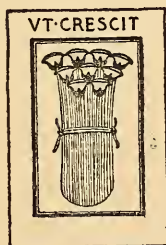

The Commander in Chief has the pleasure to inform the Army, that the honorable Congress have been pleased to come to the following resolutions

IN CONGRESS, May 1 1778

Resolved Unanimously, That all Military officers commissioned by Congress who now are, or hereafter may be, in the Service of the United States, and shall continue to [serve?] during the war, and shall not hold an [office] of profit under these States or any office after the conclusion of the war, shall be [en]titled to receive for the term of seven y[ears] if they live so long, one half of the present pay of such Officers, — Provided, that no General Officers of the Cavalry, Artillery, or Infantry, shall be entitled to receive more than the one half of the pay of a colonel of such Corps respectively — and provided, that the resolution shall not extend to any

officer in the service of the United States unless he shall have taken the oath of allegiance to and shall actually reside within some one of the United States.

Resolved unanimously that every non commissioned Officer and Soldier who hath enlisted or shall enlist into the service of these States for and during the war and shall continue therein to the end thereof, shall be entitled to receive the further reward of 80 dollars at the expiration of the war—

The whole Army are directed to prepare in the best manner possible for immediate and sudden movement

absolutely wanting in each, for such men as cannot be accommodated consistent with their health and comfort in huts. It will be relied upon in these returns, that none will make a larger demand than the real situation of their respective regiments requires. The Q. M. G. will make his issues upon these returns.

At a Gen^l. Court Martial whereof Col^o Bauman was President the 13 Inst, John Reynolds Artificer in Major Pollard's Corps tried for striking Lieu^t. Hemmet found guilty and sentenced to receive one hundred lashes. The Commander in Chief approves the sentence and orders it executed on the grand parade tomorrow morning at guard mounting —

Samuel Raymond at the same Court tried for presenting a loaded musket at L^t. Hemmet. Upon due consideration the Court are of opinion that he is guilty of the charge exhibited against him; but the extreme and unpardonable warmth with which the officers conducted themselves, renders the action of the prisoners in some measure excusable, and operates with the Court so strongly in his favor that they only sentence him to be reprimanded by the commanding Officer of the company to which he belongs.

Also John Coffin tried for abusing Cap^t Gowerly when attempting to suppress a riot on the other side of Schuylkill, found not guilty and acquitted —

The General approves the sentences and orders them to take place immediately —

The Sub and Brigade Inspectors, Majors of Bri-

gade, and Adjutants of the Army will assemble at the Baron Stubens quarters at 10 o'clock precisely, where they will receive particular orders —

The Inspectors &^c will attend at the Baron Stuben's quarters tomorrow at the hour appointed in the orders of the 19 instant.

If there are any persons in the Army who understand making thin Paper, such as bank notes are struck upon, they are desired to apply immediately to the Orderly Office, where they will be shewn a sample of the Paper — Officers commanding Regiments are to publish this in Regimental Orders —

Mr Vowles Adjutant in the Virg^a Reg^t. is approved to do the duty of Brigade Major in Gen^l. Woodford's Brigade till further orders.

At a General Court Martial the 15 inst whereof Col^o Bowman was President, Cap^t Cleaveland, of Col^o Mich^l. Jackson's Regiment, tried for behaving in an unofficerlike manner in refusing to do a tour of duty when duly notified, found not guilty of the charge exhibited against him, and acquitted with honor.

Although Cap^t Cleaveland ought not to have been

warned for duty when return'd sick, yet the General cannot applaud the spirit which actuated him in refusing obedience to a positive order, and declining a tour of duty such a kind as might have been in all appearance easily performed by Cap^t. Cleaveland in his circumstances — Cap^t. Cleaveland is released from his arrest —

At a Brigade Court Martial whereof L^t. Col^o. Cropper was President, Cap^t. Eward [*sic*] Hull of the 15 Virg^a. Reg^t tried for gaming when he ought to have been on the parade the 12 instant, unanimously found guilty of that part of the charge exhibited against him relative to gaming, but acquitted of nonattendance on the parade, and sentenced to be reprimanded by the Commanding Officer of the Brigade in present [*sic*] of all the officers thereof.

At the same Court Lieu^t. Thomas Lewis of the same Reg^t. tried upon a similar charge found guilty and sentenced the same as Cap^t Hull.

The Commander in Chief, however unwilling to dissent from the judgement of a Court Martial, is obliged utterly to disapprove these sentences; the punishment being in his opinion entirely inadequate to the offence. A practice so pernicious in itself, as that of gaming, so prejudicial to good order and military discipline, so contrary to positive and repeated general orders, carried to so enormous a height as it appears, and aggravated certainly in the case of L^t. Lewis, by an additional offence of no trifling military consequence — absence from parade, demanded a much severer penalty than simply a reprimand. — Cap^t Hull and Lieu^t. Lewis are to be released from arrest —

The Auditors Office is removed to Ja^s Cloyd's within a mile and a half of the Pay Master Generals.

At a General Court Martial the 16 ins^t. of which Col^o Bowman is President Lieu^t. Edison of the German Battalion tried for behaving in a manner unbecoming a gentleman and an officer in abusing Col^o Nixon's family, unanimously found guilty of the charge exhibited against him being a breach 21 Art. 14 Sec. Articles of War and sentenced to be discharged from the service.— The Commander in Chief approves the sentence and orders it to take place immediately.

At a Brigade Court Martial the 18^{inst.} Major Wallis President, L^t Marks of the 11th Virg^a.

Reg^t. tried for not attending the parade on the 13 ins^t. and unanimously acquitted of the charge with honor.

Likewise, L^t. W^m. Powell tried upon the same charge and acquitted in like manner —

The General observes that sickness or indisposition is certainly a sufficient excuse for not attending the parade but it ought to be an established rule to signify it either personally or in writing thro' the Adj^t. to the Commanding Officer of the Regiment to which the Officer concerned shall belong. These Gentlemen in not doing this were deficient in the line of regularity and propriety. Hereafter the excuse shall not be admitted unless this rule be observed except where any particular circumstances render the observance impracticable, which can rarely happen —

Commanding Officers of Brigades, in pursuance of former orders to hold themselves in readiness to march are to apply immediately to the Q M Gen^l for a sufficient number of waggons to transport their baggage, and are to have their respective brigades supplied as completely as possible with camp utensils, and necessaries of every kind requisite towards taking the field. The Commissary will have a quantity of hard bread and salt meat prepared to issue to the Army when called for; As we may expect every moment to march the Army is to be prepared in all respects for that purpose.

Guards of every kind are constantly to hold themselves in a collected state with their accoutrements on, and ready to act at a moments warning. The General forbids all exercise and diversions, particularly such as cause them to disperse and put off their accoutrements, which is equally incommittant with the safety and good discipline.

A Board of General Officers to set tomorrow morning ten o'clock at Gen^l Lee's quarters to examine into L^t Col^o Regnier's claim of rank in the N York line, and report their opinion thereon. The other Lieu^t Colonels of that line present are to attend. The Commander in Chief will lay before the Board the memorial presented by L^t. Col^o Regnier with other papers.

A court of enquiry to set tomorrow to examine into the conduct of L^t. Col^o. Parks, reported to have been absent from camp without leave, and to have been negligent in his duty. All persons concerned will attend, Col^o Johnson is appointed President; Col^o. Parker, L^t Cols. Bunner and Starr, and Major Fenner will attend as Members at the Presidents quarters 9 oClock tomorrow morning. —

The Commanding Officers of Regiments and Corps are not, under any pretence whatever (unless duty requires it) to permit their officers or men to

be absent from camp, that they may be ready to march at an hours warning.

At a Gen^l. Court Martial, Col^o. Chambers President the 25 instant, Cap^t. Medaras, of the North Carolina Brigade, tried for forgery — after mature deliberation the Court are of opinion that Cap^t Madaras is guilty of the charge exhibited against him but as he could not have been actuated by motives self interested or injurious to Cap^t Jones, the Gentleman whose name he signed, and as he had before been perfectly acquainted with Cap^t. Jones's sentiments, the Court (thinking his crime, tho' he is yet truly blameworthy, alleviated by these circumstances) do sentence him to be reprimanded in General Orders.

The Commander in Chief approves the Sentence, and is much concerned to find that an Officer in this Army, should presume to sign a Brother Officer's name without his permission. Cap^t Medaras is ordered to be released from his arrest.

At the same Court W^m Whiteman Waggoner, tried for desertion and sentenced to receive sixty lashes — approved and ordered to be put in execution tomorrow morning on the grand parade at grand mounting —

Also, John Cline of the 10th Penn^a. Reg^t. tried for desertion and attempting to escape to the enemy, and for stealing a horse — found guilty of both charges and sentenced to receive 200 lashes, 100 for each crime. The Gen^l. approved the Sentence, and orders it put it execution this evening at roll call at the head of the Regiment to which he belongs

Also, John Wood Serj^t. in the 8 Penn^a. Reg^t. tried for desertion and attempting to the enemy, acquitted and ordered to be released from his confinement.

A commissioned officer to every fifty men is to remain, and a Field Officer to superintend the whole. The arms of the sick in each regiment are to supply as far as may be necessary the deficiency of those unfit for duty. If any remain they are to be left in care of the officer who stays with the sick — The Vaults are to be well covered before the Brigades quit the ground.

Commanding Officers of Divisions and all others are to pay the strictest attention that no women be suffered on any pretence to get into the waggons of the Army on the march.

Col^o Cortlandt is appointed to tarry in camp to superintend the sick left on the ground when the Army moves, and to send on the recovered men properly officered to join their respective Corps and Major will repair to the Yellow Springs and the hospitals near Camp, and superintend the Sick there. They will apply tomorrow at the Orderly office for written instructions —

The following will be observed as a standing model for the order of march, whether of the whole Army, a Division, Brigade, or Battalion. It may happen that some changes may be necessary in the strength and number of the advanced, rear, and flank guards, and in their relative distances to each other and to the main body, &^{ca}.; which are to be determined according to particular circumstances, and which the officers commanding will judge of. — But the general principles and rules here laid down are, in all cases, to be practised, only with such

variations in applying them as different situations may require.

When a Battalion receive orders to march, each company forms before its own quarters; the Captain having inspected into their arms and accoutrements conducts it to the regimental parade, where the Field Officers inspect the whole, forms each Battalion into 8 platoons for charging, agreeable to instructions given, and march it by platoons to the rendezvous. When only one battalion marches, the Colonel orders out an advanced and rear Guard, each consisting of 1 Lieu^t. 3 Non-Com-Officers 1 Drum and 20 privates — A Brigade composed of several Battalions has an advanced and rear guard, each consisting of 1 Captain, 2 Subs, 6 N. C. O. & 40 or 50 privates. — When several Brigades march together each Brigade furnishes a proportionable number for the advanced and rear guards — When the whole Army marches the new guards of the day form the advanced guard, and the old ones the rear guard. The new guards being assembled on the grand parade the Brigadier of the day forms them into a Battalion of 8 platoons, the eldest field officer of the day takes the command of it, and marches at the head of the column. The Brigadier of the preceeding day having assembled the old guards, forms them in the same manner, the eldest Field Officer taking the com-mand and marching in the rear of the column — The advanced guard should be from 50 to 200 paces in front of the column. Each advanced guard should send forward a detachment to serve as an advanced guard to itself; and that detachment should also send out a patrole in front, each an hundred paces in front of the

other — Thus, 1 Capt 2 Subs, 6 n. c. off. — 1 Drum, & 50 men will send out a non c. off. & 12 men — and that N. C. O. will also advance 4 men in his front. An advanced guard of a Lieu^t. & 20 men will advance 1 n. c. o. & 8 men, who will also advance 2 men in his front. The rear guard will observe the same rules, sending its detachments in the rear as the advanced guard does in front —

When a Brigade, Division, or the Army, marches by the right it is supposed the enemy is on the left — and the contrary. — Each Battalion will therefore send out on the flank exposed to the enemy, 1 Sub, 2 N. C. O. & 16 men as a flank guard, who will march in a platoon by files from the right opposite the centre of the battalion, at the distance of 80 or 100 paces from the column.

When the Army marches in 2 columns, the right column has its flank guard on its right and the left column on its left, — when in one column, and the position of the enemy uncertain, guards must be sent out on both flanks. The advanced, rear, and flank guards must always have their bayonets fixed. Whenever the grounds will permit, the battalions must march by platoons; during the march each Colonel must stay before his battalion, and each Captain & Subaltern before his platoon; the intervals between the battalions and platoons must be strictly observed during the march — When there is a creek or defile to pass, the Brigadiers must stop till their Brigade have passed, and the Colonels till their respective battalions have passed. They will take care that the men pass with as large a front, and as quick, as possible. The advanced guard

having passed the defile should take such a situation as to be able to see all around, and shall send out patrols 500 paces round. The head of the column halts before it enters the defile to let the platoons get at half distance, and when half the column has got through it halts till the whole has passed and then continues its march. When the road will not permit to march by platoons, the march is to be made by 4 in front, in the following manner,—each officer divides his platoon into sections—for example, a platoon of 16 files makes 4 sections; they will break off by the right or left, each section 2 paces from the other, and continue the march—If a platoon has 15 files the last section will have 3 files—if 14, the last will have 4 men in one rank, if 13 files the last will have 5 files—When marching in this order by the right the officers commanding platoons will be on the left of the first section, the Serj^t on the right stays in his place, and the Officers & N. C. O. who were in the rear will be on the right flank. If they march in this order by the left the C. Off. of the platoon remains on the right of the first section and the others on the left flank; so that by wheeling the sections the platoon will be formed, and each officer and n. c. o. will be in his place.

During the march each Officer must keep his platoon in order; the Officers & N. C. O. in the rear must prevent the soldiers leaving their ranks on any account. If the soldiers have occasion for water the officer must send a n. c. o. with some men to fill their canteens and the n. c. o. must bring them back to their platoons immediately.

The flank guard will never suffer any non c. officer or soldier to pass them during the march, and the rear guard will take care to bring up all stragglers.

The following Resolve of Congress, the operation of which has been heretofore prevented by the particular circumstances of the Army, is in future to be punctually observed.

IN CONGRESS, Nov. 19th 1776.

Resolved That on any sick or disabled non commissioned officer or soldier being sent to any hospital or sick quarters, the Captain or Commandant of the troop or company to which he belongs shall send to the Surgeon or Director of the said Hospital, or give to the N. C. O. or soldier so in the hospital or quarters a certificate countersigned by the Pay Master of the Regiment (if he be with the reg^t.) of what pay is due to such N. C. O. or private at the time of his entering the hospital or quarters, and the Cap^t. or Com^t. of the Troop or Company shall not receive the pay of the said soldier in Hospital or quarters or include him in any pay abstract during his continuance therein. And in case any N. C. O. or soldier shall be discharged from the hospital or quarters as unfit for further service, a certificate shall be given him by the Surgeon or Director of what pay is then due to him, and the said N. C. O. or Soldier so discharged shall be entitled to receive his pay at any pay office or from any pay master in the service of the United States, the said Pay Master keeping such original certificate to prevent impositions and giving the N. C. O. or soldier his discharge or a certified copy thereof, mentioning at the same time his having been paid.— That this Resolution be transmitted to the Commanders in Chief in the several departments to be by them

given out in orders and then delivered to the directors of the hospitals in each department who are to cause the same to be fixed up in some conspicuous place or places in every military Hospital for the information of all concerned.

Commanding Officers of Regiments are immediately to make returns to the Com^y of Military Stores of the Arms actually wanting in their respective Corps to complete the number of men fit for duty in each. Agreeable to which the Com^y is forthwith to issue the arms now in store.

All Persons whatever are forbid selling liquor to the Indians. If any sutler or soldier shall presume to act contrary to this prohibition, the former will be dismissed from camp, and the latter receive severe corporal punishment.

On the march L^t. Col^o. Fleury will be attached to General Lee's Division—L^t Col^o Daviss to Gen^l. Lord Stirlings—L^t Col^o Barber to Gen^l. Mifflins—M^r. ought immediately to have been reported to and deposited with the Q^r M General. — L^t. M^cDonald is released from arrest. —

Jones, that he was incapable of having retained the gloves with a fraudulent intention; but as he has been clearly proved to have been guilty of the pernicious practice of *gaming*, which will invariably meet with every mark of his disapprobation, he confirms the sentence of dismissing Lieu^t Jones.

At the same Court Lieu^t. John Roberts, of the 2^d North Carolina Regiment tried, — 1st for behaving in a scandalous, infamous manner — 2^{dly} for absenting himself from camp without leave." The Court having considered the charges and evidence are unanimously of opinion that L^t. John Roberts is not guilty of the charges exhibited against him, and do acquit him —

The General approves the acquittal — but is sorry to see little personal bickerings between officers, which cannot with propriety be drawn into military offences, made the subjects of a court martial —

Some misunderstanding, and mistake in consequence, having arisen with respect to the Major Generals commands. The Commander in Chief directs that till a more perfect arrangement can be made under the new establishment, or till further orders on this head, each Major General is to command the Division heretofore assigned him,

previous to the late disposition for a march; but in case of an alarm, or any other General Movement of the Army, the three oldest Major Generals present and fit for duty are during the occasion to command the right and left wings and second line of the Army, agreeable to the General Order of the 23^d of May last. The North Carolina Brigade is to supply the place of Maxwells in Lord Stirlings Division, till further orders.

Upon firing the signal guns for an alarm, the Troops are to form immediately in front of their respective Brigades, and are to be marched by the senior Major Generals as above, to their respective alarm posts.

The 1^t & 2^d Maryland, and Varnum's Brigades are to draw up in front of their respective encampments and send to the Commander in Chief for orders.

A Major General is to be appointed for the day, who, with the Brigadier and Field Officers on that duty are carefully to attend to the police and good order of the camp. They are always to be on the grand parade at Guard Mounting, and when the Guards are marched off the Major General will make a distribution of the several duties of the day among the Field Officers of it. He is to receive and report to the Commander in Chief all the remarkable occurrences which happened during his tour of duty, and will attend in an especial manner to the order of the 9th instant respecting prisoners, as there is reason to believe that many of them are improperly detained in the provost.

All unnecessary waste of Timber is to be avoided.

The Commanding Officers will know that their Q^r Masters attend particularly to this business.

The Commander in Chief having received ample testimony of the general good character and behavior of Lieut Jones, who was sentenced to be dismissed the service by a Gen^l Court Martial, which sentence was approved by him on the 6th instant; and being further satisfied by Gen^{ls}. Woodford, Scott and other Officers that that Gentleman is not addicted to the vice of gaming, restores him to his rank and command in the Regiment he belonged to, and in the line of the Army.

At a Brigade General Court Martial June 2^d 1778, L^t. Col^o Adams President, Cap^t. Norwood tried for "refusing to comply with a general order issued expressly for the relief of the Troops on picket, founded on the necessity of the case, which at that period could not be otherwise remedied," found guilty of the charge exhibited against him and sentenced to be privately reprimanded by the Officer commanding the Reg^t. to which he belongs —

The Commander in Chief utterly disapproves the sentence, as altogether inadequate to the Offence. The mutinous and dangerous spirit which actuated Captain Norwood merited, in his opinion, the most exemplary punishment — He is to be released from his arrest. —

At a Gen^l Court Martial the 5 Ins^t. Col^o Chambers President, L^t Col^o Hubley of the 10 Penn^a Reg^t. tried for malicious behavior in being the occasion of Col^o Nagle's signing a false return, to the injury of his honor and contrary to good order and military discipline in the case of Cap^t Long, who as

Col^o Hubley told Col^o Nagle was absent without leave, tho' he had Col^o Hubleys and Gen^l. Waynes orders to remain at Lancaster till the business he was sent on was perfected." After mature deliberation the Court are unanimously of opinion that L^t Col^o Hubley is not guilty, and do acquit him with honor. — The Commander in Chief confirms the opinion.

At the same Court Cap^t Redman of Late Col^o Patten's Reg^t. tried for "misconduct on the night of the 11th of last April; first, in neglecting to guard the passes by which means Cap^t. Humphry was surprized, — 2^{dly} not coming to Capt Humphry's assistance when he was attacked by the Enemy" — The Court are unanimously of opinion that Cap^t. Redman is not guilty of the first charge exhibited against him and do acquit him; they are of opinion that Cap^t. Redman is guilty of the 2^d charge but think that his reasons for not marching to the assistance of Cap^t Humphry are sufficient and do unanimously acquit him with honor. — The Commander in Chief confirms the opinion of the Court.

At the same Court Will^m. Powell, soldier in Col^o Angel's Regiment, was tried, "first for desertion, 2^{dly} for reinlisting — 3^{dly}. for perjury" — found guilty and sentenced to receive 300 lashes 100 for each crime, and return to Col^o Angell's Reg^t. — The Com^r. in Chief approves the sentence so far as it extends to 100 lashes —

Likewise Edward Conolly, soldier in Col^o Harrison's Reg^t. of Artillery tried "first for deserting to the enemy — 2^{dly}. reinlisting into Col^o Weltner's Reg^t." found guilty of the charges exhibited against

him and sentenced to receive 200 lashes, 100 for each crime — The Commander in Chief approves the sentence the same as Powell's — These sentences to be put in execution tomorrow morning at the head of the Reg^t to which they belong —

The grand parade is assigned in front of Late Conways Brigade.

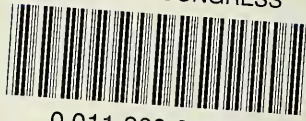
