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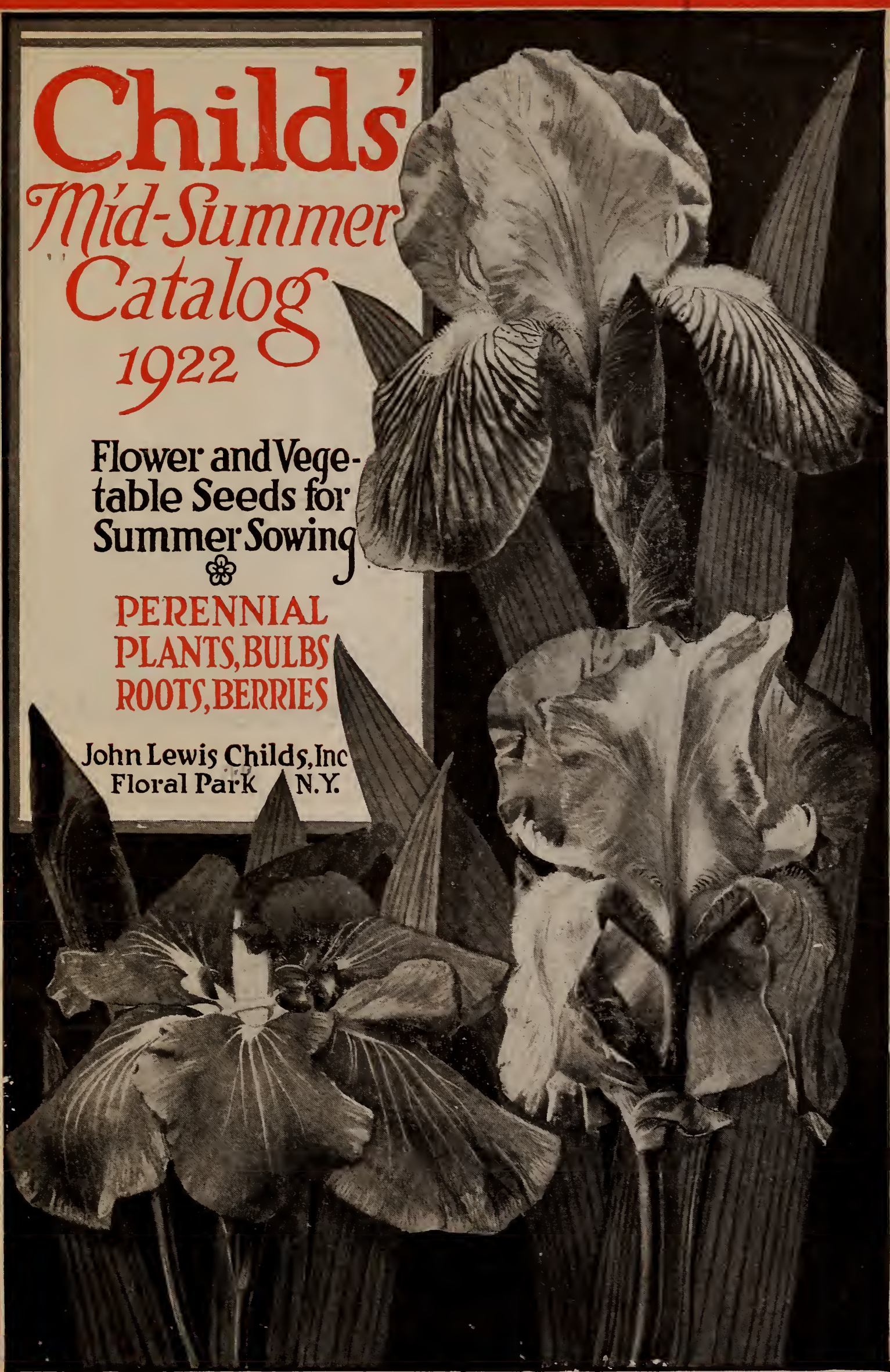

NARCISSUS, Paper White Grandiflora For Winter Flowering Indoors

This is a great improvement on the common Paper White, the flowers being about twice the size. They are of star-like form, pearly white and delightfully fragrant. It is a very early and abundant bloomer and may be had in full beauty at Christmas. Bulbs may be planted in shallow boxes or pots and kept in a cool, dark place to form roots before bringing to the light. This is one of the most beautiful and satisfactory winter bloomers when grown in the Chinese manner. Set the bulb firmly in a bowl or glass container filled with pebbles or gravel and add water to cover the roots of the bulb. Treated in this way they will bloom quickly and a few bulbs will produce a charming bit of beauty and fragrance in any room. See the illustration above.

OXALIS, Grand Duchess

This is one of the most satisfying and beautiful flowers it is possible to have. Blossoms three inches across, borne well above the foliage, and of the most lovely colors. Clear, rosy pink, pure white and a most beautiful shade of lavender. The large, fresh green leaves are clover shaped and most attractive. Both flowers and leaves "sleep" or partly close at night. A most persistent bloomer, remaining constantly in flower from November to June. Surely one of the most satisfactory of all winter-blooming bulbs.

We Take the Risk—We guarantee that all money sent us shall reach us, if sent by Post Office or Express Company's Money Order, Bank Drafts, Bills or Coin by Registered Letters. We will not be responsible for coin sent in ordinary letters, nor for postage stamps.

Free by Mail or Express—We send Seeds, Bulbs and Plants free by parcel post or express at the prices named in this Catalog, except where otherwise stated. This brings them to the very doors of our customers without trouble or expense. Of course, we must have the privilege of sending either by parcel post or express as we deem best and cheapest.

When buyer asks that goods be sent only by express we do not prepay the charges, but larger and better plants, shrubs, etc., can be sent that way.

WE GUARANTEE that every package we send out shall reach its destination in good condition, and that everything shall be received exactly as ordered. If not we must be notified at once. If a package is lost, or any of its contents injured on the way, we will send again, provided the customer returns the injured articles by Parcel Post. We cannot, however, be responsible for losses caused by detention by customs officials.

WHAT BUYERS SHOULD DO

Forward Money with the order, and at our risk when sent by Post Office Money Order on Floral Park; bills or coin by Registered Letter; Bank Draft or Express Company's Money Order. Post Office Money Orders are the cheapest and the safest method for remitting. We earnestly request our patrons to remit by Money Order if possible.

Stamps and Coin—Do not send postage stamps in payment for goods if it can be avoided. The loss is great. If stamps must be sent we prefer them in 5c and 10c denominations. Coin, when sent in letters should be sewed or pasted up in strong paper or cloth to prevent its breaking through the envelope. We will not be responsible for coin, stamps or bills sent us except in Registered Letter.

Write Your Order plainly and distinctly by itself and not mixed up with anything else you may wish to say. Be sure to write your NAME and ADDRESS plainly.

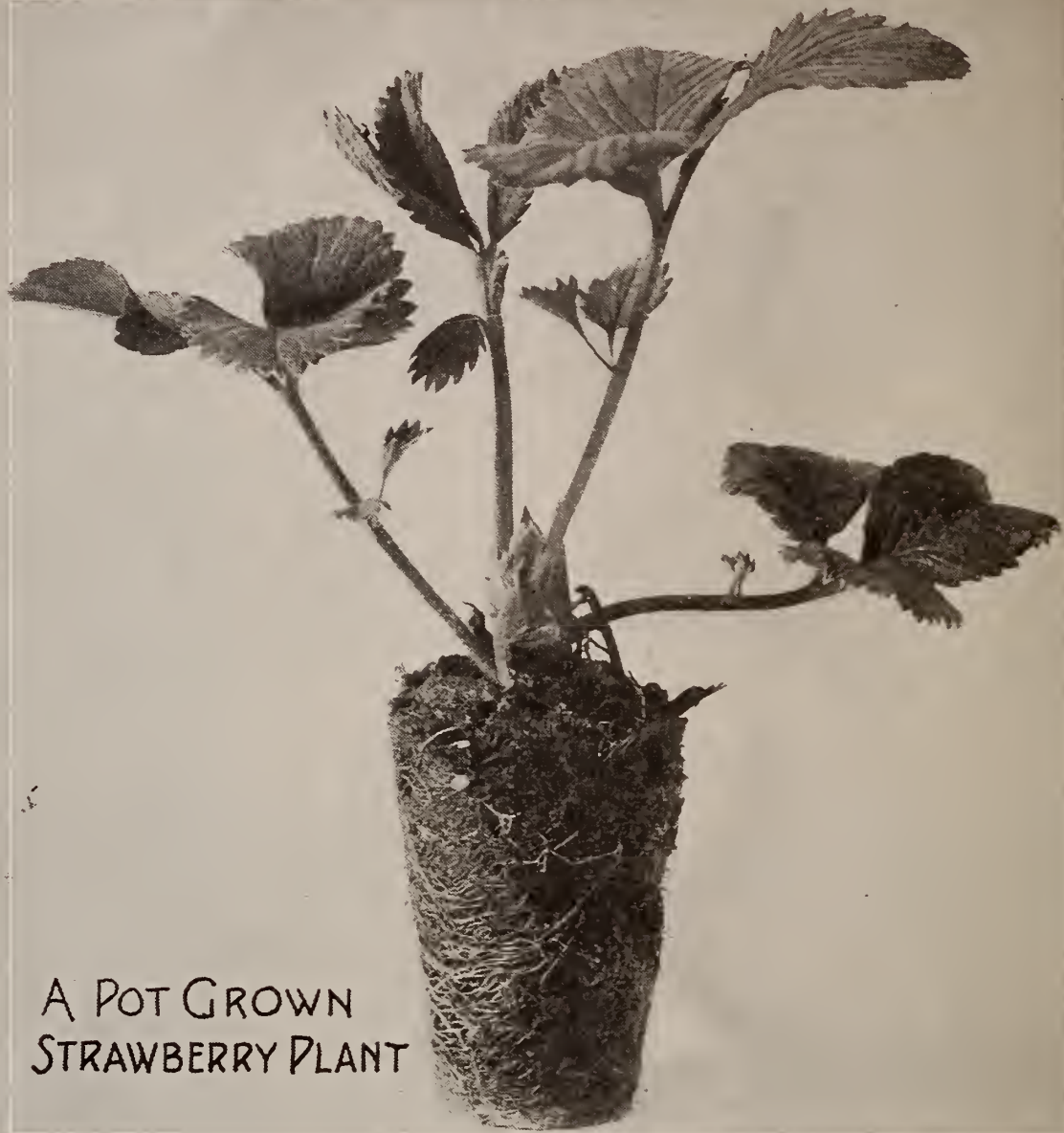

POT GROWN STRAWBERRY PLANTS

Have a great advantage over others because they will bear a crop of fine large berries the first season after planting.

Every home garden should produce some of this most delicious of berries. Pot grown plants may be set out in summer or fall and berries harvested the next summer—one year earlier than if ordinary plants were used. They will succeed on almost any kind of soil if well manured and exposed to full sun. For the home garden, plant in rows two feet apart and the plants one foot apart in the row, cutting off all runners as they appear; or plant in rows three and one-half feet apart and one foot in the row, allowing the runners to grow at will. Either method will produce excellent results. The plants will reach you with a ball of earth about the roots, just as they were removed from the pots as shown in the illustration above. This ball should be crushed and dipped in a pail of water as the plants are set. The varieties offered below have been tested on our trial grounds and we can recommend them unreservedly. In order to encourage the use of pot grown plants, which we know will give greatest satisfaction, we are quoting very low prices. The plants will be shipped by express only, carefully packed at the customers expense. We will, however, send small lots of one or two dozen by parcel post, prepaid, if 10c per doz. is added to the price. Sold in lots of not less than one dozen of any variety.

Brandywine—This fine, old variety produces large, firm, round berries of excellent quality and bright red color. Well adapted for the home garden. Price \$1.10 per doz.; \$7.00 per 100

Chesapeake—This berry will produce wonderful crops if you have a loam or clay-loam soil. The berries are somewhat heart shaped, the flesh firm and of fine quality and bright crimson color. Mid-season to late. \$1.25 per doz.; \$8.50 per 100

The Tall Bearded Irises furnish us one of the best and most satisfactory of the hardy plants. They are among the oldest of the cultivated flowers, being named Iris by the Greeks signifying "rainbow." They can be planted and transplanted with safety almost any time of the year when ground is open. They love shallow planting in a sunny, well-drained situation.

We send out either divisions of two or three eyes or roots grown one year from a division. We guarantee our stock to have live eyes and to be true to name. 12 for price of 10.

Peonies are gross feeders and love a well-prepared bed. Dig up the ground deep, working in some bone meal or well rotted manure. The eyes should be covered about three inches deep. The roots placed two or three feet apart. Late in the fall mulch the bed with two or three inches of strawy manure. A mulch of well rotted manure applied each fall thereafter is an excellent thing. Plenty of water during May will increase the size of the flowers.

Adolphe Rousseau—Semi-double type. Very large dark velvety-red with garnet hues and a distinct metallic reflex. Extra fine. **\$2.00 each**

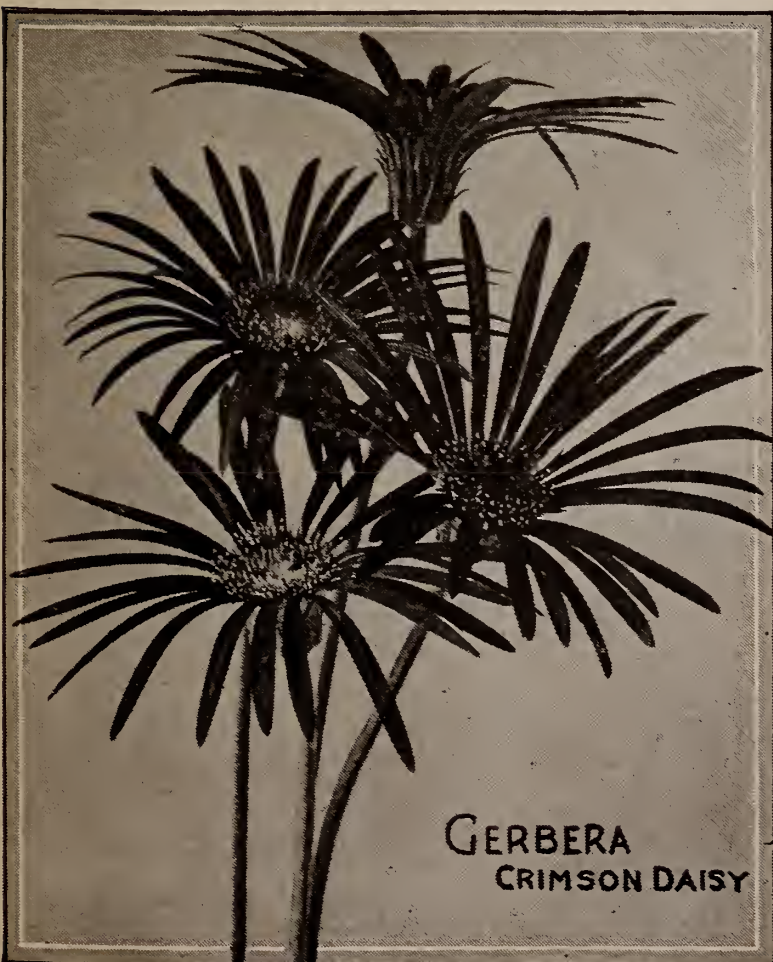

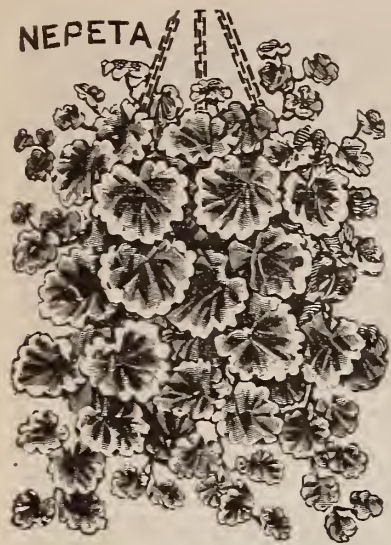

Trailing Plants



Trailing plants are most useful at this season of the year when every porch and window must have its box of greenery or flowers. Hanging pots or wire baskets of moss and soil make the summer porch cool and inviting. In the following selected list will be found plants and vines for various uses. Nepeta Glechoma—This Nepeta is hardy, fragrant and pretty, its small, round leaves finely marked with white. It will grow anywhere.

Crimson Creeper—As a pot plant it is highly ornamental, the long, slender, graceful vines, red stemmed, with dark rich-green foliage, being extremely pretty. Large crimson flowers.

Coleus, Trailing Queen—Leaves green with bright red center shading to yellow at base, bordered with chocolate markings. One of the most beautiful foliage plants. Blooms in winter.

Mexican Primrose—This plant inclines to a trailing habit, its branches drooping over the sides of the pot, holding its large silky flowers erect. Bright, deep pink, saucer-shaped flowers.

Ivy, English—Well known and popular hardy vine for walls or for pots or baskets.

Parrot Feather—A lovely mossy plant, with long trailing stems covered with plummy foliage. Fine for aquariums, or hanging pots or baskets. It grows well in soil if kept well watered.

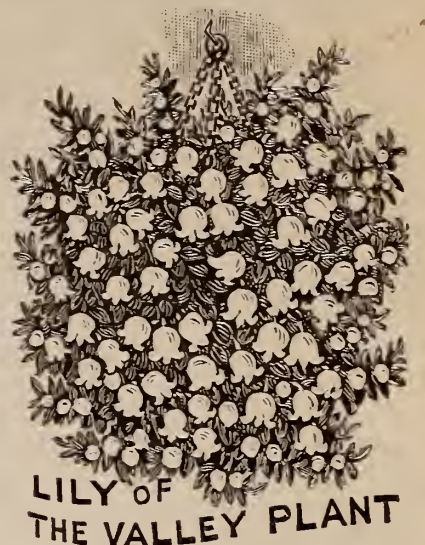
Lily of the Valley Plant—A beautiful plant of trailing or creeping habit. It has flowers similar to a Lily of the Valley.

Moneyworth—A lovely old-fashioned creeper, or trailing vine for pots or lawn. Beautiful foliage and large golden flowers. Perfectly hardy anywhere.

Weeping Lantana—This trailing plant is most desirable for pots and hanging baskets. The slender, graceful, trailing growth, and abundance of rich blossoms make it a plant of peculiar beauty. Color a fine lilac and sweetly scented.

Vinca. Aurea Variegata—A new hardy Periwinkle with variegated foliage and many lovely blue blossoms. Unsurpassed for rock work or massing in shade.

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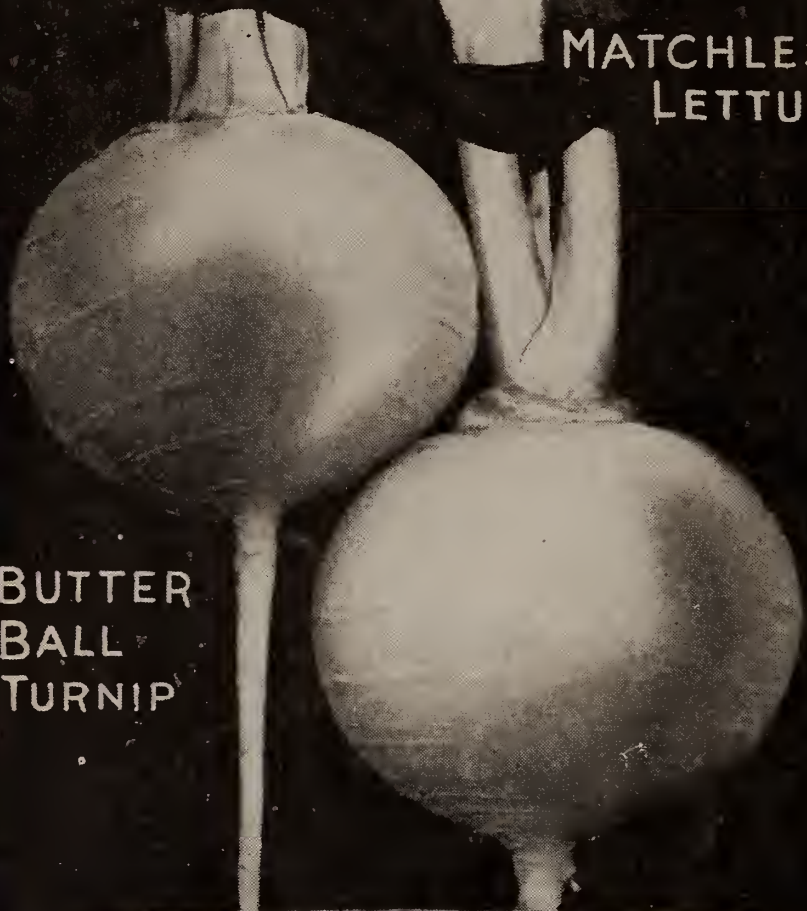
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
