The Pennsylvania State Agricultural Society was created "a body corporate" by the Legislature, on the 29th day of March, 1851. The act at large, can be found in the statutes for 1851, and in all the volumes of the Transactions of this Society. The society sprang from a meeting held at Harrisburg, on the 21st of January, 1851, in which all the counties of the State were represented. On the 22d, the meeting had taken the form of a society, electing its first president and officers. On the 20th of January, 1852, it held its first annual meeting at Harrisburg, where, in the previous September, its first exhibition had been held, with a good degree of encouragement. Exhibitions have since been held at Lancaster, Pittsburg, Philadelphia, Harrisburg, Wyoming, Norristown, Williamsport and Easton, with varying success, but always doing something toward developing the agricultural resources of the State.

The concerns of the society are entrusted to an Executive Committee, consisting of a president, twenty-four vice presidents, one from each of the Congressional districts into which the State is divided, five additional members, all the ex-presidents, a corresponding and a recording secretary, a treasurer, a chemist and geologist, and a librarian, in all, as at present constituted, a committee of forty.

The Constitution has been frequently, but not substantially, amended since its original adoption in 1852, and now stands as it is given herewith. A list of life members is embodied in this issue. It has been impossible to preserve a necrological register, and therefore lapses by death are not noted. The list comprises the names of all life members, previously to the 1st January, 1866; a total of 594 names, representing all parts of the State.

The main object of this publication is to place in authoritative shape, previous to the issue of other volumes of "Transactions," the awards of premiums for the years 1864, 1865 and 1866. Whatever is desirable to preserve of the proceedings of the society, will appear in a more permanent form in the forthcoming volumes.

CONSTITUTION OF THE PENNSYLVANIA STATE AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The name of the society shall be the Pennsylvania State Agricultural Society. The objects of this society are to foster and improve agriculture, horticulture and the domestic and household arts.

WHO ARE MEMBERS.

SECTION 1. The society shall consist of all such persons as shall pay to the Treasurer not less than one dollar, and annually thereafter not less than one dollar, and also of honorary and corresponding members; the names of the members to be recorded by the Secretary.

The officers of county agricultural societies in this State, or delegations therefrom, shall be members *ex-officio* of this society.

The payment of ten dollars shall constitute life membership, and exempt the members so contributing from all annual payments.

OFFICERS.

SECTION 2. The officers of the society shall be a President, a Vice President from each Congressional district, three-fourths of whom shall be practical agriculturalists, or horticulturalists, a Treasurer, a Corresponding Secretary, a Recording Secretary, a Librarian, an Agricultural Chemist and Geologist, and such assistants as the society may find essential to the transaction of its business; an Executive Committee, consisting of the above named officers, five additional members, with the Ex-presidents of the Society.

OF THE PRESIDENT.

SECTION 3. The President shall have a general superintendence of all the affairs of the society. In case of the death, illness or inability of the President to perform the duties of his office, the Executive Committee shall select a Vice President to act in his stead, who shall have the same power and perform the same duties as the President, until the next annual meeting.

OF THE VICE PRESIDENTS.

It shall be the duty of the Vice Presidents to take charge of the affairs of the association in their several districts; to advance all its objects; to call upon farmers to report as to the condition of agriculture in their neighborhood; to ask for information as to the modes of cultivation adopted by different farmers; and as far as in their power to make known the resources of their districts, the nature of its soil, its geological character, and all such matter as may interest farmers in every part of the State.

TREASURER.

The Treasurer shall keep an account of all moneys paid into his hands, and shall pay bills when audited and approved by the Executive Committee; each order for payment must be signed by the President or chairman of the Executive Committee.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

The duty of this officer shall be to invite a correspondence with all persons interested in agriculture, whether in the State of Pennsylvania or elsewhere, but especially with our consuls in foreign countries, that new seeds, vegetables or live stock may be introduced, and their fitness for cultivation and propagation in our climate be tested. At each stated meeting of the society he shall read his correspondence, which shall, either the whole or such parts as may be selected by the society, form a portion of the Transactions. He shall also correspond with the president or other officers of each State society in the United States, at least twice in the year, for purposes of combined and mutual action, and to be informed of the result and pro-

gress of each other's efforts; also, to invite mechanics to forward models or implements for examination and trial.

RECORDING SECRETARY.

The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of the society and of the Executive Committee; at the close of each year he shall prepare for publication such parts of the minutes and transactions of the society as may be designated.

LIBRARIAN.

The Librarian shall take charge of all books, pamphlets, &c., belonging to the society, and shall act as curator to preserve seeds, implements, or whatever property the society may possess.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE AND QUORUM.

The Executive Committee shall transact the business of the society generally, and shall appoint, annually, at their first quarterly meeting, a Recording Secretary and Treasurer, fix their salaries, and require security from the Treasurer, if they deem it necessary; shall superintend and direct the publication of such of the reports and transactions as they may deem proper, and shall designate the time and places for annual exhibitions, regulate the expenditures, examine all accounts, and keep such general charge of the affairs of the society as may best promote its interests.

They shall select their own chairman, and meet quarterly, and at any other time when convened by the President; five members shall form a quorum.

They shall call special meetings of the society when necessary.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY AND QUORUM.

SECTION 4. The society shall meet annually, on the third Wednesday of January, at Harrisburg, when all the officers of the society, not otherwise appointed, shall be elected by ballot for the ensuing year, and until another election. They shall also hold a general meeting at the time of the annual exhibition, and special meetings whenever convoked by the Executive Committee.

Fifteen members shall form a quorum for the transaction of business, but no member in arrears shall be entitled to the privileges of the society.

QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS.

SECTION 5. No annual member, hereafter, shall be entitled to vote for the election of officers of the Pennsylvania State Agricultural Society, unless he shall have been a member at the previous State fair, and in default of a State fair, then three months previous membership shall be necessary.

SECTION 6. No one shall be eligible to office hereafter, who has not obtained a right to vote under section five.

ALTERATION.

SECTION 7. This constitution may be altered or amended, at the annual meetings in January, by a vote of two-thirds of the members in attendance.

The cider exhibited by Dr. H. Detweiler, in bottles, and awarded the premium as above, was manufactured in 1825. The following is the recipe :

"The apples, machinery, &c., were all made perfectly clean; the apples were selected from one variety in November, 1825—the cider was filtered through white flannel as it ran from the press into an open tub, where it remained until after fermentation, and then it was drawn off and filtered through flannel as at first, and filled into vessels in which sulphur had been burned. It stood in these vessels until congealed by cold—the cider was again drawn off and filled in barrels prepared with sulphur as before, where it remained until the following spring, when it was again drawn off and filled into other barrels, where it remained untouched for three years. It was then again drawn off and put into barrels again, where the samples, now exhibited in bottles, remained until this time."

The display of wines, cordials, &c., by Henry A. Sage and J. M. Hackett, of Easton, was exceedingly fine and deserving of commendation.

Being new to the committee, we are unable to say more than from a short ride we have taken, we find in passing over rough ground less jolting than pertains to the elliptic springs we have been accustomed to. We therefore recommend it to the favorable consideration of the public.

Messrs. Ayres & Perkins exhibited various carriages, all of which had these gum or gutta percha springs. They appear to be well gotten up, and to which we award the first premium, or instead of the cash premium offered, a bronze medal and diploma.

Samuel B. Beck and John E. Jones exhibited very neat carriages for children, but as they are not the manufacturers—in compliance with the rules of the society—we are unable to award a premium.

We recommend Charles A. Slack's self acting wagon brake as an article of merit, and deserving consideration.

In making the awards for mowing and reaping machines, we do not feel that we would be doing justice, did we not make mention of the many other excellent machines on exhibition. Among them the "Excelsior" mower and reaper, manufactured by Brunner, Whitsell & Co., Nazareth, Pennsylvania; the "Union," manufactured by Kniffin & Harrington; the "American" mower, made by Halliday; the Hubbard mower and reaper; Seberling's "Excelsior" self-raking or dropping reaper or mower, and the Kirby mower and reaper; all of which, in the estimation of the committee, deserve to be ranked as standard or first-class machines.

We desire to make special mention of the horse rake, exhibited by John Hall & Co., as an excellent one, and well adapted for the purpose.

In conclusion, we recommend that the Executive Committee of the State society, in making out their list of premiums, shall give separate premiums for self-rakers and droppers or self-deliverers, believing that a dropper is not a self-raker, but that they are two distinct machines. In coming to

this conclusion, we have the opinions of several of the exhibitors of agricultural implements on the grounds, as also the opinions of those who have the machine in use. We are satisfied that this arrangement will meet with the hearty approval of all manufacturers of agricultural implements, and save much trouble to future committees, and give much more satisfaction to the exhibitors.

A. B. Hamilton exhibited a beautiful specimen of rusticoat potatoes, and in the opinion of the majority of the committee, was entitled to the premium, which however he declined, desiring the award to be made to Elias Fulmer, as above.

John S. Furst exhibited an exceedingly tall and beautiful specimen of oats in the straw, produced on his farm near Cedar Springs, Clinton county, Pa.

H. N. M'Allister exhibited four specimens of timothy hay, taken from the outer edge, and from the centres, of two well filled mows, respectively; the one 45 feet long, 25 feet wide and 30 feet deep, from the square. The other 45 feet long, 17 feet wide and 20 feet deep, from the square, showing the marked difference in color, arising from the high degree of heat to which that taken from the centre had been subjected in the process of curing; which had changed it from a green to a red color, without in the least impairing the quality of the hay.

J. M. M'Minn, Williamsport, exhibited fifty varieties of corn, produced by him in years that are passed, and carefully preserved in the cob. Also eight varieties of wheat, produced by him from seed obtained through the Patent office, and carefully preserved in glass bottles.

Seth Winners exhibited a perfect specimen of the old eight rowed corn.

Mrs. Mary Ann Wheeland exhibited a lot of hops in the vine.

John Clark exhibited two jars of large chestnuts, all of which added to the interest of the exhibition, and although no premiums can be awarded, because none have been offered, the committee think this honorable mention but an act of justice to the exhibitors.

The committee would further state that Mr. H. N. M'Allister, of Bellefonte, after he became a member of the committee, withdrew, absolutely, all his articles on exhibition, in this class, so far as they came in competition for premiums with the articles of other exhibitors.

The premium of the barley was awarded to him because there was no competition, and because it was deserving of the premium, and they deem it but justice further to state, that among the articles thus withdrawn were a bushel of superior Prince Albert potatoes and two bushels of white wheat. The one very good white, blue stem, the other superior tappanhook. Also, an exceedingly fine bushel of ears of corn, which, had they been allowed to come in competition, would, as to one of the articles at least, in the opinion of other members of the committee, have changed the award made.

J. E. Gould exhibited an excellent Steinway piano and a cabinet organ. A piano, exhibited by Mr. Andrus, is claimed as superior, on having the frame constructed with improved bracing, and with other improvements, to insure a superior quality of tone. The instrument is a superior one.

William Lighton exhibited an Elmira piano with peculiar bracing, and an important improvement in the soft pedal, and several useful improvements in the action.

The sewing machines exhibited the peculiarities and excellencies of the various kinds, which were well represented, but were not put in competition.

Under the foregoing organization an exhibition was held at Easton, Northampton county, in 1866. The general display was at least equal to, and perhaps superior to any heretofore made at the exhibitions of this Society. The interest on the part of the members of the Society was never so lively, nor the preparations of the Executive Committee more elaborate—all of which were seriously interfered with by one of the heaviest and most general storms of rain known in Pennsylvania for many years, followed by a couple of days of pleasant but uncertain weather. In reality, but two days were left for examinations and display. The receipts did not liquidate the engagements of the Society, and it was compelled to draw upon its balance to do so.

ALEXANDER K. M'CLURE, Esq., of Franklin county, delivered the annual address, but up to this time he has not furnished a copy for publication. It was brief, practical and directly upon the subject of agriculture. It will appear in a permanent form in a future volume of the Transactions of this Society.

The committee report that they find the display of mowers and reapers exceedingly large, being the best ever made at the Society's exhibition; above thirty entries being made, among which will be found the greater part of reaping machines now in use in the United States, and the most of the different varieties that had the honor of being awarded the first pre-

mium at the trial of mowers and reapers at Auburn, in July last. As the working qualities of the greater number of the machines on exhibition have been brought so near perfection that the committee feel it would take at least two weeks actual trial in the field with the assistance of the Dynamometer test, as well as the test of the side draught, to do full justice to the exhibitors.

Taking these things all in consideration, your committee had hoped to be able to make such arrangements with the exhibitors as to dispense with the awarding of premiums on the present occasion, because the machines contain so many valuable qualities, and are so nearly of the same merits, that it is very difficult to arrive at a correct judgment without a practical test in the field; but the Executive Committee overruled the decision of your committee, and required your committee to make the examination and awards to the best of their knowledge of the machines on the grounds, without the so much desired practical test in the field.

The screw press is used; the cheeses are turned and greased every day for sixty days; use Onondagua factory filtered salt, at the rate of two and three-quarter pounds to one hundred pounds of green cheese.

Your committee farther report, that the chairman of said committee was on the ground on Tuesday at two o'clock P. M., September 25, and found M. Q. Crane ready for operation; but unfortunately no sorghum came on the ground, and consequently the machine could not be tried.

Cory's sugar evaporator was also there, but there was no crushing mill attached.

On Wednesday at ten A. M., your chairman of said committee was again on the ground, and found, on account of the inclemency of the weather, the rest of the committee were absent; on this account he substituted others.

The rain prevented any of the machines from being operated. As no sorghum came to hand, your committee concluded to report on machinery only; but as some small samples afterwards arrived, they would make mention of the best without awarding any premiums, and their report is:

Your committee is impressed with the idea that although sorghum and sugar production is yet in its infancy, it is destined to become the staple production of the Middle and Western States, if properly encouraged. It is to be regretted that so very little attention is paid to the culture of the beet in this country, whilst in European governments it has become an object of great importance. If it were not for fear of making the report too long, statistics would be given demonstrating this fact.

Your chairman, in his last visit to Europe, had a very satisfactory interview with Baron von Stahlberg, the Austrian minister, who devotes a great deal of his time to agriculture, and was informed by him, that the exportation of beet sugar from the empire, amounted to 25,000 tons in the year 1865. Which is all respectfully submitted.

Dr. Edward Swift, of Easton, Pennsylvania, exhibited a portion of his large and valuable collection of minerals and geological specimens, a subject to which he has devoted much time and efficient study. Particular attention is also called to his display of American antiquities, including about three thousand stone arrow-heads, besides a large collection of stone axes, and implements in every state of finish. The whole is arranged in admirable order, and formed one of the most interesting departments to our exhibitions, since the origin of the Society. As the subject is much studied	

in connection with the history of mankind, it is proposed to honor the learned doctor with the Society's Silver Medal. He has kindly furnished the Society with the following history of it :

"EASTON, PA., November 27, 1866.

"I began to collect specimens as far back as 1825. The collection of minerals has been obtained almost entirely through exchanges, donations and personal collections. Probably not more than ten or fifteen dollars have been expended in the purchase of specimens. The Indian collection has been got together in the same manner, and several of my correspondents have contributed very liberally to it. Quite a large number of the specimens have been obtained from the shores of the Delaware river, between Belvidere, New Jersey, and Reiglesville, Pennsylvania, twelve miles below Easton, and some from the Lehigh valley. In addition to the collection which was exhibited, I have sent quite a large number of these things to Europe—principally to the Royal Society of Northern Antiquaries, at Copenhagen, and to Saxony—amounting in all to nearly one thousand specimens. They were sent in exchange for mineral specimens, and the return made by the Royal Society of Northern Antiquaries was very satisfactory. From Saxony, (Prof. Germar, of Halle,) promises, and nothing more. I do not think it would be necessary, in your report, to say anything more about this collection than what is contained in the enclosed paper, unless it might be to suggest to persons, who may happen to be in possession of one or more specimens of Indian antiquities, or may find them in future, that no better use could be made of them than to add them to this or some other extensive collection of the kind."


