According to the resolution adopted at the meeting of the beard, the garbage dumps in New Orleans may be regarded in a very suspicious light; and the city beard of health is urged to take some steps to abate this muisance. The resolution refers to numerous cominlaints concerning these dumps, and suggest that pending the installation. of incinerators to handle this garbage that lime be used liberally fordisinfecting purposes.

Myriads of flies are seen hovering ver these dumps, states the resolution and obnoxious odors are being reported. For the past three years the city board has been contemplating the installation of garhage incinerators that will dispuse of the garbage in a scientific manner, and the city board is urged net to delay any longer in the matter.

Reference is also made in the reslution to the insanitary condition of many public markets, confectionries, bakeries, and other establishments from which food is purveyed. Special mention is made of the Kansas bakery, with the recommendation that it be closed unless improvements are effected at once.
