PARCEL POST AND EXPRESS INFORMATION

Goods forwarded by Parcel Post are assured of quick delivery, and for light parcels or short distances the charges are less than if sent by

for fight parcels or short distances as an be forwarded by Parcel Post Express.

Parcels weighing 70 pounds or less can be forwarded by Parcel Post anywhere in the first three zones, and parcels weighing 50 pounds are delivered all over the country. Parcels going by mail must not exceed 84 inches in measurement all around and height included. This means that the distance from one end to the other added to the number of inches around the thickest part of the package must not be more than 84 inches or 7 feet.

The following was written specially as an introduction to this catalogue by Dr. Frank Crane, the famous writer.

A garden of vegetables is the ideal combination of use and beauty.

They are the best food in all the world. Doctors often warn you against eating too much meat, or too much candy, or too much of this or that, but rarely warn you against eating too many vegetables.

The garden is the poor man's friend. With it he can bid defiance to the high cost of living.

Gardening is the oldest and most human of joys, the least artificial of diversions, and of all occupations the most profitable. It is the one business where you can make a thousand percent on your capital.

When we think of the many back yards and vacant lots that are left waste, we are struck by the vast resources of joy and profit that people leave unused.

We felt that some distinction had been conferred upon our firm when the managers of the Westinghouse Radiophone Broadcasting Station selected us from among the many firms engaged in the seed business to give these short talks on gardening subjects. One of our representatives was accordingly deputed to broadcast, and the first talk was on "Lawns—Seeding and Culture," broadcasted on the evening of September 30th, 1922. On October 11th, a talk on "Golf Courses—Seeding and Maintaining" with some remarks on the history of golf courses in America was given. We may here remark that Peter Henderson & Co. seeded down most of the early golf courses constructed in America when first the game was introduced from Scotland.

The third talk was broadcasted on October 29th the subject being, "Holland Bulbs and their Culture," with a brief account of bulb life, from the planting of the parent bulb to the production of the finished bulb of commerce, which is, when marketed, about five years old. Much other interesting information concerning bulbs was also drawn from our storehouse of bulb lore, accumulated during a period of seventy-six vears in the business.

We shall, at the request of WJZ, continue these garden talks during this winter and the spring of 1923. Among the subjects treated of, will be Winter Pruning on Friday evening, November 17th, 10:00 to 10:10, Winter Spraying on Friday evening, December 15th, 9:40 to 9:50, and Garden Planning on Wednesday evening, January 17th, 9:30 to 9:45. These will be followed during the spring by other talks on garden culture.



Sueeession sowings should be made of most vegetables throughout the Summer and early Fall to supply the table, but when vegetables are wanted for eanning purposes or for storing it is better to sow seed late in the summer. Then, as the crops mature late, they keep longer.

Vegetables maturing in the late Fall are hardier and therefore better for storing in winter. Below we print a list of vegetable seeds suitable for sowing in June, July, August and September in the latitude of New York.





Cow Peas are more tender than Canada or Field Peas and should not be sown until Corn-planting time. Cow Peas, being of very rapid growth during the warm weather, can be sown as late as the middle of July with reasonable assurance of a profitable crop, either for harvesting or plowing under.

The early varieties of Cow Peas are quite extensively and successfully grown for forage and soiling as far north as Massachusetts, but so far north the crop may not ripen seeds. 



While there is no class of plantsthat will survive better under rigorous conditions, yet in order to achieve the best results thay should be planted where they can obtain ample sunlight, and may be easily watered. It is almost needless to urge the importance of careful weeding, as weeds usually grow more rapidly than the seedlings. If the rows are carefully marked when sown it will be easy to distinguish the weeds.

A continuity of bloom may be secured by occasional sowings of many sorts, such as Eschscholtzia, Sweet Alyssum Phlox, Zinnia, etc. In the latitude of New York these sowings may be made as late as June 15th.

SEED SOWING Most cases of failure of seeds to come up are due to unsuitable soil conditions. It is mechanically impossible that young seedlings can send their shoots upwards through soil which is hard and packed, neither can tender rootlets pierce downward in such soil. The result is an abortive effort to grow. So let the soil, either in the cold frame, or the permanent bed, be well dug and pulverized. Fine soil should be sitted on top to at least an inch in depth, and if heavy or clayey, lightened with sand. 

Some are mottled, striped, ringed, etc. For cutting they are unsurpassed and in the garden they flower until after frost; Anemone seed should be gently rubbed with sand or fine, friable soil, and both seed and soil may be thinly sown over the bed, which, as a finish, should be lightly beaten with the back of a spade. The situation must be shaded from direct sunshine, and frequent watering will be necessary. From seed sown in January or February under glass the plants should begin to bloom in September or October of the same year, and continue to flower until the following June. Seed may also be sown in June or July for plants to bloom in the succeeding year. (See engraving.).

The old favorite Hollyhock can seldom be flowered from seed before the second year, and as the young plants frequently winter-kill, it has limited the cultivation of Hollyhocks to those willing to give the young plants special winter care. All of this bother is obviated in growing our annual Hollyhocks, for they flower the first season from seed.

The plants from early-sown seed set out in May commence blooming in July, the May-sown in August, and in either event they flower pro-

fusely until frost.

The flower buds, borne in clusters, vary in maturity from the developing bud to the expanding flower; this characteristic accounts for the remarkably long flowering period, and, besides, the plants continuously push outside branches as well as new spikes from the base, all of which also develop their quota of flowers almost

ad infinitum. The diversity of forms and colors among the flowers affords many delightful surprises. Some plants produce densely double flowers without guards, others with guard petals; there are semi-doubles with Anemone-flowered centers, some with smooth-edged petals, others flounced, fringed, etc., and all flowers are usually very large, some measuring five inches across. In colors there is also great variety, some richly brilliant, others dainty and exquisite, then there are colors and tints in charming combinations. There are maroon, black, pink, chamois-rose, apricot with garnet throat, crimson, canaryyellow, pink with claret throat and veins, blush with carmine lacings, cerise, white, scarlet, blush with white throat magenta, apricot with buff margin, wine-red with white edge, etc., etc.

The plants are of vigorous and healthy growth and naturally branching in habit. The center spike, if not pinched, attains a height of from 8 to 10 feet, after which, if permitted, the side shoots from the base commence to lengthen, growing candelabra-like, 3 to 5 feet long. The plants are amenable to training; that is, the main stem may be kept at any desired height by pinching out the tip, or it may be kept low and induce earlier development in the side branches, thus forming a bush.



The Ball Celery Bleaching Tubes are made of heavy paper, waterproofed and with care may be used over and over again for several years. The plant is drawn together and the tube slipped over it (if the Spring Brass Celery Handler is also used it facilitates the operation); all light is then excluded and the celery blanches beautifully in from 10 to 15 days' time. Celery blanched with tubes is sweeter and cleaner than that blanched by banking, for there is no earthy flavor as with the latter, and besides, celery may be had for the table very much earlier, as the tubes may be placed over the plants any time the celery is large enough, even in hot, moist weather. The free circulation of air around the plant inside the tube allows it to dry out quickly after a rain. Place 12 or 15 tubes over as many plants, and in a week or 10 days after tube another lot of plants, then as the tubes are removed from the first lot they are placed over other celery plants. The celery should be nearly full grown before putting on our bleaching tubes. At this time, with plenty of moisture, heart growth is very rapid, and celery will often be in prime condition in from 8 to 14 days.
