I have your letter of May 2, 1947 concerning the availability of precious stones seized by the occupation authorities in Japan.



If such policies subsequently provide for the sale of these items in the United States, appropriate publicity will be given to the matter at the time they are offered for sale.



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PROPOSED LETTER TO SCAP

8 July 1947

SUBJECT: Report on Precious Metals in Japan (Reports Contest Symbol Wosca

- 1. WCL 37391, 29 April 1946, established a monthly reporting procedure for stocks of gold and precious metals held by your command. Reports have been received through the month of April 1947.
- 2. It is requested that (a) the report be expanded to include a breakdown as to ownership, and to cover metals not in SCAP custody, in accordance with paragraph 3 below, and that (b) following the initial report on this basis, the reports be submitted quarterly, rather than monthly, as of 30 Sep, 31 Dec, 31 Mar and 30 Jun. If the 30 Jun report has been submitted, the first report using the breakdown below should be that for 31 Jul.
- 3. The following general breakdown is suggested. Within these categories, appropriate subsidiary breakdowns should be developed, with the objective of presenting significant classes of ownership.

A. Metals in SCAP custody

- 1. Known Japanese-owned
 - a. Government monetary stocks.

 Includes items comprising government monetary stocks held by Japanese governmental fiscal agencies at time taken into SCAP custody.
 - b. Other stocks
 Includes, but not necessarily limited to, government non-monetary stocks, holdings of banks, corporations and partnerships, and individual private holdings.

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2. Earmarked for non-Japanese interest.

Includes items tentatively earmarked for disposition to non-Japanese interests, e.g., Vichy French Govt; at time taken into SCAP custody. Specify interests for which earmarked, and indicate in footnote, the first time reported, circumstances re each such holding.

3. Unidentified ownership.

Report in this item metals which are not identifiable as to whether owner is Japanese or non-Japanese.

- a. Identifiable as to country from which taken
- b. Not identifiable as to country of origin
 - (1) Looted (as shown by available evidence)
 - (2) Not looted (as shown by available evidence)

B. Metals not in SCAP custody

List by categories of owner. Indicate in footnote first time reported, reason for metal not being in custody of SCAP.

4. Treasury has indicated interest in the problem of assaying the metals, as discussed with members of the SCAP staff during the recent trade mission to Japan. Therefore, pertinent comments on progress on this subject, similar to those accompanying the report for April 1946 (Reference ltr AGO 410.2 (14 May 46) CPC/CD, would be of value.

Reference is made to your letter of July 9, 1947, transmitting for this Department's comments, a draft of a proposed letter to SCAP on the subject of the report on precious metals in Japan.

In view of the consideration now being given to the desirability of utilizing stocks of precious metals in Japan to help finance Japanese foreign trade, it is suggested that in addition to the information requested in the draft letter referred to above, SCAP be requested to report the following information under paragraph 3 B of the proposed letter, headed "Metals not in SCAP Custody":

1. Monetary metals; classified by:

- a. Coins; indicating:
 - (1) Principal metallic content;
 - (2) Country of issue;
 - (3) Weight;
 - (4) Face value;
 - Dollar value;
 - (6) Approximate time of issue (if available).
- b. Other; indicating:
 - (1) Metal;
 - (2) Weight;
 - (3) Dollar value.
