Explanation of the Articles in the Calendar.

Standard times* are given in all columns headed Toronto, Quebec, and Winnipeg.

The times* of the Sun's Risino and Settino† are given for the upper limb, and are corrected for refraction for Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg.

The standard times* both for the rising and setting of the Moon's centre are given for every day for Toronto, Outshood Winnipeg.

Quebec and Winnipeg.

The column, Sun on Meridian, gives the time that a watch keeping local mean time should show when the shadow of a sun dial is on the noon mark.

Moon's Age.—This column shows to the nearest tenth of a day the Moon's age at Toronto mean noon.

The column, UPPER TRANSIT OF POLE STAR, shows for every day the mean time* at which the Pole Star makes its upper transit across the meridian of longitude 4h. 46m. W. It passes the meridian twice on October 13th.

The time at which the lower transit of the Pole Star occurs may be found by adding 11h. 58m. 2s. to the time of

The column transit of the fole star occurs may be found by adding fin. 38th. 28. to the time of the preceding upper transit.

The column, Transit of First Point of Aries, shows for every day the meantime* at which the First Point of Aries passes the meridian of longitude 4h. 46m. W. (71° 30'), and for any other meridian a correction of 0.655 secs. per degree will have to be applied minus for longitudes west of the 71° 30', and plus for east. This column is put in especially to be used in connection with the Tables for Time and Azimuth of Polaris when vertical with certain other stars.

GREATEST ELONOATION OF THE POLE STAR.—This column gives the greatest Azimuth of the Pole Star east or west from the meridian as observed at a place in latitude 42°, with the corresponding corrections, which are

additive, for latitudes up to 65°. (See pages 33 and 34.)

From the time of the upper transit of the Pole Star may be found the time of its greatest western or eastern elongation, by adding or subtracting the constants given in the annexed Table. These constants are calculated for declination 88° 47° 34″. The maximum error in the use of this Table will not exceed 3 secs. in the higher latitudes, and proportionately less for the lower latitudes.

Moon's Phases.—This Table gives the times (standard 75th meridian)* when the Moon passes the geocentric longitudes of 0°, 90°, 180°, and 270° east of the sun. It gives also the times of her greatest and least distance from the earth.

*In the present Almanac the hours are numbered from 0 (midnight) to 23.

†Although these times are calculated for Toronto, Quebec and Winnipeg only the standard times at other places not differing much from them in latitude may be obtained with sufficient accuracy for ordinary purposes by adding four minutes for every degree west, and subtracting four minutes for every degree east of these places.

Star Table.

From the times of the transit of the First Point of Aries may be derived, with the aid of the following table, the approximate times of culmination, and of the rising and setting of the principal fixed stars, as seen from the parallel of 45° north latitude.

To ascertain when any star found in the following Table will be on the meridian, add the number in the left-hand column of figures to the transit of the First Point of Aries for the given day in the calendar. If the result exceeds 24 hours, subtract 23h. 56m. To find the time of rising of a star, subtract the number opposite to it in the right-hand column of figures from the time of its meridian passage. For the setting of a star, add the same number to the time of its meridian passage. The stars marked (....) revolve in a circle of perpetual apparition, and do not rise or set at places in and to the north of latitude 45°.

Eclipses.

In the year 1903 there will be four colipses, two of the sun and two of the moon:

I.—An annular eclipse of the sun, 1903, March 28th.

This eclipse will be visible as a partial eclipse in the Yukon District and part of British Columbia.

The eclipse will begin at Dawson City 16h. 48m, 135th meridian time, or 4h. 30m. p.m. local mean time. The greatest obscuration takes place at 17h. 53m., 135th meridian time, or 5h. 35m. p.m. local mean time. The magnitude of the eclipse will be 0.76 (sun's diameter = 1.0).

II.—A partial eclipse of the moon, 1903, April 11th; partly visible in Canada.

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

AZIMUTH OF "POLARIS" AND LOCAL MEAN TIME.

BY F. L. BLAKE, O.L.S. & D.L.S. (Astronomical Officer, Observatory, Toronto).

These Tables are for finding the Azimuth of Polaris and the Local Mean Time (not Standard time) when in the same Vertical Circle with certain bright stars to be observed during the evening between sunset and midnight.

The arrangement of the tables has been considerably altered from that of last year. Six stars have been selected suitable for TIME purposes, namely, \$\beta\$ Oaionis (Rigel), \$\alpha\$ Leonis (Altair) a Virginis (Spica), \$\alpha\$ Serpentis, \$\alpha\$ Aquilæ (Altair) and \$\alpha\$ Aquari. The remaining fourteen stars are for azimuth only.

To obtain the Azimuth of Polaris a certain logarithm is tabulated called Log. B., and is to be used in the following azimuth formulæ: Cotang. Az. = Cos. Lat. B.

The azimuth thus obtained will have to be corrected for time interval between the sighting on *Polaris* and the passage of the Star across the vertical line. This correction is obtained by multiplying the seconds of time interval by the decimal in column a.

The Local Mean Time is obtained by using the column under the heading TIME in conjunction with the Transit of the First Point of Aries over the meridian of longitude, 4h 46m or 71° 30′ W., and for any other meridian the tabulated Transit of First Point of Aries should receive a correction of 0.655 secs. for each degree of longitude differing from 71° 30′. Subtractive when the place of observation is West and additive East.

A method of taking the observation would be as follows: A short time before the *Local Mean Time* of passage of the selected Star (this time should be obtained from the Star table given on page 14) have the instrument set up, well levelled and the collimation error reduced to zero. Sight on *Polaris*, clamp the azimuth plate and turn the telescope over to the other star and wait till it appears in the field of view. Then turn back again to *Polaris* and bisect accurately by means of the tangent screw, note the time and again turn over to the other Star and take the time of its passage over the wires.

Either hefore or after this observation the *Latitude* may be very easily obtained from the Latitude Tables which follow by sighting on *Polaris*, noting the time and reading the altitude circle.

By means of these tables the Time, Latitude and Azimuth of Polaris may be obtained in a very short time.

EXPLANATION OF TABLES.

- "TIME. The time to be applied to the Transit of the First Point of Aries for the day of observation to obtain the true Local Mean Time.
- Log. B. The logarithms used in obtaining the Azimuth of Polaris.

The Transit of the First Point of Arics will be found in the calendar tabulated for every day of the year for longitude 71° 30′ W. The elevation of the stars are given to help identify it. The altitudes are for latitude 42°.

EXAMPLE.

Suppose that in latitude 48° 30′ 10″ and longitude 85° 20′ by account on August 11th, 1903, *Polaris* was observed at watch time 22^h 29^m 5^s and a Aquilæ (*Altair*) in the same vertical at 22^h 32^m 10^s, giving a time interval of 185 seconds. Required the watch error and Azimuth of Polaris.

For ascertaining the Local Mean Time and the Azimuth of Polaris. To find the Azimuth of Polaris add together the tabulated Log. B, and the Log. Cosine of the latitude. The result is the Log. Cotangent of the Azimuth. If there is a Time Interval between the observation on Polaris and the star selected the correction in Column a will have to be multiplied by the time interval in seconds and applied.

TABLES FOR "LATITUDE" BY AN OBSERVED "ALTITUDE OF POLARIS" AT ANY TIME.

By F. L. Blake, O.L.S. & D.L.S. (Astronomical Officer, Observatory, Toronto).

Note the watch time when Polaris is observed and correct for watch error.

Reduce the Observed Altitude to the True Altitude by correcting for index error and refraction.

Next take the difference between the True watch time and the Almanac time of the Upper Transit of Polaris for the given day. (This Almanac time will have to be corrected for any other longitude than 71° 30′ for which it is tabulated by Adding 0.655 secs. for every degree East and Subtracting when the place of observation is West of 71° 30'.)

Call this difference the Hour Angle.

Table I.—With this Hour Angle and the True Altitude enter Table I. and apply the correction to the True Altitude always additive.

Table II.—Enter Table II. with the Hour Angle and apply the correction with its proper sign.

Table III.—Enter Table III. with the Date and Hour Angle and apply the correction with the same sign as used in Table II.

The result is the Latitude.

EXAMPLE.

The correction for an increase of altitude of one inch in the barometer or for a decrease of one degree in the thermometer, is to be added to the tabular refraction, but when the barometer is lower than 30 inches, or the thermometer higher than 47°, the corrections become subtractive. When great accuracy is required, 0.003 inch should be deducted from the observed height of the barometer for each degree that the thermometer near it is above 50°, and the same quantity added for an equal decrease.

TIDE TABLES FOR HALIFAX, QUEBEC, AND ST. JOHN, N.B., 1903.

These Tide Tables, with Tidal Differences for other places, are issued by the Tidal Survey Branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries of the Dominion of Canada. They are based upon direct observations of the tides, obtained by means of self-registering tide-gauges, which are kept in continuous operation day and night throughout the year. The records are reduced by the latest methods of analysis, and the computation of the tables is made in the Nautical Almanac Office, London.

The Tide Tables for Halifax are based upon the analysis of a record which was obtained during the years 1851, 1852, 1860 and 1861, with which there has been incorporated the record for one full year from the present tide-gauge. The Quebec Tables are now based upon the record for six complete years. The St. John Tables are based upon the record for two complete years.

The Tidal Differences are based upon simultaneous observations taken throughout the St. Lawrence and the Bay of Fundy, in the summer seasons of 1898 and 1900.

Statement of the Receipts and Payments from the Consolidated Fund for the year ending 30th June, 1901.

The receipts from the sources of the ordinary revenue of the country are paid into what is called the Consolidated Fund, and payments therefrom are made to cover the ordinary expenses. These receipts and payments, therefore, constitute what may be considered as the regular income and expenditure of the country, receipts from and expenditure out of loans and all other extraordinary transactions being excluded.

LEGAL WEIGHTS AND MEASURES IN CANADA.

The legal weights and measures of Canada are the Imperial yard, Imperial pound avoirdupois, Imperial gallon (of 277-27384 cubic inches), and the Imperial bushel. The Imperial gallon is equal to 4.54174 litres, while the wine gallon, used in the United States, is equal to 3.785 litres.

By Act 42nd Vic. (1879), Chap. 16 (amended by Chap. 30, Acts of 1898), it is provided: That in contracts for sale and delivery of any of the undermentioned articles, the bushel should be determined by weighing, unless a bushel measure be specially agreed upon, the weight equivalent to a bushel being as follows:—

Wheat, 60 lbs. Indian Corn, 56 lbs. Rye, 56 lbs. Pease, 60 lbs. Barley, 48 lbs. Malt, 36 lbs. Oats, 34 lbs.

Beans, 60 lbs. Flax seed*, 56 lbs. Hemp, 44 lbs, Blue grass seed, 14 lbs. Lime‡, 80 lbs. Castor beans, 40 lbs. Potatoes, 60 lbs. Turnips, 60 lbs. Carrots, 60 lbs. Parsnips, 60 lbs. Beets, 60 lbs. Onions†, 50 lbs. Bituminous coal, 70 lbs. Clover seed, 60 lbs. Timothy, 48 lbs. Buckwheat, 48 lbs.

By the same Act the British hundredweight of 112 pounds and the ton of 2,240 pounds were abolished, and the hundredweight was declared to be 100 pounds, and the ton 2,000 pounds avoirdupois, thus assimilating the weights of Canada and the United States.

SHORT HISTORY OF CANADA.

FROM 1497 TO 1901.

The following brief resumé of the principal events in the history of our country is taken from the Statistical Abstract, and will be found of interest. The remarkable events of the year 1901-1902 are given in another portion of the Almanac.

CHRONOLOCICAL LANDMARKS IN THE HISTORY OF CANADA.

1497—June 24. Cabot discovered Cape Breton. 1500—Gasper Cortereal entered the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

1517-Sebastian Cabot discovered Hudson Bay. 1524 - Verrazano explored the Atlantic coast of Nova

Scotia. Landing of Jacques Cartier at Esqui-1534—July 1.

maux Bay. First landing on Canadian soil. 1535—July. Second visit of Cartier.

August 10. Cartier anchored in a small bay at the mouth of the St. John River, which, in honour of the day, he named after St. Law-rence. The name was afterwards extended to

the gulf and river.

1540—Third visit of Cartier.

1542-43—The Sieur de Roberval and his party wintered

at Cap Rouge.

1598—The Marquis de la Roche landed 40 convicts on Sable Island, where they were left for five years without relief, only twelve being found alive at the end of that time.

1603—First visit of Samuel de Champlain to Canada.

1605—Founding of Port Royal (Annapolis), Acadia (derived from an Indian word "Cadie," a place of abundance), by the Baron de Poutrincourt.

1608—Second visit of Champlain. Founding of Quebec, the first permanent settlement of Canada.

The name is said to be an Indian one, "Kebec," a strait. 28 settlers wintered there, including Champlain. Champlain.

1611—Establishment of a trading post at Hochelaga.

Jesuits arrive in Port Royal, Acadia.

1613—St. John's, Newfoundland, founded. Ottawa River discovered by Champlain. (Champlain sailed up the Ottawa River, crossed Lake

About this time began the migration into Canada and Nova Scotia of the United Empire Loyalists, as they were called—that is, of those settlers in the United States who had remained faithful to the British cause. The Loyalists were well treated by the British Government, and large grants of land were made to them in various parts of the country. The banks of the St. Lawrence and the shores of Lake Ontario, in particular, were settled by about 10,000 persons, on lands allotted to them by the Government.

THE BRITISH CENSUS OF 1901.

The total number of persons returned as living in England and Wales at midnight on Sunday, March 31st, 1901, was 32,526,075. This shows an increase of 3,523,-550 upon the number enumerated on April 5th, 1891, and gives a decennial rate of increase of 12·17 per cent., which favourably contrasts with the increase of 3,028, 086, or 11 65 per cent. in the previous decennium. The increase is numerically greater than in any previous decennium, but the progression per cent. is lower than in any other decennium of the last century, except

in any other decentum of the last century, except those terminating in 1861 and 1891.

Of the 32,526,075 persons enumerated 15,721,728 were males and 16,804,347 females. This gives an excess of 1,082,619 females, an excess which is partially attributable to the fact that men serving in the Army, Navy, and the Merchant Service abroad are excluded from the exception. In 1801 the excess was 806.723. To each reckoning. In 1891 the excess was 896,723. To 100 males enumerated there were 106 9 females. To each proportion of females has been steadily increasing at each census since 1851, having been successively 104.2, 105.3, 105.4, 105.5, 106.4, and 106.9 to 100 males.

Inhahited houses number 6,266,496, as contrasted with 5,451,497 in 1891, an increase of 814,999, or 15.0 per cent. For the period ending 1891 the increase had been at the rate of no more than 12.8 per cent.

The population of Scotland was 4,471,957, showing an increase of 446,310 in the 10 years, or 11'1 per cent., against 11,2 and 7.8 per cent. in the two preceding decennia. The excess of births over deaths in the 10 decennia. The excess of births over deaths in the 10 years was 499,768, showing that the loss of population during that period by excess of emigration over immigration was 53,458.

The population of Ireland was 4,456,546, and less by 248,204 than the number recorded at the previous Census in 1891; the decrease, which had been equal to 4.4 and 9.1 per cent. in the two preceding decennia, fell again to 5.3 per cent. in the last intercensal period. The excess of births over deaths in Ireland during the Census period 1891-1901 was equal to 218,222. It follows, therefore, that the loss of population during that period by excess of emigration over immigration must have amounted to 466,426, or nearly half a million. The population of Ireland at the recent Census but slightly exceeded a half of that enumerated at the Census in 1841, and for the first time fell below the population of Scotland, which exceeded that of Ireland by 15,411. by 15,411.

CANADIAN TARIFF OF CUSTOMS.

MEANING OF TERMS USED.

In this Act, and in any other Act relating to customs,

The expression "proof" or "proof spirits," when applied to wines or spirits of any kind, means spirits of a strength equal to that of pure ethyl alcohol compounded with distilled water in such proportions that the resultant mixture shall at a temperature of sixty degrees Fahrenheit have a specific gravity of 0.9198 as compared with that of distilled water at the same

The expression "gauge," when applied to metal sheets or plates or to wire, means the thickness as

determined by Stubbs's standard gauge;
The expression "in diameter," when applied to tubing, means the actual inside diameter;
The expression "sheet," when applied to metals,

means a sheet or plate not exceeding three-sixteenths of

an inch in thickness;
The expression "plate," when applied to metals, means a plate or sheet more than three-sixteenths of an inch in thickness.

FISH FROM UNITED STATES AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

The whole or part of the duties hereby imposed upon fish and other products of the fisheries may be remitted as respects either the United States or Newfoundland, or both, upon proclamation of the Governor in Council, which may be issued whenever it appears to his satisfaction that the Governments of the United States and Newfoundland, or either of them, have made changes in their tariffs of duties imposed upon articles imported from Canada, in reduction or repeal of the duties in force in the said countries respectively.

EXPORT OF GAME PROHIBITED.

The export of wild turkeys, quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock, in the carcase or parts thereof, is hereby declared unlawful and prohibited; and any person exporting or attempting to export any such article shall for each offence incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the article so attempted to be exported shall be forfeited, and may, on reasonable cause of sussnan beforested, and may, on reasonable cause of suspicion of intention to export, be seized by any officer of the customs, and, if such intention is proved, shall be dealt with as for breach of the customs laws: Provided, that this section shall not apply to the export, under such regulations as are made by the Governor in Company of a carcase or part thereof of any deer raised or bred by any person company or association of persons bred by any person, company or association of persons upon his or their own lands.

Deer when shot for sport, under license, may be exported under regulations of the Customs Department.

Regulations respecting the export of "Home-bred Deer."

Any person who wishes to export any carcase or parts thereof of deer raised or bred upon his own land, or upon lands owned by a company or association of persons of which he is a member, shall make affidavit upon the face of the export entry to the effect that the deer, the carcase or parts whereof is so entered for exportation, was raised or bred upon his own lands or upon lands owned or held by a company or association of persons of which he is a member (describing the location of such lands and naming the association or company of such lands, and naming the association or company holding the same).

DUTIES ON MOLASSES AND SYRUPS.

Regulations respecting the manner in which molasses and syrups shall be sampled and tested for the purpose of determining the classes to which they belong with reference to the duty chargeable thereon shall be made by the Controller of Customs, and the instruments and appliances necessary for such determination shall be designated by him and supplied to such officers as are by him charged with the duty of sampling and testing such molasses and syrups; and the decision of any officer (to whom is so assigned the testing of such

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articles) as to the duties to which they are subject under the tariff shall be final and conclusive, unless upon appeal to the commissioner of customs within thirty days from the rendering of such decision, such decision is, with the approval of the controller, changed; and the decision of the commissioner with such approval shall be final,

DUTIES ON WINES AND SPIRITS.

In the case of all wines, spirits, or alcoholic liquors subject to duty according to their relative strength of proof, such strength shall be ascertained either by means of Sykes's hydrometer or of the specific gravity bottle, as the Minister of Customs directs; and in case such relative strength cannot be correctly ascertained by the direct use of the hydrometer or gravity bottle, it shall be ascertained by the distillation of a sample and the subsequent test in like manner of the distillate.

MEDICINAL AND TOILET PREPARATIONS.

All medicinal or toilet preparations imported for completing the manufacture thereof, or for the manufacture of any other article by the addition of any ingredient or ingredients, or by mixing such preparations, or by putting up or labelling the same, alone or with other articles or compounds, under any proprietary or special name or trade-mark, shall be valued for duty under the provision of subsection two of section sixty-five of *The Customs Act*, as amended by section fifteen of chapter fourteen of the statutes of 1888.

MEDICINAL PREPARATIONS TO BE LABELLED.

All medicinal preparations, whether chemical or other, usually imported with the name of the manufacturer, shall have the true name of such manufacturer and the place where they are prepared, and the word "alcoholic" or "non-alcoholic," permanently and legibly affixed to each parcel by stamp, label or otherwise; and all medicinal preparations imported without such names and word so affixed may be forfeited.

DUTY ON PACKAGES.

Packages shall be subject to the following provisions: All bottles, flasks, jars, demijohns, carboys, casks, hogsheads, pipes, barrels, and all other vessels or packages, manufactured of tin, iron, lead, zinc, glass or any other material capable of holding liquids, and all packother material capable of holding liquids, and all packages in which goods are commonly placed for home consumption, including cases, not otherwise provided for, in which bottled spirits, wines or malt liquors or other liquids are contained, and every package being the first receptacle or covering inclosing goods for the purpose of sale, shall in all cases, not otherwise provided for, in which they contain goods subject to an advalorem duty or a specific and advalorem duty, be charged with the same rate of advalorem duty as is to be levied and callected on the goods they contain and be levied and collected on the goods they contain, and the value of the packages may be included in the value of such goods

All such packages as aforesaid containing goods subject to a specific duty only, and not otherwise provided for, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per cent. ad valorem;

Packages not hereinbefore specified, and not herein specially charged with or declared liable to duty, and being the usual and ordinary packages in which goods are packed for exportation, according to the general usage and custom of trade, shall be free of duty;

All such special packages or coverings as are of any se, or apparently designed for use other than the use, or apparently designed for use other than the importation of the goods they contain, shall be subject to the same rate of duty as would thereon be levied if imported empty or separate from their contents:

Packages (inside or outside) containing free goods shall be exempt from duty when the packages are of such a nature that their destruction is necessary in order to release the goods.

order to release the goods.

PENALTY FOR HAVING BLANK INVOICE WITH CERTIFICATE OF CORRECTNESS.

Any person who, without lawful excuse, the proof of which shall be on the person accused, sends or brings into Canada, or who, being in Canada, has in his posses-

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show, or which may be used to show, that the invoice which may be made from such bill-heading or blank is correct or authentic, is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to a penalty of five hundred dollars, and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months, in the dispersion of the court, and the goods entered in the discretion of the court, and the goods entered under any invoice made from any such bill-heading or blank shall be forfeited.

AFFIDAVIT OF IMPORTER CLAIMING LOWER RATE OF DUTY ON CERTAIN GOODS.

With respect to goods imported for manufacturing purposes that are admissible under this Act for any specific purposes at a lower rate of duty than would otherwise be chargeable, or exempt from duty, the importer claiming such exemption from duty, or proportionate exemption from duty, shall make and subscribe to the following affidavit or affirmation before the collector of customs at the port of entry, or before a notary public or a commissioner for taking affidavits:

a notary public or a commissioner for taking affidavits: I, (name of importer) the undersigned, importer of the (names of the goods or articles) mentioned in this entry, do solemnly (swear or affirm) that such (names of the goods or articles) are imported by me for the manufacture of (names of the goods to be manufactured) in my own factory, situated at (name of the place, county and province), and that no portion of the same will be used for any other purpose or disposed of until so manufactured.

BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

On and after the 1st day of August, 1898, section 17 of the said Act shall be repealed, and the following shall

provided in the British preferential tariff set forth in provided in the British preferential tariff set forth in Schedule D to this Act:—(a) The United Kingdom; (b) The British colony of Bermuda; (c) The British colonies, commonly called the British West Indies, including the following: the Bahamas, Jamaica, Turks and Caicos Islands, the Leeward Islands (Antigua, St. Christopher-Nevis, Dominica, Montserrat, and the Virgin Islands, the Windward Islands (Grenada, St. Vincent and St. Lucia), Barbados, Trinidad and Tobago; (d) British Guiana; (e) Any other British colony or possession the customs tariff of which is, on the whole, as favourable to Canada as the British preferwhole, as favourable to Canada as the British preferential tariff herein referred to is to such colony or possession.

Provided however, that manufactured articles to be admitted under such preferential tariff shall be bona fide the manufactures of a country or countries entitled to the benefits of such tariff, and that such benefits shall not extend to the importation of articles into the production of which there has not entered a substantial protection of the labour of such countries. Any question arising as to any article being entitled to such benefits shall be decided by the Minister of Customs, whose

decision shall be final.

"Raw sugar, including all sngar described in item 436 of Schedule A, may, when imported direct from any British colony or possession, be entered for duty or taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada at the reduced rate of duty provided in the British preferential tariff.

"The Minister of Customs, with the approval of the Governor in Council, shall determine what British colonies or possessions shall be entitled to the benefits of the preferential tariff under clause (d) of subsection 1

of this section.
"The Minister of Customs may, with the approval of the Governor in Council, make such regulations as are deemed necessary for carrying out the intention of this section.

THE FRENCH TREATY.

(Circular from the Customs Department, dated 14th October, 1895.)

I beg to send herewith, for your information and guidance, text of a proclamation by the Governor in Council, dated the 10th day of October, 1895, declaring the provisions of the French Treaty Act in force on, from and after the 14th October, 1895.

You are hereby advised that the said Act provides as | duty granted to any other power on any of the articles

follows:—

2. The present duty charged on common soaps, savons de Marseille (Castile soaps) shall be reduced by one-half.

3. The present duty charged on nuts, almonds, prunes and plums shall be reduced by one-third.

The following articles of Canadian origin imported

direct from that country accompanied by certificates of origin shall receive the advantage of the minimum tariff on entering France, Algeria or the French colonies:-Canned meats.

Condensed milk, pure. Fresh water fish, eels.

Fish preserved in their natural form.

Apples and pears, fresh, dried or pressed.

Fruits preserved, others.

So soon as The French Treaty Act, 1894, chapter two of the Statutes of 1894, is brought into force by the Governor General the divergers. proclamation of the Governor General, the advantages granted to France by the treaty with that power mentioned in the said Act, with respect to its commerce with Canada, shall extend to any and every other foreign power which by reason of the operation of such treaty is, under the provisions of a treaty with Great Britain, entitled, in whole or in part, to the same or to the like advantages with respect to its commerce with Canada, to the extent to which in manner aforesaid such other foreign power is entitled thereto; and such advantages shall continue to so extend to such other foreign power so long as the said Act remains in force, or until the right of such other foreign power to such advantages under its treaty with Great Britain is sooner determined.

3. The advantages so granted to France by the said treaty shall extend also to Great Britain and to the several British colonies and possessions with respect to their commerce with Canada, so long as France continues to be entitled to such advantages; and during the period for which France is so entitled to such advantages, all laws inconsistent with the enjoyment thereof by Great Britain and such British colonies and possessions shall be suspended to the extent to which they are so inconsistent. they are so inconsistent.

The Foreign Powers entitled to the same advantages under the provisions of the said Act, as are granted to France by the Treaty in question, with respect to its commerce with Canada, are:—Argentine Republic, Germany (Zellwagia), Austria Humany Magata Policier many (Zollverein), Austria Hungary, Muscat, Belgium, Russia, Bolivia, Salvador, Chili, Sweden, Norway, Columbia, Spain, Costa Rica.

All goods not enumerated as charged with any duty of Customs and not declared free of duty, shall be charged with a duty of 20 per cent. ad valorem, when imported into Canada, or taken out of warehouse for consumption therein.

SCHEDULE D.

BRITISH PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

On articles entitled to the benefits of this preferential tariff under section seventeen, the duties mentioned in schedule A shall be reduced as follows: The reduction shall be one-third of the duty mentioned in schedule A, and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall be two-thirds of the duty mentioned in schedule A.

Provided, however, that this reduction shall not apply to any of the following articles and that such articles shall in all cases be subject to the duties mentioned in schedule A, viz.: wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and articles containing alcohol; tobacco, cigars and cigarettes.

Provided further, that the reduction shall only apply to refined sugar, when evidence satisfactory to the Minister of Customs is furnished that such refined sugar has been manufactured wholly from raw sugar produced in the British colonies or possessions.

ARTICLES PROHIBITED TO BE IMPORTED INTO CANADA.

Books, printed papers, drawings, paintings, prints, photographs or representations of any kind of a treasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or indecent character.

Reprints of Canadian copyright works, and reprints of British copyright works which have been also copyrighted in Canada.

Coin, base or counterfeit.

Goods manufactured or produced wholly or in part by prison labor, or which have been made within or in connection with any prison, jail or penitentiary. Also goods similar in character to those produced in such institutions, when sold or offered for sale by any person, firm or corporation having a contract for the manufacture of such articles in such institutions or by any agent of such person, firm or corporation, or when such goods were originally purchased from or transferred, by any such contractor.

Oleomargarine, Butterine, or similar substitutes for butter.

Tea adulterated with spurious leaf, or with exhausted leaves, or which contains so great an admixture of chemical or other deleterious substances as to make it unfit for use.

The importation into Canada of any goods enumerated, described or referred to in schedule C to this Act is prohibited; and any such goods imported shall thereby become forfeited to the Crown and shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with as the Minister of Customs directs; and any person importing any such prohibited goods, or causing or permitting them to be imported, shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars.

METRICAL WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The French metrical system is based upon the (assumed) length of the fourth part of a terrestrial meridian. The ten millionth part of this arc was chosen as the unit of measures of length, and called a *Metre*. The cube of the tenth part of the metre was adopted as the unit of capacity, and denominated a *Litre*. The weight of a litre of distilled water at its greatest density was called a *Kilogranme*, of which the thousandth part, or *Gramme*, was adopted as the unit of weight. PRINCIPAL PHYSICAL FEATURES OF CANADA.

The principal physical features of Canada are the Rocky Mountains and the Laurentian range, the plains of the North-West Territories, the great lakes and Hudson Bay and the Bay of Fundy, and the Mackenzie River and St. Lawrence River basins.

The great inland lakes, five in number, form, with their connecting rivers, a complete system of navigation from the head of Lake Superior to the Atlantic Ocean, a distance of 2,381 miles. They cover an area of ahout

100,000 square miles.

Other lakes of large size arc Great Bear, 11,200 square miles; Great Slave, 10,100 square miles; Winnipeg,

9,400 square miles, and Athabaska, 4,400 square miles.

The principal mountains are the Rocky Mountains in the west, extending from the Arctic Ocean to the United States; they contain the highest points in the Dominion, among the chief being Mount Hooker, 16,760

The principal rivers are the St. Lawrence (with its tributaries, the Ottawa, the St. Maurice, the Richelieu and the Saguenay), the St. John, the Restigouche and the Miramichi rivers, flowing into the Atlantic Ocean; the Mackenzie, Coppermine and Great Fish rivers emptying into the Aretic Ocean; the Saskatchewan and Red, the Nelson, Churchill and Albany rivers flowing into the Hudson's Bay; the Fraser and Columbia emptying into the Pacific Ocean.

Hudson Bay is a large inland sea, having an area of 350,000 square miles. Including its two arms it has an extreme length north and south of 1,300 miles and a width across the bay proper of about 600 miles.

The Bay of Fundy, 170 miles long, and from 30 to 50 miles wide, nearly separates Nova Seotia from New Brunswick, the connecting Isthmus of Chignecto being about 15 miles wide.

The principal islands in Canada are Baffin Land, Prince Albert Land (which are the principal islands in the new district of Franklin), Vancouver and Queen Charlotte Islands in British Columbia; Prince Edward Island, Cape Breton Island and Anticosti in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

The climate varies greatly. The average mean temperature is—in Prince Edward Island, summer, 61.9 degrees F., and 19.5 in winter; New Brunswick, summer 60 degrees and winter 19.0; Nova Scotia, summer 65.2 and winter 25.0; Quebec, 58.3 summer and 15. winter; Ontario, 63.0 summer and 19.8 winter; Manitoba, 60.1 summer and 0.8 winter; British Columbia, summer 61 and winter 32.4.

In addition to the inner or advisory council, called the cabinet, there are other ministers helding subordingte positions in the covernment, but holding subordinate positions in the government, but who also retire with the cabinet in case of resignation or defeat. The whole number of persons comprising the government of Great Britain, including the chief officials for Scotland and Ireland, is forty-eight. The government hold office as long as they retain the confidence of the house of commons. The common law is the basis of justice in Great Britain and Ireland, and in all colonies and dependencies of the crown. ever, in the latter, the civil or other law is in force, it will be stated below in the case of the particular colony.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

The parliament of Great Britain is composed of the crown, lords, and commons. The lords consists at present of 592—archbishops (2), hishops (24) and peers, the latter divided into 22 dukes, 22 marquesses, 142 earls, 34 viscounts, and 341 barons. Six princes of the royal blood have also seats in the house. Scotland is represented by 16 peers, elected for each parliament, and Ireland by 28 representative peers elected for life. The speaker is the lord high chancellor of Great Britain, who is a member of the cabinet, and retires with a change of government. The house of lords has co-ordinate powers member of the cabinet, and retires with a change of government. The house of lords has co-ordinate powers of legislation with the house of commons, except as respects taxation or money bills. It cannot initiate or amend such bills, hut it may under exceptional conditions reject them as a whole. The house of commons is the body where the chief political power rests. It consists of 670 members, elected by the legal electors of Great Britain and Ireland, as follows: England 465, Wales 30, Scotland 72, Ireland 103. All elections are now by ballot. Since the reform bill of 1832 the franchise has been widely extended to all classes who have a stake in the country. The suffrage is now divided among freeholders, copyholders, leaseholders, occupants of lands and tenements, and lodgers of a specified value. The house of commons lasts for seven years, unless The house of commons lasts for seven years, unless sooner dissolved by the crown with the advice of the solved by the sovereign. The speaker and deputy speaker of the commons are elected by the house for the duration of the parliament. Members do not require a property qualification, but they must be British citizens of the age of 21 years, not bankrupts, or idiots of reriminals. Members are not paid. The system of local government has been much simplified quite recently. England and Wales are now divided into 62 cabinet. Parliament is summoned, prorogued and dis-

Executive Power.

The crown is hereditary, but subject to such limitations as may be imposed by parliament—i.e., by the crown, lords and commons. In the majority of towns local government is entrusted to commissioners, appointed by the Irish government.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—This rocky island is under the

control of the British Admiralty.

Australia, Commonwealth of, a federal dependency Australia, Commonwealth of, a federal dependency with representative and responsible government; population (1901), 3,767,443; area, 2,972,573: see statistics given below for New South Wales (p. 108), Tasmania (p. 109), South Australia (p. 109), Western Australia (p. 109), Queensland (p. 108), and Victoria (p. 109), which form the new federation proclaimed in 1901, under the Imperial Act passed in 1900, in accordance with the vector of the propule of these several dependencies. vote of the people of these several dependencies.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The king represented by a governor-general, appointed by the crown, and advised by an executive council, consisting at first of seven members. The government holds office as long as it has the confidence of the people, as expressed by their representatives in parliament. The principles of English parliamentary government prevail in the commonwealth and states of the federation.

Each state has an equal representation of six members, and half the number of senators shall retire every three years, but are re-eligible for re-election. The franchise for the election of a senator is the same as that for the popular body at the time of the union. The president is elected by the senate. The place of a senator becomes vacant if he is absent for two consecutive months of a session. The absent for two consecutive months of a session. house of representatives consists, as near as possible, house of representatives consists, as near as possible, of twice the number of senators, but no state shall have a smaller representation than five members. Members are elected for three years. The speaker is elected by the house. Members of each house receive £400 each as a sessional indemnity. Bills appropriating revenue or moneys, or imposing taxation shall only originate in the house of representatives. As in Canada and England by practice the senate way not amend kills investigated. land by practice, the senate may not amend bills imposing taxation or appropriating revenue or moneys for ordinary annual services of the government. But the senate may at any stage return to the lower house a bill senate may at any stage return to the lower house a bill requesting the amendment of any items or provisions therein, and the house may accept or reject such proposals. In case of a deadlock a dissolution takes place, and afterwards a joint sitting at which a majority of votes decide the fate of the disputed measure. The federal parliament has power to alter the franchise on which its members are elected, but it cannot diminish the voting powers of the people, or withdraw the right of women to vote as long as adult suffrage obtains in any states. The legislative powers of the federal parliament are alone enumerated, and all other powers rest with the state parliaments. In the event of a rest with the state parliaments. In the event of a federal law conflicting with an existing state law, the federal law shall prevail. The federal government has the administration of the departments of customs and excise, which form the chief sources of federal revenue, but of the net revenue from such duties not more than one-fourth shall be applied annually by the common-wealth towards its expenditure, and the balance shall be paid to the several states or applied towards the payment of interest on debts of the several states taken over by the federal government. Uniform duties of customs must be imposed within two years after the establishment of the commonwealth. The king may disallow any federal law within one year from the governor-general's assent. The capital of the commonwealth will be within New South Wales, but at least 100 miles from Sydnay, and must be in federal tentions. 100 miles from Sydney, and must be in federal territory.

Bahamas (West Indies), representative but not responsible government; population, 53,735; area, 5,800 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor appointed by the imperial government, as in other colonies and dependencies (except the provinces of the Dominion of Canada), assisted by an executive council of nine members, partly official and partly unofficial, having scats in one of the branches of the legislature.

Baluchistan, an independent feudatory state of India under the protectorate of Great Britain; population, 810,000, largely nomadic; area, 134,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A hereditary khan or chief, who is the head of a confederacy of chiefs, with undefined powers, and aided by a British political agent so far as British interests are concerned.

Barbadoes, with representative, but not responsible

government; population, 195,000; area, 166 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, assisted by an executive committee, officials, military officers, and such other persons as may be nominated by the king, one member of the legislative council, and four members of

the assembly, nominated by the governor.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—A legislative council of nine members, appointed by the king, and a house of assembly of 24 members elected annually by the people on a very liberal franchise, including persons enjoying pensions.

Basutoland, crown colony; population, 264,000, nearly all natives; area estimated at 10,300 square miles. nearly all natives; area estimated at 10,500 square lines.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A resident commissioner, appointed by the crown, acting under the direction of the high commissioner for South Africa.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative authority is exercised by the commissioner by

proclamation.

Bechuanaland, British; formerly a crown colony in South Africa. Annexed to Cape Colony in 1895. Population, about 72,000; area, 52,000 square miles.

Bechuanaland, protectorate of, in South Africa; population, about 200,000; area, 213,000 square miles. Chiefs rule the tribes under the protection of the British, represented by a resident commissioner and assistants.

Bermudas, with representative, hut not responsible government; population, 17,500; area, 20 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, assisted by a privy council, appointed by the crown, and consisting of four official and two unofficial members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—A legislative council of nine members, three of whom are official, and six unofficial, but all appointed by the crown. A house of assembly of 36 members, elected by a freehold qualification. Members must have a property qualification, and are paid 8s. a day for attendance. Hamilton and St. George have corporations.

British Central Africa, comprising Nyasaland, a British protectorate; estimated population, 1,000,000. Area, estimated at 42,217 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—The affairs of Nyasaland are ad-

ministered by an imperial commissioner under the instructions of the secretary of state for foreign affairs, and the territory beyond, under British influence, by a commissioner directed by the British South Africa chartered company.

British East Africa, comprising the East Africa protectorate and the Uganda protectorate, on the Maerland, is under the immediate jurisdiction of the foreign office, together with the islands of Zanzibar and Pemba still under the government of the Arab sultan. Commissioners and consul-generals represent British interests in the East African protectorates. total area is probably 1,000,000 square miles, with a population of three or four millions, of whom whites do not reach a thousand altogether.

British Honduras; crown colony; population, 37,000; area, 7,562 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Lieutenant-governor, assisted by

an executive council of seven members, three of whom are unofficial.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT,-Legislative council appointed by the crown, and consisting of three official and five unofficial members. The lieutenant-governor is president, ex-officio.

British North Borneo, a British protectorate; estimated population, 175,000; area, 31,106 square miles. EXECUTIVE POWER.—The affairs of this protectorate

are, under a royal charter, administered by a court of directors in London, with a governor, treasurer-general and residents appointed by them, but in the case of the

governor the appointment must be approved by the foreign secretary of state. The Indian penal and other laws are administered with such modifications as are necessary. English magistrates are stationed in the several provinces.

Brunei, a British protectorate; population, 15,000;

area, 3,000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A native state, with a sultan as a ruler. The consular courts at Borneo have jurisdiction here, with appeals to the supreme court of the Straits Settlements

Canada, Dominion of, a federal dependency, with representative and responsible government. Population (1901), 5,338,883; area, 3,315,647 square miles (exclu-

sive of waters).

EXECUTIVE POWER. — The king represented by a EXECUTIVE POWER. — The king represented by a governor-general, appointed by the crown, and advised by a cabinet chosen from members of the privy council of Canada, and consisting of 14 uninisters, holding departmental offices, besides one or more ministers without office. The government holds office as long as they have the confidence of the popular branch of parliament. The principles of parliamentary government are those of England. The common and criminal law of England prevails in all the provinces except Quebec, where the old French civil code and English criminal law are in force. criminal law are in force.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. - The LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—The king, senate, and house of commons. The senate is composed of 81 members, when full, appointed by the crown, possessed of property qualification and of the age of 30 years. The speaker is chosen by the crown. It has co-ordinate powers of legislation with the house of commons, except in the case of revenue, taxation, or money bills. Though it cannot initiate or amend such bills, it may reject them under extraordinary circumstances. Members are paid \$1,500 for a session of over 30 days, and a sum for travelling expenses at the rate of 10 cents a mile going and returning. The house of commons consists of 213 members, ing. The house of commons consists of 213 members, elected from 1885 until 1898 on a dominion franchise, elected from 1885 until 1898 on a dominion franchise, which was, in the latter year, repealed. Dominion elections are run on the provincial systems, with some unimportant limitations. Members require no property qualification, but they must be of the age of 21, and British subjects, not disqualified by law. The speaker is chosen by the commons. Parliament has a legal existence of five years unless sooner dissolved by the governor-general, and meets once every year. Members are paid the same as senators. As Canada nossesses a systematic property of the same as senators. paid the same as senators. As Canada possesses a system of federal government, her legislative powers are limited to certain subjects of dominion or national import, set forth in the written constitution, or British North America Act, of 1867, with the residue of power not expressly given to the provinces in the federal government. All the provinces of Canada, except government. All the provinces of Canada, except Prince Edward Island, possess a very complete system of municipal government, which entrusts certain quasi legislative powers to councils in municipal divisions known as cities, counties, townships, towns, villages and parishes, and elected by ratepayers. The rules and usages of procedure of the Canadian parliament and of the legislatures are based on those of the inversion the legislatures are based on those of the imperial parliament. The closure does not exist in Canada.

Provinces and Territories of the Dominion, viz.—Nova Scotia, population. 459,116; area, 20,600 square miles. New Brunswick, population, 331,693; area, 28,200. Prince Edward Island, population, 103,258; area, 2,000. Quebec, population, 1,620,974; area, 228,900. Ontario, population, 2,167,978; area, 222,000. Manitoba, population, 246,464; area, 116,021. British Columbia, population, 190,000; area, 407,300.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—In all these provinces there is a lieutenant-governor, appointed for five years by the governor-general of the dominion in council, and aided by an executive council of eight or less members, who have seats in the legislature, and are responsible to the

have seats in the legislature, and are responsible to the

popular house in accordance with the principles of English parliamentary government.

Legislative Power and Local Government.— In Nova Scotia and Quebec there is a legislative council of 20 and 24 members respectively, appointed by the lieutenant-governor in council of each province. The

assembly in these provinces consists of 38 and 74 members respectively, elected for five years on a limited franchise based on property and income. The speaker of the legislative council is appointed by the crown. In the five other provinces there is only one house, an elected assembly, viz., Ontario, 98 members; New Brunswick, 46; P. E. Island, 30; Manitoba, 40; British Columbia, 38. In all these provinces there is manhood suffrage, limited by residence and citizenship, but in P.E. suffrage, limited by residence and citizenship, but in P.E. Island 15 are elected on a special real estate qualification.* In all of these provinces, except Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec in which it is five years, the duration of the assembly is four years, unless sooner dissolved. Sessions are annual. In all of the provinces the speakers of the assemblies are elected by the members. In both houses members are paid. Members require no property qualification. The legislative powers of the legislatures are defined by the British North America Act of 1867. Widows and unmarried women, when taxed, can vote at municipal elections in Ontario and the North-West Territories; in Manitoba and British Columbia, all women who are taxed in their own right can vote at such elections. can vote at such elections.

North-West Territories, divided into districts, viz.: Alberta, Assiniboia, Atbabasca, Saskatchewan, with representative but not responsible government. with representative but not responsible government.

In addition to these partially-settled and organized districts, the following divisions have also been made in the unsettled region; Franklin, Keewatin, Mackenzie, Ungava, and Yukon. The total population of the N. W. T. is now about 220,000 souls; area, 2,497,427 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A lieutenant-governor, appointed for five years by the governor-general of Canada in council and assisted by a small executive council. The

council, and assisted by a small executive council. The system is now practically responsible government, as in

the old provinces.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. assembly of 31 members chosen by ballot on a very liberal franchise based on residence and household qualification, Indians being excluded. A commissioner, a council—partly elective—and judges are appointed by the dominion government, under authority given by the parliament of Canada. The population of the Yukon is 20,000.

Cape of Good Hope, or Cape Colony, with responsible government; population, 2,350,000; area, 221,311 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—A governor, assisted by an executive council of six or more members, having seats in the legislature and holding office on the principles of responsible government. The Roman-Dutch civil, and English criminal laws are in force.

LEOISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—A legishouse of assembly of 76 elected members. The members of the legislative council must have a property qualification, but any present as a property qualification, but any present not any content of the legislative council must have a property qualification, but any present not any content of the content of the present and the content of the present of cation, but any person not an alien or otherwise disqualified may be elected a member of assembly. LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Legislative council composed of the high commissioner (president ex-officio), six non-elective members or officials, and 12 elected members, nine chosen by the non-Mahometan population and three by the Mahometan population. The franchise, which can be exercised tan population. tan population. The franchise, which can be exercised by British subjects and foreigners after five years' residence, is based on the payment of native taxes. The council may last five years unless sooner dissolved. The English and Ottoman law prevails, and British or native judges exercise jurisdiction according as the case affects Ottoman or foreign interests. Elective councils with taying for lead purposes. exist in towns for local purposes.

Falkland Islands, crown colony; population, 2,000; area, 6,500 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, aided by an executive

council, composed of the governor and two officials.

tive council of six members, including the executive council, the judge, and two other unofficial members. The governor is president.

Fiji and dependencies, crown colony; population, 123,000; area, including Rotumah, 8,045 square miles. Executive Power.—Governor, aided by an executive council of three official members. Natives are employed

in administrative positions throughout the islands.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—Legislative council of 12 members, composed of the governor, as president, five official and six non-official members, all appointed by the crown. A system of local government exists and the natives are represented in village and district councils. An annual meeting of the high chiefs and representatives from each province is held under the presidency of the governor.

Gambia, crown colony; population, 13,500; area, 69 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Administrator, aided by an executive council of five members.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. - Legislative council of six persons, composed of the administrator, the three officials who are executive councillors, and two non-official members, all appointed by the crown.

Gibraltar, military colony; population, 27,460; including military; area, two square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, who is the general commanding and exercises all necessary powers of government.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .-- The management of local matters like water supply drainage, health, etc., is entrusted to a body nominated by the governor, called the sanitary commissioners.

Gold Coast Colony, crown colony; population, 1,473,900; area, 46,600 square miles.

Executive Power.—Governor, aided by an executive council composed of the commandant and four officials.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.-Legislative council of the governor, the chief justice, members of the executive council and three non-official persons. For the purposes of administration the 13 districts of the colony are presided over by a commis-

Guiana, British, with representative but not responsible government; population, 280,000; area, 120,-000 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor assisted by an executive council chosen from members of the court of policy. The jurisprudence is the English criminal law and the

Roman-Dutch code. LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .- Combined court, consisting of a court of policy of seven official and eight elective members, and also of six financial representatives, the elected members being chosen by a very liberal franchise based on property, income, taxes and residence. Membership to the combined court and court of policy is based on a property and income qualification. Taxation and finance are dealt with by the combined court alone. Municipal institutions have been introduced into this colony.

Hong-Kong, crown colony; population, not including the military, 284,000; area, 406 square miles. By a convention signed at Pekin on June 9, 1898, the Chinese government leased to Great Britain for 99 years the port of Kaulung and land farther inland, together with the waters of Mirs Bay and Deep Bay, and the island of Lan-tao. Area nearly 400 square miles; population, 100,000.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—Governor, aided by an executive

council of six official persons.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.-Legislative council, composed of the governor (president), six official and five non-official members, three nominated by the crown, one by the justices of the peace, and one by the chamber of commerce. A Chinese is chosen one of the three non-official members.

India.—1. British provinces, population, 231,085,000.

In all the large towns there is a municipal system and committees or councils are elected by the ratepayers, but they cannot levy new taxes or pass byratepayers, but they cannot levy new taxes or pass by-laws without the assent of the provincial government.

The council can be dissolved at the end of every five years. Parochial boards exist in the parishes for local administrative nursesses. tive purposes.

EXECUTIVE POWER. - Emperor king (Franz Josef I.), who rules by hereditary right over the united states of Austria and Hungary, with the title of emperor of Austria, king of Bohemia, king of Hungary, etc., and is aided by a common supreme ministry or executive council of three departments of state, responsible to the delegations, or two bodies of 60 members each, selected each year by the reichsrath of Austria and the reichstag of Hungary. Ministers may be impeached by the delegations. For Austria also there is a ministry of seven heads of departments responsible to the reichsrath. In each province there is a provincial council, which is an executive body, composed of the president of the diet and other members elected. The executive of Hungary is a ministry and nine heads of departments, responsible to the reichstag. One of these heads is minister for Croatia and Slavonia. The general administration of the affairs of the Ottoman provinces of Bosnia and Herzegovina is exercised under instructions of the imperial finance minister at Vienna. these provinces there is a government for internal administration, judicial and legislative affairs.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .-LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—1. The lower house or house of representatives (kepviselöhaz) is composed of between 400 and 500 members, of whom the majority are re-turned by direct election every five years from towns and rural constituencies on a very liberal property, house, or income franchise. Croatia and Slavonia send 40 delegates to this house. Members to the lower house are paid, and travel at reduced rates. 5. For Croatia and Slavonia there is a provincial diet consisting of 90 members, elected for five years. In Hungary and Austria there is a very complete system of local government. hased on the representation of communes and districts in councils and assemblies.

In addition to this responsible ministry there is a privy council, composed of "ministers of state" without portfolio, who may be summoned for consultation on extraordinary occasions.

Both houses meet annually and nominate their own presidents and officers. The king has the power of dissolving the houses either simultaneously or separately. Belgium has an excellent system of local government in provinces and communes. ment of two houses, composed of a senate and a chamber provinces and communes.

LEOISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Congress of two houses; senate of 32 members elected for four years, one-half retiring every second year; a house of 42 deputies, chosen for two years. In the communes there are elected councils, but their acts are subject to the approval of the prefect. Centralization is the governing principle in France. principle in France.

EXECUTIVE Power.—Hereditary emperor, or czar of all the Russias (Nicholas II), aided by a council of state, a ruling senate, a holy synod and a committee of ministers, in whose hands are entrusted the supervision of all the secular and religious affairs of the empire. All the work of government is in the hands of committees, cabinets or departments. Bureaucracy is the essence of

government in the Russias.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. - All legislative and administrative power is in the emperor regislative and administrative power is in the emperor and his councils. The empire is divided into vice-royalties, governments and districts, governed by governors-general, appointed and controlled directly by the emperor. Military governors are established in some provinces. Centralized government rules in Russia. The only shadow of local self-government is to be seen in the mirs or assemblies of the communes or parishes of European Russia. These "mirs" elect certain officers for taxation and purely local purposes, and are relics of old Aryan institutions which survived in the village assemblies of India and Germany, and originated the township government of England and New England. In the provinces, towns and cities there are municipal institutions, but almost exclusively controlled by the large powers of the imperial authorities.

responsible ministry.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—National LEGISLATIVE FOWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—NATIONAL assembly (narodna skupshtina) of two houses; a senate of eight members, four appointed by the king, and four elected by the assembly, which is composed of deputies elected for three years indirectly by the taxpayers. aided by responsible ministers, nine in number.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—Parliament (cortes) of two houses; a senate composed of three classes (1) 80 senators by their own right, princes, grandees, captains-general, archbishops, admirals, judges of the courts, patriarchs of the Indies, presidents of the council of state; (2) 100 life senators appointed by the crown; (3) 180 elected for five years by the communal and provincial states, clerry, universities, acamunal and provincial states, clergy, universities, academies and largest taxpayers, one-half of the number being renewed every five years; a congress of 431 members elected on a very liberal franchise based on land, income, educational, professional and public services.

The principle of the representation of minorities is observed in large constituencies. The cortes meet annually and the congress is elected for five years. The king has the power of summoning or dissolving the congress and the elected part of the senate. The senate is a court of impeachment when charges are laid against ministers by the congress. In the provinces and communes of Spain there is a representative system of local government.

The common affairs of the united Norwegian deputies. The common affairs of the united kingdoms are considered by the king, with the assist-ance of a council of state, composed of Swedish and Norwegian ministers.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT.-1. In Sweden there is a council of state of 11 members; a diet or parliament of two houses; an upper or first house of 150 members elected by provinces and town corporations for nine years; a lower or second chamber of 230 members, elected by residents of rural districts and towns for three years on a franchise based on property and income. Members of the second chamber are alone paid. The ballot is in use.

2. In Norway there is a council of state to advise the king, and a storthing, or great court, of 114 members elected for three years on a franchise based on property and income, or public service. The system of election is indirect. The people elect certain deputies every three years, these latter assemble and choose the representatives to the storthing. The storthing, when elected and assembled for business, is divided into two houses, the "lagthing," or one-fourth of the storthing, and the "odelsthing" or remaining three-fourths of the storthing. The odelsthing has the whole right to in-spect and consider public accounts. All new laws are initiated in the lower house, and are accepted or re-jected by the lagthing. If the two houses do not agree, they assemble in joint session, and a majority of two-thirds decide. Members are paid.

3. A system of local government exists in both Norway and Sweden, and the representative principle prevails to a modified extent.

The federal assembly elects president and vice-president one year and a bundesrath or federal council for three years. Members of the council can sit and debate but not vote in

Legislative Power and Local Government.—The principles of initiating measures by popular vote (the initiative), and of submitting acts to direct vote (the "referendum") are in force in this republic. EXECUTIVE POWER. - Hereditary sultan (Abdul Hamed II), whose executive and legislative authority is only limited by the precepts of Mahomet. The sultan is aided by a sadrazam (grand-vizier), and a sheik-ul-islam, who are respectively at the head of temporal and spiritual affairs under the direction of the sultan.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT .- The people have no legislative or popular assemblies or councils. The whole country is divided into governments, appointed by and subject to the decrees of the

EGYPT, under the nominal suzerainty of the sultan; population, about 10,000,000; area, 400,000 square miles. population, a bout 10,000,000; area, 400,000 square miles. Executive Power.—A hereditary khedive (Abbas Hilmi), aided by a council of six ministers. He has also the benefit of the advice of an English financial adviser appointed by himself, and whose consent is necessary to every decision on financial matters. He can sit on the council though not a member of the executive. British influence prevails in administration.

Legislative Power and Local Government.—The khedive has promulgated a constitution intended to give the people a share in legislation, but so far it is practically nugatory. Egypt is divided into governorships of towns and provinces with extensive powers, but all under the control of the khedive and executive.

Samos, Island of, principality and dependency of Turkey; population, about 54,000; area, 180 square miles. Executive Power.—Vizier or mushir of Turkey, appointed by the sultan, and aided by a council of four Greeks.

United States of America, federal republic;

population in census year 1900, 84,233,069, including all outlying possessions; area, 3,507,640 square miles.

EXECUTIVE POWER.—President, elected for four years under the constitution by electoral colleges in each state equal to the whole number of its senators and representatives in congress; but practically the election is by the direct vote of the people. Each political party nominates a set of electors on a presidential ticket and the people vote directly for them. Under the constitution the electors meet in each state on a particular day and invariably cast their votes in accordance with the result of the election. There is also a vice-president elected by the same political method. The president is head of the executive, and has a veto over the legislation of congress, but it can be over-ridden by a two-thirds majority in each house. He is aided by a cabinet of eight secretaries of state and heads of departments, appointed by himself with the approval of the senate, but having no seats in or responsibility to congress. In case of death, resignation or disability of the president, the vice-president succeeds. [On the assassination of President McKinley, Vice-President Roosevelt succeeded on 14th September, 1901, and holds office until March 4, 1905.] If there is no vice-president the secretary of state or other members of cabinet succeed in order of seniority until a new president is appointed or the disability is removed. Elections for president and vice-president take place on the Tuesday following the first Monday in November every fourth (leap) year, and they take office on the 4th March following.

LEGISLATIVE POWER AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT. — Congress of two houses; a senate of 90 members, or two from each state, chosen by the legislatures for six years; a house of 357 representatives elected every second year by the electors of the states in accordance with their respective election laws; universal suffrage limited in a few cases by residence, educational tests, registration and payment of taxes. Senators must be 30 years of age, citizens for nine years, and residents of the states which elect them. Representatives must be about 25 years of age, citizens for seven years, and residents of the states in which they are elected. The senate has the power of approving or rejecting the higher appointments and treaties made by the president, and of acting as a court of impeachment for the president, judges of the supreme court, and other high functionaries. It can also amend court, and other high functionaries. It can also amend bills for raising revenue, which alone can originate in the house of representatives. The vice-president is exosficio president of the senate, which may also appoint a temporary president. The speaker of the house is elected by its members. Members of both houses receive \$5,000 and travelling expenses every year. The territories are represented by one elected delegate in each case, who cannot vote in the house. The legislative powers of the congress are enumerated in the conlative powers of the congress are enumerated in the constitution. The supreme court of the United States can hear and determine issues of laws as to the interpretation of the constitution and may declare the acts of congress

unconstitutional or intra vires, as the case may be. The federal judges are appointed by the president with the approval of the senate. A permanent civil service is being gradually built up, and removals from office in the case of officials, not political in their nature, are very much less frequent of late years with the extension of civil service rules to all departments.

Executive Power.—In each state there is a governor and a lieutenant-governor and officers to administer the government. The governor and lieutenant-governor are elected by the people for four years in following states: California, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nevada, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, and Wyoming. In the following states the term is three years: New Jersey and New York. In the following, two years: Arkansas, Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas,

Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Ohio, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, Wisconsin. In the following, the term is one year: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts and Rhode Island. All the governors have the power of veto over legislation except in Delaware, North Carolina, Ohio, Rhode Island. It requires a majority Carolina, Ohio, Rhode Island. or two-thirds vote to over-ride the veto. The governor is the head of the executive and has no responsible ministers in the English or Canadian sense, but the executive or administrative officers are generally elected.

Legislative Power and Local Government. - In all the forty-nine states there is a legislature of two houses an upper house, generally called senate, and a house of representatives, both elected by the people of the state. In the following states the senate is elected for four In the following states the senate is elected for four years, the house of representatives for two years, and sessions are biennial, with the exception of the states mentioned: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi (annual), Missouri, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina (annual), Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming. In the following states the term is for the senate two, for the house, two, and sessions biennial: Idaho. Michigan. In New Jersey the senate three, the house one, and the sessions annual. Universal suffrage is the rule, and the sessions annual. Universal suffrage is the rule, though Delaware has a tax qualification in state senate elections. In some states the payment of a poll tax, illiteracy and residence enter into qualifications. In Colorado, Idaho, Utah and Wyoming women can vote. Members of the legislature are paid. All public officials, state and municipal, are elected as a rule, but the tendency in the older states is to have a permanent public service apart from political heads. In 31 states the judges are elected by the people; in five, by the legislature; in eight, appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by the legislature or council. The Australian or Canadian ballot is now in force in 40 states; nine have passed stringent laws against corrupt states; nine have passed stringent laws against corrupt practices at elections, but they are practically effective in only two or three states.

Throughout the union there is a very complete systhe of township, county, and city government. Township local government prevails in the New England states, the county is generally the unit in the south; in the middle and north-western states there is a mixed In several of the western states women can vote and be elected for municipal and school bodies. In all cases councils are elective. In the large cities there have been cases of gross corruption and mismanagement, and the best methods of improving municipal government are now attracting much serious attention.

The legislature (council and house of representatives) of the organized territory of Hawaii is elected for two years, but its powers of legislation are large, though subject to federal restrictions. In the other territories there are only governors and officials appointed by the president.

United States Dependencies:

Cuba; population, about 1,606,000; area, 35,994 square miles. The United States went to war with Spain in 1898 for the independence of this island, where internecine strife prevailed for years, to the disgrace of Christendom. Spain was soon driven from her ancient dependency, and on February 21,

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1901, a constitution was adopted establishing a republican form of government. On February 24, 1902, the first president and vice-president were elected. President, Senor Estrada Palma.

PHILIPPINE ISLANDS. These islands were ceded by Spain to the United States on December 11, 1898. They are about 2,000 in number. Total area, 115,300 square miles; population, estimated, 8,000,000. No definite form of government has yet been established, but a small number of the natives continue to give a feeble resistance to the arms of the United States. A provisional government has been formed for the conduct of affairs.

THE LAKE ST. JOHN TERRITORY.

The territory in question extends from the head of navigation of the River Saguenay, at Chicoutimi, to the northern boundary of the Province of Quebec, a distance of 220 miles, and from the sources of the waters flowing into Lake St. John, from the East, to the River St. Maurice, and embracing the valley of the River Batiscan, a distance of 200 miles, the whole forming an area of 44,000 square miles or about 28,000,000 acres. Comparatively little is known of this great country, with the exception of the valley of Lake St. John, which, within the last few years, has been colonized with great rapidity, and now contains a population of some 49,765.

The Saguenay and St. Maurice regions are the field of large lumbering operations, estimated at 60,000,000 feet, B.M., per annum, or equivalent to nearly one-fourth of the whole export of sawn lumber from the port of Quebec. The country is thus described by a gentleman who visited it:

The Soil "Is almost universally composed of a rich grey clay, the land seems to be inexhaustible. At Pointeaux-Trembles I was shown a field of wheat, which had been producing that grain for the last fifteen years, without the application of any manure; and the grain I saw was as fine as any to be found in this district. Truly, one is struck with wonder at the richness of the soil, for I believe there is none richer in Canada.

THE KING AND ROYAL FAMILY.

THE KING.—Edward VII., of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of all the British Dominions beyond the seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India. His Majesty was born at Buckingham Palace on November 9th, 1841; succeeded to the throne on January 22nd, 1901, on the death of Her Majesty Queen Victoria. He married Princess Alexandra of Denmark, March 10th, 1863. His Majesty is the eldest son of the late Queen Victoria and the late Prince Consort (His Royal Highness Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha).

THE QUEEN.—Alexandra, daughter of Christian IX., King of Denmark, was born at Copenhagen, December 1st, 1844, and was married to His Majesty (then Prince of Wales) at Windsor, March 10th, 1863.

The surviving children of the King and Queen are:— His Royal Highness, George Frederic Ernest Albert, Prince of Wales, Earl of Chester, Duke of Cornwall and York, born June 3rd, 1865; married his cousin, Princess Victoria May (born May 26th, 1867), only daughter of the late Duke of Teck, on July 6th, 1893. Has issue—Edward, born June 23rd, 1894; Albert, born December 14th, 1895; Victoria, born April 25th, 1897; and Henry, born March 31st, 1900.

Princess Louise, Duchess of Fife (Louisa Victoria Alexandra Dagmar), born February 20th, 1867; married July 27th, 1889, Alexander William George, Duke of Fife. Has two daughters, Alexandra, born May 27th, 1891, and Maud, born April 3rd, 1893.

Princess Victoria Alexandra Olga Mary, born July 6th,

Princess Maud Charlotte Mary Victoria, born November 26th, 1869; married 22nd July, 1896, to Charles, second son of the Crown Prince of Denmark.

The deceased children of the King and Queen are:— Prince Albert Victor, Duke of Clarence and Avondale, born January 9th, 1864; died January 14th, 1892.

Prince Alexander John Charles Albert, born April 6th, died April 7th, 1871.

The surviving children of her late Majesty Queen Victoria, beside King Edward, are:—

Her Royal Highness Helena Augusta Victoria, born May 25, 1846; married to H. R. H. Prince Frederick Christian Charles Augustus of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg-Augustenburg, July 5, 1866, and has issue three

sons, one of whom died an infant, and one died in South Africa, Oct., 1900, and two daughters.

Her Royal Highness Louise Caroline Alberta, born March 18, 1848; married March 21, 1871, to the Marquis of Lorne, now Duke of Argyll.

His Royal Highness Arthur William Patrick Albert, Duke of Connaught, born May 1, 1850; married March 13, 1879, to Princess Louise Margaret, daughter of the late Prince Frederick Charles of Prussia, and has issue one son and two daughters.

Her Royal Highness Beatrice Mary Victoria Feodora, born April 14, 1857; married July 23, 1885, to Prince Henry of Battenburg, who died Jan. 20, 1896; and has issue three sons and one daughter.

The deceased children of her late Majesty Queen Victoria are:—

Her Imperial Majesty Victoria Adelaide Mary Louisa, PRINCESS ROYAL, Empress Frederick of Germany, born Nov. 21, 1840, and married Jan. 25, 1858, to Frederick, Crown Prince of Prussia, afterwards (March to June, 1888) second German Emperor, who died June 15, 1888; died August 5th, 1901, and had issue four sons (two deceased), the eldest William, the present German Emperor, and four daughters.

Her Royal Highness Alice Maud Mary, born April 25, 1843; died December 14, 1878; married his Royal Highness Prince Frederick Louis of Hesse, July 1, 1862, who died March 13, 1892; had issue five daughters and two sons; the second son died by an accident, May, 1873; the youngest daughter died November 15, 1878.

His Royal Highness Alfred Ernest Albert, Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, born August 6, 1844; married the Grand Duchess Marie of Russia, January 9, 1874; died July 30, 1900; issue, a son, born October 15, 1874 (died February 6, 1899) and four daughters, born October 29, 1875, November 25, 1876, September 1, 1878, and March, 1884.

His Royal Highness Leopold George Duncan Albert Duke of Albany, born April 7, 1853; married April 27, 1832, to Princess Helen of Waldeck, and died March 28, 1884, having had issue one son, now Duke of Albany, who succeeded his uncle, the Duke of Edinburgh, as Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, on July 30, 1900, and one daughter.

THE KING'S CIVIL LIST.

Consequent upon the death of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, and the accession of His Majesty Edward VII., there was passed in the Parliamentary session of 1901 what is known as the Civil List Act, the Act by which is determined what charges shall be made on the consolidated fund for the maintenance of the King and his family.

Until George III. came to the throne in 1760, the income of the sovereign was derived chiefly from Crown lands, from a variety of landed property in England and

Wales, Scotland and Ireland, in which the sovereign had a life-interest, and from which he received the rents. In the feudal ages these lands constituted a princely patrimony. In later times this Crown property was greatly reduced by lavish grants to royal favorites. At the Restoration the income from Crown lands was ascertained by a committee of the House of Commons to amount to £217,900 a year, in addition to £4,000 from the Forest of Dean. By the time Charles II. had been on the throne three years he had by his lavish bestowal

of the lands on favorites reduced the income to £100,000. William III., by his grants to favorites who had accompanied him from Holland, made further havoc with the Crown domains; so much so that at the accession of Queen Anne Parliament endeavored to save the remnant hy an Act (1 Anne, c. 8) which prohibited alienation of Crown lands, and enacted stringent provisions in regard to the length of the term for which they might be leased and the rents reserved.

Queen Anne, George I. and George II. derived the larger part of their income from their life-interest in the Crown property, hut when George III. came to the throne he surrendered his life-interest in the Crown lands. It was turned over to the nation in return for a fixed Civil List of £800,000, subsequently increased to £900,000. George IV., William IV. and Queen Victoria, on their accessions, surrendered their life-interest in the Crown lands in return for a Civil List. The same course was taken hy Edward VII. when he came to the throne; and soon after Parliament assembled a committee of the House of Commons was appointed to recommend the new Civil List. It reported on the 4th of April, 1901, and its recommendations were embodied in an Act (1 Edward VII., c. 4), which was read a third time in the House of Commons on June 18th. By this Act the King's Civil List was fixed at a yearly sum of £470,000, assigned as follows:

In the event of Her Majesty Queen Alexandra surviving the King it is enacted that there shall be paid to the Queen during her life an annuity of £70,000.

Another clause provides that there shall he paid to the Duke of Cornwall and York "during the joint lives of his present Majesty and of his said Royal Highness, an annuity of £20,000"; that "there shall he paid to the Duchess of Cornwall and York during the continuance of her marriage with the Duke of Cornwall and York, for her sole and separate use, but without any power of anticipation, an annuity of £10,000; and that in the event of the Duchess surviving the Duke there shall be paid to her during her life an annuity of £30,000."

In respect to His Majesty's daughters, Princess Louise

(Duchess of Fife), Princess Victoria and Princess Maud (Princess Charles of Denmark), it is enacted that as a provision for them there shall he an annual allowance of £18,000 during their joint lives, "to he reduced at the death of each of the said princesses by £6,000."

Until the death of the Dowager Empress of Germany, on August 5th, 1901, annuities amounting to £72,000 were payable to other members of the Royal Family. These annuities were not affected by the death of the Queen, but with the death of the Dowager Empress an annuity of £8,000 came to an end.

The revenues of the Duchies of Cornwall and Lancaster are outside the Civil List arrangement. Those of Cornwall are vested in the eldest son of the reigning sovereign, who becomes hy hirth the Duke of Cornwall, by virtue of a patent of Edward III. in 1337. The Duchy of Lancaster was the private patrimony of Henry Bolinghroke, son of John of Gaunt. It is separate from the other possessions of the Crown in order and government, but united to it in point of inheritance.

THE BRITISH ARMY IN 1902-1903.

During the first six months of 1902 the British Army, as in 1900-1, was on a war footing. On the 1st of Janu- in the principal engagements of the war. ary there were 237,000 men in South Africa. These troops were made up as follows: -

The army estimates were taken on the 4th of March, two months before peace was declared. At that time the House of Commons sanctioned a vote of £69,310,000 for the army and war expenses; and in this vote provided for the pay of 420,000 men in all branches of the service. When this vote was taken Mr. Brodrick, Secretary-for-War, stated that during the years 1901-2, 53,000 men had been sent out as drafts; and that, including drivers and other men attendant on the army, there were then 300,000 men in army service in South Africa. Peace was not then in sight; and by this vote of March 4th provision was made for continuing the war for another eight or nine months. Soon after the conclusion of peace the transport of troops back to Great Britain and the colonies began, and on arrival home the reserves, the militia and the volunteers who had been in South Africa were disbanded; and, except for the fact that a large number of regulars were retained in South Africa, the British army was once more on a peace footing, and during the year the War Office was busy with its new plans for raising the permanent strength of the army to 250,000 men.

There had been no fighting in South Africa of any importance for about two weeks before May 31st, 1902, the date on which the Boers accepted the British terms. Many deaths from disease and wounds were reported subsequent to the submission of the Boers. Excluding these the accompanying table sets out the deaths and casualties during the war-that is from the 11th of October, 1899, when Kruger sent his ultimatum, until the 31st of May, 1902, by which time the war was at an end.

Twice while the war was in progress Parliament sanctioned reforms in army organization and in army conditions. In 1901 it approved the new organization scheme, the main lines of which were given in The CANADIAN ALMANAC for 1902. Last year (1902) it sanctioned a reform under which the pay of the rank and file of the army is greatly increased, and by which other changes are made with a view to attracting more recruits. In recent years recruits have varied in number from 27,800 in 1896 to 46,700 in 1900. In 1901 the number was 45,100. If the regular army is to be kept at 250,000, the number now being aimed at, 50,000 recruits a year will be required, and the War Office is hopeful that under the new scheme of pay this number will be forthcoming. In submitting the new scheme to the House of Commons Mr. Brodrick made an interesting statement as to the conditions which in the past have governed army service in Great Britain. "The whole scheme of recruiting, whether for a volunteer or conscript army," he said, "has been a trouble from time immemorial to every monarch and minister. In our own army our difficulties began very early. We have never reached an amount of pay which has been satisfactory to the army, and I am not sure that we have reached an amount of pay satisfactory to the country. From the beginning of last century there has been a steady progress to a better condition of the soldier's service. The share of the soldier in the general progress of civilization has been very significant. Better education and better conditions of service have done much, but one thing has done more for the army, namely, the shortening of the term of enlistment. We began with perpetual service, then we came down to 21 years, then to seven, more recently we tried the experiment of three years, and I think I may truly say that the more the soldier has been merged into the citizen, and the more exchange there has been between the citizen and the soldier, the better has been discipline, the less has been crime in the army, greater has been recruiting, and more confirmed has become the popularity of military service."

After assuring the House that it was hopeless to expect that the army could be brought to a strength of 250,000 men and kept at that strength under the existing terms and conditions of service Mr. Brodrick described the new scheme. "At present", he said, "when a soldier joins he gets nominally ninepence, or, with stoppages, eightpence a day, and when he reaches the age of nineteen this is raised to a total of tenpence a day. That does not seem to me, considering the rising wages outside, to be a sufficient inducement to the soldier. We propose that a shilling a day shall be given to the whole army on the 1st of April this year. The whole shilling shall be given to every recruit as soon as he has passed his recruit drill and gone into the ranks. Then, as to supplying the drafts, we propose that after two years' service every man shall make his election. He may either go to the reserve as he originally agreed to do after three years, or he may elect to complete eight years with the colours and go to the reserve for four years. If he elects to ahide by the original engagement he will remain at his rate of pay of a shilling a day. If he elects to go on for the eight years he will receive an extra sixpence, making in all eighteenpence a day, from the time he completes two years' service. Bad characters and inefficient soldiers will not be allowed to re-engage, and the commanding officer will have power to stop the re-engagement of men who are either saturated with disease or alcohol. We propose, further, to raise the standard of marksmanship, and to have only two classes—the efficient shot and the inefficient shot. Until a man can get into the efficient class he will get fourpence a day instead of sixpence. We intend to abolish the present system of good conduct pay, and to allow the commanding officers, after two years, to give a man a badge without pay." In summarizing the changes Mr. Broderick stated that the net result would be that a man who joins the army at eighteen will when he reaches twenty have ten and sixpence in his pocket at the end of the week to spend. "I believe," he added, "that the number of labourers in that position is not so very large." As to the cost of the improvements in army conditions Mr. Brodrick explained that for Great Britain it would be about £1,048,000 a year. For India, which bears the cost of the troops stationed within her borders, it would be £786,000 a year.

After the re-organization plan of 1901 had been adopted by Parliament there was much scepticism in the newspaper press as to the likelihood that the War Office would be able to carry the scheme to a successful completion. Mr. Brodrick referred to this attitude of the press towards the scheme when he submitted the army estimates to the House of Commons on the 4th of March last. "If we have not got our first army corps at Alder-

shot," he said, "it is because we have got the equivalent of four to five army corps of regular troops in South Africa. The staff of the first army corps are engaged in training troops which have gone out and are going out constantly to fill up the gaps which occur. The scheme itself continues to hold the field. It holds the field for this reason, that we have been able to establish a standard up to which we are working. The barracks in every district are being built according to the disposition of the army corps, training grounds are being obtained, and steps are being taken which will enable us to begin that system of delegation and decentralization upon which the mind of the War Office is set as much as the mind of that House. The Yeomanry have gone up from about 10,000 to 17,500. Twenty-one new regiments required to be formed; 14 have been completed, and we have proposals for five more, and I have very little doubt we shall ultimately obtain the number we require. Then as to the garrison regiments. We were empowered last year to raise eight garrison regiments out of soldiers who had already served their time in the army. Five regiments have been formed, and we intend shortly to form a sixth."

The British forces now compose what is described as a short service army. This term distinguishes it from the army of a generation ago. In the army, as it existed prior to 1873, men enlisted for 21 years, and at the end of that time were discharged with a pension. In 1873 this long service system came to an end, and in its place there was established what is now known as the short service plan.

About the time the short service system was established, what is known as the territorial system also came into being. Formerly infantry regiments were known by numbers, and generally in addition by titles which belonged characteristically to the regiments, or which commemorated some event or incident of outstanding importance in regimental history. Nowadays and since the early seventies, infantry regiments are known by the names of counties. When the re-arrangement took place regiments were assigned by name to this or that county, and their depots were then established in the neighbourhoods from which the regiments then took their names.

There are now 69 of these depots, and English, Welsh, Scotch and Irish county names are borne by the various regiments. The idea at the bottom of the territorial plan was to give regiments territorial connections, to make them locally popular, and as far as was practicable to mass soldiers hailing from the same part of the country into regiments officially connected with the counties from which the men came. To this end, since the seventies, it has been the practice to recruit regiments from the parts of the country in which their depots are situated. No matter where the main body of the regiment may be stationed, at Aldershot, at the Curragh, in India, or in Malta, its depot remains in the neighbourhood to which the regiment is titularly attached. A staff of commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the regiment is stationed at the depot. There the recruits are received: they are put through a long and hard course of preliminary training, and at the end of this course are drafted from the depot to the colours.

Recruiting officers are permanently stationed in most of the large English towns and cities, and frequently these officers go on special duty into the country villages. London is, however, the great recruiting ground of the army.

A man who offers for the army may enlist for 12 years, the whole of which period is spent with the colours, or he may elect to serve for part of the term with the colours and the remainder of it with the reserve. The 12 year enlistment plan applies to the regiment of household cavalry, to the corps of ordnance artificers, to the band of the Royal Military College, the corps of army schoolmasters, the corps of armourers, bandsmen in the foot guards, royal engineers who enlist for appointment as military machinists, and men enlisted for appointment as sergeant master tailors. Less than 2,000 men on an annual average enlist under this 12 year plan. All boys between 14 and 16, who are accepted to be trained as musicians, trumpeters, drummers, buglers, or tailors, must join for 12 years. The shorter service system, on the other hand, applies to cavalry of the line, royal artillery, infantry of the line, ordnauce store corps, the army service corps, the foot guards and the medical staff oorps, royal engineers, and the post office corps and royal engineers of the telegraph and railway reserve.

CHEST MEASUREMENT AND WEIGHT.

The minimum chest measurement is fixed at 33 in., and the minimum weight at 115 lbs.; but the chest measurement and the weight of each recruit depend upon his height and the arm of the service he wishes to join, and are left to the discretion of the approving medical officers.

It is still possible under the short service plan for soldiers to re-enlist and to serve for 21 years. After this length of service has been put in, soldiers become entitled to pensions. For privates and gunners, the pension is from 8d to 1s 6d per day; for non-commissioned officers, 1s 3d to 3s 6d per day; for warrant officers, 2s to 5s per day. Soldiers discharged on account of wounds or injuries received in action, or for sickness incurred in the performance of their military duty, are entitled to a pension varying with the extent of the disability and with the length of service.

The increase in the rate of soldiers pay bringing it up to one shilling a day clear of all deductions dates from April 1st 1902. The other part of the new scheme of 1902 does not come into operation until the 1st of April 1904, and is governed by a Royal Warrant issued on March 27th 1902 which sets out that—

On and after 1st April, 1904, the following further daily increases of pay shall be granted to all warrant and non-commissioned officers (including paid lance ranks); and to efficient soldiers, who have enlisted for more than three years with the colours, or have been permitted to extend their service, excluding Maltese or non-European soldiers, hut including the royal garrison regiments:

Class I shall consist of all warrant and non-commissioned officers (including paid lance ranks); and of men who have completed 2 years' colour service, and who have, in the opinion of the officer commanding their unit, attained all necessary proficiency in the duties of their arm, including, in the case of infantry, such a standard in musketry as may be prescribed by regulation.

Class II shall consist of other soldiers who are allowed to extend their colour service, or who, having been enlisted for more than three years, are not placed in Class I; provided in either case that they have completed two years' colour service. Soldiers enlisted for three years with the colours, and, who have not extended their service, shall, if retained with the colours on account of war, be granted service pay during such retention.

The daily rates of pay of the several ranks of the different arms of the service now in force are as follows:

A soldier who has been in the army for not more than three months may claim his discharge on payment of £10. After three months the sum is £18, and in this case the permission of the commanding officer is necessary. Discharges by purchase, however, are allowed to the fullest extent consistent with the requirements of the service, and at ordinary times a soldier finds no difficulty in purchasing his discharge.

Until 1871, commissions in the army were bought and sold. Commissioned officers nowadays are drawn from the military academies at Woolwich and Sandhurst; and admission to these schools is obtained only after stiff examinations have been passed. In the army, promotion is by seniority. The pay of a lieutenant is 5s 4d a day; of a captain, 11s 7d a day; of a major, 16s a day; and of a lieutenant-colonel, 21s a day. There are some other allowances; but the pay and allowances of officers are not sufficient to maintain them in the style which, according to the social traditions of most regiments, officers are expected to keep up. Comparatively few of them are dependent entirely on their army pay.

What are described in England as the auxiliary forces comprise the militia, the volunteers, and the yeomanry cavalry. The militia is the oldest of these services. It is older than the standing army, and until

the second or third decade of the nineteenth century all men not suffering from bodily infirmities due to age or other causes, and not specially exempted, were liable to be drawn by ballot for the militia. They could serve either personally or by substitute. Ballots were taken in counties until 1830 to make up the quota of militia each county was compelled by the law of 1760 to equip and maintain.

The militia is a local force, each regiment being raised in the division of the county in which the regiment has its head-quarters. It is called out each year for a period of training which cannot exceed 56 days. The men enlist for six years, and when under training their pay, their discipline, and the general conditions of their services are very similar to the conditions in the regular army. Until as late as 1871 the militia regiments in each county were nominally under the command of the lord lieutenant of the county; and nowadays, although there are examinations for officers' commissions in the militia, in issuing these commissions the War Department gives preference to local landed gentlemen who are recommended or nominated by the lords lieutenants, the King's representatives in the counties. In connection with the militia there is a reserve, consisting of men who have accepted extra bounties to hold themselves in readiness to serve abroad if need be in the regular army.

The yeomanry cavalry, which in 1900 was given the name of the Imperial Yeomanry, in its old form was a volunteer force, dating back to the Napoleonic wars. It was composed chiefly of tenant farmers. Many of the great landlords made it a condition in their farm leases that their tenantry should be of the yeomanry. For a long time the yeomanry was but lightly regarded as an anxiliary force. New life, however, was infused into it

during the war. Its numbers were greatly increased; and under a royal warrant of the 17th April, 1901, the force was reorganized. It then became permanently the Imperial Yeomanry. The old brigade organization was abolished, and the force is now organized in regiments of four sections, with a regimental staff and a machine gun section. The regiments are under training in camp for sixteen days each year.

Members of volunteer corps are enrolled for three years, and are compelled to put in sufficient time at the drill hall, on the parade ground, and at the rifle

ranges, to make themselves efficient, and to pass the annual inspection before an officer from the War Department. Non-efficient volunteers can be sued in the courts for any loss falling upon their regiment in consequence of their failure to earn the Government grant. The officers are drawn from the ranks of the professional and commercial classes. There is no pay to the holder of a volunteer officer's commission. On the contrary, he incurs considerable expense in connection with his office, a fact which accounts for vacancies in many of the volunteer corps.

THE BRITISH NAVY IN 1902-1903.

The navy estimates were submitted to the House of, Commons on the 15th of February, and again as in 1901 there were large additions to the votes. In 1901-2, the expenditure was £30,875,500, plus a supplementary vote for £191,000, due to the extraordinary progress which was made during the year with new construction work. During the year 1902-3 the expenditure will be £31,255,000; and in 1902 a ship-building programme which calls for the expenditure of £9,058,000 was sanctioned by Parliament. The programme entered upon in 1901 call for an expenditure of £9.003,000. What these figures for 1901-2 and 1902-3 mean in the way of increases becomes clear when it is stated that between 1889 and 1901 the average expenditure on ship-building was £5,619,676. The vote of 1901-2-£9,003,000—was up to that time the largest vote ever asked from parliament for additions to the fleet. It is exceeded in the vote of 1902-3 by £55,000.

Last year (1901-2) the number of men allowed for in the navy estimates was 118,625, an increase of 3,745 over the number for 1899-1900. For 1902-3 the estimates cover the pay of 122,500 men; and there will be 7,100 men available for the Fleet Reserve. "This," said Mr. Arnold Forster, Secretary to the Admiralty, in proposing the estimates to the House of Commons, "is a satisfactory and steadily growing addition to the fleet." "I think every naval member will agree with me," he continued, in alluding to the sources in Great Britain from which additions to the reserve of seamen are being drawn, "that we can hardly draw from a better source for the reinforcement of the navy in time of war. But there are other sources to which we must look to fill up the complements of our ships in time of war. The last year has been marked by the readiness of our great colonies to assist us in military operations. A great sea empire must always desire that this co-operation should also extend to the navy, and the year has also shown that-we may happily look forward to such assistance. We have had entries from Newfoundland, but there have been difficulties in the fact that it was discovered that the enrolment of these volunteers was not within the four corners of the law, and a Bill will be presented to the House without delay to completely legalize this experiment, not only in Newfoundland, but also in all other colonies and dependencies of the Empire. There is one other source of supply for the personnel of the navy to which I must refer. It has been the tradition of the navy in time of war to rely upon volunteers. It may be anomalous to refer in this connection to the press gang, but the same element which used to be touch-

ed by the press gang we now hope to introduce into the navy by volunteering, and so in time of war to transfer from the civilian maritime population men who with proper training will be of immense value to the navy. A committee has been appointed under the presidency of my right hon. friend the member for Berwick (Sir E. Grey) to examine into the question of a reserve volunteer force, which I hope will end in enabling us to take some steps in reviving a volunteer force for the navy."

Turning next to the additions to the navy-to the ships completed during the year, to those in progress, and to the new programme of 1902-3-Mr. Forster congratulated the House on the unparalleled progress which had been made with new ships during the year 1901-2. "Last year," he said, "I ventured to give a pledge to the House that the very large sum then voted for ship construction would be spent. It is a singular circumstance, hut a fact, that in the memory of the oldest inhabitant of the Admiralty there has been no instance during the period of iron ship-building where the whole sum during the year for which it was voted has been spent in construction. The whole of the amount voted by the House for the purposes of construction has not only been expended, but we are compelled to ask for an additional sum of £191,000 by way of supplementary estimate, in order to pay for the work during the year. I can assure the Honse that the progress made in construction has been almost unparalleled. The long period of arrears and delays has come to an end. On two of our most powerful armour cruisers we have spent, in excess of the year's cost, no less than £70,000 on each ship. We have a great ship now lying at Portsmouth—the Good Hope—which has been delivered two months before the contracted date. The difficulty with regard to armour has now been got over, owing to the patriotic exertions of the great armour makers. I think I can say that the relations between the Admiralty and the great contractors are of a harmonious description." Dealing with the additions to the fleet Mr. Forster said: "I defy any hon, member to contend that this programme is not a large and worthy programme even for a country that depends so entirely upon its fleet. We have no right to complain that this country is not entering upon adequate construction."

The forty-nine additions to the fleet during 1901.2 were: Battle-ships.—Formidable, Implacable, Irresistible, Bulwark, Vengeance.

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These vessels all passed into service during the year. How the navy has been strengthened during the last eight years is shown by some official figures published in May last by the committee which was appointed in January, 1901, to enquire into the arrears then existing n ship-building. At the time the committee reported these arrears had been overtaken. The enquiry extended back to April 1st, 1896. There were then in building in government and private yards forty-nine ships for the Royal Navy. Between that date and the end of the enquiry one hundred and forty-three more ships had been begun; and of the total of 192 ships 160 had been completed by the time the committee made its report. in May last by the committee which was appointed in

Last year (1902) a committee was appointed to inquire:—"How far are the present systems in force for the provision of reserves satisfactory or capable of extension, as to officers of all branches, seamen, stokers, marines, sick berth staff, and other ratings? How far can a naval volunteer movement be utilized to contribute towards the manning requirements of the war fleet? it feasible to form some auxiliary branch of the Royal Marines which could be made available for service on shore or affoat in time of war? To what extent and in what manner can colonial naval reserves be utilized to contribute towards the manning requirements of the war fleet, bearing in mind that on the outbreak of war war neet, bearing in mind that on the outbreak of war the men in reserve would be in the colonies, and that, as at present arranged, the ships in reserve that they could help to man would, with some few exceptions, all be in home ports? Generally, whether and how, consistent with efficiency, naval reserves can be more fully utilized to supplement the active service ratings in peace or in war?" This committee which is of especial importance to Canada and the other colonies, had not importance to Canada and the other colonies, had not reported at the time these pages of THE ALMANAC went

to press.

It has long been the policy of the British Admiralty to build part of the new tonnage in the Government dockyards, and part in private yards. Of the twenty-cight new vessels (not counting submarine boats) sanctioned by Parliament in 1901 two battleships, one armoured cruiser and two sloops are now in building in royal dockyards, in which there are about 32,000 men at work.

New arrangements were come to in 1901 between the Admiralty and nearly all the great British steamship companies, by which their finest vessels are held at the disposition of the Admiralty for employment as ar-

moured cruisers when required. Under the previous agreements only the Cunard, White Star, Peninsular and Oriental, and Canadian Pacific Railway companies were included. To these have now been added the were included. To these have now been added the Orient, Royal Mail and Pacific companies. Eighteen of the largest and swiftest passenger steamers belonging to these companies now receive an annual subvention, and thirty steamers in addition are held at the disposition of the Admiralty without further subsidy.

Like the English Army the Navy is manned by volunteers, and there is no compulsory service in connection with it. A large proportion of the seamen enter the service as boys. They are accepted for training-ships up to the age of eighteen, and when a boy reaches the age of eighteen his term of actual service in the Navy begins, and must last for at least twelve years. accepted for a training-ship, a boy between the age of fifteen and fifteen and a half must be five feet and half an inch in height, with a chest measurement of thirty and a half inches The height measurement is made and a half inches. The neight measurement is made without shoes. If accepted when between fifteen and a half and sixteen a boy must be five feet and one and a half inches in height, and thirty-one inches round the chest. Between sixteen and sixteen and a half a boy must be five feet two and a half inches in height, and thirty-one and a half inches round the chest.

The pay of seamen ranges from one shilling and three pence a day for ordinary seamen, to nine shillings a day for chief gunners and boatswains. Men who have put for chief gunners and boatswains. Men who have put in nine years' service in the Navy can pass into the Coast Guard Service. Those who stay in the Navy for a period of twenty-two years become entitled to pensions. The amount of pension is from eighteen pounds a year, upwards, according to the rating on retiring from the ranks. The average pension for men of all ranks is



The Naval Reserve, as the result of changes which
were made in 1901-2, is now of two branches, the Royal
Naval Reserve and the Royal Fleet Reserve. The Naval Naval Reserve and the Royal Fleet Reserve. The Naval Reserve is composed of men ordinarily in the merchant service, who put in a certain number of days training each year on board coast-guard ships, and who are liable to be called upon for service afloat in the event of war. The Fleet Reserve consists of men who have served twenty-two years in the Royal Navy and earned pen-sions, and of men who have served twelve years in the navy and have then transferred themselves to the Fleet Reserve. As with many seamen in the Royal Service, for pension begins at eighteen years of age, there is always a large proportion of pensioners who are in the prime of life. Before the Fleet Reserve was established many of these men were of the Seamen Pensioner Reserve. In future in the case of men who receive pensions it will be obligatory on them to join the Fleet Reserve.

For the work of the British Navy the world is divided out into nine stations. "Except for the small squadron France keeps off Newfoundland, and for the fleets of the States of the American Continents, we alone," said Mr. Goschen, in describing the naval-stations in his speech of March 10th, 1898, "have squadrons where other nations have isolated ships. When we have to reinforce our foreign squadrons we send out fully-manned and fully-commissioned men-of-war, so that at all times, besides our squadrons, we have traversing the seas a certain number of ships in commission, ready for war, if war should occur, at any moment.

Both of them, however, have exceptionally powerful defences.

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MILITIA AND DEFENCE OF CANADA.

Previous to the confederation of the Provinces, the defence of this country was entirely in the hands of the Imperial Government, who for that purpose maintained troops in each Province, supported by various local volunteer militia corps. This volunteer militia had, when called upon, rendered most efficient service in times of trouble.

After Confederation the British Government gradually withdrew all the Imperial troops from this country, and at present only maintain a garrison at Halifax, and a naval establishment there and on the Pacific coast.

By the British North America Act the command in chief of all naval and military forces of and in Canada was vested in the Queen, and the control of the same was placed in the hands of the Dominion Parliament. A Department of Militia and Defence was at the same time established, the first Minister being Sir George E. Cartier, and the first Militia Act was passed in 1868, 31 Vic., chap. 40. The Act was subsequently amended in various ways, but is practically embodied in the present Militia Act, 49 Vic., chap. 41 (Revised Statutes, 1886). By it the militia of Canada is declared to consist of all the male inhabitants of Canada of the age of 18 years or upwards and under 60, not exempted or disqualified by law, this population being divided into four classes, as follows:—

The first class comprises those aged 18 or upwards and under 30, being unmarried or widowers without children.

The second class comprises those between the ages of 30 and 45, being unmarried or widowers without children.

The third class comprises those between 18 and 45, being married, or widowers with children.

The fourth class comprises those between 45 and 60.

The following persons are exempt from enrolment and active service at any time: Judges, elergymen and ministers of all religious denominations, professors in colleges and teachers in religious orders, the wardens and officials of all penitentiaries and lunatic asylums, persons physically disabled, and any person being the only son of a widow and her only support. Certain other persons are exempt from service except in case of war.

The number of men to be trained and drilled annually is limited to forty thousand, except as specially authorized, and the period of drill is to be sixteen days and not less than eight days each year.

The Militia is divided into Active and Reserve land and marine force. The Active land and marine force is composed of men raised either by voluntary enlistment or by ballot, and the Reserve force consists, practically, of the whole of the efficient men not serving in the Active Militia of the time being.

The period of service is three years.

THE MILITIA PENSION ACT, 1901.

(Synopsis).

For permanent staff and militia; non-commissioned officers and men; widows and children of officers.

Not applicable to persons who were retired prior to passage of Act.

Officers

- (a) Compulsory retirement after 20 years' service, pension for life.
- (b) Voluntary retirement after 25 years' service, pension for life.
- (c) Constrained retirement (due to body or mind infirmity) before retirement at which a pension might be granted,—a gratuity based on years' service.
- (d) Retirement to promote efficiency or economy, same gratuity as would be granted in consequence of body or mind infirmity.

Non-Commissioned Officers and Men.

- (a) Compulsory retirement, if required, after 20 years' service,--pension for life.
- (b) Voluntary retirement, after 20 years' service, pension for life.
- (c) Constrained retirement (due to body or mind infirmity), after not less than 15 years' service, pension for life.

Rate of Deduction, Etc.

Five per cent. a year on salary for a period not exceeding 35 years; and no addition to pension after said period.

Widows and Children of Officers.

Compassionate allowances are granted thereto, based on officer's rank and salary.

All of these pensions and allowances are granted upon certain other conditions, which are fully defined in "The Militia Pension Act, 1901."

Note.—An act somewhat similar to this one was passed in 1902, granting pensions to the N. W. M. Police Force.

CANADIAN TROOPS TO SOUTH AFRICA.

In the war between the combined forces of the Orange Free State and the Transvaal Republic against Great Britain, Canadian troops took an active and illustrious part with the Mother Country. No less than six contingents, comprising over 7,300 officers, non-commissioned officers and men, left Canada for the seat of hostilities. Excepting the contingent forming part of the SouthAfrican Constabulary, and whose engagement is for three years from March, 1901, the remainder of the troops, with few individual exceptions, have now returned to Canada. The war broke out on the 11th October, 1899, and peace was signed at Pretoria on the 31st May, 1902; the hostilities lasted two years and 232 days, with the result that these territories have now become part of the British possessions, and are hence-forth to be designated as the Orange River Colony and the Transvaal Colony.

SUNDRY INFORMATION.

By Army Order, 16th June, 1900, N. C. officers and men of Colonial Contingents received a gratuity of ± 5 when discharged medically unfit, or on account of their services being no longer required in connection with the war, or at the termination of their engagement.

The following terms when applied to wounds may be taken as conveying the signification stated against them: "Slight." A wound likely to heal rapidly, not im-

pairing the use of a limb or organ, and often not even

entailing admission into the hospital.
"Severe." A wound requiring careful treatment in hospital, but not necessarily dangerous, often involving fractures of bone, and sometimes even the permanent

impairment of a limb:
"Dangerous." A wound such as might occur from the penetration of the head, chest, abdomen, or any vital organ.

CANADIAN CONTINGENT AND ESCORT TO KING'S CORONATION, 1902.

CANADIAN TEAMS TO WIMBLEDON AND BISLEY.

Canada has always been represented by a team of its canada has always been represented by a team of its best shots at the annual Prize Meeting of the National Rifle Association of England. The first matches were held in 1872, at Wimbledon, but since 1890 they take place at Bisley. The most coveted of all prizes, the Queen's (£250), was won only once by a Canadian, Pte. T. H. Hayhurst, 13th Battalion, Hamilton, Ont., in 1895.

Many other important prizes have also been canadian and the contract of the contract Many other important prizes have also been captured by our countrymen. The Kolopore Cup, contested for by the Mother Country and the Colonies was won six times by the Canadians: in 1872, '75, '81, '84,

won six times by the Canadians: in 1872, '75, '81, '84, '89 and '96. Eight men compose the team.

Canada sends to Bisley twenty representatives to take part in the various matches open to them, and these men are selected by competition held at Ottawa under the Dominion of Canada Riffe Association. This trophy of the United States was first put up to competition to the riflemen of the world, at Creedmore, Long Island, in September, 1876, and was incidental to the big Centennial Exhibition. It was then won by a team of the United States, against teams representing Ireland, Scotland, Australia and Canada, respectively. As a souvenir of the occasion cach member of the competing teams was presented with a handsome medal. In 1877 it was again won by the United States against Great Britain. It was only in 1901 that a Canadian team competed again for it, and this time won the trophy. On the 13th of Sept., 1902, immediately after the meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, it was again contested for, at Ottawa, by teams from This trophy of the United States was first put up to

Great Britain, Canada and the United States, and carried off by Great Britain. The next contest for this trophy will be held at Bisley during the summer of 1903.

CANADIAN SCHOOL TEACHERS IN SOUTH AFRICA.

The forty lady school teachers, whose names are given below, were engaged by the Dominion Government at the request of the Imperial authorities in the spring of 1902 for educational work in the refugee camps in the Transvaal and Orange River Colonies. The selection of the number required out of the many hundred applications received was entrusted to the Educational Departments of the Departments were ments of the Provinces, but all other arrangements were made by the Honorable the Secretary of State. The teachers were divided into two parties of twenty each, the first assembling at Montreal on the 13th April and sailing from Halifax for Liverpool by the SS. Corinthian on the 14th, and the second meeting at St. John on the 16th and sailing from that port on the 19th of the same month by SS. Lake Ontario. After a short stay in England, where they were the recipients of much hospitality from a number of notable personages, the two parties sailed from Southampton on the 3rd and 10th May sance from Southampton on the 3rd and 10th May respectively, reaching Cape Town towards the end of the month, the arrival of the second twenty being simultaneous with the declaration of peace (May 31st, 1902). The teachers receive a salary of £100 sterling a year, and all their expenses are paid from the time they left their homes to that of their return. They are under contract to serve for one year certain, with the prospect of permanent employment for such as desire to remain in South Africa. in South Africa.

Letter Rates, &c.

Canada.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Dominion, 2 cents per oz. If unpaid, such letters cannot be forwarded, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office. If partially prepaid, the letter will be forwarded to its destination and double the deficiency charged on delivery. Letters mailed at any office for delivery at or from the same office, provided that the office is not one at which free delivery by letter carriers is established, are charged I cent per oz., and must be at least partially prepaid; otherwise they are sent to the Dead Letter Office. Letters of this nature mailed at and for delivery from an office at which there is a free delivery by letter carriers are liable to 2 cents per ounce. All postage must be prepaid by postage stamps.

Post Cards.—From any place in Canada to any place in Canada or to the United States, 1 cent each. British and Foreign, 2 cents each.

Private Post Cards.—The face of a Private Post Card may be used for advertisements, illustrations, etc., provided that a clear space of at least \(\frac{1}{4} \) inch is left along each of the four sides of the postage stamp, and a clear space \(3\frac{1}{4} \) inches long and \(1\frac{1}{2} \) inches wide reserved for the address at the lower right hand corner of the card. Private Post Cards must not exceed a size of 6 inches in length by \(3\frac{1}{2} \) inches in width. Cards exceeding these limits are treated as insufficiently paid letters. The words "Private Post Card" must be written or printed on the face of private post cards addressed to places outside of Canada.

United Kingdom, and the following British Possessions and Protectorates: Aden, Ascension, Bahama Islands, Barbados, Bermuda, British Central Africa, British East Africa, British Guiana, British Honduras, British India, British North Borneo Company's Territory (including Labuan), Cape Colony, Cayman Islands, Ceylon, China (British Postal Agencies in), viz., Amoy, Canton, Foochow, Hankow, Hoihow, Liu-Kung-Tau (Wei-Hai-Wei', Ningpo, Shanghai and Swatow; Cyprus, Falkland Islands, Fiji, Gambia, Gibraltar, Gold Coast Colony, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Johore, Lagos, Leeward Islands, Malay States, Malta, Mauritius, Natal, Newfoundland, New Zealand, Nigeria (Northern), Nigeria (Southern), Orange River Colony, Sarawak, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, Straits Settlements, St. Helena, Tobago, Transvaal Colony, Trinidad, Turks Islands, Uganda, Windward Islands, Zanzibar. - Postage on Letters, 2 cts. per half oz.

Foreign Countries, except United States.—Postage on Letters, 5 cents per half oz. If sent unpaid, double postage will be charged.

United States.—The rate on letters to the United States is the same as in Canada, and at least one rate must be prepaid.

It is very important to bear in mind that the postage upon letters for the United Kingdom and all Foreign Countries is calculated by the half ounce and double the deficient postage is charged on all unpaid or short-paid letters.

Registration of Letters.

Persons posting letters containing value should be careful to require them to be Registered, and to obtain from the Postmaster a certificate of receipt for Registration.

The charge for Registration in addition to the Postage is, on all classes of matter, five cents.

Both the Postage charge and Registration fee should, in all cases, be prepaid by stamp.

Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a Registered Letter can be traced where an Unregistered Letter can not, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven.

Book Post, &c.

A Book Packet may contain any number of separate books. Limit of weight for domestic post, 5 lbs. (unless consisting of a single book, in which case a weight of 10 lbs. is allowed); for foreign post, 4 lbs. Limit of size, two feet in length, or one foot in width or depth.

Book packets must be open at both ends or both sides, and must not contain any letter or sealed inclosure.

Books for the use of the blind are free of Canada postage, and correspondence passing between blind persons in raised characters is chargeable at the rate of 1 cent per 2 ozs.

The rate on Book Packets for delivery in Canada, Great Britain, the United States and all Postal Union Countries, is 1 cent per 2 ozs.

Miscellaneous Matter.

Miscellaneous matter, described as under, may pass between places in the Dominion of Canada upon prepayment of the rates indicated helow. The regulations of the British Post Office do not admit of the transmission by mail to the United Kingdom (or other countries beyond the sea) of miscellaneous matter as such; but a great part of the matter referred to under that head may be forwarded to the United Kingdom hy Book Post:—

Matter (other than newspapers and periodicals), wholly in print without reference to process, such as circulars, catalogues, calendars, hand-bills, books, pamphlets, printed forms, etc., on which the rate of postage is 1 cent for each 2 ozs. or fraction thereof. This rate applies also to indepted or perforated sheets of paper containing characters which can be read by the blind. To come within this class the material printed upon must be either paper, cardboard or parchment.

Maps, prints, drawings, plans (without specifications), engravings, photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass), visiting cards (when printed or

engraved), sheet music (whether printed or written), official or private post cards in quantities, the manuscript of books or newspapers, whether hand-written or type-written, the following partly-printed and partlywritten matter: militia and school returns, customs manifests, voters' lists, written or partly in writing, school or college examination papers, municipal assessment rolls, Dominion and Provincial Government returns on official blanks, and all partly-printed and partly-written Dominion and Provincial Government documents, statute labor returns, municipal returns in general; seeds, cuttings (but not cut flowers), bulbs, roots, bedding plants, scions or grafts, botanical, entomological and mineralogical specimens. The rate of postage on these articles is 2 cents for the first 4 ozs. or fraction thereof, and 1 cent for each additional 2 ozs.

No letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be sent or inclosed in any such package or thing mentioned, and the same must be sent in covers open at the ends or sides, or otherwise so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination by the officers of the Post Office to ensure compliance with this provision (if enclosed in sealed envelopes notched at the ends or sides, or with the corners cut off, letter rate of postage will be charged).

No packet of miscellaneous matter can be transmitted by mail if it exceeds 5 lbs. in weight, 30 inches in length or 12 inches in width or depth, nor may the combined length and girth of any packet exceed 6 fect.

Legal and commercial papers generally are liable to letter rate of postage.

Printed or written requests for return are recognized on 3rd and 4th class matter, addressed to places within the Dominion, and same will be returned direct to the sender, subject to the payment by the sender, on delivery to him through the Post Office, of the full amount of postage to which the article was in the first place liable, together with any charges rated thereon on account of any deficiency in the original prepayment.

Newspapers and Periodicals.

The general postage rate on newspapers and periodicals published in Canada not less frequently than once a month, and addressed to regular subscribers in Canada, the United States and Newfoundland, and to newsdealers in Canada, is fixed by law at $\frac{1}{2}$ cent per pound. The following exception, however, is to be noted: Newspapers and periodicals published not more frequently than once a week and not less frequently than once a month, are entitled to pass free to regular subscribers and newsdealers in Canada within a circular area of 40 miles in diameter, having as centre either the place of publication or any established Post Office not more than 20 miles distant therefrom, the choice of a centre within these limits resting with the publisher; and such newspapers and periodicals are to be put up into packages and delivered into the Post Office, under such regulations as the Postmaster-General may from time to time make.

On all newspapers and periodicals posted in Canada, for delivery in the Dominion, other than those addressed to regular subscribers or news agents, from office of publication, the rate is one cent per 4 oz., to be invariably prepaid by Postage Stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals weighing not more than 1 oz. each may be posted singly, if prepaid by Postage Stamp $\frac{1}{2}$ cent each.

The postage on *bona fide* specimen newspapers, and on papers and periodicals published less frequently than once a month, is 1 cent per lb.

British and foreign publications may be posted by newsdealers in Canada to subscribers in Canada at the rate of 1 cent per lb. They cannot however be posted at that rate for local delivery at places where there is a free letter carrier service.

Transient Newspapers.

Transient newspapers and periodicals include all newspapers and periodicals posted in Canada, other than Canadian newspapers sent from the office of publication, and British and foreign newspapers posted by news agents for regular subscribers in Canada. When addressed to any place within the Dominion, or the United States, they must be prepaid the following rates by Postage Stamp:—

If posted singly and weighing not more than 1 oz., half a cent each.

If weighing over 1 oz., one cent per four oz. or fraction of four oz.

The newspaper rate to England, whether for transient newspapers or for those sent to regular subscribers, is 1c. per 2 oz. by whatever route they may be forwarded.

Patterns and Samples within the Dominion.

Patterns and Samples of Merchandise and Goods for sale, not exceeding 3 lbs. in weight, except samples of tea, which must not exceed 8 oz. in weight, may be posted in Canada, to be forwarded to any place within the Dominion, on prepayment by Postage Stamp of a rate of 2 cents for the first 4 ozs. and 1 cent for each additional 2 ozs., under the following regulations:

If insufficiently prepaid the packet will be forwarded charged with double the deficient postage, provided at least 1 cent is prepaid.

Packages of Samples and Patterns, addressed to any place in Canada, may be registered by affixing thereto stamps to the value of 5 cents in addition to the postage rate, and provided such packet be handed into the Post Office for registration.

Patterns or samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, &c., which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, or such like material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened.

The packet may bear on the *outside* the address of the sender, in addition to the address of the person for whom it may be intended; and also a trade mark or number, and the price of the sample enclosed; *inside*, there must be no enclosure but the samples or patterns themselves. The particulars, however, of the trade marks, numbers, and prices may be marked on the articles themselves instead of on the outside of the packet, at the option of the sender.

Goods sent for sale or in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or any article sent by one private individual to another, which are not actually trade patterns or samples, are not admissible. Liquids, oils, etc., may be sent by mail in the Dominion if put up carefully in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide and ascertainable at any post office.

United Kingdom, United States and Foreign Countries.

Patterns and samples of Merchandise, when addressed to places in the United Kingdom, must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight; to the United States and other foreign countries, 12 oz.; and must be prepaid by postage stamp at the following rates:—1 cent per 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz., with a minimum prepayment of 2 cents covering a weight of 4 oz.

Samples of liquids, oils, glass, etc., are admitted as samples provided they are put up in strict accordance with the directions given in the Postal Guide.

Useful Hints.

Register all valuable letters. Transmit money by Money Orders. Make complaints and inquiries in writing, and address the Postmaster-General at Ottawa. Preserve, and request correspondents to preserve, envelopes of missent or delayed letters. Send to the Postmaster-General envelopes of letters about which you seek information or make complaint. In addressing letters add the name of the County and Province in which the office addressed is located. Place stamp on the right hand upper corner of the address side. Put your own name and full address in or on letter, to insure return if it cannot be delivered. In affixing postage stamps moisten the envelope, not the stamp. When stamps are moistened the gum is apt to be removed.

Parcel Post with the United Kingdom, Newfoundland and other British Colonies and Foreign Countries.

Closed parcels may be exchanged with the United Kingdom, Newfoundland and most foreign countries and British colonies under the following Regulations:—

- 1. The dimensions of a Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom must not exceed 30 inches in length or 1 foot in width or depth, nor must the combined length and girth of any parcel exceed 6 feet. The dimensions of a Parcel addressed to any country other than the United Kingdom must not exceed 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth.
- 2. A Parcel must not contain any explosive, combustible, or dangerous articles.
- 3. All Parcels must be securely and substantially packed and closed.
- 4. Oils, liquids, etc., can only be forwarded if put up with the same security required in connection with their transmission as samples in the ordinary mails. Fragile articles should be packed with special care.
- 5. Each Parcel must be plainly directed, and such direction must include the name and full address of the person for whom the parcel is intended.
- 6. For each Parcel the sender must fill up a Customs Declaration. On this form the sender will supply an accurate statement of the contents and value of the Parcel; also the address thereof, with signature and place of abode of the sender. The Customs Declaration must be securely affixed by mucilage or paste to the parcel to which it relates.

Parcels from the United Kingdom or any other place beyond the Dominion will be liable to Canadian Custom duties, and under existing regulations must be examined for the purpose by an Officer of the Customs in the presence of the persons addressed.

Rates and limits of weight vary. See Postal Guide, or enquire at Post Office.

Prepayment by postage stamp is required in all cases. Parcels must be handed to the Postmaster; in no case should they be dropped into a letter box or other receptacle for mail matter.

Fourth Class Matter.

Postage rate 2 cents per 2 ozs. or fraction thereof, to be prepaid by postage stamp. Miscellaneous articles of merchandise, including seeds, bulbs, etc., to United States, and generally all matter permitted to pass by mail in Canada, which is not of the nature of a letter; and therefore subject to letter rate of postage, nor entitled to pass as 3rd class matter, may pass as 4th class when addressed to any destination within the Dominion or the United States. Fourth class matter must be so packed or put up as to be open to examination of contents and must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight. The limit of size is 30 inches in length by 1 foot in width or depth, but the combined length and girth of any packet must in no case exceed 6 feet. When passing between Canada and the United States it will be subject to Customs regulations if liable to duty. The registration charge on 4th class matter is 5 cents in addition to postage.

A packet of 4th class matter may contain invoices and accounts, provided they relate exclusively to the contents of such packet; it is also permitted to enclose a card or slip of paper giving in a brief manner necessary directions for the identification or treatment of the article or articles contained in the packet. Care must be taken not to abuse this privilege by converting such notes or marks, designed solely for the facilitation of business between the sender and the addressee, into what might properly be called correspondence. A packet of 4th class matter containing a letter or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter in the ordinary sense will become liable to letter postage, and the sender will incur the penalty provided by law.

When several separate articles are enclosed in a packet of 4th class matter, there is no objection to each bearing a distinguishing number, so as to enable the sender to give directions by letter (sent of course separately and duly prepaid) respecting the several articles which the packet contains.

Prohibited Articles.

All explosive, dangerous or destructive substances, glass bottles or glass in any form liable to break, and all matter subject to speedy decay, all obscene or immoral books, publications, pictures, etc., libellous post cards and letters the covers of which bear words of an offensive character, and letters and circulars relating to illegal lotteries or other fraudulent schemes.

Foreign Post-Commercial Papers.

"Commercial Papers" are understood to comprise all papers or documents written or drawn wholly or partly by hand (except letters or communications of the nature of letters or other papers or documents having the character of an actual and personal correspondence), documents of legal procedure, deeds drawn up by public functionaries, copies of or extracts from deeds under private seal and (whether written or printed on stamped or unstamped paper) way bills, bills of lading, invoices and other documents of a mercantile character, documents of insurance and other public companies, all kinds of manuscript music, the manuscript of books and other literary works. The rate is 1 cent per 2 ozs., but each packet must have a minimum prepayment of 5 cents; this prepayment will cover a weight of 10 ozs. No packet must exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth, unless in the form of a roll, when a length of 30 inches is allowed, provided the diameter does not exceed 4 inches. The weight must not exceed 4 lbs.

The Order of Baronets, the lowest hereditary rank, was instituted in 1611; a Baronet is designated "Sir John Smith, Baronet"—usually written Bart. Taking pre-Sintin, Baronet"—usually written Bart. Taking precedence of Baronets are members of The Most Honourable Privy Council, who are addressed "Right Honourable."

The Order of the Bath, instituted in 1399, and revived in 1725, is divided into three classes—Knights Grand Cross, G.C.B.; Knights Commanders, K.C.B.; and Companions, C.B.

The Order of St. Michael and St. George, instituted in 1818, has also three classes—G.C.M.G., K.C.M.G., and C.M.G.

The Royal Victorian Order, instituted in 1896, has five classes—G.C.V.O., K.C.V.O., C.V.O. Members 4th and 5th classes—M.V.O. Col. S. B. Steele, C.B., M.V.O., is a member of the 4th class.

In all Orders of Knighthood the Knights Grand Cross and the Knights Commanders have the prefix "Sir" with the initials of their class following the name. Companions and Members bear no title, but have the letters C.B., C.M.G., C.V.O., M.V.O., as the case may be, attached to their names.

Knights Bachelors are gentlemen who have received

Knights Bachelors are gentlemen who have received the honour of Knighthood, and are entitled to the prefix "Sir" and to "Knt." after name.

THE GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS.

THE TREASURY.

Chancellor of the Exchequer-Rt. Hon. C. T. Ritchie. Chancellor of the Exchequer—Rt. Hon. C. T. Ritchie. First Lord of the Treasury—Right Hon. A. J. Balfour. Financial Secretary to the Treasury—W. Hayes Fisher. Parliamentary Secretary to the Treasury—Sir A. Acland-Hood, Bart.
Junior Lords of the Treasury—H. T. Anstruther, Hon. Ailwyn E. Fellowes and W. H. Forster.
The Treasury, of which the Chancellor of the Exchequer is the political head, provides the means for meeting the charges for the military, naval, and oivil services. The Parliamentary heads of each of the spending and

The Parliamentary heads of each of the spending and administrative departments of the Government are responsible for the estimates for their respective departments; but it is the duty of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, with the permanent Secretary to the Treasury, to check all these estimates before they are submitted to the House of Commons in Committee of Supply. The Cabinct becomes responsible for estimates which have been submitted to Parliament, and the rejection or reduction of an estimate by the House of Commons is tantamount to a defeat of the Government. The duties which bring the Chancellor of the Exchequer most prominently before the country, are those in connection with the Budget. The first Lord of the Treas-

ury is one of its Parliamentary heads; but the duties of the First Lord are little more than nominal, and the office is usually held by the Leader of the House of Commons. The Parliamentary Secretary to the Treasury is the official title of the Government whip in the House of Commons. The Junior Lords are his assistants. The Financial Secretary represents the Treasury in the House of Commons.

THE FOREIGN OFFICE.

Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs-Marquis of Lansdowne.

Under Secretary—Viscount Cranborne.

All diplomatic intercourse is conducted by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, who is usually of the House of Lords. The office is next in rank and importance to that of Premier, and is sometines held in conjunction with that office. Ambassadors and consuls receive their instructions from the Foreign Office. Foreign ambassadors in London have their audiences with the Secretary of State, and he also conducts the negotiations for international treaties. The Under Secretary represents the Department in the House of Commons.

THE COLONIAL OFFICE.

Secretary of State for the Colonies—Right Hon. J. Chamberlain.

-Earl of Onslow. Under Secretary-

The Colonial Office dates back to 1660, when a Committee of the Privy Council was appointed for the Plantations, as the Colonies were then called. This Council was continued until 1768, when colonial affairs were placed under the control of a Secretary of State. When the United States secured their independence in 1782, the office of Colonial Secretary was addicated and 1783, the office of Colonial Secretary was abolished, and colonial affairs were managed from the Home Office. In 1794 the colonies were placed under the care of the Secretary at War. This arrangement was continued until 1854, when the War Department was reconstructed, and separate Secretaryships of State were established for War and for the Colonies. The colonies are divided into three classes. In the first are the Crown colonies, in which the Crown has entire control of legislation, and which are administered from the Colonial office. Hong Kong and Cyprus are examples of Crown Colonies. In the second class are the colonies with representative institutions, but not responsible government. In these the Crown has a veto on legislation and retains control of the public offices. Such colonies are Ceylon and Newfoundland. The third class includes the colonies having responsible government, such as Canada and the Australasian colonies.

THE INDIA OFFICE.

Secretary of State for India-Lord George Hamilton.

Under Secretary—Earl Percy.
The India Office in its present form dates from 1858, when an Act of Parliament was passed which directed that all the powers and duties hitherto exercised by the old East India Company, or the old Board of Control, should in future be exercised and performed by one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. same time there was established a council to assist the Secretary for India. It consists of not less than ten members nominated by the Secretary. The majority of these members must be men who have served or resided ten years in India, and have not left India more than ten years previous to the date of their appointment. Members hold office for ten years, and under the direction of the Secretary for India, conduct all the business transacted in London in relation to the government of India.

THE HOME OFFICE.

Secretary of State for Home Affairs-Rt. Hon. A. Akers-Douglas.

Under Secretary—Hon. T. H. A. E. Cochrane.

The Home Department has the control of the London police force, and also the oversight of the police forces in the counties and municipal boroughs; and, generally speaking, the Department is responsible for the internal peace of the country. Prisons, convict establishments, criminal lunatic asylums, executions, and all matters connected with the post-judicial execution of the criminal law, come within the purview of the Home Office. It is also responsible for the administration of the factory code, and the laws relating to mining.

THE WAR OFFICE.

Secretary of State for War-Rt. Hon. Wm. St. John Brodrick.

Under Secretary-Earl of Hardwicke.

Financial Secretary to the War Office-Lord Stanley.

The Secretary for War has control of the army at home and abroad, and is responsible for its efficiency to the Sovereign and to Parliament. He directs all movements of troops, and all appointments made by the Commander-in-Chief are subject to his approval.

THE ADMIRALTY.

First Lord of the Admiralty-Earl of Selborne. Secretary to the Admiralty-H. O. Arnold-Forster.

The Admiralty, which has charge of the Royal Navy is administered by Lords Commissioners. The head of The head of the Department, who is always of the Cabinet, is known as the First Lord of the Admiralty. The other Lords Commissioners or Junior Lords are officers without seats in Parliament, and are respectively at the heads of the departments into which the Admiralty is divided. The foreign movements of ships are at the instance of the Cabinet, the Foreign Office, and the Colonial Office, and it is from these authorities that the Lords of the Admiralty receive their orders. In time of war the orders go from the Cabinet. At other times the movements of vessels are at the instance of the Foreign Office and the Colonial Office.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION,

President-Marquis of Londonderry. Secretary-Sir W. R. Anson, Bart.

The Committee of Council for Education or the Education Department, as it is popularly called, exercises supervision over the various departments of state-aided education, and distributes the grants for education annually made by Parliament. These grants date from 1833; and in 1839 the Committee of Council for Education was established. The Vice-President was always of the House of Commons, and he was practically the Minister of Education. On the 1st of April, 1900, the Committee of Council for Education came to an end, and the powers it had exercised since 1839, enormously increased, however, since 1870, were transferred to a new State Department known as the Board of Education. The new Board was created under an Act of Parliament passed in the ordinary session of 1899. It consists of a President, the Principal Secretaries of State (these are the Secretaries for Foreign Affairs, for Colonial Affairs, for the Home Department, for War, and for India), the First Commissioner of the Treasury, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer. With the creation of this new Board there was for the first time a direct and general connection between the Government and secondary schools in Eng-land. Heretofore the Committee of Council had been concerned chiefly with elementary education, except as regards the Science and Art Department. Now, however, inspectors representing the Board of Education may visit the secondary schools, and a connection is established hetween these schools and the municipal With the new Board of Education there was also created a Consultative Committee, which is to keep a register of teachers, and advise the Board on any matters referred to it. Universities and other bodies concerned in education are represented on the Consultative Committee. At the formation of the Balfour Government and the retirement of Sir J. Gorst, Vice-President, the Marquis of Londonderry became the first President of the Board and Sir W. R. Anson the first Secretary.

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD.

President of the Local Government Board-Rt. Hon. W. H. Long.

Parliamentary Secretary to the Local Government Board—Grant Lawson.

This Department dates from the reform of the Poor Law in 1834. From 1834 to 1847 its chief was not of the Ministry nor in Parliament. Up to 1871 it was occupied exclusively with the administration of the Poor Law. In 1871 it took over from the Home Department numerous duties in connection with muni-cipal government and public health, and its title was changed to the Local Government Board.

THE BOARD OF TRADE.

President of the Board of Trade-Rt. Hon. Gerald Balfour.

Parliamentary Secretary to the Board of Trade-A. Bonar Law, M.P.

The Board of Trade is in charge of the administration of the laws relating to limited liability companies, to bankruptey; and it also has the oversight of all matters connected with the mercantile marine, harbours, canals, railways, and street car lines and electric lighting. Labour Bureau is a department of the Board of Trade. Its work is confined to the collection and compilation of information of all kinds relating to labour. The Board of Trade also collects information relating to trade and commerce abroad.

THE POST OFFICE.

Postmaster-General—Rt. Hon. J. Austen Chamberlain.

The Post Office in England controls the telegraphs, as well as the home and foreign mail departments. telegraphs have been a Government undertaking since The Post Office savings banks, of which there are over 12,000, receive sums up to a maximum of £50 in one year, or £200 in all. They also do a life insurance, and an annuity business on lines intended to meet the needs and convenience of the working classes.

THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

President of the Board of Agriculture—Rt. Hon. R. W. Hanbury.

The principal duties of this Department are the administration of the laws for preventing and stamping out cattle disease. It supervises the landing of live cattle imported from abroad.

OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS.

First Commissioner of Works-Lord Windsor.

This Department has the custody and supervision of all Royal Palaces and parks, and also of buildings such as the Houses of Parliament, the Palace at Westminster, the Law Courts, and the public offices at Whitehall.

DEPARTMENT OF THE LORD CHAMBERLAIN.

Lord Chamberlain-Earl of Clarendon.

Comptroller of the Household-Viscount Valentia.

The Lord Chamberlain's Department has the general supervision of the Royal Household "above stairs," and also various duties towards the Sovereign and the It is through the Lord Chamberlain that pre-Court sentations at Court are arranged. In cities where there are royal palaces, he acts as the licenser of theatres. The Examiner of Plays is in the Department of the Lord Chamberlain. His sanction is necessary for the production of a play in any theatre in England at which a charge for admission is made.

1RISH AND SCOTCH DEPARTMENTS.

Chief Secretary for Ireland-Rt. Hon. Geo. Wyndham. Secretary for Scotland—Lord Balfour of Burleigh,

These Departments for Ireland and Scotland respectively exercise functions very similar to those of the Home Department in England.

MINISTERIAL SALARIES.

The salaries received by the members of the Cabinet range from £2,000 to £6,000. The Lord Chancellor has also £4,000 as Speaker of the House of Lords. The political secretaryships and the under secretaryships of departments have attached to them salaries of £1,500 to £2,000 a year. Pensions are granted to such of the holders of Ministerial offices as after their retirement become too straitened in means to maintain themsolves in a social position in keeping with the official rank they have held. These pensions are granted irrespective of length of official service. They range in amount from £1,000 to £1,200. At the present time no pensions of this kind are being paid.

NOVA SCOTIA.—Sundays, Good Friday, Dominion Day, Christmas Day, day appointed for celebration of the birthday of her late Majesty or any of the Royal successors, Labour Day, and any day appointed by proclamation of Governor-General or Lieutenant-Governor as a general holiday or for general fast or thanksgiving.





LEGAL AND JUDICIARY.

Supreme Court of the Dominion.

The Supreme Court, as a high Court of Appeal constituted by Dominion Statute (see Revised Statutes of Canada, Chap. 135), is composed of a Chief Justice and five Puisne Judges, and has appellate, civil and criminal jurisdiction within and throughout the Dominion of Canada. The Judges reside at Ottawa, where the Supreme Court holds annually three Sessions—the first beginning on the third Tuesday in February, the second on the first Tuesday in May, and the third on the first Tuesday in October.

The Exchequer Court of the Dominion.

The Exchequer Court, also constituted under a Dominion Statute (see 50-51 Vict. Chap. 16), is presided over by one Judge and has original exclusive jurisdiction in all claims, suits or actions against the Crown. It has concurrent jurisdiction in relation to revenue cases and the enforcement of penalties, in cases in which it is sought at the instance of the Attorney-General of Canada to impeach or annul any patent of invention, or any patent case or other instrument respecting lands; cases against Crown officers for anything done or omitted to be done as such officer, and all actions or suits in which the Crown is plaintiff or petitioner.

Admiralty Division.

In pursuance of the powers given by "The Colonial Court of Admiralty Act, 1890," the Exchequer Court of Canada is declared a Colonial Court of Admiralty (See 54-55 Vic., Cap. 29.)

The Admiralty Court has all rights and remedies in

all matters (including cases of contract and tort and proceedings in rem and in personam) arising out of or in connection with navigation, shipping, trade and commerce, which may be had or inforced in any Colonial Court of Admiralty, under "The Colonial Court of Admiralty Act, 1890," throughout Canada and the waters thereof, whether tidal or non-tidal, or naturally navigable or artificially made so.

Admiralty business may be transacted at the office of the Exchequer Court at Ottawa, or at the local registry

offices.

There are Admiralty Districts presided over by Local Judges in Admiralty as follows:-

- (a) The Province of Quebec constitutes the District of Quebec with Registry at the City of Quebec.
- (b) The Province of Nova Scotia constitutes the Distriet of Nova Scotia with Registry at the City of Halifax.
- (c) The Province of New Brunswick constitutes the District of New Brunswick with Registry at the City of St. John.

- (d) The Province of Prince Edward Island constitutes the District of Prince Edward Island with Registry at the City of Charlottetown.
- (e) The Province of British Columbia constitutes the District of British Columbia with Registry at the City of Victoria.
- (f) The Toronto Admiralty District has its Registry at the City of Toronto, the limits being from time to time fixed by the Governor in-Council.
- (g) The Yukon Admiralty District has its Registry at the City of Dawson, the limits being the Yukon Territory.

The Supreme Court of Judicature for Ontario.

Court of Appeals from the High Court of Justice, and from the County Courts. From the judgment of this Court an appeal lies, at the option of litigants, either to the Supreme Court of the Dominion, or to His Majesty in Privy Council, in cases over £1,000, or where annual rent, fee, or future rights of any amount, are affected. The Judges of this Court may be placed on the rota for the trial of Election petitions, with the Justices of the High Court, who as ex-officio Judges of this Court, choose from their number a Judge or Judges to sit in Appeal in case of there being a vacancy in this Court, or if, from illness or some other cause, one of the Judges of the Court is unable to be present, or is under any legal disqualification to hear an appeal. Sittings are held at such times and for such periods as the Judges shall, from time to time, deem necessary or convenient for the speedy dispatch of business, the five regular sittings being the first Tuesday in March and September, and the second Tuesday in January, May and November, due notice of the time of holding of further sittings being given. If required, a second division of the Court, consisting of Judges of the High Court, can also sit for the disposal of business.

High Court of Justice for Ontario.

The jurisdiction of this Court extends to all manner of actions, causes and suits, criminal and civil, real, personal and mixed, within Ontario, and it may proceed in such, by such process and course as are provided by law, and as shall tend with justice and despatch to determine the same; and may hear and determine all issues of law, and also (with the inquest of twelve good and lawful men in the cases provided for) try all issues of fact, and give judgment, and award execution thereon, and also in matters which relate to the King's Revenue (including the condemnation of contraband or snuggled goods) as may be done by His Majesty's Superior Courts of Law in England, and also the like jurisdiction as the Court of Changery in Findand in isdiction as the Court of Chancery in England, in cases of fraud, accident, trusts, executors, administrators,

co-partnerships, account, mortgages, awards, dower, infants, idiots, lunatics and their estates, waste, specific performance, discovery, and to prevent multiplicity of suits, and may decree the issue, repeal, or voidance of letters patent, and generally the like powers which the Court of Chancery in England possesses to administer justice in all cases in which there is no adequate remedy at law at law

Divisional Court sittings are held on the first Monday of each month (except vacation) to dispose of such matters as may properly be brought before a Divisional

Court.

LAW CIRCUITS.—Sittings for Hearing of Actions.
—In the Counties of York, Wentworth, Carleton and Middlesex, there is held an additional such Court in every year, in the vacation between Michaelmas and Hilary Terms; and in the County of York there is held another such Court, between Easter Term and the first day of July. Whenever in any year the judges may determine that it is not necessary to hold the latter such sittings may be dispensed with. The sittings for hearing of actions may, in the discretion of the Judges, be held separate and apart from the Courts of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery. Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery.

The Courts in each Circuit are presided over by the The Courts in each Uncuit are presided over by the Chancellor or by a retired or present Justice of the High Court or of the Court of Appeal, or by a Judge of a County Court, or by some one of His Majesty's Counsel learned in the law, requested by the Chancellor or one of the Justices to act in that behalf.

Weekly Sittings.—A Judge sits at Osgoode Hall every week except vacation for the purpose of disposing of all business except trials which may be transacted by a sincle Judge. Chamber business on Mondays and Fri-

of all business except trials which may be transacted by a single Judge. Chamber business on Mondays and Fridays. Court business on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Sittings will be held at Ottawa and Lordon respectively at least one day in each week (except vacation) to dispose of certain matters which can be determined by a single Judge. The Judges have now power

on petition to constitute monthly or semi-unonthly sittings in lieu of weekly.

CHAMBERS.—Chauhers are held each day for such business relating to actions as may be transacted by a single judge out of Court. The Master in Chambers is empowered to obtain the assistance of any Official Reference to sit with or for him. feree to sit with or for him.

Long Vacation extends from the 1st of July to the 31st of August, both inclusive. There is also a vacation from the 24th December to 6th January, both inclusive.

HEIR AND DEVISEE COURT.—Commissioners, the Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other persons as may be appointed by commission uuder the Great Seal. duties are to determine claims to land in Ontario, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favor of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees, or assignees. Sittings at Toronto, first Monday in January and July in each year. Judges—The Judges of the Superior Court (ex-officio), others appointed by commission.

COURTS FOR THE TRIAL OF CONTROVERTED ELECTIONS. The nature of these courts is sufficiently indicated in their title. In respect to elections for the House of Commons of Canada, the Superior Courts hy one of their Judges appointed in that behalf, are invested with special jurisdiction for the trial of contested elections, and appeals lie to the Supreme Court at Ottawa. In respect to elections for the Local Legislature of Ontario, the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature meet annually on or before the third day of Michaelmas sittings and severally elect, by a majority of votes, a Judge from their respective Courts or Division to be placed on the rota for the trial of election petitions during the ensuing year. In the case of death or the illness of a Judge so chosen, the Court of which he is a member meet and elect another Judge. Trials involving corrupt practices are presided over by two Judges, otherwise a single Judge presides, and an appeal lies to the Court of Appeal of the Province.

COUNTY COURTS. - Presided over by a resident Judge COUNTY COURTS.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each county, assisted in some counties by a Deputy or Junior Judge. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed \$200; and to all suits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties or signature of the defendant, to \$600; and to all hail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the County Court, to any amount; in actions of contract to any amount if parties agree to try same in County Court, for recovery of or trespass to land or contract to any amount it parties agree to try same in County Court, for recovery of or trespass to land where land does not exceed \$200 in value, partnership actions where capital was not over \$1,000, for legacies not exceeding \$200, where estate is \$1,000 or under, to enforce mortgages or liens, or for redemption, or for equitable relief where claim does not exceed \$200, to

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establish claim on insolvent estate where claim does not exceed \$400; but not to cases involving the title to lands of greater value than \$200, validity of devises or bequests exceeding \$200, nor where estate exceeds \$1,000, or actions for libel, slander, crim. con., or seduction. An appeal lies to a Divisional Court.

County Court Sittings and Court of General Sessions.—The County Judge in each county holds a sitting of his Court and a Court of General Sessions in his county, for the trial of issues of fact, semi-annually on the second Tuesday in June and December, except in the County of York, in which county said Court is held four times, commencing on the first Tuesday in December and March, and the second Tuesday in May and September, the latter Courts for the trial of cases of felony and misdemeanor, but treason and capital felonies September, the latter Courts for the trial of cases of felony and misdemeanor, but treason and capital felonies are exempted from their jurisdiction, and (except in the County of York) a sitting for the trial of issues without a jury shall be held in each county on the first Tuesday in April and Octoberin each year. The Judge may also, in his discretion, hold additional sittings at such times as may be deemed expedient to expedite business, but only for the trial of issues of fact without a jury.

COUNTY JUDGE'S CRIMINAL COURT.—Persons committed to jail for trial, on charge of being guilty of any offence for which they may be tried at a Court of General Sessions may, with their own consent, and subject to the provisions of the Act in that behalf, be forthwith tried by the Judge of the County Court and General Sessions without a jury, and if convicted, be sentenced by said Judge; and the Judge sitting on any such trial for all the purposes thereof, is constituted a Court of Record, and the record in any such case shall be filed among the record of the Court of Court of the Cour records of the Court of General Sessions last mentioned.

COUNTY COURT TERMS.—The several County Courts in COUNTY COURT TERMS.—The several County Courts in Ontario hold four sittings in each year, commencing respectively on the second Monday in the month of January, and the first Monday in the months of April, July, and October, except the County of York, which commences on the first Monday in April, and the second Monday in January, June and October, and ending on the Saturday of the same week, unless extended by order of the Judge.

COURTS OF REVISION.—The County Judges hold annu-COURTS OF REVISION.—The County Judges hold annually Courts of final revision of the Assessment Rolls of each Municipality, being in the light of Courts of Appeal from the first Court of Revision held by the Municipality; and also Courts for the Revision of the Voters' Lists for Provincial Elections.

SURROGATE COURTS.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting and revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effect in Ontario, and all matters arising out

estate or effect in Ontario, and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the Chancery Division. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts.

DIVISION COURTS are held for the summary disposal of cases by the presiding Judge, being the County Judge or his Deputy, or any Barrister appointed to hold the same; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract where the balance claimed is over \$100 and under \$200 and the original amount was ascertained by the signature of the defendant, and to \$100 in other cases of debt subject in some cases to an appeal at the the signature of the defendant, and to water in contract cases of debt, subject in some cases to an appeal to the Court of Appeal; but the sum of the account to be gone into cannot exceed \$400; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to \$60; and personal actions to that chattels amounting to \$60; and personal actions to that amount, if not excepted from their jurisdiction; but not to actions for gambling debts, liquor drunk in a tavern, or notes of hand given therefor, ejectment, title to land, &c., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, malicious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P. for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Each Judicial District is divided into Caurt Divisions and Caurts are held once in two ments. Court Divisions, and Courts are held once in two months in each Division, or oftener at the discretion of the Judge. The Divisions are established by the Courts of General Sessions, and in certain cases by the Judges.

THE LAW OF INTESTATES ESTATES.

DESCENT AND DISTRIBUTION OF PROPERTY.

As to all persons who died before the first day of January, 1852, the rules of descent are substantially the same as in England at that date.

Real estate of persons who died intestate (i.e., who have left no will) after that date and prior to the first day of July, 1886, descends first to lineal descendants and those claiming by or under them per stirpes, second to father, third to mother, and fourth to collateral relatives, subject to certain rules and regulations prescribed in the statute.

The surplus personal estate of intestates who died prior to the first day of July, 1886, is, after the expiration of one full year from the death of the intestate, to be distributed in the following manner: One-third shall go to the widow of the intestate, and the residue in equal proportions to his children, or if dead, to their lineal descendants; if there are no children or legal representatives subsisting, then where the net value of the real and personal estate does not exceed \$1,000, same the real and personal estate does not exceed \$1,000, same belongs absolutely to the widow, and as to any excess over and above said amount after payments of debts, etc., the widow takes a moiety, and the other moiety goes to the next of kindred, in equal degree, and their representatives; if no widow, all to children; if neither widow nor children, all to next of kin, in equal degree, and their representatives. But no representation is admitted among collaterals further than children of intestate's brothers and sisters tate's brothers and sisters.

All real and personal property of persons dying on or after the 1st day of July, 1886, devolves upon and becomes vested in the legal personal representatives for the period of a year (which may be extended in a prescribed manner) subject to the payment of debts and to the effectual dispositions of deceased. The real and the effectual dispositions of deceased. The real and personal property of a married woman, in respect of which she has died intestate, shall be distributed as follows: One-third to her husband, if she leaves issue, and one-half if she leaves none, and subject thereto, shall go as if her husband had predeceased her. The realty and personalty comprised in a residuary devise or bequest is (unless the will otherwise directs) applicable ratably according to their respective value to the able ratably according to their respective value to the payment of the debts.

INSANE IN CANADA.

The number of insane in Canada in 1891 as obtained by the census was 13,355, of which 7,162 were males and

In every 10,000 males there were 29.1 insane, and in every 10,000 females there were 26.1 insane.

The insane, classified according to civil condition, were: single, 9,506; married, 2,815; widowed, 721; unknown, 313.

Of the single, 5.441 were males and 4,065 females; of the married, 1,239 were males and 1,576 females; of the widowed, 218 were males and 503 females, and of the unknown, 206 were males and 107 females.

According to ages there were 762 insang under 15 years old; 701 between 15 and 19 years old; 2,429 between 20 and 29; 2,643 between 30 and 39 years; 5,369 between 40 and 69 years; 878, 70 years and over, and 576 whose ages were unknown,

Under 15 years the percentage was 0.04; between 15 and 19 years it was 0.13; between 20 and 29 it was 0.28; between 30 and 39 it was 0.45; and between 40 and 69 years it was 0.57 per cent., showing a larger proportion of the insane among the population between 40 and 69 then aways other goographs. than among other age groups.

According to nativity, 5,853 of the insane were born in According to nativity, 5,853 of the insane were born in Canada of parents who were both born in Canada; 2,793 were born in Canada of foreign born parents; 612 were born in Canada of parents one of whom was born in Canada, and 3,044 were foreign born; 1,053 were born in Canada, but the birth-place of their parents were un-

These constitute two groups: (1) Those whose parents were foreign born, and (2) all the others. The first group have 90 in every 10,000 of the foreign-born population; the second group have 18 insane in every 10,000 of the native born.

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COINACE IN CANADA.

In the early days all sorts of coin were used in British North America.

The first step taken in Canada for a revision of currency was in 1795, when, to remedy the evils resulting from the coined money in circulation being reduced in weight, debased in value and composed of every variety of pieces peculiar to all countries trading with this conthent, an Act was passed which fixed a standard of value founded upon the average intrinsic worth of the gold and silver coins of Great Britain, Portugal, Spain, France and the United States.

Subsequently various Acts of the Legislatures established a valuation for these pieces, at which they were accepted in market overt.

Finally, in 1858, the Province of Canada adopted dollars and cents, pounds, shillings and pence as the

only moneys of account. In 1871 the Federal Parliament passed the Act (Chap. 4, Acts of 1871) respecting the currency, which gave to the provinces of the Dominion a uniform currency, the single gold standard adopted being that of the British sovereign of the weight and fineness proscribed by the laws of the United Kingdom, to pass current at \$4.86\frac{2}{3}\$. Provision was also made that, until otherwise ordered by Her Majesty's proclamation, the gold eagle of the United States, of the fixed weight of 10 pennyweights and 18 grains troy, and of a settled standard of fineness, should be legal tender in Canada. The same Act provided for a gold coinage for Canada, but special Canaonly moneys of account. In 1871 the Federal Parliavided for a gold coinage for Canada, but special Canadian gold coinage has not yet (1902) been minted. Silver coins were made legal tender to \$10, and bronze

coin to 25 cents. The silver coins in use are 50, 25, 20, 10 and 5 cents.

Collegiate Institutes and High Schools.

Each of the High Schools (which form the intermediate link between the Public Schools and the Universities) is unanged by a Board of Trustees, appointed jointly by the County and Town Councils. In cities the Trustees are all appointed hy the City Councils, except where there is only one school in the County. The Principal must he a graduate of a British or Colonial University, and certified as experienced in teaching. Assistants must also have received the prescribed training. Besides fees, local rates must be raised. Every High School with two qualified teachers receives a fixed amount of \$400, and also a certain sum on salaries of teachers, general equipqualified teachers receives a fixed amount of \$400, and also a certain sum on salaries of teachers, general equipment, suitability of school premises and attendance. High Schools which have an average attendance of 60 pupils, may be made Collegiate Institutes, and receive additional grant. Pupils attending these schools are prepared for Matriculation in the Universities. There were 38 Collegiate Institutes and 94 High Schools, with 22,523 pupils, in Ontario in 1901.

Public Schools.

Each Township is divided into School Sections of a suitable extent for one School; and in each of these Sections three Trustees are elected to manage its School affairs. In Cities, Towns and Villages, the Schools are managed hy a Board of School Trustees elected from the Municipality.

Educational Museum.

Connected with the Education Department is a Museum, containing specimens of school apparatus and furniture, a valuable collection of Italian, Dutch and Flemish Oil Paintings, and Statuary casts and busts. Here also is the largest collection of archæological material in the Dominion, chiefly illustrative of Ontario, and of North America. David Bayle, Archæologist, The and of North America. 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

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ONTARIO EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM.

Subject to the approval of the Provincial Government all regulations for the public and high schools are made by the Minister of Education. These schools are under the control of local boards of trustees, elected by the ratepayers, and are allowed to have none but certificated teachers. Education of children between the ages of seven and thirteen is compulsory for not less than one hundred days in the year. Some of the noteworthy features in Ontario's system of education are: uniform

course of study for all schools; all public and high schools in the hands of professionally trained teachers; provincial instead of local control of examination of teachers; uniformity of text-books and common matriculation for admission to all universities and learned professions. These give unity to the system, which includes (a) Kindergarten, (b) Public or Separate Schools, (c) High Schools or Collegiate Institutes, (d) the University.

Synopsis of Fishery Laws.

Net fishing of any kind is prohibited in public waters, except under Leases or Licenses. The size of nets is regulated so as to prevent the killing of young fish. Nets cannot be set or seines used so as to bar channels or bays. A general weekly Close-time is provided in addition to special close seasons. The use of Explosive or Poisonous substances for catching or killing illegal. The use of fire-arms for killing fish is prohibited. Mill-dams must be provided with efficient fish passes.

The above enactments and close seasons are supplemented in special cases, under authority of the Dominion Fisheries Act (Chap. 95 R. S.), by a total prohibition of fishing for stated periods. All communications relating to Fisheries should be addressed: Department of Marine

and Fisheries, Ottawa.

Abstract of Ontario Came Laws.

No person not a resident and domiciled in Ontario. may hunt or kill any animal or bird in Ontario without having procured a non-resident license.

Deer.-Open season November 1st to November 15th,

both days inclusive.

Only two Deer may be taken in one season by one person. Moose, Reindeer or Caribou.—No moose, reindeer or caribou shall be hunted, taken or killed in that part of Ontario lying to the south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway from the town of Mattawa to the town of Port Arthur except from the 1st day of November to the 15th day of November both days inclusive in each year. Throughout all that part of the Province of Ontario lying north and west of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway from Mattawa to Port Arthur the open season for moose and reindeer or caribou shall be from October 16th to November 15th, both days inclusive.

Only one Moose, Reindeer or Caribou may be taken in one season by one person.

No cow Moose, or young Moose, Reindeer or Caribou under the age of one year can be killed.

No Elk or Wapiti shall be hunted, taken or killed at

any time in Ontario.

No person may transport or have in possession, except from November 1st to 15th, any wild Deer, Moose, Reindeer or Caribou, or head, raw skin or other part thereof, unless accompanied by affidavit that same was taken during the open season. Deer, Moose, Reindeer or Caribou may not be carried or transported unless a license shipping coupon is attached.

No hounds or dogs accustomed to pursue *Deer* are allowed at large where *Deer* are found, during the close

season for Deer.

Hounds or dogs running Deer during the close season may be killed on sight by any person, who shall not be liable to damage for so doing.

Ducks. - Open season September 1st to December

15th, both days inclusive.

Geese and Swans .- Open season September 15th to

May 1st in the following year, both days inclusive.

Grouse.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Hares.-Open season September 15th to December

15th, both days inclusive.

Partridge.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be bought or sold

before the 15th day of September, 1905.

Pheasants.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. English or Mongolian Pheasants may not be killed before the 15th day of September, 1905.

Plover.—Open season September 15th to December

15th, both days inclusive.

Prairie Fowl.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be killed before the 15th day of September, 1905.

Quail.—Open season November 1st to November 30th, both days inclusive May not be bought or sold before the 15th day of October, 1905.

Rail.—Open season September 15th to December 15th.

Rail.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Turkeys, Wild.—Open season October 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be killed before the 15th day of October, 1905.

Snipe.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be sold before the

15th, both days inclusive. 15th day of September, 1905.

Woodcock.—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive. May not be bought or sold

before the 15th day of September, 1905.

Insectivorous birds may not be caught, killed or sold, or had in possession without a permit, except Hawks, Crows, Black-birds and English Sparrows.

Squirrels (Black and Grey).—Open season September 15th to December 15th, both days inclusive.

Beaver and Otter.—Open season November 1st to April 1st in following year, both days inclusive. May not be taken or killed before the 1st day of November,

Muskrats. - Open season January 1st to May 1st, both days inclusive. But no Muskrat may be shot during the month of April.

THE ONTARIO SUCCESSION DUTY ACT.

The Succession Duty Act, Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1897, Chapter 24, applies to the estates of persons dying on or after 1st July, 1892, and applies to real and personal property of every description except:

(1) Where the value of the estate after payment of all debts and expenses of administration does not exceed

\$10,000.

(2) To property given for religious, charitable or edu-

cational purposes

(3) Property passing to or for the use of father, mother, husband, wife, child, grandchild, daughter-in-law or son-in-law of the deceased where the aggregate value of the property of the deceased does not exceed \$100,000.

The Act applies:
(a) To all property passing either by Will or intestacy within Ontario, whether the deceased was domiciled in

Ontario at the time of his death or elsewhere.

(b) To all said property which shall be voluntarily transferred by deed, sale or gift made in contemplation of the death of the grantor or intended to take effect after such death to any person in trust or otherwise.

(c) To any property taken as a donatio mortis causa

made by any person dying on or after 7th April, 1896, or taken under the disposition made by any person so dying purporting to operate as an immediate gift whether by way of transfer, delivery, declaration of trust or otherwise which shall not have been bona fide

made twelve months before the death of the deceased.

(d) To any property which the person dying on or after 7th April, 1896, having been absolutely entitled thereto has caused to be transferred or vested in himself and any other person jointly so that the beneficial interest therein, or in some part thereof, passes or accrues by survivorship on his death to such other person.

(e) To property passing under settlement, as to which

see the Act.

(f) To the beneficial interest arising by survivorship

or otherwise (if any) from Annuities.

Where the aggregate value of the property of deceased exceeds \$100,000 and passes in whole or in part to or for the benefit of the father, mother, husband, wife, child, grandohild or other lineal descendant or daughter-in-law or son-in-law of the deceased, the same shall be subject to a duty of \$2.50 for every \$100 of the value. Where the aggregate value of said property exceeds \$200,000 the whole shall be subject to a duty of \$5 for every \$100.

Where the value of the property of the deceased exceeds \$10,000, so much thereof as passes to or for the benefit of the grandfather or grandmother, or any other lineal ancestor of the deceased except the father and mother, or to any brother or sister of the deceased, or to any descendants of such brother or sister, or to a brother or sister of the father or mother of the deceased, or of any descendant of such last mentioned brother or sister, shall be subject to a duty of \$5 for every \$100.


Where the value of said property exceeds \$10,000 and any part thereof passes to or for the benefit of any person in any other degree of collateral consanguinity to the deceased than is above described, or to or for the benefit of any stranger in blood to the deceased save as hereinbefore provided for, same shall be subject to a duty of \$10 for every \$100 of the value.

Provided that where the whole value of any said property does not exceed \$200 the same shall be exempt from duty.

Any property brought into Ontario for administration or distribution shall he liable to the duty.

Executors or administrators are directed to make and file with the Surrogate Registrar a statement under oath showing (a) itemized inventory of all the property of the deceased and the market value thereof, (b) the several persons to whom the same will pass under the Will or intestacy and their degree of relationship (if any); and the executor shall before the issue of Letters Probate or of Administration deliver to the Surrogate Registrar a bond with two sureties in a penal sum equal to ten per cent. of the sworn value of the property of the deceased liable to succession duty.

Should the Treasurer of the Province be not satisfied with the value so sworn to or with the correctness of the inventory, provision is made for a valuation and appraisement of the said property by the Sheriff of the County in which same is situate, with the right of appeal by either party from such appraisement to the Surrogate Judge of the County.

The Law Society of Ontario.

The Law Society was first established in 1797, by the Act 37, Geo. III., c. 13, which enabled the then practitioners of the law to form themselves into a society, and make rules for its government. By the Act of 1822, 2 Geo. IV., c. 5, "the Treasurers and Benchers of the Law Society" were formally incorporated; and under the Society has continued to be these and other statutes the Society has continued to be governed by a Board of Benchers, in the same manner as the various Law Societies of England. Under Revised Statutes of Ontario, c. 145, 1887, the Benchers are, exclusive of ex-officio members, elected by the Bar, the ex-officio consisting of the Attorney-General of the Dominion for the time being, if a member of the Bar the Dominion for the time being, if a member of the Bar of Ontario, and all members of the Bar of Ontario who have at any time held the office of Attorney-General of the Dominion or of Ontario, or of Attorney or Solicitor-General of the former Province of Upper Canada, and any retired Judge of the Superior Courts of Law or Equity of Ontario; the elected, thirty in number, being chosen by ballot, for a term of five years, by the members of the Bar, in manner prescribed by the Act. Vacancies during the term are filled by the remaining Benchers. On the first day of Easter Term, annually, the Benchers appoint one of their body to be Treasurer,

who is also President of the Society. The Benchers sit in Convocation every term for the call of Barristers, the In Convocation every term for the call of Barristers, the admission of Attorneys and Solicitors to Practice, and of Students to enter the Society, the fees paid by whom form the revenue of the Society. Osgoode Hall, appropriately named after the first Chief Justice, is the Ontario "Inn of Court," or headquarters of the Society, in which is provided accommodation for the Court of Appeal and Courts of Equity, and for the sittings in term of the Superior Courts; with a valuable and extensive library. sive lihrary.

LIFE INSURANCE,

The Dominion Government requires all life insurance companies doing business in Canada to make up, under companies doing business in Canada to make up, under oath, and deposit with the Superintendent of Insurance within two months after the close of the year, in the form prescribed by law, a statement of their affairs. These statements are subsequently verified by the Superintendent of Insurance, by personal examination at the company's chief offices, and embodied in an annual report to Parliament. The business of life insurance may be said to be wholly transacted by companies authorized by the Dominion Government, there being but one or two institutions incorporated by provincial legislation. provincial legislation.

(1) Its financial strength, to be tested by a comparison of the assets with the liabilities;

(2) An examination of the profit-earning power of the company;
(3) Of its expense ratio;
(4) Of its premium ratès;
(5) Of the conditions and privileges of its policy contract that the conditions are provided to the conditions are provided t

PLANS OF INSURANCE.

PLANS OF INSURANCE.

Policies are divided into two main classes, ordinary life and endowment. The life policy is payable at death only, the endowment at the end of a specified period (usually 10, 15, 20 or 25 years), or at death, if that should occur sooner. The life policy is usually secured for protection for the family, while the endowment policy fulfils a double object, viz.: provision for the family in case of death within the endowment term, and a competency to the insured should he survive the period. The life policy may be secured with premiums payable each year that the life enters upon, or, which is more preferable and popular at the present time, by a limited number of payments; for example, a twenty-payment life, after running for twenty years, is paid up, but the insurance is not payable until death. Similarly, fifteen and ten-payment life policies are paid up after fifteen and ten annual payments respectively, but are fifteen and ten annual payments respectively, but are not payable until death.

The endowment policy is generally secured by annual premiums payable for the same number of years as the endowment term, but this policy is sometimes written with premiums payable only through a portion of the term. For example, a twenty-year endowment by ten payments is a policy payable twenty years hence, or at prior death, with payment of premiums limited to the first ten years of the policy.

The premium rates of most of the representative Canadian life insurance companies are uniform at all

Canadian life insurance companies are uniform at all ages for the principal plans of insurance. The rates of the American companies are invariably higher than those of Canadian companies.

AMENDMENT TO INSURANCE ACT.

The amendment to the Insurance Act, which was made at the 1899 session of the Dominion Parliament, among other matters, provides for these important changes :-

(1) For the extension and uniformity of the powers of investing the funds of Canadian life insurance com-

panies, and
(2) That the interest basis of Reserves shall be as follows: for all new business transacted after January follows: for all new business transacted after January 1st, 1900, 3½ per cent.; for business existing as at January 1st, 1900, 4½ per cent., until January 1st, 1910, after which date the rate is to be 4 per cent. until January 1st, 1915, and thereafter 3½ per cent. Until January 1st, 1915, and thereafter 3½ per cent. Valuation, the life insurance companies were obliged to increase their rates on January 1st, 1900.

SURRENDER VALUES AND DIVIDENDS.

Cash values, or paid-up values, are usually allowed upon surrender of life or endowment policies, after three or more annual premiums have been paid. It has now heaven very general to endorse upon the policy the

or more annual premiums have been paid. It has now become very general to endorse upon the policy the amount of these values. On policies taken out on the with-profit system, dividends are apportioned either annually, quinquennially, or accumulated for a period of ten, fifteen or twenty years, known as the Tontine, Reserve Dividend or Accumulative Period. The dividends to those who survive this period are increased by the dividends of those who drop out-by death, lapse, surrender, etc.-within it.

HISTORICAL DIARY FOR 1901-1902.

NOVEMBER, 1901.

1-The Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York arrive at Portsmouth after their world-tour, and are met by King Edward and the Queen.

Lord Kitchener reports a Boer attack on the rearguard of Col. Benson's column near Brakenlaagte, twenty miles north-west of Bethel, in which the British lose 12 officers and 54 men killed, and 13 officers and 160 men wounded.

2—The Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo is closed. It is announced that the Nicaraguan Government has denounced the Isthmian-Canal Treaty with the United

The conference of Pan-American republics at Mexico chooses Señor Raigosa of Mexico as its permanent president.

4—The French Chamber of Deputies by a vote of 305 to 77 sustains the government's action in pressing the demands on Turkey.

5—Tammany's reign over Greater New York comes to a sudden end by the election of Seth Low, formerly president of Columbia University, to the mayoralty.

The French fleet under Admiral Caillard seizes three ports on the Turkish island of Mitylene, off the coast of Asia Minor, to be held until the Porte gives some satisfaction in the matter of the French claims.

6-Mr. Andrew Carnegie, prior to leaving Scotland for the United States, is offered a baronetcy, which he declines.

The insurgents at Colon, Colombia, seize the government steamboat Darien near Taboga, and also capture about 30 prisoners.

7—King Edward's new style of title is proclaimed from the steps of the Royal Exchange. The title is, "Edward VII, R. I., by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the Royal the R British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India."

Death of Li Hung Chang, the aged Viceroy of Chili, China, who is posthumously created a marquis and given the new name of Li Wen Chung.

8—The Sultan of Turkey yields to the entire demands formulated by the French Government.

Col. Montanaro strategically captures the King of Ikono and his principal rebel chiefs, thus paving the way to the pacification of Southern Nigeria.

The appointment of Yuan Shih Kai as the successor to the Viceroyship of Chill is announced. Wang Wen

Shao is appointed Plenipotentiary and Deputy Viceroy of Chili.

9-King Edward VII celebrates his sixtieth hirthday and confers the title of Prince of Wales and Earl of Chester on his son the Duke of Cornwall and York. The title of Prince of Wales was created in 1301 when Edward I gave to the people of Wales as their prince his Welsh-born son Edward.]

Completion of the Trans-Siberian railroad, after 10 years of arduous work, at a cost of \$390,000,000. The Czar of Russia personally tenders his congratulations to the Minister of Finance, M. Dewitte, for the successful manner in which he has conducted the great undertaking.

Explorers in the region of Cienteguita, Mexico, discover the remains of smelters and other mining appliances, which would indicate the long-lost, great Tayapa mines that yielded so much wealth to Spain in the seventeenth century. The original Spanish owners are said to have been murdered by their slaves about 300 years ago, since which time the location of the mines

has been enveloped in mystery.

The Glasgow International Exhibition closes after a remarkable record of financial success.

The first investiture of war honors in the Transvaal takes place at Johannesburg. Major Sydney Richards, formerly of the Kimberley Rifles, and Captain O'Meara of the Intelligence Department at Kimherley, are presented

with the Distinguished Service Order by Col. Bradley for

The police census of Toronto is announced, which credits the city with a population of 221,583 an increase of 25,596 over the census taken by the police in 1897.

11-A bulletin is issued from the Lick Observatory, San Jose, Cal., regarding another important discovery made in reference to the new star in the constellation

Diplomatic relations between France and Turkey are resumed.

12—The United States warns the Bulgarian Government that it will be held responsible if Miss Stone, the American missionary, should be killed by the brigands.

13—A conference of representatives of commercial bodies of nearly all the northern cities of the United States is held in the White House to urge the President to recommend in his initial message to congress a resumption of regimeral trade relations with Goodes. resumption of reciprocal trade relations with Canada.

Newfoundland issues a new four cent postage stamp to commemorate the visit of the Ducke and Duckess of Cornwall and York to Canada. The stamp is royal blue in color and bears a portrait of the Duckess.

The United States approves the claim of Great Britain to be recognized as protector of the Mosquito Indians in Eastern Nicaragua.

14-The official returns of the Yukon Territory census are given out, showing its population to be 20,000, Dawson City having approximately 8,000.

Dawson City having approximately 8,000. The French Chamber, after further considering the Shipping Bounties Bill, carries a bill granting to all railway servants a ten-hours day. The Minister of Finance protests, pointing out that this would involve an expense of 68,000,000 francs a year to the state, but the bill is passed by 358 to 87 votes.

Gen. De Wet, with 400 Boers, attacks the rearguard of Col. Byng's column near Heilbron, Orange River Colony, but is repulsed after two hours' fighting.

15—It is announced that Australia proposes to exclude all immigrants who cannot speak a European language.

A Cape Town despatch says that the cape customs for the month of October amount to over £250,000, a sum which has never been equalled hefore.

By command of the King one of the gun carriages used at the funeral of Queen Victoria is presented to the city of Edinburgh and is formally transferred to the custody of the Castle garrison.

16—The War Office's monthly statement of casualties shows that from the beginning of the war to the end of October, 1901, the number of deaths in the South African Field Force was 17,844.

The Berne arbitrators on the Franco-Chilian guano dispute decide on dividing the indemnity of £558,000 between the United States Company, Dreyfus Brothers of Paris, the Peruvian corporation and the Pacific company. The five other claims are rejected.

17—Severe earthquakes occur in Erzerum, Turkey, one thousand homes being destroyed.

Information from Skaguay, Alaska, throws light on a plot to upset the Government of the Yukon.

The reappointment of Said Pasha as Grand Vizier of Turkey is officially stated.

The Spanish Senate passes a bill prohibiting free silver coinage.

18-Secretary Hay and Ambassador Pauncefote sign the new Isthmian-Canal Treaty at Washington for the United States and Great Britain respectively.

The financial statement of the Orange River Colony is issued. The revenue for the three months ending September 30th, 1901, amounts to £19,700. The receipts for the past twelve months total £57,400, while the expenditure amounts to £38,000. The sum spent on refugee camps reaches over £173,000.

Princess Henry of Battenberg unveils a tablet in Ryde Town-hall, England, to commemorate the services of the Ryde volunteers and yeomanry in the South

19-The Colombian Liberals make an unexpected attack on Colon and capture the public offices.

A national reciprocity convention is opened at

Washington.

The Commercial Pacific Cable Company awards a contract for the first section of its cable from San Francisco to Hawaii.

In Constantinople the representatives of the four powers come to the conclusion that the Cretan flag and Creton passports should be recognized by the Porte, and that Cretans sentenced in Turkey for political or common law offences should be transferred to Crete.

Lord Kitchener reports the capture of Commandant Buys on the Vaal River, near Villiersdorp.

A calamitous mining accident occurs at the Smuggler Union mine in Marshall Basin, Telluride, Col., in which 100 lives are lost.

The South African Compensation Commission concludes its public labors, and, with the exception of one small claim by a Grecian subject upon which a report will be made shortly, the whole of the claims are settled. The number of claimants was 1,631, the amount claimed £1,116,450, and the sum awarded £106,950.

The Australian Federal Minister for Trade and Customs, Hon. Mr. Kingston, states that the government proposes to make all wearing apparel liable to a duty of 25 per cent. ad valorem, and all cotton and linen piecegoods, including shirtings, to a duty of 10 per cent.

21—Death of Capt. John Lawson, who built the first locomotive engine in England.

The Boulogne Chamber of Commerce adopts a resolution in favor of a permanent treaty of arbitration be-tween France and Great Britain.

The French Jesuits purchase Khaireddin Pasha's old palace at Tunis for a college.

A great sensation is caused in Johannesburg by the arrest of twenty persons there in connection with another conspiracy against British arms.

-Death of Count von Hatzfeldt-Wildenburg, German Ambassador to Great Britain for over sixteen years. The Judicial Committee of the Privy Council decides

that the Legislature of Manitoba had jurisdiction to enact a prohibitory liquor law.

The Athenian student agitators grow riotous in their opposition to the proposal to translate the Bible into Modern Greek. The military authorities are called out to regain order.

An influential English-American syndicate is formed for the purpose of erecting in the heart of London an office building on American lines, which, it is asserted, will cost £2,000,000, and will be the largest and handsomest structure of the kind in the world.

The appointments to the Prince of Wales' Household are announced. Lord Wenlock and Lord Chesham are appointed Lords of the Bedchamber; Lieut.-Col. Sir W. H. Carington, Comptroller and Treasurer, and Lieut. Col. Sir Arthur Bigge, Private Secretary.

23—Believing in an existing conspiracy to overthrow him, President Castro of Venezuela causes the arrest of Ramon Guerra, Minister of War.

Arrival in Washington of the British Labor delegates to attend the American Federation of Labor Congress.

A patent for an invention by which a large number of telegraph messages can be sent over one wire simultaneously is granted Dr. William Duane, Professor of Physics in the Colorado State University. The invention is based on the principle of synchronizing motors.

The American revised edition of the Bible is at last issued, and critics are inclined to regard it as the best version of the Sacred Scriptures that is likely to occur for some time to come. A very curious and interesting part of the undertaking is the rendering of the New Testament into broad Scotch.

25—The French Government invites the other powers to send representatives to a congress to be held in Paris to consider the best means of combating the white slave

As a result of the demonstrations against the proposed translation of the Bible into Modern Greek the Grecian Cabinet resigns. This action is taken in spite of King

George's efforts to induce the cabinet and M. Theotoki,

the Premier, to remain in office.

The War Office accepts Canada's offer to recruit a

force of mounted men for service in South Africa.

A mutual arrangement is completed at Washington between the United States and Canada in connection with the Yukon mail service. "The Canadian Governwith the Yukon mail service. "The Canadian Government takes charge of the mails for the two countries for the whole route from Skaguay through the Yukon territory and to Eagle city, in Alaska, the United States paying its proportion of the cost of the service performed in United Stated territory."

A destructive storm in New York does damage to the extent of \$1,000,000.

Anxiety over the depopulation of France results in an interesting debate in the senate. M. Waldeck-Rousseau, the Prime Minister, accepts in the name of the government a proposal for the nomination of an extra-parliamentary commission to seek means of increasing the hirth-rate and diminishing mortality. An agreement is effected between Lord Kitchener and

Sir J. Gordon Sprigg, the Premier of Cape Colony, whereby the colony resumes control of the colonial

forces in certain districts.

The French Chamber adopts the sum of 265,000,000 francs for the Chinese indemnity loan.

26—Battle Abbey, Sussex, England, is purchased along with 6,118 acres of land by Sir Augustus Frederick Webster, Bart., for £200,000. The historic associations that enshroud this edifice are many and varied. Erected by William the Conqueror on the site of the

Erected by William the Conqueror on the site of the Battle of Hastings (1066) to commemorate that event it has stood the blasts and vicissitudes of the centuries.

The Minister of Public Works and Colonization of Mexico recommends for passage by the congress of his country a measure which has an important bearing on the Chinese immigration question. It is a bill granting a concession to M. F. Tarpey, John E. Bennett, or any company that may form, giving them the entire fishing privileges of the Mexican coast on the Pacific Ocean. privileges of the Mexican coast on the Pacific Ocean, contingent on their building and operating a steamship contingent on their building and operating a steamsing line between Mexico and China, and another line for coast trade. The company is to be free from taxation of any kind, and is to be allowed to land passengers anywhere on the Mexican coast, which is more than 1,000 miles in extent.

The Egyptian Budget for 1902 shows a surplus of £E210,000, exclusive of payments into the Caisse of the

public debt.

27-Lord Kitchener reports the capture of Commandant Joubert by Gen. Knox, together with the remainder of Buys' Commando who escaped after the recent fight near Villiersdorp.

A terrible railway accident on the Wabash System

A terrible railway accident on the Wabash System near Seneca, Michigan, results in the loss of 100 lives. The census returns for Algeria show a population of 4,790,000; of this 292,000 are French colonists, and 291,000 foreigners. The natives have increased since 1856 from 2,307,000 to 4.071,000.

It is stated that Col. Sir Edward T. H. Hutton, K.C.M.G., C.B., formerly Commander of the Canadian Willitia has accepted the command of the Federal forces

Militia, has accepted the command of the Federal forces in Australia.

28-The preliminary work of revising the creed of the Presbyterian Church so as to make it more popularly understood is inaugurated in Washington.

An important paleontological discovery is announced from Vologda, Russia, where a skeleton declared to be human has been found with the unprecedented length of 4.75 arshines or over eleven feet.

A conference is held at Colon, Colombia, between the representatives of foreign governments and the contending parties to arrange terms for ending the revolution.

King Edward VII gives his consent to the additional title of King's Colonials being added to that of Fourth City of London Imperial Yeomanry—the regiment newly formed in honor of the colonial troops who fought in the present Boer war.

The Crown Prince and Princess of Roumania mutually agree upon a divorce. The Crown Prince signifies his intention of renouncing his succession to the throne. This marks the third event in twenty-one years in which the heir-apparent of Roumania has relinguished his right of succession.

29-Herr Wolf, German Nationalist member of the Lower House of the Austrian Reichsrath, who has been so prominent in riotous scenes in the house, resigns his seat.

1—The King Edward postage stamps are brought into circulation. These are the first stamps issued in England bearing a man's head.

The delegations of the Pan-American Congress at Mexico practically reach an agreement on the subject of arbitration. The basis of the agreement is said to be simply the Hague Convention, to which all nations represented at the congress will become parties.

A bronze statue of the late Queen Victoria, representing her majesty seated on a throne in full regal state, erected at Lahore, India, by public subscription in commemoration of the Diamond Jubilee, is unveiled in the presence of a great and picturesque assemblage of Europeans and others.

2—Gen. Bruce Hamilton, operating east of Ermelo, Transvaal, makes the third night march of the week, capturing in all 100 prisoners, including Commandant Erasmus, and a considerable amount of stock and

Herr Von Pilgrim-Baltazzi, German Charge d'Affaires at Caracas, Venezuela, hands President Castro a new note reciting in simple language what Germany desires Venezuela to do respecting all her claims and the

Gorgeously attired, and borne in the vanguard of a brilliant procession, the Chinese Emperor, Empress Dowager, Prince Chun, the Empress and several princes enter Pekin, signalling the return of the Imperial court.

8-Replying to the telegram recently sent by Premier Barton of the Commonwealth of Australia enquiring as to the rumor of England renouncing her interests in the New Hebrides to France in consideration of a settlement of the Newfoundland difficulty, and speaking of the gravity of "such a step, Rt. The statements were made by Lord Cranborne, Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in the British House of Commons on the 20th of this month in reply to a question.

24—The French Government receives a cable message from its consul at Venezuela to the effect that President Castro has absolutely refused to allow M. Secrestat, Jr., whom he suspects of communicating with the rebels, to land at Venezuela in spite of the consul's repeated vigorous protests.

The treaty of cession of the Danish West India Islands from Denmark to the United States is signed at the State Department, Washington, by Secretary Hay and Constantine Brun, the Danish Minister.

According to a statement from Johannesburg Lord Kitchener has given permission to General Vilonel to raise a burgher corps of 1,500 men, and that general has written ex-President Steyn telling him that the formation of the corps is the outcome of his (Steyn's) obsti-

-The distinguished French colonial administrator, M. Ballay, Governor-General of French West Africa,

passes away at St. Louis, Senegal.

The Prince of Wales arrives in Berlin to be present at the birthday celebration of the Kaiser on the 27th of this month.

26—It is announced from the Transvaal that Gen. B. Viljoen has been captured in the neighborhood of Lydenburg.

27—The British House of Lords passes a resolution that it is only by the vigorous prosecution of the war and through the surrender of the Boer guerilla forces that a satisfactory and lasting peace can be assured, and that the house approves, in these respects, and heartily supports the action of the government.

In a brush with a Boer laager near Makaw's Drift, Transvaal, Major Driscoll captures with other prisoners Field Coronets Venter and Grobelaar, the latter afterwards dying from wounds received in the skirmish,

28-At Wellington, New Zealand, a large meeting of Maoris pass resolutions congratulating Colonial Secretary Chamberlain on his South African policy and supporting his virile retorts to German slanders; with a further resolution regretting that Maoris are debarred from participation in the wars of the empire, and stating that if required 5,000 natives would be ready for embarkation in a fortnight.

30-Hon. G. W. Ross, Premier of Ontario, accepts an invitation from the Colonial Office to attend the coronation, June, 1902.

ration holds its annual meeting at Leicester and passes a resolution condemning the policy of demanding un-conditional surrender in South Africa and calling for a

regular peace on broad and generous lines.

Premier Barton of the Commouwealth of Australia telegraphs to the Imperial Government suggesting that it take steps to inquire into the feasibility of establishing large horse-breeding stations in Australia for the supply of animals for the army.

20-Correspondence from Vienna says that the Austrian Government is disposed to accept the proposals of the British delegates at the sugar conference for the abolition of the bounties and a reduction of the duties, but that this is opposed by the Hungarian Government and by the representatives of the sugar industry.

23—An official telegram from Salonika, Turkey, states that the American missionary Miss Stone and her co-worker Mme. Tsilka have been handed over to their friends at Strumitza, Macedonia. clapse before the payment was divulged.

The haul of Kitchener's men was a large one, the figures being 2,000 horses, 23,000 cattle, 60,000 sheep, 200 waggons, 600 rifles and 50,000 rounds of ammunition, while the death-roll and the list of prisoners totalled some 600 Boers, the latter including Gen. ers totalled some 600 Boers, the latter including Gen. Christian De Wet's son.

1—The Canadian Royal Commission on the subject of Chinese immigration, after a thorough investigation, recommends that the further immigration of Chinese laborers into Canada be prohibited and suggests a treaty to this end. In the meantime it is proposed that the capitation tax be increased to \$500.

Information from Japan says that the Emperor, in connection with the conclusion of the Anglo-Japanese agreement has conferred titles on several of the cabinet ministers, and has made Baron Hayashi, Minister to

Great Britain, a viscount.

-Abdul Aziz bin Feysul, a descendant of the old Wahabee ameers, with an army of 2,000 men, captures the city of El Riad, Central Arabia, kills the Governor of the palace and thirty retainers and compels the garrison there to surrender.

3—The sub-committee of the United States Senate Committee on Interoceanic Canals agrees to recommend to the full committee that the legal complications surrounding the Panama Company's offer are such that the United States should not accept it.

In the Pietermaritzburg Legislative Assembly a resolution is passed repudiating the slanders on the

British army and nation.

The Pope's Pontifical Jubilee is inaugurated by a mass in St. Peter's Cathedral, Rome, at which the Pope is present.

4-The Secretary of State for War, Rt. Hon. St. John Brodrick, introduces the army estimates for 1902-3 in the British House of Commons. The amount asked for is £69,310,000 and the number of men to be voted 420,000. Various changes are announced, one being an increase of the soldier's pay.

It is stated that the powers at the sugar conference held at Brussels have agreed to abolish all bounties direct or indirect, to reduce the surtax of 6f. per 100 kilos, and to check over-production until Sept., 1903, when the convention comes into force. The British Government in return undertakes not to adopt a preferential tariff in favor of her colonies producing cane

The budget statement of the Orange River Colony is issued. For the six months ending Dec. 31, 1901, the total receipts were £131,000 and the expenditure £99,000,

thus leaving a net revenue of £32,000.

5-In the Budget Committee of the Reichstag, Germany, the consideration of the estimates for 1902 is concluded. The requirements will be in the shape of

loans amounting to 112,000,000 marks.

The Boer delegates, Messrs. Wolmarans and Wessels, are received as private citizens by Secretary Hay and afterwards by President Roosevelt in Washington. After listening to their statement the President informed them that the United States could not and would not interfere in the struggle in South Africa. Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamherlain telegraphs Premier

Barton of the Australian Commonwealth regretting that his proposed revision of the meat contract for the supply of the army in South Africa is impossible.

6-The Korean Government officially notifies the French Minister that they consider the loan contract of April, 1901, void and ended through lapse of time and the absence in the contract of power to transfer loan rights to another syndicate or any third party

The National Miners' Congress at France decides by 124 votes to 105 that the eight-hours day should be obtained by a general strike to be declared immediately and without further negotiating with the government.

The issue of the 1901 census shows that the population of Newfoundland and Labrador numbers 220,249, against 202,040 in 1891.

A despatch from Brazil says that Dr. Francisco Rodrigues Alves has been elected President of that Republic.

7-In the British House of Commons in committee the military vote for 420,000 men is agreed to, a reduction of 20,000 proposed by Mr. Dillon being rejected by 182 to 54.

An announcement from Paris tells of the death of the classical landscape painter Jean Paul Flandrin at the

age of 91.

The revised census returns of India, as issued, show the population to be 294,266,701.

8-Disastrous news reaches the War Office from Commander-in-Chief Kitchener telling of the reverse of Lord Methuen and of that general's capture along with the major portion of his force. The British troops consisted of 900 mounted men and 300 infantry, 4 guns and a pom-pom, and were moving from Vryburg to Lichtenburg, Transvaal, to meet another detachment. The burg, Transvaal, to meet another detachment. The Boer force of 1,500 attacked at dawn on both flanks, stampeding the mules at the early part of the engage-ment, and, despite several displays of British gallantry, ultimately compelled the larger part of the force to surrender. Gen. Methuen was afterwards released and also some of the troops.

A serious strike among freight-handlers begins at Boston. The cause of the trouble is that the men are required to handle goods taken to the station by non-

union teamsters.

Word received from Australia shows that a deadlock has occurred between the Commonwealth Government and the Eastern Extension Company. The former offered a ten years' contract which the latter refused. The cabinet has decided, it is said, to make no fresh proposals.

Speaking at a banquet at Dunedin, Premier Seddon of New Zealand expressed the opinion that the time had come to strengthen the Australian squadron, and, though not in favor of the colonies having their own navies, urged that colonials should be trained for naval

service.

According to a despatch from Spain Senor Pidal, the Spanish Ambassador to the Vatican, has resigned rather than bring forward the proposals of the Premier, Senor Sagasta, for the reform in the concordat, which include the suppression of 10 bishoprics, 10 seminaries and nearly 100 canonries.

10—Lord Rosebery, addressing a great meeting in Glasgow, said that the opinions he had expressed at Chesterfield and Liverpool had been repudiated by Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman and that this had led to the formation of the Liberal League by some of his friends who refused to be shut out from the party. This league believed in the vigorous prosecution of the war, was not in favor of the recall of Lord Milner or of further offers of terms to the Boers, and dissociated itself from the aspersions cast on the methods of British warfare.

Secretary Long of the United States Navy tenders his resignation to President Roosevelt to take effect May 1st, 1902. He will be succeeded by Mr. W. H. Moody, member of the House of Representatives for Massachusetts.

A despatch from Pekin declares that Russia, yielding to the persistence of China, now undertakes to withdraw from Manchuria within eighteen months of the signature of the proposed convention. China still insists on withdrawal in one year.

A colonial exhibition opens in London.

The Italian Chamber reassembles. Signor Biancheri, the joint presidential candidate of the ministry and the opposition is elected by 350 votes against 24 given to the socialist Signor Costa.

In the British House of Lords Commander-in-Chief Roberts makes a sympathetic reference to Lord Methuen's capture, asking the house to withhold any adverse criticism on what had taken place until they had some more definite information.

11-Prince Henry of Prussia takes leave of New York on his return to Germany

After four secret sittings the great majority of the Danish Folkething recommend the adoption of the treaty with the United States for the sale of the Danish West Indies.

According to an Ottawa statement Canada has since the beginning of the present Boer war seut food and forage to the value of \$7,000,000 to South Africa on behalf of the War Office.

Premier Barton states that the number of aliens who

13-A statement from Chili says that as a result of the nitrate combination the government proposes to increase the export duty on nitrate by 6d. per quintal.

This will produce \$50,000,000 per annum extra revenue. The British, French, Russian and Italian Embassies present a collective note to the Turkish Porte protesting against the systematic hindrances harassing the Cretans in their personal and commercial intercourse with Turkey.

A proposal to raise the tobacco duty from 85 to 125 marks is rejected by the Tariff Committee of the Ger-

man Reichstag.

In an interview Yuan Shih Kai, Viceroy of Chili, strongly urges that the civil government of Tien-tsin be

restored to him. Germany alone opposes the restitution.

The Federal Senate of Australia rejects the clauses of the Electoral Bill providing for proportional voting.

28-A Newfoundland statement declares that in spite of the treaty difficulties the population of the French shore has increased 31 per cent. during the past decade, whereas the increase in the whole colony is only 9 per

Advices from Seoul, Korea, bring reports of much confusion in ministerial circles. The Foreign Minister refuses to have any relations with M. Pavloff, the Russian Minister, who is pressing for compensation for telegraph posts erected in spite of the protests of the Korean Government on Korean territory, and subsequently destroyed by the orders of the Seoul Government.

The Turkish Porte addresses a fresh circular to the Ottoman representatives, accredited to the six great powers, in which it attributes the activity of the Macedonian revolutionary bands to the introduction into that country by the Macedonian Committee of arms, ammunition and dynamite.

Secretary Hay of the United States and Secretary Raikes of the British Embassy sign a treaty extending to the British colonies the treaty between the United States and Great Britain for the protection of industrial

The foreign trade returns of the German Empire for 1901 are issued. Compared with 1900 the imports and exports show a decrease.

30-A calamitous railway accident occurs at Barberton, Transvaal, 46 men being killed and 40 wounded.

-The French Chamber by 442 votes to 10 agrees to a bill stipulating for a weekly day of rest for shop assistants.

In the United States House of Representatives Mr. Sulzer introduces a resolution expressing sympathy with the Boers and requesting the President to respectfully inform the British Government that if the war is to continue it must be carried on according to the rules of civilized warfare,

At a meeting of the Council of Government, Malta, the Chief Secretary announces a modification of the instruction in elementary schools limiting teaching in Maltese

A big combined movement is undertaken in the Klerksdorp district, Transvaal—the scene of Methuen's disaster—against Delarey. At midnight the Boers attack unexpectedly, the Canadian Mounted Rifles, being at the front, receiving the heavy part of the onslaught. Though temporarily outnumbered the sons of the Dominion are not wanting in heroic steadfastness the inion are not wanting in heroic steadfastness, the repeated rushes of the enemy being met with steady fires until the British support arrives.

APRIL, 1902.

1—The British Minister at Caracas, Venezuela, notifies the Venezuelan Government that the steamer Liberador (ex-Ban Righ) will not be allowed any longer to enter the harbors of the British West Indies. [The Liberador is a revolutionary.]

Information from Washington says that the American Government, recognizing the justice of Japan's claim in reference to the house tax refuses to become a party to

the arbitration

2—The Halifax Longshoremen's Association orders a strike affecting 700 ship laborers. The refusal of the steamship owners to pay increased wages is the cause of the trouble.

The committee appointed by the United States House of Representatives to enquire into the alleged charges of bribery made in connection with the negotiations for the purchase of the Danish West Indies begins its work.

After considerable trouble Mr. Schalk Burger succeeds

in opening negotiations with ex-President Steyn who is located with Generals Delarey and Kemp at Kroonstad, Orange River Colony.

The 11th International Peace Congress at Monaco,

France, is opened.

The Manitoba Liquor Act, restricting the sale of liquor, passed by the Legislature two sessions ago, meets defeat on the referendum.

3—Commandant Erasmus is killed in an engagement with the British near Boshof, Orange River Colony.

Major Hodgson on the Lower Niger, West Africa, and the gunboat *Thrush* co-operating successfully terminate their expedition, and the Aro campaign is ended.

4—The War Office issues a statement showing that the executed officers of the Australian Bushveldt Car-

bineers were guilty of murdering Boer prisoners.

The appointment of the Earl of Dundonald, C.B., C.V.O., to the command of the Canadian Militia is announced.

-A general order is issued at Melbourne, Victoria, for raising four new battalions for South Africa, to be named the "Australian Commonwealth Horse."

The Anti-War League at Sydney, New South Wales, forwards a petition to the municipal councils asking for a place in the council chambers to enable the ratepayers to sign a petition. The request is everywhere treated with contempt.

6—A serious riot occurs at Montego Bay, Jamaica. The cause is antagonism to the local police, but it is generally regarded as a symptom of unrest resulting from the policy of the government.

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7—Replying to a query in the British House of Commons Rt. Hon. St. John Brodrick, Secretary of State for War, informs the house that in view of the statements that had emanated from a responsible source with regard to the Spion Kop despatches, and the misapprehension which appeared to exist, he proposed to lay on the table all the papers which were forwarded to the War Office, with the despatch of Lord Roherts relating to Spion Kop.

The report of the committee appointed by the House of Representatives, Australia, recommends the adoption of the decimal coinage system hased on the sovereign.

The Mayor of Chicago, in compliance with a resolution of the city council, invites ex-President Kruger to visit Chicago, at the same time extending to him the freedom of the city.

The British Secretary of State for War receives a telegram from Lord Kitchener stating that Kritzinger's trial had been concluded and the prisoner acquitted. He will consequently be treated as an ordinary prisoner

8-The court-martial of Major Waller at Manila on a charge of executing Filipinos without trial reveals startling facts regarding some American generals' mode of warfare. The accused alleges that his general instructed him to "kill and burn," and that on asking the general to define an age limit for killing was told, "Everything over ten."

Earl Kimberley, late Liberal leader in the British House of Lords, and after whom the famous diamond centre of Sonth Africa was named, passes away at his London residence in his 77th year. Following the death of Cecil Rhodes this event closes two chapters of South

African history.

The Manchurian Convention is signed at Pekin.

The discussion of the new procedure rules is resumed in the British House of Commons and Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour, Leader of the Government in the Commons, announces a modification under which questions might be asked and answered at 2.15 p.m.

9 -The Danish Landsthing (upper house) carries by a small majority an amendment to the treaty, providing that the sale shall not take place of the Danish West Indies unless approved by a vote of the population of those islands.

10-The remains of the late Cecil Rhodes are horne by railway from Cape Town to the Matoppo Hills, Bulawayo -his desired resting-place-and there interred in an aperture hewn in the rock.

Hon. F. W. Borden, Canadian Minister of Militia and Defence, states in the Dominion House of Commons that by the adoption of Maj.-Gen. O'Grady-Haly's scheme for a reserve force in the Dominion, which the government had decided upon, the active militia would be increased threefold and its total strength would be 100,000 men.

The Narodna Skupshtina (national assembly), Servia, raises the peace footing of the Servian army from 12,000 to 17,500 men and agrees to the necessary supplementary credit of 1,090,000 dinars.

Serious riots begin in Belgium among the laboring populace.

11—Col. Kekewich's column while moving in the neighborhood of Rooiwal, Western Transvaal, is attacked by a strong force of Boers. The enemy are repulsed with a heavy death-list, Commandant Potgieter being among the killed.

The committee of the Australian House of Representatives fixes the duty on cotton and linen piece goods

at five per cent.

The Tariff Committee of the German Reichstag discusses the duties on cattle and horses, and, notwithstanding government protests, adopts scales of duty nearly double those proposed in the bill, with a further provision that the duties should not be reduced more than 20 per cent. under any commercial treaty

12-The Prussian Government issues a decree the object of which is to check the immigration of Poles into Prussian territory.

A telegram from Santo Domingo states that the rebellion on the south coast of Haiti has been crushed.

The trial by court-martial of the American officer,
Major Waller, on the charge of punishing the revolted
natives of Samar, Philippines, with ruthless severity is
concluded. The prisoner is acquitted by 11 votes to 2.

13—Col. Colenbrander, pursuing Beyers' commando with great activity in the Pietersburg district, Transvaal, overtakes his force among some hills bordering the Malips River and adroitly gains control of both exits of the enemy's quarters. After a slight resistance the Boers are made prisoners, but Beyers manages to effect his escape

A serious railway accident occurs near Klerksdorp, Trausvaal, as a result of which 13 men of the New Zealand Mounted Infantry are killed and 13 wounded.

14—The Chancellor of the British Exchequer makes his budget statement. To meet a deficit of about £45,500,000 he proposes to add a penny to the income tax, to double the penny stamp duty on cheques and to levy an import duty of 3d, per cent. on corn and 5d, on flour; also to suspend the Sinking Fund and horrow £32,000,000.

horses, and all the supplies.

first consignment from Germany of comforts for the Boer refugees.

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21—The South Island Battalion of the tenth New Zealand contingent, consisting of 650 men, sails from Lyttleton, New Zealand, for South Africa.

A treaty between the United States and Colombia is signed. It authorizes the Panama company to dispose of all its rights to the United States. On the ratification of the treaty the United States will pay \$7,000,000, for which Colombia relinquishes rental and all other canal revenues for fourteen years.

24—As the result of representations by New Zealand the Australian Commonwealth decides to admit without surcharge letters bearing a penny stamp from any por-

tion of the empire. A report from Somali, East Africa, says that the Mad Mullah's following is increasing and that the Eastern tribes are joining him in order to save their cattle from being looted.

25—The court-martial on Gen. Smith, charged with conduct prejudicial to good order and discipline in the army, begins at Manila.

26—Mr. W. H. Moody of Massachusetts is appointed Secretary of the United States Navy. The Bank of Spain Bill is passed by the chamber by

197 votes to 32.

The Senate Committee on United States Foreign Relations agrees to report favorably on all the reciprocity treaties before it with the exception of that with Argentina and that with Great British tina and that with Great Britain regarding Jamaica, on



The United States annesty of the Filipinos is pro-claimed. It will include exiles under the sedition law, nearly all political prisoners, and all military prisoners except those guilty of unmilitary crimes.

A report from Viceroy Curzon gives the British casualties in the Mahaud-Waziri blockade in India as 31 killed and 113 wounded.

7-A report from Venezuela declares that the revolutionists have captured Barquisimeto after four days' fighting, and that 4,500 rebels are marching on Valencia. The new French Minister of the Colonies abolishes the

post of government commissioner in the region of Lake Chad with the result that this territory becomes a province of the French Congo colonies.

8-In the discussion of the Education Bill in the British House of Commons an amendment is agreed to giving the protection of the Cowper-Temple clause to pupils in secondary schools established by county councils.

9-The opening of the Queensland Parliament takes

The Australian Federal Parliament decides not to become a party to the Brussels Sugar Convention,

10-Fresh eruptions are reported from Martinique and St. Vincent, but with no loss of life.

The death takes place at Alexisbad of the Duchess Frederica of Anhalt Bernburg. The Duchess, who had attained her 91st year, was the oldest member of any European royal house.

11—Lord Salisbury tenders his resignation as Prime Minister and Lord Privy Seal of Great Britain to King Edward. At the request of the King Rt. Hon. Arthur J. Balfour succeeds his uncle, Lord Salisbury, as Prime Minister and Lord Privy Seal, also retaining his former office of First Lord of the Treasury.

A despatch from Managua, Nicaragua, declares that the government troops have defeated the revolutionists who recently landed near Blewfields, and that the latter have surrendered.

Sir Arthur Lawley, Governor of Western Australia, is offered and accepts the Lieutenant-Governorship of the Transvaal.

12—Joachim III, after waiting fourteen months for a firman validating his election as Patriach of Turkey, obtains it through the influence of Russia.

The Orotava with Lord Kitchener on board arrives at Southampton.

14—A telegram from Newfoundland tells of the death

of Sir Joseph Little, Chief Justice of that island.
Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour makes his first appearance in the British House of Commons as Prime Minister and is warmly congratulated by Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman the leader of the opposition.

The great bell tower of Venice, the Campanile of St. Mark, falls to the ground.

15-The court-martial at Manila which tried Gen. Smith on charges of misconduct in connection with the subjugation of the Island of Samar sentences the accused to be admonished by the reviewing authority, President Roosevelt retires Gen. Smith.

The international conference for the repression of the white slave traffic opens at Paris.

16—An announcement from Tasmania says that Premier Lewis of that island will submit to parliament

resolutions amalgamating the two chambers.

According to official reports the negotiations between the American Government and the Vatican have reached a deadlock.

17—The revenue statement of Western Australia for the financial year ended June 30th, 1902, shows an increase of £610,015 over the previous year.

It it is officially given out that Earl Cadogan has sub-mitted his resignation of the Lord Lieutenanoy of Ireland to the King who has accepted it.



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18—Death of the Sultan of Zanzibar, Hamud bin Muhamad bin Said. He is succeeded by Seyyid Ali, a minor. Premier Rogers of Zanzibar will act as regent until the Sultan attains the age of twenty-one.

19—Lord Tennyson, Governor of South Australia, is sworn in as temporary Governor-General of the Com-monwealth of Australia owing to the departure of Lord Hopetoun, late Governor-General.

21—Baron Lambermont, a Belgian minister of state, acting as arbitrator between France and Great Britain in the case of the Waima incident and the seizure of the French boat Sergent Matamine by the British, gives his award. The amount to be paid by France is £9,000; by

Great Britain, £6,500.

Telegraphic despatches from Haiti declare that Gen. Firmin has been proclaimed president in the Province of Artabonite and that the situation is disquieting.

22—Cardinal Ledochowski, Prefect of the Congregation of the Propaganda of the Roman Church, dies at Rome after a Iong illness. He was born in 1822.

23—Dr. Horsey, representative for North Grey, Ontario, in the Dominion House of Commons, is accidentally killed by the bursting of a fly-wheel at Owen Souud. Two hundred persons are drowned by the capsizing of a steamer on the West River, Hong Kong.

24—A telegram from Pekin states that Yuan Shih Kai, Viceroy of Chili, and the Chinese Foreign Office, have decided to accept the terms offered for the restora-tion of Tien-tsin to China.

25-Lord Dundonald, the new commanding officer of the Canadian militia, arrives at Ottawa.

26—A telegram from Aden reports a success gained over the adherents of the Mad Mullah in Somali by a mounted column, 150 of the enemy being killed and 4,000 camels and 12,000 sheep captured.

During her passage from Kronstadt, Hungary, to Kiel, Prussia, the Italian cruiser Carlo Alberto carries out some important experiments in wireless telegraphy under the personal direction of Signor Marconi. Signals are exchanged with stations 2,000 kilometres distant, 1,000 by sea and 1,000 by land.

28-In the British House of Lords the Education Act, 1901, Renewal Bill is passed.

30—A collision occurs off Malacca, Peninsula of Malay, between the *Prins Alexander* and the *Ban Hin Guan*, the first-named vessel sinking and forty lives being lost.

The Australian Senate concludes the tariff debate and requests the House of Representatives to reduce the duties on many items.

The last coping stone of the Nile dam at Assouan, Egypt, is laid.

31-Advices from Helsingfors state that according to the latest Russian decree the laws of Finland will no longer be endorsed by the members of the National Senate, but will be promulgated and signed by the Czar.
Correspondence from Tokio states that in consequence

of the news that a party of Americans are coming to take possession of Marcus Island the Japanese Government has sent a cruiser to forestall them.

AUGUST, 1902.

1—A despatch from Cape Haytien, Hayti, says that Gen. Nord, in command of the government forces, who was sent out to give battle to Gen. Salnave, has been defeated and compelled to retreat to Cape Haytien.

The trade returns of the United States, as issued, show a decrease of \$106,000,000 in exports and an increase of \$60,000,000 in imports for the past year.

6-The International Congress for Improving the Condition of the Blind is opened at Brussels.

7—After a voyage of nine months the brigatine Blake-ley returns to Victoria, B.C., Canada, her search for the supposed hidden treasure on Cocos Island, off the coast of Central America, having been fruitless.

Ritchie succeeds Sir Michael Hicks-Beach as Chancellor of the Exchequer, and is in turn succeeded as Secretary of State for Home Affairs by the Rt. Hon. A. Akers-Douglas; J. Austen Chamberlain, Esq., succeeds the Marquis of Londonderry as Postmaster-General, who becomes President of the Board of Education (this post telegraphy and the lattice of the Secretary and the lattice of the Secretary and Secreta Education (this post takes over the duties of the Vice-President of the Council, the office of the latter becoming extinct); George Wyndham, Esq., remains as Chief Secretary for Ireland, but with a seat in the cabinet, the Earl of Dudley, the newly appointed Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, having no seat in the cabinet. 11—The colonial conference holds its tenth and concluding meeting. Resolutions are adopted on the subcluding meeting. The American Consul and the British Collector, in the presence of prominent Englishmen and Americans, hoist by the same halyard the English and American flags at Boundary Bay, British Columbia.

14—The treaties between the Chilian and Argentine Governments are approved by the Chilian Chamber of Deputies.


Information is given out that the Island of Tori Shima, which is one of a chain extending between the Bonin Islands and the main island of Japan, has been overwhelmed by a volcanic eruption. There were 150 inhabitants, of whom no trace can be found. All the houses have disappeared.

15—According to information from the East the transfer of the city of Tien-tsin to the Chinese has been completed.

16—Earl Dudley is sworn in as Lord Lieutenant-General and General Governor of Ireland.

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The protocol tariff of China is signed by the British, American, German, and Japanese representatives without reservation, and by the Austrian, Belgian and Dutch commissioners ad referendum.

17-The Boer Generals Botha, De Wet and Delarey, who arrived at Southampton on the 16th inst., are received in audience by King Edward.

18-The Women's Franchise Bill passes both houses of the New South Wales Legislature.

19-A statue of the late Dowager Empress Frederick is unveiled at Hamburg in the presence of the German Emperor and Empress.

bury Ministry.]

20—The Cape Town Parliament is opened.

21—The Australian Federal House of Representatives rejects all the important alterations of the tariff sug-

gested by the Federal Senate.

News from Venezuela declares that Germany, Great Britain and France have protested against the blockade of Venezuelan ports on the ground that it is ineffective. Venezuelan Government replies that it will not consider the protest.

22—The Parliamentary Indemnity Bill, and the Financial Indemnity Bill, are read a second time in the

Cape Colony Assembly.

A despatch from France states that a large majority of the French departmental councils have supported the action of the government in enforcing the decrees against the conventual schools.

23—Gen. Sir George White opens the Gordon High-landers' Memorial Institute, established in Aberdeen in memory of the officers and men of the regiment who fell in the late war with the Boers.

Hon. Joseph Royal, who was Lieutenant-Governor of the North-West Territories from 1888 to 1893, dies at

Montreal at the age of 65.

24-Death of Duchess Margareta Sofia of Wurtem-

berg in her 32nd year.

25—Despatches from China declare that the foreign commissioners have been informed that the Chinese Government sanctions the signature of the new tariff, substituting, however, the Chinese new year for the date previously arranged—Nov. 1. The commissioners, it is said, have telegraphed to their respective ministers in Pekin requesting that a formal protest be made.

26-Lord Roberts and Gen. Sir John French are presented with the freedom of Canterbury.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is entertained at luncheon by

President Loubet of France.

- 27—An understanding in principle is arrived at between Persia and Turkey, under the auspices of Russia, for the conclusion of a treaty of commerce embodying a specific tariff on the basis of the most-favorednation treatment. This understanding is a corollary of the treaty reported to have been recently concluded between Russia and Persia.
- 28—It is officially announced that the new subsidized monthly service of steamers from Canada to South Africa will he begun by the Allan liner *Ontario* sailing from Montreal on Oct. 18, 1902.
- 29-The Turkish Porte declines to consent to a Russian request that four new torpedo boats should be allowed to pass through the Dardanelles.
- 30-Fresh eruptions occur at Mont Pelée, St. Pierre, Isle of Martinique, French West Indies. One thousand persons are said to have been killed, and a portion of the eastern part of the island, more than a mile long, to have sunk into the sea.

31-Sir Arthur Lawley, the new Lieutenant-Governor of the Transvaal, arrives in Pretoria.

Serious riots occur in Agram the capital of Croatia, Austria-Hungary, between the Crotian and Servian elements in the population. More than 100 persons are injured and the town is placed under military control,

SEPTEMBER, 1902.

-Lord Minto reviews on Parliament Hill, Canada, in the presence of 10,000 spectators, 300 of the National Guards from Albany, New York, and the Hong Kong coronation contingent.

- 2—An announcement from Shanghai says that the difficulty regarding the Anglo-Chinese Commercial Treaty has been satisfactorily settled.
- 3-President Roosevelt has a narrow escape from a serious accident while driving near Pittsfield, Mass., an electric car colliding with the coach in which he was

riding. Two of the occupants of the coach are killed.

The Cape Colony House of Assembly passes the third reading of the General Indemnity Bill.

5—The death takes place at Berlin of Professor Rudolf Virchow, one of Germany's most famous men of science. He was born in 1821.

The British commercial treaty with China is signed.

- 6-Information from Australia says that the Federal Senate has finally passed the Tariff Bill and that the Federal Parliament has agreed to allow the next governor-general £5,500 per annum for the maintenance of government houses in Sydney and Melbourne.
- 7-A severe labor disturbance occurs at Barcelona owing to some stringent measures of the Spanish military authorities.
- At a representative meeting of sugar-planters of Jamaica resolutions are passed condemning Great Britain's neglect of the West Indies, setting forth the total inadequacy of the measures proposed by Great Britain for the relief of her West Indian sugar-planters, and calling for federation with Canada as the only means of retrieving the fallen fortunes of Jamaica.
- 8—The first volume of the results of the eleventh decennial census of the population of Scotland, taken on March 31, 1901, is issued as a bluebook. The population is 4,472,103.
- 9—The Ministry of Victoria, Australia, is defeated in-the assembly on a proposal to reduce salaries in the public service. Parliament is dissolved.
- 10-A new commercial treaty is reported to have been concluded between Russia and Servia.
- 11-General Castro's forces meet with severe defeat at the hands of the revolutionists near Tinaquillo, Venezuela.
- 12.—The Columbian revolutionists attack the out-skirts of Santa Marta, Columbia, and overwhelm the government forces.
- 13—Sharp fighting is reported from the Province of Tayabas, Philippines, between the Americans and the insurgents.
- 15—A report from Haiti says that the Haitian rebel gunboat Crête à Pierrot has been sunk by a German gunboat. The Crête à Pierrot was said to have stopped a German merchant vessel and to have taken some arms and ammunition from her.

A statement of the British national debt, as issued, shows that the gross liabilities to March 31, 1902, were \$3,842,216,930, an increase of \$313,597,540 due to the late South African war.

16—The Japanese ships sent to the scene of the volcanic eruption in Torishima return. They report that not a vestige of a living thing remains.

Queen Wilhelmina opens the Dutch Parliament in

person.

A report from Calcutta declares that twenty-five villages have been swept away and six thousand persons rendered homeless by floods due to the overflowing of rivers in the southern part of Bengal.

-Gen. Nord attacks 3,000 men at Limbe, Haiti, and after three hours' fighting abandons his positions, guns and ammunition.

18-The returns of the Japanese official accounts for the last fiscal year ended March 31 show a revenue of 267,100,000 yen and an expenditure of 266,800,000 yen, the latter including 10,200,000 yen applied to the amortization of the public debt.

The commander of the United States warship Cincinnati notifies the government and revolutionary parties of Colombia that their forces will not be allowed to obstruct railway traffic on the Isthmus of Panama.

19—The discovery ship Fram, with the Sverdrup expedition on board, drops anchor at Stavanger, Norway, after having been ice-locked for three years.

Marie Henriette, Queen of the Belgians, dies at Spa in her 67th year.

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20—A demonstration against the British Education Bill is held on Woodhouse Moor, Leeds, an immense assemblage of people being present.

22—The Cape Town Legislative Assembly passes Mr. Merriman's anti-suspension motion.

The treaty documents are exchanged between the Argentine Commission, and the Chilian representatives, in Santiago.

23—In the Lower Chamber of the States-General, Holland, the Premier in reply to a question said no treaty of alliance with any foreign power had been concluded or prepared.

An earthquake occurs in Guatemala and British Honduras.

24—The Premier of Queensland is credited with saying that the next Queensland Parliament will be pledged to support a resolution in the Commonwealth Parliament giving Queensland the opportunity of seceding.

25-Lord Dudley, the new Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, makes his state entry into Dublin.

26—According to reports from Vienna and Constantinople the Bulgarians in the vilayet of Monastir have risen in insurrection, and the situation is described as serious.

27—A cyclonic storm, accompanied by floods, does great damage in Sicily, destroying over 200 lives.

28-A British exhibition is opened at Budapest, Hungary.

29-The restoration of the Pekin-Shanhai-kwan Railway to the Chinese takes place.

M. Emile Zola, the celebrated French novalist, is suffocated in his bedroom by gas, Mme. Zola narrowly escaping a similar fate.

Odawara district, Japan, is swept by a tremendous storm and 200 persons are reported to have been drowned.

OCTOBER, 1902.

A report from Morocco states that the Berber trihes have declared themselves weary of fighting and have offered absolute submission on any terms the Sultan may impose.

2—The elections of half of the Danish Upper House (landsthing) results in the loss by the Ultra-Conservatives of their small majority and it is said that the sale of the Danish West Indies to the United States will probably be approved.

3—A report from Egypt states that upto Sept. 27, 1902, there had been 35,374 cases of cholera and 29,753 deaths. President Roosevelt's conference in regard to the anthracite coal strike fails to hring about a settlement.

A telegram from Rio de Janeiro states that the revolutionists of the Acre territory in dispute between Brazil and Bolivia have proclaimed the independence of the territory and declared war against Bolivia.

4-The death is announced at the age of 68 of the Hon Justice Hensman, First Puisne Judge of Western Australia.

6—The Boer generals arrive in Brussels.

Death of Liu Kun-yi, Viceroy of Nan-king. He is succeeded by Chang Chih-tung.

7-A convention is signed by France and Siam settling all the questions pending.

The War Inquiry Commission of Great Britain holds its first sitting at Westminster.

8—The Miners' National Committee in Paris decides after prolonged sittings to declare a general strike.

9-The results of the Victorian, Australia, elections show a vindication of the reform and retrenchment policy of the Irvine Government.

10-The Turkish Porte sends a note to the powers complaining of the inadequate supervision of the frontier by the Bulgarian authorities. The British, Austrian and Russian Governments, in reply, promise to exert their influence to terminate this state of things.

11-Lord Roseberry unveils a statue of the late Rt.

Hon. W. E. Gladstone at Glasgow.
One hundred and fifteen of the Haitian Government troops are killed in an encounter with the rebels at Montrouis. The Nouvelle Voldrogue is sunk by the forts of Saint Marc and the crew arc said to have been drowned.

The Canadian Minister of Militia and Defence, Hon. Sir F. W. Borden, K.C.M.G., is credited with stating that it had been practically decided to establish a steamship service between England and Canada, beginning with 20-knot vessels.

13—The Boer generals arrive in Paris and are welcomed with considerable enthusiasm.

The Canadian Postmaster-General and Minister of Customs conclude an arrangement with the authorities of Great Britain whereby the duty as well as the postage on parcels sent through the mails from that country

-Areport from Venezuela states that owing to fears that the revolutionists might make a night attack on Caracas, and in view of the departure of Vice-President Gomez with all the available troops from that city, President Castro has transferred the government to a provisional capital in the Guacaipuro district.

An agreement is reached by the miners and operators An agreement is reached by the miners and operators of Pennsylvania and the strike that began on May 12, 1902, comes to an end. The basis of the settlement was the appointment of a commission, consisting of six arbitrators, by President Roosevelt, to consider the questions at issue, the miners to resume work in the meantime and both parties to be governed by the finding of the commission of the commission.

-The Hague Arbitration Court brings to a conclusion the consideration of the Californian Pious Fund case between Mexico and the United States, awarding to the latter the sum of \$1,420,682, Mexican currency, and directing Mexico to pay for ever an annual sum of

18-According to news from Morocco the Algeria-Morocco frontier question has been settled, France obtaining the disputed districts already occupied by her,

A coalition ministry is formed in Servia.

20—Newfoundland correspondence declares that Sir Robert Bond, K.C.M.G., Premier of Newfoundland, has concluded in Washington a reciprocity convention with the United States, on most advantageous terms, admit-ting the products of Newfoundland into the United States free of duty.

The general council of the Belgian Miners' Federation decides that the partial strikes now in progress must

cease immediately.

21—The text of the Anglo-Chinese Treaty with a covering despatch from Sir J. Mackay, the British Special Commissioner, is issued as a British parliamentary paper.

In the German Reichstag the amendments of the Customs Tariff Bill Committee fixing the rye and wheat duties at 55 and 60 marks per ton are carried against the government proposals of 50 and 55 marks.

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

23—Telegraphic information from Haiti declares that Gen. Firmin, the revolutionary leader, has fled and that the insurrection has been suppressed.

The German Reichstag approves the proposals of the Customs Tariff Bill Committee for higher duties on barley, oats, meat, cattle, and horses, than those proposed by the German Government.

24—A communication is received by the British Government from the Russian Government proposing that direct non-political relations be established between Russia and Afghanistan with regard to frontier matters. The British Government replies that it cannot consider any change in existing arrangements without more precise explanation.

The striking coal-miners of France agree to arbitration with their employers.

25—The royal progress of King Edward and Queen Alexandra through London takes place.

26—General elections to the Swiss National Council show a strong Radical-Democratic majority.

27—The United States Coal Strike Commission has its first assembly.

An announcement from Austria-Hungary says that the Ausgleich negotiations are at a deadlock.

28—Great Britain, Germany and France agree with Japan to refer to arbitrators chosen from among the permanent members of the Hague Tribunal the construction of the treaty clauses relative to perpetual leases under which foreigners possess property in Japan.

29—Gen. Christian Botha, who figured prominently in the late Boer war, dies at Griqualand East, Cape Colony.

30-A note is addressed to the powers by the Bulgarian Government repudiating the charge preferred against it by Turkey of supporting the Macedonian movement, and calling attention to the threatening situation in Macedonia.

31—According to an announcement from China Yuan Shih Kai, Vicercy of Chili, has been appointed Chinese Minister of Commerce, with supreme control of mines, railways, telegraphs, and commercial affairs.

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


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
