year.

Special classes for electrical apprentices in the Toronto District were held at the Central Technical School on Saturday mornings and Wednesday evenings, the total number of apprentices enrolled being 12. In addition to these registered apprentices, a number of journeymen took advantage of the opportunities provided by these classes. The Apprenticeship Board is indebted to the Vocational Committee of the Toronto Board of Education and the staff of the school for their splendid co-operation in this connection. Special evening classes for plumbing and steamfitting apprentices were continued at the Danforth Technical School and a number of apprentices throughout the Province attended regular evening classes, as in previous years.

Interest in apprentice training is being revived in the plumbing and steamfitting trades in the Toronto District and steps have been taken through the local committee to stimulate action on the part of employers in registering new boys.

Several meetings have been held with representatives of the National Ladies Hair-dressing Association and the Association of Registered Hairdressers and Barbers and it is hoped that steps may be taken in the near future to bring this industry within the scope of the Act.

The general tendency throughout the Province is to regard the Apprenticeship Act as being dormant and it would appear that little can be done to revive an active interest in apprentice training until such time as most of the mechanics in the building trades are re-employed in normal activities. As pointed out in the report for the previous year, there will undoubtedly be a shortage of skilled mechanics when normal activity returns and it is hoped that some steps may be taken to re-organize the work of the Apprenticeship Board before this shortage becomes acute.

### Minimum Wage Board

CHAIRMAN—A. W. CRAWFORD

MEMBERS—PATTERSON FARMER, MISS MARGARET STEPHEN

The following report summarizes the activities of the Minimum Wage Board during the five-month period ending March 31, 1935, and is the fifteenth report of the Board since its inauguration in 1920.

Because of the brief period covered, it is deemed advisable to omit the statistical data summarizing wages and hours as revealed by the wage sheets collected from employers throughout the Province. These reports will be included in the next annual report for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1936.

Economic pressure resulting from the continued period of depression has forced many employers to reduce wage rates of female employees to the legal limit so that it is becoming increasingly difficult to enforce the provisions of the Act and Orders. Many employers have been forced to adopt a hand-to-mouth system of production, whereby orders are taken for immediate or short-time delivery and little or no stock is manufactured in advance of the seasonal demands. This results in overtime and a shortage of competent workers during the short peak of production, followed by extended periods of idleness or short-time employment, during which the tendency on the part of the worker is to stretch the work as far as possible. Where the piecework method of payment is employed, this reduces the hourly earnings and it is extremely difficult for the Board to enforce the minimum weekly wage.

During the period under review eighteen court prosecutions were instigated by the Board, which were dealt with as follows:

4 cases—fines imposed amounting to \$725.00 and arrears of \$659.87 ordered to be paid to seven girls.

7 cases—withdrawn as arrears paid—\$1,071.74 for ten girls.

5 cases—arrears ordered to be paid, amounting to \$169.71 for five girls—no fines.

2 cases—dismissed.

Total arrears for twenty-two girls—\$1,901.32.

The total amount of arrears collected during the period amounted to \$9,219.06, which was paid by 181 employers to 254 employees.

The number of permits in force on March 31 was sixty-five, seven having been cancelled and six new permits issued since November 1, 1934. These sixty-five permits cover 111 employees.

Wage returns collected during this period revealed underpayments of 521 employees employed in 331 firms, all of which were adjusted. Complaints from 359 individuals were dealt with, most of which required action by the Board.

The Board has continued to have the assistance and co-operation of all Branches of the Department of Labour in connection with investigations and inspection work,

and has steadfastly pursued the policy of seeking the co-operation and assistance of employers and organized labour throughout the Province in making known the requirements of the Act and in securing voluntary compliance with the various orders establishing minimum wages. We particularly desire to express our appreciation of the assistance rendered by the Factory Inspection Branch of the Department of Labour, and by the inspectors of the Apprenticeship Branch, without which it would have been impossible to deal with all complaints and make the necessary adjustments, as outlined above.

# Appendix

#### INDUSTRIAL DISPUTES

During the five-month period there were 15 industrial disputes reported in Ontario, in which 4,574 employees were involved, with a time-loss of 24,483 working days. As shown in the table immediately below, the greatest time-loss occurred in the clothing industry, with a loss of 11,011 working days.

The outcome of these disputes was as follows:—6 disputes, involving 3,592 workers in a time-loss of 11,162 working days, were settled in favour of the workers; 2, involving 594 workers in a time-loss of 8,848 days, were settled in favour of employers; 6, involving 188 workers in a loss of 3,273 working days, ended in compromise and 1 dispute, in which 200 workers were involved, having a time-loss of 1,200 days, was unterminated at the end of the period.

### Minister of Education

FOR THE YEAR 1935

To The Honourable Herbert Alexander Bruce, M.D., Colonel in the Royal Army Medical Corps, F.R.C.S. (Eng.), Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontario.

Your Honour,-

I beg leave to present to Your Honour the Report of the Department of Education for the year 1935.

During the years of the depression, school boards have been passing through difficult and troublous times. They have been anxious to retain a high standard of efficiency in the schools under their charge, and generally speaking, to avoid serious reductions in the salaries of their teachers. Pressure from municipal bodies and from tax-payers resulted, however, in general decreases and, in the case of rural schools especially, the situation became so serious as to warrant an amendment to the Public Schools Act making it illegal for a rural school board to share in the general township grant if a salary lower than \$500 were paid. This amendment was enacted during the 1935 session of the Legislature and had a definite effect in stopping the downward trend. It is only fair, however, to state that in the majority of cases rural boards themselves felt that salaries were reaching levels much too low and had taken steps to arrest this tendency. With improving economic conditions, much-needed additions are already being made to the accommodations and equipment of the schools and, with the approach of 1936, prospects for improvements in this respect and for higher levels in salaries are better than they have been for several years.

The problem of the small rural school continues to engage attention. 1934 there were 129 such schools with an attendance of fewer than six pupils each, and 620 with an average of from six to ten each, or a total of 749 schools with an average attendance not exceeding ten pupils. The situation in 1935 was slightly improved, there being 124 schools with an average attendance of fewer than six, and 606 with an average of from six to ten, or a total of 730 with an average not exceeding ten each. The best work cannot be accomplished in such schools. Organized games, school entertainments, and other extra-class activities are practically impossible. The pupils lack the stimulation in their studies afforded by friendly competition with class-mates, and individualism rather than community spirit is fostered. The spirit of team play both in school and in playground consequently suffers. It is considered wise, wherever circumstances render it possible, that provision be made for the education of children attending these schools in the schools of neighbouring sections. the excessive cost per pupil in these schools of abnormally low attendance is an important factor in favour of such re-adjustments, it is felt that even more important is the fact that in these small schools the pupil is not receiving the training to which he is entitled.

### Teacher-Training

In 1934 the second-year course of training in the Normal Schools was discontinued, and in May, 1935, new requirements for Permanent First Class Certificates were announced. In brief, these were:

- (1) A five-year secondary school course, or Upper School standing, in academic work as the standard for admission to a one-year Normal School course leading to an Interim First Class Certificate.
- (2) The successful completion of this Normal School course in professional training.
- (3) Three years of successful teaching experience in Ontario, certified by an Inspector.
- (4) The completion of an additional year of University work towards an Arts degree, the subjects to be approved by the Department, and two approved summer courses to be accepted in lieu of two of the University subjects, should the candidate so elect.
- (5) The completion of a further summer course in professional training. Already many Ontario teachers have fulfilled these requirements and have obtained their Permanent First Class Certificates under the new regulations.

The present seems an opportune time for raising the standard of qualifications required of teachers, as it is hoped that the surplus now existing will be sufficient to prevent any scarcity before an adequate number of those qualified under the new regulations will be available.

In the eight Ontario Normal Schools, better provision for practice teaching has been made during the past year. Each teacher-in-training now receives from four to five weeks of continuous teaching practice in elementary schools. It is the intention of the Department to continue this policy of continuous practice teaching in future sessions of the training schools.

### Medical Examination of Teachers

In September, 1935, each applicant for admission to the Normal Schools was required to undergo a strict medical examination conducted by medical examiners appointed by the Department of Education in conjunction with the Department of Health. Some twenty-four applicants failed to meet the requirements of this test and were therefore refused admission to the course. The Ontario Teachers' and Inspectors' Superannuation Commission has for some years been urging a more rigid medical examination of those presenting themselves for entrance into the teaching profession, in an effort to lessen the number of teachers who find it necessary to apply in later life for pensions because of physical inability to continue work for the period of actuarial expectancy.

### Music

In September, 1935, Mr. G. R. Fenwick, Mus.B., formerly supervisor of music for the Hamilton schools, was appointed Provincial Supervisor of Music. Results already attained have amply justified this appointment. Plans for improving the teaching of music are now under way and include proposals for the organization of the teaching of this subject in larger and in smaller urban systems, as well as in rural schools in the more accessible and in the less accessible parts of the Province. Details of these suggested plans will be found in Appendix N. Some 800 schools have already been added this year to the number in which musical instruction is regularly given.

In some inspectorates all the rural schools have arranged for organized teaching, and it is hoped that in the space of a very few years all elementary schools in Ontario, both rural and urban, will have music as a subject of instruction under better conditions and better leadership than has obtained in the past.

### Text-Books

Arrangements have been made for the introduction of two new Readers to replace the present Third Reader. These new books, which will be authorized for the school year of 1936-37, contain a much wider and richer range of reading material than that found in the present book. Teachers will be earnestly advised to teach fewer lessons intensively and to encourage in their pupils the habit of more and more extensive reading. Through this means it is hoped to inculcate a greater love for good literature and a wider reading of such worth-while books as may be found in school and public libraries. Plans are already under way for the further introduction of two additional Readers to take the place of the present Fourth Reader. These books will be ready for the opening of school in September, 1937.

In September, 1936, there will also be authorized two new Spellers, for junior and senior grades respectively. The author, Dr. Quance, has made an exhaustive study of the teaching of spelling and his text-books in this subject are considered by leading Ontario teachers to be the best available in Canada.

### Health Teaching

The Department of Health, in co-operation with the Department of Education, has been conducting experiments in health teaching in certain selected schools and is now about ready to issue in tentative form a manual on Health Teaching for the use of teachers. The Department of Education, for the past four years, has offered also a summer course in Health Teaching, and an increasing number of teachers are taking advantage of this course from year to year.

### Correspondence Courses

These courses were established for pupils in outlying parts of the Province who were unable to take advantage of the ordinary means of instruction because of lack of available schools or from inability to attend the neighbouring schools through physical disabilities. From small beginnings this branch of the Department's activities has grown from year to year, until at present more than 2,000 pupils are being served by the Correspondence staff. Up to June, 1935, instruction in these classes had been limited to the courses of study leading to the Entrance Examination. In September, the curriculum was extended to include the course laid down in Departmental regulations for Fifth Classes. Several pupils have been successful in passing the Entrance Examination and are continuing their studies in the new work. Numerous letters from the parents of these children testify to their appreciation of the help afforded by the teachers engaged in this work and their gratitude to the authorities for instituting such a course.

### Railway School Cars

The School Cars continue to do excellent work among isolated settlements situated along the lines of the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific Railways. During 1935, an additional car was added to the five already in service. The new car operates along the line of the Canadian National Railways

between Sioux Lookout and the Manitoba boundary, a distance of 145 miles. Already it is caring for the needs of forty-two pupils between the ages of five and sixteen years, in all grades of public school work, and among children of such racial origins as English, Dutch, French, German, Swiss, Indian, Ukrainian, Swedish, Spanish, and Czecho-Slovakian. The deep appreciation felt by these pupils is shown by the fact that, at one point, seven pupils tramped a total of 168 miles to and from the car, on bush trails, with snow four feet deep in places, and with a temperature averaging 52 degrees below zero. Pupils of such sturdy types as these, and with such a thirst for knowledge, should in future make excellent citizens, and will no doubt amply justify any reasonable outlay made on their behalf.

In addition to its usefulness as a day school, the School Car becomes a temporary educational centre for every point at which it makes a stop. Evening classes are held for adults, eager to learn English, Classes are conducted also for these grown-ups in reading, writing, arithmetic, and the social studies. Library books, magazines, and other reading matter are lent till the car comes back on its next visit. These cars practically transform the entire life of the people in these sequestered communities.

### School for the Blind

The total enrolment in this school for 1935 was 142. Of this number twenty-one were admitted in September, 1935; fourteen left in June, and two others after October 1, leaving an enrolment of 126 at the end of the year.

The courses of study laid down in Departmental regulations for sight-seeing pupils are closely followed in all the subjects except art. In this subject special attention is devoted to modelling and sculpture, in the endeavour to develop the faculty of "spatial" sensing of objects. The High School department is setting out for the first time with full matriculation as the goal for all students capable of taking the work.

Musical instruction is given, in so far as is possible, to every child who desires it and who shows himself capable of making progress in this study; but, on account of the insufficiency of the staff of music teachers, it has been found impossible to give lessons in instrumental music to all who would like to take them. A symphony orchestra of twenty-seven pieces has been organized, and at the June concert performed such selections as "La Diademe" by Hermon, and "Butterfly", by Bright. Last year, at the Stratford Musical Festival, one of the pupils competed with fourteen other contestants from various parts of Ontario in the open baritone class and was successful in winning the silver medal. On request, the students have furnished during the year two complete concerts at rural churches and have also supplied request numbers on programmes for outside organizations almost every week.

Extra-curricula activities are encouraged, and several student clubs have been formed. The senior girls' club, "The Merry Makers" raised fifty dollars at a bazaar during the fall term and devoted a goodly portion of this sum to buying Christmas cheer for a needy family of seven. The intermediate boys have a Scout Troup, and the intermediate girls a Girl Guide Company. An annual picnic at Simcoe has been instituted for the students; transportation was furnished this year by the Brantford Rotarians, who seemed to enjoy the trip as much as did the students themselves. Simcoe Kinsmen's Club invited the students as guests to their beautiful and well-equipped recreational park

and enjoyed the associations so much that they have asked the privilege of making it an annual event.

High commendation is due to Principal Vallentyne and his loyal and devoted staff for the excellent work they are doing in this school.

### School for the Deaf

The enrolment for the School for the Deaf on December 31, 1935, was 155 boys and 134 girls, or a total of 289, drawn from forty-nine counties and districts of Ontario.

Originally, very little oral work was done, but during the regime of Dr. Coughlin, who was Superintendent from 1906 to 1928, the school was completely transformed from a manual to an oral institution.

Last year, Dr. Amoss, Inspector of Auxiliary Classes, was placed in charge as Acting Superintendent. He devoted a great deal of attention to still further improving the courses of study, especially by making provision for a more complete course in vocational subjects and by giving the older students who were not academically inclined opportunities for shop work.

The course of study in use at present is based on the regular Departmental course for Public and Separate Schools, with modifications planned to meet the special needs of deaf children. Dr. Amoss was relieved of his duties as Acting Superintendent on October 1, 1935, and on the same date Mr. W. J. Morrison, formerly Inspector of Public Schools for the City of Brautford, was appointed Superintendent.

Mr. Morrison has earned an excellent reputation as an Inspector and it is confidently expected that, under his management, the efficiency of the school will become even greater than it has been in the past.

### APPENDIX A FOR THE YEAR 1935

### REPORT OF THE CHIEF INSPECTOR OF PUBLIC AND SEPARATE SCHOOLS

### Changes in the Provincial Inspectoral Staff, 1935

### I. By Death:

Mr. Joseph L. Garvin, B.A., retired from active service as an inspector on August 31st, 1935, and was taken by death suddenly on September 18th, 1935. He had been in failing health for some months. Mr. Garvin was born at Midhurst, Simcoe County, in 1866. He received his early education at the Midhurst Public School and the Barrie Collegiate Institute, and graduated from the University of Toronto in 1892. He taught in public schools in Simcoe County and in the Lakefield and Woodbridge Continuation Schools. In 1911 he was appointed a Public School Inspector in Simcoe County. As an inspector he worked faithfully for the improvement of the schools in his native county, and during his term of office marked improvement was made in the qualifications of the teachers and in the character of the work done in the schools.

Mr. T. W. Standing, B.A., who had retired on December 31st, 1931, as Public School Inspector for the County of Brant, died on January 24th, 1936. Mention was made in the Minister's Report for 1931 of his outstanding services

as a teacher and inspector.

Mr. W. F. Bald, B.A., LL.B., Public School Inspector for Bruce County (West) until his retirement on December 31st, 1934, died on February 19th, 1936, at his home in Port Elgin. Mr. Bald had served as a Public School Inspector very successfully from September 1st, 1910.

### II. RESIGNATIONS:

Mr. J. F. Sullivan, B.A., I.L.D., resigned as Separate School Inspector for the City of Hamilton on August 30th, 1935. Dr. Sullivan was born in Ennismore Township, Peterborough County. His elementary and secondary education and professional training were received in Ennismore Township, the Peterborough Collegiate Institute, the Port Hope Model School, and the Ottawa Normal School. In 1904 he obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree from Queen's University, and in 1935 the honorary doctorate degree was conferred on him by the University of Western Ontario. Dr. Sullivan taught for twenty-one years in public and separate schools in Ennismore Township, Ottawa, and Ottawa Normal-Model School before being appointed a Separate School Inspector in 1907. His teaching experience was followed by twenty-eight years of experience as an inspector. He was first given an inspectorate in Northern Ontario in 1907. He was transferred to the London area in 1908, and finally to the Hamilton area in 1924. From his earliest teaching experience to his final responsibilities as an inspector Dr. Sullivan proved himself to be a teacher of outstanding merit and an educational leader. His services on examination boards and educational committees under the Department of Education were always most valuable.

Mr. Thomas Preston, B.A., B.Paed., retired as Public School Inspector for Essex County (No. 1) on September 30th, 1935. Mr. Preston was a native of

the Township of Esquesing in Halton County and, after completing the public school course in his home township, he attended the Oakville and Georgetown High Schools and Woodstock College. In 1888 he graduated from the University of Toronto, obtaining his B.A. degree with honours in Science. In 1911 he completed the requirements for the Bachelor of Paedagogy degree. Mr. Preston in addition to early public school teaching experience in Caledon Township, gave very successful service in the high schools of Forest, North Bay, Perth, Renfrew, Barrie, Markdale, Chatsworth, Ridgetown, and Wheatley. From his appointment to the public school inspectorate in Essex County (North) in July, 1924, to his retirement, Mr. Preston rendered faithful service and the schools of his inspectorate made marked progress during this period.

Mr. H. B. Fetterly, M.A., B.Paed., resigned as Public School Inspector for York County (No. 1) on September 1st, 1935. He was appointed Public School Inspector for Dundas County in 1918. At midsummer, 1930, he was appointed Superintendent of the Ontario School for the Deaf at Belleville, and on September 1st, 1934, he accepted transfer to the public school inspectorate of York County (No. 1), with residence at Aurora. During his early experience as a public school teacher and principal in Eastern Ontario and as an assistant and principal later in the Cornwall High School, Mr. Fetterly gave valuable service, and as an inspector he was an aggressive leader in advancing the interests of elementary

education in the areas where he laboured.

Mr. L. A. Marlin, M.A., resigned as Public School Inspector for Welland County West, Lincoln County (in part), and Haldimand County (in part), on July 1st, 1935, on account of ill health. Mr. A. A. Jordan, B.A., B.Paed., who retired in August, 1934, had acted as inspector in Mr. Marlin's area during the school year 1934-35. Mr. Marlin had been appointed a Public School Inspector for the District of Cochrane in 1922 and on September 1st, 1931, was transferred from Cochrane to Welland. He was a native of Simcoe County. After some elementary school teaching experience he attended Queen's University and graduated with First Class Honours in 1910, obtaining the gold medal in Chemistry. He had a very successful experience as a Science Master in secondary schools from 1910 to 1922. In the District of Cochrane Mr. Marlin did splendid work in the organization of new schools and in helping to secure for the new settlers qualified and successful teachers, efficient schools and good school buildings.

Mr. W. J. Morrison, B.A., resigned at midsummer, 1935, as Public School Inspector for the City of Brantford, to accept the principalship of the Ontario School for the Deaf at Belleville. He began his new duties on October 1st, 1935. Mr. Morrison had served on the staffs of the high schools at Dutton, Listowel, and Bowmanville before becoming a Public School Inspector, and his work was always outstanding. In the City of Brantford, during his term of office as inspector from September 1st, 1929, to September 30th, 1935, the public schools made rapid progress and Mr. Morrison received at all times the hearty co-operation of the Board of Education, the teaching staff, and the parents.

### III. APPOINTMENTS:

The following were appointed to the provincial staff of Inspectors during 1935:—

Mr. D. M. Eagle, Principal of the English-French Training School at Sandwich to Essex County (No. 1) to succeed Mr. Thomas Preston, B.A., B.Paed. His duties began on September 1st, 1935, with residence in Windsor.

Mr. W. F. Hiscocks, B.A., Principal of the Northern Academy, Monteith, to District Division IX, to succeed Mr. W. R. McVittie, B.A. His duties began

September 1st, 1935, with residence at Monteith.

Mr. J. M. Kaine, B.A., Principal of the English-French Training School, Sturgeon Falls, to District Division XI to succeed Mr. R. A. A. McConnell, B.A. This inspectorate had been vacant for a period of one year. Mr. Kaine's duties began September 1st, 1935, with residence at Haileybury.

Mr. Russell Reid, B.A., Principal of Bellview Public School, Brantford, to

the City of Brantford. His duties began on October 11th, 1935.

Mr. Leo J. Langan, B.A., of the teaching staff of the Ontario School for the Blind, Brantford, to Roman Catholic Separate School Division XII to succeed Mr. J. V. Scanlan, B.A. Mr. Langan's duties began September 1st, 1935, with residence in Toronto.

### IV. TRANSFERS:

Mr. W. A. Marshall, B.A., B.Paed., was transferred from Lincoln County to Welland County to succeed Mr. L. A. Marlin, M.A. Mr. Marshall had been giving temporary service for one year in Lincoln County due to the illness of the Inspector, Mr. G. A. Carefoot. Mr. Marshall's residence is in Welland.

Mr. W. R. McVittie, B.A., was transferred from District Division IX to Simcoe County (Centre), to succeed Mr. J. L. Garvin, B.A. Mr. McVittie's

duties began September 1st, 1935, with residence at Barrie.

Mr. R. H. Roberts, M.A., was transferred from Waterloo County (No. 1) to York County (No. 1), to succeed Mr. H. B. Fetterly, M.A., B.Paed. Mr. Roberts' duties began September 1st, 1935, with residence in Toronto.

Mr. J. V. Scanlan, B.A., was transferred from Roman Catholic Separate School Division XII to Roman Catholic Separate School Division XI, to succeed Dr. J. F. Sullivan. Mr. Scanlan began his duties on September 1st, 1935, with residence in Hamilton.

### Problems and Progress

At midsummer, 1935, it was quite evident that in both urban and rural centres the tendency to reduce drastically the salaries of teachers was drawing to an end, and while some further decreases took place, particularly in the rural areas, the net result was to leave the salaries largely where they had been during the school year 1934-35.

The amendment made to Section 109 of The Public Schools Act at the session of the Legislature for 1935, making it illegal for a rural school board to share in the general township school grant if a salary lower than \$500.00 per annum were paid to the teacher, had a definite effect in pegging the minimum salaries for rural teachers. It must be stated, however, that in the vast majority of cases rural boards were aware that teachers' salaries were reaching levels much too low, and many trustees were finding it necessary to resist the tendency to engage the cheapest teacher available, realizing that in the interests of the children the first requirement was a good teacher at a reasonable salary. Due largely to the betterment in economic outlook, as shown in teachers' salaries, the inspectors found it possible to approach boards again for needed school accommodation and equipment, and as the new year of 1936 begins, there seems to be a greater possibility that these needs will be met.

The records of the Department show splendid school progress in many inspectorates during the year. The inspector's work was made very heavy because of the number of school surveys being made by the Department; but,

in spite of this fact, the majority of the inspectors initiated and promoted new features in the schools and were able to accomplish more than the required minimum number of official visits to the schools.

While the work of the inspectors is criticized from time to time, and while it is always possible for criticism to outweigh much good work not receiving public comment, it is evident to the officials of the Department of Education at all times that were it not for the quiet, effective, and successful work being done by the Public and Separate School Inspectors, the elementary schools of the province would fall far short of their present accomplishment.

### The Training of Teachers-in-Service

Both academic and professional training are most essential in the teacher's preparation for his work. These types of training, however, are not sufficient if the teacher is to render the best service of which he is capable. They must be supplemented by years of experience in which the teacher grows in wisdom, tact, good judgment, versatility, inspiration, and teaching ability. For the teacher who is fortunate enough to be employed in a graded school under the helpful supervision of a capable principal, the opportunities for development are exceptional; but for the teacher who is inexperienced and is engaged in an ungraded school, many perplexing problems arise which baffle his ingenuity. As a help to all teachers, but especially to those who have not the guidance of a competent principal, the Public and Separate School Inspectors of the province have just completed a work entitled "The Training of Teachers-in-Service." The book consists of sixteen chapters, each chapter dealing with an important phase of the problem—the improvement of the teacher while in actual service. An inspector was selected as editor for each chapter, while, associated with him in the study, were eight or nine other inspectors. An editorial committee of three was appointed to review the contributions and to unify and co-ordinate them.

The book is a splendid contribution to educational thought and experience, and should be very helpful to those teachers who are desirous of giving the very best service possible for them to give. The inspectors are to be congratulated for the successful effort they have made. The book, "The Training of Teachers-in-Service," will be the theme for the Inspectors' Section of the Ontario Educational Association at Easter, 1936.

### Railway School Cars

During the past year this service has been improved and extended by the addition of a sixth car operating on the Canadian National Railways between Sioux Lookout and the Manitoba boundary. This car is now caring for 42 children, of all ages from five to sixteen years and of all public school grades, on a one-hundred-and-forty-mile circuit. These pupils are of many racial origins, English, Dutch, French, German, Swiss, Indian, Ukrainian, Swedish, Spanish, Czecho-Slovakian, but, all without exception, equally absorbed in acquiring a good Canadian education. These isolated groups of settlers are highly appreciative of the rapid progress of the pupils and the varied services rendered. A surprising fact is that, despite a winter temperature of sometimes 55° below zero, the school cars functioned fully every day with almost 100% attendance. At one point, seven pupils in five days tramped a total of 168 miles to and from the car on nothing but bush trails, with snow four feet deep in places, and a temperature averaging 52° below zero.

The School Car fills a much larger place than that of an ordinary day-school. Library books and magazine reading matter are supplied for parents and pupils. radio programmes and talks by the teachers furnish an instructive past-time, and adult evening classes give training in English speech, reading and writing, history, geography, arithmetic, and business methods allied to occupational life. The car acts as a clearing house for ideas and practical problems, and training in home craft, together with social amenities and school contacts, serve to transform the entire life of these sequestered communities. There are practically no persons of non-Anglo-Saxon origin who are not now full-fledged Canadian citizens.

### Correspondence Courses

The correspondence courses were inaugurated by the Department of Education ten years ago. They began with an enrolment of 50 pupils. has increased until it is now nearly 2,000. These courses were established on the recommendation of the Associated Boards of Trade in Northern Ontario, who were out of reach of any school and whose parents were engaged in useful pioneer work. Those eligible for admission to the courses are:-

Children of school age who are so far from a school that they are unable to attend

during any part of the year.

Those who are able to attend school during part of the year, but during the winter months are unable to attend because of the bad condition of the roads or on account of the school being closed.

(3) Persons of school age who, by reason of physical condition, are unable to attend

school but who are mentally capable of doing the correspondence lessons.

(4) Other cases considered on their merits.

At present the courses cover the entire public school course of study from the Primer Grade to the end of the Fifth Class. The enrolment includes nearly one hundred cases of crippled or diseased children in various parts of the province who are physically unable to attend a day-school. A parent whose child's school work was carried on while he was physically unable to attend school states—"We cannot say enough in appreciation of the correspondence courses." Another mother whose children took the courses for several years states that she is unable to express her gratitude for this means of educating her children. These are typical of the many expressions of appreciation that have been received. Already 65 of the pupils enrolled have passed the High School Entrance examination. The correspondence lessons have also been sent to several of the Ontario Hospitals for the use of long-term patients. In these cases the answers are not returned for correction.

The courses were extended to include Fifth Class work in September, 1935, and already 50 pupils are enrolled in that class. The average cost per annum per enrolled pupil, including all expenditures, is about \$10.00. This is about one-sixth of the cost of education in the average rural school.

### Interchange of Teachers Within the British Empire

For the school-year 1935-36, 43 teachers from Ontario are on exchange. Of these, 27 are on exchange with Overseas teachers and 16 are on exchange with teachers in other provinces of Canada. This is the largest number of Ontario teachers on exchange in any one year for the past ten years. Those who have been privileged to participate in these exchanges speak very highly of the many advantages to be derived from a year of exchange, some even stating that they believe it to be of more advantage than a year of study at a university. The present King Edward VIII, when Prince of Wales, expressed himself as greatly in favour of the interchange of teachers within the British Empire.

To show that these exchanges are not confined to any one part of the province it may be stated that the Ontario teachers at present on exchange are from Kenora, Kirkland Lake, North Bay, Penetanguishene, Windsor, Chatham, London, St. Catharines, St. Thomas, Streetsville, York County, Toronto, Peterborough, Ottawa, etc. With the exception of the War years, the Teachers' Exchange system within the British Empire has been in operation since 1912.

The total attendance was 3,351. For the past three years a fee of \$10.00 has been charged for admission to any of the summer courses. This fee pays only part of the total cost of the courses and seems to be regarded by the majority of teachers as reasonable.

### Music

During the trying times through which we have been passing, it has been felt by many that children need a more intimate acquaintance with the Arts, and that Music, particularly, has a definite part to play in the lives of our youth by providing means of self-expression, emotional outlet, and worthy use of leisure time. In this respect Ontario has not kept abreast of some other parts of the Dominion or the Empire.

In September, 1935, Mr. G. Roy Fenwick, Mus. Bac., was appointed Provincial Supervisor of Music, and it is hoped that, with special attention to the subject, Music may be brought to nearly all the children in the elementary and secondary schools of the province. There appears to be a real desire on the part of parents and trustees to have Music taught in the schools, as is shown by a steady growth in the number of supervised schools during the past few years. Some of the larger urban centres have included Music in the curriculum for many years but, until about five years ago, Music in rural schools was rarely taught by special teachers. By means of monthly visits by qualified supervisors, augmented by daily drill by the regular teacher, Music is now becoming a vital force in many communities, and the influence of these sections is spreading to all parts of the province.

As the year closed, Mr. Fenwick's work gives promise of marked success and a rapid extension.

### School Health Supervision

The general acceptance of the premise that the school, both directly and indirectly, has a measure of responsibility for the present and future well-being of the attending pupils, has lessened the emphasis on school medical inspection. Not that the school health personnel have any less significant role to play in the well-rounded school programme, but their activities and interest are no longer viewed as a thing apart from the other phases of educational effort.

The unsoundness of the presumption that the health problem of the school would vanish into thin air by merely adding a physician, nurse, or dentist to the

school staff is realized by all those concerned with education.

The early realization that these services are not mere adjuncts but essential integrants of the well considered programme will aid materially in the much needed extension of school health supervision to those parts of the province not already served. While economic conditions do not lend themselves, at the moment, to the ready assumption by local authorities of any additional expenditure, no matter how warranted, consideration should be and is being given to the early extension of some practicable form of regular medical inspection of all pupils.

### Rural School Fairs, 1935

The popularity of rural school fair work is not waning. During the past year 520 rural school fairs were held in which 4,397 schools participated and 110,092 boys and girls were enrolled. This represents approximately 72% of all the rural public and separate schools in the province. All told, 335,878 entries were made at the school fairs and over 300,000 people were in attendance.

Since rural school fairs play an important part in rural school activities, a special effort is being made to link up more closely the lessons in Agriculture in the schools with the school fair programme. Education is the aim, and all thought and plans conform to this idea. The Department of Education paid for all seeds, the distribution of which was under the supervision of the Agricultural

Representatives of the Department of Agriculture.

Close co-operation exists between the Public and Separate School Inspectors and the Agricultural Representatives. While the management of the fairs is in the hands of the Agricultural Representatives, the inspectors advise and confer with the Representatives from time to time about all topics relating to the programme. They aid in drafting the prize-list, generally assist with the management on school-fair day, assume responsibility for judging the writing, art, essays, nature study, and collections, and generally take charge of such features of the afternoon programme as public speaking, Strathcona exercises, and contests of a similar nature.

A comprehensive prize list is issued, giving ample opportunity for boys and girls to exhibit produce from their home gardens and to show their handiwork in manual training, sewing, cooking, art, writing, and nature study collections. Provision is also made for classes in live stock—calves, colts, and lambs—poultry, and fruit.

School-fair day is a "red letter" day for the boys and girls. They enter heartily into such competitions as judging live stock, fruit and vegetable naming, button-hole making, patching a grain bag, darning a sock, identification of weeds, public speaking, recitations, music, and Strathcona exercises. The judges always make a practice of giving reasons for their placings in many classes in

order that the boys and girls may take home some valuable information and be in a position to improve their exhibits at the fair the next year.

Teachers, trustees, and parents all co-operate to the fullest extent possible in making the rural school fair a worth-while community enterprise.

### Auxiliary Classes

Since the previous Annual Report, fourteen new Training and Promotion Classes for direct learning children have been opened up as follows:—

One class in each of Pembroke, Collingwood, New Toronto, Orillia, and Weston has been discontinued owing to the present financial stringency. With the exception of four of the smaller cities and several of the larger towns, auxiliary class work in the urban centres of Ontario may be considered as more or less fully organized.

A recent publication entitled, "Subsequent Careers of Non-academic Boys," by Dr. Florence S. Dunlop, Psychologist of the Ottawa Public Schools, tells how efficiently these schools are functioning in training for good citizenship those children who find particular difficulty in making progress in the ordinary grades.

While auxiliary education in urban communities has been thus making satisfactory progress, the greatest advancement is to be seen in the extension of this work to small towns, villages, and rural communities. Dundas County and Separate School Division XV were completely surveyed in 1935, and special educational facilities afforded to all the boys and girls in rural and village schools who stood in need of special assistance. There are now in operation throughout the rural and small urban centres of the province 34 orthopaedic and home instruction units for physically incapacitated children; 115 sight-saving units; and 333 training units. Many crippled children are likewise making excellent progress by means of correspondence courses provided under the supervision of Mr. Neil McDougall of the Department. There are to be found no educable crippled children throughout Ontario who are not now being looked after. 241 of the probable 350 visually defective children are now receiving special attention, and the indications are that within the next two or three years all backward children in non-urban districts will be in receipt of needed attention as a result of county surveys.

### Penny Bank

For a number of years Ministers of Education have given approval to the work of the Penny Bank of Ontario in the public and separate schools of the province. The Bank is administered by a board of directors composed of Professor M. A. Mackenzie of the University of Toronto as President, of leading banking officials and business man, and of school trustees and school officials. The object of the Bank is to encourage the practice of thrift by the pupils in the elementary schools. Deposits are made once a week in the class-room and

the money is sent to a local banking office where the ledger is kept. Each pupil depositor has his own pass-book and his account earns interest at the current bank rate.

During the year 1935 the number of schools in Ontario using the Penny Bank increased from 467 to 480, and the total amount on deposit increased from \$1,208,315.28 to \$1,254,993.53. This increase is noteworthy, in view of the fact that many deposits were withdrawn by the pupils during the year for clothing, high school books, summer outings, Christmas gifts, and other purposes.

The chief value of the work of the Penny Bank in the schools does not lie, however, in the amount of money saved, but in the habits of money management developed by regularity in making deposits, such as foresight in providing for future needs and self-control in making a choice between spending money for a present trifle or saving it for a larger purchase at a future date. That the work of the Penny Bank is making a definite contribution to the education of the girls and boys in these ways is evidenced by the large number of schools in which more than 40 per cent. of the enrolment makes deposits each week.

### General Conditions

There was some improvement in elementary school conditions during the year 1935, due in a measure to the higher prices for commodities and farm products and to a step-up generally in business. It was easier, therefore, for ratepayers to pay their school taxes and for boards of trustees to finance the maintenance of their schools. The revenues of the province, however, had not recovered sufficiently, after meeting the increased disbursements for relief, to pay the legislative grants in full. No schools were closed at any time during the year for lack of funds, and the assisted grants to schools of low assessment were actually reduced from \$142,795.98 in 1934 to \$115,551.55 in 1935. Legislative grants on equipment were \$90,701.53, meaning that the total amount spent by rural boards of trustees in new equipment for their schools was approximately \$325,000, which is about \$20 per classroom, a very good indication of the effort being made to provide better school conditions for the children. The salaries of teachers appear to be becoming more stable. The minimum salary set by the Legislature helped very materially to arrest the downward trend. In this connection it should be said that even during the trying years through which we have passed, when teachers' salaries were being reduced from year to year, the teachers carried on as usual, giving their best in the interests of their pupils and, in addition, co-operating whole-heartedly with different organizations whose objective is the welfare of the children.

It is hoped that, as economic conditions improve further, our elementary schools will make more rapid progress.

### General Remarks

The information and short articles in this report have come from many sources. Dr. J. T. Phair, Chief Medical Officer, Department of Health, and Mr. R. S. Duncan, B.S.A., Director of Agricultural Representatives, Department of Agriculture, have contributed the information relating to their special fields of work. In the Department of Education my colleagues, Dr. J. B. MacDougall, Mr. J. D. Campbell, Mr. Neil McDougall, and Mr. G. Roy Fenwick have made contributions relating to the school activities under their charge.

### APPENDIX B

### REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL INSPECTORS

For the second year in succession the enrolment in the High Schools and Collegiate Institutes has shown a decrease. In 1933-34 the total enrolment for the Province was 590 less than in the preceding year, while in 1934-35 there was a further decrease of 536. Although there was an increase in the number of pupils attending the Middle School classes, there was a decrease in the attendance of both the Lower and the Upper Schools. The decrease in the Upper School enrolment was rather striking as there were 680 fewer Upper School pupils enrolled than in 1933-34. The decrease was no doubt due in many cases to the improvement in the employment situation. On the other hand, there was an increase of 66 in the number of teachers employed; and the congestion of classes which existed in many schools prior to 1933 became gradually less acute.

In several municipalities new schools have been built and in others the accommodations have been improved. At Madoc a new high school has replaced the old building, which was destroyed by fire; the town of Merritton has erected a fine new building; while at Schumacher, which formerly had no high school, there now stands one of the finest and best-equipped secondary schools in Ontario. In Toronto the Lawrence Park Collegiate was planned to meet the needs of the overcrowded area of North Toronto and will be ready for occupation in September. During the same period an unusually fine gymnasium was built as an extension of the Collegiate Institute at St. Thomas.

During the year the Continuation Schools at Bancroft, Capreol, Dryden, Englehart, Gore Bay, Iroquois Falls, Keewatin, Lucknow, Mattawa, and

Sturgeon Falls were raised to the status of High Schools.

Experiments both in curricula and in methods of approach to the subjects have been conducted in some schools. With a view to making better provision for the needs of pupils who may not continue to study the regular courses, the Collegiates at Oshawa, Scarboro, and East York have been experimenting with a first year general course which permits of certain options. At the beginning of the second year a division is effected, based on the aptitudes and interests of the pupils, as these have been observed during the first year of their course. In this year a limited amount of specialization is begun and subjects which were omitted from the first year programme are now allotted additional time. It is too soon to generalize on the results of these experiments; but so far as can be judged at the present time, they appear to be working satisfactorily.

In certain schools experiments in language study were begun during the year. In twenty of the larger secondary schools the teaching of French by the "reading approach" has been undertaken. In each of these schools one first-year class is being conducted according to the reading method, while the other first-year classes are following the traditional plan. In nine other Collegiate Institutes two new text-books in Latin were temporarily introduced. In these schools three-first year classes are selected; one class uses the authorized text-book, and each of the other two classes is making use of one of the new texts. These experiments in language study should provide valuable information with respect to teaching methods as well as to the comparative value of the text-books that

are being used.

The teaching of Music in secondary schools has been stimulated by the appointment of a Provincial Supervisor of Music—Mr. G. R. Fenwick, Mus.Bac., formerly Supervisor of Music in the schools of Hamilton. The importance of Music as a cultural subject is being more fully realized than ever before; and there is no doubt that in a very short time it will occupy an important place in our secondary school programme.

In 1934-35 the teachers of High Schools and Collegiate Institutes were given the privilege of recommending pupils on their year's work in subjects of the Upper School. This was an extension of the recommendation system which was used for the first time for Middle School subjects in 1931-32. The plan is still in the experimental stage, but it has met with the approval of the Principals

and teachers of the Province.

Many high school teachers took advantage of the opportunities afforded by Summer Courses to improve their professional standing. No fewer than 270 were enrolled in the Summer Courses of 1935. These included 132 in Physical Education, 65 in Art, 33 in Agriculture, and 26 in Music. The Courses in Refresher Science and in Oral French were also well attended. These Summer Courses are making a valuable contribution to the efficiency of the teaching in many schools and the teachers are to be commended for their evident desire to take advantage of them.

The Morning Assembly is playing an increasingly important part in school life. In many of the larger schools where there is an auditorium the pupils assemble each morning for the opening exercises, which usually include the reading of the Scriptures, prayer, and the singing of a hymn or a school song. Occasionally a musical selection or a brief address is given. Opening exercises conducted in this way are exceedingly valuable in promoting a good school spirit and

constitute a good beginning for the daily work of the class-room.

The following teachers with thirty or more years' experience in Ontario Collegiate Institutes and High Schools retired from the profession during the year: John P. Hume, Goderich Collegiate Institute; Alexander M. Robertson, Goderich Collegiate Institute; John H. Cameron, London Central Collegiate Institute; W. B. L. Howell, Port Arthur Collegiate Institute; A. E. Coombs, St. Catharines Collegiate Institute; Carl Lehmann, Malvern Avenue Collegiate Institute, Toronto; Ralph Ross, Georgetown High School; and Thomas Hobbs, Kenora High School.

We record with deep regret the death of the following after twenty or more years of service: James Davison, Principal Emeritus, Guelph Collegiate Institute; R. A. Grav, formerly Principal of Oakwood Collegiate Institute,

### APPENDIX C

### REPORT OF THE INSPECTORS OF CONTINUATION SCHOOLS

At the end of 1934 there were 220 Continuation Schools in the Province, of which 61 were operating with staffs of three teachers or more. There were 145 two-teacher and 14 one-teacher schools. During 1935 the following became High Schools,—Bancroft, Capreol, Dryden, Englehart, Gore Bay, Iroquois Falls, Lucknow, Keewatin, Mattawa, South Porcupine, and Sturgeon Falls. A new Grade "C" school was established at Fraserdale. At the end of 1935 there were 210 Continuation Schools, of which 56 were three-teacher, 140 were two-teacher, and 14 were one-teacher schools.

Of the 482 teachers employed in Continuation Schools, 47.1% were men and 52.9% were women. The average salary of Principals was \$1427.00, of Assistants \$1048.00, and of all teachers \$1214.00. The fact that the decrease for the year was only \$28.00, despite general economic conditions and an oversupply of teachers seeking positions, reflects the fair-minded attitude of Boards

of Trustees in engaging and re-engaging teachers.

It is gratifying to note the increase in the number of university graduates employed in Continuation Schools. In 1933 the percentage of graduates was 35.02. In 1934 this had increased to 44.22, and in 1935 the percentage was 52.49. While this increase is due, in part, to the supply of young graduates available, the efforts of experienced teachers to improve their academic standing have also been a contributing factor. Many have carried on college work extramurally, using their vacation periods for self-advancement, and each year a number have given up their positions in order to enter University and complete their courses for degrees. The importance of the work done in the Continuation Schools is reflected in the definite trend towards more highly qualified teachers.

It is a pleasure to be able to report that, generally speaking, Boards of Trustees are desirous of maintaining school accommodations at a satisfactory standard. The fact that Boards are willing to provide necessary equipment during the difficult times of the last few years has facilitated efficient teaching and made possible the success which the schools have attained. The interest which Boards are showing in courses of study, in the introduction of Music, and the place of Agriculture in the schools, is especially worthy of mention.

While suitable buildings and adequate equipment are desirable, the most important factor in the life of any school is the teacher. Many of our Continuation School teachers are young and comparatively inexperienced; the range of subjects is wide and the work is strenuous. However, their initiative, earnestness, and enthusiasm are doing much to overcome all disadvantages and difficulties, and the character of the work done by the pupils compares very favourably with that done by pupils in larger schools with more experienced and more highly qualified staffs.

In November, 1935, one of the outstanding officials of the Ontario Department of Education, Mr. G. K. Mills, retired from active work and accepted superannuation, after having served for nearly a quarter of a century as Inspector of Continuation Schools. By his earnest devotion to duty and his interest in, and enthusiasm for, the extension of secondary school education in rural communities, Mr. Mills has rendered a truly great service to the Province. For

many years, in the rural parts of southern Ontario and in all parts of northern Ontario, Mr. Mills devoted his efforts largely to bringing about the establishment of Continuation Schools, in order that the opportunity of securing high school training might be opened to those children living far from High Schools. Mr. Mills devoted his whole adult life to the cause of education in his native province, and through his scholarship, his skill in teaching and supervising, and his enthusiasm, rendered a fine service to education in Ontario. He carries with him in his retirement the best wishes of a host of friends.

In September, 1935, all the Collegiates, High Schools, and Continuation Schools were grouped together for purposes of inspection. Mr. F. P. Gavin, Principal of the Ontario Training College for Technical Teachers, was added to the staff of High and Continuation School Inspectors for the year 1935-36. The Province was divided into seven districts, one of which was assigned to each Inspector. By this arrangement each Inspector will become acquainted with the character of the work done in all types of secondary schools. The plan will also make for economy, as it will reduce considerably the amount of travelling necessary for inspection.

### APPENDIX D

### REPORT ON THE SCHOOLS ATTENDED BY FRENCH-SPEAKING PUPILS, 1935-36.

A detailed report on the schools attended by French-speaking pupils for the school year 1934-35 was contained in the previous Report of the Minister of Education. As the present survey covers only the fall term, from September until December, 1935, the amount of data available is insufficient to make a

comprehensive report on these schools.

It should be noted, however, that the number of French-speaking teachers who hold First or Second Class certificates was 68.8 per cent. of the teaching staff in September, 1935. This number represents an increase of approximately 9 per cent. of such teachers over the previous year. Over 200 students are now in attendance at the University of Ottawa Normal School, and it is expected that, within two or three years, practically all the French-speaking teachers will have the higher qualifications. In view of the importance of the qualification of the teacher in relation to the education of the children, it may properly be assumed that the schools which are attended by French-speaking pupils will continue to improve rapidly.

### APPENDIX E

### REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF PROFESSIONAL TRAINING

### Requirements for Admission to the Normal Schools

The advance of the academic qualifications for admission to Normal Schools at the beginning of the 1935-36 session by the requirement of Upper School standing has resulted in the reduction of the attendance of teachers-in-training by more than twenty per cent. This higher standard will doubtless have a twofold effect. In the first place, the decreased output of the training schools will permit many of the unemployed graduates of previous years to secure positions; and in the second place, better academic qualifications will result in a superior body of teachers. Henceforth no interim certificates lower than First Class will be issued in the Province except to graduates of the University of Ottawa Normal School, to whom Second Class certificates must continue to be granted for some time for service in the schools attended by French-speaking pupils.

### Improvement in Professional Qualifications

The Regulations with respect to Permanent certificates have given a great impetus to the improvement of professional standing. The enthusiasm with which the teachers are seizing the opportunities offered for that purpose is an indication of the high ideals which actuate the profession as a whole. In the summer of 1935 more than three thousand teachers took advantage of the summer courses provided by the Department of Education to improve their standing, while many hundreds of others attended courses offered by the universities. The summer schools are doing an excellent work in the post-graduate training of the teachers of this Province. It requires little imagination to visualize, in the not very distant future, a teaching staff in our elementary schools consisting almost exclusively of teachers holding First Class certificates or university degrees. Even among the holders of Permanent Second Class certificates there is a marked trend towards the securing of higher qualifications.

### Changes in Staff

In December, 1935, Miss Annie M. Delaney, who had given faithful and efficient service for many years as a teacher in the Ottawa Normal-Model School, retired. Her place was filled by Miss A. M. Patricia Stafford.

### Jubilee of the Ottawa Normal School

In 1935 the Ottawa Normal School completed the sixtieth year of its history. On October 10th and 11th the event was celebrated by class reunions, receptions, and public meetings. Addresses of a reminiscent nature were given by several graduates of the early years of the school. Portraits of former Principals, Dr. J. F. White and Dr. S. J. Keyes, were unveiled. The celebration closed with a dinner at the Chateau Laurier attended by more than sixteen hundred graduates. Established in 1875, the Ottawa Normal School is the second in age among the training schools of the Province, and is old enough to have traditions which are an inspiration to all students trained within its walls.

### Retirement of Mr. Duncan Walker

With the retirement of Mr. Duncan Walker on December 31st, 1935, the Department of Education relinquished the services of an educationist who had devoted many successful years to the training of teachers in this Province. After graduating with honours from the University of Toronto and teaching for a short period in High Schools, he became Inspector of the Public Schools of the City of Peterborough, and later was appointed Principal of the Peterborough Normal School, a position which he occupied for twenty-one years. In 1929 he was made Director of Professional Training in the Department of Education. During the long period of his connection with the training schools, many thousands of teachers have come under the influence of his inspiring personality.

### The Passing of Two Outstanding Principals

In the death of Dr. Sidney Silcox on June 29th, 1935. Ontario lost an educationist of outstanding ability and national reputation. He had been Principal of the Stratford Normal School for more than a quarter of a century, and had played a prominent part not only in the educational world but also in the social, civic, and religious life of his city. To their association with him in the classrooms of the Stratford Normal School, thousands of teachers owe in large measure their educational ideals.

The Province lost another eminent educationist in the death on May 18th, 1936, of Mr. William Prendergast, formerly Principal of the London Normal School. After a long service in the training of teachers, first as Separate School Inspector, and later in the Normal Schools at Toronto and London, he retired in 1931. His charming personality and scholarly attainments invariably won the admiration of his students.

### APPENDIX F

### REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF VOCATIONAL EDUCATION, 1934-35

During the past year the results achieved in the vocational schools have been gratifying, not only in regard to the quality of the work produced by the students, but also from the standpoint of administrative and instructional efficiency. This satisfactory situation is due, in no small measure, to the spirit of co-operation which has been carefully cultivated by the Provincial Inspectors among the staffs of the various schools. Principals and teachers, in their turn, have responded in a creditable manner to the gestures of assistance and suggestions for improvement which have been advanced. They have shown an openmindedness as to trends in organization, lesson-planning, and methods of teaching, which has contributed considerably to the smooth operation of a system of training differing widely from accepted academic standards. It is perhaps needless for me to point out that an organization, planned to include a variety of shop work in addition to classroom activities, presents a problem peculiar to this type of school, and localized according to the specific courses laid down in the widely-spread localities. Shop accommodation and equipment naturally restrict the size of classes in practical work, and the Principal and the staff must overcome the difficulties thus created.

### General Conditions

Many of the schools are crowded to capacity and have experienced difficulty in accommodating the influx of students. The outstanding feature of the year has been a marked improvement in the content of the courses throughout the various departments. Individual teachers, particularly in the practical subjects, have devoted considerable time and thought to the arrangement of the subject matter to be presented. The unit-lesson method is now being used in many classes. This method involves the preparation by the teacher of a series of lesson units, usually in typewritten or printed form. Lessons are drafted in such a way that the students may proceed in a regular and logical manner to find the solution of their problem by following instructions and deducing conclusions. Where necessary, reference is made to texts, the study of which is prerequisite to an understanding of the subject. This method reduces to a minimum the recitation lesson and, as a result, throws the pupil upon his own resources.

### Meeting the Demand

As evidence of actual improvement in economic conditions throughout the Province, Vocational Principals report a falling off in attendance in the senior classes towards the end of the school year. Generally, word is received that the student has secured employment. Employers are gradually learning that graduates of the vocational schools have received a preparation in both practical and academic work of value in a wide range of occupations. They realize that the desirable employee is one who not only has completed his course, but is recommended for employment by the Principal of the school. As a matter of fact, the recommendation of the Principal and his staff regarding the character and personal habits of the applicant is frequently regarded by employers as quite as important as the possession of a diploma. At all times the important point is kept before the public that Vocational schools were established to meet the demands of industry and business generally; that they are endeavouring to train young men and women so that they may enter upon employment with the minimum of adjustment; and it is safe to say that, if employers will exert themselves to co-operate with the schools, particularly through their special representatives on the Advisory Vocational Committees, they will find a supply of trained youth at their disposal, ready for immediate absorption.

### **Employment Contacts**

As an agency in securing employment for its graduates the vocationa's school has been of real value. The problem of finding work for the ever-increasing army of young people released from school year by year has been causing anxiety to those in authority, the world over. Opportunities for starting in life have been reduced to a minimum. In spite of adverse conditions, however, vocational schools have been successful in securing situations for many of their graduates. The following is an illustration which might be duplicated in many other municipalities.

In Peterborough during the years 1931 to 1935 inclusive, 97 students graduated from the Industrial Arts department of the vocational school. Of this number, 23 specialised in Electricity, 22 in Machine Shop Practice, 27 in Draughting, 12 in Motor Mechanics, and 13 in Woodworking. According to detailed information supplied by the school, 79 students are employed in occupations which have a direct relation to the training received; 7 are continuing their education; and 11 are unemployed. A voluntary report of this nature is most gratifying, furnishing, as it does, conclusive evidence that the vocational school actually prepares its pupils for industrial occupations.

Although the question of subsequent employment was not uppermost in mind when vocational education was inaugurated, and even though it might be held that such is not the function of an educational institution, there is no doubt that the natural result of familiarising young people with the basic processes of the several trades has been to stimulate their interest in some definite direction. This, after all, is probably the most effective and practical form of vocational guidance.

At this stage I should be remiss in my duty if I failed to pay a tribute to the valuable co-operation of the representatives of employers and employees (from the manufacturing, agricultural, commercial, and other industries), who have accepted membership on the Advisory Vocational Committees under which the schools operate. Such experience as theirs places at the disposal of School Boards a reservoir of helpful knowledge as to the essential needs of

Industry from the point of view of preparatory training, and also in regard to possible avenues of employment, without which the successful advances made would scarcely have been possible. It may not be an exaggeration to say that these intensely interested people form the pivot around which the vocational system revolves. The Vocational Education Act is so drafted that the Board may obtain the advice and assistance of the most active and informed people in the community. The desirability of taking advantage of such an opportunity is constantly emphasized, as providing a natural and positive link between the school and the prospective employer.

### Apprenticeship

The Provincial Apprenticeship Board which has been inactive for the past vear has been recently reorganized. "Automobile Mechanics" has been constituted a designated trade under the Act by request of the garage owners and their employees. This trade is prepared to give special recognition to boys trained in the vocational schools. Such an attitude may be regarded as a significant forward step, and should be considered by all trades operating in conjunction with The Apprenticeship Act. There can be little doubt that a boy who has had two or three years' training under qualified 'journeyman' teachers in preparation for a particular trade or occupation, and who has, during his course, covered the related English, mathematics, and science, is better prepared to undertake such work than one who has not had the advantage of this training. Employers have been short-sighted within recent years. In trying to avoid the expense of engaging beginners, they have merely succeeded in aggravating the shortage of skilled workmen. The present would be an opportune time for entering into an arrangement with the vocational schools for a part-time plan of training, under which the junior employee would return to school for at least two half-days per week during his employer's time and two evenings per week during his own time. This plan is working successfully in a number of countries and justifies more attention than has yet been given to it in the Province of Ontario. The project is recommended as worthy of consideration.

### Agricultural and Home-making Classes

A new phase of the year's work was the official transfer of the Agricultural and Homemaking classes of the Simcoe High School to operate under The Vocational Education Act. This department was organized in 1934 and has developed with considerable rapidity. Pupils are enrolled in a separate Agricultural and Home-making course. The work undertaken is definitely vocational and appears to be meeting the need of a group of young people who do not propose to prepare for University entrance. The progress made in Simcoe is indicative of what might be expected in any rural community where the subject of Agriculture with a genuine vocational bias is given a place. Recent amendments to the Regulations provide generous assistance towards the necessary capital outlay and for maintenance, and this should encourage school boards to proceed with the development of vocational agricultural and homemaking courses, which are so closely associated with the daily lives of the people.

### Commercial Schools and Departments

The Commercial Schools and Departments continue to fill an effective role in training pupils for commercial and business occupations. The larger schools report heavy enrolment of special pupils, some with three, four, or five years' High School standing. These pupils enter the vocational schools to obtain practical commercial training in preparation for employment. A bulletin has been issued by the Department of Education with the object of supplying guidance to instructors engaged in this work. Much care and attention have been devoted to the content of the several courses, which include the General Commercial course, a course in Accountancy and kindred subjects, and a Secretarial course, in addition to the special course for High School students already mentioned. The regular courses extend over periods varying from three to five years, while the special courses may be completed by pupils with previous High School training in from one to two years.

### Music

Encouragement is given, wherever possible, to the cultivation of a taste for good music and an appreciation of its interpretation, whether within or without the regular curriculum. Where classes in Music are provided under competent instructors, the usual grant on account of salaries is allowed, although the subject is not compulsory. Extra-curricular activities in instrumental music find a place in many of the schools, the teachers exhibiting a degree of self-sacrifice in promoting musical ideals and a music-consciousness which is beyond praise.

### Diploma Courses

The Committee appointed to draft a suitable four-year course of instruction leading to a Provincial Diploma is reporting progress from time to time and will be in a position to make its complete recommendations within the near future. Principals of vocational schools are a unit in support of such a course and signified their approbation by resolution at their last annual meeting in Toronto. It is felt that public opinion will quickly adjust itself to regard a diploma from the Department of Education as a standard of educational attainment, both authoritative and dependable. No effort has been spared by the Committee to enrich the course from an intellectual point of view, while retaining the basic vocational activities dictated by experience. It is hoped that the plan envisaged by the Committee will commend itself to your judgment.

### Changes in Grants

The condition of the public finances during the past several years having necessitated a percentage reduction in the grants to all types of schools, a revised plan of assistance to vocational schools has been prepared and announced for the school year of 1935-36. The new provision, it is hoped, will avoid the necessity of resorting to a reduction from the scale of grants provided in the Regulations and will serve as a guide to school boards in preparing their estimates. No change has been made in capital grants to which the Department is committed by agreement, and although a substantial reduction has been effected in the general grants to industrial and commercial day schools, special provision has been made to encourage the establishment of Agricultural and Home-making classes and towards the development of a programme of General Shop work in rural areas. The evening classes will benefit from the announced changes, and this should result in the reopening of many classes suspended during the past few years for lack of funds.

### Conclusion

We are living in an era of change, particularly in regard to scientific achievement. The worker of to-day must keep in touch with the times or be submerged

in the competition for employment in a world which is becoming more and more mechanized as civilization advances. It may be confidently asserted that the vocational school, with its wide facilities for study of the fundamentals involved in industrial, commercial, and agricultural progress, its homemaking propensities, and the example of its fine body of teachers, will contribute in no small measure to the prosperity of our country and the development of useful, informed, and happy citizens.

### APPENDIX H

### REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF AGRICULTURAL CLASSES

A survey of the reports on agricultural instruction for the year 1935 shows that there has been the usual increase in the number of schools undertaking the work. There has also been considerable improvement in the character of instruction in a large number of schools and in many communities Agriculture as a subject on the school curriculum is now well established. Although legislative grants for agricultural instruction have been reduced during the past five years, continued progress has been made, which indicates that the aims of the Department of Education in providing optional courses in Agriculture are appreciated and approved by those responsible for the control and management of elementary and secondary schools.

Except in those schools which are operating under the Vocational Education Act, Agriculture is an optional subject, and hence only a limited time can be given to the subject by teachers and pupils. While pupils may be influenced in their choice of a vocation by the instruction given, many other factors are involved in selecting an occupation and too much cannot be expected from the study of Agriculture under these conditions. These courses are of interest to the majority of pupils, provide for practical work in gardening, in beautification of school grounds and in home project activities, and are closely associated with the School Fair Programme in the rural schools.

Two phases of the work should be kept in mind. First, it is of importance to the rural pupil who is more or less familiar, through experience, with some phases of the subject matter discussed in the classes. These pupils are interested in methods of production. The value of this study to them lies in the consideration of the best methods of growing farm crops, rearing and care of poultry and live stock, and in the consideration of general principles developed by investigation and practice by the staffs of the Agricultural Colleges, agricultural experts, and practical farmers. In the second case, it is of importance to pupils of urban schools who have little knowledge from experience of methods of production, but who know farm products mainly as articles for consumption. Such pupils are interested in the sources of production and in the processes involved in preparing farm products for use. For example, a discussion of milk in the urban school might include the breeds of dairy cattle and the comparative fat content of the milk produced by each, how milk is supplied to people in larger towns and in the cities, and the importance of milk as a food. Similarly, poultry products, cereal grains, fruits and vegetables may be discussed to show how they are produced and processed for consumption. Moreover, in many urban centres, practical work in the growing of vegetables and flowers may be successfully carried on in garden plots at the school or in the home. In both rural and urban centres the attention of pupils should be directed to the importance of agricultural activities in the present day organization of society and to the opportunity offered for success in primary production, as well as in business and industry.

The system of agricultural instruction in the Province has been developed over a long period and, when viewed as a whole, provides a commendable organ-

ization. In the elementary and secondary schools the subject is taken as an introductory course in which many of the general principles are discussed and considerable attention given to practical applications. On leaving school, pupils engaged in farming may attend the Short Courses offered by the Department of Agriculture. Those who wish to take more advanced courses may attend the Ontario Agricultural College or the Kemptville Agricultural School. Thus the system provides for all according to their opportunities, ambitions, and abilities.

Now that the work is well established in the elementary schools, future efforts must be concerned with improvements in the methods of instruction and the qualifications of teachers. In secondary schools there is still a good deal of promotion work to be done, especially in those centres where most of the pupils are from rural homes. At present the supply of qualified teachers for these schools is adequate. Changes in the courses and improvements in methods of instruction are being made as required.

## Public and Separate Schools

The number of schools which have met the requirements of the Regulations and qualified for grants for Form III, Form IV, and Form V is shown on the abbreviated table given below:—

Last year there were 7,162 elementary schools in the province, and the above figures show that 75.7 per cent. reported giving instruction in Agriculture, as follows: 4,941 of 6119 rural schools, or 80.7 per cent., and 468 of 1043 urban schools, or 46.3 per cent. In many counties of Southern Ontario all rural schools are taking the work.

It will also be noted that there has been a marked increase in the number of school gardens in 1935 as compared with 1933 and 1934. In many schools excellent work is done in these gardens. The pupils are keenly interested in the preparation of the soil and the planting of seeds, and benefit from the practical instruction given under the teacher's direction. In many rural schools the potatoes, carrots, and other vegetables grown are used at the school for hot lunches during the winter. On the other hand, a school garden may not always be desirable, due to lack of proper soil, or of suitable provision for summer care, or for other reasons. These difficulties are recognized by the Regulations, which state that work in school gardening is optional.

In September, 1935, new courses in Agriculture were authorized by the Minister, and made available to teachers in Circular 56F. The subject matter is divided into four courses A, B, C, D, which are to be taken consecutively. In an ungraded school a pupil in passing from junior third to senior fourth will cover a comprehensive field of study. Assistance to the teacher is provided in the arrangement of the topics, with each of which is given a list of references, and suggestions concerning teaching methods. These courses have met with

the general approval of Public and Separate School Inspectors and teachers, and their continued use will do much to raise the standard of instruction in

this subject.

For many years one of the difficulties associated with the work has been the lack of qualified teachers. For purposes of record and comparison, figures covering the number of qualified teachers will in the future be included in this report. The following table covers the years 1934 and 1935:—

The Regulations now provide for a fixed grant to the Board when a qualified teacher is employed, and a certificate in Agriculture is one of the credits allowed for permanent certificates. It may be expected that future reports will show an increase in the number of teachers who are qualified in this subject.

In addition to the courses for Forms III and IV, Agriculture of the Lower School course was taken in Fifth classes of 441 schools under the Regulations for Public and Separate Schools. The Lower School courses were taken under

the High School Regulations in the following schools:—

## Secondary Schools

Instruction in Agriculture in the secondary schools is provided under three schemes as stated below and may be taken in those schools which meet the requirements of the Department of Education.

1. Optional classes in Lower and Middle School as a part of the course for

Normal Entrance or Matriculation.

2. Department of Agriculture under the High Schools' Act.

3. Department of Agriculture under the Vocational Education Act.

Under scheme (1) above, Agriculture was taught during the year in the following schools. Under (a) are the schools in which Lower School courses only are taken and under (b) both Lower and Middle School courses.

# Collegiate Institutes:

A summary of the above shows that Agriculture is now taken in twenty-six Collegiate Institutes, sixty-seven High Schools, and forty-one Continuation Schools. During the year the work was discontinued in one Continuation School, but was introduced in one Collegiate Institute, five High Schools, and six Continuation Schools. Both Lower and Middle School courses are taken in 92 schools.

The following abbreviated table shows the development in this phase of instruction since its inception in 1913, and the number of schools now taking the work.

One hundred and seventy-one teachers are engaged in giving instruction in Agriculture. Of this number, ninety-nine hold the Specialist Certificate in Agriculture, of whom seventy-two are graduates of the Ontario Agricultural College.

The following schools are taking work under the scheme indicated in (2)

above: Drayton, Elmira, Listowel, Port Perry, Wheatley, and Whitby.

At Port Perry and Whitby instruction is given in Farm Mechanics for boys and in Household Science for girls. At the other centres additional time for Agriculture alone is provided. The modified plan of organization at Port Perry, under which all pupils of the first and the second years take ten periods per week in practical subjects, is now in the third year of operation and continues to meet with approval.

Under (3) above the following schools are qualifying for grants under the Vocational Education Act: Beamsville, Renfrew, Ridgetown, Stamford, and Simcoe. At Stamford provisions is made for boys only, while at the other

centres courses in Home-making are also provided for girls.

In all of these schools a very satisfactory type of work is being done and the courses attract a reasonable proportion of the pupils who attend the secondary school. A new departure in making known the nature of the work was introduced at Simcoe last fall where a display of the work done by pupils at the school was shown at the fall fair. This feature attracted the attention of parents and others to the type of instruction offered and the advantages of the courses of the Vocational Department. The general first-year course which all pupils take for one year, and which was introduced last year at Ridgetown, has been generally satisfactory. The scheme is now in the second year of operation. The Annual Winter Course at this centre has again provided instruction for boys and girls of the community who have left school or are unable to attend full-time courses.

The development of vocational Agricultural and Home-making Departments has been slow, largely because most of the schools serving rural areas have an enrolment below two hundred. Under present Vocational Regulations, two separate organizations are necessary during the first three years and unless the enrolment exceeds the above figure this is not possible. A modification of the Vocational Regulations to enable smaller schools to carry on the work under a scheme similar to that used in Port Perry and Whitby is desirable and would enable smaller schools to provide instruction in practical subjects under the Vocational scheme. It is hoped that in the near future such organizations may be provided for.

## Certificates and Summer Courses

Three special certificates in Agriculture are issued by the Department of Education: the Elementary, the Intermediate, and the Specialist. The first is valid only in elementary schools, the last two in secondary schools and also in the elementary schools when the teacher has a first or second class certificate.

Teachers who have not taken Agriculture of the Lower and the Middle School courses in a secondary school or who are not graduates of the Ontario Agricultural College must qualify for these certificates by attendance at the Summer Courses held annually at the Ontario Agricultural College and at the Kemptville Agricultural School. Last summer at these centres, teachers from 109 Inspectorates were enrolled. The attendance at Kemptville was 156, considerably more than in previous years, while that at Guelph was 409, a gain of 89 over 1934. Teachers in attendance gain not only in knowledge of the subject, but benefit from the association with others and from the programme of extra-classroom activities, which are of great value in developing those qualities necessary for leadership.

#### Normal Schools

Instruction in Agriculture at the Normal Schools does not lead to any special certificate. The instructors are all fully qualified in Agriculture and all students receive instruction in Nature Study and Agriculture, which should enable them to continue courses in schools which have been started by other teachers. At the first opportunity, however, those who are engaged in rural schools should take additional training and qualify for the Elementary Certificate by attendance at Summer Courses.

#### Urban Organization

(a) Since the previous annual report new training classes have been opened in London (1), Lindsay (1), Picton (1), St. Catharines (1), York Township (2), Renfrew S.S. (1), Toronto S.S. (1); and new promotion classes have been established in London (1), North Bay (1), Kingston S.S. (1), Ottawa S.S. (1). With the exception of four cities, Brockville, Cornwall, Timmins, and Woodstock, and several of the larger towns, all the more important urban centres throughout the province have undertaken the provision of some form of auxiliary education. In certain centres such as Kitchener, where there are 1 boys' promotion class, 1 girls' promotion class, 2 junior mixed training classes, 1 visiting teacher class, 1 itinerant speech-correction class, 1 hospital class, 1 separate school training class and several sight-saving units, the organization may be considered as complete. In other centres the process of elaboration is still under way.

(b) During the same period classes have been discontinued in Collingwood (1), New Toronto (1), Pembroke (1), Weston (1). While in each case financial stringency was set forth as the main reason for discontinuance, nevertheless the establishment of auxiliary education in towns of less than 5,000 population is attended with certain unique problems. When a class is first organized in such a community it is usually filled by pupils who have stagnated in the grades over a considerable period of time. In the course of three or four years this excess accumulation is disposed of, either through the graduation of senior pupils or the readjustment of certain junior pupils to regular grade work. The emigration of two or three families from town may also diminish the size of a class just as the immigration of other families may augment it. Frequently the problem of keeping the class up to normal enrolment then arises. If the original class comprised excess numbers of very low-grade pupils, difficulties of placement may be increased because of stigma attached to the group.

The following solutions to the problems of establishing and continuing auxiliary education in smaller towns are offered.

(1) The original class should not be wholly composed of all the low-grade pupils in the school area, but should contain a fair percentage of readjustment cases who, after having their backward studies strengthened and aligned, may be returned to regular grade work, thus advertising to the residents of the community the fact that the door of the new room swings both ways.

(2) As time goes on and accumulated retardation throughout the school is gradually reduced, the readjustment phase of the work should receive more and more emphasis. In this connection it may be noted that several of the more successful classes are returning to the regular grades from three to six pupils each year.

(3) Where after a survey it is found that there are barely sufficient pupils to constitute a class and that the problem of its continuance must inevitably crop up in the future, it would appear more advantageous to establish either

a partial class or rural training units.

(c) The urban auxiliary training class aims to take pupils who from one cause or another have been stagnating and deteriorating in the grades and by direct methods of instruction (i) to readjust the more capable in their backward studies and return them to regular grade work, (ii) to provide the less capable with such minimum accomplishments in reading and arithmetic as will enable them to carry on with the ordinary activities of life, and (iii) to restore shattered confidence and build up a good citizenship attitude in all.

An analysis is given of the results obtained by two mixed auxiliary training

classes in medium sized communities.

The first class has been in operation 7 years 4 months. Of the 52 placements 18 are at present on the roll, 14 have been readjusted to grade work and are carrying on with reasonable success in this or in other schools, 1 after fair trial was excluded as ineducable, and 19 have graduated. Chart I is a brief picture of the auxiliary class progress and subsequent careers of these 19 graduates. It is to be noted that in January of this year 15 of the 19 graduates were gainfully employed. Chart II is a picture of the present class in the second school. Standings in reading and arithmetic at the time of placement are in accordance with reports of grade teachers from whose rooms the children were admitted. It is to be noted that the subject-group system of promotions permits pupils to advance at different rates in different subjects according to variation in ability.

## Rural Organization

(a) In 1935 survey procedure in rural inspectorates was expedited by having all teachers within an area report on the individual examination form every case of retardation beyond 18 months, in readiness for the survey. In conjunction with Inspector Stewart the actual survey of Dundas County including towns, village, and rural schools was thus completed in 8 days. The actual survey of C. P. Matthews' Separate School Inspectorate extending back from the St. Lawrence between Belleville and the Ottawa River was accomplished in the same time. In the former area 99 children were examined and 92 training units and 4 sight-saving units established. In the latter, 92 pupils were examined and 89 training units inaugurated.

During the same period many other inspectors and teachers had interested themselves in individual cases, so that there are now in operation throughout the rural and small urban schools of the province 36 orthopedic and home instruction units for physically incapacitated children, 119 sight-saving units for children suffering from visual defects, and 335 training units for backward pupils. Many crippled children are likewise making excellent school progress by means of correspondence courses provided under the supervision of Mr. Neil McDougall, of the Department. All available evidence indicates that very few educable crippled children throughout the province are not being now looked after. Of the probable 350 to 400 children suffering from vision deficiency who stand in need of special educational facilities, 127 are being provided for in urban sight-saving classes and 119 in rural sight-saving units. At the present rate of progress this phase of the work should be completely in hand by 1937.

That organized survey work in case of backward pupils began in Eastern Ontario is due in no small degree to interest aroused during the recent medical survey of the five eastern counties conducted by Dr. Phair and his assistant Dr. Kiteley, of the Department of Health, who have likewise extended valuable co-operation in the matter of providing medical reports and advisements in case of all applicants for sight-saving, orthopedic, and home instruction units. Arrangements have been completed for surveying this spring the inspectorate of A. B. Lucas, Kent (2) and Elgin West, and the inspectorate of J. J. Wilson, Grey North. Inquiries from other inspectors indicate that this phase of the

work should now make rapid progress throughout the province.

(b) Methods of dealing with these children vary with various types. In case of a crippled child who can carry on in school but who cannot travel to and fro, an orthopedic unit may be established, the school board providing transportation and, where necessary, special seating equipment. The pupil carries on with regular grade work until 12 years of age, at which period suitable vocational training may be introduced. The Department repays the Board 50 per cent. of the transportation expenditure to a maximum grant of \$40 and the full cost of special seating equipment and learning material.

Where the crippled child cannot carry on in school, a home instruction unit may be established. The local teacher, or any qualified teacher, may be engaged by the Board to give at least 100 hours of instruction during the school year in not fewer than 50 visits, the Department repaying the Board 50 per cent. of the teacher's remuneration up to a maximum grant of \$50.00, as well as any expenditure made for special approved learning material. The regular grade courses are pursued as in case of the orthopedic unit with similar provisions for vocational training.

In case of a sight-saving unit the Board is advised to secure a small table and chair suitable to the size of the child, so that he may be seated convenient

to the blackboard for assignment work and at different parts of the room throughout the day, according to variations in lighting. Exercises should be done in large hand with a black carbon copying or primary pencil on sight-saving paper. Magnatyped copies of readers, spellers, and other texts and exercises are furnished without charge by the Department from year to year, according to the progress of the pupil. Expenditures made by the Board for sight-saving paper and seating equipment are subject to full reimbursement grant. Where occasion warrants, special vocational training may be approved as in the case of crippled children.

(c) Where training units are established for backward children several

courses may be pursued.

A pupil under 12 suffering from a severe mental handicap is taken from the class of primary children in which he has stagnated and deteriorated year after year and taught reading, writing, spelling, and arithmetic by himself. He is provided with special learning material in the form of readers and reading workbooks, special spelling exercises, number-work books, toy money, etc., which enable him by direct learning methods and with little extra demand on the busy teacher's time to attain such a minimum accomplishment in these studies as will enable him to carry on with the simpler activities of life. If, however, a junior pupil is less backward, and especially if he is behind in but two or three subjects, he may be continued with the grade in his forward studies, taking his difficult subjects separately after the above-mentioned fashion, or he may be continued with his grade in all courses and given extra work with direct learning materials in those subjects with which he has been having difficulty. In either case the aim is to readjust him to regular grade work, in the hope that he will progress slowly but with considerable success into the senior forms.

When the pupil is 12 or over and entering adolescence it is of utmost import that his self-respect be maintained. Nothing in the world is so hopeless as a broken spirit. If at all possible he is placed with an intermediate or senior grade in some subjects. Attention is focussed upon reading, writing, and practical everyday problem arithmetic, either with the group or taken separately with special learning material. Some form of manual work (in which these pupils often excel), sewing and knitting for girls, reed work and wood carving for boys which will not prove disturbing to class discipline may be substituted for other subjects such as grammar and composition or even history and geography. With less backward pupils elementary drafting and book-keeping may be chosen as substitutes. Besides the development of useful skills and good work habits such substitutions will go far toward placing the backward pupil on a social level with his book-learning fellows. Expenditures made by the Board for special approved learning or craft equipment and material are subject to full reimbursement grants at the end of the school year. It may be noted, however, that the average cost of each training unit last year was under \$3.00.

(d) Did space permit it would be interesting to include a number of case studies illustrating the school and behaviour readjustments which have been made by many backward and sight-saving pupils who, discouraged by repeated failure, had drifted into truancy, incorrigibility, and other behaviour difficulties. Suffice it to say that the first pupil constituting a home instruction unit was the blind and crippled young lady who delighted an audience in Hart House with her accomplishments at the 1935 meeting of the O.E.A., and who, after passing Entrance last summer, is now taking Fifth Form work; the first constituting a sight-saving unit has been enabled to pass through the grades from senior first to senior third with but slight retardation; the first constituting a training unit, and who just previous to its organization stood in danger of withdrawal from school, is now a successful young farmer respected as an equal by his neighbours.

Appreciation is expressed of the co-operation everywhere extended to myself and to Miss DeLaporte, Assistant Inspector of Auxiliary Classes. Trust-tees have met suggestions with ready response. Inspectors have been enthusiastic in their support though in many instances it meant considerable additional labour. Even warmer commendation is due the rural teacher who with ungraded classes of thirty and more pupils finds time and energy to bring along successfully a struggling charge.

## Auxiliary Organizations

(a) All teachers of Auxiliary Classes are specially trained in a five weeks' Summer Course. In 1935 a tripart course was given, (1) for teachers having at least an interim Second Class certificate and three years' successful teaching experience in the province who wished to qualify as teachers of training and promotion classes; (2) for teachers with at least an interim First Class certificate and three years' successful teaching experience or an ordinary Vocational certificate who wished to qualify as teachers in senior craft schools; (3) a general course for teachers who wished to improve their professional standing and practice. 74 took the first course; 14, the second; and 21, the third.

(b) Brief courses were given in each of the Normal Schools of the province to acquaint teachers-in-training with methods of dealing with auxiliary type pupils, especially with those in rural schools. The many communications received by the Department from recently graduated teachers concerning exceptional children in their charge is ample proof of the interest created in the

welfare of handicapped children by these Normal School lectures.

(c) The Auxiliary Class teachers throughout the province have been organized into eight associations. Owing to the special nature of the work in which they are engaged, Auxiliary Class teachers have not the same professional contacts as grade teachers. The monthly or bimonthly meetings of these groups are a means of disseminating new ideas in methods of instruction and in supplying a needed stimulus to those engaged in such an exacting form of work.

(d) The Auxiliary Class Section of the 1935 O.E.A. was well attended, and a number of Ontario representatives took part in the 1935 Convention of the International Council for the Education of Exceptional Children held in Baltimore. Both meetings were productive of renewed enthusiasm for the work.

(e) "The Special Class Teacher," a magazine devoted to the interests of special education and published by the Auxiliary Class Section of the O.E.A., is making spendid progress under its new management and editorial staff. Its pages are filled with interesting articles and valuable suggestions contributed by

auxiliary class teachers throughout the province.

"Subsequent Careers of Non-academic Boys" by Florence S. Dunlop, M.A., Ph.D., Psychologist and Supervisor of Special Classes, Public Schools, Ottawa, is another noteworthy publication of the year. In this work an intimate study is made of the employment history, the delinquency history, and the leisure time activities of 250 of the 257 graduates from the Senior Boys' School, Ottawa. Relations have been statistically set forth among such factors as pre-school, inter-school, and post-school delinquencies; intelligence and employment; intelligence and delinquency; home environment, employment and delinquency; etc. The practical conclusions and consequent social and educational recommendations are of vital interest to all special class teachers and social workers.

## APPENDIX J

# REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

In 1933-34, the Calendar year was replaced by the School year as a basis for recording and reporting statistics of all elementary schools. Consequently, no definite data are available for the Calendar year 1935. This change was essential in order to harmonize the returns from elementary and secondary schools, to avoid over-lapping, and to establish continuity of record in the process of transfer of pupils from the elementary to the more advanced panels.

The last report, a concise account was given of the growth of compulsory education from the time of Confederation to the present. The history of the movement shows that it was sternly contested at every stage of advance till, to-day, it is made to compass the full formative years of childhood. The child of a century ago was viewed merely as a human asset. His immature but growing powers were measured in terms of service. These powers were marketed in the open field of industry. No labour laws at this time intervened. The child was a pawn in the game of life. The artisan class represented the bulk of the population of the world, and poverty in the home forced the child into service where he too often was exploited for private or corporate gain. Self-improvement received no place in the plan of things. It was confined to night school, Sunday school, and the few fag ends of time the child might snatch from the treadmill of toil.

To-day a new conception of the place and purpose of child-life rules. Child rights are paramount and are safeguarded by health, school, and labour laws with the willing assent and support of home and industry. The result is visibly reflected in school statistics. In Ontario almost twenty-five per cent. of the population is at school. The average attendance is no longer a paltry two days out of five in a hundred-day year, as in 1867, but over ninety per cent. of an approximate two-hundred-day year. There is a complete reversal of form as between the child at labour and the child at school. The years of eight to sixteen are absolutely reserved for self-improvement under the aegis of the law. The entire school system is now framed to distribute the school year in terms and daily sessions with a view to strike a proper balance between school work and leisure in the interest of the all-round physical, social, and mental development of the child. The child Utopia may not yet have been reached, but it is a far call from the day when he was an innocent and helpless victim of the forces that too often preyed upon him for selfish ends.

## APPENDIX K

# REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF PUBLIC LIBRARIES

Since 1932 I have called upon every active public library, free or association, in the province. Between March and December of 1935, I visited every free public library outside the city of Toronto, in addition to 13 association libraries. All but two had previously been visited once; many twice. I was able to obtain access to every library, though not to interview every librarian. The board's minute book and cash book were available in all except some half-dozen instances.

According to Mr. L. Newcombe, Librarian of the National Central Library, London, England, "It is generally felt that, with few exceptions, a town with a population of less than 20,000 is unable to provide an efficient library service." Such a basis of population would exclude all but 16 of our 467 municipalities. It is admittedly difficult for the "tiny" library to be efficient, even to survive, but fortunately the efficient division must be understood to include many Ontario libraries in centres with less than 20,000 population. In most centres above 5,000, a librarian is in charge who is qualified either by successful experience or by a course of training in a library school. The Minister has now under consideration a resolution of the Ontario Library Association, submitted in 1935, seeking a Departmental regulation limiting appointment to none but certificated librarians or assistants in centres of 5,000 or more.

#### Finances

The most serious obstacle to Free Library progress continues to be that of inadequate finances. There are, however, some notable exceptions. Several cities of over 20,000 receive more than the statutory minimum municipal appropriation of 50c. per capita; for example A, 69c.; B, 60c.; C, 54c.

Among smaller centres:—

E, population 750 receives \$0.80 per capita F, " 550 " 1.27 " " G " 750 " .66 " "

Unfortunately, many libraries continue to receive less than this statutory minimum. Boards are in some instances responsible, since they have been remiss in preparing the annual budget and estimates for submission to the municipal council as provided for in the Act. In other instances boards have met with the active opposition or, at best, the apathy of the councils. It is still true that in various quarters public opinion gives but grudging assent to the educational aspects of the library's activities, and inclines to discriminate against citizens who are unable to pay fixed fees for a fixed number of books. On the other hand, failure to show progress cannot always be attributed to restricted finances; at times it appears to be caused by a rooted objection to disturbing the *status quo*. The supposition that all library authorities cherish a desire for progress must be qualified.

#### Records

A decided general improvement in the keeping of boards' records is to be noted. Certain treasurers had not been keeping a cash book, and some cash

books had not been audited, as prescribed by the Act. Certain boards still fail to hold regular meetings and some transact business without having a quorum present. In only one or two instances has a board invoked Section 21 of the Act to disqualify habitual absentees from meetings. A number of minute books still fail to record details of accounts ordered paid.

Librarians' records likewise are steadily improving, though a few still have no accession record of any kind. Library M (population over 1700) has been receiving regular legislative grants on the librarian's certificate, but no accession record exists, owing to division of opinion among board members as to its value. Many libraries now have a shelf-list and have taken a recent inventory of stock; the majority have an annual revision of their borrowers' registers. A number have yet to install the card system of charging books to borrowers.

#### Book Stock

More care is evident in the selection of new books, especially juvenile books, though a few boards still give cheapness the first consideration. Most free libraries now contain a nucleus of reference works, except where restricted hours of opening render such of little value. Periodicals are being selected with more discrimination and are systematically filed for circulation or for reference. Extensive discarding of worn and obsolete volumes has now been effected in virtually every free library, even the smallest.

## Buildings

Various towns and villages have been fortunate in securing more commodious library quarters. Port Perry's new War Memorial library building was officially opened in May by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. New quarters have been provided for the library at Parry Sound in the recently completed municipal building; at Acton, in the new Y.M.C.A. building; at Oil Springs, in the new Community Hall; at Espanola, in a neat brick bungalow near the post-office. Interiors of buildings have been much improved at Brampton, Brussels, Chesley, Exeter, Mimico, Port Arthur, Woodstock, Sault Ste. Marie, Walkerton. St. Jacobs is still probably the model library of the province for a small municipality. Libraries X, Y, and Z, on the other hand, are still sharing the same quarters as the municipal "lock-up."

#### Co-operative Projects

The following co-operative associations which may be expected eventually to develop into county free libraries are now functioning: Lambton, comprising, with Sarnia, 19 libraries; Middlesex, with London, 20; Essex, 6; Norfolk, 5; Simcoe, 3; Dufferin-Peel, 2; Huron-Perth, 5. Saltfleet township, with its main free library in Stoney Creek village, has 10 deposit stations throughout its area.

The Simcoe co-operative project includes the libraries of Collingwood, Orillia, and Midland. In addition to this, the town of Orillia is developing an important experiment in the co-operation of school board and library board for supervision of boys' and girls' reading. The children's librarian divides her time between the schools and the boys' and girls' department of the public library, each board contributing its share of expenses. Other municipalities have similar arrangements under consideration.

The Work of the School and Organization

When Dr. Kerr Love, an authority on the education of the deaf in Great Britain, visited the schools in Europe and America during the years 1904, 1905, and 1906, his comments in his report on the Belleville School were "That the course was limited to seven or eight years and that little oral work was being taught." He further stated "That the Principal accomplishes his avowed object, viz., to make his deaf children earn a living in a country where labour is plentiful and workmen scarce."

Mr. Mathison resigned as Superintendent, September, 1906, and was succeeded by the late Dr. Coughlin, who continued as Superintendent until his death in 1928. After careful study and after visiting many schools in the United States, Dr. Coughlin, soon after he became Superintendent, organized three oral classes. At the time of his death in 1928, the school had been transformed from a manual school to an oral school. The reorganization of the school last year by Dr. Amoss has increased its efficiency by giving the senior pupils a more complete course in the vocational subjects and by giving the older slow pupils an opportunity to work in the shops.

In the late Dr. Coughlin's first report, he made reference to the preparation of a new curriculum for the purpose of unifying the work with that of the public schools of the Province. He further stated that at that time, 1907, "That the graduates of the school would hardly equal, in their general knowledge and in their use of language, the pupils in the Junior Third class in the Public Schools." The curriculum was revised from time to time, but always based on the course of study used in the Public and Separate Schools.

In his annual report for 1914, Mr. H. J. Clarke, who inspected the school for twenty-six years, made complimentary reference to the first class obtaining High School Entrance standing. He stated further, "I am not prepared to say that the High School Entrance examination is the ideal for this school. It is quite possible that a modification of the Public School Course for Forms I to IV might be better suited for the requirements of these pupils." The Course of Study in use at the present time is a modification of the Public School Course of Study planned for the special needs of deaf children. This course was fully outlined in the report of the Acting Superintendent submitted last year.

The work includes, in addition to the academic work, rhythm work with the radio-ear apparatus and the piano, and vocational work in several branches, namely—carpentry, shoe repairing, printing, farming, cleaning and pressing, cooking, sewing, laundry work, and beauty culture.

#### Buildings

Mr. Mathison, in his last report submitted in 1906, made several recommendations, including the following—a new modern school building, a gymnasium, a playroom for small girls, change of name to "School for Deaf," extension of time limit from seven to ten years. During the subsequent thirty years, all these improvements have been made with the exception of the building of a gymnasium. But the teachers in charge of the games for the boys and girls endeavour by the use of the assembly hall and the basement rooms of the residences to provide the necessary recreation. The two skating rinks, one for the boys and one for the girls, are very popular during the winter months.

The children are very comfortable in the three residences, but the young children are unable to use the basement rooms in the junior residence as playrooms, owing to the dust of the cement floors. Dr. Coughlin, in his report for 1919, referred to new asphalt floors being laid in the boys' and girls' residences eliminating the dust from the concrete floors, which was a very serious drawback to the use of the basement playrooms. A similar re-surfacing of the floors in the basement of the junior residence is necessary to enable the children to play.

The central heating plant, which heats all the buildings, is taxed to capacity during cold weather. Only two boilers are in use, although the heating of the

junior residence was added to the heavy load formerly carried. I concur in the opinion expressed by the Engineer that a third boiler, which is already in the boiler-room, should be placed in position so as to be available for use at all times. The saving in fuel would be sufficient to pay for all necessary changes, and the danger of being without heat during the winter months would be obviated.

For several years the refrigerator system in connection with the kitchen has received consideration from the Department of Public Works, but no action has been taken. When the kitchen was built, an ice chamber was provided to furnish the necessary refrigeration. For many years it has not been possible to use ice, resulting in the school being without proper facilities for keeping food fresh and palatable.

I would suggest that very serious consideration should be given to the repairing of the roof on the main building, to the re-surfacing of the floors in the junior residence, to improvement of the heating plant, and to the installation of a system of refrigeration in the school kitchen.

## Changes in the Staff

Mr. George F. Stewart, a member of the teaching staff from 1894 to 1931, and editor of "The Canadian" from 1894 to 1935, retired in June, 1935. Appointed to the dual position of teacher and editor, on the recommendation of Superintendent Mathison, Mr. Stewart rendered efficient and faithful service to the deaf of the Province. Having had experience in newspaper work before his appointment to the Ontario School for the Deaf, he had unusual qualifications for the office he filled with such distinction. Mr. Stewart has consented to write some reminiscences for "The Canadian," which will be of unusual interest to former graduates of the school.

Mr. M. S. Blanchard, B.A., supervising teacher in the senior department of the school and a teacher in the school for twelve years, resigned in June to accept an appointment as Superintendent of the Manitoba School for the Deaf at Winnipeg.

Mr. Elgin R. Mundy, B.S.A., was appointed to succeed Mr. Blanchard. Mr. Mundy, who is a graduate of the Ontario College of Education with a Specialist's Certificate in Agriculture, will devote his full time to the teaching of vocational agriculture.

For matrimonial reasons, Misses M. Totton and M. Benedict resigned in June. Miss M. Reid, who had been a regular teacher during the school year 1933-34 but who was in charge of the girls' recreation last year, was transferred to the teaching staff in September. Miss D. Dewar of the British Columbia School, who has been in training in this school this year, took over Miss Reid's duties until the transfer of Miss C. Connell from the Monteith Academy was arranged November 1st. As a consequence of these changes, the staff has been reduced by one.

Dr. H. E. Amoss, Inspector of Auxiliary Classes for the Province and Acting Superintendent of this school for one year, was relieved of his duties as Acting Superintendent on October 1st, 1935, his successor being W. J. Morrison, formerly Inspector of Public Schools for the City of Brantford. Dr. Amoss will devote his full time to his duties as Inspector of Auxiliary Classes, but will continue his connection with this school as Inspector for the Department of Education.

# Physician's Report

From April 1st, 1935, to March 31st, 1936, there were 410 admissions to the Ontario School for the Deaf Hospital at Belleville.

Beginning September 28th, 1935, there was an epidemic of chicken-pox. 43 pupils suffered from this disease and it lasted until December 14th, 1935.

Beginning December 12th, 1935, there developed an epidemic of measles, which lasted until March 15th, 1936, and from which 151 pupils suffered.

As a complication of measles, we had six cases of lobar pneumonia, all of which were severe in character.

During the month of January, 1936, we had 32 cases of influenza. There were at this time several children with some fever and swollen glands, the condition subsiding in a few days.

There were six cases of appendicitis. The appendix was removed in all six cases.

There was a fracture of the left arm; a fracture of the left leg; and an amputation of leg, due to crushing injury.

The tonsils were removed from nine children.

One boy developed meningitis from an old discharging ear. This boy died. There were several minor operations, as opening abscesses, etc.

27 children were vaccinated; 34 were given scarlet fever toxin; and 32 were

given diphtheria toxoid.

While the admission of 410 children to hospital seems a large number, an epidemic of chicken-pox and one of measles, in spite of all precautions, spread rapidly, particularly among the younger children. Where there is any doubt of the condition of any child, this child is at once sent to hospital for observation and treatment if necessary.

We find among the very young children a certain amount of fatigue, due to the daily routine of early morning hours. An occasional few days rest in

hospital for these youngsters seems to be what they require.

One of the causes of lost school days and need of hospital care is the chronic discharging ear of many of the children. Aside from the pain suffered by these children is the danger of meningeal trouble and it is a pity the parents do not allow a mastoid operation for the relief of this chronic and painful condition. An operation will at any time be performed for this condition free of any charge, if the parents are unable to pay. It is to be hoped the parents will give this their very serious consideration.

We would be glad to have parents inform us when children are returned to school if there has been any communicable disease in their family for the previous

Minor conditions, as ingrown toe-nails, enlarged tonsils and adenoids, etc. could be treated during the summer holidays, preventing the loss of time at school that many suffer.

I would like to take this opportunity of thanking the staff for their co-operation in the early recognition of the children's disabilities.

#### Summer School

A Summer School for teachers of the deaf, sponsored by the American Association to Promote the Teaching of Speech to the Deaf, was held in Toronto from July 2nd to August 9th, 1935. This was the first time for the Association Summer School to be held in Canada. Sixteen of the seventy-five students enrolled were Canadians, and of these, the Misses Rierdon, Nurse, Hegle, Tett, Van Allen, Sweetnam, Sheffield, Brown, and Mrs. Wannamaker were from the Ontario School for the Deaf. Miss C. Ford, the capable and efficient Directress of Professional Training in this school, was one of the instructors.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE ONTARIO SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Ontario School for the Blind, for the year ending Dec. 31, 1935.

Of the 14 pupils who left in June, 1935:—

- 4 completed the course.
- 1 left to return to a school for the seeing.
- 3 remained at home on account of ill-health.
- 3 had reached their academic peak.
- 2 remained at home on account of illness in the family.
- 1 was excluded for inability to care for himself.

Of the two pupils who left since October, 1935, one was excluded temporarily to mature in personal care, and the other went home on account of ill-health.

The four students mentioned above as having completed their course are competent to take their places in the industrial or commercial world as opportunities offer, and the Canadian National Institute for the Blind is working to place them.

The pupils who have come to us for the first time during the past year have been uniformly good. Our kindergarten-primary teacher feels that all our beginners are average or better in intelligence. Seven senior pupils came to us for the first time this year, with ages ranging from thirteen to twenty. Three are in the Senior III grade, one in Junior IV, and the other three are High School pupils. Five of the seven have considerable sight; the other two are totally blind. Their social and mental capacities make them a decided asset to our school.

#### School Curricula

From Kindergarten to Senior Fourth Grade, we follow closely the Departmental courses of study. Obviously, this is not the case with such a subject as art. I am hoping to have our pupils do some work in clay modelling and sculpture. This type of work is so closely linked with "spatial" sensing of all objects

that I think we should derive immeasurable benefit from it despite the fact that we would turn out few, if any, students who would follow up such work vocationally.

In our High School Department we are setting out for the first time with a full matriculation as the goal for all pupils capable of doing High School work. Our High School classes are made up as follows:—

Our work at present includes:—

- 1. English—four years' work in Composition, Literature, Public Speaking, Supplementary Reading, Dramatics, and one year of Grammar.
  - 2. Languages—French I and II, German I, and one Latin class.
  - 3. Mathematics—Algebra and Geometry in alternate years.
- 4. Music—Piano, Violin, Organ, Vocal, Choral work in junior and senior groups, Orchestral instruments, Elementary and Primary Theory, Form, Harmony (five grades), and Musical History (4 grades).
  - 5. Botany and Natural Science.
  - 6. Geography.
  - 7. History—English, Canadian, and World of To-day.
  - 8. Commercial Course—Typing, Law, and Business Practice.
  - 9. Physical Training.
  - 10. Household Science—Sewing, Knitting, Cookery.
- 11. Shop work—Caning, Furniture Making, Basketry and other reed work, making of rubber mats, and Assembly Tests.
  - 12. Piano Tuning.

# Health-Physical Education and Eurythmics

In this Department, for the first time, we have placed our senior girls under a lady instructress, also for the first time, our girls take swimming instruction. They greatly enjoy these classes, and the "Y" instructress tells us that they have made better progress than any other class unit.

Our Kindergarten and First Book classes join for their physical play hour in the gymnasium. This leaves two teachers supervising the circle and a music teacher at the piano. Their work includes games, songs, eurythmics, and a story period as they sit on the floor.

Our Annual Games and Field Day, and our trip to Batavia, New York, were successful and profitable, as has been outlined in reports of former years.

Last winter, not without some misgivings, we went skating on a city rink for two periods of one hour each per week. The benefits in general health, elimination of disciplinary cases, and increase of happiness were so marked that we made a new rink of our own this winter. It is serving the same good purpose, and we are aiming to have every pupil skate, except any excluded for health reasons.

As a part of our physical and health work, we are charting monthly weight and height records.

#### Health Service

We herewith submit reports from Dr. Marquis, our chief Medical Officer, and Dr. Bragg, our Ophthalmologist. As has been our custom in former years, every pupil visits the dentist each term, and all necessary dental work is done.

It is gratifying to add that we have had no epidemic during the year, nor have we had a single case of serious illness either among our pupils or staff, except one staff member who had a protracted illness.

#### Music

We have aimed in the past year, in so far as is possible, to give every child who desires it and shows progress instruction in music. This has been done in the case of choral instruction. On account of the insufficient staff of music teachers, we have not been able to extend instrumental music to all who seek this training. A fifteen-year old boy who asked for piano lessons this year, told me that he had asked in vain for the past six years for this work. At the present time, I have a waiting list of deserving pupils. In order to overcome this condition to some extent, our Miss Z. Perry last summer holidays took, at her own expense, a course of training in the group method of teaching music. In September we organized two group classes of eight pupils each—that is to say, we are giving piano instructions to sixteen pupils, requiring just one hour a day of teacher's time. We are very much interested in this experiment. I may say that the heads of American Schools for the Blind, recently visited, also expressed a very keen interest in our results. It is, so far as we know, the only group instruction class for the sightless on the continent.

A year ago we organized a symphony orchestra. It has had a steady and gradual growth until to-day we have 27 pieces. We have exhausted our own treasury funds in financing this project. Our friends have been very good to us in the loan of instruments and in gifts of money. The only time-table allowance for instruction in orchestral instruments is one half hour a day. I do not quite understand how our Director, Mr. Lord, accomplishes so much in such a limited time. After four months of training, the orchestra played "La Diademe" by Herman, and "Butterfly" by Bright, at our June concert. Only the teacher of music and musical Braille to the sightless fully appreciates the application and "stick-to-it-iveness" necessary to achieve better than average standards. Dr. Ham in his report says of the orchestra, "Its influence on music throughout the school is already being felt."

Last year at the Stratford Musical Festival, one of our pupils, Rae Beacock, competed with fourteen other contestants from various parts of Ontario in the open baritone class, and was successful in winning the silver medal.

Six of our students sat for the Toronto Conservatory of Music examinations in June. All of the six obtained honours, and four of the six obtained first class honours.

#### Library Report

During the past year, Mr. Leo J. Langan acted as Librarian in addition to his regular class-room work. We have a total of 369 books, made up as follows:—

In addition to the reading matter in books, we are using ten monthly magazines in Braille.

During this year the library was open at definite times during the day, with a teacher in charge to advise and help choose the books.

The amount of reading in 1934-35 really represents twice as much as in 1933-34 because the new books added during the year were from England, printed on both sides of the paper, and in highly contracted Braille, while the books bought prior to that year were from Louisville, Kentucky, printed on one side and in Grade  $1\frac{1}{2}$  Braille.

Our senior pupils have reached the place where there is nothing left to read, and we are in the unhappy plight of "Old Mother Hubbard" with bare cupboards for our best readers. I should like to express my appreciation of the Department's grants to our library during the past two years, and I do regret that this year's grant is temporarily tabled, but I am given to understand that our book order will be passed along as soon as finances permit.

#### Staff Changes

In September, Mr. Leo J. Langan, who had served the Ontario School for the Blind faithfully for sixteen years, was promoted to an Inspectorship. Mr. A. McNamara, Principal of St. Brigid's Separate School in Toronto, was appointed to fill the vacancy created by Mr. Langan's withdrawal. Mr. Robert Troughton, a graduate of our school, who had been Boys' Supervisor for nine years, was placed in charge of the Manual Training and Trades work. Mr. Ralph Brown, who was on the Mimico staff, came to us as Boys' Supervisor, to which duties have been added certain academic class work.

#### Extra-Curricular and Student Activities

There is probably no department from which we derive so many and varied benefits as from our extra-curricular activities. One may especially mention the improvement in enunciation and pronunciation, personal poise, grace of movement, and the thrill from co-operation in larger tasks. The co-ordination of speech, rhythm, song, and instrumental music, was especially demonstrated in our Christmas production of "Why the Chimes Rang." This was repeated twice to more than capacity houses, and the general effect upon ourselves and our public seemed to be most excellently put by one of the members of the caste, who said, "It's so beautiful it does something to you. You just feel as if you'll never be the same again."

During the year, our senior group produced "The Poison Party" by Sladen-Smith. This was repeated on several occasions to special audiences, among which was the Rotary Club of Brantford.

We value highly our church associations and our down-town church friends. Going out to Sunday School has meant for us losing ourselves among seeing groups for a while every Sunday, and this in turn has lead to our being invited to Camp Fire Meets, weiner roasts, toboggan parties, sleigh rides, and so on.

We have on request given two complete concerts in rural churches, and have supplied request numbers on programmes almost every week during the year. Our senior pupils supplied vocal and instrumental numbers on the Lions Service Club Christmas broadcast, and on several occasions at regular Rotary Club meetings.

On four occasions during the year, our entire school have been the guests of the local picture theatres. The Manager, Mr. E. Moule, makes us welcome whenever we feel that there is education as well as entertainment to be had from the film. Needless to say, the best example of this was Freddie Bartholomew in "David Copperfield."

We instituted an annual summer picnic at Simcoe, to which we were driven by Brantford Rotarians. We were the guests of the Kinsmen's Club in their beautiful and well-equipped recreational park. Rotarians, no less than the children, enjoyed the drive. The Simcoe Kinsmen enjoyed the association so much that they have asked us to make it an annual event.

Our student body has several clubs. The senior girls' club, "The Merry Makers," raised fifty dollars at a bazaar during the fall term, a goodly portion of which brought Christmas cheer to a family of seven. The senior boys' club conducted an over-night hike in the spring time. Our intermediate boys have a Scout Troop, and our intermediate girls a Girl Guide Company. Finally we have the junior club, who always enjoy a party or a story. The senior boys' and girls' clubs carry on such activities as public speaking, debating, car drives, sleighing parties, and all-day hikes.

In these student groups I have observed throughout the year a growth in social capacity, in the ability to give and take, and to get along with other people, and the power to co-operate efficiently and effectively—indeed in all those worthwhile attributes that go to the making of that thing we call character.

#### Physician's Report

During January and February, we had many patients in the hospital suffering from colds and influenza, with from seven to twelve beds constantly occupied. These ailments, along with bilious attacks, vertigo, etc., accounted for the great part of our year's sickness.

On December 26, 1934, one of the older girls underwent an operation in the Brantford General Hospital for enucleation of the left eye, which operation was performed by Dr. Norman Bragg, our eye specialist. She returned to our own hospital the next day, where she was cared for for a period of ten days.

Three smaller children have suffered from cranial disturbances—one during the last school term. After a period in our hospital, he was removed to his home. He returned to school in the fall in good health mentally and physically. Since the opening of school in September, two young girls have suffered at times from slight disturbances of a similar nature, but we are watching them closely, and we anticipate no serious results.

One small boy was in the hospital for over a month with rheumatic fever. He was returned home in the spring, and he is remaining at home this year. Another boy who came back to school this fall in a highly nervous condition, suffering from chorea, has also returned home.

One of our teachers was in the hospital for some time with influenza, complicated by the fact that she had been in poor physical condition for the past few years. She recovered slowly, and was under my care for the balance of the term, after she returned to duty. I am happy to report that she has started the fall term in much better physical condition, and is steadily gaining in health and strength.

In general, we have had a fairly good year from the standpoint of health. In addition to our hospital patients, we have a daily quota of students coming up for treatment of minor ailments. We are continuing to give cod liver oil during the winter months to all children a bit under par physically. This group is fewer in number than in the previous year. Our children spend a good part of their time out of doors in healthful activities, and this has produced beneficial results in health generally.

#### Oculist's Report

I have the honour to present the following report dealing with the ocular examination of the pupils entering the School for the Blind, October, 1935, also re-examination of other pupils resident in the School. Of the new pupils 9 are girls and 14 boys, total of 23.

It is both interesting and gratifying to notice from the foregoing chart that the visual acuity of those entering the School is much higher than was formerly noted, there being 10 pupils, slightly over 40%, having some degree of sight in each eye. Unfortunately, however, there are 3 pupils that have no vision in either eye, which constitutes a slightly higher percentage for this class than in recent years.

In a study of the above table (dealing with the cause of blindness), several factors of note are present: first, the increased number of congenital conditions producing blindness. Congenital Glaucoma (Buphthalmus), particularly accounts for 5 cases; and congenital lesions, such as Nystagmus and Microphthalmus, also account for 5 cases. Congenital cataracts, however, show no apparent increase, there being 2 cases in this group, which is an approximate average to former years.

The second observation of note is the increase in the number of cases of Optic Atrophy, there being 4 cases, 3 girls and 1 boy. This latter followed an attack of meningitis, whereas the 3 cases of Optic Atrophy occurring in girls were the result of brain tumor. This significant fact would suggest that brain tumor is more common in girls than in boys.

And thirdly, while the cases of Ophthalmia Neonatorum show a slight increase, the number this year being 3, there is a decrease in the number of Keratitis, only one case occurring.

A very thorough survey was made of the senior pupils and a re-examination of a great many of them was made. The result of this was indeed encouraging as we found that many of them showed considerable visual improvement.

We felt that this was due in a measure at least to the co-operation of the pupils in following the advice and instructions given them at previous examinations regarding the conservation and care of their eyes.

Finally, I should like to express to you and through you, to Dr. Duncan McArthur, Deputy Minister of Education, my sincere appreciation for your sympathetic consideration of our needs and the kindly hearing of our requests.

The members of our teaching staff have shown a devotion to duty that is commendable, and a readiness to carry our instructions that make administration happy. The officers and other members of the staff have been faithful and endeavoured at all times to be efficient in their particular tasks.

#### APPENDIX N

# REPORT OF THE PROVINCIAL SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

During the year I visited 105 Inspectorates, interviewing the Inspectors, visiting schools, and addressing Teachers, Boards, and Service Clubs in the interests of Music as follows:—

Schools Fairs (3)—Aberfoyle, Northumberland, Ospringe.

Teachers' Meetings (21)—Barrie (twice), Brockville, Campbellford, Chatham, Ingersoll, Kingston, Kirkland Lake, Ottawa, St. Thomas, Stratford (twice), Tillsonburg, Toronto (four meetings), Welland, York Township (three meetings),

Trustees' Meetings (18)—Almonte, Brighton, Carleton Place, Cayuga, Galt, Cobourg, Guelph, Kemptville, Kirkland Lake (twice), Kitchener, St. Thomas, Tillsonburg, Timmins (twice), Toronto (three meetings).

Service Clubs (9)—Brantford (twice), Carleton Place, Galt, Ingersoll,

New Liskeard, Orangeville, Stratford, Timmins.

School Concerts (6)—Aberfoyle, Brampton (twice), Hamilton, Toronto, Woodstock.

Festivals, Adjudicating (8)—Beamsville, Birchcliffe, Brantford, Guelph,

Hagersville, Hamilton, Russell, Toronto.

While in almost every class room of the Public and Separate Schools in Ontario there is some singing, in only 57 per cent. is any serious effort being made to give the children a well-organized course. The percentage varies greatly in different types of schools. It is encouraging to note that 895 rooms have introduced Music during the year. There is evidence of increasing interest in the subject everywhere, but progress has been hampered both by lack of money and lack of organized leadership.

Suggested plans for dealing with the teaching of this subject in the different

classes of schools are outlined below:-

1. Larger Urban Systems—The only practical way to conduct a Music programme efficiently is to appoint a Director of Music, with assistants where necessary. The return of better times and the increasing public interest, which

is quite apparent, will probably solve the problem in the near future.

2. Smaller Urban Systems—Two types of Supervisors are possible; a part-time Supervisor, visiting each class room regularly, or a grade teacher in each school who holds a Departmental certificate and is responsible for the supervision of Music throughout the school. The former is usually preferable. A revision of the Music Grants would be a means of encouraging the study of Music throughout the smaller urban centres.

3. Rural Schools in the More Accessible Parts of the Province—The employment of itinerant Music teachers seems to give the best results. 34 per cent. of these schools are being served this way and, with an increase of 10 per cent. during the past year, it would seem that eventually the plan will be adopted

by practically all schools of this class.

4. Rural Schools in the Less Accessible Parts—In many parts of the Province, weather and road conditions, and sparseness of population make the employment of itinerant Music teachers impracticable. There seems no possibility of giving these children a technical course of study, but by the use of

gramophones and special recordings it would be possible to teach them to sing with enjoyment and to study the works of the great composers.

Secondary Schools—A large number of Secondary schools have choruses and orchestras operating as extra-curricular activities. In very few of them is there a course in Music during school hours. Several, however, have expressed their intention of introducing the subject in the Lower School in September. The chief obstacles to progress in the Secondary Schools are the difficulty of finding time for an additional subject in an already crowded curriculum, and the lack of suitably trained teachers.

Teacher Training—While 57 per cent, of the elementary schools of the Province are receiving musical training, in too many cases the standard of work is not high. Steps are being taken to help the teachers in many ways. A new tentative Course of Study is being distributed. The Summer Course for Supervisors of Music is being extended to three years, and an Instrumental Course added in Toronto. For teachers-in-service it is suggested that pamphlets dealing with various phases of the work be distributed from time to time, and that Clinics and Round Table Discussions be held in various parts of the Province. The difficulty of getting teachers from outlying districts to attend Summer School at Toronto or London might be overcome either by establishing Summer Sessions at convenient points, or by giving financial assistance to teachers from a distance.

High School Music Options-For some time certain Certificates of the Toronto Conservatory of Music have been accepted in lieu of other subjects on the Middle and Upper School examinations. This privilege has been extended to include the following additional examining bodies:

McGill University Conservatorium;

University of Ottawa School of Music and Elocution;

University of Saskatchewan Faculty of Music;

Trinity College of Music (London, England), and

The Associated Boards of the Royal School of Music (London, England).

Music is a subject which lends itself to public performance, to the advantage of itself and to education in general. The performance at Massey Hall, during Easter Week, of the Provincial High School Orchestra, High School Chorus, and Public School Chorus was an outstanding achievement. More than 500 students from all parts of Ontario participated, and I feel that for the next few years at least, this activity will have a sufficiently far-reaching effect to warrant the support of the Department.

Festivals, both competitive and non-competitive, have been carried on successfully in many parts of the Province. I assisted in the organization of three new ones, at Russell, Brantford, and Guelph, where in each case the work was creditable and the public response highly satisfactory. The introduction of Music as a part of the School Fairs during the past few years has also brought the subject to the attention of the public.



## BOARD OF GOVERNORS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH JUNE, 1935

To His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council:

The Governors of the University of Toronto have the honour to present their twenty-ninth annual report, which is accompanied by the President's comprehensive review of the academic work of the University and its Colleges for the Session 1934-35 and the reports of various officers and departments. Reference to the President's report and its appendices will reveal the wide range and variety of the activities of the institution and of the services which it is endeavouring to render to the public.

The Governors submit also the usual statements covering the funds and assets, including investments, as they stood at the close of business on 30th June. 1935, together with statements in detail of the receipts and expenditures of the Board for the fiscal year which ended on that date, and the certificate of audit of the same by Mr. G. T. Clarkson of the firm of Messrs. Clarkson, Gordon, Dilworth and Nash.

It will be observed that the auditor reports that all the transactions of the year upon both Revenue and Capital Accounts have been duly audited and found correct; that the securities for the investments, which are held for safekeeping by the Canadian Bank of Commerce, were produced for his examination twice during the year and were found to be in agreement with the Bursar's records; and that this officer's records are well kept and all endowment and trust funds properly accounted for. While a small number of bonds are in default, as is the case with practically every investing corporation today, the market value of the securities as a whole on 30th June was greater than their book value by approximately \$405,177.

The general revenue for the year amounted to \$1.510,343. There was also credited to revenue the Legislative Grant of \$1.000,000 and a supplementary Special Grant of \$150,000, making a gross total of \$2,660.343. From this sum there falls to be deducted \$61.811 for interest written to certain scholarship and trust funds, leaving available for expenditure for salaries and maintenance \$2,598.532.

The disbursements under the appropriations for these purposes (exclusive of the Ontario College of Education which is maintained by a separate vote) totalled

\$2.607.796. There was consequently an excess of expenditures over receipts of \$9.264, which has been met from the credit balance of \$64,760 available from 1933-34 as shown in the report of that year, leaving a balance of \$55.496 carried forward to be applied towards the expenditures of the year 1935-36.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

1934-35

With the exception of some new construction at the Connaught Laboratories Farm, for which this office is responsible both for design and construction, no new buildings were started during the year. The total expenditure on buildings already under construction, but not completed, amounted to approximately \$16,000.00. This expenditure took place in connection with the Royal Ontario Museum and the David Dunlap Observatory, both jobs now being practically completed. The Observatory was officially opened by the Donor. Mrs. D. A. Dunlap, on Friday, May 31st. 1935.

## Buildings (Maintenance)

During the year, approximately \$73.000.00 was expended on Repairs and Renewals of the University buildings and the Royal Ontario Museum. With this amount, which is considerably less than one-half of one per cent. of replacement valuation, we are restricted largely to maintaining the fabric and mechanical services in the buildings. Such items as improved lighting and interior decoration cannot be maintained as they should be.

During the year, the regular practice of testing all fire hose has been followed, and the necessary replacements made. Chemical extinguishers have been discharged and refilled, and special extinguishers provided for special hazards. An inspector from the Toronto Fire Department has also made an inspection of our buildings from a fire hazard standpoint.

In addition to the 58 buildings directly supervised by my office, heat and electricity are supplied to Knox College, Victoria College, Emmanuel College, Wycliffe College, and some power to Trinity College.

The expenditure for fuel and electricity for University buildings and the Royal Ontario Museum, and the services to the colleges mentioned above, was approximately \$140,000,00.

## EMPLOYEES AND WORKSHOPS

The average number of employees working for the office, exclusive of contracts, was 265, tradesmen accounting for 73 of this number. The merchandise distributed through Superintendent's Stores amounted to approximately \$83,000.00. The wage item for sundry labour was approximately \$255,000.00, while salaries of semi-permanent staff amounted to \$33,025.00, making a total of approximately \$283.000.00. These figures include services rendered to Connaught Laboratories, Hart House, the Athletic Association, etc., the Royal Ontario Museum, and the colleges.

## PURCHASING

During the year, 8,752 departmental orders and 6,392 Superintendent's Stores and work orders, a total of 15,144, were sent out, and, in consequence, 20,795 accounts were passed for payment. These purchases involved the passing of 1,498 customs entries handled within the office. In addition, accounts totalling 4,353 for work done were sent out for payment. Accounts are passed promptly for payment, so that all possible discounts are obtained, and the good will of the sales people maintained. Every effort is made to obtain the known benefits to which the University is entitled under the Customs and Sales and Excise Acts. During the year, the office has spent considerable time in the preparation of a claim for sales and excise tax, to which the University is entitled due to an undisclosed ruling.

## Post Office

During the year, the turnover in the branch Post Office in the University amounted to approximately \$35,000.00, of which the sale of stamps accounted for approximately \$25,000.00. The revenue to the University from this source was \$1,042.52.

## POLICE AND WATCHMEN

The Police Force, though small, is successful in handling the problems created by the public, and its relationship with the student body is cordial and, at the same time, effective. We are indebted to the City Police for their willing co-operation on all occasions. A close supervision is maintained on the nightwatchman service, and daily reports are carefully checked.

## CENTRAL PLANT

The amount of radiation heated from the Central Plant, exclusive of high pressure service was 344,237 square feet, as against 343,341 for the previous year. The total cost of operation was \$137,510.50, as against \$133.367.22 for the previous year. The total unit cost for heat and light was 39.9 cents per square foot of radiation, as against 38.9 cents for the previous year. The amount of 39.9 cents was made up of 24.4 cents for heat, and 15.5 cents for light. The average temperature, October to May inclusive, was 1.92 degrees above the average, against .7 degrees below the average for the same period the year before. Due to the higher temperature, the amount of coal burned was considerably less, but the total fuel cost was higher due to a substantial increase in the unit cost of coal.

Comparative tables showing the operation of the Central Plant and the distribution of charges for 1933-34 and 1934-35 are attached.
