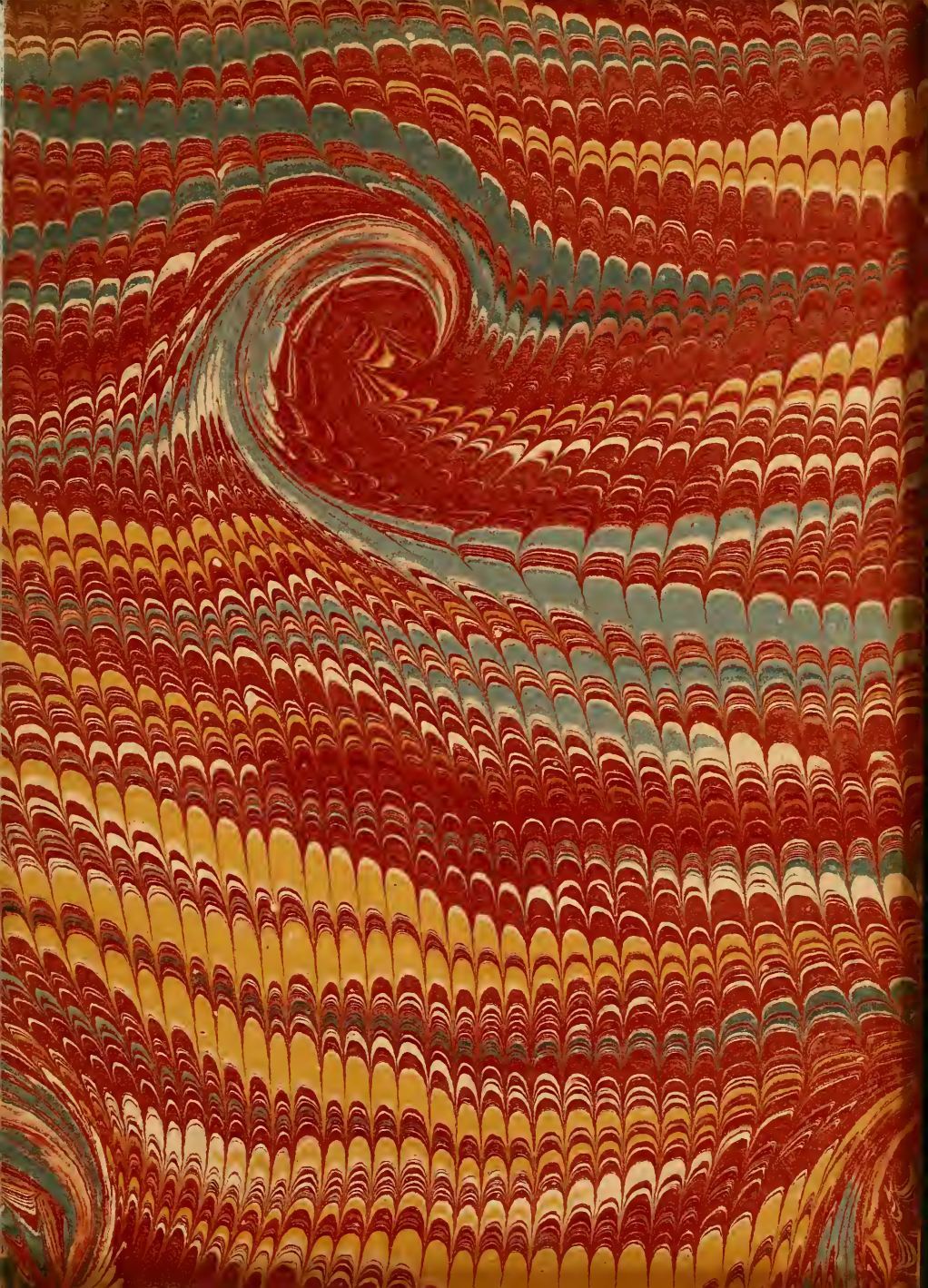

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**A treatise made by Athanasius the  
great, concerning the vse and vertue  
of the Psalmes.**



**A** holie scriptures is certeinlie the teacher of all vertue and of the true faith : but the booke of the psalmes doth expresse, after a certein maner, the very state and condition of the soule. For as he which intendeth to present himselfe to a king, will first come pound with himselfe to set in good order both his gesture and speech, least else he might be reputed rude and ignozant : euen so both this godly booke in some all such as be desirous to lead their life in vertue, and

to know the life of our saviour, which he lead in his conuersion, putting them in mind in the reading thereof, of all their affections and passions whereto their soule is inclined.

Moreover, the psalmes informe and teach every man with diuers instructions, wherby he may not onlie espye the affections and state of his soule, and to see a good paterne and discipline, how he may please God, but also with what forme of words he may amend himselfe, and how to giue God due thanks, least if helthould speake otherwise than were conuenient, he should fall into impiety by his vnreuerent estimation of God, for we must all make an account to the iudge, as well of our idle words, as our euill deeds.

**I**f thou wouldst at any time describe a blessed man, who he is and what thing maketh him so to be : thou hast the 1, 32, 41, 112, 128 psalmes.

2 If thou wouldst rebuke the Jewes for their spite they haue to Christ, thou hast the 2 psalm.

3 If thine owne familiars pursue thee, and if many rise against thee, say the 3, 143, psalmes.

4 If thus in trouble thou hast called on God, and hast taried vpon his helpe, and wouldst giue him thanks for that he hath heard thee with his helpe, sing the 4, 40, 116 psalmes.

5 If that thou feelest that euill men lay snares for thee, and therefore desirest Gods eares to heare thy prayers, sing the 5 psalm.

6 If thou feelest Gods dreadfull threats, and feelest thy selfe afraid of them : thou maist say the 6, 31, 88 psalmes.

7 If any take counsell against thee, as Achitophel did against Dauid, if thou be admonished thereof, sing the 7 psalm.

8 If thou in beholding the grace of our saviour spread on every side, speciallie for the redempcion of mankind to saluation, wouldst speake thereof in meditation to God, sing the 8 psalm.

9 If so againe thou wilt sing in giuing thanks to God for the prosperous gathering of thy frutes, vset he 8 psalmes.

10 If thou wouldst haue thine aduersarie kept backe, and thy soule saved, trust not in thy selfe but in the sonne of God, singing the 9 psalm.

11 If thou perceivest God to be wroth with his people, as though he regard

some expedient words both to comfort thee, and to put thee in remembrance of his old mercy with the 57, 142 psalms.

47 If thou wilt confound hypocrites which make glorious shewes outwardly, speake their conversion with the 58 psalme.

48 If thy pursuers command thy house to be watched, when thou art escaped give thanks to God, and graue it in the tables of thine hart for a perpetuall remembrance, and say the 59 psalme.

49 If thine enemies cruelly assault thee, and would catch thy life, offer thy subiection to God against them, and be of god comfort: for the more they rage, the more shall God subdue them, and say the 62 psalme.

50 If thou seekest persecution, and gettest thee into wilderness, feare thou not as though thou wert there alone, but hauing God nigh to thee, rise to him early, in the morning, singing the 93 psalme.

51 If thine enemies would put thee in feare, and neuer cease to lay trains for thee, and picke all maner quarrels against thee, though they be very many, giue no place to them, for the darts of babes shall be their destruction, if thou sault the 61, 68, 70, 71 psalms.

52 If thou wilt laud God with a psalme or hymne, sing the 65, 66 psalms.

53 If thou aske the mercy of God, sing the 67 psalme.

54 If thou wouldst sing to the Lord, thou hast what to say in the 96, 98 psalms.

55 If thou hast need to confesse God with thanks, sing the 71, 76, 92, 108, 111, 118, 136, 138, 145 psalms.

56 If thou seekest wicked men prosper in peace, be not offended thereat, but say the 73 psalme.

57 If thine enemies haue beset the waies whither thou fleest, and art thereby in great anguish, yet in this trouble despaire not, but pray, and if thy praier be heard, giue God thanks, and say the 77 psalme.

58 If they persecute still, and defile the house of God, kill the elect, and cast their bodies to the fowles of the aire, feare not their crueltie, but shew pittie vnto them which be in such agonie, and say the 97 psalme.

59 If thou wilt informe any man with the mysterie of the resurrection, sing the 81 psalme.

60 If thou wilt sing to the Lord, cal together Gods seruants on the sabbath day, and sing the 81, 95, 134 psalms.

61 If thine aduersaries floeke together on euery side, and thzeaten to destroy the house of God, and make their conspiracies against the religion, let not their number and power trouble thee, for thou hast an anchor of the wordes of the 83 psalme.

62 If thou callest an eyeto Gods house and to his eternall tabernacles, and hast a desire thereto as the apostle had: say thou also the 84 psalme.

63 If Gods wrath be ceased, and the captiuitie ended, thou hast cause how to giue thanks to God with Dauid, recounting his godnesse to thee and others, with the 76, 85, 116 psalms.

64 If thou wilt rebuke Painims and heretiks, for that they haue not the know ledge of God in them, thou maist haue an vnderstanding to sing to God the 86, 115 psalms.

65 If thou wilt see and know the dissent that the cathoike church hath from schisme, and wouldst conuert them, or to discern the church concerning the outward apparence and forms thereof, thou maist say the 87 psalme.

66 If thou wouldest know how Moses praised to God, and in his meditation recounting the brittle state of mans life, desired of God to direct to his thoye life, that he might follow wisdom, read the 90 psalme.

67 If thou wouldest comfort thy selfe and others in true religion, and teach them that hope in God will neuer suffer a soule to be confounded but make it bold and without feare for Gods protection, sing the 91 psalme.

68 If thou wilt sing on the sabbath day, thou hast the 92 psalme.

69 If thou wilt sing on sunday in meditation of Gods word, desiring to be instructed therein, whereby thou maist rest in Gods holy will, and cease from all the works and doctrine of vaine men, reuolue that notable psalme 119.

70 If thou wilt sing in the second day of the sabbath, thou hast the 95 psalme.

71 If thou wouldest sing vnto the Lord, thou hast what to say in the 96, 98 psalms.

72 If thou wilt sing the fourth day of the sabbath, sing the 94 psalme: for then when the Lord was betrayed, he began to take vengeance on death, and to triumph of it: therefore when thou readest the gospell, wherein thou hearest the Jewes to take counsell against the Lord, and that he standeth boldly against the diuell, then sing the foresaid psalme.

73 If thou wilt sing on good-friday, thou hast a commendation of the psalme 93, for then was the house of Gods church builded & groundly founded, though the enemies went about to hinder it: for which cause sing to God the songs of triumphant victory, with the said psalme, and with the 98 and 129 psalms.

74 If there be any captiuitie wherein thy house is laid wast and yet builded againe, sing the 96 psalme.

75 If the land be vexed with enemies, & after come to any rest by the power of God, if thou wilt sing therefore, sing the 97 psalme.

76 If thou considerest the prouidence of God in his gouernance so ouer all, and wilt instruct any with true faith and obedience, when thou hast first persuaded them to confesse themselves, sing the 100, 147 psalms.

77 If thou doest acknowledge in God his iudiciall power, and that in iudgement he mixeth mercie, if thou wilt draw nigh vnto him, thou hast the words of this psalme 101, to the end.

78 If for the imbecillitie of thy nature, thou art wearie with the continuall miseries and grieues of this life, and wouldest comfort thy selfe, sing the 102 psalme.

79 If thou wilt giue thanks to God, as it is most conuenient and due, for all his gifts, when thou wilt so do, thou hast how to reioice thy soule therevnto, with the 103, and 104 psalms.

80 If thou wilt praise God, and also know how and for what cause, and with what words thou maist best do it, consider the 113, 117, 133, 146, 147, 148, 149 150 psalms.

81 If thou hast faith to such things as God speaketh, & beliauest that which he praier it on utterest, say the psalme 116 to the end.

82 If thou seelest thy selfe to rise upward in degrees of well working: as though thou saidst with saint Paul, I forget those things which be before me thou hast the 120 psalme.

83 If thou be holden in thraldome vnder Crateng and wandring thoughts and seelest thy selfe drawne by them, whereof thou art sorry, then say thy selfe from thenceforth, and say where thou hast found thy selfe in fault, sit thee down

downe and moorne thou also as the Hebrue people did, and say with them the 137 psalme.

84 If thou perceuest that temptations be sent to proue thee, thou oughtest after such temptations to giue God the thanks, and say the 139 psalme.

85 If yet thou be in bondage by thine enemies, and wouldest taine be deliuered, say the 140 psalme.

86 If thou wouldest pray and make supplication, say the 141, 142, 143 psalms.

87 If anye tyrannous enemie rise by against the people, feare thou not no more than Dauid did Goliath, but beleue like Dauid, and sing the 144 psalme.

88 If thou art elect out of low degree, especiallie before others to some vocation to serue thy brethren, aduance not thy selfe too high against them in thine owne power, but giue God his glorie who did choose thee, and sing thou the 145 psalme.

89 If thou wilt sing of obedience, praising God with Alleluya, thou hast the 105, 106, 107, 108, 111, 112, 113, 114, 115, 117, 135, 136, 146, 147, 148, 149, and 150 psalms.

90 If thou wilt sing speciallie of our saviour Christ, thou hast of him in euery psalme, but most cheefly in the 25, 45, 110 psalms.

91 Such psalms as shew his lawfull generation of his father, and his coequal presence, be the 11, 69 psalms.

92 Such as do prophete befoze of his most holy croffe and passion, telling how many deceptful assaults he sustained for vs, and how much he suffered, be the 2, 119 psalms.

93 Such as expresse the malicious enimities of the Iewes, and betraying of Judas, are the 21, 50, 55, 69, 72, 109 psalms.

94 Such as describe his agonie in his passion, death and sepulchre be the 22, 88 psalms.

95 For his dominion and presence in the flesh, read the 116 psalme.

96 Such as shew the glorious resurrection of his bodie be the 24, 47 psalme.

97 Such as set out his ascension into heauen are the 23, 96, 98, 99 psalms.

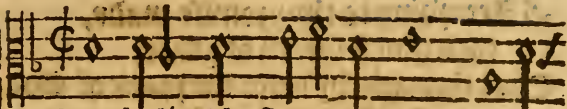
98 And that he sitteth on the right hand of his father, the 110 psalme maketh manifest.

He exhorteth good men to praise God for creating and governing all things. for his faithful promises, for scattering the counsell of the wicked, teaching that no creature preferueth any man, but only his mercie.

- 27 And rained downe flesh as thicke as dust,  
and foule as thicke as sand:  
28 Which he did cast amidst the place  
where all their tents did stand.
- 29 Then did they eate exceedingly,  
and all men had their fill:  
Yet more and more they did desire  
to serue their lusts and wils:
- 30 But as the meat was in their mouthes,  
his wrath vpon them fell:  
31 And sue the flower of all their youth  
and choise of Israell.

32 Yet fell they to their wonted sinne,  
and still they did him greeue:  
For all the wonders that he wrought,  
they would him not beleue.

33 Their dayes therefore he shortened,  
and made their honors vaine:  
Their yeares did wast and passe away,  
with terrors and with paine.

34 But euer when he plagued them,  
they sought him by and by:

35 Remembꝛing then he was their strength  
their helpe and God most hie.

36 Though in their harts they did but close,  
and flatter with the Lord:

And with their toongs and in their harts  
dissembled euerie word.

37 For why? their harts were nothing bent  
to him nor to his trade:

As yet to keepe or to performe

- 43 Nor how he wrought his miraclis,

- 44 Nor how he turned by his power  
 their waters into blood:  
 That no man might receiue his drinke  
 at riuer nor at floud.
- 45 Nor how he sent them swarmes of flies,  
 which did them soze annoy,  
 And filld their countrie full of frogs,  
 which should their land destroy.

he did pꝛeserue and keepe,

53 Without all feare both safe and sound  
he brought them out of thral,  
Whereas their foes with rage of sea  
were pouerwhelmed all.

54 And brought them forth into their coast  
euen of his holy land:  
Euen to the mount which he had got:  
by his strong arme and hand.

55 And there cast out the heathen folke,  
and did their and diuide:

64 And with the sword the preests also  
did perish euerie one:

And not a widdow left aliuie,  
their death for to bemone.

65 And then the Lord began to wake,  
like one that slept a time:

And as a valiant man of war  
refreshed after wine.

66 With Emrods in the hinder parts  
he strake his enemies al:

And put them then vnto a shame,  
that was perpetuall.

67 Then he the tent and tabernacle  
of Ioseph did refuse:

As for the tribe of Ephraim  
he would in no wise chuse.

68 But chose the tripe of Jehuda,  
whereas he thought to dwell:

Euen the noble mount Sion,  
which he did loue so well.

69 Whereas he did his temple build  
both sumptuously and sure:

Like as the earth, which he hath made  
for euer to endure.

70 Then chose he Dauid him to serue,  
his people for to keep:

Which he tooke by and brought away,  
euen from the foldes of sheep.

71 As he did follow the ewes with young,  
the Lord did him aduance:

To feed his people Israel,  
and his inheritance.

72 Thus Dauid with a faithfull heart,  
his flocke and charge did feed:

And prudently with all his power,  
did gouerne them indeed.

For the flesh euer more rebelleth against the spirite, whereby wee continually transgresse thy holy precepts and commandemēts, and so purchase to our selues through thy iust iudgement, death and damnation. Notwithstanding (O heauenly Father) for asmuch as we are displeas'd with our selues for the sinnes that we haue committed against thee, and do vnfeinedly repent vs of the same: wee most humbly beseech thee, for Iesus Christes sake, to shew thy mercy on vs

vs, to forgiue vs all our sinnes, and to increase thy holy spirite in vs, that we acknowledging from the bottome of our hartes our owne vnrightheousnesse may from henceforth not onely mortifie our sinful lusts and affections, but also bring forth such fruits, as may be agreeable to thy most blessed will, not for the worthynes thereof, but for the merites of thy dearely beloued sonne Iesus Christ our onely sauiour whom thou hast already geuen an oblation and offering for our sinnes, and for whose sake, we are certainly perswaded, that thou wilt denye vs nothing that we shall aske in his name, according to thy will. For thy spirite doth assure our consciences that thou art our mercifull father and so louest vs thy children through him, that nothing is able to remoue thy heauenly grace and fauour from vs. To thee therefore (O Father) with the sonne and the holy Ghost, be all honoz and gloyp. world without end. So be it.

**A**Lmighty God and most mercifull father wee humbly submitte our selues and fall downe before thy maiestie beseeching thee from the bottome of our hartes that this seed of thy word now sown amongst vs, may take such deepe roote, that neither the burning heat of persecution cause it to wither, neither the horny cares of this life choake it, but that as seed sown in good ground, it may bring forth thirty, sixty, and an hundred fold as thy heauenly wisdom hath appointed: And because wee haue need, continually to craue many thinges at thy handes, wee humbly beseech thee (O heauenly Father)

father) to graunt vs thy holy spirite to direct our petitions, that they may proceede from such a frequent minde; as may be agreable to thy most blessed will. And seeing that our infirmity is able to doe nothing without thy help, and that thou art not ignorant with how manye and great temptations, we pooze wretches are on euery side enclosed and compassed: Let thy strength, O Lord, sustaine our weakenesse, that we being defended with the force of thy grace, may be safely preserved against all assaults of Sathan: who goeth about continually like a roaring Lion seeking to deuour vs. Increase our faith, O mercifull father, that wee doe not swarue at any time from thy heavenly word, but augment in vs hope and loue, with a carefull keeping of all thy commandements: that no hardnesse of heart, no hypocrisy, no concupiscence of the eyes, nor intisementes of the worlde, doe draw vs away from thy obedience. And seeing we liue now in these most perilous times: let thy fatherly prouidence defend vs against the violence of our enemies, which doe seeke by all meanes to oppresse thy trueth. Furthermore forasmuch as by thy holy Apostle we bee taught, to make our prayers and supplications for all men: wee pray not onely for our selues here present, but beseech thee also, to reduce all such as yet be ignorant, from the miserable captiuitie of blindness and erroz, to the pure vnderstanding, and knowledge of thy heauenly trueth: that we all with one consent and vnitie of mindes, may worshipping thee our onely God and sauour. And that al pastors, shepherds and ministers, to whom thou hast committed the dispensation of thy holy word, and charge of thy chosen people, may both in

their life and doctrine, be found faithfull, setting on-ly before their eyes thy glozy: and that by them all poore sheepe, which wander and go astray: may be gathered and brought home to thy fold.

Moreouer, because the heartes of rulers are in thy handes, we beseech thee to direct & gouerne the harts of all kings, princes and magistrats to whom thou hast committed the sword: especially O Lord, according to our bounden duety wee beseech thee to mainetaine and increase the honorable estate of the Queenes maicesty, and all her most noble counsellers, and magistrates, with all the spirituall pastors and ministers, and all the whole body of thys common weale. Let thy fatherly fauour so preserue them, and thy holy spirite so gouerne their heartes, that they may in such sort execute their office, that thy religion may be purely mainetained, manners reformed, and sinne punished, according to the precise rule of thy holy word. And for that wee bee all members of the mysticall body of Jesus Christ, wee make our requestes vnto thee (O heauenly Father) for all such as are afflicted with any kinde of crosse or tribulation, as warre, plague, famine, sicknesse, pouerty, imprisonment, persecution, banishment, or any other kinde of thy rods, whether it bee calamity of body, or veration of minde: that it would please thee, to giue them patience and constancy, till thou send them full deliuerance of all their troubles. Roote out from hence (O Lord) all rauening wolues, which to fill their bellies seeke to destroy thy flocke. And shew thy great mercies vppon those our brethren in other countreies, which are persecuted, cast into prison, and dayly condemned to death for the testimony of thy truth.

utterlie destitute of all mans aide, yet let thy sweet  
comfort neuer depart e from them : but so inflame  
their hartes with thy holpe spirit, that they maye  
boldly and chearfully abide such triall, as thy god-  
ly wisdom shall appoint. So that at length as  
well by their death as by their life, the kingdome of  
thy deare sonne Iesus Christ, may increase and  
shine through all the world. In whose name  
we make our humble petitions vnto thee  
as he hath taught vs. Our Father which  
art in heauen hallowed. &c.

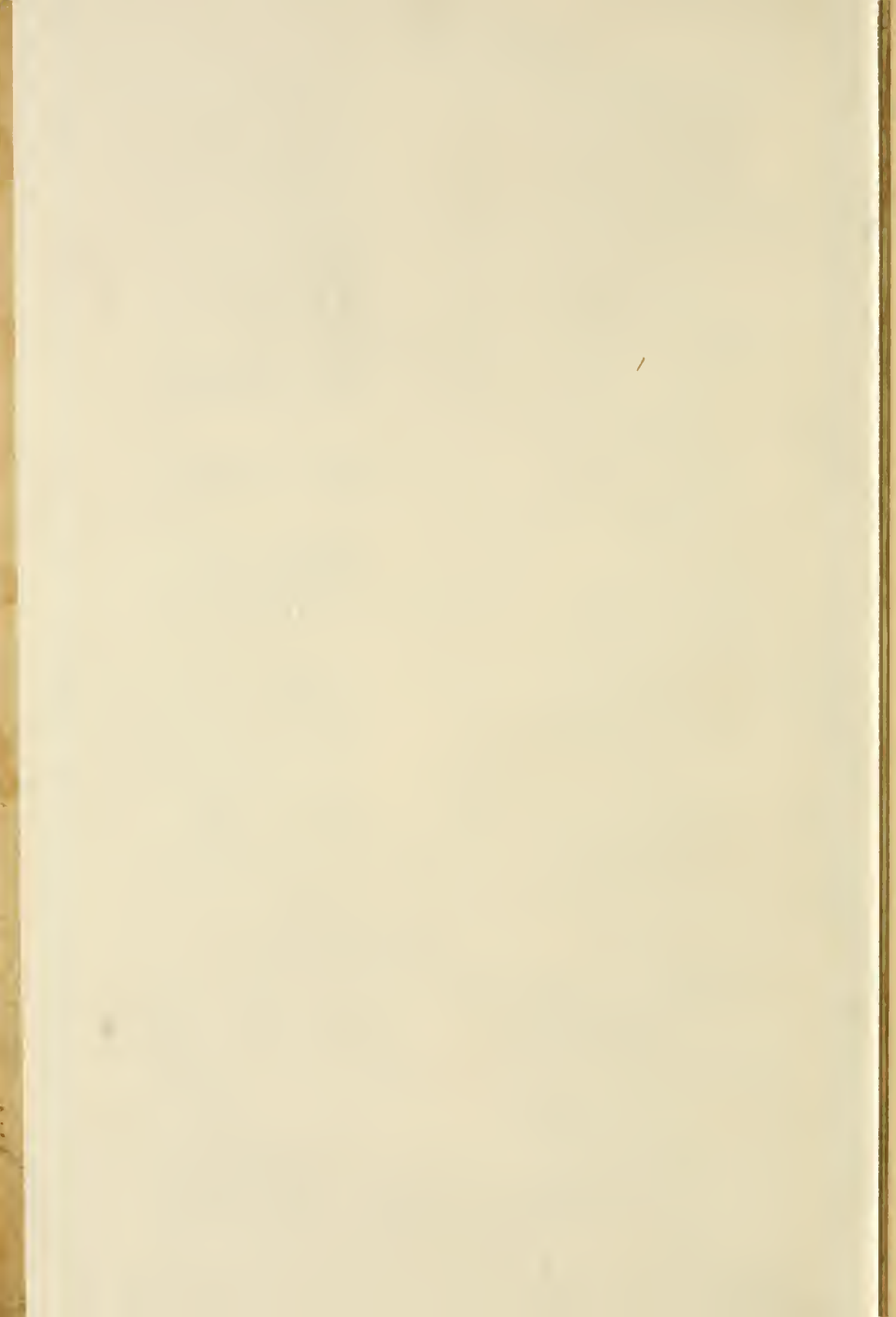

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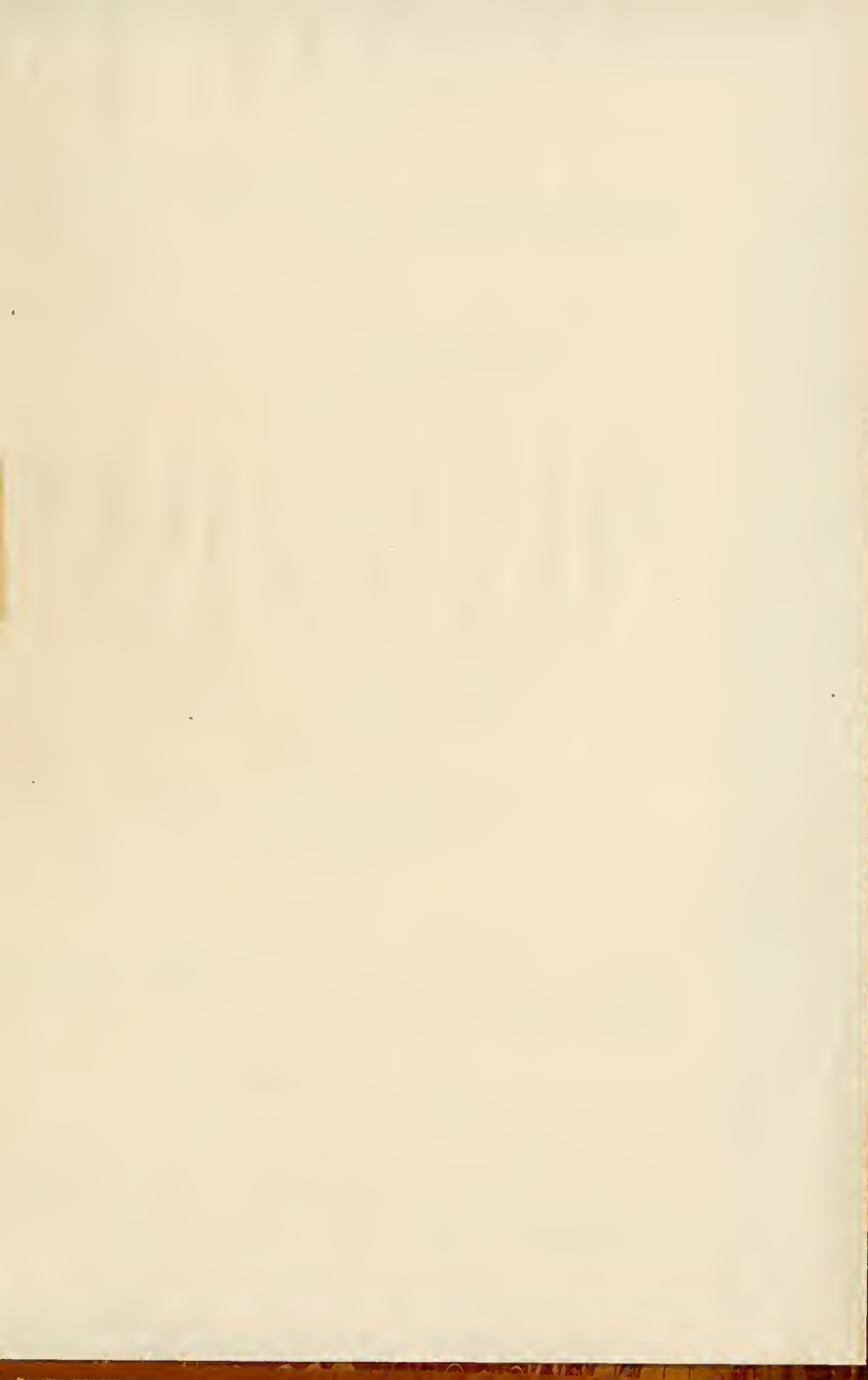

The author was a most eccentric character. He was first a Protestant, he then went over to the Church of Rome. Returning from the Continent to England, he was seized and committed to the Tower and again recanted. Going a second time abroad he was apprehended and a second time was reconciled to the Romish persuasion. He also wrote a book replete with the most virulent abuse of the Romish Clergy, and scandalous representations of their licentiousness and vices.
