WORLD COCOA BEAN PRODUCTION TO BE DOWN IN 1972-73

FCB 2-72
November 1972

SUMMARY

World cocoa bean production for the 1972-73 season is forecast at 1,526,900 metric tons, down from the record 1971-72 harvest of 1,550,200. African production is forecast at 1,101,800 tons, off about 4.5 percent from the large 1971-72 crop of 1,154,200. Smaller crops are expected for Ghana, Ivory Coast, and the Cameroons, compared with prospects of a 10-percent rise in Nigerian production. The North American crops are forecast to be slightly below last year's level of 90,500 tons. However, because of prospects of a larger Brazilian crop, South American production is estimated to be up about 12 percent over the previous year. Production in Asia and Oceania is also expected to be larger.

In contrast to earlier projections of a stock buildup for 1972, world production and consumption are now expected to be in near balance, following 2 consecutive surplus years. World cocoa bean grindings for 1972 are estimated at an alltime high of 1.54 million tons, up about 100,000 tons over the 1971 level. World exports of cocoa beans in 1971 totaled 1.21 million tons, a gain of over 9 percent from 1970 shipments of 1.11 million tons.

Cocoa bean prices this year have been trending upward and are now well above year-earlier levels. The higher prices are reflecting the close balance of the 1972 supply-demand position and the possibility that 1973 could be a deficit year if world consumption continues strong. New York spot Accra cocoa bean prices reached new highs for the year in October, averaging 38.1 cents per pound, compared with October 1971 average prices of 25.1 cents. Spot Accra prices during the first 10 months of 1972 have averaged 31.2 cents per pound, up from 27.3 cents during the corresponding 1971 period.

MAJOR PRODUCERS

Africa: Production in **Ghana** is forecast at 430,000 metric tons, off about 6 percent from the 1971-72 harvest of 457,000 tons. The 1972-73 main crop is expected to approximate 406,000 tons (400,000 long tons), down from the estimated 1971-72 main crop of about 447,000 (440,000 long tons). Prices paid to Ghanaian cocoa farmers will remain at the same level as those paid for the 1972 mid crop—10 cedis per 60-pound load (13 U.S. cents per lb.) for Grade I cocoa.

Preliminary data shows Ghana's exports of cocoa beans in 1971 at 361,092 tons, down slightly from the 367,345 tons exported in 1970. The major recipients of the 1971 exports were the United States, 109,351 tons; West Germany, 56,932; the Netherlands, 52,278; the United Kingdom, 35,531; Japan, 25,736; Yugoslavia, 19,692; and Australia, 14,625. Shipments to the USSR fell to only 13,208 tons from 48,305 in 1970.

Weather conditions in **Nigeria** have been more favorable this season, and production is expected to be up 10 percent to 290,000 tons. Grower prices for the 1972-73 season have been set at N£155 per long ton (20.9 U.S. cents per lb.) for Grade I cocoa and are unchanged from the previous year.

Nigeria's cocoa bean exports in 1971 totaled 271,742 tons valued at \$200 million, up from 195,910 tons valued at \$186 million a year earlier. The USSR was the largest recipient, taking 66,355 tons—more than double 1970 purchases of 24,068 tons. Other major markets for Nigeria's exports were the United Kingdom, 54,572 tons; the United States, 48,089; the Netherlands, 37,450; and West Germany, 28,658.

Reflecting less favorable growing conditions, **Ivory Coast** production is now forecast at 190,000 tons, off 15 percent from the record 1971-72 outturn of

224,000. The farmers' price for the 1972-73 season is to remain unchanged at 85 CFA francs per kilogram (15.1 U.S. cents per lb.) for Grade I cocoa.

Ivory Coast exports of cocoa beans in 1971 were a record 146,939 tons valued at \$79.4 million, up from 1970 shipments of 143,231 tons valued at \$96.3 million. The Netherlands accounted for the largest share of the 1971 exports, taking 49,059 tons. Other major recipients were the United States, 25,144 tons; France, 21,246; and West Germany, 17,887. Exports to the USSR jumped sharply in 1971 to 15,934 tons from only 749 in 1970.

Dry weather conditions have characterized the development of the 1972-73 **Cameroon** main crop. However, losses from pod rot, which normally takes a high toll in the Cameroons, are not expected to be as great this season. Production is forecast at 105,000 tons, down about 15 percent from the record 1971-72 harvest of 123,000 tons. Prices for Grade I cocoa will remain unchanged from the previous season at 90 CFA francs per kilogram (16 U.S. cents per lb.).

South America: Production in **Brazil** is forecast at 195,000 tons, up nearly 18 percent over the 1971-72 harvest; it could be even higher if favorable weather conditions continue. Growing conditions for the 1972-73 Bahia main crop have been good, and a harvest of between 1.6 million and 1.7 million bags (96,000-102,000 tons) is expected, compared with the 1971-72 main crop of 1,511,000 bags (90,660 tons).

Brazil's 1971-72 harvest of 165,400 tons was off 9 percent from the 1970-71 crop of 182,400 tons because of a poor 1972 Bahia temporao outturn of 1,095,051 bags (65,703 tons), which was down sharply from the large 1971 temporao harvest of 1,944,354 bags (116,661 tons). Production from the other areas in Brazil usually amounts to 150,000 bags (9,000 tons).

Ecuador's 1972-73 production is now expected to approximate the 1971-72 harvest of 60,000 tons. Production could go even lower as reports now indicate that the July heavy rains in the coastal areas have resulted in lower estimates of the Christmas crop, which is now being harvested.

Ecuador's exports of cocoa beans in 1971 totaled 50,902 tons valued at \$25.4 million, up 41 percent over 1970 shipments of 36,098 tons valued at \$22.1 million. The United States was the largest recipient taking 18,768 tons, followed by Colombia, 6,403; the USSR, 4,100; Japan, 3,960; and West Germany, 3,262 tons.

North America: Production in the **Dominican Republic** is forecast to be below the large 1971-72 outturn of 40,000 tons. Initial estimates indicated a

reduction of about 5 percent, but later information reveals that the crop could be as much as 10 to 15 percent lower this season.

MAJOR IMPORTERS

Reflecting record world production in 1971-72 and strong demand for cocoa, grindings of cocoa beans in the major European consuming countries are running ahead of year-earlier levels.

United Kingdom grindings during the third quarter of 1972 totaled 23,800 long tons, up 30 percent over the similar 1971 quarter. Grindings for the first 9 months have totaled 69,300 tons, a gain of more than 18 percent over the corresponding 1971 period. Total 1971 grind was 83,100 tons, compared with 81,100 in 1970.

West German grindings for the first 9 months of 1972 amounted to 98,589 metric tons, up 3.7 percent over the same period a year earlier when grindings were 95,085 tons. Total grindings in 1971 were 133,000 tons, up from 126,000 tons in the previous year.

Grindings in **the Netherlands** were also higher, reaching 91,380 metric tons during the first 9 months of 1972, an increase of 5.2 percent over the similar 1971 months. Annual grind in 1971 was a record 120,600 tons.

Grindings in the **USSR** are also expected to be higher this year. Recent estimates by the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations (FAO) place 1972 Soviet grind at a record 140,000 metric tons, up from 120,000 in 1971. Soviet imports of cocoa beans in 1971 were a record 138,277 tons, compared with 99,900 in 1970.

U.S. cocoa bean grindings during the third quarter of 1972 totaled 139.4 million pounds, off 5.4 percent from the corresponding period a year earlier. However, because of unusually high first quarter grind, cumulative January-September 1972 grind, at 460 million pounds, is running 4.1 percent ahead of the similar 1971 level of 441.9 million. Total 1971 grind was 615 million pounds (278,962 metric tons).

U.S. imports of cocoa beans during January-September 1972 totaled 226,624 tons valued at \$112.3 million, off over 7 percent from imports of 244,656 tons valued at \$143.6 million during the corresponding 1971 period. However, imports of unsweetened cocoa powder/cake amounted to 54,972 tons valued at \$20.1 million, up nearly 34 percent over 9-month 1971 imports of 41,129 tons valued at \$15.6 million. Imports of cocoa butter were also up for the January-September period, totaling 15,336

tons valued at \$17.4 million, compared with 14,416 valued at \$16.7 million for the similar 1971 months.

Paralleling the rising trend in cocoa bean prices, quotations for cocoa butter were also higher this year. New York spot cocoa butter prices (cents per lb.) are shown as follows:¹

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENTS

The Sub-Group on Statistics of the FAO Intergovernmental Group on Cocoa met in Rome, October 25-26, 1972. World cocoa bean production for 1972-73 was forecast by the Sub-Group at 1,468,000 metric tons, off 4.1 percent from the 1971-72 crop of 1,531,000 tons. World grindings in 1973 were forecast at 1,598,000 tons, compared with 1,541,000 for 1972. After adjusting production data

for a 1-percent shrinkage, a deficit of 145,000 tons was forecast by FAO for 1973, compared with a projected deficit of 25,000 for 1972. According to the FAO data a stock buildup of 71,000 tons occurred in 1971.

A United Nations Cocoa Conference was held in Geneva from September 11 to October 20, 1972. At the conclusion of the meetings, the Conference adopted the text of an International Cocoa Agreement, with 53 of the 55 nations attending, approving the draft text without reservations.

Although the UNCTAD-backed proposed International Cocoa Agreement now appears closer to success than at any other previous time, there is a strong possibility that there will not be sufficient consumer ratifications to enable the Agreement to enter into force. The United States, which accounts for about 25 percent of world imports, has reservations in regard to being a party to the Agreement as it now stands, and West Germany, with 10 percent of the imports, still has reservations about agreeing to the automatic entering into force of the Agreement when 70-percent ratification of consuming nations had been achieved. The 80-percent producer ratification requirement appears to pose no problem. The Agreement will be open for signature from November 15, 1972, through January 15, 1973.

The Agreement will utilize export quotas rather than sales quotas and will utilize a buffer stock to regulate prices. The price range of the Agreement will be 23 to 32 cents per pound (based on the daily average of the 3 nearest futures trading months on the New York Cocoa Exchange at noon and the London Cocoa Terminal Market at the close).
